Susan Rungren provides update on plans for pipeline

Susan Rungren began her career with the City of Ventura in 1999 as the Utilities Engineer for the City's Water and Wastewater Divisions and has served as the Water Resource Manager for the last seven years. Mrs. Rungren obtained her bachelor's degree in Civil Engineering from Oregon State University and is a licensed Professional Engineer. She has professional affiliations including the Association of California Water Agencies of Ventura County.

In May 2018, she became Ventura Water's Assistant General Manager. In this position, Rungren shepherds key future water projects such as the State Water Interconnection Project and the VenturaWaterPure project that will maximize the reuse of recycled water. She works closely with Ventura Water, the Community Development Department, Public Works Department, as well as stakeholders and community organizations to meet long term water supply demands.

I asked if it's true the City of Ventura has been paying the state \$1M/year since 1971 for the rights to state water.

"The City has been paying for our rights to the 10,000 acre-feet since 1971. All State Water Project (SWP) contractors pay an annual fee, regardless of the *Continued on page 8*

worked here at Rubicon many times and are always surprised to hear people around town ask, "What's Rubicon?". It catches us by surprise. The Company's been presenting professional theatre in Ventura for 20 years and yet there are still folks who don't know that we're here or what we're trying to achieve. We felt like the pianos are a terrific way to engage people on the street and either remind them of Rubicon's presence or let them know about the Company for the first time. These pianos grab you on so many levels - visual, auditory, tactile."

She went on to say, "I found the pianos in a couple of places - on Craigslist as well as through people who heard about the project and reached out to me. The Craigslist "free" section routinely has several free acoustic pianos listed. I contacted a bunch of owners and came up with a list of 5. Then I hired 4 strapping young men, rented a truck and we drove all over Ventura and even up to Santa Barbara to collect the pianos and get them out on the street. It was fun! Hard work, but really fun. Since the initial pianos went out, we've had 2 more pianos donated to the cause by The Arc Foundation Thrift Store and The Child Abuse

I know it is all about the funding. The council is working out terms with the county to lease 2323 Knoll Drive for a year-round homeless shelter. It will cost an estimated \$4 million to convert the building into a residential facility,

If you have better ideas and solutions I sure would like to hear them. As would the City Council.

The Clean Power Alliance is made up of 31 jurisdictions and the counties of Los Angeles and Ventura, awarded Calpine Energy Solutions a four-year contract to provide data management and call center services to an initial 1 million customers.

Ventura, Camarillo, Moorpark, Ojai, Oxnard, Simi Valley and Thousand Oaks have joined the Clean Power Alliance, which offers an alternative to Southern California Edison and other traditional power companies.



Homeless voting

Did you know? In California, someone who is homeless may register to vote at a location they state is the place where they spend most of their time. The person must provide a description of the location that is clear enough for the elections official to establish that person's right to vote in a particular precinct. This ensures accurate elections materials can be provided to this voter. In these instances, a mailing address needs to be provided (i.e. shelter or day center) in order for the voter to receive election materials.

restrictions on passengers and driving late at night during the first year they have a license.

Lead by example: Practice safe driving yourself. Have practice driving sessions with your teen.

Set Ground Rules: No cell phones, no passengers, no speeding, no alcohol, no drowsy driving, and always buckle up. No keys until they know the rules. Establish consequences you will enforce if your teen breaks the rules.

With driving comes great responsibility: Remind your teen that driving requires your full attention. Texts and phone calls can wait. Teach them about zero-tolerance laws, and the adult consequences they face for driving after drinking or using drugs. Urge them to never ride with someone who has been drinking or using drugs.

"Whether it's drinking and driving, not wearing a seat belt, speeding, driving distracted or with friends in the car, it's important for parents to let their teen know that driving is not a right, but a privilege," said Traffic Corporal Al Gomez. "It can be taken away when they don't follow the rules."

Teaching teen drivers how to be safe

The week of October 21-27, 2018 is National Teen Driver Safety Week, and the Ventura Police Department wants to remind parents and guardians the importance of talking to their teen drivers about new responsibilities and rules that come with operating a vehicle.

"For teens, getting a license is a rite of passage tied to freedom and independence, but is also something that can be dangerous because teens lack experience behind the wheel and are more likely to take risks," said Traffic Sergeant Michael Brown. "National Teen Driver Safety Week is a way to encourage all parents to instill good driving habits that help their teens stay safe on the road."

The reality is that vehicle crashes remain the leading cause of death for teens ages 15 to 18. According to data from the Statewide Integrated Traffic Records System (SWITRS), there were 73,736 crashes in 2016 involving drivers 16 to 20 years old in California alone. In those crashes, 437 people were killed.

Throughout the week the Ventura Police Department will join the California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) in offering tips to parents and caregivers on how to talk to teens about the consequences of making dangerous and illegal choices behind the wheel.

amount of SWP water received, to help pay for the system and ongoing maintenance costs. The annual fee varies, but the cost to the City has recently been about \$1M/year. The City has taken advantage of the opportunity, when available over the years, to recoup a portion of these costs by transferring our annual allocation to other SWP contractors."

 ${\it Is there consideration of dropping the pipeline?}$

"Although this has been discussed over the years, the City considers State Water as an important supply source to improve system reliability. The City currently depends fully on local water supplies consisting of surface water from the Ventura River and Lake Casitas, groundwater from three local groundwater basins, and recycled water from the Ventura Water Reclamation Facility. These supplies have been sufficient to meet demands to date, but continued drought conditions, heightened environmental requirements, compounded by continued population growth are threatening the City's ability to meet water demands and will require supplemental supplies."

Where will the state water come from once the pipeline is built?

"The State Water Project is a water storage and delivery system of reservoirs, aqueducts, power plants and pumping plants that starts in Northern California and extends south more than 700 miles - 2/3 the length of California. The nearest SWP wholesaler to the City of Ventura is Calleguas Municipal Water District. Calleguas imports and distributes water from Metropolitan Water District, water that arrives via the SWP. The proposed connection point to Calleguas system is near their Springville Reservoir facility, located in the southwest portion of the City of Camarillo."

Have we started to build the pipeline?

"We have begun the studies at this time. The City of Ventura in conjunction with Calleguas, the United Water Conservation District and Casitas Municipal Water District recently completed a Pipeline Alignment Study. We are now preparing an Environmental Impact Report for the preferred alignment. Upon completion of the environmental documents, the next steps before construction can commence will be completion of agency agreements, right of way agreements, permits and project design."

Will the pipeline increase Ventura's water supply? "Although the City's entitlement is 10,000 acre-feet per year, this allocation is subject to availability as established by the Department of Water Resources. Based on historical allocations, the range of available SWP water has been 5% to 100% over the last 25 years. The water projected to be delivered by the SWP is not being considered as a reliable means of increasing water supply volume for the City on an annual basis but will give the City flexibility to utilize SWP when it is available in lieu of water from Lake Casitas, groundwater or Ventura River water. Additional benefits to the City include improving water quality and providing an emergency/backup supply for Ventura Water's proposed reuse project, VenturaWaterPure."

Would water delivery fees from the state cost extra once the pipeline is completed?

"Yes, additional payments are made by each SWP based on the amount of SWP water delivered to their agency".

Lastly, once the pipeline is completed, will our water bills go down?

"Ventura Water is owned by the City of Ventura and its water and wastewater customers. The water and wastewater functions are enterprise business entities that do not make a profit and their expenses and revenues are accounted for in proprietary funds, separate from the City's General Fund. Customer rates must generate sufficient revenues to sustain operations, maintenance, debt payments and capitol improvement projects as well as the costs of oversight and administrative functions performed by the City. Every dollar paid is invested locally to ensure that our community continues to have reliable, quality water services today and into the future. The rate increases are needed to keep pace with inflationary expenses, renew our aging pipelines, facilities and growing regulatory and environmental compliance requirements".

Anticipated completion for the pipeline is 2022 – 2023.

Wells Fargo volunteers pitched in to help with Thomas Fire recovery efforts at the Big Rock

'LT awarded \$10,000

Ventura Land Trust (VLT) was recently awarded \$10,000 from Wells Fargo & Company (NYSE: WFC) for Thomas Fire recovery activities at the Big Rock Preserve in Ventura. VLT's Big Rock Preserve, located off Highway 33 in the Ventura River watershed, was hard hit by the Thomas Fire, losing 85% of the more than 1,000 trees and plants the nonprofit had planted on the property. In addition, there was damage to trails, tools and wildlife habitat.

VLT will use the funding to replant many of the trees and plants that were burned in the Thomas Fire. For the past ten months, community volunteers have participated in restoration work days at Big Rock, on Saturday, Sept. 21, a group of Wells Fargo employees volunteered to water newly planted flowers and trees and spread mulch to help prevent the spread of invasive plants and keep the new plantings hydrated.

"We are very grateful for Wells Fargo's support of our Thomas Fire recovery efforts," said Derek Poultney, VLT Executive Director. "Thanks to financial help from companies like Wells Fargo,

combined with the efforts of concerned community volunteers, there is lots of regrowth at Big Rock and the preserve is making a beautiful comeback."

In March, 2018, Wells Fargo committed \$800,000 to help in the recovery efforts related to the Thomas Fire and Montecito mudslides. VLT is one of many nonprofit organizations that has benefited from the company's commitment to rebuilding and revitalization in the region.

Ventura Land Trust (formerly Ventura Hillsides Conservancy) is dedicated to permanently preserving and protecting the land, water, wildlife, and scenic beauty of the Ventura region for current and future generations. Founded in 2003, the 501(C)(3) non-profit organization is supported by over 600 members, local businesses, and government partners. Ventura Land Trust manages 90 acres of land along the Ventura River and is negotiating the purchase of its first hillside property. Ventura Land Trust's offices are located in the Poinsettia Pavilion, 3451 Foothill Rd.

Sneaky little scary enemy in the house!

Several months ago, one of my neighbors told me a scary story. She and her husband did not know that her very young daughter had made a "friend" of a sneaky little enemy that had invaded their house. The little girl had been feeding a mouse.

The mother said, "I told her, Honey, that mouse could have bitten you. But children are so innocent and naive-she thought the mouse was her friend who would never bite anyone." Fortunately, the little girl had not been bitten, and the parents immediately called for professional help to rid their property of mice.

But let's find out why this "cute little mouse" (the child's words) could have been very dangerous. For example, a surprisingly high percentage of the white-footed mice collected last summer in Howard County, Md, in an Agricultural Research Service (ARS) Areawide Integrated Tick Management Project, turned out to be infected with the bacteria that cause Lyme disease.

The high rate of white-footed mice infected with Borrelia burgdorferi, the bacteria that cause Lyme disease, in Howard County - just over 50 percent of captured mice -was a little surprising to ARS project leadership. Then it was demonstrated that white-footed mice elsewhere in the USA have infection rates as high as 80 percent.

What may this mean for homeowners? Professionals would advise caution on several levels. For example, unwittingly, people often make mistakes. So, which category might you be in when it comes to the most common mistakes homeowners make regarding rodent prevention? Consider:

17% of homeowners leave trash bins uncovered.

25% of homeowners place trash and recycling bins curbside on nondesignated pick-up dates. 30% of homeowners do not properly

seal pet food stored in garages. 30% of homeowners have doors and windows that are not tightly sealed. 22% of homeowners are not keeping vegetation trimmed and manicured.

However, the most helpful advice and solution we can offer is to warn families to call the professionals for help as soon as you become aware of a potential pest



Shortly before 1 am, on Sunday morning, Oct.21, a two alarm fire broke out in Cabrillo Village (in East Ventura). The blaze resulted in several major injuries, two houses consumed by fire, and an adjacent home damaged.

Two homes had significant fire activity upon the first apparatus arrival. Numerous cars were fully engulfed in fire as well.

Four people were injured, reportedly all from the same house that initially caught fire. Two of the residents were in critical condition, with the other two sustaining moderate injuries.

Powerlines fell along the side of a row of homes that were threatened, exposing arching wires that hampered firefighting efforts.

A total of 15 people were displaced due to the incident. The Red Cross arrived on scene and provided assistance to the victims of the fire. Initial estimated damages are well over \$500,000, not including vehicles.







Cypress Place presented program on avoiding senior scams

In collaboration with the Ventura County Adult Abuse Prevention Council (VCAAPC), Cypress Place Senior Living in Ventura presented a fun, free and educational program on avoiding senior scams.

The Stop Senior Scams (SM) Acting Program used theater to dramatize senior scams. Members of the troupe, ranging in age from 60-97 years-old, write and perform skits based on their own personal experiences. It is a memorable way to equip those who are vulnerable with the knowledge they need to protect themselves.

Using popular songs like the Rolling Stones "You Can't Always Get What You Want", "Getting to Know You ", from the Rogers and Hammerstein musical "The King and I", Abba's "Money, Money, Money", and the Supremes "Stop in the Name of Love", the troupe brings theatricality, laughter and excitement to a commonly frightening and frustrating topic.

The program was founded in 1997 by director Adrienne Omansky who was a teacher of older adults and adults with disabilities. The Stop Senior Scams (SM) Acting Program has been recognized by the U.S. House of Representatives and the California State Assembly, according to Nancy Cole, an eldercare manager and board member of VCAAPC.

Omansky stated "On March 7 , I testified for the U.S Special Committee on Aging about the effectiveness of this Peer to Peer Education Program. The program started nine years ago and comments from seniors have been collected and reported in my testimony. I learned that anyone can be a victim regardless of education, race, gender, national origin, or social economic background. Seniors are more likely to tell their peers they have been scammed than family members including their spouses. I have learned that seniors often do not know

where to report scams to. I have learned the senior scams are grossly under reported. I learned that residents in Assisted Living Facilities are specially vulnerable to scams."

Also on hand during the event were vendors who provide a variety of services to the senior population. Attendees asked questions and received materials from these corporate sponsors.

The Ventura County Adult Abuse Prevention Council is a not-for-profit service organization dedicated to the prevention of elder and dependent adult abuse. To learn more about VCAAPC please visit their web site at vcaapc.org.

NIH-funded study examined outcomes

In a large clinical trial to determine the risks and benefits of daily low-dose aspirin in healthy older adults without previous cardiovascular events, aspirin did not prolong healthy, independent living (life free of dementia or persistent physical disability). Risk of dying from a range of causes, including cancer and heart disease, varied and will require further analysis and additional follow-up of study participants. These initial findings from the ASPirin in Reducing Events in the Elderly (ASPREE) trial, partially supported by the National Institutes of Health, were published online on September 16, 2018 in three papers in The New England Journal of Medicine.

Homeless at 81

Joan Lucas has worked hard all her life, she managed a training program for many years with Budget Rental Car and at 64, she started her own business. She worked 7 days/week taking only one Monday off per month to "sleep and recover - I am not a deadbeat!" she said. Collecting social security at 65, she continued working. And by age 68, "I was making money hand over fist!" But in 2007, she suffered severe injuries inflicted by her mentally ill son that required extensive hospitalization and rehabilitation.

In 2008, "the economy went to pieces, but I continued to work through the year and I broke even". It was obvious to her that the next year would be worse, so she "folded". Joan says that sixteen years ago, the amount of social security she received was enough to live on but, "prices kept climbing!" She tells me she did get a 3% increase in her social security, but her bills went up by 5% three years in a row. "My income has not kept up with the economy", she simply stated, "I've outlived my friends of 50-60 years and I've outlived my money".

Joan was recently renting a room here in Ventura and reports, "I think this must have been the first time this woman rented a room in her home because it came as a surprise to her that I might want a little space in the refrigerator or to do some light cooking". She adds, she was not allowed to "drag her oxygen around". Joan has COPD (Chronic obstructive pulmonary disease). She wasn't allowed to bathe everyday either and her landlord was angry because the oxygen made the electric bill go up.

Joan had until October 3rd to find a new place to live. Her registered service dog, Jackie has been her companion for ten years, but potential landlords only hear "dog". Affordable Housing requires a minimal income and she didn't meet the criteria... Joan confessed, "I was hugely terrified!"

Just one day before Joan and Jackie would have ended up on the street, she found Cindy Wilson with Gabriel's House in Oxnard. Residents there are from 3 months to 81 years of age and the program is like our City Center Transitional Living in Ventura. Cindy shares, "Joan had a cool journey to find us, she is as much an asset to the house as we are for her". Gabriel's House has a fundraiser coming up on October 26th called "Operation Hope", it is an event to end the cycle of homelessness. Joan confides, "I see all of this as a way to make us aware that homeless people are not necessarily who we perceive them to be".

"Does Medicare include coverage for my prescription drugs?"

What you need to know this Medicare enrollment season

It's that time of year when people with Medicare review their health insurance choices and enroll in a

Medicare Advantage or Prescription Drug plan for the coming year.

People typically have a lot of questions as they research their Medicare options, which primarily include Original Medicare, Medicare Advantage and Medicare Supplement plans, before finding the plan that best fits their needs.

Here are some of the most commonly asked questions Humana licensed health insurance agents get from consumers during the Medicare Annual Election Period:

When is the annual enrollment period to choose a Medicare plan for 2019?

The Medicare Advantage and Prescription Drug Plan Annual Election Period takes place from Oct. 15 through Dec. 7, 2018, for coverage that takes effect Jan. 1, 2019.

Do I have to re-enroll in Medicare every year?

You don't need to sign up for Original Medicare each year. However, you should review your Medicare Advantage or Prescription Drug Plan coverage annually, since Medicare plans and personal circumstances can change every year. If you take no action during the annual enrollment period, you'll typically automatically be re-enrolled in your same medical or prescription plan for 2019. Does Medicare include coverage for my pre-

scription drugs?

Original Medicare does not cover most prescription drugs. Many Medicare Advantage plans include prescription drug coverage, or you can sign up for a Part D Prescription Drug Plan separate-

ly. A licensed agent can look up your medications and tell you what the cost of each drug would be on a plan.

How are health insurers like Humana able

Private insurers keep premiums low through programs like disease and chronic care management, which help people better manage health conditions and, in turn, reduce health care costs. Keep in mind that you still need to pay your Medicare Part B premium, which covers medical services and preventive care. You might want to use the additional premium dollars you save for out-of-pocket medical costs, such as co-pays. How do I find out if my doctors, hospitals and specialists are in my Medicare Advantage provider network?

Most Medicare Advantage plans offer easy-to-use online tools to help you find doctors and hospitals that are in the plan's network. A licensed agent can also help you look up hospitals and doctors to see if they're accepting a plan

and taking new patients.

If I select a Medicare plan for the coming year, and then find I don't like it, can I drop it and choose another plan?

The plan you select by Dec. 7 will be your Medicare plan for all of 2019, with few exceptions, so it's wise to research your options carefully. If you sign up for a Medicare Advantage plan for 2019, and then find it's not the right fit, between Jan. 1 and March 31, there will be an Open Enrollment Period during which you can switch from a Medicare Advantage or a Medicare Advantage-Prescription Drug Plan to another Medicare Advantage plan with or without prescription drug coverage, or choose Original Medicare with or without a stand-alone Prescription Drug Plan. Ways to make a home safe and comfortable for seniors

Losing strength and balance can be common consequences of aging, and living with these changes is rarely easy. It is frustrating not to be able to do everything you once could; it can also be dangerous due to an increased likelihood of falls.

Changes in mobility can make your own home seem like a dangerous place. However, there are ways to make the home a safer place for seniors. With a few altera-

tions and upgrades, you can live comfortably in your home again or bring aging loved ones into your home safely. Here are six ways you can bring your home up to snuff for anyone easing into old age.

Falls are a serious hazard for older individuals, often resulting in injury or even death. Fortunately, the necessary adjustments for avoiding trips are simple. Remove throw rugs from the floors as well as cords and other items that can be tripped over. Move furniture around so that there are large pathways that will be easier to navigate. Outdoors, make sure walkways are smooth and kept clear of debris. If possible, remove thresholds between rooms and into the home so an older person does not have to step over the threshold.

Stairs can be difficult for seniors to navigate, whether they are painful for aching joints, cause balance issues, or are just harder to climb than they used to be. If you are looking for a new residence that is senior-friendly, stay away from stairs if possible. When making changes to a home, trade the stairs for a ramp for a wheelchair. Leading up to the home, take out stairs and instead use an inclined walkway. Inside the home, be sure stairs have handrails and add nonslip tread to avoid falls. A stair lift can also be installed to help a person get up and down.


Adequate lighting is critical for seniors, especially when their eyesight begins to worsen over time. Make sure the home is well lit in every room. Good lighting can help a person to get around their home safely and avoid tripping over objects or bumping into furniture. Put bright lights in hallways and stairs and add extra lamps. Outdoors, make sure pathways are well lit. Consider motion-sensor lights that will help keep the area bright at all times and will not need to be turned on.

One aspect of a senior-friendly home that may not be as obvious are the appliances. Appliances can become more difficult to use as eyesight declines and technology advances. Find simple, easy-to-read appliances, such as microwaves with programmed buttons. Look for appliances with an automatic shut-off, which will ensure they do not stay on if they are forgotten. Find appliances that may be easier for someone with limited mobility, like a side-by-side refrigerator and freezer. Adjust the water heater to avoid scalding injuries.

The bathroom is a prime location for falls among the elderly, especially those with poor strength or balance. Several changes in the bathroom can help a person maintain their independence and reduce the risk of getting hurt. Install grab bars in the shower or next to the toilet to help with standing up and exiting or entering the shower. If a tub is being used, a bench or bar can help give support while stepping into or out of the tub. Shower chairs and nonslip mats also help prevent slipping while showering and bathing.

People with arthritis or weakness in their hands may find it difficult or painful to do simple tasks like turning on the lights or opening a door. Some relatively cost-effective changes can make these acts much easier. Change out light switches with a toggle switch and change doorknobs and faucets to levers. These alternatives can lessen the amount of force and grip strength needed.

A slip and fall and be life-changing, or even life-ending, for a senior. Make your home a safe and comfortable environment by making changes in layout, fixtures, and appliances. The changes are small, but the gains in safety are enormous.



No other victims have been identified

Long term Ventura County resident Ron Zenone, age 76 was sentenced October 10th by Ventura Superior court judge Bruce A. Young for lewd acts on a minor child under the age of 14.

Zenone pled "No Contest" to the felony charge on September 12 with the court finding him guilty. The victim, his granddaughter said during tearful impact statement that she was abused almost every holiday we visited him when I was 10 years old and it continued for over 10 years.

Judge Bruce Young gave him a sentence of 365 days and 3 years probation and he must participate in a recognized treatment program as well as register as a sex offender. He is scheduled to turn himself in to begin his sentence on November 6, 2018.

Emotional victim impact statements were read by the victim and her parents prior to sentencing. The victim and her family felt the sentence was not adequate considering the lifetime effects the victim will likely suffer, but are satisfied that they can put this painful chapter in their life behind them. Although Ron has 6 grandchildren the victim was his only granddaughter.

Vista Del Mar reopens

While the official grand reopening date remains to be announced, as of October 16th, Vista Del Mar began admitting patients. 55 of the previous 87 beds are now available after much hard work from the dedicated staff, the fire department and Armstrong Construction who I'm told, worked so well with other community individuals along with OSHPD (Office of Statewide Planning and Development).

Its taken ten months since the Thomas Fire took much of the private psychiatric hospital from where it has stood at the top of Seneca Street since 2001. Delays were with the infrastructure, a new water pump and issues requiring lots of testing that often led to other problems and further repairs. Two modular buildings have been added for administration and three of the preexisting buildings have been updated because hospital vacancy offered an opportunity to do so. Two large barren lots stand as a reminder of the fire's devastation. Plans are to eventually rebuild, "we want to restore the beds we lost", said Jetta Zellner, Director of Clinical Services.

Vista Del Mar is a private psychiatric hospital that takes private insurance, although some do pay out of pocket.

The timing for bed availability couldn't be better because at this time of year, suicide risk is more prevalent among adolescents due to school stressors, grades, peer pressure etc... Although beds are assigned to fit the population's needs, adolescents are separated from the other patients.

In addition to the upgrades, a new program has been implemented called "Expressive Therapy" headed by Victoria Troshina a licensed art therapist. Victoria has worked for Vista Del Mar since 2016 and although there was a recreational therapy department in place before the Thomas Fire, she is "revamping the whole program". She said that it's more structural now, "we never did themes before, we just followed a curriculum and social services followed their curriculum, but now we're on the same page".

The themes will focus on the phases of care - the crisis phase and the treatment phase. Every day will be a different theme such as identifying triggers, managing thoughts and feelings or boundaries in relationships.

Victoria does an assessment on each patient within the first 24 hours of their admission to determine what recreational activities they enjoy that help them cope. She looks for anything expressive, do they like to walk, paint, read or is it music that would be effective while they're there? According to Jetta, "not everybody learns in the same way, expressive therapy is a different approach to treatment, it can be visual, verbal or hands on, it definitely helps with patient recovery".

"A lot of kids say they play the piano, so I'll bring the electric keyboard", Victoria smiled, "I try to identify with what they enjoy". "And some ask for the guitar", added Jetta, "we have a military program and a lot of our military love to play guitar". Victoria reports they have a lot of musical instruments and in fact, she had just purchased a brand-new guitar.

Art is another very effective tool and an alternative to verbal communication. "One of the things I've noticed is we get a lot of nonverbal, gravely disabled individuals who are in a traumatic state and they're afraid", Victoria said, "I'll sit next to them and do a soft scribble on a piece of paper with a crayon and pass it to them, it's a way to engage in nonverbal communication, it's a very scary place when you can't express yourself".

Victoria emphasized that there is such a high expectation of what artwork should look like, "we forget it's the process, not the product, we call it mark making, not art making". With patient's consent, some artwork gets displayed but sadly, "old artwork was lost in the fire".

The staff and their patients aren't the only ones that have returned to the top of Seneca Street, a family of deer have returned as well. Jetta shares," they're back! They love the figs and berries off the trees". The location and surroundings of Vista Del Mar must certainly enhance the treatment process...

Farm to table — what's in season for winter?

The popular phrase "farm to table" literally refers to fresh produce — fruits and vegetables — that are picked straight from the field (or farm) and delivered to your table vs. having to be preserved or frozen and shipped long distances to reach your grocer and ultimately your table.

Not only is farm to table produce more flavorful and fresh, the dollars you spend close to home help local businesses. It's estimated that the food purchased in grocery stores has to travel an average of 1,500 miles. The reduced travel distance required when you buy from local markets helps curb the consumption of fossil fuels used in transport making it a win-win for the environment as well as local farmers and retailers.

In Ventura County, we're incredibly fortunate to have access to abundant, fresh, locally grown produce year round. One of the best ways to purchase this local bounty is at Certified Farmers' Markets. On Saturday mornings from 8:30 am to Noon the Downtown Ventura Certified Farmers' Market at 305 E. Santa Clara Street offers the community a delicious array of locally produced fresh fruits, vegetables, cut flowers, and other tantalizing items all at the peak of the season.

Talk to your local farmer

Have you ever wondered how your food is produced? Do the farmers use organic farming practices? What are (if any) the chemicals utilized? Don't hesitate to get to know your local farmers and talk to them about their farming practices. You'll also discover excellent cooking tips and learn their favorite recipes.

"For winter, we have a lot of citruses," said Ed Etheridge from Etheridge Farm Organics at a recent Downtown Ventura Certified Farmers' Market. "Fukumoto navel oranges, mandarins, and tangerines are abundant. We also have apples, kiwi, and Fuyu persimmons (a round fruit), which you can eat like an apple. Our Hachiya persimmons taste great when they get somewhat pudding-like; otherwise, they're very astringent. You can also freeze them and when you're ready to serve, eat them with a spoon as you would a bowl of sorbet."

Some other local regulars you'll find this time of year at the Downtown market include Oxnard's Rodriguez Family Farms,

which sells only strawberries that they pick fresh the morning of each market.

"We've been organic farming since the mid-80's," said Eric from Tutti Frutti Farms. "We specialized in all varieties of heirloom tomatoes. The Cherokee Purple tomato has a savory taste, and Marvel Stripe has a super sweet tropical flavor. This time of year, we also produce all types of peppers and squash."

During winter months the McGrath Family Farms display offers an array of gorgeous radishes, winter beets, winter squashes, and a variety of leafy greens and more.

During a visit, you might also want to stop in and get a free sample of some pure, natural, raw honey from Blue Ridge Honey.

Once you visit the local Downtown Certified Farmers' Market, you'll be sure to find what you're looking for — and more, so make sure you bring your reusable totes.

Santa Paula Animal Rescue Center (SPARC) has received a new \$20,000 grant from PetSmart Charities. The grant has been earmarked to support the pet retention efforts of the Santa Paula Animal Rescue Center, so they can continue helping homeless pets in the City of Santa Paula.

Santa Paula Animal Rescue Center, SPARC, is a No-Kill, No-Excuses, 501(C3) city pound in Santa Paula where every single animal arriving gets a second chance at life.

A team of researchers at Cornell University has found evidence suggesting that little dogs lift their legs when peeing at a higher angle than bigger dogs as a means of tricking other dogs into thinking they are bigger. In their paper published in Journal of Zoology, the group describes a study they carried out and what they found.

Most anyone familiar with dogs knows that they tend to pee in a lot of spots, especially males. They also seem to like peeing on objects that extend up from the ground, such as bushes, fire hydrants, etc. Prior research has suggested that such behavior is a way for dogs to communicate with one another. Communications can occur because dogs have very keen noses and brain parts able to tease out specifics from other dogs simply by sniffing their urine. By sniffing dogs can learn a lot about the dog-such as its gender, age, fertility and some aspects of its health. These communications occur as a means for dogs to learn more about other dogs in the area. And now it seems that some dogs have added a little something to the message they want to convey-some trickery involving size.

Their study consisted of taking many dogs of all sizes out for walks and observing very closely how they behaved when peeing. One important factor they noted was the angle of the leg when raised. Another was measuring where on an object the urine wound up.

The team found that little dogs lifted their legs at a higher angle than bigger dogs and in so doing caused

their pee to be applied higher up on targeted objects than it would be otherwise. The researchers suggest this likely indicates that the little dogs are attempting to trick others dogs in the area into thinking they are bigger than they actually are.

Dogs form an attachment to their owner and as a result can find it stressful to be separated from them. It used to be conventional wisdom that you should ignore your dog before you go out, but a pilot study finds gentle petting of dogs before a short separation makes them more calm than if they were ignored before the separation.

Separation-related issues are a welfare concern for dogs and may affect the human-animal bond. But how to help dogs who don't have separation-related issues has received very little attention.

A new study by Dr. Chiara Mariti et al, published in the Journal of Veterinary Behavior, looks at the effects of gentle petting on dogs' stress response to separation.

As it is a pilot study, there were only 10 dogs. The study took place at a field which was a neutral location, away from the dogs' homes where they were used to being left, and the dogs were on leash.

All dogs took part in two conditions. In the gentle petting condition, the owner spent one minute petting the dog before going away and leaving the dog with the experimenter.

In the neutral condition, owners ignored the dog for one minute prior to going away and leaving the dog with the experimenter.

The dogs were not highly stressed by the separation, as shown by low salivary cortisol levels and by their behaviors.

When dogs were petted before the absence, they spent more time showing calm behaviors during the absence, and their heart rate was lower after the test, compared to when they were ignored before the absence.

Calm behaviors were lying down, and sniffing the ground for a period of 3 seconds or longer (sniffing for a shorter period was seen as a stress signal, as sniffing can be a sign of stress in dogs).

The paper concludes. "This pilot study suggests that petting a dog before a brief separation from the owner may have a positive effect, making the dog calmer during the separation itself. Further studies are needed to analyze more in depth its effectiveness, especially in dogs affected by separation anxiety."



2018 NAMI Walk

First, there was the rain Friday night. Not something you plan for in Southern California for outdoor events. The NAMI Walk, the group's biggest fundraiser and celebration of determination and hope, was the next day...

6:30 a.m., Ventura Pier parking

lot. There are puddles but the rain has stopped. Trucks, boxes, tables, supplies, and people all pouring in. Volunteers who believe in the cause of de-stigmatizing mental illness and advocating for care. Many have t-shirts with the name of their walking teams

and heartfelt sayings about the sorrow and hope for the person, the families, and society at large.

My group is the "NAMI Mommies" and our t-shirt says, "Providing Support with a Mother's Love." We met in a NAMI class for families, and formed out own support group. It really helps to have others for education and emotional assistance.

But back to the Pier, it appears to be chaos but there are a couple of intrepid women with clipboards and maps and it slowly gets sorted out. Areas for organizations, information, snacks, merchandise, and so on are marked off. Tables, many many tables, need to be set up. Portable awnings, chairs, signs... everyone just sort of picks up a job and a couple of helpers. I find myself doing tablecloths with some students from Ventura and Moorpark College - the plastic clothes need to be separated, placed, and taped down. The enthusiasm and energy of the students makes it fun, and it's interesting to hear why they are here. One young woman wants to start learning about social service agencies and meeting people for networking. Student nurses are learning a

lot more than textbook information by interacting with all sorts of folks who have shown up. Family members of the mentally ill want to show their gratitude to NAMI for the free classes, groups and information it gives.

More people show up, some to walk, some to help out, some out of curiosity: "I saw all this activity and want to know what it is about." Organizations, caregiving companies, social service groups, vendors, all come to claim and set up their spaces. Some of the table and chair setups have to be rearranged, but it all gets done. Within a couple of hours a waterlogged parking lot and a ton of stuff has been transformed into a colorful, functional event. More students show up to work at the booths for registration, team captain pickup, and t-shirt handouts. I hang out with the team captain people, and it's so much fun to talk to every group leader, ask them who they are and why they are there, comment on their clever team names and sayings, and thank them for coming.

My team shows up; I get my cute t-shirt. There are speeches by officials and participants, and the Walk begins.

County to accept reservations for beach parks

The Board of Supervisors has approved a plan for County Parks to shift from a first-come, first-served policy to a reservations-only policy for its three beach parks (Faria, Hobson and Rincon) beginning November 1, 2018. This decision was driven by multiple factors, primarily customer feedback — that is, the high number of public complaints the Parks Department receives about the existing system. In addition, trends in technology have changed the way in which the public conducts business transactions, making this the appropriate time to implement this change.

The shift to a reservations-based policy for the beach parks will generate the following benefits for patrons and improvements in Parks staff efficiency:

Allow customers to reserve a camping site in advance, from 12 months in advance to within 48 hours of their planned arrival date, eliminating

the guesswork of site availability.

Mobile payment will still be available for open sites (non-reserved) the day of arrival as is currently allowed.

Improved customer access to beach

Eliminate groups from holding/ managing spaces for other groups.

Allow park rangers to be more accessible and provide better customer service to beach park patrons.

Reduce calls for service to the sheriff to resolve disputes (i.e., fighting over

Allow for self-booking of reservations via the Parks public. At http:// www.venturaparks.org/ (reservations can still be made by calling the Parks reservation line (805) 654-3951)

Length of stay and return polices will remain the same. More data will now be available to staff for better enforcement of the rules and tracking of customer compliance with usage policies.

Improving public safety and patron peace of mind by:

Keeping bike lanes clear from RVs waiting for a site to become available

Eliminating onsite searching for a space to open - which both contributes to carbon emissions from RVs driving up and down the road continuously and disturbs those already camping (i.e., continually being asked "When you are leaving?")

The County is aware that this change to a reservations-only policy for the most popular County parks is a major shift from current policy and will require a period of adjustment for patrons. To allow for the least amount Continued on page 22

What are Ventura's pressing issues?

Ask anyone what the pressing issues are facing Ventura; you'll get a variety of answers. We interviewed the retiring Councilmembers and some former Council candidates to get their perspectives. Each pointed to several significant issues facing Ventura in the next few years.

Governing By Districts

As Citizens expect their elected officials to represent their district's interests, concern for the city as a whole may take a backseat to district wide issues.

Governing by districts means inexperienced new Councilmembers will lead the city. They will face a steep learning curve to be effective. Their inexperience means two things. First, existing Councilmembers and city staff may marginalize them until they gain experience and knowledge. Second, the new City Manager and the city staff may take more control without voter accountability. Neither of these is good.

More distressing may be the loss of a citywide perspective on the Council. Wrangling for projects will probably intensify.

Re: Growth

Growth meant different things to each interviewee. All agreed Ventura needed to grow. They also concurred that growth and water availability are inseparable. Each acknowledged the need for affordable housing but recognized the opposition to more houses (the NIMBYs).

The Solution is Sensible Growth

Growth and water are inseparable. The next City Council must forge a reasonable growth plan. The new Council will also have to convince the "no-growth" citizens that the city needs to grow to be vital. The Council should also call for the city staff to streamline current fees and permits practices.

Everyone acknowledged water was a concern. The specifics on how to address the issue varied widely, however.

Solutions for Better Water Management

The new City Council can take three steps to address water. First, they must request a modification to the Heal the Bay Consent Decree to extend the deadline for extracting wastewater from the estuary.

Second, The Council must force Ventura Water to table Direct Potable Reuse (DPR). It is an expensive gamble. No State approved testing exists for DPR today and may not for 4-8 years. There's no reason to proceed with an untested and unproven method that risks the public's health.

Housing Ventura's homeless was a high priority. Some thought affordable housing was the solution. Others mentioned the homeless shelter. Some interviewees distinguished between the mentally ill living on the streets and the vagrants. Each saw it as a countywide problem with Ventura as its nexus. The county jail and the psychiatric hospital are in Ventura, making the city a natural final destination for the homeless to stay.

Consideration Toward Addressing Homelessness

The new Council should distinguish between criminal vagrants and those willing to accept help. We should be willing to help those who help themselves.

Re: City Staff Accountability

All the interviewees wanted more accountability from the city employees.

Improving City Staff Accountability

The new Council needs to apply critical thinking and be willing to question all city staff reports and recommendations. To do so requires financial literacy. Each Councilmember must study the city budget and Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR).

Second, the Council should stop accepting mediocre performance from the staff. Stop praising the employees even when they don't perform. False praise is not an antidote for low morale. It may be detrimental to the top performers by cheapening the value of the kudos. The new City Manager Alex McIntyre should

Third, the new Council should scrutinize the expenditures on outside contractors. Last year, Ventura spent \$30 million. They should be fiscally responsible and look for ways to cut these costs.

Now nearly a year later, many of the original plants are showing signs of recovery, and many new specimens have been planted. During the closure, many changes have taken place. Fire-damaged walkways were repaired or rebuilt. A new hand hewn rock staircase is now in place near the entrance of the Chilean Gardens, and the long-awaited Merewether Welcome Center will open. Funded through the generosity of Mike and Loretta Merewether and designed by architect Martha Picciotti with work donated by Matt Roberts of Quality Containers, the Center will include a check-in kiosk, an information center, educational space, a stage, a community gathering area, storage and a much-needed

restroom. The Gardens now have roughly 2,000 plants in the collection.

A morning event is planned including a ribbon cutting with Deputy Mayor, Matt LaVere, and a Welcome Center dedication. At noon, the Gardens will be open to the public, with garden walks by local tour guide Lorie McWhirter, and nature talks from garden experts.

"We are so excited about re-opening the Gardens," states Barbara Brown, VBG President, who also lost her home in the Thomas Fire. "This will be a very bright moment for a community that has struggled through a very difficult year. It means so much to all of us, that this iconic community place will reopen."

She continues, "We'll also be opening the new Fynbos Gardens as well, highlighting the flora of the Cape of South Africa. It seems fitting that this Garden be inaugurated in the aftermath of the Thomas Fire because plants in the Cape of South Africa have a life cycle in which fire plays a critical role. For many, smoke is required for seeds to germinate."

The Fynbos Garden has been planted with a multitude of the protea and ericas - two of the more exotic and showy South African flowering displays. The bridge and dry creek bed work that began before the fire, is also complete.

"With the regrowth and expanded plantings needed after the Thomas fire, it has become clear that ongoing financial sustainability is critical for the maintenance, operation and expansion of the Gardens," said Joe Cahill, Executive Director. "We are implementing a membership fee, but we want visitors to enjoy the Gardens affordably, so we've kept the annual fee to \$45 per year, less than a cup of coffee a day, or for those who aren't members, \$7 per day. And, children 18 and under, are always free." For those who can't afford the low annual membership, EBT cards will be accepted.

On Tuesdays, the Gardens are free for everyone. Monthly scheduled guided tours are also free. Additionally, the Gardens plan to be free on most major holidays with the exception of July 4. The new hours are from 9am to 5pm, with possible extended hours in the future. The upper gardens above Summit Drive remain free to the public. Dogs are welcome on Tuesdays and Wednesdays.

Located at Grant Park the Ventura Botanical Gardens' goals include encouraging visitors to strengthen their connection to nature. To find out more, visit www.VenturaBotanicalGardens.com and Facebook.

Whenever people learn I am a school superintendent, they want to tell me about their school experience. Some tell

me about their favorite teacher, others tell me about a class or program that changed their lives in a meaningful way.

Ventura Unified School District recently completed a brand strategy effort that, we hope, will create for our students many positive memories of their school years that set them up for successful lives

"For the future of every student" is our ambitious promise at VUSD. It means that we will strive to create a path to future success for every student, no matter what their abilities, gifts or challenges might be.

Some asked why in the face of all the challenges that educators experience did we choose to spend time and money on a brand strategy. "Why do you need a new logo?" someone asked.

This effort was about so much more than a logo (although I love the new logo.) After I was hired by our board of trustees, one of their priorities was re-branding the district. They understood that the brand is what you stand for. It is, according to Michellene DeBonis of Zeste - the company that we hired - "what people say about you when you are not around."

Zeste took on an in-depth study of our stakeholders over several months and learned that our district's brand was unclear. That we had pockets of excellence and great potential. But we were inconsistent in our communication and direction.

So inconsistent were we that many of our "customers" did not know that we are a district of choice: that a student and their parents can consider what school in our district they wish to attend. You examine the strengths of each school and choose the one that's the best fit for you. We had parents who did not know this. It was not clear on our website.

But we were competing with schools whose brand promised so much more.

Our trustees and administration understand the schools are competitive. We have private and parochial schools in Ventura. Charter schools. Many students are home-schooled. We know that we compete favorably with these alternatives and want our community to know it. We want to have adequate resources to do the job. We want these students and their parents to choose us because we have an exemplary school that is right for them.

It's a cliché, but it's accurate to say that "one size does not fit all" in education. So here is the focus of our brand promise for each student: rigorous and relevant academics that challenge each student; a safe, healthy, and positive learning environment in every school; engaging settings that stimulate curiosity and empower students to have a voice in their learning; real world experiences and connections in and out of the classroom to cultivate creativity, critical thinking, and an appreciation for the world in which we live, and, consistent, enthusiastic and unwavering encouragement of each and every childso they can discover who they want to become and be academically, personally,

Just think about how much that differs from your own education. This is a profound shift in how we educate. This 'n' That

City Council approves Green Energy Rate

During a recent Ventura City Council meeting the council voted unanimously to adopt a provision that will increase your electric bill by 7-9%. The council approved a measure that will put Ventura at the forefront of a measure that will require 100% of Ventura's electricity be sourced with renewable energy.

In recent years alternative energy providers have emerged shaking up an industry that traditional had no competition.

Last February the Ventura City Council voted to join the Clean Power Alliance. The alliance offers community choice aggregation, which works by allowing cities and counties to buy and invest in renewable energy.

Once it is up and running the, the alliance will be the state's biggest community choice aggregation provider in terms of members.

Ventura, Camarillo, Moorpark Ojai, Oxnard, Simi Valley, Thousand Oaks and the county have all joined along with Los Angeles County, which gave the alliance a \$10 million loan to help with startup cost, and 23 other cities in L.A. County.

Although actual costs are still unknown and will not be fully known until November, cities must set a default rate which is the percentage of renewable energy customers who do nothing are automatically enrolled in.

Electric utility customers who want to stay with Edison or who want a different percentage of renewables can do so, but they must manually opt out or change their default. The change can be accomplished on-line, or by mail. The options that will face Ventura Southern California Edison customers contains three tiers: 36 percent renewables, 50% renewables and 100% renewables.

The alliance predicts savings of from 1-3% for 36% renewables, no change in cost if 50% is selected, and a 7-9% premium cost for opting 100% renewables.

City staff had recommended to the council that Ventura go with the 50% renewable tier, but after several public speakers advanced the 100% alternative as the best, smartest way to face a future of global warming, sea level rise and continuing drought, as an effective way of reducing the city's carbon footprint the council agreed.

Currently the alliance is projecting savings on Edison base rate in the 36% tier of about 3 percent, 1% or less for the 50% tier and addition costs of up to 9% for the now approved goal of 100% renewables.

Camarillo, Moorpark and Simi Valley have set their rates at the 50% level, while Ojai and the county set their rates at 100% renewables. Oxnard has yet to set a default.

Clean Power Alliance Executive Director Ted Bardacke said he anticipates those rate differentials holding true even with a significant decision made by the California Public Utilities Commission.

The commission voted unanimously to change the way "exit fees" are calculated on community choice aggregation customers who leave investor owned utilities (like Edison). The fees are charged to ensure every customer, whether they are served by a community choice aggregation or an investor owned utility pays for power already purchased on their behalf.

PUC commissioners felt the new exit fees more fairly spread the costs between investor-owned utility customers and community choice customers.

Last year 32 percent of Edison's energy came from renewable sources, according to Edison also offers customers the option to increase that percentage of renewable energy to 50 and 100 percent at additional cost.

The council also considered and approved to continue with plans for a new parking garage in downtown and the city is soon reviewing architectural plans and drawings.

The council also released Thomas Fire new construction permit numbers and they now stand at 82 permits issued, with more forthcoming.

Council passes a contract for temporary generator rental which will include ten generator rentals for emergency power.

Legal victory protection for Santa Clara

Conservation groups have scored a key courtroom victory for endangered Southern California steelhead harmed by operation of the Vern Freeman Dam on the Santa Clara River.

In a 152-page decision issued by Honorable Judge David O. Carter, the court found United Water Conservation District violated the federal Endangered Species Act by clearly causing past, ongoing, and future harm to steelhead as a result of the dam's barrier to fish movement and diversion of water. Finding that United "dragged its feet" on critical solutions, and that "United has proved itself unable and unwilling

to tackle the two key problems repeatedly identified as perpetuating harm to steelhead," Judge Carter ordered measures needed to prevent the harm from continuing and to allow for steelhead recovery.

The 1,200-foot-wide, 25-foot-high Freeman Dam's ineffective fish ladder, combined with United's diversion of the Santa Clara River's flow at the dam, prevent steelhead from returning to their prime upstream spawning habitat in the river and migrating to the ocean.

Southern California steelhead are a federally protected, endangered anadromous fish that mature in the ocean but return inland to spawn in freshwater upstream. The Santa Clara River historically supported thousands of steelhead and is critical for the recovery of steelhead throughout their range.

The court's ruling requires United to immediately ensure the river has sufficient flows for steelhead to swim the 10.5-mile stretch of river to and from

the ocean. In addition, by January 2020, the court's ruling requires United to fully design both a 400-foot wide notch and a hardened ramp solution to allow fish to migrate past the dam, and to construct the fish passage option acceptable to the National Marine Fisheries

Filed in federal court in June 2016, the lawsuit was decided after an 11-day trial with testimony from some of the most esteemed steelhead and fish

passage experts.

The groups were represented at trial by lead counsel Christopher Sproul of Environmental Advocates; Jason Weiner, senior attorney and general counsel of Wishtoyo Foundation; Geneva EB Thompson, staff attorney for Wishtoyo Foundation; and Heather Kryczka of Environmental Advocates.







Interplanetary hi-jinx in high gear at Rubicon

It seems that no matter what the situation or scenario, William Shakespeare already has it covered. Based very loosely on Shakespeare's The Tempest, Return to the Forbidden Planet uses a clever mix of science fiction, rock music and many of the Bard's words to weave its tale. Author Bob Carlton debuted the musical in London in 1989 to rave reviews. Rubicon first presented it in 2016 and brought it back specifically for the theater's 20th anniversary season.

Imagine Galaxy Quest meets Plan 9 meets Shakespeare.

The action begins the minute one enters the theater. Members of the crew of the ship Scientific Survey Flight Nine welcome patrons and assist in acclimating them to their surroundings and rules to follow while in flight.

As the voyage begins Captain Tempest (Daniel DeYoung) and the crew is introduced to their new Science Officer – a woman. Egads. She immediately abandons ship on the last shuttlecraft just before the ship crashes on an uncharted planet. The planet is ruled by Prospero (Kevin Bailey), a brilliant scientist who was rocketed there fifteen years ago by his wife, Gloria (Rebecca Ann Jonson) who coincidentally is the new Science Officer, before his greatest discovery was revealed. Their infant daughter Miranda was along and the two have been exiled on the lonely planet.

Captain Tempest welcomes Prospero onto his ship and things turn a bit crazy. Miranda (Kimberly Hessler), who is now of age, has never seen other men before and right away is struck by the Captain. The ship's cook, Cookie (Andrew Huber), is smitten with Miranda and vows to win her over. Along the way we are introduced to Ariel (Larry Cedar), a quite hip and groovy robot.

The plot is a relatively simple one of love found, love lost, and love regained. The setting on a space ship armed with a rock band creates an entirely new way to present Shakespeare. It just continues to prove that his words are timeless, as they adapt easily to any situation, no matter how farfetched.

Return to the Forbidden Planet is just plain fun. Riddled with over 20 familiar tunes of the 50's and 60's such as Don't Let Me Be Misunderstood, Shake, Rattle and Roll and She's Not There, the action is a continual panoply of sight, sound and surprises.

The cast is out of this world talented

all around. The Navigation Officer (Eric Shorey) plays a mean synthesizer and the ship comes complete with its own on-board drummer, guitar players and back-up dancers. Shouldn't they all?

The energy is electric. The stage setting is clever, with all the bells and whistles a space ship could have. On opening night there was a slight hitch in one mechanism and the cast dealt with it so well it took a few moments to realize anything was amiss. Shakespearean dialogue continued until all was resolved and the action progressed seamlessly.

If you caught the show in 2016, go again. If you missed it before, be sure to catch it this time before it spins back into space.



On November 9-10, 1938, Nazi sympathizers torched hundreds of Jewish synagogues, vandalized Jewish homes, destroyed Jewish businesses and killed over 100 Jews before



sending another 30,000 to Dachau, Buchenwald and Sachsenhauser concentration camps.

The riots followed years of increasingly repressive actions by Hitler's government, including a public burning of Jewish books in 1933, and the passage of the Nuremberg Laws in 1935 which denied German citizenship to non-Aryans.

post-traumatic stress disorder and traumatic brain injury achieve rehabilitation, recovery and resilience in their daily lives.

The riders began the fifth day of their 400-mile ride to Ventura from the Hadston House located in Solvang and continued at the Crowne Plaza, after a 68.6-mile ride for the day. Local supporters cheered on the cyclists as they road through communities along the route.

The event is a noncompetitive, therapeutic bike tour. It includes stops at historic sites, civic centers and local attractions. The riders make the journey with hand cycles, recumbent cycles, tandems and traditional road bikes.
