Ethan McKinley selected as Channel Islands National Park Superintendent

The National Park Service has selected Ethan McKinley to serve as the next superintendent of Channel Islands National Park. McKinley has been serving as the park's acting superintendent since July, following the June retirement of Superintendent Russell Galipeau.

"Ethan is one of the few National Park Service superintendents who has experience building a new national park from the ground up," said Stan Austin, regional director for the National Park Service's Pacific West Region. "With this unique perspective and his passion for building strong relationships with community stakeholders, I am confident he is the right fit for Channel Islands."

McKinley has more than 12 years' experience with the National Park Service. He comes to Channel Islands National Park from First State National Historical Park in Delaware, where he has been the superintendent since 2015.

"I am fascinated by the rich diversity of wildlife and human history represented within Channel Islands National Park," said McKinley. "The Islands and their surrounding waters constitute a world class resource just off the coast"

The community was very clear in their request that the new Superintendent be someone who will advocate for all students, who has experience working with at-risk and marginalized youth, and who will effectively communicate with our students, staff and community. When considering whether to spend several months and thousands of dollars conducting its third search in four years, the Board agreed to look first at local candidates with a proven track record of working with and for all students. Dr Rice immediately came to mind - having been a highly regarded finalist in the previous Superintendent search.

At the time of his death, Sergeant Dowell, 32, was a nine-year veteran of the Ventura Police Department. He is remembered as a dedicated police officer, devoted husband, and loving father to his two young children.

The City of San Buenaventura named Dowell Drive, the location of police headquarters, in Sergeant Dowell's honor in 1979.

City of Ventura releases draft environmental impact report for water supply projects

The City of Ventura invites community members and stakeholders interested in learning about the VenturaWaterPure project's role in a sustainable water future for Ventura to review and comment on the Ventura Water Supply Projects Draft Environmental Impact Report (Draft EIR). The public review and written comment period for the Draft EIR will run until April 19, 2019.

The City of Ventura is currently in the planning phases for the proposed VenturaWaterPure Project which includes the construction of an Advanced Water Purification Facility (AWPF) for potable reuse. Potable reuse is the proven use of recycled water to supplement drinking water supplies. After years of special studies, environmental assessment, demonstration facility testing, and stakeholder meetings, the City determined the best way to enhance environmental protection while improving local water quality and supply reliability is to divert highly treated wastewater discharges for reuse. The final product of this state-of-the-art AWPF would be a new, locally owned source of highly purified drinking water that provides Ventura with a long-term drought resilient water supply solution.

Interested persons, organizations, and agencies are invited to attend a public meeting, in conjunction with the regularly scheduled Water Commission meeting, to receive an overview and ask questions about the environmental analysis of the project.

Hypnotherapy versus Psychotherapy

Hypnosis Rising

If we bite our nails or watch too much TV for long enough, changing our habit may seem too hard. We can suffer - or look for help. Life coaches, religions, meetups and recreational sports: any and all might bring encouragement and direction for change.

But what if that doesn't work? What if our mind is wounded?

In medicine, that's a familiar fear. When I had back pain, I worried that I might need surgery. To my relief, I healed through yoga. Stretching and strengthening solved the problem!

With the mind, we have the same options. Psychologists and psychotherapists are licensed to treat wounded minds - minds that are missing parts or overly sensitive. They are the surgeons of mental health. By law, hypnotherapists offer "vocational and avocational self-improvement." We are the yoga instructors of mental health. We help clients change themselves.

As with our bodies, we need to control mental stress to avoid serious injury. A TV addiction can lead to a job layoff or divorce. Then we have plenty of cause to be depressed.

But why hypnotherapy as opposed to buying a friend? The psychologist Irving Yalom described psychotherapy

as teaching relationship skills - a kind of friendship. How is hypnotherapy different?

Hypnosis is not a technique, but a way of learning. In hypnosis, the subconscious immediately adopts welcome suggestions as behaviors. Those changes affect the connections between our neurons and the flow of blood - a natural surgery. This happens efficiently because the critical part of our mind is comfortable and doesn't protest, "Well, that's not going to work!"

When in hypnosis you learn like you did before you started to doubt yourself.

Let's compare this to psychology, which uses drugs to modify thinking. Two chemical systems control our basic emotions: dopamine creates euphoria and norepinephrine creates fear. Imbalance between euphoria and fear is the cause of several psychological disorders. The two are kept in balance by the reasoning part of our brain.

Where a hypnotherapist would strengthen reason and balance euphoria and fear, the psychologist prescribes drugs that amplify the weaker emotion. This is like using a brace to straighten someone's back, rather than using exercise to balance their muscles

Just as in maintaining our bodies, adjusting the operation of our minds prevents serious breakdowns. Hypnotherapists help you make minor adjustments before they become major problems. And as hypnosis is a learning process, several approaches can be tried until the right one is found.

Let's think of hypnotherapy as "mental hygiene." Just as with dental

■ Congratulations to my favorite music columnist, **Pam Baumgardner**, on the 10th-anniversary of providing Ventura-Rocks.com for our community. People

live by her daily listings for showing where to go for music in Ventura, and she's never once charged the artists or Ventura venues to be listed. Plus, you can read her column in the Breeze.

■ Here we go again, hopefully this appointment works out. The Board of Education has selected **Dr. Roger Rice** as the new Superintendent of the Ventura Unified School District (see cover story). And they did it without spending a lot of money to hire a search company by looking at local candidates.

■ It just got a little harder to open a store that sells **firearms** and ammunition in Ventura.

The City Council voted 7-0 to approve an ordinance that limits where in the city these businesses can be located.

Once the new rules become law, a firearms business won't be allowed to open if it's within 500' of a "sensitive use," a designation that includes schools, parks, religious institutions, day care facilities and residential zones. Such stores will need to be at least 200' away from a similar business.

The new rules limits stores to three areas based upon the zone. Limited Industrial (M-1), General Industrial (M-2) and Manufacturing Planned Development (MPD).

Even though I don't like guns much I'm not sure limiting where stores can be located serves any purpose at all.

■ A "glad they're here" to a few Ventura businesses. **Steve's Plumbing & Hardware**, 1199 E. Thompson Blvd (but don't expect to find Steve there) is a great local hardware and plumbing fixture store. Recently I went in to buy a very specific little bitty screw and a part for a ceiling light. 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

More aortic valve stenosis patients will be treated locally and minimally invasively

Community Memorial Hospital has added another procedure to the growing list of minimally invasive heart procedures: transcatheter aortic valve replacement (TAVR).

TAVR is a minimally invasive surgical procedure that repairs a narrowed heart valve without removing the old, damaged valve. Instead, an artificial valve is placed in the aortic valve through the femoral artery (the large artery in the groin) using a long catheter. There's no large surgical incision in the chest. Once the new valve is expanded, the tissue in the replacement valve regulates blood flow from the heart to the body. Previously, heart valve replacements required open-heart surgery in which the sternum is surgically separated, which typically required longer recovery for patients.

"The TAVR procedure is reducing the need for open-heart surgeries in some instances and hastening patient recovery," said Dr. Omid Fatemi, Community Memorial Health System's Medical Director of Structural Heart and High Risk Revascularization.

The newly opened Ocean Tower's state-of-the-art cath lab allows CMH to expand its line-up of heart procedures that couldn't be performed in the old hospital. Within the first week, four successful TAVR procedures have been completed at CMH, and more are planned for the near future.

The Ocean Tower cath lab has four procedure rooms and a fifth is expected to be added by next year. The new, expanded cath lab also features start-of-the-art imaging equipment with superior imaging quality and new, superior diagnostic and ultrasound equipment.

TAVR is an FDA-approved procedure for people with aortic valve stenosis who are considered at intermediate or high-risk for open-heart valve replacement surgery. The FDA approval has expanded over the past few years with the outstanding results that have been achieved with this technology.

The Structural Heart Program at the new CMH offer minimally invasive procedures for heart problems, and most patients can go home the next day. Procedures include TAVR, ASD and PFO closure, and the WATCHMAN Left Atrial Appendage Closure Implant for patients with non-valvular atrial fibrillation (AF) who can take warfarin but seek a non-drug alternative to reduce their risk of AF-related stroke.



"You don't really need to be chained. It's a mental thing. There's someone whose job is entirely to get you psychologically into a place and once that's done its done. You don't have to have anything on you,"

JAB gets his toddlers to wiggle with excitement to the rousing nursery rhymes he sings as he strums his guitar. To the pleasure of their mothers, the colony of two-year-olds in the room hops ecstatically from lily pad to lily pad, inspired by the colorful mats and the music. This is fun but it's also a lesson in identifying both colors and animals. "Jump on the blue fish! Now, the green owl! And now, the brown shell!" JAB sings at regular intervals.

"Pick out two scarves," JAB says, holding open a magic bag full of colorful squares of fabric. One by one, they each extract a couple of scarves. "The wheels on the bus go round and round, round and round," he croons. The excited kids gesticulate, whipping their scarves into a vibrant blur. And then JAB tapers off to a whisper: "The mommies on the bus go shh-shh-shh, shh-shh-shh, shh-shh-shh." The kids look up, open-mouthed and spellbound by the sudden change in volume.

In their first sixteen months, infants learn to roll over, sit up, crawl and walk—a triumph of gross motor skills that movement to the song "Wheels on the Bus" underscores. Eventually, thes

After 1 1/2 years of renovation, and 1 1/2 years after the opening of the North Tower at Ventura County Medical Center (VCMC), the new addition to the Emergency Department at the county hospital has opened. Celebrated on Thursday, February 28th, with a ribbon cutting hosted by Seaside Emergency Associates -- which oversees both VCMC's emergency department and Santa Paula Hospital's -- the enthusiastic attendees didn't let the rain dampen their spirits. Almost 100 invited guests gathered under a tent to hear from VCMC CEO Kim Milstien, Dr. Marty Ehrlich, and County Executive Officer Mike Powers, on how the updated ED will better serve the community it's been serving for 100 years.

Twelve new patient exam rooms were added, making the total room count 34. That count includes seven triage bays, four observation rooms and one eye exam room. Also included in the renovation is a waiting room triple the size of the previous waiting room, lab space for dedicated point of care testing, dedicated rapid care space, a patient

quiet room for families, new department nurse manager's office and a staff conference room. In all, the new space added an additional 12,000 square feet.

Operation School Bell® celebrates 25 years

Assistance League® of Ventura County (ALVC) is proud to celebrate 25 years helping children in the Hueneme Elementary, Ocean View, Oxnard and Ventura Unified School Districts. Since 1993, through our signature philanthropic program called Operation School Bell® (OSB), ALVC volunteers have provided new school clothing to children in need, who have been referred to Operation School Bell by school personnel. Over the years we have been able to provide clothing, toiletries, school supplies, Target Gift Cards, Payless Gift Cards, and books to 25,194 students from approximately 40 schools.

Today, the need for school clothing is as great as ever as the number of impoverished children, whose parents struggle to provide them with basic necessities, continues to increase. As one principal shared in our annual program

assessment, "These children often come to school less than fully clothed. Your services are invaluable in promoting the health, wellness and feeling of safety and caring for our students. Only when their primary needs are met, can they focus on the academics and social aspects of school life."

Operation School Bell is our signature program and is managed entirely by volunteers. Normally we work out of portable classrooms which have been located at schools in two of the districts. This year, we continued having the students bussed to our site at Junipero Serra Elementary in Ventura, where they were greeted by an ALVC volunteer who helped them pick out the appropriate sizes for a polo shirt, t-shirt, sweatshirt, socks and underwear. They also received school supplies, a bag of toiletries, and a book. A \$20 Target gift card to purchase pants, shorts, or a skirt and a \$15 Payless card for shoes were given to the adult in charge for each child. Unfortunately, this year we lost our Oxnard site which served the Hueneme, Ocean View and Oxnard School Districts due to the increase in enrollment and the need for more classrooms.

We have about 40 members who are at the sites with the children, helping to transport the clothing and supplies to the sites, or preparing the paperwork necessary to keep everything moving smoothly. These volunteers donate the school supplies and along with Friends of the Camarillo Library, also donate the books. We are currently looking for another space to use in Oxnard so we can continue this program which helps so many children in need. If you know of



Threats to Medicare continue in 2019

Medicare faces numerous threats in 2019. It's time for lawmakers and healthcare advocates to attack these challenges head-on.

One threat stems from the Trump administration, which has suggested

weakening the so-called protected classes provision in Medicare "Part D."

Medicare's Part D drug benefit has enabled seniors to purchase subsidized prescription coverage from private insurers. Part D regulations require every plan to cover all medications in six protected classes of therapies, including anticonvulsants, antidepressants, anti-neoplastics, antipsychotics, antiretrovirals, and immunosuppressants. This protection ensures that older adults who battle cancer, HIV/AIDS, depression, and other serious diseases have a full range of treatment options.

The administration's proposal would allow Medicare Part D plans to stop covering some of the most popular and needed medications in these classes. Key medical and patient advocacy groups have indicated that the proposal should be withdrawn.

Another threat lurking for beneficiaries relates to the importation of prescription drugs. Some politicians argue certain drugs can be obtained cheaper if imported from other countries, assuming that price is the only factor that should motivate consumers.

However, consumers should also be concerned with the safety of imported drugs. Is the drug developed in a safe manner? Is it counterfeit? In other

Hip fractures should be treated as emergencies

There are good reasons that older people fear hip fractures. They can remember the days when a broken hip was often the beginning of the end. Even today, up to 30 percent of seniors who break a hip are dead in a year. Many others never get around

quite as well as they did before, which could make the difference between living at home or in assisted living, or even a nursing home.

Yet until recently, doctors often took a fairly leisurely approach to fixing broken hips. Patients would wait in bed for two or three days for surgery while doctors carefully evaluated their other medical problems. Now, spurred by research that found better results with shorter delays, hospitals are creating special programs to get more hip-fracture patients into the operating room within 24 hours or less of entering the hospital. A clinical trial in Canada is testing whether surgery within six hours should be the goal. Run by a cardiologist, this trial, known by the acronym HIP ATTACK, is treating hip-fracture victims with the kind of urgency that is now the norm for heart attack and stroke patients.

Hospitals in the Philadelphia region haven't gone that far yet, but several have created special programs to expedite care for older patients with fragile bones, whose frailty makes prolonged bed rest especially dangerous. Among them are Penn Presbyterian Medical Center, Temple University Hospital, Einstein Medical Center, and Bryn Mawr Hospital. The multidisciplinary programs also work with patients before they leave the hospital to discuss how to strengthen bones or prevent more falls.

Almost everyone who breaks a hip will get some kind of surgical repair, surgeons said.

The question is when.

words, could it be a threat to the health of a person who uses the imported drug?

It is essential that the most stringent safety requirements be developed before there is any discussion of importation. All drugs that might be imported must pass this rigorous safety test.

In the highly-charged atmosphere around drug prices, importation will be a front and center issue. Different bills permitting everything from unlimited importation to very limited importation will be presented in this session of Congress. Sens. Chuck Grassley and Amy Klobuchar already introduced one importation bill, the "Safe and Affordable Drugs from Canada Act of 2019." However, the rallying cry from advocates must be safety first.

Another concern relates to Medicare Part D's Low-Income Subsidy (LIS) program, which enables enrollees to obtain heavily discounted prescriptions. Some influential government advisors have proposed raising these enrollees' co-pays for certain necessary prescriptions. The program is a lifeline for low-income, older adults needing prescription drugs. All efforts to squeeze this vulnerable group of older Americans must be resisted.

Further, we need to do a better job of raising awareness about the LIS program to those older Americans from minority communities who are underutilizing this important benefit.

Medicare has been an unqualified success. Politicians, from the president to representatives in Congress, have pledged to protect Medicare. Advocates should pressure them to fulfill that pledge.

Tony the Vet

Everyone knows Tony the Vet. For fifteen years, this disabled 72-year-old veteran has been hawking his wares—a combination of baseball caps, decals, flags and other assorted patriotic tchotchkes—on a side road next to the Target on Main Street.

Tony is a warm, spirited man who presides over his collection of carefully lettered signs with pride. “If you like your freedom, go hug a veteran,” reads one of his posters.

“You’ve got the mean people and the nice people,” Tony says. “There’s a lot of people that help me.” Tony is out every day, except when it’s raining. He lives in a black van nearby. “I’m a little entrepreneur,” he continues. “I try to make a little living, I try to be honest.”

Tony tells me he served in Vietnam from 1963-67. “He was a sergeant, a platoon leader,” his best friend Russ chimes in. Russ—a philosophical UCSB grad with pale eyes who looks like an aging surfer—is also homeless. They offer each other a great deal of emotional support.

“Tony, tell her what the stop sign stands for,” Russ says, gesturing to the crimson hexagon that dominates the cluttered display of merchandise. “It stands for ‘Sergeant Tony Offers Prayers,’” Tony says with a glint in his eye.

Russ tells me Tony is “a visible, friendly, social person” who is well-liked. “People come up, he lends an ear, he listens,” Russ says. In a part of town conducive to alcoholics and drug addicts, Tony has prevented

more than one suicide. “He’s like a surrogate dad or uncle.”

According to Tony, there is a government code that says vets are permitted to sell to stay alive in designated areas. Despite his disabled veteran’s license, Target doesn’t want him there, and neither does the city. But the police ultimately sided with Tony.

The feisty veteran has serious heart problems. During the hour that we spoke, he had to pop a nitrate pill twice. Suddenly his cell phone rang. An overwhelmed Tony blurts something out, and then abruptly ends the call. He immediately regrets hanging up, realizing it could have been someone who might help him get housing.

I ask him about his Dodgers hat. “I hope we can win the world series before I’m in the big one in the sky,” he says with a lopsided grin.

Squinting into the sun, Russ next lays out a meandering story about an eccentric woman on the freeway that everyone knew in the 1970’s. “When Tony dies people will remember him the way we knew the freeway lady in Santa Barbara,” Russ concludes. “He’s an icon.”

Russ also mentions that Tony is a former drag racer and that he has adult children. “Isn’t that right, Tony?” Russ asks. An aggravated Tony runs his fingers through his thick white beard. The interview has gone on too long, and it’s bad for business.

Just before I walk away, I see the faces of the two friends framed by the late afternoon glow as if bathed in nostalgia.

experiment, the polar vortex may have killed as many as 95 percent of the stink bugs that hadn’t found warm shelter this winter. Pests in regions of the country that typically do not experience extremely low temperatures will most likely be impacted the most, Dr. Campbell said.

Pests in these areas are least equipped with physiological and behavioral adaptations to survive the cold. Diapause, a period of inactivity for insects, may have come early in regions of the country that commonly experience winter temperatures below 50 degrees Fahrenheit.

During diapause, insects that are adapted to regions with typical cold winters undergo physiological changes that allow them to withstand low temperatures. The insects may also have sought shelter, insulating them from cold air. Perhaps these bugs decided to find shelter

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in your house! Not good.

According to Campbell, some insects are able to withstand temperatures even below zero F, with the limit for many insects that can “super freeze” being typically around minus 30 F. “That said, we won’t be entirely certain of the impacts until spring occurs,” Campbell admitted.

Despite some bugs’ ability to survive short periods of cold weather, sustained frigid conditions, like those brought about from the most recent polar vortex, could be effective at killing off even some well-prepared pests.

The entomologist with the NPMA explained further that, “in addition to the effect of extremely cold weather on pests themselves, damage to plants and other animals can also disrupt food supplies for insects in the spring and summer, driving them indoors.” As I said above, “indoors” could mean into your abode.

“Ah,” said Mr. Stinkbug, “this is a nice cozy warm house. I think my family will enjoy wintering it out here during the polar vortex. I wonder if these humans have a jacuzzi?”

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Buzzed Driving Is Drunk Driving

St. Patrick’s Day is celebrated by millions across the country, often culminating in parties where drinking is involved. Sadly, this leads to tragedies on our roadways because of drivers who choose to leave parties impaired.

During the St. Patrick’s Day weekend, March 16-17, 2019 the Ventura Police Department will have additional officers on patrol ready to stop and arrest drivers suspected of driving under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs.

According to data from the California Highway Patrol (CHP), one person was killed, and 48 others were injured in DUI crashes on St. Patrick’s Day last year. In 2017, 59 people were killed nationwide in drunk-driving crashes over the St. Patrick’s Day holiday (March 16-March 18), accounting for 37 % of all traffic deaths.

Due to St. Patrick’s Day becoming a dangerous holiday on our roads, the Ventura Police Department encourages everyone to plan ahead and use a designated sober driver, ride-share or public transportation. Even one drink can be one too many.

“Don’t even put yourself in a position where you need to ask whether you are okay to drive,” Ventura Police Sergeant Mike Brown said. “If you feel the slightest hint of a buzz, you should not be driving.”

The Ventura Police Department also wants to remind everyone that a “DUI Doesn’t Just Mean Booze.” Prescription drugs, over-the-counter medications and marijuana can all be impairing, especially in combination with alcohol or other drugs.

“We all know the dangers about driving impaired,” Ventura Police Commander Rick Murray said. “Let’s all be responsible adults and help each other get where we need to go safely.”

Funding for St. Patrick’s Day DUI enforcement is provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

Wild Winter Worries

Meteorologists say much of this strange weather moving south was the result of a polar vortex. Despite the many negative impacts typically associated with this recent polar vortex, the record-breaking cold may have killed some harmful, invasive species, according to a press release by the National Pest Management Association (NPMA).

“While most insects will be equipped to survive a short period of very cold weather, like the recent polar vortex, it’s likely some will die from this extreme weather event,” said Dr. Brittany Campbell, entomologist with the NPMA.

Police reports are provided to us by the Ventura Police Department and are not the opinions of the Ventura Breeze. All suspects mentioned are assumed to be innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.

Carjacking, Robbery, Assault with a Firearm, and Conspiracy

On February 22, at approximately 10:45pm, the victim in this case drove his car to the downtown Ventura area meet up with a female acquaintance he met through social media.

The two spent a short amount of time together and then the female contacted an unidentified male to meet up with her and the victim. The three then drove to the area of the hills above Ventura's City Hall.

After parking, the unidentified male drew a pistol and pointed it at the victim while giving him orders. The suspects robbed the victim of his personal property, struck with the firearm, and ordered him out of the vehicle.

The victim fled toward downtown while the suspects drove away in the victim's vehicle. The victim located bystanders and asked for help. A bystander called Ventura Police Department was contacted and officers responded.

Officers located the victim vehicle unoccupied in the area of Howard Street and Thompson Blvd at approximately 9:30am on February 23. At that time, Officers were responding to the area of Weber circle in Ventura for an armed robbery with a gun that just occurred. Officers arrived on scene and searched for the suspects but were unable to locate them.

The suspect description in the robbery matched the description given by the victims during the carjacking the night before. Detectives responded to assist in the investigation. Detectives obtained a search warrant for the suspects' residence and attempted to serve the warrant with patrol officers at the Weber address. The suspects, 18-year-old Ventura resident Brisa Sotello Torres and 18 year old Ventura resident Joe Rodriguez, refused to come out of the residence and the Ventura Police SWAT team was activated.

After lengthy negotiations with the VPD Crisis Negotiations Team both suspects surrendered without incident.

Torres was booked at the Ventura County Jail for Carjacking, Armed Robbery, Assault with a deadly weapon, and Conspiracy to commit a crime.

Rodriguez was booked at the Ventura County Jail for Armed Robbery, Assault with a deadly weapon, and Conspiracy to commit a crime.

Possession for Sales of a Controlled Substance

On February 25 at 2:45pm, the Ventura Police Department Command Center received a 911 call of a possible residential burglary in progress at a residence in the 700 block of Temple St. The victim resident was not home at the time, but reported seeing a subject, later identified as 27 year old Ventura resident Christopher Diaz, on a security camera in the backyard of the residence. Diaz was a relative of the homeowner, but did not have permission to be on the property. Officers responded to call and detained Diaz as he tried hiding from officers in the backyard.

Using a Ventura Police K-9, officers searched Diaz's vehicle, which was parked to the front of the residence. The K-9, Bolt, alerted to narcotics being

inside. During a search of the vehicle's interior, officers located a large quantity of methamphetamine, heroin, and oxycodone. It was determined Diaz was in possession of the narcotics for the purposes of sales.

Diaz was arrested for possession of a controlled substance for sales. He was not charged for prowling at the residence.

A review of the Ventura County Superior Court website shows that Diaz has an open case for an arrest on 02/19/19, for the charges of possession for sale of a controlled substance. He is currently out on bail for that arrest. Additionally, it showed Diaz has a prior conviction in 2017 and 2016 for possession of a controlled substance and for being under the influence of a controlled substance.

Domestic Dispute, Assault with a Deadly Weapon

On February 28, at approximately 8:15pm, Ventura Police Patrol officers responded to a call of a physical domestic disturbance in the parking lot of Tommy Burgers. As officers were responding to the call, they were given additional information that the suspect, 44-year-old Andrew Chavez, used his vehicle to back up into the victim purposefully. When officers arrived, they contacted the victim and learned that Chavez had left the scene.

Continuing the investigation officers went to Chavez's home located in Oxnard to contact him. As they were arriving at his home, they saw Chavez driving away from his home. The officers turned around and caught up to Chavez and attempted to make a traffic stop on him. Chavez refused to stop, and a pursuit was started. After a short pursuit, Chavez pulled over in the parking lot of the gas station located at 2201 Gonzalez Rd.

As the officers were contacting Chavez to take him into custody, he began to resist them, and there was a brief struggle. During the struggle, Chavez received minor scratches to his forehead.

The victim refused medical treatment on scene, and no officers were injured during the arrest. Chavez was arrested for felony Domestic Violence, and Assault with a Deadly Weapon as well as misdemeanor evading and resisting arrest.

Arrest for Transportation and Sales of Methamphetamine and Heroin

The Ventura Police Department Street Crimes Unit concluded an ongoing investigation on 49-year-old Ventura resident Ernesto Macias for sales of both methamphetamine and heroin in Ventura. On March 8 at 12pm, detectives stopped Macias while driving in the area of Ralston St and Johnson Dr. During the traffic stop detectives located about an ounce of heroin packaged for sales and cash from recent narcotic sales. Detectives served search warrants on Macias' home and his vehicles and located more illegal drugs and evidence. It was discovered that the heroin Macias was selling is laced with fentanyl, a very potent synthetic opiate which has been responsible for a significant amount of drug overdoses in Ventura County.

At the conclusion of the investigation, detectives seized over a pound of methamphetamine and half a pound of fentanyl laced heroin along with thousands of dollars in proceeds from narcotic sales. It was discovered Macias has been selling drugs throughout

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Ventura County. Macias was arrested for possession of methamphetamine and heroin for sales and transportation of narcotics for sales. He was booked at the Ventura County Jail.

Arrest for Transportation and Sales of Methamphetamine

Ventura Police Department Patrol officer conducted a traffic stop in the 6000 block of Bristol Rd. During the investigation, VPD K9 "Jag" was used for a search for contraband and he alerted on the vehicle. During a search officers located over 6 pounds of methamphetamine and thousands of dollars in proceeds from illegal drug sales.

The suspect, 33-year-old Cesar Herrera, was arrested for possession of methamphetamine for sales and transportation. He was booked at the Ventura County Jail.

■ For years, we've heard that dogs can be good for human physical and mental health in part because the canines' need for exercise gets their sluggish human companions out of the house for a walk at least a couple times a day.

University of Pennsylvania researchers point out that those walks sometimes end in broken bones and trips to the emergency room for older dog walkers. They estimate that nationally, the number of dog-walking fractures in people aged 65 and older more than doubled between 2004 and 2017, from 1,671 to 4,396. During that period, the number of older adults increased by 10 percent or 4.6 million. Because the team's data included only people seen in emergency rooms, the researchers believe there likely are more dog-walking-related fractures than they were able to count.







e tots will be able to catch a ball, climb, and play tag. The waving motions also strengthen the small muscles in their hands, wrists and fingers, so that the kids can soon color and write.

JAB scours his young audience, so he can make sure each kid is at the appropriate place developmentally. How is their speech? How is their ability to count? Do they make eye contact? Do they observe boundaries? His practiced eye gauges their approximate level.

JAB—who is a certified music therapist as well as a professional musician and a composer with more than twenty years of experience under his belt—gets “in tune” with his client to invoke a healing response. He recently sang “Don't Sit Under the Apple Tree” to an eighty-year-old woman who had been diagnosed with dementia three years before. “I'm sorry my brain isn't better,” she told him at their first meeting. “I'm here to help you keep what you have and hopefully turn it up a notch,” JAB replied.

The first thing that JAB noticed about her house was the large collection of African art she and her husband had amassed over the years. He took out a small drum and asked her to hit it as he placed it at different nearby angles. At the next session, he introduced a West African drum called the djembe. She smacked it with her bare hands, matching exactly the therapist's series of different rhythms, rediscovering a creative outlet that had been closed off to her since she had ceased playing the piano two years before.

JAB also does music therapy with people who suffer from addiction disorders, chronic depression and bipolar disorder.

Everyone has their own personal soundtrack: music and words that speak to them and make them feel fully alive. Certified music therapy is relatively new territory to Ventura County, and JAB is one of the few trailblazers bringing essential services to our region's very underserved population. Under his artful expertise, music truly works magic as it empowers lives.

Rothchild said.

According to Rothchild in 2016, 5,788 more girls went missing than boys. In 2017 that number increased to 6,942 and in 2018, 7,982 more girls than boys went missing. Rothchild encouraged everyone to pay attention to warning signs in order to help these young girls.

“Be the best you that you could be and listen to your gut and those instincts when you can,” Rothchild said. “We all can make a difference, wherever we are and pay that forward.”

Following Rothchild's speech Kris Hart, founder and CEO of 4Kids2Kids spoke about her experiences providing aid to kids who are victims of human trafficking.

According to the Soroptimist website 4Kids2Kids “provides safe homes for sex trafficking survivors.”

According to Hart, 43 girls have enrolled in 4Kids2Kids. After being in this program three girls returned to

their families, ten girls went into foster care, five girls graduated high school, three went to college/trade school, three rented their own apartment and three testified against their traffickers.

Hart emphasized that these victims are just children and the need to educate ourselves on the issue.

“If we don't educate ourselves then we just don't know,” Hart said. “If you see something you have to say something and that is how we promote change, and that is how we make a difference.”

Next, Darryl Evey, Executive Director of Family Assistance Program in San Bernardino spoke and explained different legislations that help victims of human trafficking.

These bills have and will treat survivors as victims rather than criminals which in turn gives them the opportunity to prosper in life. Without such policies survivors are not given the chance to fully recover and the only way to have policies that protect these women is to have the community promote and support such bills.

“Your legislatures need to hear from you. If they get 10 phone calls or emails on a bill, they ‘think wow that's interesting,’ if they get 20 they stop what they're doing and look at it. So, if every one of you contact all of your legislatures these bills will absolutely pass,” said Evey

Conejo's Sweeny Todd delivers

In the mood for something dark, brooding, frightening and thoroughly captivating? The current production of the award-winning musical thriller Sweeny Todd: The Demon Barber of Fleet Street at Conejo Players Theater in Thousand Oaks will fill the bill nicely.

The evil character of Sweeny Todd was first introduced in a Victorian penny dreadful. He has continued to come to life via book by Christopher Bond and, perhaps best known, as a musical by Stephen Sondheim. Sondheim outdid himself with the operatic score.

The story of Sweeny Todd is a dark one from start to finish. Benjamin Barker, recently released from exile in Australia, returns to London hoping to reunite with his wife and daughter. He was sent away by an unscrupulous man, Judge Turpin, who raped Barker's wife, Lucy, and took his daughter, Johanna, as his ward. Under the new name of Sweeny Todd, Barker seeks justice.

A young seaman, Anthony Hope, rescues and befriends him as he returns. Anthony becomes enamored by the beautiful Johanna, not knowing she is his friend's daughter. The judge hopes to marry her himself and does all he can to prevent the two young lovers to meet.

A barber by trade, Todd sets up his tonsorial parlor above Mrs. Lovett's Meat Pie Shop to try and begin again. Widow Lovett admits that her meat pies are the worst ever, using stray animals for filling. When Todd finds out the true fate of his family, he vows to exact revenge upon the Judge, the judge's henchman, The Beadle, and others who wronged him.

Director Celeste Russi fully utilizes the intricate multi-story set by Aaron Van Etten to deliver new scenes, as well as the necessary functional tipping barber chair and chutes.

The vocally and musically challenging piece is superbly handled by the highly skilled large cast.

The cast does wear microphones for this production - a critical point to carry above the front and center orchestration led by David Fraley.

In the title role of Sweeny, John David Wallis knocks it out of the park, both vocally and in characterization. He manifests darkness inside and out without letup.

Dana Kolb as the Widow Lovett displays a fine voice and a cheeky,

humorous contrast to the brooding Todd. Wallis and Kolb are a good match who deftly tackle Sondheim's challenging score beautifully.

The ensemble creeps in and out of scenes throughout to add musical definition and context to the action. Collectively they embody their many mini-characters to full advantage. Veteran actors Steve Perren and Gary Saxer are particularly solid.

Mid-nineteenth century costumes add the right touches to the entire cast. Those worn by Judge Turpin (Kelly Green) and his servant The Beadle (Gabriel Gentile) convey the entitled attitude the characters require. Both are chillingly wonderful in their roles.

Vincent Perez is fresh and compelling as the seaman/suitor Anthony. He is complimented by Joanna Bert as Johanna.

Sweeny Todd at the Conejo Players Theater is a difficult Sondheim offering professionally presented.

"An Indefinite Duration" Contemporary Dance Event

Ventura choreographer Devin Fulton has been dancing since age three,

and is now bringing her decades of experience to the fore in a new contemporary dance show she directs, featuring talented choreographers and dancers from both Ventura County and Los Angeles. "An Indefinite Duration" has nine pieces, each exploring the human obsession with time, from efforts to speed it up, slow it down, or turn it back, while touching on determining how to live in the present. The diverse suite of ten performers, ranging in age from 23 to 43, goes through precarious journeys like ending love, reinventing friendships and aging hiccups. Clocks are suspended above the stage, and dancers interact with them, powerfully weaving the theme of the variance of time throughout the show.

"This is the first time I've combined using local community dancers with professional performers in the same show," said Fulton. "It's been a huge growth opportunity for all of us—the beauty of it is finding ways to create an experience that works for everyone. I get to think outside of my own box, and I think the finished product is really amazing." Fulton shared that contemporary dance is, by definition, subjective, and audience members will have the opportunity to individually interpret what they see and hear. Her hope is that people get a little glimpse of many different human experiences. "They may cry a little bit, laugh a little bit, or be inspired to shimmy a little as the show unfolds," said Fulton. "Either way, we welcome the audience to come play with the hands of time by diving with us into the sometimes heavy, sometimes funny, and always multidimensional ways we exist as humans."

"An Indefinite Duration" will have 8 pm performances on March 23, 2019 at Hamsa Dance & Yoga Studio in Ojai and on March 29th and 30th at NAMBA Performing Arts Space in downtown Ventura. Its choreographers include Fulton, Gianna Burreight, Brittney Nevison, Estéfano Suazo, and Anthony Arellano. Tickets are \$20 and can be purchased at www.devin-fulton.brownpapertickets.com.

SEEAG seeks business/organization supporters for new mobile classroom

As part of its new Ventura County Child Wellness Initiative, Students for Eco-Education & Agriculture (SEEAG) is bringing its message of healthy eating, proper nutrition and daily exercise to classrooms throughout Ventura County using its new 30-foot-long cargo van—the “Farm Fresh Mobile Classroom.”

Over the next three years, the mobile classroom van will visit over 120 schools, reaching 10,000 Ventura County second through fourth graders, many who are Title 1 low-income children. SEEAG will introduce hands-on activities to increase children’s knowledge and preference for fresh Ventura County fruits and vegetables. As part of the program, students will get a chance to prepare healthy snacks using locally grown crops. They will also learn how to incorporate healthy living practices, good nutrition and exercise into their daily activities.

The colorful van will carry free educational supplies, Ventura County-grown farm fresh produce and recipe cards and nutrition information that students can share with their families. In addition, SEEAG will be promoting oral health by supplying free toothbrushes and dental floss.

To help cover van and transportation costs, SEEAG is making available 11 positions on the vehicle for business/organization logo placement—four on each side and three on the back.

“We want kids to get excited whenever

they see our van pull up at their school,” says Mary Maranville, SEEAG founder and CEO. “Our goal is to cultivate a deeper appreciation for our local agriculture, and healthy eating and wellness practices that will stay with these young students throughout their life.”

Red Cross: Severe shortage of type O blood

The American Red Cross has a severe shortage of type O blood and urges type O donors – as well as eligible blood and platelet donors of all blood types – to give now to ensure lifesaving patient care isn’t impacted this winter.

Type O blood is the most in-demand blood type, helping patients facing life-threatening conditions and emergencies every day. Type O negative blood can be transfused to patients with any blood type and is what emergency room personnel reach for when there’s no time to determine a patient’s blood type. Type O positive blood is also especially needed because it is the most transfused blood type and can be given to Rh-positive patients of any blood type.

Having a readily available blood supply is critical for patients like Luna Giles, who at the age of 1 1/2 has already underwent two heart surgeries and required over a dozen transfusions.

Right now, the Red Cross has less than a three-day supply of most blood types, and blood products are being distributed to hospitals faster than donations are coming in. Recent snowstorms and severe weather in many parts of the country have forced hundreds of blood drive cancellations, causing more than 20,000 blood and platelet donations to go uncollected.

Individuals of all blood types – especially type O – are asked to make an appointment to donate blood or platelets by

downloading the free American Red Cross Blood Donor App, visiting RedCrossBlood.org or calling 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767).



How to donate blood:

Simply download the American Red Cross Blood Donor App, visit RedCrossBlood.org or call 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767) to make an appointment or for more information. All blood types are needed to ensure a reliable supply for patients. A blood donor card or driver’s license or two other forms of identification are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also have to meet certain height and weight requirements.

Blood and platelet donors can save time at their next donation by using RapidPass® to complete their pre-donation reading and health history questionnaire online, on the day of their donation, before arriving at the blood drive. To get started, follow the instructions at RedCrossBlood.org/RapidPass or use the Blood Donor App.




