SCAG honors 6 innovative projects

Six exemplary and innovative planning projects were honored May 2 as winners of the 2019 Sustainability Awards by the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG).

Recipients of the 12th annual awards include municipalities, agencies and non-profit organizations throughout the six-county SCAG region. The Sustainability Awards recognize excellence in coordinating land use and transportation to improve mobility, livability, prosperity and sustainability.

"We're honored to present these awards, which recognize the best of the best when it comes to improving the quality of life of our communities and the region," said Bill Jahn, Big Bear Lake City Council member and President of SCAG. "Sustainability encompasses so much, but at its core is the integration of land use and transportation to improve our lives. As these projects illustrate, there is a tremendous amount of innovative and meaningful work being done across our region."

The Sustainability Awards winners will be formally honored at SCAG's 2019 Regional Conference and General Assembly, taking place at the JW Marriott Desert Springs Resort & Spa in Palm Desert.

Outstanding Achievement in Sustainability: The City of Ventura for the Kellogg Park project.

Nestled into city of Ventura's Westside neighborhood, Kellogg Park is the result of extensive collaboration between residents and the City. Built on a vacant lot that once cited a rebar factory, the park serves the varied recreation needs of a community short on open space. Residents advocated for a number of amenities to meet the diverse needs of the community, including multi-generational opportunities to exercise, a community garden, and design components that allow for increased safety. The park also features innovative sustainable design such as a sand-filter swale "river" that reflects the nearby Ventura River watershed and provides recreational and educational opportunities.

options for survivors of the Thomas Fire that are working to rebuild.

The Solarize Ventura 2019 program is designed to make it easier and more affordable for homeowners to go solar. This year, the program has selected Coastal Solar as their installer partner, who will offer discounted prices through July 31, 2019.

The program will offer energy storage equipment and education on energy storage for the first time. Storage systems will be available to new solar customers and to existing solar customers who wish to upgrade their systems to include storage.

Southern California Edison's new "time-of-use" pricing structures benefit solar customers. Under these new rates, many solar customers will benefit by utilizing solar energy stored during the day for peak evening hours, avoiding the need to buy electricity from the grid at the most expensive time, from 4pm - 9pm. Having a battery backup can also give solar customers power in their homes during power outages.

Residents who lost homes in the Thomas Fire are invited to participate in the Solarize Program regardless of the progress of their rebuild. Solarize Ventura will offer community workshops focused on the benefits and details associated with going solar. Workshops will cover solar billing rates, equipment, warrantees, financing, and tax credits. A solar coach will also be available to discuss questions as needed.

Ventura Council votes to switch high usage accounts to SCE

The Ventura City Council, at the June 24th meeting has voted to move Ventura's high usage electricity accounts back to Southern California Edison. The majority of city accounts will remain with the Clean Power Alliance. Council members responding to a sudden and unexpected substantial increase in high electricity usage categories remained firm in their commitment to move the city to 100% renewable energy with the exception of those high usage categories. The city will not be able to switch from SCE to CPA for 12 months after the decision to switch back to SCE.

On June 6, this year CPA's board set significant rate increases to close a gap in projected revenues. The rate hikes would have affected 1,800 high-user accounts, about 1% of all customers. The high energy users faced rate hikes of 37% to 47%. The accounts affected relate to street and highway lighting,

outdoor area lighting, pumping, and agriculture. CPA's residential customers faced no increase in rates. They will continue to pay based on the tier set by elected officials in their jurisdictions. For city government and large accounts, the costs amounted to between tens and hundreds of thousands of dollars extra per year.

In a 4-3 vote at Monday's council meeting, it was decided to move the city's biggest accounts (those related to street lighting) to Southern California Edison. Several other city accounts while still impacted like pumping and large facilities like City Hall will remain with the CPA, but will change to a 36% renewables energy mix, reducing the original plan that called for use of 100% renewables which the council had previously adopted.

Based on early estimates, it will

cost the city \$100,000 to \$160,000 more, Finance and Technology Director Michael Coon said. Exact amounts, however, remain unknown at this early stage. The city only had weeks notice to prepare for the rate increases, he added. Coon said the city planned to work with CPA to "narrow down the exact impact."

CPA said the unexpected rate increases were associated with a series of rate changes and a sharp spike in exit fees, which Edison charges to customers who leave the investor-owned utility for the power it purchased on their behalf. Colin Cushnie, vice president of power supply, said a main driver of the streetlight increase was peak pricing, which used to be noon to 6 p.m. So just as streetlights are turning on, power rates are at their highest. Rates in the past were highest during midday when





After more than 30-years at 2401 Harbor, the last **Carrows** Restaurant in Ventura County has closed its doors. Carrows Restaurants, Inc. is a subsidiary of

Catalina Restaurant Group, Inc. I'm sorry to see it close. Even though part of a chain, it was still a local casual restaurant.

■ The board that oversees use of the Ventura County **Fairgrounds** has voted to tighten rules on gun shows in 2019.

The changes will impact Cross-roads of the West, which has three more shows scheduled this year.

The policy changes are likely to include requiring firearms, whether in a locked showcase or on display, be attached to security cords. Vendors and their employees will also be banned from drinking alcohol.

And speaking about guns:

A gunman who killed two workers and then himself at a Ford dealership in the San Francisco Bay area Tuesday had apparently just been fired, witnesses said. Police confirmed that he appears to have been either a disgruntled or former employee.

A San Bernardino woman was arrested after one of her sons accidently shot and killed his 12-year old twin-brother in their home. The boy's mother was arrested on suspicion of child cruelty for leaving the unprotected gun where it could be used by her kids.

A 10-month old girl is in critical condition after a man shot her in the head after the baby's mother rejected him at a party.

A longstanding dispute ended with the deaths of five people after a shooting in a quiet mobile home park in Central California. The shooter is 64.

■ San Francisco will become the first US city to effectively **ban e-cigarette** sales, after the city's board of supervisors unanimously voted in favor of an

ordinance providing this law.

The ordinance states; "No person shall sell or distribute an electronic cigarette to a person in San Francisco" unless that product has undergone premarket review by the US Food and Drug Administration. To date, none have.

Health advocates have been saying that the FDA has failed to assume their responsibility on this matter. The city criticized the FDA for allowing these products to temporarily remain on shelves without undergoing premarket review for their impact on public health, as required.

E-cigarettes are a product that, by law, is not allowed on the market without FDA review.

FDA spokesman Michael Felberbaum said that, "The FDA has and will continue to tackle the troubling epidemic of e-cigarette use among kids. This includes preventing youth access to, and appeal of, flavored tobacco products like e-cigarettes and cigars, taking action against manufacturers and retailers who illegally market or sell these products to minors, and educating youth about the dangers of e-cigarettes and other tobacco products."

This includes sales in brick-and-mortar stores, as well as online sales shipped to a San Francisco address. The ordinance also applies to flavored tobacco products in addition to e-cigarettes. The measure does not ban the use of vapes among people 21 and older.

Vaping may or may not be healthier than smoking conventional cigarettes, but it is getting dangerous. Recently, a teenage boys' vape exploded blowing out several of his teeth and cracked open his jaw. This was not the first incident of vapers blowing up.

Obviously, people who want to buy e-cigarettes won't have any trouble doing so, but I'm glad that San Francisco is making a statement by enacting this ordinance.

A Texas woman was banned from

a **Walmart** for eating half of a cake and refusing to pay for it. Can't blame her - why pay for half a cake? She can't have her cake and eat it too.

■ For the first time since humans have existed on Earth, carbon dioxide in the atmosphere has topped 415 parts per million. It reached 415.26 parts per million, according to sensors at the Mauna Loa Observatory, a research outpost of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Agency.

A report has revealed that at least 1 million species were at risk of extinction thanks to human activity and the carbon emissions that are a byproduct of economic development.

■ The Kansas Supreme Court ruled that women have the right to an **abortion** under the state's Constitution. In a 6-1 decision, the state's highest court also kept in place a temporary injunction on a law that bans a common second trimester abortion procedure.

■ **Apple**, Inc. will manufacture its new Mac Pro computer in China. It has been its only major device assembled in the United States. They will use Quanta Computer to manufacture the \$6,000 desktop computer.

A well-known **pizza** company has a policy that if you drop and ruin your pizza, they will replace it. Do you know anyone who has ever dropped a pizza? What happens if you are driving home after picking up a pizza and have a car accident, will they give you a new pizza, and repair your car for free? Better read the pizza contract.

Goats clear invasive brush by the ocean in Ventura

Ventura Brush Goats recently delivered 70 weed eating goats to the vacant lot behind the Golden China Restaurant next to Highway 101 at Seaward to remove fire-fuel brush and invasive plant species. The herd arrived on Friday, June 28th and will remain for several weeks. The site is for a future hotel.

Owners Michael and Brook Leicht said, "Goats can often be the best method for clearing land, whether it is for fire mitigation, soil improvement, or invasive plant removal. They can clear steep slopes that are difficult and dangerous for humans to traverse and will happily devour poison oak and thistles."

Goats trim the skirts of trees up to four feet off the ground, effectively preventing "canopy" fires, and once the goats are on-sight, there is no need for loud and fuel intensive heavy machinery or toxic chemicals.

This is especially beneficial on this site because any run-off would quickly make its way to the Pacific Ocean. Mob grazing with goats can help prevent storm water run-off; their hooves make thousands of cups in the soil that catch water and slow it down. The beneficial microbes in their gut inoculate the soil with healthy microbial activity via manure which improves soil health and encourages "better" weeds with a more fibrous root structure to thrive rather than persistent tap-root plants like invasive mustards and mallow. The fibrous-rooted plants create more humus which allows the soil to hold more water over time, further preventing surface run-off and combating drought.

Ventura Brush Goats uses portable solar electric nets to keep predators out and goats targeted in a specific area. The herd is transported in a large 32' long livestock trailer that doubles as shelter and hospital pen. Their hooves are trimmed every 2 months. Other than their free-choice mineral supplement, they require no food except weeds!

Michael went on to tell the Breeze "We are a family owned weed abatement and soil improvement service based in Ventura County. We graze firebreaks and eliminate invasive brush while restoring natural fertility with our goat herd."

"For us, the Thomas fire was a call to action. We had been raising a couple of dairy goats to provide for ourselves and our then-two-year-old daughter; we saw firsthand how they quickly dispatched of the brush in their paddock, and in the first days of 2018 with ashes still in the air we decided take the leap and learn how to holistically manage a large grazing herd. Our herd will total about seventy animals and we expect to grow to approximately one hundred in the spring of 2020. "

"Because of their practicality, cost-effectiveness, ecological sustainability and downright fun, our family has become very passionate about working with goats to clear brush and improve soil! Affordable Housing Project receives large award

The Housing Authority of the City of San Buenaventura applied for and secured \$8,370,651, the largest California award from the National Housing Trust Fund, for construction of the Willett Ranch senior affordable housing development.

The Willett Ranch community will make 50 new construction homes available to income-eligible senior households (ages 62+), including 15 homes for formerly homeless seniors. The development, located in the Solana Heights area of Ventura, is designed to GreenPoint-rated standards with regard to energy efficiency, water conservation, indoor air quality and environmentally preferable materials. The community will consist of 46 one-bedroom and four two-bedroom units, a community room, a reading or craft room, a common laundry room and office space and landscaped courtyards where seniors can enjoy the outdoors or visit with family.

At the newly constructed development, low-income seniors will pay no more than 30 percent of their income

towards rent. Construction is expected to be completed by March 2021. Seniors at the new community will access a wide variety of services provided by the HACSB Community Services Department and by way of the HACSB partnership with the Area Agency on Aging.

The National Housing Trust Fund (NHTF) assists in the new construction of permanent housing for extremely low-income households. The Project was awarded under the first Notice of Funding Availability issued in 2018. All NHTF projects must maintain affordability for a period of 55 years.

"We are thrilled to receive this generous National Housing Trust Fund award that enables the Housing Authority to help address the growing need for safe, accessible and affordable housing for our low-income seniors," said Denise Wise, HACSB Chief Executive Officer.

The Housing Authority of the City Of San Buenaventura (HACSB) is the largest residential landlord in the City of Ventura, currently managing 295 public housing units, 705 nonprofit affordable rental units, and more than 1,500 Section 8 vouchers. The agency is actively working to increase the supply of affordable housing and to improve the quality of life for hundreds more of the low-income residents of the City of Ventura. http://www.hacityventura.org/.

Adventure of a lifetime

Take an "adventure of a lifetime" and learn what life is like aboard the deep-sea Exploration Vessel Nautilus at the free community lecture "Fascinating Discoveries from the Deep Blue Sea" on July 25.

Melissa Baffa, Development Officer at Santa Barbara Museum of Natural History, and a Science Communication Fellow on the E/V Nautilus (2015, 2016 and 2018), will speak at Ventura Land Trust's upcoming Environmental Speaker Series "Fascinating Discoveries from the Deep Blue Sea" 7:00 pm on July 25, at the Museum of Ventura County, 100 E. Main Street.

"I'll be talking about exploring the deep sea and my experiences aboard the Exploration Vessel (E/V) Nautilus, a ship owned and used by Dr. Robert Ballard, a pioneer in oceanography who is known for his historic discoveries of hydrothermal vents, the final resting place of the HMS Titanic, as well as the German battleship Bismarck," said Baffa. "I'll also take attendees on a typical day aboard the Nautilus, and they'll have an opportunity to view some fascinating deep- sea discoveries."

The E/V Nautilus is equipped with some of the latest, state-of-the-art technological systems, which help advance the frontiers of ocean exploration by employing the assistance of remotely operated vehicles (ROVs) and real-time satellite data transmission available for public viewing at nautiluslive.org.

Event guests will get to experience other-worldly ecosystems, hydrothermal vents, and exotic marine life near the Galapagos Islands, the basins and ridges off the coast of Southern California; and Davidson Seamount, part of the Monterey Bay National Marine

"I'm looking forward to sharing the highlights of these amazing ocean experiences," continued Baffa. also be talking about the opportunities available for educators and college-age students to participate in these types of exploratory experiences. "

Man pursues his dream to dance after 46 years

It has been Ron Perkovich's dream to dance since 1964. In 2010, in Ventura, Perkovich finally made that dream come true. Now, nine years later, at the age of 71, he is a part of three dance clubs, is vice president of a dance club, has tried various types of dance, and dances every week.

Perkovich was born in Wisconsin and is the youngest of eight kids. He said that as the youngest, he just wanted to do everything his older siblings did.

Perkovich's dream to dance started in high school. One of the high school students would bring records and spin them at lunch.

"The kids would go out there and dance. Well, being the youngest you follow your brothers and sisters. Most of them danced to some degree out there so I went out there. I was like 14, 16 years old. I'm out there bojangling around, not doing very well but you do it because your brothers and sisters are doing it. Well I had a couple buddies sitting on the bleachers harassing me," Perkovich said.

Once the kids started laughing at him, Perkovich quit dancing. Throughout his life he would watch others dance and wish he could do the same but always remained silent.

"About 32 years ago in St. Paul, Minnesota, my brother-in-law and his wife were dancing to a Don Williams song in their kitchen and I am standing there and I didn't say anything to anybody but I was thinking, 'damn I want to do this,'" Perkovich said.

About nine years ago, Perkovich was

laid off from his job so he had more free time. Perkovich saw this as an opportunity to start dancing. He looked in the newspaper for dance ads and found an ad for line dancing lessons at the Barranca Vista Center in Ventura.

Perkovich began line dancing but later wanted to expand his horizons. Perkovich searched the internet for other dance lessons and found ballroom dance lessons in the same building. Perkovich's wife knew he had a passion for dance, so she decided to go with him.

"My wife knows that my passion was dancing so she was kind enough and honorable enough to say "I'll go with you," Perkovich said. "She suffered through six sessions with me. I know it's her desire to not do that. She's very quiet and shy and so she likes to be alone and I honor that. She knows that I need to dance because I waited 46 years for this."

Since Perkovich started dancing, he has tried various dance styles and dances at different dance clubs in Ventura County.

"Now, I belong to three dance clubs. Monday night at Poinsettia, Tuesday-Line Dancing at the Moose Lodge and Thursday at the Oxnard Performing Arts Center. I also go to Leisure Village off Las Posas in Camarillo," Perkovich said.

Perkovich has tried ballroom dancing, line dancing Latin dancing and Zumba. He said he likes them all.

Fall-proofing your home

Six out of every 10 falls happen at home, where we spend much of our time and tend to move around without thinking about our safety. There are many changes you can make to your home that will help you avoid falls and ensure your safety.

Fall hazards in the home, including a scatter rug, dog, and empty slippers in stairways, hallways, and pathways.

Have handrails on both sides of the stairs, and make sure they are tightly fastened. Hold the handrails when you use the stairs, going up or down. If you must carry something while you're on the stairs, hold it in one hand and use the handrail with the other. Don't let what you're carrying block your view of

Make sure there is good lighting with light switches at the top and bottom of stairs and on each end of a long hall. Remember to use the lights!

Keep areas where you walk tidy. Don't leave books, papers, clothes, and shoes on the floor or stairs.

Check that all carpets are fixed firmly to the floor so they won't slip. Put no-slip strips on tile and wooden floors. You can buy these strips at the hardware store.

Don't use throw rugs or small area

Mount grab bars near toilets and

on both the inside and outside of your tub and shower.

Place non-skid mats, strips, or carpet on all surfaces that may get wet.

Remember to turn on night lights. In Your Bedroom

Put night lights and light switches close to your bed.

Keep a flashlight by your bed in case the power is out and you need to

Keep your telephone near your bed. In Other Living Areas

Keep electric cords and telephone wires near walls and away from walking

Secure all carpets and large area rugs firmly to the floor.

Arrange your furniture (especially low coffee tables) and other objects so they are not in your way when you walk.

Make sure your sofas and chairs are the right height for you to get in and out of them easily.

Don't walk on newly washed floors—they are slippery.

Keep items you use often within easy reach.

Don't stand on a chair or table to reach something that's too high-use a "reach stick" instead or ask for help. Reach sticks are special grabbing tools that you can buy at many hardware or medical-supply stores. If you use a step stool, make sure it is steady and has a handrail on top. Have someone stand next to you.

Don't let your cat or dog trip you.

Know where your pet is whenever you're standing or walking.

Keep emergency numbers in large print near each telephone.

If you have fallen, your doctor might suggest that an occupational therapist, physical therapist, or nurse visit your home. These healthcare providers can assess your home's safety and advise you about making changes to prevent falls.

Your Own Medical Alarm

If you're concerned about falling, think about getting an emergency response system. If you fall or need emergency help, you push a button on a special necklace or bracelet to alert 911. There is a fee for this service, and it is not usually covered by insurance. Home Improvements Prevent Falls

Many State and local governments have education and/or home modification programs to help older people prevent falls. Check with your local health department, or local Area Agency on Aging to see if there is a program near you.



Are you concerned about health care costs?

by National Council on Aging

Almost sixty percent of Americans aged 60 and over are concerned that health care costs (56%) and 43 percent are concerned that prescription drug costs are outpacing retirement savings, according to a new NCOA/Ipsos survey. This survey is being released at NCOA's Age+Action Conference, June 17-20 in Washington, DC. The conference is a premiere national convening focused on ensuring every person's right to age with their best possible health and economic security. The event brings together 1,000 professionals from across the country who are dedicated to making aging well possible for all.

"Our recent NCOA/Ipsos survey of older Americans finds that most people 60 and older report being pretty happy with their current lives," reports Annie Weber, Senior Vice President at the research company Ipsos. 



Rubicon Theatre Company offers aims to protect its Fearless Shakespeare Camp

Once again, Rubicon Theatre Company offers its Fearless Shakespeare Camp, marking the tenth season the organization has presented a youth production by the Bard. The 2019 production of The Tempest will be special though. For the first time ever, Rubicon is making free tickets available for students and teachers in our region. Kirby and Beverly Ward, Co-Directors of Education and Outreach at the theatre, got the idea after hearing about the inception of Joseph Papp's famous Shakespeare in the Park in NYC. "I was watching a TED Talk with Oskar Eustice," says Beverly, "when he referenced his predecessor at The Public Theatre, the great Joe Papp. According to Eustice, Papp believed that the classics should be free for everyone - not just the wealthy." "More importantly, he thought they should see the very best renditions of these plays," says Kirby Ward, Beverly's husband and partner at Rubicon. "Anyone who's seen one of Joseph Fuqua's Fearless Shakespeare productions knows, his spin on these Masterpieces is spectacularly creative and his direction is first-rate."

Fuqua is a Yale Drama grad and a member of the professional company at Rubicon. His students are fiercely loyal to him, often returning many years in a row. He's known for his humor and insight into the minds of teenagers. "When adapting these plays for Fearless Shakespeare, my focus is to make them easily understood by an American audience. We use modern dress, put it in a contemporary setting, but still honor Shakespeare's exalted language," says Fuqua. New campaign children and youth from child exploitation

Ventura County's READY TO STOP Initiative launches campaign distinguished by a blue check mark to raise awareness about the commercial sexual exploitation of children.

Just when you think your county and your home are safe, your child can fall victim to exploiters and predators in the blink of an eye. Ventura County's Commercially Sexually Exploited Children's (CSEC) READY (Respectfully Empowering and Defining Yourself) Program is stepping in with their first campaign, READY TO STOP Child Trafficking in Ventura County, to ensure our children and our community stay protected, informed and vigilant around increased levels of exploitation here in Ventura

The READY Program is a program within the County's Children and Family Services Agency. The program provides support to social workers as they seek to identify and offer assistance to children and youth within the child welfare system who are experiencing commercial sexual exploitation or are at high risk of such. The program liaisons with stakeholder agencies, non-profits, law enforcement, and other partners to build a network of response to address child trafficking.

The commercial sexual exploitation of children is one of the largest criminal industries in the world. According to the Child Welfare Council CSEC Action Team, the FBI has determined that three of the nation's thirteen High Intensity Child [Trafficking] areas are located in California in the metropolitan and surrounding areas of San Francisco, San Diego, and Los Angeles.

It is crucial to understand this is taking place right in our own backyards. In Ventura County alone, an average of 1.4 referrals per week have been made to the child abuse hotline in 2019. In 2018, there were 17 identified youth in care at high risk of CSEC.

The READY TO STOP campaign aims to raise awareness by educating the public about the warning signs surrounding sexual exploitation of children. The campaign will inform members of the community about existing hotlines for those who need immediate assistance, as well as what resources are available for survivors.

Rental scam alert

During the past few weeks four Ventura residents have fallen victim to rental scams. The scammers have listed home rentals on Craigslist and Zillow. In one case the victim toured the home they intended to rent and then sent the deposit and first month's rent. The home was for rent, but the scammer was not the owner of the home. The scammer used the empty home to con the victim into believing they were the property

Please use caution when looking for a rental! As you consider issues like size, cost, and location of the rental, also consider this: that rental listing could

be a scam. Scammers often advertise rentals that don't exist or aren't available to trick people into sending money before they find out the truth.

Scammers know that finding the right rental can be hard work, and a seemingly good deal is hard to pass up. They've been known to game some home or vacation rental websites.

Some scammers hijack a real rental or real estate listing by changing the email address or other contact information and then they place the modified ad on another site. The altered ad may even use the name of the person who posted the original ad. In other cases, scammers have hijacked the email accounts of property owners on reputable rental websites.

Other scammers make up listings for places that aren't for rent or don't exist and try to lure you in with the promise of low rent, or great amenities. Their goal is to get your money before you find out.

Being savvy when you're in search of a rental is well worth the effort. Here are some signs you may be dealing with a scam:

They tell you to wire money: This is the surest sign of a scam. There's never a good reason to wire money to pay a security deposit, application fee, first month's rent, or vacation rental fee. That's true even if they send you a contract first. Wiring money is the same as sending cash - once you send it, you have no way to get it back.

They want a security deposit or first month's rent before you've met or signed a lease. It's never a good idea to send money to someone you've never met in person for a home you haven't seen. If you can't visit an apartment or house yourself, ask someone you trust to go Continued on page 24

A new study suggests when dog owners go through a stressful period, they're not alone in feeling the pressure their dogs feel it too. Dog owners experiencing long bouts of stress can transfer it to their dogs, scientists report in a study in Scientific Reports.

The Swedish researchers focused on 58 people who own border collies or Shetland sheepdogs. They examined hair from the dog owners and their dogs, looking at the concentrations of a hormone called cortisol, a chemical released into the bloodstream and absorbed by hair follicles in response to stress.

Depression, excessive physical exercise and unemployment are just a few examples of stress that can influence the amount of cortisol found in your hair, said Lina Roth of Linkoping University in Sweden.

Roth and her team found that the patterns of cortisol levels in the hair of dog owners closely matched that found in their dogs in both winter and summer months, indicating their stress levels were in sync.

She thinks the owners are influencing the dogs rather than the other way around because several human personality traits appear to affect canine cortisol levels.

The researchers don't know what causes the synchronization in cortisol levels between humans and their pups. But a hint might lie in the fact that the link is stronger with competitive dogs than in pet pooches.

The bond formed between owner and competitive dogs during training may increase the canines' emotional reliance on their owners, she said. That in turn could increase the degree of synchronization.

The study results are no surprise, said Alicia Buttner, director of animal behavior with the Nebraska Humane Society in Omaha."New evidence is continually emerging, showing that people and their dogs have incredibly close bonds that resemble the ones that parents share with their children."

So, relax around your best friend. It's good for both of you.

Seattle-based Amazon is the most dog-friendly workplace in the U.S., according to a newly released report. The study, by the pet care website Rover.com, said Amazon's pet policies at its Seattle campus gave it the highest dog-friendly

score of any other U.S. employer.

The study based its rankings on data collected from pet owners on what they value most, including the total number of dogs allowed in the office, dog and pet parent perks and office amenities geared towards pups.

According to the survey, Amazon supports its 6,000 registered dogs with an on-campus dog park and plenty of free poop bags and treats. The company also has policies allowing for pet time off, a pet adoption stipend and other amenities.

"Today, 40 percent of all workers feel overworked and pressured, and dogs can offer much-needed relief in an office environment," the report says.

Phil Tedeschi, executive director of the Institute for Human-Animal Connection at the University of Denver, says having pets in the workplace is often welcomed by many employees, not just pet parents.

"The bond between humans and animals is good for human health and can build connections in the work environment," he said. "Pets often allow for engagement and shared activity, in turn strengthening bonds among coworkers."

Temperatures are rising Southwest Colorado, which means it is time for pet owners to consider the safety and comfort of their furry companions as more people venture outdoors.With temperatures starting to soar, pets can experience different dangers, including heatstroke, burned paws and rattlesnake bites.

Heatstroke, which affects animals more than people, occurs when the body is unable to regulate its temperature.

If a pet is experiencing a heatstroke, put cool (not cold) water on the animal's head, stomach and paws to help cool it. If a pet has had a heatstroke, take the animal to the veterinarian immediately

A car parked in 70 degree weather can reach 89 degrees after 10 minutes, according to information from the American Veterinary Medical Association. A car parked in 90 degree weather can reach a scorching 109 degrees after 10 minutes..

Barbara Hjermstad, hospital manager at Riverview Animal Hospital, said the clinic sees one to two dogs die from heat-related illness each summer.

Overheating in cars is not the only heat-related risk for pets. Their paws can also burn on asphalt. Owners concerned about the temperature of cement or asphalt can place their own hand on the blacktop for four seconds to test the temperature, Anderson said.

There are a few other things animal lovers can do to help keep their pets safe during the summer.

One way of keeping pets healthy in high temperatures is to leave them at home, Anderson said.

The disease was most frequently reported to the F.D.A. in golden retrievers, but the report noted that breed-specific social media groups and activities raised awareness of the issue in these communities of golden retriever owners, who perhaps disproportionately notified the F.D.A. of their dogs' diagnoses.

Many of the dogs researched in the investigation did not have a genetic predisposition to the condition, the F.D.A. said.

wetsuit donated by Patagonia, with tickets available for anyone bringing in a wetsuit to be recycled by Suga, a company that converts donated wetsuits into yoga mats.

Oergel reported that the local Surfrider chapter has been serving the community since 1991, helping protect the environment in a variety of ongoing ways. Since 2016, the chapter has installed over 100 ashcans with "Hold Onto Your Butts" emblazoned on them, which serve dual purposeskeeping cigarette butts disposed of and then actually recycled, as a company called Terracycle makes things like benches out of them. One such green bench can be seen on the promenade near the Ventura pier playground. The Surfrider members also participate in water quality testing with the Foundation's Blue Water Task Force, a volunteer-run, water testing, education and advocacy program which measure bacteria levels at both marine and freshwater beaches and compare them to federal water quality standards established by the EPA to protect public health in recreational waters.

This year, the Surfrider Foundation partnered with local non-profit pure Stoke Surf Club to raise awareness of environmental responsibility while enjoying and respecting the ocean. Zora Wolter is the founder of the organization, and she and her team of volunteers



were busy during the event, offering tandem surfing lessons for kids. The organization develops free, yearround community surf programs for kids with diverse backgrounds and abilities, including underserved communities. Wolter shared that in the past she had been involved with other surf therapy organizations, and recalled that during one of them, a participant was so jubilant that he told her 'This is the best day of my year!' She said "That made me so sad! We should definitely be out here far more often offering this to kids." So, she launched the pure Stoke club in Ventura in 2018, and since then, they have offered nearly 500 monthly surf lessons to kids at C street, as well as a location in Rosarito, Mexico, all taught by local surfers.

Ventura Harbor Village Marina begins major transition

On the heels of a major upgrade at its Fish Pier, the Ventura Harbor Village Marina, operated by the Ventura Port District, is making another large investment as one of the most active commercial fishing ports between San Pedro and Morro Bay.

In 2017, a total of some 27 tons of fish was offloaded at the Ventura Harbor Village Fish Pier. The value of this activity was \$31 million. The majority of this was California market squid.

Commercial fishing is vital to the local economy. In April, the Ventura Port District invested \$500,000 into the re-

surfacing of the Fish Pier and other improvements of the essential offloading facility for large and small commercial fishermen.

Next, an extensive Ventura Harbor Village Marina Dock Improvement Project will increase the availability of larger slips. Commencing in mid-May, the sweeping project is scheduled for completion in September.

Both projects align with the Ventura Port District goal of positioning the harbor marina as a world-class commercial harbor.

Seven years in the planning, the

dock improvement project will cost an estimated \$4.5 million as part of the Ventura Port District's Capital Improvement Program aimed at upgrading the utilities and the infrastructure of the dock systems, including fire suppression.

The new dock systems will accommodate the harbor's ever-expanding fleet of commercial vessels.

"Our tenant population is and will continue to be primarily commercial fishing vessels," said Harbor Village Marina manager Dave Werneburg, "along with our other existing commercial entities including dive boats, hospitality offerings and Island Packers Cruises."

Infrastructure improvements include the replacement of environmentally unfriendly foam dock floats with cement docks, and the upgrade of electrical pedestals in each slip.

Kelly Herrera, AP Literature and AP Language teacher at Buena High, presented on her groundbreaking Teach Living Poets project, a movement that was created to bring livings poets into classrooms, via Skype and video, to make poetry more accessible and engaging. "There's no teachers' manual," said Hererra. "As we dive in, I'm diving in along with the students. It's making me vulnerable with them, and getting out of my comfort zone makes me a stronger teacher,

and our students deserve that."

Students at DATA Middle School are finding cool new methods with which to engage in advanced design methodologies. Alex Wulff is a teacher and entrepreneur at DATA, and is passionate about teaching advancements in media and fabrication technologies. He spoke about Ventura's non-profit student-led "STEMbassador" program, focusing on Science, Technology, Engineering and Math, and how these students develop practical, standards-based curriculum for teachers to use for a variety of applied STEM technologies. These include CAD-based CNC-routers, laser engravers, and 3D printers—his points were amplified in real time while he spoke, as behind him a 3D printer made a small, detailed plastic frog. He was enthusiastic about the difference this program has been making in students' academic lives. "Students started creating works of art, really, it hurt your heart, it was so beautiful," said Wulff.

According to LAUNCH, following the event, which was videoed, the stories shared will live on to influence others, through social media. The plan is for the collection of videos to continue to grow over time to facilitate more peer to peer sharing, learning and collaboration.



Police Reports

Police reports are provided to us by the Ventura Police Department and are not the opinions of the Ventura Breeze. All suspects mentioned are assumed to be innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.

Stolen Vehicle, Brandishing

On June 21, at approximately 5pm, the Ventura Police Command Center received a 911 call of a subject being detained for brandishing a handgun at McConnell's Ice Cream. As officers arrived, they learned that the suspect, 63-year-old Thomas Young, approached the two victims as they sat in a van parked next to the business. Young told the victims that the owner of the van owed him money. Neither of the victims knew who Young was, and the three became engaged in a verbal argument which escalated into a physical altercation.

During the fight, a handgun fell from Young's clothes and onto the ground. Young picked up the gun and pointed it at one of the victims. The victims continued to fight with Young and were able to subdue him and disarm him of the gun. After taking the gun away, the victims waited for the police to arrive and turned over the gun to the police. During the arrest, the gun was found to be unloaded, and Young was found to have illegal drugs on his person. It was also discovered that the vehicle Young was driving was a stolen

Young suffered minor injuries during the incident but refused medical attention. Neither of the victims or any officers were injured during the call. Young was arrested for possession of a stolen vehicle, possession of controlled substance, and brandishing. Young is a PROS offender.

On June 22, at approximately 12:30pm, officers responded to a report of a stabbing victim in a vehicle to the front of the Ventura City Fire station in the 700 block of N. Ventura Ave. It was reported the stabbing had occurred at an unknown location in the Ventura River bottom. Officers, along with Ventura City Fire and AMR personnel, found the victim, later identified as a 31-year-old male, suffering from non-life-threatening stab wounds to his neck and torso. He was immediately transported to VCMC for treatment of his injuries. The victim was admitted to the hospital and his current condition is not known.

During the investigation, officers learned that the suspect is possibly none to the victim and both were in the river bottom when the suspect stabbed him. The victim fled to a nearby residence and got a ride from the homeowner to the fire station. The victim was not cooperative with the investigation and officers were unable to locate a crime scene.

The investigation is ongoing. There is no additional information to be released at this time. An additional press release will be sent out when the information is available. Anyone with information about this crime is asked to contact the Ventura Police Department at 339-4488.

Prowling, Peeping, and Resisting

On June 23, at approximately

2:30am, VPD officers responded to a call of a prowler seen in the backyard of the victim's residence. The victim awoke to their motion activated flood lamp and saw a male suspect wearing a beanie looking into their sliding glass door. The victim immediately called 911.

VPD patrol officers quickly arrived and observed the suspect, 51-year-old Ventura resident Carl Valadez, after he climbs over the victim's fence to exit the yard. The first officer tries to make contact and the suspect runs. The officer engaged in a foot pursuit and is joined by a K9 officer. The suspect ultimately gives up peacefully and is taken into custody without incident.

The suspect was booked at Ventura County Jail for Prowling, Peeping, and Resisting Arrest.

Assault on a Peace Officer

On June 28, at approximately 7:30pm, officers responded to a Subject Disturbing call at the Travelers Beach Inn. The suspect, 43-year-old Andrew Hodges, was reported disturbing guests of the hotel, and he was not a registered guest of the hotel. As officers went to contact Hodges, he attempted to walk away from them. Eventually, the officers were able to stop Hodges on the second floor, landing next to a staircase.

Immediately upon the contacting Hodges is was uncooperative and refused to listen to the officers repeated requests sit down. Secrets Abound at Santa Paula's Casa

A retro revelation into a world many of us have little or no knowledge of takes the main stage at the Santa Paula theater Center. Casa Valentina, written by Harvey Fierstein (of Kinky Boots, La Cage Aux Folle fame) is based on actual events. Casa explores an exclusive resort in the Catskills catering to straight men who desire a place to dress and act as women, even for a brief time.

In 1962, the play's setting, such a desire was strictly taboo and considered a severe embarrassment. Although great strides have been made, even today there is still a wealth of misunderstanding, derision and even fear surrounding transvestite lifestyle. Women dress as men -why are men not afforded the same acceptance? Casa Valentina explores this story of a few brave men who retreat to New York's Catskill mountains for an annual rejuvenation of sprit.

With Fred Helsel at the Director's helm, the seasoned cast takes on this enlightenment challenge beautifully.

Chip Albers plays George who transforms into the capable and confident Valentina. Aided by his understanding wife Rita, portrayed by Sindy McKay, the two assist each guest to become comfortable in their temporary roles as women.

A retreat regular, Bessie (Albert) is given larger than life attributes by Allan Noel. By far the most outspoken of the group, Albert embraces his inner femininity with gusto.

He is joined by Michael/Gloria, a younger regular played by the versatile and enchanting Trent Trachtenberg. The other end of the age spectrum is covered by Doug Friedlander as Theodore/Terry, a vision in lavender.

Rounding out the mix are long-time attendees Judge (Ronald Rezac) who becomes Amy, and Isadore (Elixeo Flores) who embodies Charlotte, a zealot for change. Both are solid in their portrayals.

Enter Jonathan, a first-time guest, in the form of Michael Adams, who takes tentative steps towards becoming Miranda. The regulars all lend their expertise on dressing attractively, hair and make-up assistance and other delicate tips in order to ease the transition.

As the men settle into their alternate selves, tensions rise over questions of potentially identifying themselves as a legitimate group which would involve some privacy being compromised. Not unlike today, fears of retribution cause some to back away, not knowing how their careers or personal lives may be impacted. Acceptance must start from within and project outward. Some just aren't ready to reveal that side of their lives.

The Casa is struggling to stay open and keep financial solidity. These uncertainties, coupled with each man's personal reasons for maintaining privacy, threaten the Casa's very existence.

The story is told with insight, humor and compassion. We witness mental and physical transitions, realities of political climate and societal fears, not unlike those we still endure today, some 50 years later. The play is a timely picture of the constancy of misunderstanding and fear surrounding elements of life that apply to a select few. Hopefully, writings such as Casa Valentina will ease misconceptions and help toward acceptance of all persons.

Casa Valentina continues through July 28 at the Santa Paula Theater Center, 125 S. 7th Street, Santa Paula. Tickets for the Friday and Saturday 8 p.m. and Sunday 2 p.m. performances may be obtained via 805-525-4645 and www. santapaulatheatercenter.org. Adults are \$24, Seniors and Student \$22. Children not advised due to content.

Jesse Borrego was cast well as the best friend Carlos and showed passion and enthusiasm both for premium pizza and his longtime friendship with Bobby. Carlos was really the only joyful character in the movie, though Bobby was able to find his happiness again at the grand opening bowling tournament.

This movie falls flat in providing any real substance, and tends to drag on with trivial issues, though does have a few moments of good feeling entertainment. Rated R - 108m

Phoenix, Oregon is the story of a middle aged man whose life is going nowhere when his longtime friend hatches a plan for them to relive some of their younger glory days by reopening the bowling alley they both grew up going to and reinventing it as the best pizza ever made with micro brews and fine wines. Directed and Written by Gary Lundgren and Starring James Le Gross as Bobby the bowling star, Jesse Borrego as Carlos, his best friend and pizza perfectionist and Lisa Edelstein as Tanya, Bobby's unrequited love interest.

Educating the young is a passion for the John Williamson family. Their commitment to teaching has enriched the Ventura Unified School District in many ways. Meeting with Trisha and son Matt, it was clear their eyes shone brightly as they spoke of their teaching paths and of their family's chosen profession. According to Matt "sometimes a career direction finds you, rather than the other way around." That appears to be true of the Williamsons.

John spent many years as an administrator in private schools before he undertook securing his teaching credential. When he did, he was off and running. For the next ten years John served as a math teacher at ATLAS elementary school in Saticoy. This setting proved to be an excellent match, as his fourth and fifth graders enthusiastically attest.

Sadly, life rarely goes as planned. In November of 2018, John was given a cancer diagnosis. As John was treated and doing his best to overcome the disease, son Matt was asked to substitute in his father's fifth grade math class. Matt was instantly dubbed Mr. 2.0, a role that he

took on eagerly. He wanted, above all, to provide continuity for his father's students during such a trying time. "I want to make a difference like dad. That is very important to me, to continue the legacy that he began."

When John passed away in March of 2019, Matt vowed to return quickly to the classroom. "It's all about the relationships" Matt declared. "Up until the last few days, dad still talked about the kids. They meant everything to him." Indeed, the kids felt the same about John. While he was a home on hospice, the kids decorated his sidewalk with colorful chalk art and messages to buoy his spirits.

Trisha, having just celebrated her 31st year of teaching at Portola Elementary, found Matt's willingness to step into John's shoes inspiring. Along the way she and Matt both earned their master's degree, albeit at different institutions.

Both teaching fifth grade this year, Trisha and Matt have experienced a sense of comfort in being able to share classroom resources, techniques and trials as they coped with John's illness. They agreed that these similarities helped them considerably to redirect their thoughts and gave them both an opportunity to emotionally refocus, which they both sorely needed.

When asked what advice she would give to students desiring to become teachers, Trisha replied "you'll have your plans and then you must expect those plans to be changed." "Always be flexible" stated Matt. "It's (teaching) one of the few professions in which you can reinvent yourself every school year" added Trisha.

The Williamson family has created a legacy of learning that enriches not only the students, but the school district and themselves. The Williamson motto seems to mirror Trisha's statement "if you love it, do it."

If you live in Ventura, you already know you can save your imagination for something else.

Ventura is an almost implausible mix of the magical and the mundane. Pump your gas at certain gas stations and you can gaze out to Anacapa and Santa Cruz islands as you squeegee your windshield. And maybe that's the trick, the sleight of hand that sees some of us forget that we live in a place where folks vacation. It could be argued that our lives are a vacation, with work, chores and errands thrown in. It's a nice feeling. A happy contentment that brings a smile at unexpected times. Bhutan coined the term gross national happiness, but Venturans don't need it defined.

Visitors are drawn to this. Not just our town's obvious largesse -- surf, sun, kaleidoscopic culture, and simple pleasures like a good laugh over a cold beer -- but also, less visible, this sense of contentment and even unshakeable confidence. Ventura is a very special place.

Regarding the matter of visitors, they are important to our town. Critical. Why does tourism matter? Well, there are scrolling reams of financial figures illustrating the benefits of tourism -- 2.7 million visitors spent 289 million dollars in Ventura in 2017 and generated \$8.4 million in local tax revenue -- but honestly, though figures matter, you've probably forgotten these three already. What you haven't forgotten is the warm smile of the local coffee shop owner who might not be smiling across the counter at you were it not for the visitors who also line up for their turn at a flaky croissant. Tourism creates roughly 2,600 jobs in Ventura. And the spillover effects of tourism seep into almost everything in our town; our agriculture, our fire and police, our roads, our schools. It doesn't take an MBA to know that these things matter. Safe to say that tourism hums quietly behind many scenes.

And, from a resident's standpoint, the best thing about tourism can't be notched

as a figure. Tourism keeps us as we are. Visit Ventura, charged with promoting our town, targets the kind of visitor Ventura wants; visitors who care about Ventura, who appreciate the beauty of Ventura, and, here's the important part, people who want to see Ventura stay the special place it is.

Promoting Ventura as a vacation destination might seem an easy job, like offering honey to Pooh, but the truth is it's a competitive world. There are over 100 tourism offices in California alone, and we lucky Venturans know many of the beauties and charms they offer. Los Angeles, On paper Visit Ventura is a nonprofit funded by the city, tasked with promoting Ventura's charms to the world beyond Ventura County. and confirm that it's for rent, and that it is what was advertised. In addition to setting up a meeting, do a search on the owner and listing. If you find the same ad listed under a different name, that's a clue it may be a scam.

They say they're out of the country: But they have a plan to get the keys into your hands. It might involve a lawyer or an "agent" working on their behalf. Some scammers even create fake keys. Don't send money to them overseas. If you can't meet in person, see the home, or sign a lease before you pay, keep looking.
