From April 15 - 19, the Ventura City Fire Department put 17 students through the CSFM Rope Rescue Technician course at the Ventura Botanical Gardens. This course, which is the second in a series, builds upon the students' existing skills and focuses on the art of rope-based rescue. Throughout the training, the students and instructors were immersed in intricate scenarios, and were challenged with advanced techniques in order to execute successful rescues.

The training provided to the students was far from restrictive, preparing them for a diverse range of rescue scenarios. Engineer Eric Caddock, from Ventura Fire Station 5C, expressed his thoughts on the matter. He emphasized that "the expertise of the Ventura Fire Department extends beyond the confines of a single environment."



Ventura recruiting commission and committee members

The City is seeking applicants for its Arts and Culture Commission, Parks and Recreation Commission, Water Commission, and Design Review Committee. These positions provide the City Council with recommendations on related projects and programs.

"Civic engagement is the foundation of local government," said Mayor Joe Schroeder. "When individuals contribute their time and energy to address common issues and pursue common

goals, they strengthen the fabric of our community."

Vacancies occur either by the expiration of a term or resignations during the year. Per San Buenaventura Ordinance 2019-003, no citizen may serve on more than one committee, commission, or board. Dual appointments are not permitted.

There is one unscheduled vacancy for the Arts and Culture Commission with a term that extends to June 2026. This seven-member commission meets the second Thursday of each month at 5:30 p.m. to advise and make recommendations on matters about arts, culture, and cultural tourism in the City of Ventura. Applications are due by May 13.

There are two vacancies on the Parks and Recreation Commission with terms that extend to June 2028. This seven-member commission meets the second Wednesday of each month at 4:00 p.m. to assist in recommending and promoting public parks and recreation programs, facilities, and events. The Commission also assists in the preparation of and annual review and revision of long-range plans for public parks and recreational facilities and programs. Applications are due by May 24



There are two vacancies, one professional and one non-professional, on the Water Commission with terms that extend to June 2028. This seven-member commission meets the fourth Monday of each month at 5:30 p.m. to review and make advisory recommendations regarding water rates, water resources infrastructure projects in the five-year capital improvement program, water supply options, and other water resource issues. Applications are due by May 24

There are three vacancies on the Design Review Committee with terms that extend to June 2028. This five-member committee meets the third Wednesday of each month at 6:00 p.m. to review, consider, approve, or deny applications for approval of design of architectural, landscaping, aesthetics for public and private projects, applications for sign variances, and proposed design elements or components of specific plans, historic districts, or other special areas. Applications are due by May 24.

• The closure to traffic of 5 blocks of Main Street was started in May 2020, and has been extended several times by the city council.

City Council considering important items

During the City Council meeting held on April 25th, 2024, Rachel Dimond, the hearing officer, brought forward two important items for discussion which also included public comments. The initial topic on the table was the proposed paid parking plan for Harbor Village, which was intended to be implemented at various locations including Harbor Cove, Harbor Village & Marina, Ventura Isle Marina, and Surfer's Knoll. However, a final decision on this plan was postponed until the Directors Hearing scheduled for May 23, 2024 to allow for further examination and discussion.

The second item on the agenda revolved around the Derecktor Ventura Coastal Development Permit, Planned Development Permit, and Major Design review for a project located on Anchors Way. The presentation included the consideration of public comments. The applicant, Tom Dereckor, along with Taylor Hernvall, the Senior Planner, provided detailed information on the Coastal Development Permit (CDP), which ensures adherence to specific regulations for coastal areas. They also highlighted the Planned Development Permit (PDP), allowing for customized development outside of existing zoning regulations. Furthermore, the design review process meticulously evaluated both the aesthetic and functional aspects of the proposed development to ensure it blended harmoniously with the surrounding community.

The presentation placed emphasis on the building development near The Waters Edge Restaurant on Anchors Way, aiming to create an inviting and vibrant space for both the local community and visitors alike. Currently, the project is in its planning and approval phase, with the developers fully dedicated to meeting zoning regulations, obtaining permits, and fulfilling other necessary requirements. Throughout the process, the City Council has prioritized community engagement, providing ample opportunities for residents to voice their concerns, make suggestions, and share their thoughts.

One local resident, Victoria Hubbell, expressed her concern during the meeting regarding potential view obstruction caused by the proposed 36-40 foot tall boat storage racks on the north end of the parking lot. She suggested "amending the plans by lowering the height of the storage racks specifically in that area, thereby addressing the potential impact on views."

The proposed project encompasses various elements, including the reconfiguration of day sail stalls and parking lots, renovation of the Water's Edge Restaurant to create a new taproom, construction of a new mixed-use building, installation of additional boat storage areas, establishment of a public boat service area and promenade with seating, along with other related improvements. The architectural design of both the existing and proposed structures will adhere ensuring a visually cohesive appeal that aligns with the surroundings harbor and community.

At the meeting, the Design Review

Committee (DRC) gathered to discuss the proposed Major Design Review. The Ventura City Council, expressed support for the project, emphasizing its positive impact on the community through the enhancement of public spaces, improved services and amenities, and the creation of employment opportunities. In light of this, the Committee unanimously recommended the project's approval as presented by the Community Development Director.

Be well informed about local evacuation procedures

With a firm commitment to saving lives, the City of Ventura is spearheading efforts to ensure residents are well-informed about local evacuation procedures. Recognizing the complexity of the various hazards that could prompt evacuations in Ventura, the City has meticulously divided Ventura into 15 evacuation zones, considering factors such as hazard vulnerability areas, population density, and major thoroughfares.

To educate residents on the new evacuation plan, evacuation zones, shelter locations, and transportation assembly points, community members and business owners are invited to join Emergency Services Manager Mack Douglass for a community workshop on Saturday, May 18, 2024, from 10:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m. at the Ventura Police Department, located at 1425 Dowell Drive in Ventura.


The workshop will cover information about the 15 designated evacuation zones, potential shelter locations and transportation assembly points.

"With Ventura's unique geography, location, and limited ingress and egress routes, it is crucial for residents to be aware of their designated evacuation zones in case of an emergency," said Police Chief Darin Schindler. "By empowering residents with the knowledge and resources needed to respond effectively, we can streamline evacuation processes and save lives."

The workshop is just one part of the outreach efforts. Additional presentations will be made at neighborhood community councils, ensuring accessibility to all residents. These presentations will cover essential details and provide opportunities for questions and feedback.

The Evacuation Plan was developed based on feedback from over 900 residents who completed the Emergency Preparedness Community Survey in 2023. Survey responses provided diverse insights on all-hazards evacuation preparedness, including familiarity with current evacuation routes, emergency



shelters, transportation options, preferred communication methods, and overall readiness.

The completed Emergency Evacuation Plan is inclusive of diverse populations, recognizing the needs of individuals with visual or hearing impairments, chronic medical conditions, language barriers, disabilities, access, and functional needs.

read with a young child. "Talking throughout the day with your young child, reading together, telling stories, and singing all help develop pathways in the brain that will later be used to recognize letters, read, and think critically," Supervisor and First 5 Commissioner Matt LaVere added.

"We know that the first five years of life lay the foundation for success in school and life. For young children, early exposure to books is beneficial for long-term academic achievements," said Health Care Agency Director and First 5 Commission Chair Barry Zimmerman. Studies have proven that when you talk, read, and sing to children starting at birth, you promote and support early language and literacy development.

Brain research shows that the Sheriff Jim Fryhoff, Ventura County prenatal period and first five years Fire Chief Dustin Gardner, and many of a child's life are critical for developing lifelong social, emotional and learning skills. Based on this research, California voters passed Proposition 10 (a tobacco tax) in 1998 which established First 5 county commissions throughout the state to improve health and education programs for children prenatal to 5 years.

The Pigs of the SS Kalorama

In the days before the coming of the railroad, and paved roads, the only dependable means of transportation in Ventura was by sea. The Ventura Pier was built in 1872 so ships could land here to take on cargo and passengers. But, the plan was to have breakwater to make landing at the pier safe but the breakwater was never built (too expensive). Ships had to come in at their own risk, especially in the winter months when tides could change and storms come in fast off the Channel Islands.

On February 25th, 1876, the coastal steamer SS Kalorama came in to take on a cargo of pigs. As she was leaving the pier, an errant wave hit the ship and sent her into the beach. Here the pounding waves slowly broke the ship apart. Her cargo of frightened pigs escaped, leaping into the water and swimming for shore. and then into the community! The crew of the stricken ship tried to recapture the animals but only a few were caught. The rest ran up California Street and into all neighborhoods of Ventura.

People came out of their houses to catch the pigs, rich and poor, all took part in the wild adventure. The escaping porkers were rounded up only to vanish into barns and back yards, never to be returned to their rightful owners. It is said that when summer came, the smell of barbecues filled the town and most citizens feasted on pork ribs. It was a festive July 4th that year.

Some enterprising Venturans risked their lives by going out to the wreck and pulling off souvenirs and mementos from the wrecked ship. The Ventura County Museum of Art and History has some of the artifacts from the SS Kalorama in its collection. One of the downtown streets was named Kalorama for the lost ship. Two other streets are named for ships that were beached here and lost, the schooner Ann and steamer Crimea.

The Murphy Auto Museum is Closing

The Murphy Auto Museum will be permanently closing. The last day for public admittance will be Sunday, July 7, 2024. The museum will use the remaining month of July to sell furniture, fixtures, chattels and ephemera as they begin the de-accession of the contents. The building will be turned over to the landlord on July 31st.

The museum will keep its regular operating hours from now through July 7th, which is every Saturday and Sunday from 10:00am till 4:00pm; the last admission is at 3:00pm since it takes about an hour to view the museum's collection. Admission is \$10.00

for guests 13 years old and older, free to guests younger than 12 years old, and free to active military with identification.

The museum's board has been trying for several years to find a sustainable path to keep the museum viable and part of the community. However, economic realities have forced the decision to close the museum in conjunction with the end of the present lease agreement. The Murphy Auto Museum has been a part of Ventura County since 2005 and sees an average of 10,000 visitors per year. The museum, at any given time, has over 40 antique and vintage cars on display, as well as Americana, an HO scale model railroad, a large slot car raceway, vintage trailer town, diecast car collection, a monthly car show and more.

"We've been embedded in Ventura County since 2005," said David Neel, Executive Director of the foundation. "I took over the running of the foundation from Dan Murphy, the museum's founder in January of 2014 because it was in danger of closing then. It is sad that Oxnard has had two fantastic car museums for many years, ourselves and the Mullin, and that the Mullin has closed and the Murphy will be closing."

The museum invites the public from near and far to visit the museum before it is gone. "We're a little gem in the big city of Oxnard, and we bring a lot of smiles to people's faces. We want everyone to come visit the museum one last time and make a lasting memory."

It's quite incredible to note that VFD has even conducted rescues from the heights of a crane ride at the Ventura County Fair!

Explore Lower Harmon Canyon

Now is the perfect time to hit the trails and explore. Lower Harmon Canyon is open and promises unforgettable beauty!

California brittlebush (Encelia californica) is in peak bloom! One of four sensitive plant alliances in Harmon Canyon, Encelia californica, are true Southern California locals - growing in coastal sage scrub from San Luis Obispo County to northern Baja. To spot these beauties, look for daisies with dark centers (disk flowers) and yellow "petals" (ray flowers).

Encelia californica is commonly seen

on drier south and west-facing slopes and is beloved by native bees and beetles. The east side of Trail 101 is a wonderland for this special community - slow down and check out all the pollinator action!

Interesting observations are everywhere - including at your feet! In the moist early morning hours, keep your eyes peeled for the Trask shoulderband snail (Helminthoglypta traskii). Considered a sensitive species in California due to habitat loss and degradation, these beautiful, long-lived animals are thriving in the vibrant shrublands of Harmon Canyon. To distinguish them from the

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invasive European garden snail (Cornu aspersum) look for their narrower shell with a distinctive dark-colored band that follows the whorled spiral.

Helminthoglypta traskii are active longer than usual this year, enjoying the moist conditions of our extended rainy season. They estivate (a state of dormancy like hibernating but in response to heat and dryness) during the drier months and may not be as visible soon, so enjoy these delicate detritavores while you can.

The Hollywood Jazz Orchestra is coming

Over the years, Harrison has had compositions and arrangements performed by jazz greats like Kurt Elling, Marcus Miller, Cedar Walton, Joe Williams and The Count Basie Orchestra.

High School Student Volunteers needed to help local seniors

High school student volunteers are needed to work in supervised teams to provide companionship, household cleaning, yard maintenance and home organization to homebound seniors in Ventura County.

This opportunity is made possible through the Building Bridges Intergenerational Program at CAREGIVERS: Volunteers Assisting the Elderly which is now marking a 40-year milestone to support older neighbors aging in place with the helping hands of volunteers.

One of those volunteer opportunities is designed for high school students. "We identify an adult volunteer Team Leader

who will provide transportation, supervision and serve as a mentor during home visits to the seniors we serve," said Angie Archer, student engagement coordinator at CAREGIVERS Volunteers. "We need new high school student volunteers as much as we need adult Team Leaders to assist in providing this program to the community."

Scheduling is generally flexible and coordinated around the needs of the senior and the availability of the Building Bridge team. Ideally, Building Bridge teams are scheduled weekly in two hour blocks of time which includes travel time and one hour to do chores at

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the senior's home. "We rotate visits to the same seniors over the course of the month to ensure that everyone gets a little help," Archer said, adding that one of the greatest gifts of volunteering are the friendships people build. "We now have student volunteers who are growing up and taking on the role of adult volunteers. Most of all, we have people from all walks of life, spanning the generations—and building intergenerational bridges—that last a lifetime."

Regular monthly visits to the same

homebound senior give everyone an opportunity to get to know each other over time. During the visit, student volunteers are able to tackle light household chores such as changing the bedsheets, putting heavy wet laundry in the dryer, changing a lightbulb and running the vacuum-tasks that someone who uses a walker may struggle to do.

"This program allows college bound high school juniors and seniors to gain life skills that will be helpful in their

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

This list provides common steps to consider when getting your affairs in order

1. Plan for your estate and finances. Depending on your situation, you may choose to prepare different types of legal documents to outline how your estate and finances will be handled in the future. Common documents include a will, durable power of attorney for finances, and a living trust.

A will specifies how your estate your property, money, and other assets - will be distributed and managed when you die. A will can also address care for children under age 18, adult dependents, and pets, as well as gifts and end-of-life arrangements, such as a funeral or memorial service and burial or cremation. If you do not have a will, your estate will be distributed according to the laws in your state.

A durable power of attorney for finances names someone who will make financial decisions for you when you are unable to.

A living trust names and instructs a person, called the trustee, to hold and distribute property and funds on your

behalf when you are no longer able to manage your affairs.

2. Plan for your future health care. Many people choose to prepare advance directives, which are legal documents that provide instructions for medical care and only go into effect if you cannot communicate your own wishes due to disease or severe injury. The most common advance directives include a living will and a durable power of attorney for health care.

A living will tells doctors how you want to be treated if you cannot make your own decisions about emergency treatment. You can say which common medical treatments or care you would want, which ones you would want to avoid, and under which conditions each of your choices applies. Learn how to prepare a living will.

A durable power of attorney for health care names your health care proxy, a person who can make health care decisions for you if you are unable to communicate these yourself. Your proxy - also known as a representative, surrogate, or agent – should be familiar with your values and wishes. A proxy can be chosen in addition to or instead of a living will. Having a health care proxy helps you plan for situations that cannot be foreseen, such as a serious auto accident or stroke. Learn how to choose a health care proxy.

These documents are part of advance care planning, which involves preparing for future decisions about your medical care and discussing your wishes with your loved ones.

- 3. Put your important papers and copies of legal documents in one place. You can set up a file, put everything in a desk or dresser drawer, or list the information and location of papers in a notebook. For added security, you might consider getting a fireproof and waterproof safe to store your documents. If your papers are in a bank safe deposit box, keep copies in a file at home. View a list of important papers.
- 4. Tell someone you know and trust or a lawyer where to find your important papers. You don't need to discuss your personal affairs, but someone you trust should know where to find your papers in case of an emergency. If you don't have a relative or friend you trust, ask a lawyer to help.
- 5. Talk to your loved ones and a doctor about advance care planning. A doctor can help you understand future health decisions you may face and plan the kinds of care or treatment you may want. Discussing advance care planning with your doctor is free through Medicare during your annual wellness visit. Private health insurance may also cover these discussions. Share your decisions with your loved ones to help avoid any surprises or misunderstandings about your wishes.

Different Care Settings at the End of Life

The three most common places people at the end-of-life die are at home, in a hospital, or in a care facility. While not everyone has the chance to decide where they will die, people who know the end of life is approaching may be able to plan ahead. Several factors may help with

this planning, including knowing the type of care you need and want, where you can receive this level of care, advance care directives, costs, and availability of family and friends to help.

It's important for a caregiver or family member to work closely with the health care team to decide the type of comfort care needed at home in order to make the dying person as comfortable as possible. This type of care can often be provided by nursing assistants or family and friends without medical training. However, a doctor will continue to oversee the patient's health care plan. Hospice care is frequently used at home.

Caring for someone who is at home at the end of life can be physically, emotionally, and financially demanding for the people providing the care. Extra support from paid caregivers or home service providers, also known as respite care, can help. If the person who is dying is returning home from the hospital, sometimes a hospital discharge planner, who is often a social worker, will be able to help with the logistics. Your local Area Agency on Aging might be able to recommend other sources of help.

In a hospital setting, you will have access to medical professionals who understand the needs of a dying person. This can be very reassuring to both the person and their family.

In addition to the regular care team, some hospitals have palliative and hospice care teams that can assist with managing uncomfortable symptoms at the end of life, such as digestive issues or pain. These teams can also help with making medical decisions for patients or families.

No matter which end-of-life care setting you choose, it's important to make plans for this care in advance. Having these documents in place helps medical staff provide the care that you wish to receive at the end of life and helps family members avoid having to make difficult decisions about your care without your input. Learn more about advance care planning.

Many people are in care facil-

ities, such as nursing homes, at the end of life. In a nursing home, nursing staff are always present. Unlike a hospital, a doctor is not in the facility at all times but is available when needed.

Some people are discharged from a hospital to a care facility, while others may already be living in one. If you have lived in a nursing home or long-term care facility for a while, you may choose to stay and receive end-of-life care there. You and your family may already have a relationship with staff who work there, which can help make the care feel more personalized than in a hospital.

"The doubles sweep was huge"

On a picture-perfect day for tennis, the Ventura College men's tennis team had a picture-perfect ending to their 2024 season with a 5-0 sweep over American River College from Sacramento in the 3C2A State Championship at the VC Tennis Center. Julian Tellez clinched the winner for the Pirates (18-6) in No. 4 singles after Rafael Matias had recorded a love and love win in the No. 2 slot. The title is the third for VC under longtime head coach Nelson Emery, their first since 2010.

The match was much closer that the final score indicated, especially in doubles play.

ARC's No. 2 doubles pair held a 3-2 advantage over Matias and Tellez and their contest was tied 5-5 before the Pirates rallied to win three straight games to capture the first point of the championship, 8-5.

Court 3 was tied 2-2 before VC's Robinson Pelluault and Edgar Ploquin took over by winning the next four games. Ventura won the contest 8-3 to go ahead 2-0.

Cody Ray Emery and Lucas Abreu took a 4-1 lead in the No. 1 doubles match for the Pirates before the Beaver's duo came storming back to tie the score at 4-4. Both teams held serve until Ventura broke for a 7-5 advantage. ARC held on their next serve before Emery and Abreu posted the 8-6 victory to put the Pirates comfort-

ably ahead, 3-0.

"The doubles sweep was huge," said VC's coach Emery. "I thought if we could get two doubles, we could split singles. We won all three."

Buoyed by their sweep in doubles, the Pirates took full control in singles play as they won the first set in all six matches. Matias was the first to finish singles with his 6-0, 6-0 victory in the No. 2 slot to put VC on the precipice of the title. Soon thereafter, Tellez watch an ARC shot sail long as he completed his 6-2, 6-0 triumph at No. 4, clinching the crown for Ventura.

"This is why I'm here," said Tellez, a product of Taft High School in Woodland Hills. "This is what I've been working for. It was state title time"

The championship was extra special for Cody Ray, Ventura's No. 1 player and the son the VC head coach.

"It feels awesome to win, especially with my dad," said the younger Emery. "It's crazy how things worked out."

Coach Emery echoed the sentiments of his players.

"We played, we battled, (we're a) bunch of fighters," said Coach Emery, who has led VC to 12 State Final Fours in his 26 years at the helm of the Pirates' ship. "We've had more talented teams, but this team had the toughness."

It's unfair that

miserable sniffling and sneezing. But between 10 and 20% of the world population is allergic to cats and dogs, marking a significant portion of people who are sensitive to two of the world's most popular household pets.

Hypoallergenic cats and dogs are a purported solution. But what does it mean to be hypoallergenic — and does such a trait really exist?

The most common ones appear in their saliva and shed skin, or dander. People with allergies to these proteins experience immune reactions, meaning their immune system responds as if they're bacteria or viruses, deploying a bevy of unpleasant symptoms like sneezing, itching, or coughing.

Some cats and dogs are deemed hypoallergenic, which means they're "relatively unlikely to cause an allergic reaction, but still can," Koch says. Dog breeds believed hypoallergenic include hairless terriers, poodles, bichon frise, and schnauzers while cats include the Cornish Rex and hairless sphynx, according to Koch. These animals supposedly don't shed as much, or might be hairless altogether, but that might not make a difference when it comes to allergies. Koch says that dogs can produce allergens in their blood, prostate, and anal glands, while cats make allergens in their skin oil glands, anal glands, blood, and male cats produce them in urine.

Salivary allergens are especially problematic because as cats and dogs groom themselves, they spread these proteins all over their body. These compounds can also hang around in the air for several days. Even if you get a hairless cat or dog, an allergy to their saliva can make them a menace to your immune system.

• Ask the Vet

Q: I was at the vet's office last month with my Lab for her annual check-up, and he was talking about a vaccination for Lepto. I've never heard of Lepto before. Can you tell me more? Does Betsy (my Lab) need it? E.R., Farragut

A: Leptospirosis, or "Lepto" for short, is a bacteria that can affect most animals, wild and domestic. The bacteria is spread in the urine of infected animals. Dogs can contract the disease by coming into contact with infected urine in standing water, streams, lakes or recently contaminated soil. The bacteria can enter the body through the mouth, nose, eyes or a small cut in the skin or paw pad.

In rural areas, Leptospira can be spread by wildlife, such as deer, opossums and skunks. In urban areas, rats are the primary carriers, with notable outbreaks occurring in Chicago and New York City. All dogs have the potential for exposure, unless he/she is the rare dog that lives inside only and uses a litterbox.

Dogs that contract Lepto typically develop a high fever. They become weak and dehydrated, and often have vomiting and/or diarrhea. Dogs often are jaundiced; the yellow color is visible on non-haired skin, gums and/or the whites of the eyes. In most cases, acute kidney failure develops, and some dogs also develop liver failure. Blood and urine tests are required for diagnosis.

Although we have effective antibiotics, treatment can be lengthy and expensive if the kidneys are severely affected. Thus, early detection, diagnosis and treatment is important.

There has been an increase in cases across the country the last 10-to-15 years, so many veterinarians are talking to clients about the vaccines. The AVMA recently came out with the recommendation that vaccine should be used for all dogs.

With increased incidence, vaccination technology for Leptospirosis has also improved; it's a better vaccine with fewer side effects. Current vaccines include protection for the four most common subtypes.

Unfortunately, there are more than 400 subtypes, so complete protection is not possible. Please have a conversation with your veterinarian regarding Betsy's medical history, lifestyle, exposure and any past vaccine reactions.

• US insurers paid out \$1.12 billion in dog-related injury claims in 2023.

The number of dog bite and related injury claims was 19,062 in 2023, an increase of more than 8% from 2022 and a 110% increase over the past decade, with the total cost of claims at \$1.12 billion, reported Janet Ruiz, director of strategic communications at the Triple-I.

On a positive note, the average cost per claim decreased from \$64,555 in 2022 to \$58,545 in 2023, she said, noting that California, Florida and Texas had the most claims. "Education and training for owners and pets is key to keep everyone safe and healthy."

The National Dog Bite Prevention Week Coalition provides the following tips to prevent dog bites:

Make sure your pet is healthy. Not all illnesses and injuries are obvious, and dogs are more likely to bite if they are sick or in pain. If you haven't been to the veterinarian in a while, schedule an appointment for a checkup to discuss your dog's physical and behavioral health.

Prioritize proper socialization: Socialization involves gently introducing your dog to a range of settings, people, and other animals, and ensuring these experiences are positive. Whether it's quietly observing the bustle of a park, meeting new people in a controlled manner, or getting used to the sights and sounds of your neighborhood, each positive experience builds confidence. Socialization should be a lifelong journey, and not just for the puppy phase.

Take it slow. If your dog has been mainly interacting with your family since you brought them home, don't rush out into crowded areas or dog parks. Try to expose your dogs to new situations slowly and for short periods of time, arrange for low-stress interactions, and look for behaviors that indicate your dog is comfortable and happy to remain in the situation.

Understand your dog's needs and educate yourself in positive training techniques. Recognize your dog's body language and advocate for them in all situations. This will give your dog much needed skills and help you navigate any challenges you might encounter.

Be responsible about approaching other people's pets. Ask permission from the owner before approaching a dog and look for signs that the dog

wants to interact with you. Sometimes dogs want to be left alone, and we need to recognize and respect that.

Make sure that you are walking your dog on a leash and recognize changes in your dog's body language indicating they may not be comfortable.

Always monitor your dog's activity, even when they are in the backyard at your own house, because they can be startled by something, get out of the yard and possibly injure someone or be injured themselves.



The Surfers Point Managed Retreat Project aims to meet the City's coastal resilience goals through a multifaceted approach. "We are fortunate to have so many partners to help safeguard this site for generations to come."

Brush management deadline is June 1, 2024

Despite recent heavy rainfall, Ventura residents are urged to remain vigilant as the threat of wildfires persists. The Ventura Fire Department stresses the importance of creating defensible space by maintaining flammable grass, trees, and shrubs surrounding vulnera-

Over 6,200 parcels will receive notices in mid-April as part of the Fire Hazard Reduction Program (FHRP). Property owners are required to complete 100 feet of vegetation management from structures or to the property line by June 1,

"Defensible space isn't solely about protecting property; it's about protecting lives," said Ventura Fire Marshal Brett Reed. "Neglecting vegetation management can lead to hazardous conditions during wildfires. Acting promptly, residents can greatly diminish wildfire risks and help contribute to our community's safety."

The FHRP aims to reduce fire danger by managing the density and placement of flammable vegetation. The required defensible space varies based on an area's terrain and vegetation type. This approach is critical for slowing or stopping the spread of wildfire and shielding structures from ignition by direct flames, radiant heat, or airborne

Inspections of vulnerable properties will begin in early June.

Ventura school project replaces plastic tableware with metal

At EarthDay.org, which bills itself as the global organizing hub of the "world's largest environmental movement," an announcement proclaims this year's Earth Day theme, "Planet versus Plastics." Organizers "demanded" a 60% reduction in the production of plastics by 2040 and set a goal of "building a plastic-free future for generations to come."

Earth Day was officially April 22, but local Earth Day events throughout April highlighted a diverse array of environmental issues. In addition to presenting alternatives to plastic products, local events featured electric car shows, recycling reminders, energy saving ideas, gardening tips, and the usual fun, food, and music of festivals.

However, one school in Ventura focused on a practical way to avoid litter and reduce single-use plastics. Students in Emily Noel's and Flow Hansmeier's fourth grade class at Ventura Charter School calculated the school's lunches resulted in the discard of 4,320 plastic utensils per month and started a campaign to reduce the waste. They created a video (https://www.instagram.com/

reel/C5rdVRRyQme/?igsh=MzRlOD-BiNWFlZA%3D%3D) and coordinated other outreach, urging fellow students to bring their own reusable utensils. Parents and teachers joined the effort, buying metal utensils from thrift stores, providing those for students who did not bring their own, and washing the utensils after meals.

Perhaps many more students will be inspired by EcoHero shows sponsored by various public agencies for presentations at school assemblies. These 40-minute shows grab and hold the students' attention by quickly earning respect from a critical mass of kids. Professional presenters impress the kids with call-and-response chants, clever and easy-to-repeat-and-perform songs, involvement of volunteers from the audience, and funky dance moves, all while clearly communicating important messages and providing easy-to-implement tips.

At ecoheroshow.com, schools in Ventura County's unincorporated areas, outside cities, can book an EcoHero show about avoiding food waste free, sponsored by Ventura County Public Works. Schools countywide can arrange for a similarly impressive free show focusing on stormwater pollution prevention, sponsored by the Watersheds Coalition of Ventura County. Schools in Simi Valley can arrange for a great show focusing on bottles, cans, and avoiding litter of material such as plastics.

A View from House Seats

A different viewpoint on death and humor

Few comedies open with a beating and a hanging. The Santa Paula Theater Center's "Hangmen" by Irishman Martin McDonagh does. From there the comedy is in the hands and ears of the receivers (you, the audience).

Nominated for four Tony awards and recipient of a Laurence Olivier Award in 2003, the play takes on human foibles and the urge to compete, even in areas where competition is uncommon.

The Irish satire is set in 1965, in an old pub owned and operated by Harry, (Richard Kuhlman) well known as the second-best hangman in the country. The death penalty has just been abolished in the United Kingdom and

poor Harry is now out of a job. Still, he competes for bragging rights with Pierrepoint (John Webber), acknowledged as the number one hangman. Harry's cronies (Bill Walthall, Scot Blanchard and Donnie Stroud) solidly back him up, but only as far as a pack of drunken sods who are continually provided with pints of drink can do.

A young, inexperienced journalist (Eric Umali) meets with Harry to get his side of the story. How does he feel being out of a job? While Harry maintains he will not comment, eventually he does, and then some.

Harry's wife Alice (Jolyn Johnson) and teen daughter Shirley (Emily Redman Hall) do most of the bar duty. Jeff Ham makes appearances as several

Harry's assistant, Syd (Derek Petropolis), would love to take Harry's attitude of superiority down a peg and plots with Mooney (James James), a connivingly menacing stranger. Mooney's actual intent is unclear. Insisting he is menacing, not creepy, Mooney intrigues Shirley into meeting him elsewhere, whereupon she disappears for a period, causing Harry and Alice a great deal of angst. Mooney ultimately taunts the group into placing him in a noose which turns deadly as the group attempts to hide this action from the inspectors.

The highly competent cast carries off their well-rehearsed Irish accents beautifully. So well, in fact, that the accents, combined with unfamiliar Brit-speak language, created a challenge (for me, at least) to follow and find the humor. Credit is given to Erin De Horta as dialect coach.

The detailed interior pub set is impressive. Two 1960's clothed dancers (presumably a directorial addition) assist with minor scene changes, providing a tinge of the aura of the era. The dancers are Martha Benevides and Keke Navarro.

Artistic Director Jessi May Stevenson has assembled a cast of talents who perform admirably. Action is tight and

While the play may have fared well in the United Kingdom, I personally did not find it to be the comedy I'd hoped for in this "all comedy" SPTC season. Brit humor can be an acquired taste. There was sporadic laughter at specific well-timed lines, However, the underlying premise is one that is not inherently funny, in my opinion. Perhaps I just needed a pint or two.


