

CAPS Media Mural Project, Elections & An Educational Event

Tuesday, November 5 is Election Day and CAPS crews are actively engaged in the democratic process. Recently CAPS recorded, broadcast, and streamed the League of Women Voters forum for candidates vying for positions on the Ventura City Council and the Ventura Unified School District Board of Education, and the CAPS crew recorded individual statements with the candidates in the CAPS studio for Video Voter 2024.

The Ventura County Registrar mailed ballots to registered voters throughout the County and has opened an early voting site at the county government center. October 21 is the last day to register to receive a ballot in the mail and in-person voting begins on October 26. One of the many drop boxes throughout the county is at the CAPS Media Center at 65 Day Road. SEEAG is the nonprofit that hosts Ventura County Farm Day each year. "Hundreds of dedicated farm workers are behind every piece of fruit or vegetable we buy at the store."



A Quarter Century of Film: Ojai Film Festival Marks 25th Anniversary

The year 2024 marks the 25th anniversary of the Ojai Film Festival (OFF). In 1998, artist and filmmaker Steve Grumette received an invitation to judge at the Canyonlands Film Festival in Moab, Utah. With a similar population and boasting both a vibrant arts

community and a spectacular natural environment, Moab reminded him of Ojai. Upon returning from Utah, Steve realized that if Moab could support a thriving film festival, why not Ojai? From that idea came the inception of the

locations they want to visit by going to the Farm Day Trail Map (https:// venturacountyfarmday.com/map) and then travel at their own pace from site to site. Descriptions of what to expect at each site are included on the map. The day consists of behind-the-scenes tours, tastings, giveaways and kid-friendly activities. Some sites require pre-registration. "Pick three or four locations and plan your day," says Paulus-Case.

Widespread farming in Ventura County dates back to the 1780s and agriculture is still one of the largest industries in the county with crop values in 2023 totaling over \$2.1 billion. "Nothing else in Ventura County has more history than agriculture," says Phil McGrath, owner of McGrath Family Farm in Camarillo and Farm Day participant. "Farm Day provides the opportunity to understand how agriculture in the county evolved, what growers are doing now and what the future will bring.'

Participating in Farm Day this year include the Agriculture Museum of Ventura County, Agromin (organic compost, mulch), Alpacas At Windy Hills (Alpaca fleece), Duda Farm Fresh Foods (celery and lettuce), Eden Forest Collective (agroforestry), Good Farms (berries), Growing Works (fresh flowers), McGrath Family Farm (organic farming), Ojai Olive Oil (olives), Oxnard Historic Farm Park, Petty Ranch (fruits and vegetables), Prancer's Farm (strawberries, tomatoes, avocados), Ranchos Camulos National Historic Landmark Museum, UC Hansen Agricultural Research and Extension Center, VCAA Senior Nutrition Farm and Ventura County

Agriculture/Weights and Measures. Petty Ranch will serve as the Farm Day Hub with booths, displays, kids' activities and free fresh produce.

Two school farms are participating -Rio School District Farm and Sa'Aliyas Ranch. Both farms teach students about agriculture including career opportunities--all while growing and harvesting fruits and vegetables for market.

Ventura County Farm Day sponsors include The Wood-Claeyssens Foundation, Gene Hass Foundation, Driscoll's, Church Brothers Farms, Mission Produce, and County of Ventura Agriculture/Weights and Measures.

Visitors are encouraged to register in advance at My805Tix (https://www. my805tix.com/e/venturafarmday). Once registered, guests show their 805Tix QR code at each location to enter without signing in.

Several hotels are offering special room rates over the Farm Day weekend. For more information about Ventura County Farm Day including a list of local hotels, visit www.VenturaCountyFarmDay.com or call 805-892-8155. The Trail Map is updated daily. No pets allowed.





On Nov. 15, 2000, nearly two years of intensive effort by more than 100 volunteers culminated in the opening of the first Ojai Film Festival to an overwhelmingly enthusiastic response from filmmakers and filmgoers alike. The festival launched with two goals in mind: to provide audiences with opportunities to see groundbreaking work otherwise inaccessible and to give filmmakers access to an enthusiastic audience, including industry professionals.

In early 2002, the festival established itself as an independent nonprofit foundation, dedicated to expanding the traditions created during the first two years. Now in its 22nd year, the festival continues its commitment to enriching the human spirit by seeking out important films that uplift, help audiences feel good about being part of the human race, or inspire them to live meaningful lives. Falls are a significant concern for seniors in the U.S.

Prevalence of Falls

Approximately 36 million falls are reported among older adults each year in the U.S. (adults aged 65 and older).

Out of these, about 8 million result in injury.

Falls are the leading cause of injury-related deaths among seniors. In 2021, there were around 36,000 deaths attributed to falls in older adults.

Injuries from Falls

Every year, about 3 million seniors are treated in emergency departments for fall-related injuries.

More than 800,000 hospitalizations occur due to falls, often involving serious injuries like hip fractures or head trauma.

Fractures

Falls cause over 95% of hip fractures among older adults.

Many fall-related fractures involve the spine, forearm, leg, ankle, pelvis, upper arm, and hand.

Impact on Quality of Life

Falls can lead to a loss of independence, with many older adults unable to return to living independently after a fall.

Fear of falling can also lead to a decrease in physical activity, contributing to further decline in balance, strength, and overall health.

goal was to provide education on how to avoid future falls," said Julianna Eusanio, MSW, Fall Prevention Coordinator at the Ventura County Area Agency on Aging (VCAAA).

Over 400 people attended the event, which featured two keynote speakers: Dr. Thomas Duncan, Trauma Medical Director at Ventura County Medical Center (VCMC), and Dr. James Hornstein, a family medicine doctor also affiliated with VCMC.

Registered dietitian Aurora Meadows led a healthy recipe demonstration, showing attendees how to prepare a smoky black bean, butternut squash, and kale salad. The event also included an interactive Zumba demonstration, which participants enthusiastically joined, as well as a Tai Chi demonstration led by instructor Fred Case. Physical therapists provided balance assessments, blood pressure screenings were available, and attendees had the opportunity to receive their annual flu vaccinations.

"Staying active is key to reducing the risk of falls," said Eusanio.

The forum, free and open to all Ventura County residents, attracted many seniors, some accompanied by family members. "It was important to raise awareness about fall prevention in a fun and engaging way, which is why this year's theme was 'All Aboard the Fall Prevention Train," Eusanio added.

A free lunch, catered by Caribbean ven, was provided. The event also featured a variety of vendors, including government agencies, home health organizations, and adult day health care providers. Los Robles Hospital and Tri-County GLAD (Greater Los Angeles Agency on Deafness) were present, with ASL interpretation available for those who needed it.

The day concluded with a raffle of donated gift baskets.

This year's forum was held in Thousand Oaks to serve the eastern part of Ventura County, while last year's event took place in Oxnard to accommodate residents in the western region. Next year's forum will return to the western part of the county, continuing the annual effort to help older adults prevent falls.

Local Heroes: How a Tribe of Women and a Community United to Support Local Causes

In 2018, a small but determined group of women met for coffee in front of Heavenly Cakes Bakery in Oxnard Shores. What began as a casual gathering quickly transformed into a powerful community movement. Nancy Klein and Dotty Pringle, who first connected at the Shores ArtWalk, sparked an initiative that would soon touch the lives of countless businesses and individuals across Oxnard. Natascha Saavedra, Yvonne LaMendola, and Bee Magno soon joined the effort, helping the group gain momentum.

Their first project was a grassroots fundraiser to support the strip mall where Heavenly Cakes Bakery is located. Inspired by their success, the group expanded their efforts to include fundraisers for Fisherman's Wharf businesses and later the Elite Theatre. As their mission grew, so did their team.

Yvonne LaMendola, a graphic artist, brought in her husband, RJ LaMendola, a world-renowned photographer, whose contributions added strength to the cause. In recognition of their achievements, particularly during the COVID-19 pandemic when small businesses needed support the most, the County of Ventura honored the group with an award for their Fisherman's Wharf Fundraiser under the Channel Islands Gulls.

Over the years, they have raised funds for a diverse range of causes, including Friends of Fieldworkers, the Lahaina Fires, local animal welfare organizations like CARL and SPARC, the Hueneme Veterinary Center, Toys for Tots, and national health groups like City of Hope. Their efforts have also supported cultural events such as the RedBird Powwow, local services like VC Caregivers, and unique initiatives like the Occu-puppy Project, along with supporting bomb-sniffing dogs and local spay/neuter programs.

In addition to their work with larger organizations, the group remains committed to helping local artists in need, ensuring that Oxnard's creative community continues to flourish.

What started as a simple fundraiser outside a bakery has grown into a movement that uplifts local businesses, artists, and causes. These women and their dedicated supporters have proven how much a small group with passion and heart can achieve, making a lasting impact on their Ventura County community.

Ventura Hosts Dynamic Electric Car Show, Highlighting the Future of Sustainable Mobility





Stay Spooky, Stay Safe: Tips for Keeping Pets Safe This Halloween

Halloween is just around the corner, and while it's a fun holiday for humans, it can be a stressful and even dangerous time for pets. Follow these tips to keep your furry friends safe this Halloween: Candy: Trick-or-treat is for humans, not pets. Keep all candy out of reach and educate children in the home about the dangers of feeding candy to animals. Symptoms of chocolate poisoning include vomiting, diarrhea, rapid breathing, increased heart rate, and seizures. If your pet consumes candy, contact your veterinarian immediately. Costumes: Don't force your pet to wear a costume unless you're sure they're comfortable. What may seem cute to you could be overwhelming for them. Ensure costumes don't block their vision or breathing and avoid constricting movement. Check for any small parts, like buttons or tassels, which could be irritating or pose a choking hazard.

Keep pets indoors: Don't leave pets in the yard on Halloween. Pranksters may tease or harm animals, leading to injury or worse. Before festivities begin, place your pets in a quiet, secure room away from the door. This helps reduce anxiety and prevents pets from

escaping when trick-or-treaters arrive. **Black cats:** Black cats are particularly at risk of harm around Halloween. As a precaution, bring black cats indoors several days before and after the holiday.

Candles, wires, and cords: Keep pets away from candles to prevent burns or accidental fires. Wires and electrical cords can also pose serious risks. If chewed on, pets can suffer life-threatening electrical shocks.

ID tags: Ensure your pets are wearing current ID tags and verify their microchip information is up to date. Proper identification is crucial to reuniting lost pets with their owners. The Humane Society of Ventura County offers free ID tags through Halloween, and microchipping is available for \$25, including registration. Call 805-646-6505 to schedule this service.

Ventura Police to Address E-Bike Safety and Laws in Second Public Workshop

Community Invited to E-Bike Safety Workshop Hosted by Ventura Police Department

The Ventura Police Department will host a free community workshop on Tuesday, October 22, from 6:00 - 7:30 p.m. in the Community Meeting Room at City Hall, located at 501 Poli Street. This event is part of the department's ongoing efforts to address the growing concerns about illegal electric bicycle use in Ventura.

"E-bike safety, reckless riding, and enforcement have become significant concerns in Ventura, and we are committed to addressing these issues head-on through education and enforcement," said Chief Darin Schindler. "This workshop is an opportunity for residents to learn about safe and legal e-bike use and to engage directly with our officers. Our goal is to ensure the safety of all road users and foster a culture of responsible e-bike use in our community."

Electric bikes with pedals propelled by human power and an electric motor are classified as class I, II, or III e-bikes. Vehicles without pedals, driven solely by an electric motor, are classified as electric motorcycles and must meet the same requirements as traditional motorcycles, including proper state licensing, registration, and insurance.

The workshop will cover e-bike classifications, regulations for electric motorcycles, and state and local laws. Key points include:

- E-bikes must have a class identification sticker permanently affixed to the device.
- Modifying an e-bike to increase speed, reckless riding, and fleeing law enforcement are illegal.
- Riders under 18 years old are required to wear a properly fitted and secured helmet at all times.
- All cyclists, including e-bike riders, must follow the rules of the road.

To address community concerns, the department is taking a proactive approach to education and previously hosted a workshop in July, distributed informational mailers to residents, participated in radio interviews, published an editorial in the Ventura County Star, attended Ventura Unified School District events, and increased social media messaging.


Fantastical Blues: Solo show by Deborah Paulsen







The Last of the Sea Women

The Last of the Sea Women" is an incredible documentary detailing the lives of the stellar senior sea women of South Korea that live on Jeju Island and are known as Haenyeos, which free dive in the ocean harvesting marine life as their primary source of food and income. They say it's a calling to be a haenyeo, serving as guardians of the sea and sharing a very symbiotic relationship with the ocean fulfilling their duty to protect it for hundreds of years. Jeju is known as the home of the haenyeos and the island is famous for three things: rocks, wind and women.

The 1960s was the heyday for the haenyeos with the number of haenyeos peaking at 30,000 when the population of Jeju was 200,000, but the number has steadily declined and now there are about 4,000 haenyeos left mostly in their 60s, 70s and 80s. They serve their duty with all their hearts and the traditions are passed down from their mothers and grandmothers. Even when it's cold or they don't feel like diving, they still dive as it's in their bones.

Being a haenyeos is a very dangerous job and haenyeos are not covered by health insurance because the job is considered too dangerous. The currently older generation of haenyeos doesn't think that the younger generation has the tenacity to live like they do and no one seems to want to become haenyeos anymore, which may cause the haenyeos way of life to become extinct. The sea itself has also changed and the haenyeos are disappearing, seeming like the haenyeos culture is melting away.

They sing traditional songs boating out to sea and spend hours free diving filling large floating baskets. The singing actually began when they had to row boats out to sea. Culturally, when they were young people used to look down on haenyeos, especially those married to influential people in the village. That was a long time ago and now even UNESCO (United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization) recognizes the haenyeos giving them the courage to stand tall against those that would judge them.

During the Joseon Dynasty being a haenyeo was a tough job and primarily done by men. After they found out it was hard, men just quit doing the job because they could handle it and women had no choice but to do this job to provide income for the family. Young women start training to be haenyeos at ages 7-10 years old, learning how to swim, dive and the necessary breathing techniques to free dive. They are also taught where to find and how to harvest the food, and then once they reach 15-17 years old they would officially become a haenyeo.

In August 2024, Japan began releasing radioactive wastewater into the ocean causing a future where haenyeos would lose their homes and livelihoods. In Geneva Switzerland, the UN Human Rights Council met to work on the Fukushima issue. Haenyeos were invited to the meeting to speak about the impacts of Japan's decision.
