"Did you hear a gun shot?"

Visitors at scenic Grant Park often hear gunshots echoing over the hills. Not to worry, not too far behind Grant Park is an old shooting range with a vibrant history. While it's currently only in use a few days out of the week, it used to be filled daily with avid shooters.

Grant Park was opened in 1918 and shortly after the original range was built. The earliest photos of the range in use date back to 1933. Some years later, the FBI began using the range to hold trainings. The earliest photos of these training sessions are from 1948.

In 1957 the old range was torn down and the current one was built. It was opened to both the public and various law enforcement agencies. The right side was partially enclosed and used for basic outdoor shooting. The left side of the range was an open area used for combat style training.

In 1990 the facility was turned over to the Parks and Recreation department, who then rented it to a private company. Continued on page 12

On the weekend of July 18th and 19th, Ventura offered many wonderful outside events (too many actually). Unfortunately, Saturday offered up just about every kind

of weather that we see here throughout an entire year (except snow - though it did snow one-day in the 1940's). Luckily, Sunday saw nearly no rain so Pirate Days, Art Walk and the Pooch Parade had successful events. Ironically, the Pooch Parade was cut a little short because it was too hot and muggy (85 degrees with 50% humidity) especially for the dogs.

Even Porterhouse Bob, who was scheduled to play at the Olivas Adobe's Summer Under The Stars concert on Saturday night, was cancelled due to rain. Although it wasn't raining in the evening, and it turned out to be a beautiful night, the Olivas grounds were very wet and muddy. Unfortunately, it didn't appear that attendees were able to find out if the concert was cancelled - we checked the Concert's online page, by phone, and the Concert's Facebook page. I found out the concert was cancelled by going over to Olivas. The wonderful young volunteers that help with the events were passing out notices giving people the news. Lessons learned should we ever see rain again during the series.

Speaking of the Olivas concerts, the first featuring a Beatle's tribute band (Britain's Finest), was sold out with a crowd of 500 in attendance. It's great that it was sold out, but the legal capacity of 500 is too many people-we were crammed in like the perennial sardines.

- On the same day that an historical event occurred, the removal of the Confederate flag at the Southern Carolina Statehouse, I turned on the Channel 5 news (I don't normally watch this). The lead story was about a hidden camera in a bathroom along with interviews with some of the victims. News coverage at its finest, so I switched channels.
- The Ventura **Charter** Review Committee is working on their recommendations to be presented to the City Council for charter revisions later this year. Go to http://www.cityofventura. net/meeting/charter-review-committeemeeting to see their agenda and meeting dates. Citizens can attend their meetings to listen and to speak your mind. What

do you think should change in the City?

■ Once again (every year I complain), I am appalled that the State charges \$10 for parking, which is especially bad for non-profit events. The latest example was the Pooch Parade (presented by CARL for dog adoptions) at State Park next to the Marriott Hotel. But the same applies for cancer, MS and other non-profit events that are held at San Buenaventura State Beach. Perhaps governments should help communities by supporting groups who are trying to make a difference in the world. The parking fees certainly seem to negatively impact attendance.

And, I believe the park is large enough to provide some RV overnight spaces. There is great demand for these during the summer, and they would certainly bring in more money than \$10 parking fee.

I'm really shocked - and disappointed - that I didn't receive letters of protest regarding my comments about religion in my last editorial. Among other things, I said that Supreme Court Justices should be atheists so that their decisions are made on logic and not based upon biblical/ religious beliefs. Maybe I still will.

And speaking of the bible, I thought it was pretty impressive launching a paper while in my seventies, but Noah built a forty foot boat, with 3 levels when he was 630 years old. And without power tools. What a show-off.

■ Most of our new, or proposed condo/ apartment projects, include some retail space on the first floor. Perhaps this is required by planning, but usually it's a complete waste to require these spaces because they remain empty. The retail space at the WAV (built a little over 5-years ago) is still mostly empty (a yoga studio recently expanded into a portion of the space). The retail space in the recently built condo project on the Avenue, behind the Vons's shopping center, remains empty. Doesn't seem like a useful requirement when there is no call for them and no parking if they did move in?

■ Recently, planning department officials (Jeff Lambert and Dave Ward), gave the City Council an update on six major projects making their way through the city planning review process. They do this on occasion. This is not a formal presentation and is not seeking Council approval (that comes later), but just an informal discussion so that developers (oh no, the dreaded "D" word) will have an idea what to expect when the formal presentations are made to the Council.

Often times, Council members comment on the design elements of projects. I really don't think it is the Council's role to act as pseudo architects. They appoint a Design Review Committee (DRC) that manages this function through many meetings and presentations with the projects architects and developers. Typically, many design revisions are made during this process.


If the Council doesn't think that the **DRC** is doing a good job, then they should replace committee members.

HACSB awards first scholarships

The Housing Authority of the City of San Buenaventura (HACSB) announced the awardees of its first Annual Scholarship Program competition. The HACSB Annual Scholarship Program is the result of a partnership with Pacific Western Bank, awarding two \$1,500 scholarships for students attending four year institutions and two \$750 scholarships for students attending two year institutions. Public Housing and Housing Choice Voucher participants were asked to submit applications for the open, competitive selection process. The selected recipients are recent graduates of Foothill Technology High School, Ventura High School and Buena High School with plans to attend Ventura College, Azusa Pacific University and University of California San Diego starting in the fall.

The HACSB is simultaneously announcing a new partnership with SurePath Financial Solutions and the Ventura County Community Development Corporation (VCCDC) to establish a "Scholarship Savings Club" program that will support an additional ten (10) low-income students in the city of Ventura. HACSB Chief Executive Officer Denise Wise said, "This key new partnership gives the HACSB the opportunity to work with our residents to save for their education and meet critical education goals they have set for themselves."

The HACSB hosted its first Annual Scholarship event at the Westview Community Center on July 16. The event celebrated the first four scholarship winners as well as the first ten "Scholarship Savings Club" Program participants.

VCCDC is the only nonprofit one stop Home Ownership Center in Ventura County with over 14 years of experience offering unbiased financial guidance. In addition to foreclosure prevention services, they offer assistance with financial management (youth and adult programs), pre-purchase education and counseling, realty, lending and down payment assistance.

SurePath is a non-profit organization dedicated to providing education, counseling and resources to individuals seeking to improve their financial situation, keep their homes, and improve their credit.

The HACSB is the largest residential landlord in the City of Ventura, with 471 public housing units, more than 1,500 Section 8 vouchers, and over 350 non-profit affordable rental units. The agency is actively working to increase the supply of affordable housing and to improve the quality of life for hundreds more of the low-income residents throughout the City of Ventura.

Should you Solarize your house?

Solarize Ventura, the discounted solar installation program offered in partnership with the City of Ventura and The Community Environmental Council has been extended through August 15th. So far, 70 households in Ventura have gone solar through Solarize Ventura programs, saving

money on their electric bills, and generating clean electricity on their roofs.

2014 participant, explained that the economics of going solar through Solarize Ventura made sense for her. This July marks the year anniversary of her switch to solar, and she sees the benefits whenever she gets her electricity bill; she is saving about \$100 each month in electricity costs. Peggy shared her advice to homeowners that might be considering going solar, "Do it! At least explore it. I was surprised that I could actually do it."

The primary goals of Solarize Ventura are to increase the amount of solar in the City and to make it simpler and more affordable for Ventura residents to go solar. "The Solarize program offers Ventura homeowners a streamlined process and a discounted price for solar from vetted installers," explained Jefferson Litten, CEC's Solarize Program Manager. Litten noted that CEC's past Solarize programs have already helped more than 440 homeowners in Central Coast communities go solar.

Solarize Ventura features three vetted solar installers, Allen Energy, California Solar Electric and SunRun. These companies were selected for the program after evaluation and vetting by a committee of local experts. The companies have agreed to offer a fixed, discounted price to Ventura residents who sign up before the new deadline of August 15.

The workshop will address the benefits of solar energy, and experts will be available to answer solar pricing, financing, and equipment questions. Ojai events

When Nordhoff High School student Audrey Hernandez is not working as a lifeguard at the Lake Casitas water park this summer, she can often be found in the studio of Ojai artist Vera Long, who is mentoring Hernandez as part of the City of Ojai Arts Commission's summer arts-internship program.

Hernandez is one of four local high school students currently participating in the city-funded Arts Mentor Program, now in its third year. The other students are Dylan Reed of the Oak Grove School Madeleine Bigger of Nordhoff and Felicity Evans of Villanova Prep.

For Long, a member of the Ojai Studio Artists group, the city's Artist Mentor Program is another example of the community's commitment to fostering the arts.

The Ojai Valley Land Conservancy (OVLC) and Ventura County Public Works Agency's Watershed Protection District (VCPWA WPD) will collaboratively improve the quality of urban runoff to the Ventura River through a Low Impact Development (LID) Retrofit Project at the Ojai Valley Meadows Preserve.

To meet state water quality objectives, a portion of the undeveloped parcel at the Ojai Valley Meadows Preserve on South Lomita in Meiners Oaks will be replaced with a bioswale of drought tolerant shrubs, grasses and trees. Rock riprap will be constructed at the start and end of the bioswale to avoid erosion. The bioswale is designed to remove trash, sediment, bacteria and nutrients from polluting the Ventura River, treating polluted storm water runoff to ensure clean water is discharged to the watershed.

Additional construction activities will include reconstruction of portions of the sidewalk on the east side of South Lomita for storm drain improvements; excavation and grading for construction of the bioswale, as well as two treatment vaults at either end of the bioswale; vegetation planting; and establishment.

Funding for the project comes from a Proposition 84 Storm Water Grant and is one of approximately 40 projects throughout the state to have its full proposal selected.

A public education and outreach program is expected to be integrated into the project including Ocean Friendly GardensTM Classes and hands-on workshops. The contract has been awarded to Shaw Contracting of Carpentaria. Construction is anticipated from July through October 2015.



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

family is restored to housing, or, for an average cost of \$700 in one-time rental assistance we can keep them in their home. And the mental and emotional stress of losing one's housing are not quantifiable. How much better to prevent the loss in the first place?

Since its inception in 2007, the fund has helped 356 households and 945 individuals, over half of them children, stay in their homes (by the time this is printed, those numbers will have grown!) Case managers at Project Understanding and the Salvation Army provide assistance with budgeting, and work to make

sure those receiving help from HPF will be able to stay housed. And over 90% of those who have been helped by HPF were still in their homes when contacted nine months later.

The HPF is financed 100% by donations from individuals, faith communities, and service organizations. Every penny donated goes directly to preventing individuals and families from losing their homes because this 501(c)(3) non-profit is entirely volunteer-run.

Preventing homelessness

Marie (not her real name) was desperate. Her car had broken down, and fixing it had used up her rent money. The rent was already late, and the landlord wasn't willing to give her an extension – again. Living on the edge of poverty, she had paid rent late too many times. If she didn't get help fast, she and her family – her mother, sister, and two children – would be homeless.

Luckily for Marie and her family, a group of Ventura citizens had acted on a dream they had back in 2007 that they could help families like hers. Employees and volunteers from many social services agencies, churches, and individual residents concerned with the issue of homelessness came together to form and sustain the Ventura Homeless Prevention Fund (HPF). That fund is still helping tenants like Marie who have a one-time financial crisis that can make them lose their housing.

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

Why do you only mention parks? I bike around Ventura on a regular basis and am saddened by the amount of litter all over town. Sure, it's not just plastic bags, but plastic bags are problematic and there is an easy solution with reusable bags. Please review my slideshows and photos of plastic bag litter in Ventura to see that this is an issue that warrants our attention. In addition to bags that are littered, plastic bags have a design flaw that can allow them to 'float away' from trash trucks when emptying garbage or birds can pull them from trash cans near the beach.

Plastic does not biodegrade in our lifetimes when littered. We are never going to ban all plastics but we must use plastic responsibly. That means durable products rather than disposable products. As plastic litter enters the watershed and then the ocean it accumulates over time in an ocean gyre if it floats. Scientists are finding alarming amounts of plastic in the gyres and in many cases there is more plastic than plankton.

Plastic pollution is turning into a tragedy of the commons and we need to take simple steps to help solve the problem. Banning plastic bags and requiring reusable bags is a big first step. The voters

will decide on the statewide checkout bag bill in November 2016 while for now we need to encourage everyone to choose to

Between 1993 and 2006 it was still open to the public. However, in 2006 the lease ended and the City Council voted that it be off limits to the public due to safety concerns.

Since 2006 the range has been used solely by the Ventura Police Department. They use the facility for both combat style training and individual target practice.

The range is currently maintained by retired officers who volunteer a few hours during the week to make sure the facility is properly maintained and suitable for trainings.

One of these volunteers stressed the importance of the range. "I believe the police range serves a critical training function for the officers of the Ventura Police Department. In this day and age it is imperative that our men and women are able to safely do their jobs, and be as technically skilled with their tools of the job as we can make them. Having a training facility in the City provides close, quality, and well supervised training for those officers, insuring the quality of life for our residents is maintained."

While some people regret that the range is now closed to the public, the police department is thankful there is a place for our officers to train at right here in Ventura.

After dinner we took a little walk over to the State Beach but not a very long one because the Ventura breeze (not the Ventura Breeze) was blowing so it was a little chilly.


My buddies were concerned what would happen if I had to do my thing in the middle of the night and were not sure if I would use the patio, but I was terrific and slept all night.

Police reports are provided to us by the Ventura Police Department and are not the opinions of the Ventura Breeze. All suspects mentioned are assumed to be innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.

Assault with Deadly Weapon

On Thursday, July 9th, at 10:39 a.m., the VPD received a call regarding a subject armed with a knife threatening another individual at the Bus Depot, located at 3330 Telegraph Road.

The victim, Arthur Munoz, was at the Bus Depot sitting in his wheel chair and was attempting to collect his money that had fallen to the ground from his pocket. The suspect, Gerald Mclintock, started picking up Munoz's money off of the ground and was claiming it as his own. An argument ensued between the two men when Mclintock brandished a knife and threatened to kill Munoz. Mclintock attempted to stab Munoz but was unsuccessful.

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Officers responding to the area apprehended Mclintock. He was taken into custody without incident and booked at the county jail for an assault with a deadly weapon and attempted robbery. Munoz was not injured and his money was returned to him.

Armed Robbery

On Sunday, July 12th, at 3:18 p.m., the VPD received a call from the victim of an armed robbery. The victim was walking in the vicinity of California Street and Thompson Boulevard when two suspects approached him, and one of the suspects brandished a knife. Ventura City Fire and AMR personnel, responded to the call and found the victim, Frank Reyes, suffering from multiple stab wounds to the upper torso. He was immediately transported to VCMC for treatment of his injuries.

Officers learned that Reyes had just left the liquor store and saw a subject vandalizing his vehicle that was parked in the parking lot. A second subject confronted Reyes and stabbed him. After the stabbing, both subjects fled from the scene.

Officers checked the area, but were unable to locate the suspects. Reyes is in serious condition, but his injuries are considered non-life threatening. No one else was injured as a result of this incident.

Vehicle Pursuit

On Monday, July 17th, at 7:15 a.m., a Ventura police officer on patrol attempted to stop Shane Dumas, driving his vehicle for expired registration in the area of Seaward Avenue and Thompson Boulevard. The officer activated his emergency lights to initiate the traffic stop, but Dumas failed to yield and a pursuit was initiated.

In the area of Preble Avenue and Rexford Avenue, Dumas exited the vehicle while it was still moving and fled on foot. A female passenger that was in the vehicle was able to stop it before in collided into anything. Dumas was able to elude officers, who quickly set up a perimeter of the area. Dumas was found hiding in a storage closet that he had broken into and barricaded himself. He was taken into custody without incident in the 3300 block of Rexford Avenue.

Prior to being booked into the VC Jail, Dumas was transported to VCMC for treatment of a medical issue unrelated to the arrest and admitted. Once he is medically cleared, Dumas will be booked into jail.

Assault with Deadly Weapon

On Monday, July 13th, at 3:46 p.m., officers responded to a call at a residence in the 10400 block of New Haven in reference to a possible brandishing of a firearm.

During the investigation, officers learned that Hector Revelez was doing yard work in the area when Cezar Puica exited his residence and confronted him about the loud noise. Puica returned to his residence and Revelez continued working. Upset that Revelez, who is a landscaper, had not stopped working, Puica exited his residence a second time with a rifle. Puica pointed the rifle at Revelez and threatened to kill him. He then returned to his residence.

Officers attempted to make contact with Puica at his residence, but he refused to come out. After 45 minutes of negotiating with Puica, he finally exited his residence and was taken into custody.

After being cleared from VCMC for an unrelated medical issue, Puica was booked into VC Jail. No one was injured as a result of the incident. The weapon used by Puica was determined to be a replica firearm.

Purse theft

On July, at approximately 1:00 pm VPD officers responded to a report of a purse theft that had occurred at Pump it Up on Ralston St.

The victim, Michelle Burt, had set her purse on a table during a child's party when a male suspect from another party group took the purse, concealed it under his shirt and fled the area.

Approximately two hours later the Ventura Police Department Command Center received a report of a theft in progress at Kevin Jewelers inside the Pacific View Mall.

The business reported that a male suspect had asked to see some merchandise and when the sales person showed the suspect the items he took them and fled the

mall on foot.

An employee was able to see the vehicle that the suspect fled in and provided that information the responding officers. During this investigation several discarded items belonging to Burt were located near the mall and the description of the suspect matched that of the theft suspect from Pump it Up.

VPD detectives conducted additional follow up investigation and identified the suspect in both thefts as Matthew Rico, 29 Ventura resident.

Rico was later transported the Ventura County Main Jail and booked on two counts of 487(a) PC – Felony Grand Theft.

Show Time

Jurassic World

Universal Pictures opened *Jurassic World* 22 years to the date of the original film's release. Yes, they are trying to tap into those nostalgic feelings you had growing up, watching the original films. At its core, *World* is a fun, campy, and exciting ride that plays into the moral of the prior films (life finds a way) and a new one: people would live a lot more comfortably if they accepted the fact that they are not in control over their lives. An interesting premise indeed.

22 years after the events of the original film, InGen has managed to get a hold on those pesky electric fences, feeding schedules, and the creation of new animals. Every few years, Claire (Bryce Dallas Howard) explains that the park must introduce a new attraction to spike attendance. This time around, it is a new dinosaur called the Indominous Rex, a hybrid of a variety of different species. Owen Grady (Chris Pratt) is horrified by not only the creation of a new animal, but also Hoskins' (Vincent D'Nofrio) desires of training raptors for the purposes of military weapons. When Claire's nephews come to visit, as expected, all goes wrong.

My main problem with Jurassic World is the lifeless nature of the plot's motion. It feels like this was written with the purpose of churning out another entry in the JP franchise so as to capitalize on people's nostalgia. The idea of an operating and fully functioning park actually came from Steven Spielberg. Though only Colin Trevorrow and Derek Connelly are credited, the two are just half of the amount of people who worked on the script and it seems like there were lots of versions combined into what was made.

Though both Howard and Pratt were excellent in their roles, their past romance (which creates trouble for them both) feels completely forced. On the opposite end,

Jake Johnson and Lauren Lapkus end up stealing the show with all of the moments that they share on screen, including the biggest laugh in the movie. The rest of the supporting cast varies from irritating to annoying with Irrfan Khan's Masrani (who took over the reins from John Hammond) confusing me because I was never certain if we were supposed to take him seriously or not.

One unexpected surprise *World* was able to deliver was a surprising amount of violence. Some of the kills in this are particularly brutal, even for a Jurassic Park sequel. The films overall bleak take on the genetic modification of animals was easily the movie's most interesting element. This does play into Vincent D' Onofrio's plan to try and tame raptors to militarize them. In a movie about dinosaurs on a dinosaur tour, I just wasn't buying it.

I did, however, buy Michael Giacchino's brilliant score. At times, the usage of John Williams' original themes feels like we're supposed to be having feelings of nostalgia shoved down our eyes and ear ports. They don't always work, but it's amazing when they do. PG-13 Century 10

Santa Paula Theatre Center brings to the stage *Vanya and Sonia and Masha and Spike*, a summer comedy, designed by noted playwright Christopher Durang to delight, plus simultaneously ignite recognition. The 2013 Tony and Drama Desk award winning work garnered raves for its absurdist style.

Fans of Anton Chekov plays will be amused by both the subtle and outright references to numerous Chekov's works, both in characterizations and through the play within the play. If unfamiliar with the classic works, audiences will still find the humor in the by-play

between the characters - and what characters they are!

In the piece we meet Vanya (Raymond Mastrovito), a middle-aged, sedentary, half in the closet gentleman who lives in the family home with Sonia, his adopted sister. Sonia (Peggy Steketee) is an insecure matron who is still finding her place within the family, despite the fact she is not new to the situation. Enter Vanya's blood sister Masha (Aileen-Marie Scott), a flamboyant star of stage and screen, in search of being the center of attention every moment. The cougar is accompanied by her current boy toy, Spike (Andrew Garrett), an awkward, young, insincere egotist whose acting claim to fame is almost landing a bit part in a movie.

The family's cleaning lady, Cassandra (Francine Daniels), uses her clairvoyant powers to constantly predict dire circumstances that tend to come true, and voodoo magic to ease the complications that subsequently arise. An additional dynamic is added when Spike meets Nina (Rachel Addington), a young and vibrant summer visitor from next door who happens to be an aspiring actress and admirer of Masha.

Masha makes her grand entrance into the family home in Pennsylvania, quickly disrupting the staid routine life that Vanya and Sonia lead. She has big news - although she has been supporting her brother and sister, as well as underwriting the costs of their family home for years, she has decided to sell. This meets with great dismay from the two non-working siblings. In addition, she has been invited to a costume party where she will portray Snow White and has decreed that everyone else don the roles of Snow White's entourage in order that she remain the star. The result is an unpredictable maelstrom of events.

Despite several lengthy discourses of questionable value (in our opinions) and some flagging energy in the second act, the absurdity of each characters' self-focus kept the audience at least chuckling throughout.

To veteran director Fred Helsel's credit, all the characterizations were broad and played with abandon by all the actors. Watching actors relish what they are presenting is a joy. Well-earned applause goes to the Santa Paula Theater Center for keeping their audiences involved and intellectually stimulated with unusual material.





From Tennessee native to California local

Katherine Ratliff isn't your typical Ventura resident. Although she does love the beach community and fair weather, she finds her roots in Nashville, Tennessee. In 1997, she even started a school in Franklin, TN, called the Spring Hollow Early Learning Center.

However, that isn't the only school that Ratliff has started in the world—she also started a school in Bangkok, Thailand. She clearly used her doctorate in early childhood education to kickstart a longtime career in teaching children.

"Whatever you want to call it, be it the grace of God or fate or the universe," Ratliff said. "Sometimes things just fall right into your lap and you have to listen to your heart."

Only recently opened this past May, the Spring Hollow Gallery already emits good energy and an appetite for creativity and imagination. Ratliff worked at various studios throughout Ventura, but eventually came to the decision she needed a bigger space.

She views this gallery as an extension of a studio, and has even transformed the basement into her pottery studio. Ratliff spends hundreds of hours making pottery, as well as making most of the jewelry displayed in the gallery.

Known as the Spring Hollow Approach, Ratliff incorporates the idea of sharing ideas and feelings together in a collaborative effort. This particular way of thinking involves encouraging children to have their own feelings/opinions without any judgment and to encourage and facilitate artistic acceptance.

"Art is about the heart," Ratliff said. "It's about doing things to make those creative juices flow and expressing your true feelings and creativity."

The story behind the logo of the gallery is quite interesting. Named the inuksuk, the stone landmark was used by the Inuit Indians across the Arctic region of North America for communication and survival, as well as for navigational purposes. It was a sign that someone was on the right path. Ratliff credits watercolorist Janice Chan for designing the logo vision for the gallery.

Ratliff displays a plethora of artwork, pottery, and jewelry. She exhibits creations not only from local artists, but from out of state artists as well, such as those from Tennessee and North Carolina, where she was born. In fact, the first two people she represented in her gallery were Bill and Liz Kidwell, who remain two of her closest friends to this day.

Ratliffhosts a variety of weekly classes at her gallery: every Friday from 6-9 pm there is Bead Circle, every Tuesday from 4-6 pm there is Watercolor Class, every Wednesday @ 5pm there is Meditation, and every Thursday @ 10 am there is Clay Class.



Junior Fair Board

The Junior Fair Board was established in the 1970's to provide young adults with an opportunity to develop leadership skills, perform community service, and become aware of the business and operations of District Agricultural Fairs. 4 drivers were cited for 14601 VC, Driving on a suspended license and had their vehicles towed.


5 drivers were cited for 12500(a) DUI/CDL Checkpoint in the area of VC, Driving without a driver's license.

Many residents of Ventura County live in the "blast zone"

Dozens of residents recently gathered in Downtown and marched to the Amtrak station on Harbor Blvd to voice their opposition to oil trains moving through Ventura County. The rally, organized by Food & Water Watch and Ventura County Climate Hub, was part of the Stop Oil Trains Week of Action coordinated across North America by ForestEthics and Center for Biological Diversity.

Many residents of Ventura County live in the "blast zone," which is the one-mile evacuation zone recommended by safety officials in the case of an oil train derailment and fire. ForestEthics calculates that nationwide, 25 million Americans live in the blast zone.

Residents marched dressed as oil train cars and held signs opposing the oil industry's proposal to move millions of gallons of highly toxic, potentially explosive crude oil through Ventura Country in unsafe rail cars over tracks that were never designed for this dangerous cargo. Phillips 66 is attempting to build a rail spur that will result in millions of gallons of this crude coming through our Ventura County communities. Dozens of communities along the tracks have written letters to the San Luis Obispo Planning Commission requesting that they deny this dangerous proposal. Ventura County is a leader in this opposition with almost every major city (Moorpark, Ventura, Oxnard, Camarillo, Simi Valley), several school boards (Ventura Unified School District, Pleasant Valley School District) and the County itself sending letters of opposition.

"Many of our major cities in Ventura County are in the oil train Blast Zone, including Ventura, Oxnard, Moorpark, Camarillo, and Simi Valley,"said Camarillo resident Todd Shuman, who

is a CFROG Advisory Board Member. (CFROG is the Ojai-based Citizens for Responsible Oil and Gas.)

Oxnard and Ventura County recently saw the devastation of a train derailment when an Amtrak train plowed into a truck as it headed south out of Oxnard the morning of February 24, 2015. The collision knocked passenger cars off the tracks and the truck burst into flames, injured thirty people and took the life of the engineer Glenn Steele. One can only imagine the devastation that Oxnard would have experienced if the train had been filled with explosive crude.

Question: I have seen WEEDDUI signs in Ventura. I know how alcohol is checked but how is marijuana checked?

Brad:

We asked Ofc. Jason Kohagen of the Ventura Police Department to answer your question.

As far as determining if someone has used marijuana, the basics are very similar to alcohol. Like alcohol, marijuana impairs judgment, balance, decision making, and ability to follow instructions. All of these tasks are vital to safely operate a motor vehicle. Determining if someone is impaired by marijuana for the purpose of driving is very similar to alcohol in many ways. In regards to usage, a person may use a small amount of marijuana, similar to having a small amount of alcohol, and not be impaired to drive. That being said, just like with alcohol, the more marijuana a person ingests, the more impaired they will be. Determining the level of impairment is done using the same standardized field sobriety tests used for alcohol, supplemental eye exams and pulse rates. After an officer determines based on their training, experience, and what they have observed, that there is probable cause to arrest a driver, a blood sample is obtained to confirm the presence of

The state Office of Traffic Safety is funding several schools to improve the average officer's ability to detect impairment from substances other than alcohol. What is known as drugged driving or D.U.I.D. is becoming an increasingly dangerous occurrence throughout our country. More and more people are injured and killed every year across the country and our state as the result of people driving under the influence of both illicit controlled substances and even prescription medications. If I can Stress one point, at no time should anyone use marijuana and drive. Since it is not a legal substance, the potency and purity are not regulated and can fluctuate from dealer to dealer, and grower to grower.
