Ventura's Economic Development Manager resigns – part 1

Sid White recently left his post as the City of Ventura's Economic Development Manager. The Breeze wanted to talk to White about his long career in urban renewal and economic development. This is part 1 of a 2-part interview.

White grew up in Reinholds, located in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania—noted home of the Amish and Pennsylvania Dutch. "It was very austere," he said. "We didn't have indoor plumbing until I was 16 years old, but I knew about community service. In fact, any notice of self above community was darn near a sin."

He received a scholarship to attend Albright College in Reading, Pennsylvania and received his degree in psychobiology. After graduation, he enrolled at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in Troy, New York where he majored in urban and environmental studies.

At Rensselaer, he learned the nuts and bolts of urban economic development. As White described it: "Troy was one of the old nitty gritty industrial cities located at the confluence of the Hudson River and Erie Canal. It was the home of Bessemer Steel and the birth-place of the industrial revolution. It had thrived in the 1800s up to the 1960s, and then it went bust."

This was during the 1970s when "all of the social programs came out, and that was a lot of our curriculum." White interned for the city and had to "figure

out how these programs worked and how we could make life better for folks who lived in our great cities."

He described Troy as "in the throes of urban renewal." Rebuilding the city was, for a young intern, quite a challenge. "They had destroyed about twothirds of the downtown," he said. "Eventually, I took a full-time job as a planner and did a lot of downtown renewal. First I helped save what was left of the great downtown fabric and then we created a downtown historic district and put it on the National Trust of Historic Places."

White's unique approach tied together historic preservation with economic outcomes. "We were known as the Hudson Mohawk Cultural and Historic District," said White, "and we worked with Rensselaer to develop a business incubator, the first business incubator in the country. I also founded the Industrial Development Authority that financed the facility."

White must have done something right. For his work in Troy, he received the prestigious New York State Main Street award in 1984.

White's connection to Ventura was pure kismet. Ann Baker, his wife-tobe, was a Ventura native and the great granddaughter of E.P. Foster. Baker moved to Troy to work as an artist

and potter. Her cousin, a graduate of Columbia, also lived in Troy. "We had quite a few Columbia graduates come up and learn about historic preservation," said White.

When White and Ann Baker were married in Ojai in 1980, it was his first time in California. "I thought this was the most wonderful place on earth," he said. When he returned in 1984 for his mother-in-law's funeral, he noticed an ad in the L.A. Times for an economic development project manager for the City of Santa Monica and decided to apply. "I hand wrote my application," he said. He was hired and happily moved his family west.

White oversaw some important projects in Santa Monica, including the Ocean Park Beach Project and the rehabilitation of the Ocean Park Promenade and pier. When he left, he had just finished plans for the redevelopment of the former 3rd Street Mall.

White's next job was with Economic Research Associates in Westwood, where he eventually became a partner. His niche became feasibility analyses for development of convention centers and sports arenas such as the L.A. Convention Center and the Rose Garden, home to the NBA Portland Trailblazers.

After several years, White realized something was missing in his life. Children. He left Economic Research Associates and took a year off. "We hit our forties and I was traveling a lot for projects," he said. "We had forgotten about kids, so we decided to adopt." The Whites did research and found Cradle of Hope in Washington, D.C., a group that facilitated adoptions in the former Soviet Union and the Republic of Georgia.

The Whites adopted two 5-year-old girls, Rebecca and Elizabeth, from an orphanage in Georgia. White described the girls' joy over learning to play: "We took them out to Balboa Park in the San Fernando Valley and just let them run for hours on end."

In 2002, White encountered another kismet moment. While working as Economic Development Manager for the L.A. County Community Development Commission, he was reading the L.A. Times (again) and saw an ad for Economic Development Manager for the City of Ventura. "I faxed in the application," he said. "We decided to come back home."

White's qualifications, his connection to one of Ventura's most historic families, and his local knowledge of Ventura's quirky "oil, agriculture, tourism, beach town" economy worked very much in his favor. So much so that "as I was driving home from my last interview, I was offered the job."



(now Calonne attempting to say not the case)

c. "The architectural design of the proposed development is compatible with the character of the surrounding neighborhood and all reasonable design efforts have been made to maintain the harmonious orderly and attractive development contemplated by this zoning ordinance. (now Calonne attempting to say not the case)

d. "The design of the proposed development would provide a desirable environment for its occupants and visiting public as well as its neighbors and that it is aesthetically of good composition, materials texture and color that will remain aesthetically appealing with the level of maintenance and upkeep that might reasonably be expected of the occupants."

2. Sec. 24.535.080: "Administrative variance requiring planning commission review" - administrative variances from the standards and regulations referenced in this section may be approved subject to the provisions of this chapter but shall

be reviewed and acted upon by the plan- Breeze: ning commission rather than the direc-Mr. Calonne)

Comment: It appears to me this requirement was met when the planning commission approved this project. Subsequent decisions by the community development director and others would appear in violation of this ordinance. Respectfully,



Grape Expectations

Sizzling summer selections!

As I was closing my last article about the "Wonderful Wines of Summer", I left you hanging with one of my favorite grape varietals, Zinfandel. This grape gets its roots from Italy and Croatia, where the grape is called "primitivo and crljenak kastelanski". In California, 10% of all vineyards are planted with Zinfandel. This grape produces a robust red wine and often contains alcohol levels above 15% which is higher than other traditional red wines. I like to refer a good Zin as "jammy".

The taste of the wine depends on the ripeness of the grapes at harvest. Red berry fruits like raspberry notes from wines in cooler areas and blackberry, anise and pepper notes are more common in wines harvested in warmer climates. The age of the vines also is important with zinfandel with some of the vineyards having been planted over 100 years ago!

Zinfandel was originally planted in Napa Valley, but also has a large presence in Amador, Sonoma, Lodi, San Luis Obispo, and Mendocino county.

Zins go great with BBQ's, which is why I call this a summer wine. The spices in the sauces tend to interact great with the fruit forward characteristic of this wine. I also like Zins with Mexican or Thai food. For after dinner, try a Late Harvest Zinfandel, a fortified wine that many Zin producers make.

Many of the wineries on the Ventura Wine Trail produce Zins as part of their wine portfolio, so next time you are visiting one of the wineries on the trail, make sure to try this varietal, then bring some home for the BBQ Cheers! Eric wineoeric@gmail.com



Chumash ceremonial leader and Dolphin Dancer Mati Waiya, a lifelong resident of Ventura County, created the Wishtoyo Foundation, a non-profit organization, in 1997.

Mr. Waiya addresses cultural resource laws protecting sensitive archaeological sites as well as endangered species and natural resources. He is involved with Chumash cultural preservation and educational programs teaching the Chumash values and environmental preservation.

Waiya appears in full regalia to present programs for schools, public events, government functions and grassroots foundations; he has presented programs to thousands of school children, sharing his knowledge about Chumash sustainable life ways and environmental responsibility.

Mati Waiya is the first Native American to be named a Keeper in the international Waterkeeper Alliance. Wishtoyo's Ventura Coastkeeper program is one of over 140 Keeper organizations that operate globally under the Waterkeeper Alliance, created and headed by Robert Kennedy, Jr.

The Wishtoyo Foundation protects and preserves the culture and history of coastal communities and fosters responsibility to our waters, marine habitats and watersheds through research, education, community action and where necessary, citizen enforcement. Their aim is to utilize traditional Chumash beliefs, practices, songs, stories and dances to create self-respect and a greater awareness of our connection with, and dependence upon, the natural Environment.

Mr. Waiya's belief is that education is the primary tool for a future healthy, sustainable environment, awakening a passion for our natural surroundings in young people today to be passed on for generations to come. He has worked tirelessly to foster environmental awareness through teaching of his native Chumash cultural values.

"In our culture we have to recognize the balance and the lessons of our natural, spiritual and physical world. We believe in the upper world (the sky), the lower world (the ocean), and the middle world (the land). As we are growing up both physically and spiritually, we learn from our elders about understanding the three basic laws: the laws of limitations, moderation and compensation."

We realize that we are only going to live so long, then we are going to die. We only can be so strong and do so much. The more we can understand about what we can do and our abilities, the more we can accept who we are as human beings. We respect our plants, our ocean, and our wildlife. We honor our women, our mothers, our daughters, our sisters, and our wives. They bring us into the world, and they give us life...

We asked him what he likes most about Ven-

"Aside of Uncles and Aunties, cousins and family growing up throughout Ventura County, is that deep rooted history we have here with our Culture. The rivers and coastline throughout Ventura have always been a place to see far and clear and to appreciate the spirit of living in this area. Where the Sespe and the Santa Clara Rivers meet is a place of dreams and visions...I've continued to hold ceremony there for over 20 years with our Elders and children and it's where I did my ceremonial apprenticeship. Our cultural songs and dances, traditions are what will never die off from this sacred place. In the 1980s our family participated in the recovery of the California Condor through ceremony and outreach to the community and through litigation. The memories of our ancestors brings us a unique connection and perspective to this land and its waters. We hear the songs and feel the spirit of the wind, land and the waters. To carry the memorable years with me in Ventura has made me proud to call this my home and to honor it by sharing our cultural and natural heritage with our extended community through our cultural education programs.

And how was the experience of having your portrait painted by Johanna?

"It seemed a 'shutter speed' to producing a portrait! Johanna is amazingly focused and talented as she can capture the essence of her subject so quickly. To see through the physical and capture the spirit of a human being...I was honored that she included me in the Face Of Ventura project."







I had a chance to chat with Sandy Morse, RN, new Director of Community and Professional Relations at Livingston Memorial Visiting Nurses Association (LMVNA) and Hospice. Here is what I learned:

Tell me a little bit about LMVNA such as when it was founded, where it's located and the areas served.

LMVNA was founded in 1947; they have two offices, one on Eastman Ave, in Ventura and the other in Thousand Oaks. Livingston serves all patients throughout the entire Ventura County area, including Simi Valley, Westlake, and Agoura Hills.

Who does LMVNA help?

We are unique because we're the only nonprofit Home Health Agency in Ventura County and. we take care of everyone, regardless of his or her ability to pay. In 2010, between our home health, hospice and respite patients, we provided care for over 4,000 people. Also, the amount of care provided to subsidized care patients (indigent and uninsured) continues to rise and we provided \$302,064 worth of care in 2010. How much does it cost?

Cost is related to the type of services patients receive and is covered by Medicare, MediCal, private insurance and there is no cost to the uninsured or those

who cannot pay. What services do you provide?

We provide skilled (RN) home care nursing for all ages that includes:

Full Health Assessment, Disease and Medication Management,

Infusion Therapy, Wound and Ostomy Care, Diabetic and Family Teaching

Rehabilitation Therapies: Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy, Speech Therapy Registered Dieticians, Medical Social Workers, Home Health Aides, Chaplains, Volunteers

Pallliative Care: Pain relief due to a serious or life threatening disease

Hospice Care: Compassionate care to relieve suffering, provide comfort and restore dignity to those who face a life limiting illness Telecare & Telemedicine: Remote medical oversight by a registered nurse

Gold Coast Caregivers: The non-medical aspect of Livingston offers assistance with personal care and household help. Free Community Education and Support: On going Bereavement Support Groups, Diabetic Education Classes, Joint Replacement Classes, Flu Clinics, and more.



Michelle (Shell) Hirrel began floral designing at Loma Vista Flower Shop when she was only 15 years old. Now, twenty-two years later and a single mom, she is happy to be doing something she loves as the owner of Shell's Petals at 7820 Telegraph Road. "We are a full service florist, but we specialize in weddings. I just love to see the look on people's faces when we start setting up the flowers and hand the bride her bouquet," says Hirrel. The experienced designer says she has had a busy summer. "The most popular color for weddings this year is purple. Everything is specially designed for each wedding. Brides are welcome to bring me their pictures and ideas, and then I try to give them something that is like what they have in mind-but with a little twist that makes it uniquely theirs. I have seen all shades of purples from lavenders to dark purples. We usually mix the purple with oranges and greens. We have been using a lot of Lisianthus also known as Texas Bluebells, orange Melva Roses from Ecuador, and hanging green Amaranths. The green Dendrobium Orchids have also been very popular." Hirrel says, the Ecuadorian roses offer a wide variety of shades and their size is larger than locally grown roses in the summer.

The designer says she has worked with brides on every budget level. "I have designed flowers for budgets from \$500 to \$20,000. Sometimes brides will use their own vases and glassware to save money". She usually does a free wedding consultation to see what the wedding's floral budget is and to get a feel for what sort of event they are hoping for. "I also offer 'day of' coordinating and oversee not only the flowers, but the placement of the cake and down the aisle assistance and make sure the DJ, photographer, and everyone else knows what the timeline is. Day of coordination fees run \$800-2,000 depending on the number of locations and where they are. "Right now, photo booths are popular at weddings and not only do guests get two copies of the picture, but the couple gets a reel of the photos they can use in a scrap book."

Shell's Petals has been at the current location for seven years. "We had some rough months and almost had to close the doors at one point," says Hirrel. But it was important for her to show her daughters that a woman can be independent and selfsufficient—and never give up. Now, the shop offers floral services for beach weddings, chuppahs for Jewish weddings, on-line purchasing, wire purchases, delivery, and two websites with sample arrangements. STOCK options provide support for cash-strapped school districts

If you're a parent trying to provide your child with a quality education here in Ventura County, opportunities and choices within local school districts are shrinking. As the state's budget crisis continues, less money is being provided to school districts. Less money means more program cuts, fewer teachers, larger class sizes, and less school-sponsored activities like music, sports, and art.

Alan Roper and Brian Torres know this from personal experience. They both have daughters enrolled at Elmhurst School in Ventura. They're both involved with the PTA. They understand all too well the impact of shrinking school budgets. "Every year teachers have to pay more out of pocket," said Torres. "We'd like to help relieve some of that stress on teachers and districts."

That's why they co-founded a nonprofit organization called STOCK (Success Through Our Communities Kids). It's a partnership between school districts and local businesses to help raise funds for additional program development in Ventura County schools. "We want to reach out to local business and help them find ways to reach out to local schools," said Roper.

One example of their work is the STOCK sponsored violin class being taught by music instructor Peter Shuere at the WĀV in downtown Ventura. Funding has been provided by STOCK to help offset some of the costs for instruments and instruction.

A group of about 20 or so young students have gathered tonight to learn the innovative music techniques provided by Shuere. He instructs violin students using the Suzuki method, but he's designed and added some additional tutoring through his own music software program. "We've been doing this for 25 years, mostly in local churches," said Shuere. "This is the first time we've done it with a nonprofit."

Students use the program during class, but since it's also online, they

can continue using it at home. Shuere's daughter Erica described the program as similar to Karaoke. "It's a really fun learning experience," she said, "and it speeds up the process."

STOCK helped to pay for these lessons and invites the public to watch the kids give a grand finale concert at the WĀV theater on Friday, August 26 at 7 and 9 p.m.

The idea behind STOCK is to find out what schools need. It means doing a lot of research, asking questions, and seeking business partnerships to help support that need. "We are trying to get local businesses to match a school's specific request for more field trips, different assemblies, whatever they need," said Roper.

Torres and Roper realize that education is more than the basics of English, math, and science. Something within the school's program must inspire each student. Torres talks about his own daughter. "Ava is going to need every tool she can get," he said. "She needs that extra something to spark her."

By forming STOCK, Torres and Roper acknowledge that local communities need to take more responsibility for their own schools. "People should wake up to what's happening to children in our schools," said Torres. Roper agrees. "The community needs to take responsibility and help the situation," he said. "With STOCK, instead of dealing with the red tape of the government, we're identifying a need and it gets done."

The hope is that STOCK itself can be the seed for more innovation in local schools. All it takes is someone to step out, identify a need, and put that idea to work. STOCK helps provide support and funding. "We're really into synergy," said Roper.

Most important, however, is the idea that support for education should extend beyond the school district. "When we visit local businesses," said Torres, "we try to educate them about what's happening in their schools."

Amada Irma Perez was a little girl with five younger brothers when her family emigrated from Juarez, Mexico. She also had a love of reading and a mother who knew her way around a library. Now, Perez a longtime Ventura educator is writing and publishing children's books.

Perez has written four bi-lingual children's books. My Very Own Room/Mi propio cuartito, My Diary from Here to There/Mi diario de aquí hasta allá, and Nana's Big Surprise/Nana !Que sorpresa! were illustrated by Maya Christina Gonzalez and published by Children's Book Press. Pearson Education commissioned her to write the oversized preschool book Desert Quails Hit Jungle Trails/ Del Seierto a la Jungla in 2010. Perez recently wrote a writing book for children called My Handy Writing Book: A New, Fun & Easy Way to

Write Stories and published it herself under the name of her newly founded publishing company, Writers Group Press for Ventura and Beyond, dedicated to helping new authors self-publish.

Her writing book uses the human hand as a metaphor for storytelling. "Every story must have a beginning. I use the thumb to represent the start of a story. The pinkie finger is the ending. By the end of a story, the pinkie and the thumb must come together. The three middle fingers represent the three D's: details, description and dialog," says Perez. She also emphasizes that children need to be taught to use their senses in storytelling. "Sights, sounds, smells, tastes and touch are as important as the who, what, when, where, and how of writing."

The award-winning author says that she was inspired by the mantra, "Plant a tree. Have a child. Write a book. It was something that filled my heart and brain," says Perez. As a teacher, Perez was always encouraging her students to write down their own stories. "Everyone has a unique story based on their own experience." After Perez began sharing her own stories with the children, she found that the students, who had also emigrated, were significantly touched by her own journey. "I realized

Gasland

It is happening all across America. Rural landowners wake up one day to find a lucrative offer from an energy company wanting to lease their property. Reason? The company hopes to tap into an energy reservoir dubbed the "Saudi Arabia of natural gas."

America's natural gas industry is exploding and we find ourselves on the precipice of becoming an energy superpower. But at what cost? To promote energy self-sufficiency and maximize profits, Halliburton and others have developed chemical "fracking fluids" that, when injected under high pressure with vast quantities of water, releases the gas more efficiently. Tens of thousands of landowners have signed on based on promises of minimal impact to landowner's lifestyles. Their next few mortgage payments will be met and other debts relieved.

It's a simple decision, especially in these economic times, unless you're Josh Fox, the citizen filmmaker behind "GASLAND", a deep and disturbing look into the gas exploration process known as "hydrofracking". Fox brings us stories of property owners who were solicited and paid and others who were not given a choice in the matter due to eminent domain. We hear from scientists on the impact these exploration practices and regulatory policies will have on our collective future.

This very special screening on a topic of vital public discourse will be followed by an in-depth discussion with Nathan Alley from the Environment Defense Center in Santa Barbara and other guests. We will be discussing the current state of oil and gas drilling and exploration in Ventura and Santa Barbara Counties, especially any incidents of hydrofracking. We will also learn how California's environmental protections differ from and in many ways exceed those of other states.

Bellicose Backstage Bitchery Abounds

Pulitzer Prize winning playwright Paul Zindell's satirical comedy the "Ladies at the Alamo" is unabashedly built on controversial stereotypes - a large, financially troubled performing arts center (that is only named after the Alamo), brassy Texas broads with big hair, and hot button regional prejudices.

With powerful portrayals by its stellar cast of experienced and stage-savvy divas, and direction by award-winning director/actor Taylor Kasch, audiences get to enjoy a show that maximizes all the clever, deliciously bitchy and viciously funny potentials the author buried in the script.

The action takes place in the 1970s in the Alamo Theater's Boardroom where elaborate preparations are under way for a traditional opening night reception.

The story spins around a clash between the Alamo Theater's long time artistic director, Dede Cooper (Cynthia Killion), and its principal financial backer, Joanne Remington (Trish Beasley), who has been secretly maneuvering to replace Dede with Shirley Fuller (Ramona Leah), a film actress with a waning career who got her start at the Alamo Theater when it was in a converted church. Remington

plans to make her move at the trustees' post-reception meeting that night.

Also on hand during the preparations are two long-time theater volunteers - Dede's outrageous best friend Bella Gardner (Peggy Steketee), and Remington's assistant who is known as Suits (Paula Maxwell).

In the program each act of the play is given a title. Act I is "The Ambush" and Act 2 is called "The Massacre." The titles are only clues to the scope of the complex intrigue, manipulations, schemes and counter schemes, revelations and alleycat sniping that propel both the plot and the laughter to the final black out.

Although Killion is exceptional as the pivotal character of Dede, and she has the most dialogue that is superbly delivered with a Texas drawl, she is not the star. This is truly an ensemble piece. There are no spear carriers here. The script is so tightly crafted that the show doesn't work unless all the performers are essentially alike in strength. And the cast is equal to the challenge.

As Bella, the theater's blatantly earthy volunteer head of children's theater and Dede's unswerving supporter, Peggy Steketee is loud, overstated and delectable. Equally as loud for her character and the story line are the strong subtleties in Paula Maxwell's sensitive portrayal of the regressive-mannered Suits.

Trish Beasley as the grand dame Remington is appropriately aristocratic, disdainful and distant, while Ramona Leah as Shirley, the actress whose professional opportunities are spiraling into oblivion, is successfully desperate and grasping.

Staged by the Flying H Group, "Ladies of the Alamo" is staged in a sumptuously decorated space in the elegant RE/MAX Gold Coast building, 1500 Palma Dr., Ventura. It is at the corner of Palma Dr. and Valentine Rd., which fronts on U.S. 101 southbound between the exits for Telephone Rd. and Victoria Ave. Performances continue through August 20, 2011 on Fridays and Saturdays at 8 p.m. and Sundays at 2 p.m. Reservations: www.flyinghgroup.com. 201-0566. 
