Redevelopment woes

Last month marked the end of 2011. It also marked the end of something else in Ventura – its Redevelopment Agency. In December, the California Supreme Court dashed many a city official's hopes across the state of the possible continuation of redevelopment agency projects when it made the final ruling upholding the state's right to abolish redevelopment agencies in California.

The task of dissolving Ventura's Redevelopment Agency is being led by Jeff Lambert, community development director for the City of Ventura.

"It's daunting, there is so much work to be done, we're unraveling it all now," said Lambert who has been working closely with city attorneys as well as city officials from other parts of the state to understand exactly what the approach should be. "The good news is we have a fairly small agency, which makes us better off than many other cities in the state."

Each of the approximately 400 redevelopment agencies in California has its own set of implications from loan repayment obligations and staffing issues to land ownership liabilities and future project commitments.

Ventura's Redevelopment Agency owes the city \$5.4 million and owns a handful of properties in the downtown area which will most likely be sold. According to Lambert, the city is currently reconfirming exactly what remaining obligations the Agency has such as contracts with affordable housing developers. Tax accessed monies will most likely pay for the loan back to the city.

As for staffing, Lambert said, "there is likely to be some shifting around but there is no person whose job is defined as having 100 percent redevelopment responsibilities."

As of Feb. 1, all redevelopment agencies for all intents and purposes won't exist anymore. However, because the complexities of unwinding all the components of redevelopment will inevitably take more time, Lambert is working to make the city of Ventura the successor agency. Lambert will formally present this request to the City Council this month.



version of that same show at the Majestic Theatre 14 years ago. Initially announced for two performances only in the 1,400-seat venue, Rubicon's Superstar quickly sold-out, a third show was added, and Rubicon Theatre Company was born. Each performance received a standing ovation. Critics summed up Neeley's performance in one word: "stellar."

Neeley returns to the company with the debut of his new concert, "Ted Neeley and The Little Big Band," an upclose-and-personal musical event which previews January 20, opens January 21, and continues for a limited run through January 29 in Rubicon's intimate 190-seat home in Ventura's Downtown Cultural District.

Council, an oversight committee will be formed to keep an eye on the final tasks of taking the Agency's projects and obligations apart.

"The court was pretty clear that the dissolution of the Agency needs to happen over the next four to five months," said Lambert.

The Redevelopment Agency of the City of Ventura has acted as the city's real estate developer in an effort to spur economic growth. Following a five-year plan, the Agency had been focusing public investment in the city's blighted areas. The Agency worked as a tool for the city to attract and guide private investment with the aim of improving living and working conditions by developing affordable housing, strengthening neighborhoods, building public facilities, creating jobs and expanding businesses. One of the goals of the Agency was to increase revenue for the city by enlarging the overall tax base.

City officials are hopeful that projects such as the Westside Redevelopment project will find a way to continue in a different capacity within the city's purview. How this might be accomplished is more than unclear.

A possible effect on private development companies that worked primarily with redevelopment agencies who were funded by state and federal monies is also unknown.

Gov. Jerry Brown proposed to abolish redevelopment agencies in January 2011 as a way to close a two-year \$25 billion budget state deficit. He intended the money to move from redevelopment and go instead to schools and public safety.

Bilingual babies

The world is getting much smaller, and we are all exposed to multiple languages at an early age. In Ventura not knowing Spanish is a definite disadvantage.

Parents have become more interested in bringing up their children to be bilingual. Studies have shown that children can learn two languages at the same time. In fact, it's better to have them learn two languages than it is for ESL parents to try to speak to their child in English, if they do not know it themselves. The child can always pick up English later.

Opportunities to make a child bilingual abound in our melting pot society. Quite often, a baby's caregiver will speak a language other than English as their native tongue. Parents can safely encourage the caregiver to speak in his or her own language so that the baby will pick it up.

Parents are also forming study groups and enrolling their young children in foreign language classes. Children under the age of ten learn a new language in the same ways that they learned their original language, so it is much easier for them. They also speak each language as a native, without an accent.

Children enjoy knowing more than one language. It can widen their social circle at a young age, when communication with other children is so important. Being bilingual can cut across social barriers as well.

Do you think learning one language is enough for a baby's mind to process at once? Studies have shown that being bilingual was an advantage. Research has shown that children who are bilingual do as well or better as monolingual children in tests in high school.

In an Italian study, testing 7-month old babies, it was found that the babies who were brought up with more than one language had definite advantages. They showed improved executive function, which measures picking the right tool for the right operation. In this basic process, the brain switches from one learned response to another as situations change. Monolingual babies develop this ability later in their young lives.

Bilingual babies learn to distinguish the different languages at a young age. Monolingual babies learn the same thing, but later on. The study's findings did not show that babies who were bilingual were more intelligent; just that they learned some things at an earlier age.

Local Bands unite to raise funds for Typhoon Victims

On the evening of December 16, 2011, a typhoon hit Northern Mindanao (Philippines) with heavy rains and flashfloods destroying several communities. Within 3 days, 1,000 people were known to have died, 15,000 were missing and over 167,000 individuals and 20,000 families had been displaced. Death counts have continued to rise as a result of one of the worst incidents of flooding the country has ever had.

Over the past 3 weeks, several residents of Ventura County have united to donate, collect and pack over 100 boxes of clothing, foods, and toiletries through a donation center set at Mary Star of the Sea Church in Oxnard. Monetary donations of \$4,300 were also collected. On Wednesday, Jan. 4, volunteers dropped off the care boxes to a Los Angeles based international shipping company - LBC Express Foundation to be shipped to the Philippines and distributed in the hardest hit areas.

With a goal to raise \$10,000, the fundraiser continues as five bands from Ventura County join together



know by now a major part of the implementation of the Downtown Parking Management Program has been the installation of the

very controversial paid parking meters in the downtown core area. It has been about 15 months since the parking meters were installed.

Their stated goal is improving the flow of downtown traffic and opening up more spaces in front of shops and restaurants. The meters also are meant to pay for increased police patrols and other services downtown.

On January 9, the City Council, on a vote of 5-2 (Council members Andrews and Monahan were the 2 voting no for various reasons) approved minor amendments to the Parking Management Program (final reading will be on Jan. 23 and the changes will probably take place on Mar. 1)) that reduced the cost of parking on the metered side streets, where use is much lower than on Main and California Streets from \$1.00 per hour to 50 cents per hour The affected streets would be Fir, Chestnut, Oak and Palm.

In approving the changes Deputy Mayor Cheryl Heitman stated that ""It's good that the plan can be flexible and we can try something new in order to make it work for the benefit of all."

They also approved the creation of a business owned vehicle parking permit program for the downtown parking district area to allow for business owned vehicles to park in parking lots overnight or in exception to the 4-hour restriction in some parking lots and structures. Several council members questioned as to how this will be implemented and verified that the vehicles are owned by downtown merchants and used for business. Council member

As you certainly Andrews also felt that the \$20 permit know by now a fee was ludicrously low and should be major part of the more in the \$200 range.

Tom Mericle, the city's transportation manager stated that "We've always allowed that informally, and waived tickets when they've occurred, and this is just a way for us to formalize that".

The goal of the Downtown Parking Management Program was to have 85% of the spaces full during peak weekend hours, a recent study shows that this is being achieved on main and California (about 95%) but not on the side streets (about 66%).

It is felt that reducing the price on side streets from \$1 to 50 cents an hour will increase the parking on these streets. Parking on Main and California streets would remain at \$1.00 per hour.

Kevin Clerici, Executive Director of Downtown Ventura Partners, and a member of the Parking Advisory Committee, said that the DVP supports the changes.

He said "The spots on Main are the premium spots and you get to choose if you want to pay more to park in them. If you don't, you just have to walk a block."

Personally instead of parking on the side streets why not park on Poli for free and also get a little exercise walking downtown?

Clerici said many downtown merchants are happy with the meters and are seeing faster turnover on the spaces in front of their stores, which brings more customers inside.

To explain the new changes new stickers will be placed on the pay stations.

The city is also working on new ways to mark the curb space numbers more permanently because the number are wearing off and are getting very difficult to read and if you enter the wrong space number you could get a ticket.

And something that I learned is that cars with handicap designation can park at the meters spaces and the green marked 24 minute spaces all day for no charge.

As 2012 starts allow me to offer a challenge to our community. That is for us to move past our failures to success. The failure I am speaking of is our community's lack of year round, well managed, 24/7 shelter. For at the moment we fail in two ways - rather dramatically.

The first is where we are failing to respond properly to what is a clear, present, and urgent need for well managed, year round, 24/7 shelter. I am aware that such shelter will not be a magic wand that will resolve all issues related to poverty or homelessness.

And the second way where we are failing is to reflect the true heart of this community, where I have lived since 1991. I long ago lost count of the number of people and businesses, who are more than willing, to actively participate and contribute to addressing identified needs in our community. Be it NAMI or Turning Point or Project Understanding or the local community councils, and so many others. I have witnessed again and again businesses and

residents who, most often without fanfare or recognition, express the "where am I needed?" and "where can I contribute?" outpouring that is so much a part of this community of San Buenaventura.

It's hard to believe that 2011 is already over. I've been writing this column for a year now and it seems that I have so much to share and so many wines I want to talk about.

So, what I want to do is put 2011 behind me with my thoughts of what I have learned and accomplished in my wine world. Though I am retired, I still have had the luxury this year of visiting several wineries in my travels and going to many wine tastings through the wine trade. I have been fortunate to taste close to 1000 wines throughout the year and have formed opinions on several of

What I have tried to do in this article is list one or two of my favorite wines, by varietal or country that I have found to be reasonably priced, easy to find, and not break the pocket book. While these may not be the best wines in each category, I have found them to be some of my go to wines. These wines listed are available at fine retailers in Ventura, and I will list the retailers later.

My favorite NEW winery is DAOU winery in Paso Robles. They are the highest elevation winery in Paso, and make outstanding French style Cabernets and Rhone style reds and whites. Situated high above the valley off Adelaida Road, this is a must visit winery.

My second favorite new winery is right here in Ventura! Four Brix winery opened three months ago on Eastman Avenue. Please go and support them, as they have very good wines that you can taste AND purchase there. They are also part of the Ventura Wine Trail.

My pick as "Wine of my year" is: La Serre Nuove '09 by Ornellia

Dillon's Dining

Cafe Fiore

Cafe Fiore, located at 66 California Street in Ventura, is one of many family owned businesses in the Downtown Ventura area; it offers an extensive menu of unique Italian fare. The restaurant is owned and operated by Anna and Maria Fiore, first generation Americans with ancestries from Bari, Italy.

Café Fiore is a beautiful restaurant featuring exposed beams that draw your eyes up to the vaulted ceilings. The plush pillow-lined booths make for a very comfortable dining experience. Guests waiting for a table can enjoy their time next to the fireplace and exposed brick walls. An oversized wine case compliments the exposed kitchen with copper accents and a cozy patio with soft lighting is perfect for enjoying a warm California evening outdoors. The interior is skillfully decorated with an "at home" feel; however, the massive bar is the first thing guests see when entering through the front door. Most guests seem to enjoy the bar, as it offers a full menu, excellent martinis, and extensive wine list; however, it does obstruct the view of the attractive dining room hiding right behind it. I love to enjoy a drink while waiting for a table, but I feel this coliseum sized bar distracts from the open kitchen and dining room.

My multiple visits to Fiore have included a variety of service experiences, ranging from great to below average. Most servers are quick to welcome you and eager to explain the specials of the evening, while some servers seem uninterested and neglect to mention the specials. Inconsistent service aside, one thing that remains consistently good at Fiore is the delicious artigiano bread and tapenade provided after seating. Like chips and salsa at a Mexican restaurant, you're very likely to overindulge in this starter, so pace yourself. Fiore offers a moderately priced menu with an abundant selection of salads, homemade pastas, pizzas, vegetarian, and meat dishes. Fiore also offers a "Spa Menu" for those of you watching your waistline. Italian cuisine varies significantly based on the region of origin and the menu offered at Fiore has obvious traces of its southern roots. Most recently, I enjoyed the Agnolotti di Pollo e Spinaci (Homemade ravioli stuffed with roasted chicken and spinach in a cherry tomato olive oil sauce tossed with melted burrata cheese - \$16). The ingredients were fresh, the ravioli perfectly cooked, and the dish seasoned well. My guest ordered the Osso Buco con Risotto alla Milanese (Braised veal shank in a vegetable red wine sauce over a creamy saffron and parmigiano risotto - \$27) The veal was presented nicely and was extremely tender; however, I felt it was a bit dry and under-seasoned. I think the food is priced appropriately, but the inconsistent service could motivate me to say it's slightly high.

If you're interested in a side of "club scene" with your Italian food, Fiore also offers the Tree House Lounge, located adjacent to the main dining room. The Tree House Lounge boasts "hip DJs", private cabanas, and bottle service in a romantic setting.

All things considered (beautiful

dining room, extensive menu, full bar, club lounge, and service), I give Cafe Fiore 3 ¾ forks rating. Additional attention to food and service consistency will easily raise Fiore to a four fork rating.

Cafe Fiore is open for lunch daily from 11:30am to 3:00pm, dinner Monday – Thursday from 5:00pm to 10:00pm, Friday – Saturday from 5:00pm to 11:00pm, and Sunday from 5:00pm to 9:00pm. Contact 653-1455 for reservations.

Improvements at the Ventura County Fairgrounds

The Ventura County Fairgrounds looks back at 2011 as a year of progress and improvement. Under the leadership of a 9-member board of directors, led by president Jan Berk and Vice President Leslie Cornejo, events and improvements were designed and implemented to benefit and enhance the Ventura County Fairgrounds for our community.

The annual Ventura County Fair has been a tradition in the county since 1875. The Fair theme for 2011 was "The Bounty of the County". The Fair showcased local talent and the fruits of labor proudly entered for competition and exhibited by more than 5,000 Ventura County residents. 14-year-old Amanda Zavala from Thousand Oaks was chosen as the artist for the official Fair Poster. Visitors to the 2011 Fair witnessed the birth of a calf, learned about Ventura County Agriculture and enjoyed free concerts.

The fair infused Ventura County with thousands of people including ride operators, food vendors, entertainers, animal owners and fun seekers who stayed for more than 12 days, all the while spending money on hotel rooms, local restaurants, gas, animal feed, clothing, medical needs, food and more. The local taxes generated by the fair exceeded \$1 million. Hundreds of Ventura County residents were offered employment for the summer. Ventura County benefits every year from the multi million dollar spending that comes in August.

Surfer's Point is the pride of the Ventura County Fairgrounds. The legendary beach and bike path were restored and restructured to protect against the wrath of the seasonal ocean storms. Together with environmental and government organizations the eroded bike path was moved farther inland from the coast and rebuilt with an attractive design that includes seating and a rock garden. It was designed to serve the community safely and beautifully for years to come.

The Fairgrounds Main Entry Plaza project, presented by the Ventura County Fair Foundation is a fundraising effort, which began in early 2011. The project serves to beautify the Fairgrounds while inviting the community to be a part of the Fairgrounds forever. Continuing into 2012, paving bricks are beautifully personalized with the names of friends, neighbors and loved ones, and laid out in a decorative fashion at the Main Entry to the Fair. For generations people will read the names and remember. The Ventura County Fair Foundation is a volunteer organization dedicated to raising funds to maintain and beautify the Fairgrounds.

Construction of a new 38,000 square foot Livestock facility began this year. Named after a native son, the Judge William


He is determined to drive forward the club side of the Fusion youth programs since taking over in November.

Butter side up -Hal Wilder, Jr.'s life!

Most people in their 90s like to relax and enjoy their retirement. Not so Hal Wilder, Jr. He's so busy that it's difficult to get him to stop and talk about his life. He's out in the community on a daily basis making a difference in so many people's lives.

As he notes, "Let's just say that I have always been lucky. Not so much in big things. When things could turn out either way, it usually falls my way. When I have need, it seems, I usually meet the right new friend. First off, take my selection of parents. They were smart, happy people. Each came of industrious stock and they were industrious themselves. I guess they were 20th Century examples of the "upper middle class". They were basically middle of the road philosophically. I think they were both just naturally generous, but I know they were also brought up to consider others, not only with tangibles, but with ideas and points of view. So, I started out with very good luck."

In July of 1941, he was recruited to go to work at the Iowa Ordnance outside of Burlington. After training, he became Senior Shift Inspector at only 23 years old but in 1942, he signed up in the Aviation where his entry into the combat zone in the European Theater was delayed by some 18 months.

Hal wound up in the hospital with a mild case of spinal meningitis in June of 1944 after he had finished his training as a combat crew but before he could be shipped out. This saved his life as the crew went to England without him where they were shot down with only one survivor who ended up as a POW for the duration of WWII.

In the summer of '43, on a blind date with Rosie Naumann he found himself proposing marriage before the night ended. They married in February '44 where he began a career in sales. They settled in Illinois and then moved to Ventura County back in the 1970s. After more than half a century honeymooning, Hal lost his beloved Rosie in February, 2000.

As Hal puts it, "Now, I'm broke and living in the CalVet Home in Saticoy. I keep busy with writing books, LA Workout, volunteering on the Tall Ship, Bill of Rights, St. Pauls Episcopal Church, and the Brain Injury Support Group (where he leads a workshop on memory resoration). Additionally, he joined the Ventura Power Squadron in 1977, and am now a past Commander. "I served as Chairman of the Public Boating course for 12 years and have served in almost every position in VPS."

Stephen Taylor, captain of the Bill of Rights, says, "Hal is a compassionate, dedicated, and caring member of our team. He's patient to a fault and has a sly sense of humor that helps relax nervous sailors. Once you meet him, you can never forget him."



■ Having a cat is sure less expensive then having a dog. I like toys that I can run around with in my mouth and ones that squeak and with Savana just take some aluminum foil and roll it in a ball and she is as happy as a kitten (just doesn't know what she is missing).

And how do you tell if a cat is deaf they don't come when you call them anyway?

■ I recently asked Sam Mazzotta (from King Features) the following question.

Question: In my column I always have several rescue dogs and I know that they are very well taken care of but I recently read a news story about several dogs rescued from horrible conditions in a "puppy mill". The shelter caring for these dogs is not immediately putting them up for adoption, and it said there will be stricter requirements for those who want to adopt them. Why is this?

Answer: Scamp, many shelter pets come with their own special set of behavioral quirks, often due to the stress and trauma of being abandoned at a shelter. But dogs (and cats and other pets) that suffer especially traumatic situations, such as abuse or starvation or neglect, can have a very difficult time adapting to home life. Because of this, many shelters have developed special policies regarding these rescues. As you read, the puppymill dogs were not immediately put up for adoption; they're being treated and evaluated. Some may never be considered safe to adopt.

Once dogs are considered healthy enough to adopt, the shelter is following guidelines to make their transition to a new home as smooth

On January 21-22 the as possible. For instance, it may not allow a puppy-mill rescue to go to a home that has kids under age 10. First-time pet owners will likely be discouraged or outright not allowed to adopt. Adopters may need to attend special classes, and the shelter may ask to make follow-up visits to the dog's new home.

Many rescues need a great deal of one-on-one attention, love and patience. If you're an experienced dog owner, meet the guidelines and are willing to take on the challenge of rehabilitating a rescued dog, go for it. But if you're not sure, then consider very carefully whether your family is ready to care for a rescued pet.

■ Because I always have a CARL dog to adopt I asked Sharon Clark, Executive Director Canine Adoption and Rescue League (CARL) to comment on this.

This is her answer:

"Scamp, it is a sad fact that dogs in puppy mills suffer deprivation in many ways. Dogs are pack animals and when a dog is isolated by being kept in a kennel or chained and required to have litter after litter of



puppies the dog suffers. Puppies born in puppy mills do not receive the individual attention and stimulation critical for them to develop emotionally and physically. They may not learn to bond to people. When



film look and created an artful modern day romantic comedy, still keeping with the period's character and artistic palate.

Jean Dujardin plays George Valentine a handsome and popular silent movie star, a Rudolph Valentino look -a-like. As the era of big business in the motion picture industry starts changing, so does the production climate and it takes a turn toward talkies, a genre the audiences are vying for and for George it's a sad reality that the silent films are fading, and finds out his talents are no longer a viable money making or entertainment draw.

Berenice Bejo plays Pepper Miller, an assertive dancer, feisty and friendly who bumps into George at auditions and pretty much every where George goes. Feelings are mutual as flirtations lead to George's marriage crumbling and as his life takes a drastic turn, and peppy comes to his rescue.

Shot in black and white typical of Hollywood classics, The Artist has touching nuances of humor and sensitivity with real heartwarming and inspirational power, coupled with frequent surprises.

Once you got through the tension of the barbaric war scenes, the actual sentimentality and likeability of the characters stood out. 





Set in Baltimore, Maryland in 1962, "Hairspray" chronicles teen Tracy Turnblad, a plus-sized dynamo with big hair and big dreams about getting on an after school dance show broadcast from a local TV station. The show tackles the tricky themes of respect, racism, prejudice, intolerance and teen angst. It is a full-out toe-tapping musical filled with memorable songs and outstanding performances.

The Simi Valley production we attended Sunday afternoon played to a capacity house of enthusiasts. Codirected by Fred Helsel and choreographer Becky Castells, the show proceeds full steam ahead from the first musical notes. The pace is well met by the stellar cast with live music provided by musical director Gary Poirot and orchestra. Poirot also carries double-duty as the company wig master, no small task for this production.

The Simi Valley cast features Jamie Whittington Studer in the lead role of Tracy whose seemingly boundless talent is evident as she (and her hair) bounces endlessly to the beat of the 60's. Bart Sumner, in the traditionally genderbent role of Tracy's mother, Edna, is a hoot throughout. He and milquetoast husband Wilbur (John Dantona) are charming in their duet "You're Timeless To Me." The part of snarky Velma VonTussle is given exquisite definition by Sandra Moreau, who shares the role with Michele McRae the last few weeks of the run. Tracy's love interest, Link Larkin, is played with wide-eyed perfection by Andrew Allen.

Laughs are plentiful as the action zips along. The first act is a little long due to the sheer volume of musical numbers. Nonetheless, the action never drags as the audience seemed eager to get back from intermission to continue the journey. The material, while suitable for all ages, will resonate most with those familiar with the era and its ensuing challenges.

Shawn Lanz, director of the High Street Arts Center production, has assembled an equally large cast that features a number of Ventura and Ojai residents, as well as some seasoned pros.

No matter whether you attend the production in Simi Valley or Moorpark, you will be sure to enjoy yourself. The two companies are working cooperatively and even offer a discount in their programs for the other company's show. Treat yourself – go see both!
