

Ventura looks to jump-start building projects

Last month the Ventura City Council made the decision to look into temporarily ending an ordinance that makes downtown developers include affordable housing in all new projects. The rule, which will suspend the law for five years if approved, is the city's "downtown inclusionary housing ordinance" which currently requires 15 percent of all new units be affordable residences – for both rental and for-sale properties.

A similar ordinance–applying to for-sale units only–for other parts of the city would stay in place. The move is being made in an effort to jump-start building projects downtown and, in part to push affordable housing to other parts of Ventura. The council voted 5-2 to have city staff develop a program for later approval after council members Christy Weir, Cheryl Heitmann and Brian Brennan proposed the idea.

City staff was also directed to make recommendations on creating a "rapid rehousing" fund and program that developers would contribute to in lieu of including low-income housing in their projects.

Councilmembers who proposed the modification cited a weak economy as a main reason for the ordinance change.

"The cost of building downtown is a lot tighter than it used to be just a handful of years ago," said Community Development Director Jeff Lambert. "A condo that might have sold for \$600,000 may only be worth \$350,000 in today's market – this means the developer needs to reduce costs."

According to Lambert there are a number of approved projects downtown that won't be built until developers figure out a way to cut costs.

Lambert admitted this change won't solve every problem developers face.

In their proposal, council members Weir, Heitmann and Brennan argued that downtown has more than its share of affordable housing with 38 percent of current downtown units falling in Continued on page 4

Bus driver booked for DUI


A school bus, driven by 54-year-old Joanne Madaule, fatally struck a 75-year-old pedestrian, Marguerita McIntosh, on Wednesday, Sept. 26. The accident occurred at Woodland Street and Brook-

shire Avenue. Madaule has been working for the VUSD for 15 years.

The bus was carrying less than 15 elementary school students at the time.

Don McPherson named new Ventura City Fire Chief

The City of Ventura has named Don McPherson its new Fire Chief. The 32-plus year veteran has completed assignments in most disciplines within the Ventura Fire Department and for the last three years has served as Assistant Chief.

"Working with other departments and creating relationships is important to me," McPherson said. "We will look at ways to provide the best service we can with the resources we have. We will continue to evaluate how we do what we do and if there is a better way now or in the years ahead, we will pursue it."

McPherson began serving the local community at the age of 15 when he worked in the Youth Conservation Corps (YCC) in Rose Valley and then at Point Mugu State Park. He also did seasonal work with California State Parks and started with the Ventura City Fire Department as a reserve in 1980 at the age of 18.

Don was hired as a full time Ventura Firefighter in March 1981. He was promoted to Fire Engineer in 1987, Fire Captain in 1991, Battalion Chief in 2002 and has been Acting Chief since the retirement of former Chief Kevin Rennie this past June. In addition, McPherson has completed assignments in almost all disciplines within the Ventura Fire Department including several years working with the joint Police/Fire Continued on page 9



the affordable housing range. Housing Authority CEO Denise Wise understands the city's need to rethink its strategy in the face of a changing economy and is interested to see how the recommendations and programs will unfold.

Wise pointed out that affordable housing has traditionally been concentrated downtown because it is where the majority of services and transportation hubs are located.

"The further you push affordable housing out the more difficult it is to get to services many low-income residents need," added Wise.

Wise is also concerned about the fact that with this change there will be no requirement for low-income rentals anywhere in the city.

"The 15 percent requirement outside downtown applies only to for-sale units," said Wise. "And, let's be honest, very few people who are looking for low-income housing are in a position to buy today."

Wise acknowledged developers are currently stretched but believes there will always be complaints from these groups when it comes to costs.

"A developer will always make the argument that it will 'cost me more' to do this," said Wise. "I submit it's the cost of doing business."

The second component of the proposed change includes creating a pool of money to help with homeless issues that plague downtown.

"We are at the very beginning stages of developing what a rapid rehousing program might look like for Ventura," said Lambert. "But the idea is to get people off the streets and into housing faster."

It is common for rapid rehousing programs to provide monies for deposits and first and last month rents for individuals and families. Programs can be tailored to target specific groups of homeless people. For example, some are designed to help the working homeless others for families in particular.

The proposed ordinance would apply to projects that received a building permit after Aug. 1. City staff is expected to come back to the council next month to gain permission to hire a consultant. Final plans aren't expected to be voted on until the new year.

Lambert said a consultant would help determine how much of a fee should be accessed from developers for a program like this. Lambert also said the process for developing recommendations and a rapid rehousing program will include input from a number of city stakeholder groups.

Wise is eager to participate.

"This is definitely an opportunity for a more comprehensive strategy," said Wise. "As long as everyone understands while the economy may have changed, the need for affordable housing is still there."

This rare, unidentified species (not the sea creature previously featured in the Breeze) tends to rear its head in Ventura County's local waters in the fall, about the same time as the 11th annual SAILATHON to benefit CAREGIVERS: Volunteers Assisting the Elderly on Oct. 14.

At times, the "Ugly Fish" has been mistaken for the blue whale, which also has been spotted off the Channel Islands, but the distinct colors of the "Ugly Fish" give reason to believe that it is not part of the musculus species.

"I hear it's good eatin'" said Capt. Stephen Taylor of the tall ship, Bill of Rights, who is also participating in this year's SAILATHON. "Just take the eyeballs out and you'll have the key ingredient for an excellent ceviche."

Multihull, monohull, paddleboats, power boats and canoes will assemble off the Ventura Pier in Pierpont Bay on Sunday, Oct. 14 for the 11th Annual SAILATHON vying for a glimpse of the "Ugly Fish."

Charrette reveals potential

The neighborhood around lower Seaward has a quaint small town feel to it. But for those who live there, it also has its problems. Traffic congestion, limited parking, hazardous cycling, and heavy pedestrian traffic. What's more, most local residents agree that the business district could use a facelift.

All this was on the mind of Seaward residents and a group of students and professional advisors connected to the Ventura College Architecture Program. They had been invited by the Pierpont Neighborhood Council last June to take a crack at envisioning a redesign during a three-day charrette called "The Lower Seaward Design Workshop."

After months of compiling the data and creating a series of drawings and maps, the students revealed their hopes for lower Seaward during the Pierpont Council's monthly meeting on Tuesday, September 18.

The charrette was overseen by local architect-instructor Curtis Cormane, Nick Deitch of Mainstreet Architects, and Dale Jaetke, the Community Development Chair for the Pierpont Community Council.

Cormane believes the charrette was important because it encouraged community input and the potential for quick and decisive action. "One of the missing elements in trying to redesign this area as an academic exercise is working with clients and resolving issues that are real," said Cormane. "One of the exciting things about this was that students could do it with the public in a quick fashion, in a period over three days."

For Deitch, redesigning the lower Seaward area is both unique and difficult. "Lower Seaward is very distinct and very identifiable, like a village," he said. "That's part of its richness and part of its challenge."

8 students and local professionals worked on the project. Four of them were at the council meeting to make their presentation. They included Caroline Raftery, a Ventura College architecture student who previously attended Cal Poly San Luis Obispo to study city planning; Tana Hayes who owns a local landscape firm called Syndicate Design Group in midtown; Kathleen Middlebrooks, an environmental research management student at Ventura College; and Janina Mancilla, a graduate of the Ventura College architectural program.

For each student, the opportunity to participate in the charrette was a chance to make a tangible difference in their community. "It functioned on two levels," said Middlebrooks. "It provided the design forum for the community council as well as a learning experience for students."

Mancilla enjoyed the chance to talk to people about what they wanted to change in their community. "It was a very enlightening experience to be able to work with the community, especially a smaller community, because there was a lot of interaction and reaction," she said.

Raftery was excited about having the opportunity to put her classroom skills to work. "I have a background in planning from Cal Poly," she said, "and I was able to apply what I learned there while getting my degree in the city I'm from."


The group provided a series of slides that outlined the redesign of the beach, local business fronts, the streets, and the beach area at the end of Seaward.

According to Hayes, the goal in mind was to include a "multifunctional area" at the end of Seaward that would be more enjoyable and include such things as trees, a fountain, an expanded play area, and various public art works.

The charrette was intended to allow for creative discussion and to encourage residents to move forward with community improvements. "People prioritized and gave us their boundaries and realized what was more important and feasible to them," said Raftery.

With these ideas on the table, the Pierpont Council will work together over the coming months to create their own presentation and, at some point in the future, share their ideas with the Ventura City Council.

The members of the charrette are excited to see what will come out of that discussion. As Raftery stated, "This is not the end of the story."

the vagrants/transients out of the Ventura Riverbed and they end up in the downtown area, on the promenade, in the State Beach Park, on Pierpont Beach and in the Santa Clara Riverbed. I cycle daily and am seeing exactly this. Hopefully, organizations like Project Understanding can help the truly homeless with a hand up and get them out of their situation but I am very concerned about all the others (the transients and the vagrants) causing problems in our community.

Also, it was nice for the County to cough up \$100,000 to put some of these individuals in motels but I truly hope they all aren't ending up in Ventura motels since most are in the downtown and midtown area. Hopefully, they are being spread throughout the county. But what are the chances that this is being done? Slim and none. Also, temporary stop gap measures often become permanent stop gap measures, meaning these individuals instead of being placed in permanent housing simply end up filling our downtown motels for a long time and loitering in our parks as they do now. Both the City and County should have been dealing with this situation all along. It has never been legal to camp in the riverbeds. By never taking action they are complicit in creating an environment where Ventura has more homeless/transients than any other City in the county including Oxnard which is almost twice as big. The City and County still don't really have a plan in place to deal with the issue as far as I am concerned. Next we will be hearing about a huge Santa Clara Riverbed cleanup because of the threat of a \$25,000 a day fine(by the State) because that environment is being destroyed and the shell game will continue.

It is just as illegal to camp in the Santa Clara riverbed or on Pierpont Beach as it is in the Ventura Riverbed. Why not enforce the laws? When you don't, you are complicit and basically condoning this type of behavior. And no one should be under the illusion that these transients are all from the Ventura or even California. They are here for the weather just like the rest of us. Simply put our City and County are supporting a lot of individuals that aren't even from here. And don't think just because someone is "living off the land" they aren't costing our local government lots of money. Think about all the police, fire, environmental cleanup that these individuals are using. I have heard from a reliable source that it costs almost as much to support these individuals "living off the land" as it would to house them.

Most were older and had lived in the river for years.

Many had significant physical health issues – cancer, back/knee injuries.

This effort could not have taken place without all the extensive pre-planning efforts, leadership, financing and partner collaboration that was created and continues to develop in addressing one of our greatest community challenges. At each step of this process, adjustments were constantly made as needed, dates shifted to accommodate other issues and a willingness to evaluate as we moved forward keeping a very complicated process moving. Additionally, I know there were many "behind the scenes" people who worked extensively to facilitate this effort and bring us to the point. We will continue this process and keep everyone posted to next steps once they are in place.

Calote worked her way up through various low-wage jobs while attending college, including positions selling popcorn in a movie theater and working as a billing clerk in a hospital. She remembers taking a break from "washing dishes in a restaurant when they announced that man had landed on the moon." Anxious to complete her education, she took extra classes each quarter and graduated a year earlier than scheduled in the subject field of sociology. While she had an excellent academic background, she found that there were few jobs for which she was qualified, putting her at a personal crossroads.

At the time, there was a nation-wide shortage of librarians. Although working in a library had not been her ambition, she wanted to find meaningful employment and so she went back to school to obtain her master's degree in library science. By the time she finished her degree, the shortage of librarians had disappeared, but after sending out many applications, Calote was still able to find a job at San Bernardino Valley College as a reference librarian.

Calote worked her way up and eventually landed a job as Library Director, then Dean, and then Vice President of Instruction. During this time, she married her husband, an art history teacher and her college boyfriend, and they eventually had two children. And true to the family tradition, both of her children grew up to be public school teachers.

In 2005, Calote was selected for presidency of Ventura College. Since then, she has worked with the Ventura College Foundation on the Ventura College Promise program, which underwrites the first year of enrollment fees for recent high school graduates. Assisting in the development of this program has been a highlight of her professional career. She

is especially gratified by evidence that shows that students who participate in the Promise program persist in their education at approximately twice the rate of their counterparts who are not in the program. A variation of this, the Ventura College Corporate Promise, was initiated by Ann Deal (A Face Of Ventura) and Fashion Forms, which underwrites enrollment fees for all interested employees in Deal's organization.

The last few years have been challenging ones for community colleges, especially as financial constraints have made it necessary to make difficult choices about which classes Ventura College can afford to offer. Calote says she has been impressed by the ability of the faculty and staff to join with her "in finding solutions to live within our means," and that she has "enjoyed working with the college community to address the many challenges that have faced us."

We asked her what she likes most about

Johanna was easy to talk to and overall it was a very positive and pleasant experience!



On Monday, October 8th, from 10 am-1 pm at the Marriott Courtyard, 600 E. Esplanade Drive in Oxnard, the Health Insurance Counseling and Advocacy Program (HICAP), County of Ventura Area Agency on Aging, will be hosting a Medicare information event for 2013.

Medicare beneficiaries, pre-Medicare beneficiaries, Medicare disabled and caregivers will have the opportunity to meet and discuss all their Medicare plan options for 2013 at this free event. No reservations are required – you just need to show up!

Everyone attending will be able to fill out a Part D Plan worksheet for a free, unbiased Part D comparison of three prescription plans for next year. HICAP will be there to help participants with their worksheets.

The Medicare Advantage Plans attending are: Aetna Medicare Select Plan, Anthem Blue Cross PPO, AARP Medicare Complete (Secure Horizons), Kaiser Permanente Senior Advantage, Physicians Choice Medicare Plus, and SCAN Classic.

HICAP Program Manager, Katharine Raley, notes, "The representatives from each of these plans will be able to go over all the changes seniors can expect to find for next year. In addition to professionals from the insurance companies, other resource representatives attending will be: Medi-Cal Eligibility & Veteran Services, of the Ventura County Human Services Agency,

Gold Coast Health Plan (Medi-Cal payer), Livingston Memorial Nursing Association and Hospice, Grey Law Legal Services for Elders, and Cal Fresh - the government food assistance program."

Katharine goes on to add, "Ventura County Health Care Agency's Public Health will be administering free flu shots to the first 300 Medicare beneficiaries so you will want to get here early. Also, all participants will receive handouts on all plans, and from all other resources that attend this event. There may be additional resource participants than what I've listed here."

Attendees will be able to talk to professionals about Medi-Cal eligibility, veterans service's available to them, learn whether they qualify for Cal Fresh and talk to the professionals about various health plans available to seniors that work in conjunction to Medicare. There will be a breakdown on what these plans cost and a list of what services are offered to find out which plan best suits each individual.

The Ventura County Area Agency on Aging HICAP program provides free and unbiased counseling to, and advocacy for, Medicare beneficiaries and those who will soon be receiving Medicare. Trained, registered volunteer counselors offer objective information and provide assistance with problems relating to Medicare, Medicare Part D, Medicare Advantage plans, supplemental (Medigap) insurance policies, long-term care insurance, prescription drugs and other insurance issues.





Two on the Aisle

Skyway **Playhouse** takes a shot

Wallowing in dissolution and desperation, a number of misguided souls have felt assassinating the President of the United States would generate the changes they craved when their peculiar views of the American dream were not met.

Assassins, the surreal psychological musical drama by Stephen Sondheim currently playing at the Camarillo Skyway Playhouse, speculates on the forces that might have motivated some in this diverse band of would-be and actual slayers. The group includes John Wilkes Booth (President Lincoln), Charles Guiteau (Garfield), Leon Czolgosz (McKinley), Guiseppe Zangara (attempted FDR), Samuel Byck (attempted Nixon), Lee Harvey Oswald (Kennedy), Lynette "Squeaky" Fromme and Sara Jane Moore (attempted Ford) and John Hinckley (attempted Reagan).

The show, for us, must be viewed from the perspectives of the local offering and the piece itself.

The production values of the Skyway Playhouse production are excellent. The direction is smooth, the use of multi-media and historical film clips is enriching, the lighting and technical touches are effective, and the live musical accompaniment is well modulated for a building that has built-in challenges.

One of the challenges is air flow and large fans are sometimes used.. However, the night we attended most of the dialogue and song lyrics could not be easily heard or understood until the fans were turned off midway through the first act.

The cast boasts a number of strong voices, extensive credits and strong performances. The depth of Julie Bermel's professional experience shines through as her characterization of Sara Jane Moore is both deliciously inept, which makes her scary, and generally a hoot. Alex Choate as 19th Century actor John Wilkes Booth carries the action well. while local stage veteran Jim Seerden is equally impressive as Nixon's would-be assassin. Sam Byck.

Little verifiable information exists about the actual mental status and motivations of most of the slayers. So, the script relies on twisted history and literary license to accommodate the psychological conjecture on which it is grounded. While there is music, none is truly memorable.

The play begins as the assassins from the various eras gather at a shooting gallery somewhere in a state of limbo where each receives a hand gun. In their subsequent exchanges they variously whine, justify, taunt and encourage one another in their perverted missions, each dipping out of the action periodically to take their shot.

Several times the characters aim and fire blanks at the audience. For many having weapons pointed and discharged directly their way may be such an overly dramatic take-away experience that the show's underlying message may be lost or neutralized.

Assassins opened Off Broadway in 1991 for just 76 performances. It didn't

appear on Broadway until 13 years later in 2004 where it had a total run of only 101 performances.

The story takes place in the depression era 1931, in Franklin County, Virginia. This was an era of illegal liquor production run by the bootlegging clan, the Bondurant brothers.

The boys are threatened by a new deputy in town Charlie Rakes (Guy Pearce) whose ruthless, greedy, weasellike character along with other backstabbing authorities wants a cut of the moonshine profits. Pearce is the type of character you love to hate. He is so creepy and obnoxiously relentless. The boys tussle with the Chicago mob until they come out as heroes just trying to survive the changing times.

The film was well cast with Jessica Chastain as the quiet, secretive, waitress taken in by the brothers, quickly becoming entrenched in their lives. Tom Hardy plays the elder brother Forrest Bondurant, who maintains an authoritative, protective appeal. The middle brother Howard, (Jason Clarke) is the silent, crazy one, who you see a lot in the background making faces and howling a lot, and the youngest sibling Jack (Shia LaBeouf) the innocent, love struck, ambitious brother who needs to man-up, seems to get himself stuck in the middle of all the chaos. Real and heartfelt, the chemistry between the brothers gave one the opportunity to easily grow attached to them.

AllGuard Termite and Pest Control

Steve Holt was in another industry when he was told that he could be a game changer in the termite and pest control business.

"Being in residential real estate for 12 years, I've had a lot of first-hand experience with termite companies during that time,"

said Holt, owner of AllGuard Termite and Pest Control in Ventura.

Launched in 2009, AllGuard has four full-time employees, who help Holt carry out a professional and eco-friendly approach to termite and pest control.

wood and subterranean termites. Holt recommends getting a yearly inspection which AllGuard provides for free.

Holt's staff does a 30 to 40-minute on-site inspection and written report. If termites are found on the property, the homeowner will be presented with various treatment options.

"Whenever possible, we use the more green and non-toxic approach to eradicating termites," said Holt.

Among the eco-friendly treatment options that AllGuard offers for killing termites is orange oil, which contains the active ingredient D-limonene, an extract from orange rinds.

Injected into the wood, orange oil moves through porous lumber cells and directly attacks termites. Many homeowners favor this approach, as they don't need to vacate their homes during orange oil treatment.

Timbor is another green treatment option. Featuring borate mineral salt as an active ingredient, Timbor is also used as a pre-treatment option in new construction for termites and other wood-destroying insects.

Approximately 80 percent of All-Guard's business consists of termite eradication while the remaining 20 percent is pest control.

Holt works with at least a hundred realtors in the area spanning Santa Barbara County to West Los Angeles.

Kids' Arts fosters creativity!

Kids' Arts was first conceived of and pursued by Joan Roberts, the current treasurer on the board of directors. This program, further developed by Lynne Thurston, one of the teachers and the president of the board, who comments, "I'm delighted to say this year Kids' Arts celebrates 20 years of providing professional creative arts programs to children from a wide range of socio-economic backgrounds. We're also honored to receive another grant this year from the Ventura Cultural Funding program in support of our service to the community." Another founder, Judy Adams, not actively working with Kids' Arts at this time, is a life-long booster.

Kids' Arts Program Director Jerrica Van Nest notes, "Our teachers are local artists connected to KA by word of mouth and outreach events. We have 6-8 teachers on staff who work on a rotating schedule to offer variety in our classes from week to week. Several families have been participating in our program for many years and have invited their friends and family to join us along the way. We have also had kids referred to our program by teachers and other child educators or some have even found us on the Internet. We typically have between 10-20 kids participating each Saturday. Our program is free of charge but thrives from the donations of money, time and materials from the community."

She goes on to add, "The drop-by nature of our program means that families are free to participate whenever they like - no enrollment is necessary! We have several kids between the ages of five and 14 who have been coming to Kids' Arts for years and participate nearly every week; some join us whenever it works for them! For example, we see a few kids each summer who live out of town or even out of the country. This year saw a Kids' Arts first - a second generation participant. Jennifer P. started attending our program when she was 11 and she now brings her daughter to us!"

The instructors offer a one-hour visual art class and a one-hour performing art class each Saturday between 10am-noon. The kids are divided between the two classes by age group, with each group taking a turn in each class. Kids learn a variety of techniques and projects in the visual arts classes: water color, self-portraits, paper doll and puppet making have been some recent favorites. The performing arts teachers lead classes in storytelling, acting, music, yoga and more!

Thanks to the efforts of local artist and former director, Lynn Okun,

the Art Barn at 856 E. Thompson Boulevard has been the home of Kids' Arts for many years. The staff also organizes field trips of classes off-site. In October there will be a field trip to a puppet-crafting studio and through collaboration with The WAV there will be classes with guest artists at their location every other month.

Jerrica concludes by saying, "Look for us at StoryFest-Ventura Education Partnership's fun family event focusing on encouraging literacy and a love for literature. It's an event not to be missed! It is on Oct. 13 from 9-3 at the Education Service Center located at 255 W. Stanley."

An emergency can happen anytime so be prepared

A medical emergency occurred during the recent Ventura County Kiwanis "Fire Services & Heroes Celebration," which honors Fire Service personnel for meritorious service and citizens for heroic actions. One of the event attendees experienced a sudden and complete airway obstruction during the ceremony. Ventura Mayor Mike Tracy was seated next to the man and, recognizing the man's struggle to breathe, immediately summoned for help.

Fire Captain Ben Davis, being honored at the event as Ventura City Fire Department's Firefighter of the Year, was able to quickly assess and treat the man. Captain Davis first confirmed that the man was choking, then he performed the Heimlich maneuver. After several firm abdominal thrusts, the obstruction was dislodged and the man began breathing again. Since

the man's airway was cleared quickly and prior to losing consciousness, there were no adverse effects to his brain or other vital organs. Brain death occurs in as little as 4 minutes once oxygen delivery stops.

This event heavily underscores the importance of everyone, not just emergency response personnel, being trained and certified in CPR (Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation). The keys to the positive outcome of this event were early recognition and intervention. However, this event is very similar to ones that occur each and every day. The delivery of bystander CPR frequently means the difference between survivability and death during emergencies.

We encourage people of all ages to obtain CPR training. Certification can be obtained through any local CPR training provider, most notably The American Heart Association (www.heart.org) or the American Red Cross (www.redcross.org).

You never know when someone in your presence will choke, suffer a heart attack, or have some other medical or traumatic emergency. The person that you save could be a family member, someone you know...or even a complete stranger. Are you ready to act?
