# New lieutenants arrive at Salvation Army

The new lieutenants for the Salvation Army of Ventura arrived last summer to replace Bill and Tolani Finley. Matthew and Vanessa Jensen moved from the Salvation Army of Santa Maria to assume their responsibilities at the Salvation Army sites in downtown Ventura and on Petit Street.

For Matthew, the journey to get here has been very interesting. He points to 2003 as a particularly important turning point for him. Describing himself as a young man looking for a purpose in his life, he began to attend a local Salvation Army church in Los Angeles. "I had this realization of emptiness," he said. "Then I walked into a Salvation Army church and asked for help."

Matthew found the Salvation Army appealing because the gospel message seemed to resonate with his desire to help the poor and needy. In addition to his work as an ombudsman for Los Angeles County, he began to volunteer his nights and weekends with the Salvation Army in downtown Los Angeles. ## Another McGrath State Beach grand reopening will be necessary


On Saturday, June 30, 2012, in celebration of the grand reopening of McGrath State Beach a free all-day celebration was held to celebrate the completion to upgrade the sewer facilities at McGrath. The work was completed by early summer after many-many months of McGrath being closed because of the sewer problems.

Now, in an ironic twist of nature McGrath's 170 campsites are under 2-4 feet of water. Reservations for the summer that would be filling up for McGrath at this time of the year will not be happening and may not happen for a long time.

This is because the water that spills into the area during winter months from the Santa Clara River would be nearly gone as it drained into the ocean but has not drained this season.

So the irony is that it hasn't drained this year because the sandy berms that allow the water to leave are blocking the water from draining to the ocean. This is because there has not been enough strong rain water this season coming down the river to break through the berms for this to happen so the berms are keeping the water intact.

So a lack of rain has caused 2-4 feet of water to close McGrath.

Youngsters will enjoy making a pine cone owl and playing games to win prizes. The "owl table" will have lots of information about owls including *Continued on page 4* 







to see lives turning around with my simple actions, I just wanted to keep on doing it," he said.

In 2005, someone suggested that he could do this for a living. He admitted that the idea of working full-time with the Army came as a surprise: "I said 'You've got to be kidding me. It sounds too good to be true.'

In 2008, he married his wife Vanessa, who now serves as his fellow Salvation Army partner. They went through officer training together and graduated in June 2011. They currently have two daughters, ages three and one.

In terms of managing the Ventura Army sites, Matthew handles the downtown center and Vanessa handles the church on Petit Street. He preaches on Sundays and takes care of public relations, counseling, spiritual development, community relations, and case management. She deals with the Army's business affairs, human resources, music programs for their youth, their women's ministries, and their partnership with the Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts.

Matthew is beginning to understand the problems that face Ventura as residents and agencies deal with the local homeless population. He's heard about the issue from many different viewpoints, both from the homeless and the non-homeless, and he knows that it's a vexing problem to solve. "I can see the frustration and heartache on each end," he said. "I see many looking for an easy answer and quick fix, but because of the years of frustration, I think it's more of a complex issue that demands grace and patience."

As the local face of the Army, he would like to make clear the Army's central message-that it exists to share the love of God. As he explained: "Because the Salvation Army is about the love of Christ, I feel that many should know why we do what we do, that everything we do is because of our faith."

He's encouraged by the existence of such programs as Homeless to Home and would like to develop similar partnerships that provide for the needs of the poor in holistic and sustainable ways.

He's also impressed by the quality of the Army's staff in Ventura. "I've seen a lot of Salvation Army staff in our days, in our work and with volunteers, but the quality of staff that we see here in Ventura is by far the most professional and compassionate that we've seen, and as the days go on, we consider it more of an honor that we can serve on the team."

They hope to develop some strong links between their ministry and the surrounding area's social service agencies. "Call me or come down to my office," he said, "because we exist for the community."

The development at the site of the former Wagon Wheel Motel and Restaurant in Oxnard has finally broken ground. Whereas I think that Ventura could

certainly use more new development Oxnard is absurd.

The Riverpark Development (just up the freeway) where even now more new construction has started will have 8,000 - 10,000 residents and almost a million square feet of commercial space when completed and occupied.

The 64 acre Wagon Wheel project will include about 1,500 homes, two 25-floor apartment towers, affordable housing, a transportation center and office space.

When these 2 developments are completed, and occupied as many as 30,000-40,000 people will be concentrated in this area and most using the freeway. When this happens we Venturans had better find a new way to go south.

■ Also Wal-Mart doesn't seem to be making much progress at its proposed Victoria Avenue location. The city issued permits to Wal-Mart late last year but it doesn't appear that there is any progress being made in their remodel.

A story in our first issue was titled "Is the devil really coming to Ventura?" that asked are they really coming and that was over 5 years ago so they are sure taking their time.

When they do open I am going to be there with a hidden camera and photograph all of the people that were opposed to them coming to Ventura.

■ The District Attorney's Office has filed misdemeanor involuntary manslaughter charges against a Ventura school bus driver Joanne Maudaule, 53, who is accused of hitting and killing a 75-year-old pedestrian last year. Her arraignment is scheduled this week and because it is a misdemeanor she only faces up to a year in jail.

Maudaule was turning left from Brookshire Avenue onto Woodland Street when her bus struck Marguerita McIntosh on Sept. 26, 2012 as McIntosh was legally crossing Woodland.

This is such a very sad thing that I am not sure it was the correct thing to do.

Ventura County Superior Court Judge Charles Campbell has sentenced Edward Burgess to 36 months of probation for the theft of relics from the San Buenaventura Mission. The judge also ordered Burgess to a residential treatment center and said he will be sent to prison if he violates the terms of his probation which I assume are that he can't steal items from another church for a certain period of time and can only go to church on Sundays.

A Ventura transient Burgess, 26, broke into the Mission Oct. 12 and took nine items, 8 of which have been found and returned.

■ I would like to thank R. Ellis Smith for being one of our most dedicated readers. He was a contributing writer (Ron Rellis Smith) in our very first issue of Oct. 24, 2007 with a riveting article titled "What's a Rabobank?" And after all these years I know that he is still reading the Breeze

because he sends letters to other newspapers commenting on us. So, besides being an avid reader he also gives us nice publicity in other newspapers.

- I have been told that the Fire Marshall has made some exiting requirements for the proposed summer concert series (above city hall) that may put it in jeopardy of happening. I certainly hope that it can proceed because it will bring major entertainers, and tourists here and would be a big shot in the arm for our downtown businesses.
- Our new city manager Mark Watkins will receive a salary of approximately \$260,000. Even though all City Council members approved of his hiring they only approved his contract 4-3.

When invitations for applicants were first published the City Council set the salary rate range of \$160,000 to \$214,000. The salary of previous City Manager Rick Cole was of \$174,000.

The Ventura County Taxpayers Association spoke against approval of the contract because the starting salary was simply too high for an entry level manager and stated that the salary should be started lower and then increased to provide performance incentives and that the contract providing automatic annual Cost of Living Adjustments (COLA) increases during the 3 year term of the contract was wrong.

Many others (including some council members) feel that the automatic COLA adjustments would set a bad precedent when other public union contracts came up for renewal.

Mayor Tracy, Councilman Monahan, Councilwomen Weir and Deputy Mayor Heitmann approved the contract. They stated that this was what needed to be paid to attract a qualified City Manager who would focus on the basics of operations of city government and that the additional expense can be justified by the savings that the new Manager will bring to our budget.

Then interim City Manager Johnny Johnston commented that Mr. Watkins was a good choice.

I certainly hope that the Council is right in saying that he will more than pay for this higher amount. In the meantime we must keep a close eye on how the City Council spends our money.

tial and playground areas, graffiti, etc.

Of great concern to me, and I am sure my neighbors, are all of the Calls for Service in the area in which I live. I pulled a month's worth of VPD Calls for Service records and was surprised to find 33 Incidents along Harbor BL between the Marriott and the Ventura Harbor and 18 Incidents on Seaward between the freeway and the beach. In all there were 101 Calls for Service in the Pierpont and Keys area. 10 rounds were fired in an officer involved shooting at the Motel 6, hopefully none ended up in our residential area. Plus we learned that on average ten transients are living at the Motel 6 on any one day and that the neighbors complain about the Motel 6 tenants on a regular basis describing the place as a zoo. Is it really safe to walk our streets at night....maybe not. If tourists knew about all these incidents would they be reluctant to visit our fair city...probably not. This to me is downright scary. My mother died as a result of this awful disease after living with it for 19 years. 

## Making the Ventura River habitat publicly accessible

On March 21 the Conservation Alliance and member companies Deckers Outdoor, Horny Toad, Patagonia, REI and Vapur, partnered with Ventura Hillsides Conservancy, to remove Arundo and plant Arroyo Willow cuttings to help make the Ventura River habitat publicly accessible. The event marked the first of eight nationwide Backyard Collective events in 2013, providing Conservation Alliance member companies' employees with the opportunity to take action in support of the organization and to get their hands dirty for the sake of conservation.

'The Conservancy has been working with local partners including conservation groups, our city government and social service agencies for over a year to reconnect our community to its river," said Lee Sherman, Development Manager, Ventura Hillsides Conservancy. "The work done by volunteers participating in the Backyard Collective to restore this property will help provide our community with access to some great scenic areas for bird-watching, picnicking and trail running, all within a five minute walk of downtown Ventura."

The Conservation Alliance is an organization of outdoor businesses whose collective contributions support grassroots environmental organizations and their efforts to protect wild places where outdoor enthusiasts recreate. Alliance funds have played a key role in protecting rivers, trails, wildlands and climbing areas.

## A few words about smoke detectors

A properly functioning smoke detector provides the crucial time needed for you and your family to get out of the home when a fire occurs. Unfortunately, however, 33% of American homes are not adequately protected with them. In fact, one and two family dwellings are where 79% of all civilian fire deaths occur, at a staggering national rate of one death every 156 minutes. Exposure to flame is rarely the cause of death in a house fire, the real culprit is exposure to toxic smoke. It takes mere minutes for a home to become charged with deadly smoke and for oxygen to drop below life sustaining levels. The truth of the matter is...smoke detectors save lives.

While one smoke detector goes a long way in adding to your safety, multiple detectors located throughout the house is substantially safer. Placement of your detectors should be strategic. Avoid placing detectors near fireplaces, wood stoves, bathrooms, and kitchens. Detectors can be activated not only by smoke, but by steam and dust as well. Ideally there should be one detector in every room that will be occupied, at the top of each stairwell, and in every hallway. At a minimum, however, one detector should be placed in the hallway adjacent to bedrooms. Avoid placing detectors within 18" of the corner area where walls and ceiling meet, this area is a dead air space where smoke accumulates last. Also avoid proximity to windows, doors, and ceiling fans.

Besides not being present to begin with, there are several common causes of smoke detectors not being successful in preventing tragedy. These causes are batteries being disconnected (to prevent nuisance alarms), dead batteries, obstruction of the detector by debris, or component failure due to age. Instead of removing the battery to silence a nuisance alarm, try fanning the detector with a towel until the air clears. Removing the battery, no matter how good your intentions are to replace it right away, is a recipe for disaster. A detector that is chirping periodically is trying to tell you that the battery is nearly depleted. If you replace the battery and the detector still chirps, it may be malfunctioning and should be replaced. Unless otherwise indicated by the manufacturer, smoke detectors should be replaced every ten


Smoke detectors should be tested regularly by pressing and holding the "test" button, the alarm should sound loudly within a few seconds. A good rule for battery replacement is to do so whenever you adjust your clocks for daylight savings, or every six months. Most smoke detectors that are hard-wired, meaning they operate on household electricity, also have a battery back up and that battery should be replaced on the same schedule.

A smoke detector is an inexpensive insurance policy that can save the lives of you and your loved ones. Take the time to see that your home is properly covered by functioning smoke detectors.

## Emmy winner docks in Ventura

Jack Comeau loves the sea. Originally from Boston, Comeau says that people think Bostonians all talk like the Kennedys. "They could afford their own accent. Boston is different. We save our 'Rs' to use in places where they really count, like at the end of words like 'idea'".

Comeau began his career in New England as a grip on the lighting crew for Jimmy Carter's 1980 presidential campaign. Comeau went on to work with two other presidents: George Bush, Sr., and Bill Clinton. He was also Matt Lauer's lighting director in Boston for a year. Then Comeau worked for WWOR-TV in New York City where he received an Emmy for a nationally syndicated show called New York at Night and was nominated two other times.

Eventually, "like so many other bewildered souls" Comeau moved to LA. "It seemed like the next logical step for my lighting career but, more importantly, it was the place to pursue my true passion of screenwriting." Comeau has written seven screenplays. "I often liken my screenwriting experiences to living the life of Ralph Kramden from The Honeymooners...a 'sure thing, can't miss' adventure would fail spectacularly at the last minute." Comeau was certain that his 1994 epic telling of an historical saga was his ticket to the big leagues. He was even in negotiations with Clint Eastwood's company, Malpaso. Needless to say, 1994 turned into 1995 when James Cameron's Titanic filming began.

Three years ago, Comeau and his wife, Terry, moved to Ventura with their two dogs, Leo and Gina. Together, the couple has five grown children. This was the first place we thought of when it came to moving. Comeau says Ventura has become his favorite place to live because he can hear

the sea from his bed at night and watch it with each morning's coffee. "I like looking out across at the Channel Islands and the constantly changing weather."

Comeau has not given up on writing. His first book, Distress Signal, came out in 2012. "It is a sea-going romantic adventure, set on the tiny island of Nantucket. Half of it is set in the present and half in the 1840s. I try to capture the romance and love I feel for the sea." 

manners when answering the telephone, not everyone who calls you necessarily has good intentions.

According to the U.S. Department of Homeland Security, a recent spate of lottery scams or advance fee frauds originating in Jamaica are targeting seniors and other Americans by telephone.

While the Jamaican and U.S. governments have teamed to tighten laws and combat the problem, it's important to guard against becoming the next victim.

Knowing the difference between legitimate telemarketers and scammers is crucial. Protect yourself by taking the following precautions:

 Never pay money to collect supposed sweepstakes winnings. Legitimate operations won't require you to pay to collect winnings. It's against

U.S. law to play foreign lotteries. If you get a call saying you've won one, it's probably a scam.

- Never wire money to anyone you don't know.
- While we are all taught to use good Ignore unsolicited calls from anyone, even charities and companies with whom you already do business. You have no way to confirm the caller is legitimate. Even caller ID can be faked. When in doubt, just hang up.
  - Place your telephone number on the National Do Not Call Registry. It's fast and free. Visit www.DoNotCall. gov or add your number to the registry by calling 888-382-1222 from the phone you wish to register.
  - Check unfamiliar area codes before returning calls. Be aware that there are many three digit area codes that connect callers to international telephone numbers.
  - If you don't make international calls, ask your telephone provider to block incoming and outgoing international calls.
  - provide anyone Never personal information, such as bank

accounts, pin numbers or Social Security numbers.

- Prevent criminals from accessing your money. Contact your bank, brokerages, as well as the Social Security Administration to add a password to your accounts.
- If callers insist on speaking with you, tell them you'll call them directly. Don't take a number offered by a potential fraudster. You're safer looking up the number independently.
- Scammers often create false deadlines. If you feel pressured, hang up. You've spent a lifetime earning your money. You deserve time to choose how to spend it.
- Help others from falling victim to scammers by warning friends and family. If you've received a call, mail or email you think might be from a scammer, report it to the Federal Trade Commission by calling at 877-FTC-HELP (877-382-4357) or contact local authorities.



## **CAREGIVERS** enlists five sociology students

CAREGIVERS Volunteers Assisting the Elderly recently enlisted the support of five sociology students from California State University, Channel Islands (CSUCI) to explore the impact of the organization in Ventura County, which boasts one of the largest concentrations in the nation of persons over the age of 60.

CSUCI Senior Ana Castro, who worked with a team of four other sociology students last fall, said, "A community can choose to ignore the needs of the elderly or it can choose to work together to find solutions.

"With the senior population expected to double by the year 2050, identifying cost-effective solutions for care is going to be critical in communities across the nation," said Tammy Glenn, executive director for the Ventura County-based CARE-GIVERS. "Our organization is one of the original 25 pilot programs funded by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation in 1984 and I'm proud to tell you that the model has helped

to launch over 500 volunteer care giving organizations across the country!"

Glenn, who also serves on the board of directors for the National Volunteer Caregiving Network and the National Senior Citizens Bureau, notes that the senior population in Ventura County is expected to double by the year 2050. "A neighborly deed, a compassionate phone call, a ride to the grocery store are simple gestures that allow our seniors to continue living independently-with dignity," Glenn said, adding that volunteers and seniors are screened thoroughly to ensure a good fit with the services provided.

"The gift of a few hours, two to four per week, makes a huge impact on the life of our seniors," Program Manager Courtney Darrough said. One of the greatest threats to the elderly is the risk of depression that increases with other illnesses when the ability to function becomes limited. Studies show that major depression in older people rises to 13.5 percent in those who require home healthcare. "We look for qualities on which a senior and their volunteer can build a friendship," Darrough said. "We must be doing something right because we have friendships that last a lifetime at CAREGIVERS. Some of our matches have dated back 20 years!'

CAREGIVERS: Volunteers Assist-ing the Elders was established with start-up grants from the Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet, Trinity Lutheran Church of Ventura, the National Council of Jewish Women, First United Methodist Church of Ventura, First United Methodist Women of Ventura, First Presbyterian Church of Santa Paula, the Ventura County Church of Religious Science, the Aid Association for Lutherans, and Sisters of the Holy Cross.







## **Police Reports**

Police reports are provided to us by the Ventura Police Department and are not the opinions of the Ventura Breeze. All suspects mentioned are assumed to be innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.

#### **Loaded Firearm**

## VPD to conduct VIP Academy

The Ventura Police Department will be conducting their eighth Volunteers In Policing (VIP) Academy. Members of the public are encouraged to apply for the Academy which is slated to begin in mid to late April.

The goal of the VIP Program, which began in 2005, is to increase community member participation and allow volunteers to assist Patrol Officers by responding to non-emergency calls for service, thus enhancing an officer's free patrol and emergency response times. The program has been highly successful with over 67,488 hours contributed by VIP members since the inception of the program.

During the ten-week VIP Academy, participants will take part in a comprehensive training program consisting of traffic and parking enforcement, dispatch and communications training referencing calls for service, patrol procedures, crime scene investigation, school and infrastructure checks, graffiti/vandalism, report writing, and a driver's awareness program.

Once graduated from the VIP Academy members can expect to perform a myriad of duties including downtown and promenade patrols, critical infrastructure checks, school and vacation checks, parking enforcement and other functions.

All VIPs work in teams of two or more, drive a marked volunteer vehicle, and wear the department's VIP uniform, including a badge, flashlight, and police radio.

The requirements for VIP membership include a completed application and interview, a background check, be at least 21 years of age, possess a valid driver's license, be in good physical health, and have the desire to contribute a minimum of sixteen hours per month to the program.


Short videos (30-90 seconds) are preferred, but longer videos are welcome

## Music and Art for Youth awards scholarships

When local musician voice teacher, Jodi Farrell, met music producer, Saint Pierre, it seemed it was more than a coincidence. "I wanted to find a way to assist talented and gifted students who were unable to afford music lessons by performing in a concert to help raise money and Saint Pierre seemed to share that same vision.'

The 2 lifelong musicians come from different musical backgrounds. Much of Saint Pierre's musical knowledge comes from being on the road while Jodi majored in music and became a music teacher and performer. Both, however, know the value of mentoring. At first, they weren't sure how their common vision to help the youth would play out but, in January 2013, the Music and Art for Youth program that they co-founded received 501(c)3 tax status. So far, three local youths have been granted scholarships that include lessons, mentoring, instruments and performance opportunities.

The Music and Art for Youth mission statement says, "We are dedicated to help provide opportunities to nurture our youth to achieve their artistic dreams and goals. We seek out young generation youth with the desire and potential talent in music and art. These extraordinary individuals are financially unable to provide the means to nurture their goals . . . " Youths, ages 20 and under, may be nominated through the organization's website:musicandartforyouth.

Seventeen-year-old Adam Sortomme was awarded a performing art scholarship. Adam plays the guitar and sings. Adam's parents had promised him music lessons. Then his father passed away. Since receiving the scholarship, Adam has performed five times on stage at The Winery Concert

Antonio Barrera, nine years old, was awarded a visual arts scholarship. Antonio is a third grader in Oxnard who creates colored drawings in ink. His professionally framed work titled, "Crystal Dragon" is currently up for silent auction bids at the Panaro Brothers Winery at 4517 Market St.

The latest recipient, nine-year-old Andrew Doyle, received a performing art scholarship to pursue his love of the saxophone. "I started with a toy saxophone," says Doyle, a student at Lincoln Elementary. "Then I was given a real one. I like Ray Charles and Dave Koz. This is pretty much the most exciting thing that has ever happened to me."

Stated Farrell. "We had no idea where it was going, but we begin to work with the kids and moved forward in faith," says Pierre. "We have rehearsals and we handle the publicity—things the average kid can't manage on their own."

The program survives on donations. Local artists are invited to donate their work, which hangs at The Panaro Brothers Winery until the sale. Volunteers are always welcome to help coordinate shows and do administrative work. The program's teachers are compensated, but anyone who wishes to contribute should contact Pierre at email@saintpierre.org.

# Lonesome Traveler returns to the Rubicon


