### The impact of recent homeless policies in Ventura – Part 1

#### by Tim Pompey

In the last year, there's been a noticeable change in policy and approach by the city of Ventura and Ventura nonprofit agencies toward the homeless in the downtown area. This change in approach has been driven by at least two factors.

First, the state of California's Environmental Protection Agency has put pressure on the city and local landowners to clean out the homeless encampments that had thrived for years in the Ventura River.

Under threat of some serious fines, the city, in cooperation with the police department, local nonprofit agencies, and Ventura River land owners, launched a major effort last year to clear out these illegal encampments. For Peter Brown, Community Services Manager for the city of Ventura, that effort has been successful, at least in terms of getting rid of the camps. And while a few *Continued on page 4*


### The new trolley is free, so use it

Downtown Ventura Partners (DVP) led a coalition of business groups to provide a trolley to transport residents and visitors from downtown to the harbor. The trolley will be free for riders and privately operated by DVP. Operation costs will be funded through private contributions and advertising revenue.

Communities have found people enjoy riding streetcars and can be lured from their automobiles by reliable, frequent service on trolleys. Residents and visitors can "jump on" to travel to attractions, restaurants, hotels, stores, office buildings in the downtown and harbor areas for free.

The trolley helps eliminate short auto trips between the beach, downtown, harbor and hotels. Replacing auto trips with trolley trips helps decrease parking demand, traffic congestion, and air pollution. For businesses, the trolley means more customers without the additional parking demand. 

others may have sprouted up, Brown maintains that the city has continued its efforts to keep these camps out of the river. "Success was always defined as the reduction or removal of these permanent build encampments and was never based on this notion that nobody would ever camp in the Ventura River again," he stated. "By those standards, our cleanup efforts have been an undeniable success."

As a follow-up, the city has also launched an anti-panhandling campaign called the safe and clean public places initiative (www. cityofventura.net/page/safe-andclean-initiative). Brown described it as a notion that "all public places are going to be safe and clean for everybody to use."

treatment, before these agencies will allow access to their drop-in center.

In addition, Turning Point and the Salvation Army have helped launch the new Homeless to Home Project that provides housing for the homeless as its first priority.

"We've housed 90 of the chronic homeless over the last year," said Rob Orth, director of social services for the Salvation Army Ventura. "They've been housed locally in low income housing, rehab facilities, sober living facilities, and camps like River Haven. And we've helped some of them simply get a bus ticket and go home."

Orth asserts that rather than make broad and often incorrect assumptions about the homeless, it's important to get to know the client. "Our attitude about it is that we ask each homeless individual: How did you end up in He listed six targeted locations Ventura? What networks do you have where the city has focused its efforts: that can help sustain you living here? South Seaward, Plaza Park, the And depending on what their answers are and what makes sense, then we start exploring the direction for their housing." Brown acknowledged that this change in funding approach as well as a shift in local agency policies toward homeless assistance has had an impact on how the city has dealt with homelessness. 'What I would contend is that the reduction of maintenance and management programs that allow people to live comfortably on the streets or river bottom is consistent with the city of Ventura's hand up not hand out policies," he explained. "But also the federal government's change in policy away from funding temporary solutions and toward finding permanent housing is what's driven the city of Ventura's policy."

The second and perhaps more important factor is the change in funding approach by such federal agencies as the Department of Housing and Urban Development. In the last several years, HUD has moved away from funding emergency services and directed its monies toward providing housing for the homeless.

This change has directly affected the way agencies such as Project Understanding, the Salvation Army Ventura, and Turning Point Foundation are dealing with homelessness.

For instance, Project Understanding and Turning Point now ask that a client agree to accept free services such as housing assistance, drug and alcohol services, and mental health

A sad day for Ventura as the summer concert series won't happen this year.

Before you read this let me say that I posted some of this on our Facebook and

there seems to be a lot of misunderstanding about why I think this is sad for Ventura.

It is not because it is not happening above City Hall but because, right now it is not happening at all.

Perhaps above City Hall would be a terrible location, I don't know. But it's not for me to decide because I don't live in the downtown area.

Okay having said that, in what I consider a very big loss for Ventura, because of concerns about possible noise complaints the promoters have cancelled their plans to launch an outdoor concert series this summer.

As proposed, it would have presented up to 12 "major" concerts under a tent in the upper parking lot above City Hall, with seating for about 1,900 concert goers. The parking lot serves very little purpose now.

The concert series was expected to put about \$1.5 million into our local economy. And better yet a portion would have gone to support the proposed Ventura Botanical Gardens that will be located right above the parking lot.

The concert series was proposed last year and was approved by the City Council. Public hearings were held, and only a few residents voiced opposition, mostly about increased traffic. As I recall there was no concerns expressed about the noise and the concert's had to end at 10pm so plenty of time for neighbors to still get to bed.

Because a city ordinance requires that decibel levels be monitored (and have a maximum volume) and logged at each concert the promoters were concerned that noise complaints could be used to shut down an ongoing concert and possibly upcoming events.

The promoters, local Star Lounge and Watermark restaurant owner Mark Hartley, and Nederlander Concerts, (the company that puts on concerts at the

something that seems to throw a monkey wrench in everything even if the majority wants it."

Ellie Kearns-Richman: "Ross Emery did the Johnny Cash concert at the fairgrounds and it brought business to downtown and Santa Barbara Bowl and others) decided that they didn't want to take the chance of this happening.

It has taken a few years for the promoters and the city to work out the parking, fire safety (with the Fire Marshall) and access for people with disabilities. A final permit was recently granted.

This would have brought major artists to Ventura. Just as we might go to the Libby Bowl, in Ojai or the Santa Barbara Bowl many "tourists" would have come to Ventura to hear the talent that would have performed at this concert series greatly helping our economy and perhaps changing the idea by some that



we are "That town on the way to Santa Barbara".

In my opinion the cancellation of this concert series is a blow to those who see downtown Ventura as a place for live music within walking distance to local residents and tourists staying at our local hotels.

Hopefully some pro-active members of our city council will look into changing our noise ordinance so that the promoters might re-consider presenting this series next summer, at city hall or at a different location.

I spoke with co-promoter Mark Hartley who told me "We are ready and happy to proceed with presenting these concerts except for the potential lawsuits regarding the sound level of the concerts on surrounding homes. We are prepared to satisfy all of the conditions set by the city and the Fire Marshall."

"I plan to meet with the city council and explain to them how the sound is monitored at all of the major concerts. Our contracts with the artists would set a maximum decibel rating for their music and it would be monitored by the engineer at the soundboard who would reduce the level once it reaches the maximum set by our contracts and the city, this is the industry standard. The contract with the artist contains fee production and usual requirements for both parties. City events like we propose contain a curfew with a fine if the band goes past and sound DN levels at the approved level. It is the only way to enforce a contractual agreement and the only way to control the sound because weather factors can determine the sounds that could be heard by the neighbors." (Much as the sounds of the race track are only heard sometimes based on low clouds, wind, etc.).

"We really want these concerts to stay in Ventura because they can only help our local economy, both downtown and the hotels. So we certainly hope that this can be resolved with the intention of presenting them next summer."

Council member Brian Brennan agrees and stated "The noise ordinance is scheduled to come back to Council this fall for tweaking because the present one would allow citizens to sue the City (And promoters) for not enforcing our sound ordinance which puts the concert series in the cross hairs."

And to confirm their concerns the Bella Maggiore Inn is suing Cafe Fiore, and the city alleging that the loud noise from the Fiore's music is hurting their business and they are violating the cities' noise ordinance.

Sheldon: Sorry to say that the Hillsides-Arroyo Verde Park concert has been cancelled for this year. They are running out of volunteers.



1987 and was appointed Mayor in 1989 where he served for two years. Francis took a break from public office in 1991 to raise his twins, Dillon and Hannah, with wife Nancy, a Ventura City Planning Commissioner.

From his first arrival in Ventura, Francis helped neighbors and citizens who were concerned about their neighborhood land-use issues. He stated that "the potential for Ventura becoming another San Fernando Valley due to unchecked urban sprawl and the special interests that would drive it was a real threat to our quality of life." So he teamed up with now Ventura County Supervisor Steve Bennett and together, along with hundreds of other volunteers, became the driving force to stop urban sprawl and give the citizens a voice in how our communities would grow into the future with the SOAR (Save Openspace and Agricultural Resources) measure.

Asked why he has decided to return to public office Francis said, "Anyone who lived in Ventura prior to 1987 knows what poor condition Ventura was in, particularly in the downtown area. As Mayor, I worked hard to help guide our city towards a sustainable future that protects our quality of life and grows a vibrant economy.

Community service has always been important to Francis. He is currently advisor to Cabrillo Economic Development Corporation and a Trustee with the Ventura Hillsides Conservancy. He sits on the Ventura County Mobile Home Rent Review Board, and is a board member for both the Community Action of Ventura County, Inc. (formerly Commission on Human Concerns) and SOAR. His law firm was voted 2013 Premier Law Firm in West Ventura County by the readers of the Ventura County Star. Holding "Erik Nasarenko For Ventura City Council" signs in the background, the 43-year-old launched the "Campaign for Core Services," telling the crowd that when city government "takes care of small but measureable improvements, good things will happen" in Ventura.

In the speech Nasarenko called for trimming the trees overgrowing the Telegraph Road median near Ventura College, repaving cracked asphalt on Telephone near Montgomery and Petit avenues, and placing "Welcome to Ventura" signs near freeway exits to greet prospective businesses, visitors and residents. Nasarenko also called for making the permit and license process simpler for prospective and current business owners by supporting web-based companies like License123, where all necessary city, county, state and federal permits can be accessed electronically in one place "so entrepreneurs can spend less time at government counters and more time growing their business." Nasarenko, who worked in public education for over a decade, selected Ventura Community Park because one of his priorities if elected to the City Council would be to implement the Sports Fields Master Plan for the park, which called for adding shade pavilions, more softball diamonds, soccer fields and children's playgrounds.

"As your next city councilmember, I will work toward completing the park and finishing the job," said Nasarenko, who pointed out to the audience how certain areas of the park remain unused dirt lots.

### Local resident vies for National Title

What if you suffered a broken back as an active 12 year old and you weren't expected to live? Three days in a coma. a month in the hospital with nuns shaking their heads in pity, three months in rehab and no promise of ever walking again. Cynthia DeJesus found herself in exactly this place after falling from a tree. It was not the end, though. DeJesus did walk again with the help of leg braces and crutches. And even though she eventually came to depend on a wheelchair she was never "confined to one." DeJesus continued to play sports with the help of adaptive equipment made by her father and his cousin. She says she is the same person that she was before the accident, "I am the same individual heart and soul with or without my mobility impairment." DeJesus also reminds people, "I may have a mobility impairment but it does not have me."

DeJesus moved to Ventura last November after she visited the area in July 2012. "Is the weather always like this? I asked. When the answer came back absolutely, I knew I would move out here." She says she loves not only the elements, but the old town charm Ventura has to offer. "It is quite the eclectic mix of old and new. The people have been so friendly and welcoming from the BNI group to the Chamber of Commerce. Amazing, supportive people are absolutely right here in Ventura."

In March, DeJesus was awarded the title of Ms. Wheelchair California.

She will represent California on July 16-18 at the national Wheelchair USA Pageant in Akron, Ohio. DeJesus, 48, says it is not a beauty pageant, "It is a pageant for advocacy and who will be the most appropriate agent to the disabilities community." She says that winning the crown at nationals is important because of all those who have chosen her to be their voice, their representative, their hope. "Every child that says, 'look at the princess' will see my crown and sash, not my wheelchair. Now I'm working on the adults to see with their hearts too.

Originally from Chicago, DeJesus says, "I educationally reinvent myself every few years," and she is now studying for a PhD in anthropology from the University of Iowa Extension. She is also the CEO of DeJesus Coaching Services. "I coach many types of situations such as life, business, disabilities, and families. I mentor people from all over the world via phone/skype, or whatever means they choose. I have coached CEO's, physicians, school teachers, students

. . . people with disabilities as I can put myself in their shoes like others can only imagine. I have coached people with family members that have illnesses." DeJesus knows what it is like to make tough decisions. She had to make life-altering decisions when her brother was injured in an accident and faced life as a quadriplegic. "He was mid-forties, with custody of his two daughters, owner of a million dollar successful business and best friend to all. He lost all that in the blink of an eye . . . he had two daughters to stay for whether he liked it or not, he would have to be there for them in whatever capacity."

DeJesus has also been a foster parent and has an adopted daughter, Glori and a grandson, three-year-old Jesse. "I was overjoyed when Jesse was there to see his grandmother crowned Ms. Wheelchair California. The smile on his face was priceless," says DeJesus. Also,

DeJesus says that although she is thrilled to be crowned Ms. Wheelchair California, the job is not without its pitfalls. "Ms. Wheelchair California is a non-profit organization. We need sponsors. Unlike Ms. Iowa, who received sponsors and even a car from Dodge, Ms. Wheelchair is almost entirely out of pocket for the titleholder. I want to get out to my Chamber of Commerce members in hopes that they will help my leadership."



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

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

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

### Senior Cone-nection Avoiding the dangers of caregiver distress

Most family caregivers are unaware that they could be at risk for heart disease, diabetes, depression and various other physical and emotional maladies as a result of caregiver distress, a potentially dangerous condition brought on by the pressures of caring for a senior loved one.

Studies increasingly show that acting as a caregiver is considered the leading cause of stress for families. Caregivers must adjust to role changes in addition to the extra tasks of caregiving. For example, an adult child often becomes a caretaker for their mother or father and a spouse assumes extra burdens and tasks in the relationship. Keep in mind that role changes are tremendously stressful for both the caregiver and patient and it's normal to feel resentful and overwhelmed when forced into a new role.

In response to this growing issue, the local Home Instead Senior Care® office has launched a public awareness campaign called Family Caregiver Stress Relief (www.FamilyCaregiver StressRelief.com) to help family caregivers determine if they are at risk for distress and to minimize problems before they escalate.

Included in the program are two new tools: The "Are You a Caregiver Quiz," which is designed to help a family caregiver self-identify and recognize the role of a caregiver, and the "Family Caregiver Distress Assessment," adapted for the Home Instead Senior Care network by Dr. Peter Vitaliano of the University of Washington.

risk of caregiver distress because they don't see themselves as caregivers," said Laurie Reid, owner of the local Home Instead Senior Care office. "These new resources enable them to understand their role, the stresses they may face as a caregiver, and how that stress might lead to more serious health effects.'

A recent Home Instead Senior Care study discovered that caregivers are prone to hiding their emotions and, as a result, their health suffers. Approximately 74% of caregivers who repress their emotions report fatigue while 53% report difficulty sleeping, 37% report depression, and 30% weight gain or loss.

Research shows that certain characteristics make family caregivers more vulnerable to caregiver distress, the top being:

•Gender: Women report more psychological distress than men (however, male caregivers have more negative physiological responses to caregiving, including higher blood sugar and insulin levels, poorer cholesterol and immune function, and obesity).

• Reluctance to ask for help: Caregivers who won't ask for help are setting themselves up for the kind of exhaustion that can lead to distress.

• Chronic Illness: Caregivers who are already sick or have existing medical conditions, such as coronary disease, hypertension and cancer, are more vulnerable to additional negative health effects resulting from caregiver stress.

"It's important for caregivers to understand that stress can impact one's ability to care. If they don't care for themselves, they may put their senior loved ones at risk. Whether it's support groups, stress management techniques or respite help, caregivers need to realize the importance of managing their health, too," said Reid.



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



### Healing waves by Tom Marshall

#### Ventura could be considered a surfer's paradise with world famous breaks up and down the coast and local shops supplying the necessary gear. Perspective has a way of sneaking up on those of us fortunate enough to be born into a prosperous and equitable nation. Matthew Smith was inspired to spread the many positives of surfing to those less fortunate while on a surfing trip to Nicaragua back in 2011. There was a local kid named Chinto who was riding a board that any surfer in the states would consider garbage. Matthew and his friends on that trip met many local children who wanted to surf but lacked boards and related gear. "Surfing can be a selfish act. We travel all over the world in search of waves," said Matthew. "Those kids live a half mile away from world class waves yet don't have boards. We can't immediately change their financial situations but we can bring them happiness," stated Matthew. Those world class waves were the reason a group of friends traveled to Nicaragua in 2011, Foam For Families is the non-profit that was born on that trip.

Foam For Families began as an idea to make a positive change in the lives of impoverished youths around the world. Providing surf boards and gear to local kids is the focus but co-founders Matthew Smith and Chad Compton have much bigger ideas in mind. "Surfing tourism is a huge industry. We want to provide the boards, teach locals how to surf, and show them how to make money through surfing," said Matthew. The idea is to provide the equipment and teach the locals how to repair boards. Board rentals, surfing lessons, and surfboard repairs are all very real business opportunities that Foam For Families envisions will provide hope to the extremely poor.

Foam For Families returned to Nicaragua in 2012 armed with surfboards donated by Channel Islands Surfboards, fins donated by FCS, and repair kits courtesy of Pro-Lite. "We've received huge support from the surfing community," said Matthew. The group set up a community surf supply center with the help of a local named Joe and gave surfing lessons to children. Anybody in the community now has access to boards and supplies. A trip to Mexico in August is next up for the nonprofit. Recreation tourism is a massive industry and one that can make huge differences in poor communities worldwide. It takes courage and vision to travel into these areas and attempt to make a difference. Surfing also requires courage and vision. Team members Chad Compton, Matthew Smith, and Kellen Ellison are committed to making a difference around the world in places most of us don't have the courage to venture into. Their vision for Foam For Families is to be ambassadors for the sport of surfing while uplifting the lives of the less fortunate. They are well on their way. Foam For Families needs your help. 

Kits provided by the Emma Zen Foundation come in a red carrying case and contain three masks, each of a different size, as well as oxygen tubing, instructions for CPR and first aid care, and even a decal to indicate presence of the kit. The National Association of Boards of Pharmacy said, "Many websites selling prescription drugs are unlicensed, operating illegally, or operating from foreign countries where medicines shipped to the United States are unregulated. Thus, there is no way of knowing whether the medicine you receive is contaminated, sub-potent, super-potent, expired, or counterfeit, or whether it has been stored and shipped under proper conditions to maintain its effectiveness."

Medications purchased from sources other than veterinarians may not provide the needed medical benefits to the animal, and even worse, could be dangerous and do serious harm. By obtaining these drugs through their veterinarian, consumers will be counseled regarding proper administration and potential adverse reactions. Passage of SB 688 will assure the quality of medications dispensed for the care of companion animals and provide the safe treatment of livestock, thereby protecting public health

Chris Cowing, DVM, president of the CVMA said, "The CVMA is strongly embracing SB 688 as a significant step forward to help clients achieve savings for the necessary care and treatment of their animals."

The California Sales and Use Tax law already provides for an exemption for human prescription medicine. By providing a similar exemption to animal medications, SB 688 will protect the health of millions of California pets and livestock by making prescription medications safer and more affordable.

#### Too Bad the Crooks Aren't Fumigated

Since March 2013 the Ventura Police department and other law enforcement agencies throughout Ventura and surrounding counties have identified a trend in fumigated residential properties being targeted by burglars.

Several residents have reported their homes burglarized after being "tented" for fumigation. Residences are targeted between the times the structure is covered with the tent until the tent is removed. The suspects generally enter the residence by going under the tent or cutting through the tent and forcing entry into the tented residence. The most commonly stolen items are house and car keys, personal documents, money, jewelry, and small electronics. In one case a resident reported their vehicle being stolen during the burglary as a result of their keys being left behind in the residence.

If a resident of Ventura is scheduled to have their home fumigated, they can call VPD Command Center at 650-8010 and advise them when their home will be fumigated.

### A Triumphant Journey

#### by Jennifer Bowles

How many of us have been affected by substance abuse or addiction? It is powerful and persuasive and it affects people in a myriad of ways. Many of us have witnessed a family member or a close friend travel down the dark path of addiction. For some it touches us ever so slightly. For others, it can be devastating and/or life altering. If it weren't for the dedication of people like Zuinda "Cookie" Martinez and her colleagues, who knows where our loved ones would be today.

At the young age of 17, Zuinda started a journey that would lead her somewhere she never imagined. Despite watching her own mother struggle with addiction, she headed down a similar path of substance abuse. This part of her journey took her into her 30's. It was then, as a homeless woman, she had a moment of clarity, and decided to take her life back. She sought out help at a treatment facility in Long Beach. This center utilized a holistic approach to healing. It is not about only treating the problem at hand, but about treating the whole person and getting total wellness. She met a counselor there who changed her life and put her on the path she is on today. It is the reason she is where she is now.

Now, 16 years later, and 16 years sober. Zuinda has come full circle. She has now been clean and sober longer than she was an addict. This is a huge accomplishment for someone who has battled addiction. It was barely a year into her recovery when an addict approached her for help. It was then Zuinda realized she had the ability to help others with their struggle. She pursued an education and earned an MA in Clinical Psychology. During her graduate studies, Zuinda and a group of colleagues made the decision to start a school. This group of colleagues, Rosalinda, Naj, Ben, Irina, Carmen, Crystal, Lupe, and Jennifer, saw a void within the system. They had the wherewithal to create a way to fill it. It was Zuinda's vision to build an institute that would provide the proper education and necessary skills to effectively change the stigma that often occurs with the diagnosis of addiction. She has a strong desire to instill empathy in her students so they can become advocates for the clients they care for. What began with months of brainstorming at a dining room table finally came to fruition in December 2012. Hence, The Ventura Training Institute for Chemical Dependency Counseling was born.

The program at the Institute is open to people from all walks of life. From man on the street to mental health care professionals. Most people who apply have been affected by addiction either by a family member, a friend, or even themselves. presented a slideshow that highlighted its success in marketing Ventura. A review of the information revealed that the VVCB is a key driver of demand in the local economy, stimulating job creation, business income development and increasing both sales tax and transient occupancy tax. The Bureau is a city investment that pays for itself and then some, generating significant return on investment. To highlight, travel spending for the California tourism travel & tourism outlook of April 2013 includes: Air 1%; Retail 20%; Arts & Entertainment 14%; Ground Transportation/Gasoline 12%; Food Stores 3%; Accommodations 21%; and Eating and Drinking Establishments 29%. Each year, 20% of city funding goes to the VVCB budget to promote the city.

The meeting ended with positive feedback and support for the VVCB's past, present, and future efforts to promote the city of Ventura; recognizing that the city's economy depends on bringing visitors to Ventura. The City and VVCB will enter into a one year agreement, beginning July 1, 2013 through June 30, 2014, with commitment to negotiate a 5-year contract for continued partnership. The Ventura Visitors and Convention Bureau Executive Director, Marlyss Auster, comments "I am pleased with the outcome and look forward to our future discussions with City Staff. The VVCB is dedicated to the continued growth and prosperity of our wonderful city through tourism." She continued, "I would also like to take this opportunity to thank Board Members for their continued support. Victor Dollar, Oscar Pena, Pat Seminario and staff member Hilda Kilpatrick were all there with me until midnight - it was a late one. I had many conversations with others, thank you. The support we have received from our strategic partners is also very much appreciated."

Upcoming developments include: promoting the Downtown Ventura Trolley – as part of Ventura being a car free destination; Ventura Rebranding Effort with Strategic Partners; and Ventura Website Update & Redesign – tapping into the abundance of local talent. tion letters within a two-week period demanding a Social Security number, driver's license number and suggested it had "information" I had been doing business within the City and to explain myself.

I visited the office of Ms. Janey Espinoza Dunn, Ventura's "business tax collector", for an explanation. Since my last visit to said office (in 2004, I soon learned), it had grown exponentially from two desks in a small room in City Hall to a replica of an old fashioned bank interior filling at least 1200 square feet, including nine teller windows, behind which Janey and her assistant sat ensconced in what I estimated cost we taxpayers at least \$250,000.00 in tenant improvement work. No wonder they needed money.

I told her I would look into the matter and would gladly pay whatever i may owe. Janey also intimated that she required copies of my Internal Revenue tax returns for "verification". I thanked her and immediately ran upstairs to City Attorney Ariel Calonne's office where, while explaining my concern to the receptionist, Mr. Calonne materialized at the counter, having overheard my comments. He graciously shook my hand, addressing me by name, and proclaimed absolute surprise and consternation at my having been asked such personal information by this out-of-town quasicollection agency for the City. He said, "I will call Janey".

Subsequently I received the following on June 11 from Mr. Calonne and Ms. Dunn, respectively: Mr. Calonne: Mr. Calonne cited Muni Code Sec. (and copied in City Council members) # 4.155.230 (#7), requiring: "federal employee ID number or social security number of all owners... driver's license number..., date of birth, etcetera..." for a business license application – not for a collection agency in

Fresno. Response: "No problem, but I'm not gonna send this information to a bunch of collection goons in Fresno. It's one thing to give this information to a clerk in the city......".

Ms. Dunn: Ms. Dunn offered to recall my information from Fresno and will be handling it in house. She was very nice. She noted her office had attempted to contact me but had the wrong address. She graciously sent me a work sheet for my gross revenue summary, and suggested I could provide either a Schedule C from my tax returns or verification from any "other financial report" She noted if my gross business revenues did not exceed \$2400.00 annually, I might qualify for a "limited tax exemption", where only \$20.00 per year would be required. She also indicated that if I owed more than I could afford, she could allow for a promissory note to the city with installment payments. Meanwhile, MuniServices is still advertising (www.muniservices.com) and soliciting cities (call 916-441-4530) to avail themselves of its many service under the rubric of "revenue enhancement": "parking ticket collections", "Sales tax collections", "property tax collections", and "utility user tax collections". Of particular interest: MuniServices "compiles numerous external data bases to identify non-compliant businesses", "identifies business tax audit targets", and "conducts business tax audits". Sound familiar?

### Second Samuel serves up surprises

Santa Paula Theater Center is known for bringing to its stage plays of depth. Its current production, the Pulitzer Prize nominated comedy *Second Samuel* by Pamela Parker, continues this tradition with its inner exploration of a small Georgia town in 1948.

The southern town of Second Samuel, so named because the original town of Samuel met an untimely demise and was rebuilt, has its share of well meaning, yet misguided citizens. It seems every town harbors secrets buried beneath the patina of society and Second Samuel is no different. In a town where everyone seems to want to know everyone else's business, secrets cause quite a stir. The story is narrated by B Flat, a young man of borderline intelligence. When startling information emerges following the death of the revered town matriarch. the town is set all a-twitter. B Flat, in his simplicity, sees the solution clearly where others apparently cannot. He supplies the common thread of reason throughout, ultimately pulling the citizens back from near mental chaos to calm. B-Flat is superbly played by Eric Burton with naïve enthusiasm and consistent affectations The thought provoking comedy is ably directed by Fred Helsel, who cleverly trisects the set so there is never a need to break for scene changes. Each corner of the triangle represents a specific and significant part of the town's social arena - the Bait and Brew, a local hangout for the men-folk; the hair salon, a gathering place of the women; and the front porch of a citizen's home.

include a variety of characters, all of whom are endearing in their own way. The piece is truly an ensemble work – all the actors give well-thought through and consistent characterizations. However, standout performances are given by Peggy Steketee as Omaha Nebraska (whose family members are all named after locations), Burton as B-Flat, and Dan Tullis as the superbly understated handyman.

The hair salon is reminiscent of *Steel Magnolias* – the town's gossip capitol where tempers flare and friendships are fueled. The Bait & Brew offers the men a similar diversion, only with alcohol. County stage staple Doug Friedlander renders a suitable performance as the resident bitter old coot, flanked by Rick DeLeon, Scott Blanchard, Ron Flesher and Elixeo Flores as various local denizens.

*Second Samuel* is a light look at times gone by, where we find that human nature, our desire to be included and things we talk about today really hasn't changed all that much through the years. To their credit, the cast gives the entire piece an any town feel to which the audience can clearly relate.


