# 10 projects that will change the face of Ventura – Part 1

Signs of life are beginning to be seen again in Ventura's construction and development sector after developers had put the brakes on the majority of projects in the city due to years of sluggish economy. Across Ventura, residential and commercial projects are starting to gain momentum again, many of them bound to have significant impact on the

city – some single projects alone adding hundreds of residential units.

City of Ventura Planning Manager Dave Ward was quick to point out many of these projects are not new and have been in the works for years.

"Ventura is not rapidly changing, a lot of projects while heating up now, have been cooking so to speak for more than ten years," said Ward who stressed the city's growth rate is still relatively low. "With the changing economy, many older projects that hadn't moved forward have come back recently with new sources of financing, or retooled as slightly different projects."

According to Ward, a number of projects have been reworked – changing for-sale units into rental units, or at least the option to do either.

The Cannery Row project on Ventura Avenue just north of Main Street, which is nearing completion is such an example. Originally submitted in 2006 as 78 for-sale condominiums, the developer received approval for the option to make them into apartments in 2012. Ultimately, the project ended up as for-sale condominiums. Mayor Mike Tracy believes this project in particular can be a catalyst for the area.

"I think The Cannery project really shows the potential for that kind of property which is available on the west side," said Tracy. "It's at the gateway to Ventura Avenue as well as on the edge of downtown, which means it's bringing more residents to that area which it needs, and it's really nicely done."

With nearly 50 new construction projects on its list, the City's planning group saw noteworthy movement forward *Continued on page 20* 

cultural backgrounds. As she explained: "I just want all communities to know that they have a voice, and that means women and people of color."

She believes that her background in community development will serve her well on the council. "I understand how private business works with the city," she stated. "The background that I'm coming from and the fact that I've worked within a city agency is important."


Her vision of city government is one in which the city becomes more effective in raising and administering tax dollars. "I have a mind for Ventura business," she said, "and I would like to continue to develop sustainable economic development strategies."

Part of that strategy would be to diversify the city's economic portfolio. For example, she suggests raising the transitional occupancy tax, taking greater advantage of state and federal grants and funding, and redeveloping the city's industrial areas.

She also believes that the city is going to have to improve its relationship with private developers. "The city is going to have to work directly with developers in terms of redevelopment," she said. "They're going to have to find creative ways to fund projects."

She suggests that city residents could work to develop special districts such as a hillside district to help mediate property runoff or a Thompson Boulevard district to provide more business development.

For Brown, the key to all of this Continued on page 13

## Paul Meehan

Paul Meehan, who has a B.A. in environmental studies from UCSB, began his career in the early 1990s as an intern for the Channel Islands National Park Service. He fell in love with the islands and when the owners of Island Packers offered him a job, he took it. Over the next dozen years, he worked for Island Packers as a deck hand, a naturalist, and a boat captain.

He then moved on to become a park ranger—first at Anacapa Island, then Lassen, and finally at the Virgin Islands National Park.

Three years ago, after he moved back to Ventura with his family, he was offered a temp job at FedEx as a software installer. Eventually they hired him on

as a permanent employee.

This is Meehan's first attempt to run for any kind of elected office. His role as a father and his own life transition (he just turned 50) have heavily influenced his decision. "It made me realize that you can't expect Ventura to be at its best from the sidelines," he said, "so I wanted to be more active in the decisions that would affect the place where my kids would grow up."

His concern for the well-being of local families in the city has shaped his campaign. "I don't feel I'm represented as a father of a young family," he stated. "I don't feel there's that voice on the City Council currently."

One of his biggest family concerns is the rising crime rate in Ventura, something which he knows from personal experience. "I've been affected by crime at my house," he noted. "My neighbor's house has been ransacked. Some friends of my wife, their house was broken into. I'm really concerned about public safety."

When it comes to budgeting and finance, Meehan thinks that the city needs to provide more common sense education to its citizens. "I'd like to help translate the budget for more people," he explained. "And if I can make that a more readable document for people, then I think we can address some of our financial issues."

Then there's the issue of city management: "I'd like to uncover places where we're wasting money and time. I feel like *Continued on page 13*

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
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
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

# New trash and recycling bins

This past August, The City of Ventura Environmental Sustainability Division, in partnership with the Downtown Ventura Partners (DVP), installed 30 Big Belly trash and recycling bins. These containers are state-of-the-art, using solar power to self-compact trash, which reduces the amount of necessary pick-ups, saving money. These bins provide easy recycling at each trash container too. This will help Ventura to divert even more recyclables from the landfill, encourage public recycling, and eliminate unsightly scavenging of recyclables.

There are also now 4 sets of new City trashcans on lower Seaward. They are locked so that the transients can't get into them and steal the recyclables.

Each Big Belly Bins hold about 150 gallons of trash - five times the volume of an ordinary trashcan. Recyclables go in one receptacle and trash goes into the other. Each bin clearly indicates what goes where in case you forget.

"The solar panels located on top of the Big Bellies, absorb the sun's energy and then trickle charge a battery located inside the machine," states Joe Albrecht, Sales Director, Big Belly Solar, Inc., "The trash compacter has two photo eyes which produce a beam. When the trash inside the unit breaks that beam, it sends a signal to the machine that it needs to run a compaction. When the bin is full, it has built in software that alerts service crew as to which bin is full and needs to be emptied.'

"Ventura is currently at a 74% diversion rate," added City of Environmental Specialist Courtney Lindberg. "The new state mandate AB341 introduces an increased diversion rate from the previous goal of 50% to a

more aggressive 75% by 2020. We'll definitely be able to reach our target. By using non-general fund AB939 money to purchase the Big Bellies, we are directly saving the City money to our general fund by significantly reducing the trash service levels."

"The past several years, the City of Ventura has been working on a number of beautification efforts," said City Councilmember Christy Weir. "We've partnered with Downtown Ventura Partners on these new Big Bellies, because not only do they help us save on trash collection, they allow for advertisement panels to be used for public services messages. It's a winwin-win all the way around."

Hopefully the advertising on them will be much more monitored and approved (maybe by the design review committee) before being placed on them so that they are more attractive than the ones on the current trash bins, By the way these were supposed to be just beautiful pictures of Ventura with subtle advertising. Ventura doesn't want to look like one big advertisement as we do now with "used car" type banners waving in front of many businesses. Which are illegal without very limited time permits. Plastering the city with ads might not be helping our "beatification efforts".

■ Former Hells Angels leader George Christie Jr. has been sentenced to 10 ½ months in prison in connection with the bombing of two Ventura tattoo shops in 2007.

Christie, 66, will begin serving his sentence in about two months. Christie and three others were arrested in 2011 on suspicion of taking part in bombing Scratch the Surface and Twisted Ink, two Main Street tattoo shops.

He has been jailed before but his attorney was happy with this short sentencing, as he should be.

Property owners will still have time to apply for Ventura's amnesty program for unpermitted second dwelling units, but things just got a little more stringent.

The amnesty program was started in mid-2011. It allows owners of "illegally" converted second dwelling units, often called "granny flats", to bring them into code compliance at what would have been the city costs when the work was first done. In some cases, that's thousands of dollars in savings and it isn't always easy to determine when they were even built.

Last fall, the city directed the staff to look into expanding the program to other residential and commercial building projects. The council ultimately rejected such an expansion, but, at that time staff members learned they should have been requiring energy upgrades mandated by the California Energy Commission.

So they added a 6-page energy checklist to ensure the units have proper windows, insulation, lights and water heaters, among other things.

The energy requirements will not apply to people who have received their final permits.

I will share my thoughts on this "amnesty program" in a future issue.

■ In the never ending Joshue Parker fiasco (you can call it a trial) for now Ventura County Deputy District Attorney Michael Frawley will remain as prosecutor in the state's case against Packer, who is accused of killing a couple and their unborn child in their Faria Beach home in May 2009.

Packer's defense lawyers have been trying this year to have Frawley removed from the case. They say his presence is a conflict of interest in part because his children spent time in a Christian youth group with Packer in high school.

This guy could die of old age before this goes to trial.

■ Six-hundred CLU (Cal Lutheran University) students partnered with City of Ventura to clean up the Santa Clara Riverbed on Sept. 3 on city-owned property between the Olivas Links Golf Course and Harbor Blvd. City staff and students removed an unbelievable amount of debris as a result of unauthorized homeless encampments in the riverbed. Some actually being small "homes".

This is the 6th year the Volunteer Ventura Program has partnered with CLU as part of the university's "You Got Served" service learning project. From 2008-2011, this partnership effort removed more than 36 tons of trash and debris from the Ventura Riverbed. And in 2012, city staff and students removed invasive ice plant from the Ventura Harbor Wetlands Ecological Reserve.

This removal was even more difficult (if possible) because of the amount of debris and landscaping.

Rob Orth, Social Director, Salvation Army, was there and stated: "Deep breath....

"Just as an update for this week's Santa Clara effort, 19 people took us up on case management and housing, we shall see how many follow through. Probably another 40 that 'moved on' not wanting assistance. Amazing amount of debris, last count as of today was 39 tons. CLU students will be back on Sept 3rd for general rubbish removal...which there is a lot of.

"We now have our housing specialist on board, she just started and we are hoping that will get us some hosing prospects we didn't have previously...

'Thanks for all you do in getting the word out."



So why are our students at Ventura College reduced to eating harmful, processed carcinogenic "food-like substances?" It has come to my attention that due to "budget cuts" the College cafeteria has been closed and now only offers, sodas, candy and other items that have questionable ingredients. # **Cypress Place** Senior Living resident turns 100

Howard Boroughs was born in rural Brooklyn, NY, on August 21, 1913. He and his sister, Eunice, grew up taking local street cars to famous Coney Island for amusement. (Eunice is now 105 years old and lives in Van Nuys). He remembers his father's first car, a Chevrolet, being the first automobile on their street. His dad hired a young man from the neighborhood to be his driver.

The family moved to Los Angeles in 1920-21 where Howard graduated from high school and joined the Navy during WWII. In 1934, at 21, he married Evelyn and became a house-husband while she worked at Sears & Roebuck Department Store. When she died in 2000, they had been married for 66 years.

After the war, at age 33, Howard went to USC on the GI Bill and ultimately earned his PhD in Biochemistry from Cal Tech in 1952. His career in plant biochemical research ranged from a National Cancer Institute fellowship at UCLA, a research fellowship at the Paris-Sorbonne in France, a four-year stint researching the after-effects of radiation from the hydrogen bomb at the University of Hawaii, and four years in Costa Rica as head of President Eisenhower's Federal "Atoms for Peace" program.

Howard worked several years as the program director for the National Science Foundation in Washington, DC; the Bureau of Higher Education's review of colleges during the Civil Rights era; the Academic VP of Portland State University, and as Director of Academic Affairs at California Polytechnical University before retiring in 1975.

After moving to Ventura in 1979, Howard became an active philanthropist, donating time, effort and significant funding for local entities. Ventura

College has the Evelyn and Howard Boroughs Library. The Museum of Ventura County's recent renovation has the Evelyn and Howard Boroughs Gallery with the new Children's Garden named after them as well.

Howard's love of dogs prompted him to donate funding for fencing at a local dog park in Ventura and to providing funds for a new neutering surgery bay for the Humane Society. There is a brass plate with his name at the Rubicon Theater. He also supports the "Rising Stars" Music Festival in Ventura financially, and he has been on the board of directors for the Ventura County Caregivers Association, which meets at Cypress Place Senior Living in Ventura every month.

Howard also hangs his hat at Cypress Place. He has been a resident in the active senior living community since

# "Ugly Fish" search launched in the Harbor

Local skipper Andy Killion is hitting the water early these days in search of the "Ugly Fish."

This rare, unidentified species tends to rear its head in Ventura County's local waters in the fall, about the same time as the 12th annual Sailathon to benefit CAREGIVERS: Volunteers Assisting the Elderly on Oct. 13.

"Last year, I was out for an early morning on my boat, just off Santa Cruz Island when I noticed a trail of bubbles on the ocean surface," Killion said, eager to assure that this is no fish tale. He said the pungent odor associated with the "Ugly Fish" gave way for caution.

California mushroom farm owner Jack Reitnauer said tales of the fish date back to the early 60's when the mushroom farm started.

At times, the "Ugly Fish" has been

mistaken for the blue whale, which also has been spotted off the Channel Islands, but the distinct colors of the "Ugly Fish" give reason to believe that it is not part of the musculus species.

While the origins of the "Ugly Fish" remain a mystery, local fisherman can attest that this is no folklore.

"I hear its good eatin'" said Capt. Stephen Taylor of the tall ship, Bill of Rights, who is also participating in this year's Sailathon. "Just take the eyeballs out and you'll have the key ingredient for an excellent ceviche."

Multihull, monohull, paddle-boats, power boats and canoes will assemble off the Ventura Pier on Sunday, Oct. 13 for the 12th Annual Sailathon vying for a glimpse of the "Ugly Fish."

# Inaugural Ventura Marathon: brimming with connections

Irais Armenta, an employee at the New Balance Factory Store in Camarillo, did not know any of the runners. "Volunteering just seemed like a really cool thing to do," said Armenta, who was assigned to the finish line area, along with two of her co-workers.

Ventura resident Andrea Ramirez had just lost her husband and wanted something worthwhile to do. "So I heard about this new event and signed up to help everyday. I had a great time meeting so many new, energetic people," said Ramirez who helped check in participants from Friday to Sunday.

And the positive energy was very much evident along the course and at the finish. "The crowd cheering for me at the end brings me close to tears every time," said Caroline Connolly who ran the 5K with her son, brother and co-workers.

is to encourage the city to be creative and proactive in its business practices. "There are a lot of things that they can do to help themselves," she said.

She also feels it's important to work with youth and to promote a better infrastructure for health and public safety. "I will support safe ways to lend a hand to those with basic unmet needs,"

she said, "and I would like to encourage youth leadership opportunities through organizations like Ventura City Corps."

Brown feels that she is a prime example of someone who never thought of themselves as a viable candidate for public office. She credits mentors such as Carl Morehouse with encouraging her to consider that possibility. Now she feels it's her opportunity to be a role model for others in similar situations. "I would like to show people what I went through," she said, "and that this is how it's done and you can do it, too."

we have enough money. We're just not using it efficiently."



■ Los Angeles County's supervisors have voted unanimously to strengthen the county's regulations on vicious dogs in the wake of a dog attack that killed a woman in the Antelope Valley.

The new rules expand the definition of a "potentially dangerous dog" to include those that have attacked livestock.

Previously, the law covered only dogs that had attacked people or pets. Attacks on livestock "are often a precursor of attacks on pets or people." county animal control Director Marcia Mayeda wrote in a report to the board. Personally I wouldn't have a guinea pig for a pet (would eat all of my food if I wasn't careful).

But because I am an equal opportunity writer I am presenting this from an online site.

Dear Paw's Corner: My male guinea pig, "Dale," was always healthy. He was fat and not losing weight. One day, we cleaned his cage and noticed that he was sticking his head out repeatedly and opening his mouth — like yawning.

The vet said to come in right away, and within five minutes of hanging up, Dale was dead. The vet looked at him and said he looked healthy and that maybe he had a heart attack or stroke, but I didn't see any symptoms. Any help would be great because we have two others.

Dear Julie: Sadly, it often can be difficult to tell when a guinea pig is getting ill. They're very good at hiding signs of illness, and often they are acutely ill before their owners can tell what's wrong. It's clear that you pay close attention to your guinea pigs, as you were aware of Dale's weight and normal behavior.

However, guinea pigs can become ill very quickly. You were right to contact the veterinarian immediately after noticing Dale's strange behavior, which I agree, could have been a sign of a stroke or heart attack.

I'll refer again to the late Peter Gurney's brilliant Guinea Pig Health Guide. One suggestion, which you may be able to apply to your surviving guinea pigs, is to have the vet listen to their heartbeat. A heart murmur can indicate valve problems. Another possibility is an undetected fungal or bacterial infection that got into Dale's system, eventually causing a heart attack. But as you pointed out, he showed no external signs of illness.



#### **Assault with Deadly Weapon**

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

# Play explores time continuum

It's an interesting concept. Modern day scholars and occupants of Arcadia, an ancient English manor house, try to solve a puzzle about events that may or may not have taken place on the premises two centuries earlier and might have involved the renowned poet Lord Byron.

Santa Paula Theater Center's current play, *Arcadia*, is complicated, complex and, at times, confusing. The action transports the audience back and forth between 1809 to the present all in the same setting, as groundwork for tales of sexual conquests, mystery and supposition in both periods. The play suggests that what is lost is eventually rediscovered, and shows how clues left in the past are interpreted by scholars in the future.

The action starts in 1809 with Thomasina Coverly, a precocious teen with ideas about mathematics well ahead of her time, and her tutor, Septimus Hodge, reputed to be a friend of Lord Byron who, although unseen, is a pivotal character in the play. Hodge is suspected by the 21st Century academics of later becoming a hermit, perhaps after the early death of Thomasina, or possibly as a consequence of a reputed duel. The history of the Arcadia's earlier inhabitants is unrelentingly scrutinized in a quest to find out the truth. To what purpose we never know.

The script by Tom Stoppard garnered Tony and Drama Desk awards for its exploration of age-old questions concerning relationships between past and present, chaos and order, and the disruptive influence of sex upon our lives.

Touted as "a most ravishing comedy," we expected to be thrilled to be on an emotional roller coaster. While the play is rich in language, theory and intellect, the comedy did not come forward the night we attended. Possibly due to the rapid-fire dialogue that bounced like ping-pong balls off the stark, bare walls and floor of the set, as well as the combined pitch of the capable actors' voices, most of the subtle humor was lost before it could be digested and rewarded.

Director Eric Stein fortunately has a talented group of performers to give life to the leading characters. Each is definably distinct in mannerisms as they, as well as the supporting characters, prance with pomp and posture.

Cravats off to costume designer Randy Pool who has proven over and over she is an asset to any period piece. Set designer Mike Carnahan provided just enough authenticity to be useful in both eras, although we felt a rug might have helped with the acoustics.

We applaud the SPTC's effort to bring deep works to theater-goers. But, with a running time of some three hours, we feel judicious cutting can still be made without damage to the premise or the story.

The free outdoor event was hosted by Ventura County's FOOD Share and featured fine arts and crafts, street chalk art and live music throughout both days.



# Carlisle Cooper, 1919-2013

Carlisle Cooper, esteemed artist and educator, died Wednesday, September 11, in Ventura. Mr. Cooper was 94 years old.

on a number of them this summer. I've ranked the 10 biggest new construction projects – those with sizeable potential for impacting Ventura – that could break ground or finish construction within a year. Here are numbers 10 through six.

Number 10. Marriott – Residence Inn: Slated for 770 S. Seaward Ave. behind where Golden China currently resides, the project which includes a 128-room four-story hotel was approved by the City when the developer filed for an extension earlier this year. The hotel represents outside confidence in Ventura's push to be a bigger tourist destination. More recently, architects for the project submitted significant enough changes to warrant the need to go back for design review, a step back for the project. According to Ward, if the developer stays

on track, design plans could be finalized by the end of this year with construction beginning next year depending on the economy.

Number 9. La Barranca: While not the largest project in the works within the city, the 10 "executive-style" homes planned on Foothill Road near Day Road represent something city officials such as City Councilmember Christy Weir have advocated for – housing of all types, for all levels of income. "Lately we have been concentrating on affordable housing, which is important, but equally important is high-end housing," said Weir. "We want to retain and attract businesses to provide jobs, and provide places to live that are attractive to business owners and other executives."

The homes, which received initial approval back in 2008 recently came back to the City's Design Review Committee in August with updates where they were met with some criticism in regards to how large the buildings were in relation to the lot size. According to city officials the project is expected to move into construction in the first part of 2014.

Number 8. Island View Apartments: This 155-unit complex behind Montalvo Square represents the last piece of a neighborhood that has been built – virtually from scratch – in recent years complete with its commercial component Montalvo Square, single-family homes and a park. With the recent annexation of the greater Montalvo area, the region will now be essentially a complete Ventura community. The apartment project received final approval this summer and expects to break ground as early as this fall.

Number 7. All thing citrus: Together the Citrus Apartments and Citrus Place/Orchard Collection Projects makes it to number seven on the list mostly due to the fact that the projects, unlike many others on the City's list, are moving forward at a good pace. The projects are one block from each other in East Ventura near Wells Road and Citrus Road. The 54-unit Citrus Apartments project has recently broken ground and is moving toward completion in 2014. The

Citrus Place project which has already-completed their phase one construction of 60 apartments, is looking to begin construction on phase two and three of its plan which includes 59 single-family and 60 condominiums which, according to Ward, will start before the end of the year.

Number 6. JenVen Village/Ventura East Village: Another combination of projects makes the list by virtue of its potential impact on the greater East Ventura area. The JenVen Village project located at Wells Road and Darling Road consists of 83 residential units and has been approved. It is anticipated it will break ground by the end of the year. The commercial component of the project, called Ventura East Village, plans to bring a 14,000 sq. ft. market, 15,500 sq. ft. drugstore and a drive-thru restaurant. While city officials are more than ready to support the prospect of a supermarket and drugstore to support the burgeoning East Ventura area, the developer has not been able to secure tenants beyond a drive-thru restaurant for its project.
