# Council votes down medical marijuana dispensaries in Ventura

At the July 8, 2013 City Council meeting, the City Council voted 7-1 to approve a motion that directed the City Attorney's office to prepare an ordinance banning mobile and stationary medical marijuana dispensaries, as well as large scale cultivation.

Medical Marijuana Dispensaries are defined as "Medical Marijuana Distribution Facility shall mean any facility or location, whether fixed or mobile, where medical marijuana is made available, sold, transmitted, given, provided, exchanged for consideration, or otherwise made available to two or more qualified patients, persons with identification cards, or primary caregivers, or any facility where qualified patients, persons with identification cards, or primary caregivers meet or congregate collectively or cooperatively to cultivate or distribute marijuana for medical purposes."

The 4-3 vote came after about 20 speakers on the proposed ordinance, 19 of which urged the council to reject the ordinance.

Mayor Mike Tracy (who originally requested the banning ordinance) supported the ban along with council members Christy Weir, Cheryl Heitmann and Jim Monahan.

The opponents were council members Neal Andrews, Brian Brennan and Carl Morehouse.

A motion, before the vote was made for the formation of a working group to study safe access to the drug. That Continued on page 4

# E.J. Harrison Family Youth Center opens in Saticoy

The doors of the Boys & Girls Club of Greater Ventura's new Saticoy clubhouse – the E.J. Harrison Family Youth Center – officially swung open during a grand opening on Thursday, Nov. 14.

Over 200 community members and scores of Saticoy children attended the event that was held to also honor the over 120 donors of the new 4,000-square-foot facility. Ed Summers, board president of the B&GC of Greater Ventura, presided over the event that featured a dedication ceremony by members of the Saticoy

Chumash community.

The club is named in honor of Harrison Industries, a Ventura-based trash and recyclables collecting company, which matched the contribution the Ventura County Board of Supervisors made in 2010 to launch the \$1.3 million project.

"We're thrilled to help build the club in Saticoy, where our business began," said Harrison Industries President Ralph Harrison, who attended the Continued on page 4

# Graduates of the CERT program will be ready

In the wake of the recent devastation in the Philippines, it brings to light the importance of disaster preparedness, 36 graduates of the CERT program will be ready to assist their community if such an event takes place.

Captain Steve Lazenby (Santa Paula Fire Department) and Ventura City Fire Marshal Brian Clark have been preparing individuals through a Community Emergency Response Team Course (CERT) over the last few months.

The CERT program consists of a 21 hour class that is available to residents of Ventura County for free. The course covers the basics of search and rescue, how to free people from light entrap

# Join World AIDS Day

On Sunday, Dec. 1, to commemorate World AIDS Day, Ventura County Public Health's (VCPH) HIV / AIDS program will host a community health fair that includes free HIV testing, health screenings, nutritional counseling as well as information about programs and services provided by other local agencies. The free, open-to-the-public event will take place from 10 am – 2 pm in the back parking lot of the VCPH building at 3147 Loma Vista Rd., Ventura.

Two thousand small red flags, each printed with the words "I Know, Do You?" will be placed on the front lawn of the VCPH building. The flags, which represent the over 2,000 Ventura County residents who currently know their HIV positive status, will serve as a visual reminder of the importance of getting tested for HIV.

Since the first cases of HIV/AIDS were reported 32 years ago in 1981, the Continued on page 4

Do I still have time to participate in Ventura's 2nd Dwelling Unit Amnesty Program and if so, how does it work?

Yes. For property owners who are considering whether to legalize their unpermitted second dwelling unit, now is the time.

In light of the struggling economy of 2008-2010 and the need to provide safe and affordable housing, the City of Ventura explored options for legalizing existing 2nd dwelling units that had no record of a valid building permit. In the fall of 2011, the city began officially granting property owners amnesty from fines and impact fees, while working with licensed contractors to assure the safety of 2nd dwelling units. Today, more than 50 property owners have participated in the City of Ventura's amnesty program and have saved thousands of dollars and significantly increased their property values.

# Ventura news

The City Council has decided that more than 200 fees will rise in Ventura, in some cases by as much as 50%. The council voted 4-2 to approve a new fee schedule that attempts to recoup more of the city's costs. In addition to raising existing fees, the council approved some additional ones.

The fee changes for most departments will go into effect Dec. 1, and those for planning, land development, construction permits and fire prevention will take effect Jan 1.

In January 2012, Ventura received a \$2.3 million grant that paid for 2 years' worth of salaries and benefits in exchange for the city pledging to keep Ventura Fire Department Station No. 4 open a third year. The question has always been of how to keep the station. In 2014 a three-year partnership between the city and federal government ends. The department is applying for a \$2.4 million grant that would cover the salaries and benefits for nine firefighters from February 2014 to February 2016.

Both Ventura city and county are going to sue California Mushroom Farm Inc. to try to recoup the costs associated with fighting a compost fire at their shuttered farm located on Olivas Park Drive. The Ventura City Council voted 6-0 to sue the farm. Officials think that the owners didn't properly maintain their compost piles after it shut down, and that this caused them to combust spontaneously.

The county spent about \$45,000 fighting the blaze, and the city more than \$155,000.

And all of Ventura had to cope with the awful smell for weeks so maybe we should all get some of the money?

Ventura police officers Nicole Gallion and Kendra Williams thought that it would be just a routine call when they responded to Motel 6, on Harbor in March to help evict a hotel guest. But on this call the male guest being evicted was able to get into his truck and attack both of them with his vehicle. They were able to gain control and shot him to death. Their actions were recognized recently at the Peace Officers Association of Ventura County's Medal of Valor Awards Ceremony. The ceremony, held at the Sun Air Hangar in Camarillo honored more than 40 civilians and law enforcement personnel.

motion failed on the same 4-3 vote.

Speaking of the problems that Santa Barbara had when dispensaries opened there was Police Chief Ken Corney. Crime and use by students on the high school campus increased, Corney said.

He stated that "Dispensaries haven't brought anything good to any community", adding that he talked to police chiefs across the state about the problems encountered.

While the ordinance bans dispensaries, collectives and cooperatives, state law lets residents grow up to 6 mature and 12 immature (those are the ones that haven't grown up yet) marijuana plants for personal use.

In supporting the further study Neal Andrews said growing marijuana wasn't an option for many people who needed it. "We don't need huge numbers of dispensaries, but we do need dispensaries," he said.

According to a new Gallup Poll a majority of Americans now favor legalizing marijuana use 58% to 39%.

In voting against the dispensaries Council member Christy Weir told the Breeze "Medical marijuana dispensaries have proven to be detrimental to the neighborhoods where they are located. Allowing "multimillion dollar", unregulated cash businesses is an invitation for increased crime. That is why the cities (including LA and Santa Barbara) that have not banned dispensaries are now struggling to create and/or enforce restrictions, and the federal government is raiding and shutting them down. In many cities, less than 10% of the clients are medical patients, and 90% are recreational users. Because marijuana is not regulated, taxed or inspected by the state or federal governments, 100% of the regulation would be the responsibility of the City of Ventura. We do not have the public safety or legal or administrative or code enforcement resources to oversee a complicated network of marijuana operations that extend far beyond our city boundaries.'

In favor of the voted down working group Carl Morehouse told us "While I believe I understood Mayor Tracy's concerns, I thought it best that we convene a working group of affected stakeholders to see if we could come up with a solution that could provide those who find relief from pain in cannabis a legal, viable way to obtain access to marijuana. This was not about recreational use. This was about not criminalizing those who were in need. In developing other ordinances that affect a fair number of individuals in Ventura, we have always included them in the discussion. This time we did not."

The council will vote to adopt the ordinance at its second reading at their meeting on Dec. 2.

Application for a Second Dwelling Unit Amnesty Permit is streamlined. An application packet can be picked up at Ventura City Hall, 501 Poli Street, Room 117 during normal business hours or downloaded from http://www.cityofven tura.net/safehousing. A licensed contractor will need to complete one of the forms in the packet. City staff is available by phone and/or appointment to assist with completion of the forms. Once completed, the forms will give the property owner a very good estimate of the costs associated with legalizing their second dwelling unit. There are no city fees charged for the application or application review services.

Once the completed application has been reviewed and approved, the property owner can decide whether to purchase the building permit or stop the permit process. If the property owner decides to move forward with legalization, the fees that were estimated during application review will be due and the permit will be issued to the licensed contractor. Once the licensed contractor has confirmed the second dwelling unit meets the state minimum housing standards (via a checklist provided in the application packet), the city will meet with the contractor onsite for an inspection. This single inspection will be based on the checklist items and any repair work done to meet the checklist requirements.

This program has significantly improved the safety of second dwelling units in our city and has saved unpermitted second dwelling unit owners tens-of-thousands of dollars. We have seen older, single bedroom/studio, second dwelling unit amnesty permits cost less than \$700. As a comparison, a new, standard, second dwelling unit permit of the same size

would cost more than \$10,000.

Deadline for applications for this special program is December 24, 2013 and all permits for this program must have a final inspection and be approved by the city before July 1, 2014.

ment, basic medical skills, triage of injured people, the use of fire extinguishers, introduction to the incident command system, how to turn off house utilities, and methods to integrate with fire department personnel when they arrive.

CERT graduates participated in realistic scenarios that exercised their newfound skills. Captain Lazenby orchestrated Ventura City Firefighters and Prevention personnel who proctored stations and provided instruction to students. Scenarios replicated what the public could expect in an actual disaster.

Various assembled props featured: a broken gas meter, a fire pit where CERT members used an extinguisher, search and rescue of victims that require treatment and triage, and freeing people from entrapment utilizing heavy lifting techniques.

"With every class, our county gets a little more prepared for a disaster with these great individuals who have stepped forward to be the stewards of their neighborhoods", stated Fire Marshal Brian Clark.

The CERT class is paid for by a FEMA Homeland Security grant and is administered by the state and the county. number of people in the U.S. infected with HIV has grown to more than 1.2 million. One in five people with HIV does not know that they are infected and every 9.5 minutes someone new in the U.S. becomes infected.

The Centers for Disease Control recommends that everyone ages 13-64 get tested for HIV at least once in their lifetime and recommends even more frequent tests for those people who have higher risk factors, such as those who have multiple sexual partners or use IV drugs.

■ Our second dwelling amnesty program will be running out after Dec. 24 (see article by Jeff Lambert). This somewhat controversial program allowed illegally built second units to secure permits if certain guidelines were followed.





# November is Pre-Diabetes/ Diabetes Month

Did you know that 8.3% of the population in the United States has diabetes? This is equivalent to approximately 25.8 million children and adults. 27% of people over age 65 have diabetes. 79 million people have prediabetes.

This is a growing problem. In 2010, 1.9 million new cases of diabetes were diagnosed in people ages 20+. The cost of diabetes has increased to \$245 billion U.S. in 2012: \$176 billion for direct medical costs and \$69 billion in reduced productivity.

#### What is pre-diabetes?

When a person has pre-diabetes, the blood sugar levels are higher than normal but are not high enough to be called diabetes. There are no clear symptoms for pre-diabetes. You can take steps to reverse, delay, or prevent Type 2 Diabetes and heart disease.

#### What is Type 2 Diabetes?

Type 2 Diabetes occurs when your body can no longer make enough insulin to convert glucose from the food you eat into energy. High glucose levels stay in your body and can cause serious problems. There is no cure for diabetes, but it can be managed.

# How can you take care of your diabetes?

Choose what, how much, and when to eat: "Create your plate"

Be physically active (30 minutes, 5 days a week)

Check your blood glucose (see CMHS screenings below)

Take your prescribed medication;

keep appointments with your physician Attend classes: educational and/ or support groups with family members (see CMHS classes below)

Maintain a healthy weight

# Tips to avoid colds or flu this holiday season while traveling

# **Religion**Chanukah

Every year between the end of November and the end of December, Jewish people around the world celebrate the holiday of Chanukah, the Festival of Lights. Chanukah begins on the 25th day of the Hebrew month of Kislev, but the starting date on the western calendar varies from year to year. This year it starts at sundown on Nov.27 and ends on Dec.5.

In the land of Judea there was a mean (boo) Syrian king, Antiochus. The king ordered the Jewish people to reject their God, their religion, their customs and their beliefs and to worship the Greek gods. There were some who did as they were told, but many refused. the government is proposing tougher rules to protect America's pets for how

their food is manufactured. The new Food and Drug Administra-

tion regulations would establish production guidelines to help prevent harmful bacteria and other contaminants from tainting pet food and animal feed (I hate the taste of bacteria so this is good). The aim is to reduce food-borne illness that could harm people as well as animals (especially us dogs).

This is the result of the FDA continuing to grapple with a widespread outbreak of illness linked to imported jerky treats. About 3,600 dogs (and even a few cats) have become sick since 2007 after eating the Chinese-made products; nearly 600 pets have died.

The FDA says the proposed rules will give its inspectors more power to crack down on offenders during the manufacturing.

■ Writing in the LA Times (I read 2 newspapers) Sandy Banks stated "Last spring I wrote about a novel campaign to keep dogs and cats out of the South Los Angeles shelter by helping pet owners through difficult times."

"With a little money and a lot of volunteers, the intervention program run by Downtown Dog Rescue had paid vet

bills and pet deposits, repaired backyard fences, spayed and neutered hundreds of dogs, and found homes for pets whose owners had to give them up."

"In just 7 months, the group has kept more than 1,500 dogs and cats from winding up in the shelter. That's in a neighborhood where almost a third of the people live in poverty and packs of stray dogs roam the streets (Maybe a lot of these people shouldn't have pets to begin with)."

■ The Ventura County Board of Supervisors has approved a rule that would require dogs and cats older than 4 months to be spayed or neutered. The board voted 4-1 on the new ordinance. The rules are intended to prevent dog breeding in puppy mills and reduce the number of homeless animals, many of which are unadoptable and eventually euthanized (Like those in the article above).

Final adoption of the ordinance is scheduled for Dec. 10. It would take effect 30 days later.

The ordinance would apply to unin-

Recently corporated areas only but is certainly a good idea for Ventura also (I have been).

(Pretty Happy Dog)

Pet owners would receive a 60-day notice to spay or neuter their animals by the time the pets are 4 months old. Violators would be fined \$25 per day if they fail to spay or neuter their pets within 60 days of receiving a notice. Multiple violations could result in civil penalties up to \$500.

■ A recent party celebrated the retirement of 3 dogs from their duties with the Simi Valley Police Department's K-9 program. The Simi Valley Police Foundation hosted the event in honor of German shepherds-Rocco, Gino and Zep. The dogs, all over 9, were honored for their service, which ranged from 4 to 7 years.

Replacing a police dog costs on average \$15,000-\$25,000, and replacing a columnist dog (With a PhD) is priceless.

■ A Sierra Madre resident recently escaped eviction when the town's police chief decided that "Neil" (Not the resident) was actually a pot-bellied pig, not a hog. Which was good for Neil, because hogs are illegal in Sierra Madre.

Neil couldn't live in Seal Beach, however, because the Orange County beach city has adopted an anti-pig law, adding it to the list of animals that are illegal to keep. Hogs - along with goats, horses, cows and mules - were already banned in the city limits. Personally I like pigs and hogs equally as long as they are bar-b-qued.

■ Researchers meeting in Chicago have presented findings from 3 new studies that show health and other benefits from human-animal interaction (I could have told them that and saved them a lot of money). Scientists who examined the impact of pets on physical and emotional health and on human social relationships have found positive and lasting effects of pet ownership and pet therapy.

"What we're seeing overwhelmingly is benefits from the interaction," says Dr. Sandra McCune, Scientific Leader of Human-Animal Interaction at the Waltham Centre for Pet Nutrition, based in Leicestershire, England.

In one of the studies, University of Maryland researchers looked at elderly adults with dementia residing in assistedliving facilities and found that structured interaction with a dog helped improve their mental health and physical function. The study involved 40 elderly adults with dementia who had two, 60-90 minute sessions per week for 3 months, during which they could interact with a visiting dog. The interaction included feeding and grooming the dog using large and small motor skills.

"They had to put a collar on the dog or do something that was dog-related and what they found was that really helped their physical functionality of being able to open things and being able to manipulate things with their hands," McCune says. "What you find is that it really improves their mental health so their depression scores are lower (better) and their physical function is better. And over time, those results persisted."

# Nobody is immune to crime

The Ventura Police Department has issued a Community Crime Advisory due to an increase in reported incidents of packages being taken from the porches/ doorsteps of residents' homes throughout Ventura.

For example, for the months of September and October 2013 they have had 14 reports of packages stolen from the front porches/doorsteps of homes; (7 in September and 7 in October). When compared to the same timeframe last year there were a total of 4 reports of stolen packages; (3 in September and 1 in October). For the year-to-date of January 1, 2013 to October 31, 2013 there have been a total of 67 reports filed compared to 13 during the same period last year.

Although this type of crime occurs year round, the busy Holiday shopping season is rapidly approaching and naturally many people will have items

delivered to their homes. Unfortunately, the criminals also know this all too well. Nobody is immune to crime but there are a number of steps you can take to reduce your chances of being a victim of this type of crime.

Request delivery of package(s) via signature so as to ensure the package will not be left on the porch.

Track your package online so you have a better idea of when it is scheduled

If a package was left on your doorstep, and if possible, have a neighbor, friend, or family member go to your home and pick up the package.

If you know you will not be home in advance then have the package delivered to your work (if possible) or to a neighbor, friend, or family member who will be

If you have a P.O. Box at a local mailbox services store, UPS Store, etc., then have your package delivered directly to the store.

Effective lighting is always a good deterrent. Install a light/motion light on your porch/doorstep in the event your package is delivered in the late afternoon Continued on page 20

# Rubicon overflows with holiday magic

There is so much holiday magic at Ventura's Rubicon Theatre Company this season – over 35 shows and events – that it's impossible to fully share all the details here.

There's a Santa's Village, Dickensian carolers, a late night comedy event, holiday readings, Tiny Tots concerts, a holiday boutique and two blockbuster musical productions.

The merriment begins with the 2013 edition of A Rubicon Family Christmas Concert. conceived and directed by the Rubicon's multi-faceted Associate Producer, Brian McDonald. The cast features Santa, Frosty, Rudolph, a talented local youth chorus and six Broadway veterans, all making marvelously memorable musical magic. # **About Time**

About Time is Ground Hog Day with a British sensibility and an equal amount of charm and kookiness.

But there's enough here that's new in this fresh take on time travel to make it a must-see.

As is always the case in this type of fantasy, you have to suspend logic and go along with a few wacky rules. In this one, Tim (red-head Domhnall Gleeson, from the Harry Potter films) inherits the ability to go back – only back, not forward – in time from his father, the brilliantly quirky Bill Nighy.

How is this accomplished? Well, as his dad explains, there's standing in a dark closet, clenching fists, and recalling the exact moment you wish to return to. As long as it's not before the birth of your most recent child, see, because then DNA gets involved. OK, as long as you understand that, you can return to any point in time. Now that we've gotten the wacky rules out of the way, let's do the Time Warp.

Young Tim gets the hang of it fairly quickly, and uses his talent to "do-over" any number of things from minor faux pas (knocking over a table full of drinks at a party) to sexual blunders (going back to master the critical unhooking of Mary's bra) to changing his mind repeatedly about who will be the best man at his wedding. The comic tone of the movie changes when Tim goes back in time to try to save a loved one from disaster.

Writer/director Richard Curtis is master of the light comedic touch, also evidenced in *Love Actually*, and *Four Weddings and a Funeral*. He always succeeds in combining young hopefuls, black sheep, and raging misanthropes in a most engaging way. Also, on display are the unmatched irony of Bill Nighy, the open hearted charm of Rachel McAdams as Mary, and the playful nuttiness of Lydia Wilson as sister Kit Kat. Venerable British thespian, Lindsay Duncan, brings warmth to the role of the mother.

One great thing about movies is that they take us places we'd like to go to, but might never get the chance. In *About Time* 

passionately pursued a communal lifestyle and other radical experiments in utopian living.

"The Source", their pioneering Sunset Strip health food restaurant, their legendary rock band Ya Ho Wa 13, and the seemingly endless array of beautiful women in the family, made them the darlings of hipster Hollywood. But their outsider ideals and unconventional behavior became an issue with local health and building code authorities. Father Yod made a lot of people nervous with his 13 wives, free love doctrine, and other "cult-like practices". Controversy followed the group when they decamped for Hawai'i in search of a fresh start. This is not what they found in that island paradise.

we get to visit "Dans Le Noir," French for "In the Black," a restaurant where service and dining take place in pitch darkness, the ideal place for Tim and Mary's initial meeting. You know you've always wanted to go to one of those places. Too dark? OK, then you'll probably prefer another unique location, the fashion photography exhibit featuring supermodel Kate Moss, a fun backdrop to the couple's second meeting, this time fully lit.

The "do-over" is clearly an irresistible fantasy, probably the one super power we'd all like to have. Who wouldn't want the ability to go back and do it right, or do it better, or kiss the one we should have kissed? Where this movie succeeds is in showing both the unfair advantage of this ability and the pitfalls inherent. If all decisions and actions can be recalled, then what weight does the present have? What care, if any, do we need to take in our daily lives? This movie is guaranteed to make you think about the past and the present in a fresh and funny way.










# This 'n' That

# Many fires are caused by holiday trees

Each year, fire departments respond to an average of more than 200 structure fires caused by holiday trees. These fires cause an average of 13 deaths, 27 serious injuries, and \$16.7 million in property damage. By carefully choosing, decorating, and caring for your holiday tree, as well as disposing of your tree properly, you can make your holiday season much safer.

When placing your tree, ensure it is at least 3 feet away from any heat sources. Items such as fireplaces, radiators, candles, heat vents or even lights can become an ignition source. Ensure that the tree is not blocking an exit that could be needed during an emergency.

If you purchase an artificial tree, be sure that it is certified or identified by the manufacturer as fire resistant. When choosing a natural tree, pick one with fresh, green needles that do not fall off when touched. Before placing the tree in a stand, cut off one to two inches from the base of the trunk. Add water to the tree stand right away and be sure to check it daily. Allowing your tree to become completely dried out is a recipe for disaster; keep it fresh by keeping it watered. When your holiday tree begins dropping needles, it's time to get it out of the house. Dried out trees pose a significant fire danger and should never be kept in the home or garage. They should not be placed outside directly against the home. Check with your local trash service for tree recycling options.

The decorations you choose for your tree should be the safest possible. Always use lights that have the certification of an independent testing laboratory. Be sure to note whether the lights are for indoor or outdoor use. Replace any string of lights that has worn or broken cords, or that has loose bulb connections. Connect no more than 3 strands of mini-string sets, and a maximum of 50 bulbs for screw-in bulb sets. Read manufacturer's instructions for the maximum number of LED strands to connect. Lit candles should be used with caution around the home. They should never be used to decorate the holiday tree.

Always turn off your holiday tree lights before leaving home, or before going to bed. Have a functioning smoke detector on each level of the home and outside every sleeping area. Also, have a fire extinguisher in a readily accessible location. Test your smoke detectors monthly, and replace the batteries every six months. An emergency home evacuation plan should be created and practiced with all members of the family. Taking a few precautions during your holiday decorating, and taking proper care of your holiday tree, will help you and your loved ones stay safe and fully enjoy this holiday season.

If you have a home security video surveillance system make sure it is operational and recording activity.

Additionally, you can also register your camera security system with our department. Cameras that record and view public areas such as streets, sidewalks, parking lots, etc., can be extremely useful in helping to identify individual(s) and solve crimes.

The program with our department works whereby should a crime occur in the vicinity of a registered camera, a representative from the VPD might contact the registered owner of the camera and ask to review the recorded footage relevant to the date and time of the incident.
