Turning Point Foundation's Annual Kinetic Sculpture Race will be held on October 17 in, and around the Ventura Harbor. This is a free family oriented thrilling, exciting and sometimes humorous event. The Kinetic Sculpture Race in Ventura is the only Kinetic Race held in Southern California. In 1969, Hobart Brown started the Kinetic Sculpture Race, almost by accident when he modified his son's tricycle to a fivewheeled, decorated "Pentacycle" and another local artist and gallery owner, Jack Mays, challenged him to a race.

This unique event features peoplepowered works of art built to travel over an exciting all-terrain racecourse beginning with the launching of the vehicles into the water at the boat ramp on Spinnaker drive, continuing across the sand and around an oval track and ending with a drive through the Mud Pit at Ventura Seaside Village. These Kinetic Sculptures can have over 100 gears, ingenious treading, flotation and propulsion, athletic pilots and mechanically advanced pit crews. These uniquely engineered machines are transformed into moving artful sculptures.

















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

adds people who pay higher taxes and spend more money. This helps underwrite all of Ventura's services to lower income people as well as supporting restaurants and stores, and neither of these projects, nor any of the ones cited at the beginning of this letter, take farmland out of production."

"The City of Ventura needs to move forward on some of these projects. I understand that water use will be an issue, but the technology exists to make new construction much more water and power efficient than the old homes, and either a city moves forward or it moves backward – it doesn't and can't stay the same."

I included her quote because I completely agree with her.

A city certainly needs a diverse population, and we also need "rich" and even "very rich" residents to bring companies here so that low and moderate income workers have jobs in Ventura. That is why we need "executive housing". Many of our residents need to leave Ventura each day to work because there are not enough jobs here.

In defending the concept that Ventura already has executive housing, I once heard one of our City Council Members state that "we have lots of million dollars homes here" suggesting that these represent executive housing, which they do not.

Of course we have million dollar houses - we are a beach community with homes on the ocean or views of it which is why they are worth a lot of money. **Executive homes are large**, sit on several acres of land and typically worth \$10,000,000 and up. They don't have 5 foot side yards and 20 foot front yards.

I've heard folks say what makes Ventura unique, and a great place to live, is that we have jobs for low and moderate income wage earners. I live here because of the **usually great weather**, the arts and our laid back style, as do most people. Not because we have housing for low and moderate income workers (which by the way are always consistently being built). It is wonderful that these folks can live here as well, but we need the full spectrum of the population.

There is a group of people here that just doesn't want any changes made that seem to have a "we don't want no rich people here" mentality.

Without new money coming into Ventura we will continue to have a stagnant tax base, and people

will complain about a corroding infrastructure. This erosion will continue unless we can entice new, larger companies to relocate, or open branches, here.

In fact, several companies recently left Ventura and moved their employees to their new locations.

■ Which brings me to the proposed **55-unit Regency** project that would be located on our hillside. It's many years away but already has an organized group opposed to it.

I asked a neighbor with an opposition sign on their front lawn some questions about the project.

Have you seen the property? "No I haven't."

Have you seen the proposed

drawings?
"No I haven't."

Have you read the geology report? "No, I haven't."

So you are against a project that you have no knowledge of?

"Yes, because the LA developer doesn't want to follow our HMP. I

don't know what the HMP, is but he should follow it."

This represents another group of Venturan's who don't want any change, so they oppose everything without really knowing enough to thoughtfully determine if it is good or bad for Ventura.

Future Ventura Breeze issues will include more facts regarding this project, so that readers can make more informed decisions about the positive and negative effects of the project.

I certainly haven't decided for or against it at this point. To be honest, I might be prejudiced in favor of it because of the new people/money it will bring to the city. Plus, the developer would be gifting more than 700 acres of the site to the Hillside Conservancy. I have been to the proposed property and it would be a wonderful addition to our being able to access and enjoy the hillsides. Fifteen minutes into this property and you are in a different world.

The former Sams Rv Club building, located at the end of Vista Del Mar, is being remodeled and will be the future home of the Ventura County Credit Union.

Two downtown restaurants have closed for different reasons The owners of **71 Palm** have called it quits after 20 years and will be closing this week. Just time to move on they said. Sorry to see them go.

And, after only 8-months, **Padrino's Ristorante** (on Santa Clara) closed because they just couldn't make it - not much of a surprise, really. Another Italian restaurant is waiting for approvals to move in.

# The story behind downtown paid parking

The City erroneously entered into competing contracts with the movie theater and Dan Frederickson (60 California Street, LLC owner of the California Street building). The theater was to have full access to the structure, but then the City leased the gated spaces to Frederickson.

In spring 2014 the parties threatened to sue the City. Without public knowledge, the City made an agreement with the property owners in February. This includes installing paid parking even though the City agrees that there is no current need for paid parking. Frederickson wants lower usage so there is more availability by his second floor bridge.

The City's proposal includes 90 minutes free, then \$1 per hour, with an undetermined amount of increased lighting and security. The City projects \$50,000 in annual revenue before maintenance costs, although they have not released usage and length of parking time assumptions. Any changes could significantly reduce the projected revenue.

In a Facebook survey of over 2,600 people, 98% opposed paid parking and 91% said they would reduce or eliminate downtown trips.

Many have worked hard for years to create our unique downtown experience.

This summer, VVCB's Visitors Center staff and volunteers welcomed over 8,000 visitors from 35 different countries and five different continents -an exciting feat at a time when other visitor centers are decreasing in visitation and some even closing.

Visitors Center also continues to enjoy record retail sales which have quadrupled since 2012. Tourists and locals alike come to the Visitors Center to find Venturainspired gifts, souvenirs, apparel and more featuring 35 local vendors.

This summer, VVCB continued its support of community events in Ventura. The Visitors Center served as a venue for the Artwalk and sold tickets for the Ventura County Fair which complimented by beautiful weather, brought over 318,000 through its gates. "The biggest party of the summer was a phenomenal success not just in terms of numbers but in terms of smiles and happy fair-goers" said Ventura County Fairgrounds CEO/Executive Director, Barbara Quaid.

VVCB also worked on partnerships for conferences and group events that potentially generated an estimated economic impact of over \$3 million this summer, and partnered with an array of travel writers from Dubai, Brazil and across the USA.

VVCB's following has grown by 11,000 people since last year for a total of 40,000 social media fans. VVCB's website has quickly become

its number one marketing asset with over 200,000 visitors to the site this summer with top visitors from the US, Canada, United Kingdom, Russia, and Brazil.

At our hotels, our summer occupancy rate averaged 90 percent on weekends, up 2.5 percent from the same time last year, and our year-to-date occupancy rate is still growing and currently up 1.7 per cent from last year. ## **CATCH** project receives second year funding

The Ventura County Health Care Agency's Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD) Access to Community Health (CATCH) project has been awarded a second year of funding through the Health Care Innovations Award (HCIA) program in the amount of \$1.3 million from the Centers for Medicaid and Medicare Services (CMS). The total grant award is \$4.1 million dollars over three years.

Ventura County is honored to be one of only 39 organizations nationally to receive this prestigious award.

COPD is an umbrella term that includes chronic lung diseases such as emphysema, chronic bronchitis and asthma. The CATCH program has implemented new, evidencebased guidelines throughout the County for prevention, diagnosis and treatment of COPD because it is the third leading cause of death in the nation and the fourth leading cause of death in Ventura County. There are more than 28,000 people that suffer from COPD in Ventura County and many are unaware that they have it. A simple test called a Pulmonary Function Test (PFT) can be performed to determine if someone has COPD. Identifying and treating COPD in its early stages can drastically change/slow the progression of the disease.

"CATCH is also reforming the way in which we pay for the treatment of COPD, reducing costs by an estimated 22% over all. During the first year of the project, CATCH has been able to reduce Emergency Room visits by 18% and the number of critical vaccinations for COPD patients has increased by 25%. CATCH is improving the quality of life for COPD patients while reducing the costs of treatment," says Dr. Renee Higgins, CATCH Principal Investigator.

The CATCH team of specialists, led by Susan White Wood, CATCH Program Director, can travel county-wide to provide services. The team includes a Project Director, two Registered Nurses, two Respiratory Therapists, two Community Health Outreach Workers, a Medical Office Assistant and contracts with numerous specialists throughout the community. 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

Ventura County Hosted QPI Conference for its Utilization of Quality Foster Care Training for Families—The Quality Parenting Initiative (QPI) statewide conference in Ventura on Friday, Sept. 25, brought unique perspective concerning the development for high quality care, partnership and support for children in foster care and the caregivers, families and Child Welfare staff walking alongside them. Eighteen participating counties across California were in attendance. The event, which took place at the Crowne Plaza, entailed keynote addresses from Executive Director of Youth Law Center (YLC) and former foster youth - Jennifer Rodriguez. In addition, the conference featured foster youth/ family panels and group discussions on topics relevant to quality care and partnership. 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

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

## Getting the prescription right for America's seniors

September was national Pain Awareness Month. And one of the major issues policymakers, healthcare providers, and average citizens alike need to focus on is how to improve pain management among older Americans.

Unsurprisingly, this population experiences more pain than younger Americans. Among active seniors, it's estimated that 25-50 percent experience persistent pain. For these Americans, finding ways to

manage pain without reducing quality of life is essential. Among seniors residing in nursing homes or receiving in-home hospice care, as many as 85 percent experience persistent pain.

Plus, older Americans account for an outsized shared of American drug consumption. People 65 years and older make up just 13 percent of the U.S. population, yet they're responsible for a full third of all pharmaceutical purchases.

And seniors rely heavily on opioidbased treatments, which are extremely powerful but come with elevated risks of addiction and abuse. Since 2007. the number of opioid prescriptions for patients aged 60 years or older has jumped by nearly a third. That's double the rate of growth for middle-aged patients during that same period.

Of course, responsible prescription drug use - opioid-based based or otherwise - can be transformative for patients, alleviating chronic pain, speeding up post-operative recovery, boosting emotional well-being, and enhancing cognition.

However, opioid drugs can also

cause huge, potentially fatal, problems for seniors. Elderly patients tend to be taking other drugs that can interact with opioids and cause adverse side effects. Their physical frailty exacerbates these problems. And opioid overuse can slow post-surgery recovery and speed up cognitive function

Abuse also puts senior patients at much higher risk of falls, which can cause serious bone fractures and shorten life. In fact, a 2010 paper in the Archives of Internal Medicine found that Medicare patients using opioids were four times more likely to suffer a fracture than enrollees using non-opioid treatments.

These risks are a big reason that the Joint Commission, a national non-profit that certifies healthcare organizations, specifically warns that opioids may not be appropriate for all patients.

The Interagency Pain Research Coordinating Committee, which is run by the federal Department of Health and Human Services, recently published a comprehensive strategy for improving pain management that includes specific steps for helping seniors. Policymakers should heed its recommendations.

Avoiding addiction and overdose requires careful care management and regular dialogue between doctors and their senior patients.

Caregivers need to adopt treatment protocols that can help prevent addiction, such as using drugs with the fewest adverse effects first. Providing non-opioid pain medication before and after surgery can also help.

Likewise, caregivers should embrace proven non-opioid pain management alternatives, such as intravenous acetaminophen and over-the-counter painkillers like ibuprofen. These medications can be just as effective at reducing patient suffering without running the high risks of addiction. And even non-pharmaceutical pain management techniques such as yoga, stretching, massage, or acupuncture can help relive senior suffering.

All courses of treatment should begin with an honest and open conversation between patients and their caregivers about how pain affects them, how they are prepared to deal with pain, and how their ideas can be woven into treatment.



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## **Police Reports**

#### **Firearm Possession**

On Sunday, September 27th, at 7:28 a.m., officers responded to a call of suspicious circumstances at a residence in the 1800 block of Topaz Avenue. The caller reported seeing an unknown subject, Dan Hulsey, sleeping on the doorstep of a neighbor's residence. Hulsey was said to be in a sleeping bag.

When the first officer contacted Hulsey, he found that he had a firearm on the ground next to him. Additional officers arrived and took Hulsey into custody.

The investigation revealed the firearm, along with several other items of property found in Hulsey's possession, was stolen out of an unreported burglary to a motorhome in Saticoy. All of the property was returned to the owner.

#### **Package Theft**

On Friday, September 25th, at 1:50 p.m., an alert citizen saw Mary Dunham-Lopez and Victoria Sander-Robles attempt to steal a delivery package from the front porch of his house. After the suspects were confronted by the citizen, they dropped the package and fled from the porch. The citizen called the police to report the crime, and he briefly followed the suspects as they fled in their vehicle.

A responding patrol officer located the suspect vehicle and was able to conduct a traffic stop in the 2200 block of East Main Street. The subsequent investigation revealed additional stolen delivery packages from other residences in Ventura. The suspects were arrested and booked into VC Jail. The owners of the recovered stolen packages were contacted and the items were returned.

#### **Armed Robbery**

One of the clerks opened the cash register and handed the suspect an undisclosed amount of money. The suspect fled away from the gas station.

Several patrol officers responded to the area and attempted to locate the suspect, but he was not found.

#### Armed Robbery

On Thursday, October 1st, at 4:09 a.m., the VPD received a call from a Three Star Book and News clerk, located at 359 East Main Street, reporting an armed robbery. The suspect entered the store posing as a customer and lured the clerk from around the counter. Then the suspect pointed a handgun at clerk and demanded the money from the register. Once the suspect received the money, he bound the victim's wrist and forced him to lie on the ground. The clerk was ordered not to move and he was unharmed during this incident. The suspect fled in an unknown direction.

VPD patrol officers responded to the area and attempted to locate the suspect, but he was not located.

#### Felon in Possession of Firearm

On Thursday, October 1st, at 8:28 p.m., two officers assigned to a special enforcement detail were in the area of North Bank Drive and Johnson Drive when they

observed Jeffrey Savala riding a bicycle without a light. The officers stopped Savala, who was acting very nervous and reached for his waistband area. One of the officers conducted a patdown search of Savala and found a loaded handgun in his pants pocket. After further investigation, the officers learned that the serial number on the handgun had been obliterated and Savala is a convicted felon prohibited from possessing a firearm. Savala recently plead guilty to two counts of felony vandalism for his involvement in a series of tire slashes that occurred in the city of Ventura earlier this year and was released on his own recognizance pending sentencing.

#### **Burglary With Shooting**

On Friday, October 9th, at 7;50pm, the Ventura Police Command Center received several calls regarding a shooting at a residence in the 8200 block of Denver Street. Patrol officers arrived on scene and found a victim at the residence who was suffering from non-life threatening gunshot wounds. The investigation revealed the victim had interrupted a residential burglary at the house and was shot by the suspect. The victim was transported to a local hospital for treatment.

animal welfare, reduce suffering and save lives," says Lieff, who learned about Davey's death and vowed to get involved. "We want to ensure something positive comes out of Davey's horrific fate and pledge to make Santa Barbara the most animal responsible county in California. After that, we will continue our mission throughout the United States and beyond."

Davey's case has drawn nationwide attention due to the severity of the abuse inflicted by his owner, Chinese student Duanying Chen, 19, who is serving a 12-month sentence in county jail. At the time Davey was relinquished to a local pet emergency clinic by Chen's girlfriend, he had multiple broken bones, significant infections and burns over 80 percent of his body, the District Attorney's Office said in a January 2014 statement. His life could not be saved.

I think that a 12-month sentence is not nearly enough. How many years would he have gotten if this was a human that he tortured.? And a human might be able to fight back and this poor dog couldn't.

Lief stated "We're still working on the campaign details and will announce our plan in the next couple of weeks."

## What to look for when buying a computer - Part 1

Buying a computer is no easy task, and with the cost of many of the machines out on the market today, you want to make sure you're making the right purchase so you don't blow your money on something that stops meeting your demands within a year. Not all machines are created equal, and unless you're pretty familiar with computer hardware, you might have a hard time determining just how unequal they are.

This guide should help you get a better understanding of what all the components of the computer will mean for you and make it easier to decide what you want, need, and which elements to prioritize so you get the right computer for you and don't spend any more money than you must.

#### 1. Desktop or Laptop?

This is probably one of the simplest choices to make and can have a big impact on the overall cost of your computer, including expenses that might not come right at the time of the purchase. In general, if a laptop and desktop are boasting all of the same performance specs, the desktop will be cheaper. It might not make sense, since it's a bigger piece of hardware, but the ability to cram a lot of components into a small space and the need for a battery is what ups the price of the laptop — notice the premium paid for Apple's thinner devices.

If you often need your computer on the go, the choice is simple: laptop. If it's only occasional and you don't need much more than a browser or word processor, you may be able to find a cheap tablet or netbook to do the job, and could potentially afford it with the money you save by getting a desktop as your primary computer.

#### 2 Know the processor and what it

The simplest way to explain the processor is that it's the brain of the machine. If you want a fast computer that boots up programs in a flash, completes tasks as soon as you start them, and doesn't keep you waiting, then you want the strongest processor available — and who doesn't? You just have to know what you're looking at when you see a processor's details.

The short and simple of processors is in the number of cores and the speed (labeled in GHz or Gigahertz) of the processor. The speed of the chip will tell you how much data it can process in how much time, so the bigger the number, the better. The number of cores functions as a multiplier, as the processor is actually a stack of cores that each run at the listed speed (e.g. a single-core 2GHz processor is a lot slower than a four-core 2GHz processor). Multiple cores can also help with multi-tasking, as each can be working on different tasks.

Make sure to ask how many cores are on the chip and what the clock speed is. Two computers might both say they have an Intel i5 chip, but the number of models that go into the group are many and their speeds and core counts can be leagues apart.



standard housing, but what seems to happen is that instead of infilling areas in the city where streets and sewers etc. already exist, the building is done on what is probably the most valuable and productive farmland in the world. And once it is taken out of farming, it is gone, never to be replaced, and there isn't going to be more made elsewhere. We can build housing on empty lots, or tear down old warehouses and buildings that have outlived their purpose, but we can't ever grow strawberries or lemons or avocadoes when the farms are built upon.

The proposed Hillside development (Regency 55-unit), if it passes all the geological testing, etc, at least will be built on non-productive land and will be a tremendous boost to downtown businesses, as will the proposed housing where Joe's Crab Shack was. That area (Sanjon and Thompson) is full of boarded-up stores. Ventura needs to grow its tax base and building higher-level or luxury homes adds people who pay higher taxes and

spend more money, which helps underwrite all of Ventura's services to lower income people as well as supporting restaurants and stores, and neither of these projects, nor any of the ones cited at the beginning of this letter, take farmland out of production.

The City of Ventura needs to move forward on some of these projects. I understand that water use will be an issue, but the technology exists to make new construction much more water and power efficient than the old homes, and either a city moves forward or it moves backward – it doesn't and can't stay the same.

How about an update on all the projects from your original list? Sincerely,

## **Show Time**

## Sicario

Denis Villeneuve's Sicario doesn't allow us to be a bystander - if you come at it thinking you can just sit back and enjoy, you're wrong - it'll chew you up and spit you out. At the very least, it's a compelling crime drama with unrelenting tension; what separates it from most films of its ilk however, is the way that Villeneuve and scriptwriter Taylor Sheridan deliver a nuanced take on the hopelessly twisty Mexican drug wars. Like real life, there's no easy solution to this rampant problem, nor does the film truly provide one.

After a botched raid involving rotting, mutilated corpses and a battering ram, FBI agent Kate Macer (Emily Blunt) comes into contact with a DOD consultant named Matt (Josh Brolin). If Kate will volunteer, he promises to give her a real shot at combatting the Mexican drug wars, which are spilling into her jurisdiction. After hesitantly accepting, Kate is thrust into an exceedingly complex web of deception and brutality, with no clear sign of understanding or even a way out. Clinging to her idealism and true desire to set things right, the by-the-book Kate must learn to survive in a land of wolves.

The view of the story's central conflict makes Villeneuve's film fascinating, presenting it as a breathtaking cinematic descent into hell. The deeper we go, the more nightmarish it gets, but never for the sake of shock, instead illustrating the war on drugs as a savage mobius strip that thrives on ordered chaos, supply and demand.

In the hands of any other writer or director, a film like this would go from one action set piece to another. Instead, there's a weight to everything, with humanity in the balance and poetic contrasts that are dark, yet too urgent to ignore.

In addition to the story's focused themes, the film still manages to deliver two of the most intense sequences of the year. Without spoiling things, one involves an extended excursion across the border and into Juarez, while another photography thermal against the pitch black darkness of night. Villeneuve's direction is as taught and tight as it gets, utilizing stunning photography from Roger Deakins to get both our minds and hearts racing as his characters face insurmountable odds psychologically as well as physically.

There are three incredible performances at its core. Emily Blunt as the idealistic Kate Macer plays a modern heroine who must confront her integrity and the impossible reality of her situation. She's in a tough spot, and Blunt allows the character to be more than just our audience surrogate, but also a relatable cipher that calls us out and makes us complicit in her journey.

She's far from a cartoony archetype thanks to Blunt's simultaneous strength and fragility, but also a fierce character clinging on to what

she believes is right. Benicio Del Toro gets the second most play in the film as the mysterious, shady Alejandro. This is one of his best performances ever, and he is the personification of what the entire film is about, challenging our allegiances through an ambiguous, primal mix of opposing character traits. Josh Brolin's Matt, provides a lot of the film's levity, but it comes with an undeniable dark side. There's a sinister slant that contrasts with his nonchalance about the entire ordeal that's a bit creepy and keeps things always on edge.

Simply put, Sicario isn't just one of the most intense experiences of the entire year, it's also of one the year's best, period. Villeneuve's thriller is on a league of its own, proving that action films can go deeper than empty thrills to explore the consequence and the ideas behind the chaos. My best advice to you: see this and don't forget to breathe; focused and fully formed on every level, it's an unforgettable revelation of the human darkness that lies at the fringe of everything we hold

Warehouse worker Swaino is obsessed with spreading his legend (in his own mind) as a super stud. Frank is a high school drop who started repairing small appliances when he became a father at age 17. Their back stories provide the comedy, raw dialogue, taunting and male rivalry on display in this 70-minute revenge comedy.

Enter Chad, played by Joshua Kahn. He is an entitlement-minded, overprivileged, college preppy who is a local supplier of ecstasy and pot. The social gap between the trio and the newcomer soon expands into a chasm that leads to a series of plot twists involving the internet and technology, as well as attitudes and hazards fostered by social networking.

The play features solid acting by Brian Robert Harris as Frank, Michael Wayne Beck as Packie and Eric Mello as Swaino, each of whom creates a well-defined character and gives a

tightly balanced ensemble performance. Although, when they deliver dialogue in rapid fire fashion it is difficult to hear and catch it all.

The set of the fix-it shop designed by Flying H Theatre Group Artistic Director Taylor Kasch is superbly appointed with tools, stored detritus and things that will be needed someday. His personal garage has probably not been so empty in years because all his man cave stuff is on the set.

The direction by Kathleen Bosworth is equally artistic. The pacing, utilization of the actors, and other touches reflect a studied sophistication.

The script, first performed in 2011, is by a newer playwright. It has a few technical rough edges. For example, the playwright repeatedly uses the same

device for the same purpose. Three times a character abruptly announces, "I have to pee," and leaves the stage just so the action can continue as a two-person scene. Additionally, we found the ending to be less than equal to its build up. Nevertheless, the play is current, significant and for adults only.

## Feeding the Hungry at the Ventura Saturday Farmers Market

On Saturday, October 24, Food Forward will launch its 16th Farmers Market Recovery site, at the Ventura Downtown Farmers Market. One hour before the market closes, a team of volunteers, sporting Food Forward aprons and hats will fan out, collecting donations of unsold produce from the vendors for donation to those in need. Food Forward's Farmers Market Recovery Program has collected and donated 875,000 pounds of fresh produce in three years, and Ventura will be their first market in Ventura County.

On any given Saturday morning, shoppers at the Downtown Ventura Farmers Market stroll the rows of locally-grown vegetables, freshly baked breads and juicy fruit. Trucked in early that morning, vendors sell the majority of the their food but, inevitably, at the end of the market some food remains

So, what happens to this unsold produce? By the time the vendor takes it to their next market day, it will likely have lost its freshness. Volunteers convene at the markets, distribute boxes to farmers wishing to donate and then collect and weigh the boxes of full produce at the end of the market. 100% of what is collected is donated to directservice agencies within a 10-mile radius of the market.

Volunteers are needed for both the Farmers Market Recovery team, and for harvesting from farms, orchards and





Ventura County Potters' Guild presents Harry Poliak's Clay Journey at the Ventura Avenue Adult Center, 550 N. Ventura Avenue, 648-3035

Monday, October 26, doors open at 7 pm, program begins at 7:30 pm.

Harry Poliak was born in 1952 and grew up in South Africa during the Apartheid regime. As a child, the need to travel into the inner recess of his mind and connect to creativity abounded. Influenced by his African roots, he spent many moments entering the realm of ancient art fed by Africa's multicultural identities. Poliak moved to Canada in 1977 where he began replanting forests and where he trained and worked as a cabinetmaker. In 1985 he married a potter. By 1990 he had shifted his focus primarily to clay and started the journey as a production potter making both functional and sculptural ware. Currently Poliak's work is sculptural. In 2000 he relocated to the USA where he pursued opportunities to work in community arts, education and youth development and continue his journey with clay. Poliak will be doing a hand building demonstration of his working process.

Focus on the Masters kicks off its 2015-16 Artist Spotlight season on Nov. 7 in the Screening Room of Brooks Institute in Ventura. The Spotlight interview will feature the inkspots. Founder Virginia Furmanski will be joined by Bay Hallowell and Inés Monguió in a panel discussion led by Dr. Judy Larson. The inkspots were formed in 2007 by Virginia who explains that the group is greater than the sum of its parts. "We take classes together. We learn new techniques."

Four Ventura artists interested in printmaking formed the original inkspots group in 2007 by pooling their resources and creating a printmaking studio at the Sea Breeze Gallery in Ventura. The inkspots of San Buenaventura are a group of artists dedicated to creating original prints using a variety of techniques including etching, collagraph, linocut, monoprint, monotype, woodblock, and digital manipulation.
