Midtown parking structure provides potential for economic growth

Community Memorial Hospital's new \$13 million parking structure in Midtown is a win-win that provides economic growth opportunities along with increased parking spaces for the community, hospital visitors and customers visiting nearby businesses. Through a public-private partnership, the City of Ventura provided the land with

a long-term lease agreement and CMH paid for building the new 571-space, five-level parking structure which opened in September. Of those 571 new parking spaces, 200 are allocated for CMH use, 172 spaces are for the public, and 199 spaces are available to serve further economic development in the area.

The 57,000 square foot building will house obstetrics-gynecology, orthopedics, podiatry, plastics, gastroenterology; hematology/oncology, an infusion center; ophthalmology, optometry with optical dispensing, urgent care, as well as blood draw; general radiology and pharmacy. Local resident considers herself fortunate

Tracy McIntosh was studying to be a teacher when a car accident changed her life. McIntosh already had a history of headaches. "At first it was women coming from the salon. Then they brought their husbands so many of my patients are couples. As it turned out, we are close enough to the naval base that I get men from there. It really is a fun place to work."

McIntosh says she loves everything about Ventura. "Sometimes I'm driving around at sunset and the sky is orange over the ocean and the palm trees are silhouettes in the sky and I can't believe I live here."

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

Well I'm feeling very lucky

The purpose of any city council is to protect and enhance the health safety and welfare of the citizens they serve. To do this, cities deliver certain public goods such as infrastructure (roads, water/sewer systems, parks, etc.) and services (police, fire, planning, etc.). Councils pay for these goods and services with tax dollars derived from the wealth of the community. To increase what is provided, the community must either become wealthier on a per capita basis, or taxes collected per individual must be increased.

For the past twenty-five years, since the Ventura Chamber of Commerce Political Action Committee took voting control of the Ventura City Council in the 1991 election, per capita real purchasing power of the city's citizens has

There 117 Short Term Rentals Registered with the City as of 9-12-16.

There are 77 in the Pierpont Community. Of these 21 of the owners live in Ventura (27%). Only 11 live in our Pierpont Community

I'm very saddened the passing of Sandra Laby as a friend, a spirit, an inspiration, a contributor to the arts and to the lives of so many. She will be very, very missed (sometimes life sucks).

With this issue, we have included statements from five (one was in last issue) of the ten City Council candidates. Hopefully we will be able to include statements from all candidates by election

time. Please read them carefully, and if you can't attend the forums being held you can find them on CAPSTV.

Speaking of the elections, the California voter's information guide is more than 215 pages long, most of which covers the 17 propositions. I'm not a big fan of the initiative process (an initiative is a means by which a petition signed by a certain minimum number of registered voters can force a public vote, sometimes called a plebiscite). I have a problem with the process because there are always a few absurd items that voters get to decide.

For instance, #60 "Adult Films. Condoms. Health Requirements" should be regulated by the industry not by a vote of the people. I think the initiative process should make it more difficult to place propositions on the ballot.

- The closing of ITT Technical schools makes the closing of Brooks seems like nothing. ITT's closing left almost 40,000 students and 8,000 employees stranded. This certainly doesn't make those affected by Brook's closing any less tolerable, but it does appear that "for profit" schools such as ITT are on their way out.
- The construction of the new Community Memorial Hospital just keeps going on and on but at least the new 570 space parking structure is finished and had a ribbon cutting ceremony recently (see article in this issue). CMH's scheduled completion is now set for next summer some six years after groundbreaking and about two years past the original completion date. A new driving entrance to the hospital will be available

The usual excuses of why it has been

delayed almost two years (we only hope two years) have been made. It will take another several months after construction is completed for training, hiring, obtaining many approvals and making sure all of the new very sophisticated equipment works correctly.

In the meantime, businesses in the area are getting killed by the loss of customers due to lack of parking, noise and other distractions. Perhaps the new parking structure will solve some of their problems.

Of course, once completed it will be great for these businesses if they can remain open until then. Yolanda's Mexican Café is going through a major remodeling and will now be completed before the hospital.

I'm sorry to find out that the annual Ventura Kinetic Sculpture Race "where art and engineering collide" won't be held this year. It was a fun and entertain-

ing event that was well attended. And, it included a fundraiser for a worthy cause - the Turning Point Foundation.

The race, located at the Harbor, involved "bicycles" using people power to traverse over water, mud and sand. Over the years the number of participating vehicles has been dwindling. And, most participants came from out-of-town. A large amount of work and effort to build and ride the vehicles certainly reduced the number of entrants.

Since the race just wasn't a very big moneymaker for Turning Point, the benefit to them didn't justify the effort needed to make it happen.

Hopefully some donors will help

bring the race/event back next year.

- The City Council did the right thing by taking back four acres in East Ventura that had originally been planned for Veteran support services. The property had been given over for another use. One of the motivations is that the City wants to get Proposition 41 funding which provides funds for housing and services for homeless veterans. The City will be looking for an affordable housing developer to build low-income housing for our homeless veterans (see, all developers aren't "evil").
- I am really confused by constant (at least it seems like) revisions that the City makes to zoning standards and to the General Plan. Which are often, by the way, in conflict with each other. It almost seems like there is a strategy of "let's try this and if that doesn't work let's try something else." A revolving door process.

A perfect example is **Victoria Avenue**.

Victoria was planned to be a pedestrian-friendly thoroughfare but it never really turned out that way and never would have been. The only place that pedestrians walk is downtown (I don't consider folks in the Harbor to be pedestrians).

Victoria is the only street that can be driven from one end (Foothill) of Ventura all the way to the beach, so it will always remain a busy auto thoroughfare.

Because of this, the Ventura City Council has voted to change the zoning there to allow greater types of development in parts of the "Victoria corridor".

The 7-0 vote means that zoning changes will allow one-story buildings, which were allowed at one time (with a Conditional Use Permit - CUP) and drive-thru businesses. I can't imagine why one-story buildings weren't recently allowed.

City Councilmember Christy Weir was concerned that making the change would result in generic, cookie-cutter projects, but isn't that what our Design Review Committee (and Planning) is there for - to prevent poor design? She was happy, though, that a CUP is required. I would be happy if the DRC (and Planning) did their job.

There are 34 Short Term Rentals in the rest of Ventura.

66% of the Short Term Rentals are in Pierpont, however, Pierpont only represents 3% of the Housing Units. Consequently, the vast majority of Short Term Rentals are heavily concentrated here in our Pierpont Community.

To put it another way 86% of the owners of the Pierpont Community's Short Term Rentals don't even live in our Pierpont Community and 73% don't even live in Ventura. These owners should not be deciding the quality of life for our community. Those not living in Ventura can't even vote for our City Council. Our community residences should not be used as a hotel alternative. Hotels at least have someone on premises to monitor their guests. This, for some reason, is now the Pierpont residents responsibility pitting against neighbor. Robert George



decreased year after year. This has led to a decrease in per capita tax dollars received by City Hall and, therefore, the City is less able to address the health, safety and welfare needs of its citizens.

Because City hall has failed to increase the overall wealth of the community due to incompetent economic development policies and practices, and because it is failing to deliver adequate public goods and services due to this failure, the Ventura City Council is asking its citizens for a tax increase to maintain the public goods and services they provide.

It is now manifestly clear that the citizens of Ventura must be intellectually honest with themselves if they wish to maintain their quality-of-life and ask: "Should we reward consistent failure at City Hall by increasing the taxes we

pay, or should we be more careful about whom we elect to the council?"

I recommend the latter since it will have the greater chance of fixing the problem in the long-run. But, before you take this advice, lets look at some of the supporting evidence.

Ventura used to be the wealthiest city in Ventura County; this is no longer the case.

Ventura used to be the safest city in the county; it now has the highest per capita crime rate.

Ventura used to have some of the highest paying jobs in the county; no longer.

Ventura used to have the best roads in the county; now they are falling apart.

Ventura used to have the greatest number and best parks in the county; now the citizens have to storm City Hall with mobs bearing pitchforks and

torches just to build a small neighborhood park on the west side of town, and still don't have the swimming pool they were promised fifteen years ago.

Ventura's fire department used to be able to respond to emergencies in less than five minutes almost all the time; they are now much less able to do this. This is a life-threatening situation!

In summation: I'm going to paraphrase "Dirty" Harry Callahan: "In all this election confusion you've got to ask yourself 'Do you feel lucky?' Well, do you...?"

Well I'm feeling very lucky, so I'm voting NO on Measure "O" and YES for Brian Lee Rencher, MBA.



I am running particularly on a 'green' agenda

Do I think City Council is doing a poor job? No. But we can do better, and this year I felt a call to help do so.

I am running particularly on a 'green' agenda. This platform will serve not only to move Ventura into a more self-suffcient city but also create job growth and a stronger infrastructure without raising taxes.

Which is why I oppose Measure O. Of course the city needs more revenue, but we're already pricing average middle class households out of Ventura. Additional sales tax would further hurt the families I'd like to be a voice for. The median household income for Ventura is \$66,485/year. Measure O would increase what the average Ventura citizen already pays in taxes by \$170/year. Furthermore, the accountability of where this money will be spent is unanswered. It's a blank check to the Council with an oversight committee appointed by the Council.

Next, the drought. This is a complicated issue; however, the answer is not the state. We cannot become reliant on sources that at any time can cut us off; leaving us worse off than before given the false reality additional water can give at the time in terms of growth for Ventura. Ventura is unique in that all of our water comes from local grounds. It is something to be proud of and why Ventura should be at the forefront of creating a sustainable, local solution.

The city has already enacted the successful "Green Street Project". Additional resources should be provided to water conservation and reuse such as capturing and recycling yard water run-off.

Self-suffciency is not possible without local food. We need to work with farmers and their land to utilize our precious water in the most effcient and effective means. Using permaculture design, we can restructure the lay-out of our farmlands to create a more sustainable and permanent agriculture.

To increase infrastructure, revenue and job growth, I propose 'solarizing' Ventura. At least three farms closed last year. If the land cannot, at this time, be reconstructed into farmable land, then there is a space where a solar farm could be applied. Other cities from here east are contracting with solar energy companies to put solar panels on all homes in their city; thus, not only creating revenue for the city, but dropping the average household energy bill by 75%.

Additionally, Ventura should invest in wind energy. We have the wind and need the power. Echoes throughout the City call for more tech companies. What better way to bring that type of job growth than to be at the forefront of sustainable energy.

There are seven seats on the Council. Ventura would like to see a more diverse representation of the people and their voice. Businessmen, lawyers and the blue collar worker. We may not have all the answers yet, but at least now we're discussing new and innovative ideas. Let's work together to find the solutions for us, our kids, and generations to come. The parking structure consists of 180,000 square feet with an additional 1,400 square feet on the first floor dedicated to commercial and retail space for new businesses. Currently, motorists can access the new parking garage from Brent Street and there is no charge for parking. Soon, an additional parking entrance will be available from Main Street and parking limits (such as 2-hours free) for the 172 public spaces may be noted. Two Chargepoint Electric Vehicle charging stations were also installed at the new structure, bringing the total to 16 stations in Ventura available to EV drivers at city facilities and public parking spaces.

Ventura's Wellness District—anchored by Community Memorial Hospital and the Ventura County Medical Center – is bolstered by both organizations which have made a substantial commitment to the area by investing more than \$500 million to re-build their medical centers. CMH's new 350,000 square-foot hospital, adjacent to the new parking structure and current building, will have a larger emergency room, more operating rooms and private patient rooms. VCMC's new hospital replacement wing project is slated for completion by fall of 2017, with 220,000 square-feet of acute care facilities.

Development of the Wellness District is part of the City's Economic Development Strategy focusing on the health care and biomedical industry, one of the six key areas in the plan. The build out of the District will include medical offices, supportive services, restaurants and retail which help enhance economic activity by creating jobs and businesses. The new parking structure

is a significant step to help attract new development and a fully realized Wellness District.

The City is also working to replace and improve infrastructure in the Wellness District so our underground systems have the capacity for present and future growth. The current sewer line project at Main and Brent Streets is replacing undersized and aged pipes that, in some cases, were installed between 1945 and 1991. Addressing the needs of our aging infrastructure is vital for long-term economic growth, business competitiveness, and to maintain the quality of life for Ventura residents and visitors.

emergency response times. Maintaining fire, police and paramedic emergency response is paramount to protecting the residents of Ventura.

Our city also needs protecting. Ventura is 150 years old and showing its age, including deteriorating streets, sidewalks and storm drains. 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

Dementia friendly Ventura County

Have you seen someone who seemed confused when you are out running errands? Tasks that many of us take for granted, from finding groceries in the store, buying gas, and making a deposit at the bank can be challenging for someone with dementia. Many people with dementia are not diagnosed or deny that they have a problem.

To help the nation address the impact of the alarming nationwide increase of Alzheimer's disease and dementia-related diseases, Dementia Friendly America® was created in 2015 through the White House Conference on Aging. It is a national multi-sector collaboration of six federal agencies and 50

plus partners including AARP and the Alzheimer's Association. The program mirrors the successful Alzheimer's Society dementia friendly program in England.

Dementia Friendly America® helps organizations, which have met specific criteria, to create a dementia friendly environment tailored to the needs and resources of the local community. Online tools, educational materials, templates and sector specific guides are provided to plan strategies, conduct needs assessments, identify issues, and engage the community, including service-oriented organizations, persons with dementia, and their caregivers. The result is to



educate the public and to train persons in service sectors, such as cashiers, bus drivers, receptionists, etc. to recognize the signs of dementia and provide their service in a patient and compassionate

The initial focus in Ventura County will be exploring what is needed to empower the Health Care Sector to become more dementia friendly, and other sectors will follow. The Ventura County Area Agency on Aging (VCAAA), was recently certified by Dementia Friendly America® to lead Dementia Friendly Ventura County.

"The agency is thrilled to be among the 80 communities certified nationwide to be a Dementia Friendly America® partner. It is timely given that at least given that at least 14,000 persons in Ventura County have the disease according to the Alzheimer's Association. "There is no treatment, no cure; it is 100 percent fatal. It is the fifth leading cause of death in California," says Victoria Jump, Director of the Ventura County Area Agency on Aging.

The Dementia Friendly Ventura County Team Leader, Christine Voth, who is also VCAAA's Manager of Business Strategy and Strategic Planning, has assembled a Dementia Friendly Ventura County leadership team. It includes persons from the Alzheimer's Association, Long-Term Care Ombudsman, Senior Concerns, Camarillo Health Care District, Health Care Agency, Elder Care Alliance, Alma Via, Right at Home, Coast Caregiver Resource Center, Oxnard Family Circle, persons with dementia, their caregivers and more. "We have begun with the Health Care Sector and are making plans to address other community sectors. The leadership team will evolve as we address other sectors," says Voth.

The National Training Center is the first facility of its kind in the nation

In August guests, Seabees and staff were invited to the National Disaster Search Dog Foundation's National Training Center located at 6800 Wheeler Canyon Rd, Santa Paula (it feels like Ventura).

They were there to review the work completed in the past year by Navy Seabees from Naval Mobile Construction Battalions 5 and 25 through their Innovative Readiness Training Program.

The Search Dog Foundation is building a 125 acre National Training Center to give America's Canine Disaster Search Teams the advanced training needed for their most challenging deployments around the world and here at home.

It is the only training facility in the U.S. dedicated solely to first responders and their canine partners who risk their lives to make sure no one is left behind in the wake of a disaster.

The "Disaster Training Zone" consists of unique advanced search

sites that simulate the conditions encountered during actual deployments including collapsed structures and train derailments.

The "Search City" includes Murphy's Firehouse, Jessie's Schoolhouse and Maggie's Rubble Pile. Where the dogs can practice on disaster simulation scenarios.

Obedience and search and find demonstrations were held show casing the wonderful dogs abilities and training.

In 2015 Scamp wrote "The six SDF-trained Search Teams who deployed to Nepal as part of Team USA are now home after a long, challenging 18-day mission after joining first responders from around the world searching for survivors of the deadly Nepal earth-quake. During the deployment, the teams helped rescue a teenage boy buried beneath the wreckage, and cleared scores of buildings, giving closure to families and letting rescue crews know they could move on to other areas."

The celebration of Jewish New Year

Rosh Hashanah occurs on the first and second days of Tishri. Jewish Year 5777 this year from sunset October 2, 2016 - nightfall October 4, 2016. In Hebrew, Rosh Hashanah means, literally, "head of the year" or "first of the year." Rosh Hashanah is commonly known as the Jewish New Year. This name is somewhat deceptive, because there is little similarity between Rosh Hashanah, one of the holiest days of the year, and the American New Year.

There is, however, one important similarity between the Jewish New Year and the American one: Many Americans use the New Year as a time to plan a better life, making "resolutions." Likewise, the Jewish New Year is a time to begin introspection, looking back at the mistakes of the past year and planning the changes to make in the new year.

The shofar is a ram's horn which is blown somewhat like a trumpet. One of the most important observances of this holiday is hearing the sounding of the shofar in the synagogue. A total of 100 notes are sounded each day.

No work is permitted on Rosh Hashanah. Much of the day is spent in temple, where the regular daily liturgy is somewhat expanded. There is a special prayer book called the machzor used for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur because of the extensive liturgical changes for these holidays.

Another popular observance during this holiday is eating apples dipped in honey, a symbol of the wish for a sweet new year.

Religious services for the holiday focus on the concept of G-d's sover-

The common greeting at this time is L'shanah tovah ("for a good year"). This is a shortening of "L'shanah tovah tikatev v'taihatem" which means "May you be inscribed and sealed for a good year."

If you had the chance to circumnavigate the globe in a hand-built plane, would you?

With the start of 2016, Ventura resident Ryan Shields was faced with this question. And, while the business owner and father of four had reservations about departing from all that he knew to be part of a journey that covered two oceans, three continents, nine countries and 21 cities, his wife simply said, "You'd be stupid not to."

Shields first began flying in his twenties in Mammoth Lakes, California. He studied at California Polytechnic State University in San Luis Obispo and joined the Peace Corps after graduating, where he was stationed in El Salvador. During this time, he developed a love of travel—venturing through much of Central and South America. Returning stateside, almost two decades ago, Shields married and founded a telecommunications company, placing its headquarters in Ventura, California.

When his business expanded, opening offices in Los Angeles and other locations in the Western United States, Shields decided an airplane was a logical solution to his frequent travel between corporate divisions. He chose the six-seater Epic LT, "a Tesla of the skies," for its carbon-fiber technology and high-performance handling.

As an experienced pilot and dedicated customer, Shields was offered the opportunity to test the full capabilities of his state-of-the-art aircraft as a participant of the Epic Odyssey World Tour. This inaugural trip was hosted by Oregon-based aviation company Epic Aircraft, which specializes in the design and manufacture of all composite, single-engine turboprop airplanes, like Shields' Epic LT.

With his family's encouragement and all lights glowing green, Shields embarked on the first-of-its-kind Epic journey in July 2016. The trip consisted of six Epic aircraft and their owners, including Epic CEO Doug King — accompanied by professional pilots, staff members and a documentary film crew. Epic and its team of international aviation

partners scheduled the logistics of this world tour, and sponsors of the journey included Pratt & Whitney Canada, Garmin, Hartzell, Jeppesen, Spidertracks, Globalstar, and GoPro.

The itinerary spanned 21 days, beginning in Wisconsin and traveling to Canada, Greenland, Iceland, Scotland, England, Italy, the Czech Republic and Russia. Coordinating prior commitments to go on this once-in-a-lifetime adventure, Shields joined the 26-person travel party on the ninth day of the expedition in Prague. The trip ended with a finale in Oshkosh, Wisconsin, where participants celebrated their victory at the Experimental Aircraft Association's (EAA) conference, AirVenture 2016.

"The longest flight leg spanned from Magadan, Siberia, to Nome, Alaska, totaling more than 1,200 nautical miles," said Shields. "It really is a testament to Epic's craftsmanship that all six aircrafts made the entire length of the trip without any major mechanical issues."

The complete Epic Odyssey World Tour covered 16,405 nautical miles, lasting 51.5 flight hours and achieving an average ground speed of 318.5 knots. Shields, who houses his Epic at Oxnard Airport, explained that he came back from the trip with a new respect for the United States' airspace and a better understanding of the broader world.

"I found myself in Moscow's Red Square, and I couldn't help but think of my time in Washington, D.C., with my family several months earlier at the Blossom Kite Festival," said Shields. "There are significant similarities between all cultures, and this trip really helped to dispel a lot of geopolitical myths."

With all 26 voices shouting "success" at the journey's completion, Epic is currently planning its next world adventure. For more information, please visit www.epicaircraft.com.



Approximately 1 hour later the suspect vehicle returned to the Ventura area traveling southbound on the 101freeway with the Highway Patrol still in pursuit. The suspect vehicle was now driving on its front rims and was having a difficult time maintaining control.

As the suspect vehicle passed the Vineyard off-ramp it lost control and drove off the side of the freeway and came to a stop at which time the suspect driver, identified as 35 year old Ventura resident Jason Fenstermacher, was taken into custody.

The accident ignited a small brush fire on the side of the freeway that engulfed the suspect vehicle. It was later determined that this vehicle had been reported stolen a week ago out of Santa Barbara county.

Fenstermacher was transported to VCMC for treatment of minor injuries he sustained in the accident and was then booked into the Ventura County Main Jail and the charges of felony evading and driving a stolen vehicle.

Violent Crime Incident

On September 15, at approximately 6:00am, the Ventura Police Command Center received multiple 9-1-1 calls regarding a person out of control in the 200 block of E. Main Street in the downtown area. Ventura Police Patrol Officers responded to the area and learned the following.

The suspect, 35 year old Forrest Brantley, committed a burglary by breaking into the gift shop at the Ventura Mission. He stole two crucifixes from the gift shop and then left. Brantley approached one person in the parking lot of the Ventura Mission and demanded that victim's phone. When the victim refused to give Brantley the phone, Brantley hit that victim with one of the crucifixes. Brantley then began walking down Main Street and did the same thing to two more victims, striking them with the crucifix. At one point, Brantley approached a 75 year old man who was sitting in his vehicle. Brantley broke the window to the man's vehicle and struck the man, causing him injury.

After battering and attempting to rob multiple victims, Brantley continued walking eastbound on Main Street. Brantley then broke the window to the ARC thrift shop in the 200 block of Main Street and stole a bicycle from the store, committing another burglary. As Brantley continued eastbound he approached another victim in the 300 block of Main Street and battered that victim by striking him with the crucifix.

Victims and witnesses began following Brantley and watched as he continued traveling towards the intersection at Chestnut St and Main St. Ventura Police Officers arrived and took Brantley into custody at that location without incident.

DUI Investigation Resisting Arrest

On September 16, at approximately 8:30pm. the Ventura Command Center received a report of a single vehicle traffic collision in the 4200 block of E Main St.

Ventura Patrol officers responded and arrived on scene to find the driver, identified as 26 year old Thousand Oaks resident Christopher Nuciforo, standing in the roadway next to his vehicle that was resting on the raised center median.

As the officers questioned Nuciforo about the accident they began to suspect that he may be under the influence of alcohol and initiated a DUI investigation.

Nuciforo suddenly ran from the officers across E Main St in an attempt to get away. The officers gave chase and he was quickly apprehended

They continued with their DUI investigation and determined that Nuciforo was driving while impaired and drove his vehicle up onto the raised median while attempting to negotiate a left turn.






Tour the city's nationally renowned Municipal Art Collection of almost 100 works by 73 of Ventura County's best contemporary artists.

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






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Ask The Chief: Ventura City Fire Chief David Endaya

What are the most important priorities for the Ventura City Fire Department right now?

As a full-service city that also functions as the county seat, Ventura faces many challenges when it comes to public safety. The City contends with miles of coastline, railroads, highways, two rivers, the Government Center, the County Jail, the County Fairgrounds, wildland (brush) fire hillsides, tsunami threat, earthquake faults, and more. Despite the many unprecedented challenges, the Ventura Fire Department continues to remain trained, prepared, and equipped to serve you quickly and efficiently in times of crisis or disaster.

Maintaining fire, police and paramedic emergency response is vital to protecting the residents of Ventura. One of our highest priorities is to keep our response times as short as possible. Nearly 85% of all calls to the Ventura City Fire Department's communications center require emergency medical attention. Keeping all six of the City's fire stations open is important to maintaining quick response times and utilizing every resource available to save lives and mitigate emergencies. One of our local fire stations currently relies on temporary funding to remain open.

The City has placed Measure O on the November ballot for voter consideration to make local funding available for vital city services, including keeping all existing fire stations open.

We currently provide service out of six fire stations, with a daily staffing of 22 firefighters citywide, serving a population of over 110,000 people. In 2015, the department responded to more than 14,300 emergency calls for service. In 2008, the department received just over 10,500 calls for service. The continued increase in calls for service remains a challenge for the crews protecting the city around the clock.

In 1974, when the department

responded to 1,975 calls annually, the daily staffing was 19 firefighters. In 2016, the number of permanently funded firefighter positions remains at 19. The additional 3 daily positions we have today are only temporarily funded, and that is the greatest challenge we face when trying to maintain rapid, efficient emergency response. Maintaining today's response times means keeping all of our current fire stations open and operational.

Another priority is ensuring firefighting equipment and training is up to date. The advancement of technology is, at best, very difficult to keep up with. Progressive elements such as new air bags in vehicles and different types of home construction present new challenges to emergency responders. Firefighters must learn and train on the techniques of victim extrication from newer cars and the dangers the airbags pose to rescuers during emergency operations. They must also become experts at understanding newer building construction under fire conditions, and when and how the structure may fail or collapse. These are two examples of the many types of incidents our crews face every year.


Firefighters no longer just "fight fire." Ventura City firefighter professionals are also paramedics, hazardous materials specialists, building collapse experts, urban search and rescue technicians, rope rescue experts, ocean rescue swimmers and trench rescue technicians to name just a few. Keeping all existing fire stations open and our firefighters trained and equipped with the best protective gear and rescue equipment available is important to protecting the health and safety of Ventura residents.

Community celebrates at Launch Party for 5th Annual Water: Take 1

Over 100 community members and water professionals turned out to celebrate the launch of the 5th annual Water: Take 1 film festival at the Crowne Plaza Ventura Beach hotel held Wednesday night, Sept. 21. City of Ventura Councilmembers Carl Morehouse and Jim Monahan were among the local dignitaries present.

Morehouse told the crowd that the city's film festival has a global reach. It's also launched a year-round dialogue that has grown to include two annual events plus a monthly newsletter. "This invites an international audience to share our message online," Morehouse said.

"Water: Take 1 is a homegrown campaign that keeps the conversation going not only about the importance

of local sustainable initiatives, but also the global perspective that sharpens our local focus back to a 'one water' mindset as you will see tonight," said the event host, Ventura Water General Manager Shana Epstein. "Ventura Water is pleased to showcase the topic of water protection, conservation and sustainability to like-minded individuals and organizations in such a creative and engaging way. With the drought uppermost in the minds of Californians, this Short Film Festival brings together our local, national and global conversations."

Finally, Epstein thanked the many sponsors and partners who made Water: Take 1 possible.

Water: Take 1 aims to create a greater awareness of water as a valuable resource by inviting filmmakers worldwide to submit short films of five minutes or less in any genre - drama, documentary, comedy, animation, sci-fi or experimental - that address the topic of water. Awards include the Audience Choice Award, voted on by the general public with the winner receiving an iPad; the award for Best Student Short Film, chosen by a jury of entertainment and water industry experts with a GoPro camera for a prize; the Grand Prize of \$1,500 presented by Ventura Water; and the Ventura Vision Award, which recognizes films shot in and around Ventura and offers a \$500 cash prize.

Film submissions are now being accepted through Dec. 14. Winners will be announced at a celebration event to be held in Ventura in the spring of 2017. Last year, 48 films were entered from around the globe.

Expanding on last year's efforts to engage other local water agencies, the Palmdale Water District was introduced as a new partner and is sponsoring the Palmdale Vision Award, recognizing films that best represent its mission and objectives, also for a \$500 cash prize.

Other new film festival partners include Change the Course (http://changethecourse.us), a national movement

to engage the public, the community and corporations to restore fresh water to people and nature, and Waves for Water (www.wavesforwater.org), which has a focused international mission to bring clean water to the entire world.
