

## More excitement coming to the Harbor!

Two exciting new development projects are underway at Ventura Harbor that will offer Ventura visitors and residents additional opportunities to stay ocean side. The Board of Port Commissioners has approved a proposal from H. Parker Hospitality that will bring two new hotels to Ventura.

The "Harbor Cove Inn," was approved for the 2.07-acre site next to the Channel Islands National Park Visitor Center and Harbor Cove Beach, at the end of Spinnaker Drive. Plans call for an upscale 64-room hotel, complete with restaurants, rooftop pool, fitness center, casual patio dining, beach club program, dock which would serve as a launching spot for fun and excursions to the Channel Islands, whale watching, diving, sport fishing and other harbor activities such as a water taxi service.

Expanding on the seaside brand of Ventura Harbor as home of the Channel Islands National Park, the second hotel property will be located at the area between Ventura Harbor Village and Island Packers and is named "Adventure Lodge,". The Parcel 5 property is about two-thirds of an acre, where H. Parker Hospitality proposes building the hybrid hostel-lodge inclusive of a public pocket park located within the large lawn area that is now the location of many outdoor events.

"We're thrilled to bring new lodging options to Ventura Harbor and are grateful for the community support we've received for these exciting projects," said Port District General Manager Oscar Peña, who noted that Breeze. He spent his last 17 years as

## Main Street Meats & Real Food Market a Ventura legacy

Located at 3049 E. Main St., this landmark has long been known as Ventura's original and most loved butcher shop.

Opening in the 1920's it was originally known as "Triangle Park Market" referring to the nearby intersection of Thompson, Main, and Telegraph Rd. Briefly leased as a restaurant it opened again as a butcher shop known as "Bud's 101 Market", back then Main Street was Hwy 101!

Frank Rea took over in the 1950's and it became our beloved "Frank's Market", with son Mike as successor.

In 2012 Frank's Market suddenly closed and Ventura held its breath ... where we will get those amazing spencer steaks? Rumor was Frank became ill ... truth is Mike simply retired.

A local rancher with over 17 years of experience, Sharon Palmer bought the business and after extensive remodeling re-opened as "Main Street Meats" in 2013.

Three of her kids, Jazmin, Shannon and A.J. work for their mom. Other employees include Aldo, Alexa and Isaiah with Future Farmers of America Continued on page 6

- The new wing at **Ventura County Medical Center** (VCMC) has opened.
  Hopefully the opening of the new CMH will be coming up soon.

■ The California State University system will no longer require intermediate algebra because "they might rarely use it in everyday life."

Using this logic, why should students be required to take history or any other classes that they rarely use in everyday life?

Per an article in this issue, things might be looking up at the **Museum of Ventura County** regarding funding and keeping the facility it open. But just keeping it open really doesn't mean much unless the museum can attract many more visitors on a consistent basis.

- The famous LA Fairfax area Canter's Deli just received a C grade from the health department. Some patrons are shocked thinking that this is a food rating. This is not a food review, it is a health rating (like bugs, etc.).
- Ventura is in the process of exploring the cost of hooking up to state water and developing a water-reuse program (about time). Water officials are also recommending that the city remain in a Stage 3 Water Shortage Event, which requires households to cut water by 20%, or pay higher rates.

Part of that is driven by the **Lake Casitas' water level**, which is at 40.2% and dropping — the lake was at 48% when the rates were adopted and groundwater supplies remain very low.

The Water Commission (an advisory body to the council) approved staying at the Stage 3 level.

Resident Dan Cormode, a frequent speaker at city council meetings about our water concerns, thinks that the supply is overly optimistic and "fails to address the potential impact of several issues adversely impacting the availability of various resources." All of the city's water resources are threatened,", he said.

I certainly do not like the way some Venturan's are cutting their water usage by letting their front yards just get covered with weeds. I'd rather see dirt if they don't want to plant succulents. I just think some folks are using it as an excuse to just not care what the front of their homes look like.


Many disgruntled residents have turned to political activism to voice their concerns. Hence, the foundation of the Ventura Manufactured-Home Residents Council (VMRC), which assembles delegates from nine of the dozen or so mobile homes in the city of Ventura to confront salient issues. The council coordinates with the Golden State Manufactured-Home Owners League (GSMOL), a statewide volunteer organization that promotes resident rights primarily through legislative advocacy. The VMRC convenes the third Wednesday of each month (barring August) at one of the nine mobile home parks. to do."

The meat all comes from local ranchers and is organic, no dyes, no artificial preservatives or hormones, never been packaged or frozen. Much of the meat is dry aged which is the natural way to care for fresh meat, just as the butchers of days past used to hang it. "The problem with local grocery stores," according to Sharon, "is the meat is cut and packed and never allowed to do what it's supposed

Customers can order preferred cuts (like those spencer steaks), but the meat case has a variety of choices such as gorgeous steaks, chops, ribs and some incredible specialties - teriyaki beef short ribs, chicken artichoke feta sausage or sundried tomato, spinach and goat cheese stuffed chicken. There are a variety of custom burgers not found anywhere else such as the bacon burger with beef and bacon ground together. The ultimate burger is a combo of ground tri-tip, brisket and sirloin and all meat is ground fresh daily. Bulk Boxes are available ranging from 20-40 pounds with choices of beef, pork or the forager (combo) pack.

Sharon also does specialty side dishes for holidays, there was "Man Candy" for Father's Day.

There's also a full deli with assorted sandwiches etc.... and smoked tri tips, chickens, ribs and turkeys available to purchase. Selections change frequently.

Specials are offered every weekend. By entering your cell phone number, you'll receive text messages notifying you of the current deal. Deals include \$10 off a \$50 purchase or a free tri tip with purchase of a bulk box and additional 5% discount if you pay cash. Sharon says, "Fees for small merchants are high, I'd rather give my customers that discount." Checking in each visit earns future discounts of \$5 to \$10.

Main Street Meats also calls itself "a Real Food Market" and rightly so because there is local produce and products including Blue Ridge honey, Ventura's Coffee and Earls Gone Wild BBQ sauces and marmalades. Sharon says, "You've got to be part of the neighborhood and support small businesses."

She also shared, "To me, if you don't give to the community, how do you expect the community to give back

Sharon gives generously to the City Center, Future Farmers of America and the Ventura County SELPA project, which provides disabled kids a chance to work in the market every Wednesday. Main Street Meats & Real Food Market carries on the legacy of Frank and Mike Rea.

## Ventura County Fair ends 12 days of fun



For children, taking them to the library, movies or beach making it fun and staying cool at the same time.



In addition, she is trained in The John Argue Art of Movement for people with Parkinson's Disease and Tai Chi: Moving for Better Balance from the Oregon Research Institute for those at risk of falling or repeated falls. The classes she teaches are "evidence based" and recognized by the CDC and NCOA or based on a combination of evidence based programs. Parkinson's Disease And The Art Of Moving is a program developed by John Argue in 1985 to help friends diagnosed with the disease. With input from doctors and others in the neurological field, he developed a program that addresses, movement, speech, and activities of daily living. She has been teaching the program there

and in Camarillo since her training.

## Memory and thinking

Many older people worry about their memory and other thinking abilities. For example, they might be concerned about taking longer than before to learn new things, or they might sometimes forget to pay a bill. These changes are usually signs of mild forgetfulnessoften a normal part of aging-not serious memory problems.

Talk with your doctor to determine if memory and other thinking problems are normal or not, and what is causing

#### What's Normal and What's Not?

What's the difference between normal. age-related forgetfulness and a serious memory problem? Serious memory problems make it hard to do everyday things like driving and shopping. Signs may include:

Asking the same questions over and over again

Getting lost in familiar places Not being able to follow instructions Becoming confused about time, people, and places

### Mild Cognitive Impairment

Some older adults have a condition called mild cognitive impairment, or MCI, in which they have more memory or other thinking problems than other people their age. People with MCI can take care of themselves and do their normal activities. MCI may be an early sign of Alzheimer's, but not everyone with MCI will develop Alzheimer's disease.

Signs of MCI include:

Losing things often

Forgetting to go to important events and appointments

Having more trouble coming up with desired words than other people of the same age

## How Medicare helps people with diabetes

Greg Dill is Medicare's regional administrator for Arizona, California, Hawaii, Nevada, and the Pacific Territories

At a recent meeting of my staff, the topic of diabetes came up.

When we went around the table, it turned out that 25 percent of them have problems with blood sugar. That figure exactly matches the percentage of Americans 65 years old and older who have diabetes or a condition called pre-diabetes.

I'm shocked that such a large number of Americans are affected by this disease, because it's a nasty one. If left uncontrolled, diabetes can lead to some really bad outcomes, including kidney problems, glaucoma and other eye disorders, foot ulcers, amputation of feet or legs, stroke, diabetic coma, and even death.

The good news is that people with diabetes can avoid many of these negative outcomes if their disease is diagnosed, treated, and controlled. At Medicare, we're committed to preventing diabetes as much as possible and treating those who are diagnosed with it.

If your doctor thinks you're at risk for diabetes, Medicare covers screening tests for it. And if you develop the disease, Medicare covers a wide variety of medications, home testing equipment, supplies and self-management training to help you cope with it.

Screening tests are used to detect diabetes early. Conditions that may put you at risk for diabetes include:

High blood pressure

- Obesity (with certain conditions)
- Impaired glucose (blood sugar) tolerance
- High fasting glucose
- A history of abnormal cholesterol and triglycleride levels (Dyslipidermia)

Medicare will pay for two diabetes screening tests in a 12-month period. After the initial screening, your doctor will determine when to do the second test.

You and your doctor can discuss diabetes and any other health concerns you have during a "Welcome to Medicare" visit. Medicare covers this one-time review of your health, including counseling on any screenings, shots, or other care you may need. (You must have this visit within the first 12 months you're enrolled in Medicare

In addition, Medicare covers an annual wellness visit with your doctor, during which you can develop or update a personalized prevention plan based on your current health and risk factors.

If you do develop diabetes, Medicare pays for self-management training to help you learn how to successfully manage the disease. Your doctor must prescribe this training for Medicare to cover it.

The training covers topics including the risks of poor blood-sugar control; nutrition and how to manage your diet; options to improve blood-sugar control; exercise and why it's important to your health; and how to take your medications properly.

Medicare also covers medical nutrition therapy services to help you learn which foods to eat and how to follow an individualized diabetic meal plan.

■ Well-trained guide dogs are important for visually impaired people who rely on them. But many puppies bred to be guide dogs flunk out of training programs.

A study published in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences suggests the way a puppy's mother raises it may be the key to the dog's success, or failure. A research team at the University of Pennsylvania found that puppies destined for guide dog training are more likely to fail if they're coddled might help increase the effectiveness by their mothers.

research about mothering behavior in dogs," says lead author Emily

Past studies on rodents and primates have found that, in general, active mothering is better than no mothering. "So, on one hand, we'd think 'Yes, you need your mother. Mothering should be a good thing.' But for guide dogs, the mothers are with their puppies in the pen 24/7.

So then the question becomes 'What exactly is beneficial?' "

The answer, at least for guide dogs, appears to be what Bray describes as a hands-off style. (Or, paws-off style?)

They found that among the 98 puppies they studied, the activelymothered ones were more likely to fail a guide dog training program later.

How mothers nurse their puppies also affected how puppies performed. The mothers will either lie down to nurse, or sit or stand up. If the mother dog is sitting or standing, "she's further from the puppy.

The training for guide dogs teaches and selects for a very specific set of skills. "You're looking for dogs that are very compliant, very, very relaxed, not at all thrown off by any kind of strange occurrences," says Clive Wynne, a professor of psychology at Arizona State .

The dogs also need to be "sufficiently driven to learn and tackle tasks," says Bray, and capable of limited disobedience in order to, for example, disobey a command that would put their handler in danger.

Bray thinks that one reason hands-off mothering is associated with more of these traits could be that the little challenges in puppyhood prepare them for the bigger challenges of being a guide dog.

Another possibility is that maternal stress could affect puppy development. Previous research has found higher levels of the stress-related hormone cortisol in dogs with more active parenting behaviors.

Still another possibility is that specific mothering behaviors may not be the primary cause of the observations. It may be more about genetics. The authors point out that high-performing guide dogs are chosen to breed.

Wynne, who was not involved with the research, thinks the findings shouldn't be applied broadly, even to other working dogs. "I think what we have here is a special effect of working with guide dog populations, and not necessarily true of all dogs or all animals," he says. Two previous studies on military working dogs and other dogs have found the opposite effect: that more anxious mothers produce more successful offspring in those contexts.



## Confidence expressed for achieving Museum goals

On August 7th, 2017 the City funding for the Museum of Ventura County. The county also approved another \$125,000 in funding as well. There were a number of contingencies that were attached to the funding, requiring hiring of key personnel to develop museum goals, fundraising and plans for better use of the museum's collections and archives over the next six months. The Breeze wanted to follow up on the progress. "City staff will be holding monthly meetings with the museum employees to get a report on milestones", according to city manager Mark Watkins, who adds "the public purpose of the appropriation is to protect city resources, support the arts and promote economic and cultural tourism." Watkins expressed confidence that all the goals would be met within the six months.

When the Breeze queried interim Council authorized \$125,000 in museum director Elena Brokaw, she also expressed her confidence that the goals would be met. "I am extremely confident that we will be able to meet the requirements. They are ambitious and will demand a great and concerted effort, but the community has already shown its support for the museum's reinvention through the formation of an Endowment Committee, new board members, funding and increased attendance."

Of the 23 specific tasks to be completed in the first 6 months, we have already completed five, and have made significant progress on five more," Brokaw reports.


Council member Christy Weir August 28." So far so good. is also confident that the museum will meet its goals. "They have an ambitious action plan, but with city and county funding and new leadership, this year we will see substantial changes. They have already made progress in board development and fundraising. We will soon see physical improvements to the interior and exterior, and continued emphasis on engaging exhibits and special events."

## We must stand, we dare not be silent

A vigil was held in Ventura's Mission Park Sunday evening, August 13th, in memory of three people who died and the 19 others who were injured during recent White Supremacist protests in Charlottesville, Virginia. The vigil also condemned the violence and intolerance expressed by the "Unite The Right" activists.

John Golson, who swiftly organized the demonstration in Ventura, said "We must stand, we dare not be silent when hatred acts in bold disregard of decency and compassion."

Participants at the event agreed. They were highly motivated to stand together in condemnation of the reprehensible violence, displays of Nazi and Confederate flags, the shouts against Jews, blacks, and gay people, and the raised-arm Nazi salutes that had been featured days earlier at the "Unite the Right" demonstration in Charlottesville.

In Ventura, the "Stand with Charlottesville" rally attracted nearly two hundred people who held candles and signs calling for peace and equal justice in the wake of the Charlottesville tragedy. Many voiced disgust at the fact that Americans had not already completely abandoned the deplorable agenda of such hate-based groups.

Passers-by were very supportive, many honking their agreement and waving to the demonstrators. Musicians played and speakers called for peace and understanding among all Americans. Participants were invited to come up and share their thoughts or prayers about the recent events.

Nationally, hundreds of similar rallies took place. Locally, Ventura was not alone — Camarillo, Ojai, and Thousand Oaks also held vigils —all with the purpose of declaring that hate, racial and religious intolerance, and violence has no place in our county or in our nation.

### Officer Aaron Drake may be called

Di Rodio. Di Rodio, 61, was stabbed repeatedly in her room in her home in the Ventura Keys neighborhood on June 3, 2009"

"Gina Drake is the former wife of VPD veteran Police Officer Aaron Drake, The Drakes were married at the time of the homicide, but Officer Drake had filed for divorce in June, 2009 (about the time of the murder) and they have since been divorced."

Why is this important now?

In a suicide attempt, VPD patrol officer Aaron Drake, 47, shot himself around 1:30 p.m. on July 28 in the locker room of the Ventura Police Department headquarters located on Dowell Dr. (officer Dowell remains the only Ventura officer killed in the line of duty).

He was taken to Ventura County Medical Center and eventually to Kaiser Permanente hospital in Los Angeles where he is being treated.

Apparently Aaron Drake was very involved with the investigation in to his ex-wife's case, even wearing a wire in a meeting with her. The investigation is being conducted by the Ventura Police Department and the Ventura County District Attorney Office.

Defense attorneys for Gina Drake, as well as prosecutors, want to call the officer as a witness during pretrial motions and for her future trial.

Activities have been delayed pending the condition of Aaron Drake and his ability to be a witness in the case.

It has not been determined if his involvement with Gina Drake's pending trial predicated his attempted suicide.

Police reports are provided to us by the Ventura Police Department and are not the opinions of the Ventura Breeze. All suspects mentioned are assumed to be innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.

## Robbery, Assault with a Deadly Weapon

On August 18, at approximately 4pm, the Ventura Police Department Command Center received a 911 call from a caller reporting a battery that just occurred and that Pacific View Mall security officers were following the suspect. Additional information was received from an employee of Trader Joe's that the suspect, later identified as 20 year old vagrant Araceli Aguileracastillo, was also involved in a shoplifting of alcohol from the store.

When the first officer arrived on scene, mall security officers had Aguileracastillo detained in the parking lot to the rear of the store. As the officer was speaking to her and waiting for additional officers to arrive, Aguileracastillo tried fleeing from him on foot. The officer caught her, and as he was attempting to take her into custody, she grabbed the officer's firearm and began forcefully trying to remove the weapon from its holster.

After a further struggle on the ground, the officer was able to take Aguileracastillo into custody with the assistance of the mall security officers.

During the investigation, officers learned that Aguileracastillo was inside of Trader Joe's when she was observed by an employee concealing several large bottles of alcohol in her clothing. The employee confronted Aguileracastillo, at which time she removed one of the bottles and attempted to hit the employee with it. Fearing for his safety, the employee allowed her to leave the store.

### Residential Burglary Arrest

On August 19 at 4:30pm, the Ventura Police Department Command Center received a 911 call from resident in the 100 block of N. Brent Street, reporting that a subject had just attempted to gain access into his apartment and had fled the area.

During the investigation, officers learned the victim had left his residence for a brief time. Upon returning, he noticed his front door was standing open and property had been removed from the interior and was left on the porch. The victim walked to the rear of his residence to further investigate and observed a male and female running from the yard.

Officers were provided a description of the suspects as they began to search the area. Officers located a male and female who matched the suspect description a short distance from the scene. The male suspect, 26 year old Ventura resident Cameron Marrufo was detained and a search revealed he had property concealed on his person which had been taken from inside the residence.

Marrufo was placed under arrest and booked into the Ventura County Jail for burglary and possession of stolen property. Officers determined the female contacted with Marrufo was not involved in the burglary.

### Stolen Vehicle Arrest

On August 18, Ventura Police officers contacted the victim of a stolen vehicle at State Beach Park located at 901 San Pedro Street.

During the investigation, officers learned the victim had left several pieces of property unattended while he exercised nearby. When he returned a short time later, he discovered a backpack containing his vehicle keys had been stolen. The victim soon realized his vehicle had also been

stolen. Officers searched the area at the time but were unable to locate the suspect or vehicle.

On August 19 at 11:45am, the Ventura Police Department Command Center received a call from the victim who reported he had just observed his stolen vehicle parked in the area of Monmouth Drive and Harbor Boulevard. As officers were responding, the suspect, 36 year old Ventura resident Jamaar Smith, left the area driving north on Harbor Boulevard as the victim followed.

Smith pulled into the public parking lot located at San Jon Road and Harbor Boulevard as officers arrived. Officers conducted a high risk stop and took Smith into custody without incident. Property taken from the backpack was located inside the vehicle along with evidence linking Smith to initial theft.

### Felon in Possession of a Concealed Firearm with High Capacity Magazine

On August 20 at 1:40pm, a patrol officer was patrolling the area of Thompson Boulevard and Figueroa Street, and made a traffic stop on a vehicle for a moving violation. The driver of the vehicle, 25 year old Ventura resident Nikolas Inglis was contacted and found to be on active probation with a prior felony conviction.

During a search of the vehicle, a loaded 9mm handgun was found concealed under the front passenger's seat. It was determined that Inglis had possessed the firearm prior to being pulled over by the officer.

Inglis was arrested and booked into the Ventura County Jail for possession of a concealed firearm, felon in possession of a firearm, felon in possession of ammunition and possession of a high capacity magazine.

### Stolen Vehicle Arrest

On August 22 at 9:25am, a Ventura Police officer noticed a suspicious vehicle in the Motel 6 parking lot that matched the description of vehicle which was recently reported stolen. While the officer was attempting to confirm the status of the vehicle, the suspect, 42 year old Ventura resident Brandon Small and two others entered the vehicle and drove away.

Officers conducted an enforcement stop as the vehicle exited the parking lot and took Small into custody without incident. Small was later booked into the Ventura County Jail for being in possession of a stolen vehicle and for an outstanding arrest warrant. A passenger, 37 year old Ventura resident Jesse Matt was also arrested and booked for outstanding arrest warrant. The third passenger was determined to not be involved and was released at the scene.

he underwent to fight it. He was still sending us press releases the week before he died, on Sunday, August 6.

"The last few years when he was battling cancer, John was simply amazing," said Stan Whisenhunt, owner of Ventura-based Whisenhunt Communications. "He wanted to keep working and he did that right up to the end."

Cressy was born June 16, 1953, in Hayward, California, the middle of nine children. He graduated high school in 1971 and in 1975 earned a bachelor's degree in history from Humboldt State University. After working a year at Alameda Glass and Paint, he returned to Humboldt and in 1978 earned a degree in journalism.

A lifelong sports enthusiast, Cressy spent the next 22 years in newspaper



journalism, primarily as a sports writer and editor, for the Arcata Union, the Santa Maria Times and the Ventura Star-Free Press. Starting as a sportswriter, Cressy went on to become a popular sports columnist at the Star-Free Press and in 1987, he was promoted to sports editor by then-managing editor Whisenhunt.

Cressy went on to work at the Ventura County Star and the Santa Barbara News-Press before leaving journalism in 2000, when he returned to work for Whisenhunt, who'd left journalism in the early '90s to create his public relations firm.


In addition to his work as a writer and photographer for Whisenhunt, Cressy also taught writing skills at workshops for Custom Training. His personal passions revolved around his family and his love of sports and sports trivia. He also loved photography, hiking, the beach, classic movies and classic rock.

He died peacefully on Aug. 6 at Community Memorial Hospital in Ventura, surrounded by loved ones. He is survived by his wife, Kathleen; stepchildren Laura and Darren Mills; sisters Susan Verhees; Ann Zammattio (Duilio) of Italy; Peggy Figueira (Ray); brothers Danny, Steve, Bob and Brian Cressy (Rosalee); brothers-in-law Pat Williams and David Kimbrough; mother-in-law Suzanne Kimbrough and numerous cousins, nieces and nephews. Other survivors include his faithful maltipoo Whiddle, who was at his side when he died, and his catnapping com-

panions Rascal and Oscar Eddie.

A rare man of honor, heart, humility and humor, Cressy was a truly good person with a remarkable work ethic whose passing has left a huge hole in the lives of those who knew him and worked with him. We're grateful to have had that privilege, and we're grateful for all his service to journalism, particularly to us these past 10 years.

Cressy will be remembered by his large and loving family and loyal friends in a private memorial service. Donations may be made in his honor to the Humane Society of Ventura County.



Girls Trip is a 2017 comedy film directed by Malcolm D. Lee and written by Kenya Barris and Tracy Oliver, from a story by Erica Rivinoja and the screenwriters. The film stars Regina Hall, Queen Latifah, Tiffany Haddish, and Jada Pinkett Smith.

After years apart, best friends Ryan, Sasha, Lisa, and Dina head to the essence festival and New Orleans. What started as a way to bring the Flossy Posse back together, the trip leads to a wild adventure beyond what they could have imagined.

Girls Trip, I felt, offers more than what the previews promised me. It's a whole lot funnier, a whole lot nastier, and a lot more sentimental that I would have thought. Sure, it rehashes plenty of tired tropes, and doesn't really add anything new or daring in regards to its comedy. However, to the films credit, it doubles down on every raunchy, dirty joke that it makes. Screenwriter's Kenya Barris and Tracy Olive go all in on their jokes, which either crash and burn spectacularly, or reach great heights. Girls Trip is definitely funny, and features a lot of gross out humor. So viewers with a weak disposition will probably want to skip out of this one.

My main gripe of *Girls Trip* is its strict following of the same tired Hollywood story beats that all films of this type follow. If you frequently watch movies, and have a good enough instincts, *Girls Trip* can be entirely too safe and predictable. In the grand scheme of things this isn't a huge problem but also means that you are not missing much if you don't watch this film.

Largely, most of this film's success can be attributed to the cast's stellar performances. The leading ladies all do a fabulous job bringing each of their respective characters to life on screen. Tiffany Haddish in particular is what steals the show. Haddish's wild performance starts at a 9 and just goes up from there. While *Girls Trip* might arguably be forgettable as the year goes on, Haddish's performance will be the last thing I forget.

Girls Trip accomplished exactly what I needed it to in order to have a good time. It was funny, it was raunchy, and was competently produced. If you find yourself needed a comedy fix at the movies, then Girls Trip can be exactly what you needed. However, outside of that I'm not very inclined to recommend the film. ## A View from House Seats Becky's New Car offers delightful

Ready for a theater experience that will make you laugh, touch you and possibly even involve you? It is waiting for you now at the Santa Paula Theater Center in the form of *Becky's New Car* by Steven Dietz. The engine is revving up and the lanes are clear.

Originally commissioned around 2007 by a Seattle realtor as a birthday gift for his theater-loving wife, this fresh offering is about real people, in real situations. The play is set in an unspecified city but is identified as "a town very much like Seattle". No wonder, since author Dietz was a part-time resident there.

The satirical, out-of-the-box comedy offers insights into the complexities of middle class life which is predictably full of routines, angst, potentially life-changing decisions, and familiar expectations. The clever staging involves four settings, all contained in one set. Threading the living room, office space, car and terrace together are roads that converge center stage, symbolizing how easily lives can veer off course if the wrong road is taken.

Becky Foster (Cynthia Killion) is a middle-class woman holding down a demanding yet mind-numbingly routine job who has a college age son (Andrew Garrett) living in the basement, a blue-collar husband (Scott Blanchard) who works as a roofer, and wanderlust in her heart. She is presented with an unexpected opportunity by wealthy widower Walter Flood (Ronald Rezac) which has the potential to completely upend her life. How she copes with the increasingly complex quagmire she has allowed to form is the crux of the story.

Along this stretch of the road we meet the widowers' daughter Kenni (Jennifer Skutley) as well as Ginger (Aileen-Marie Scott), an unskilled socialite who is in the process of going to the school of hard knocks. The play takes more turns than the Grand Prix in reaching a surprising climax.

The acting throughout is absorbing. The audience is immediately put at ease and the action continues as though a comfortable conversation is taking place. It just seems natural when Becky invites members of the audience to participate in small ways, adding to the feeling of just hanging out with the characters, particularly Becky. It also helps that actor Killion has experience in, and a knack for, improvisation and ad-libbing.

Ms. Killion is well matched by Rezac, a Ventura County theater veteran of deservable renown. Their scenes together are particularly authentic. Scott Blanchard as Becky's husband of 28 years brings forth a solid, quiet and commanding voice of reason. Son Chris (Garrett) is a walking psychology term textbook which he handles well. Skutley is given little to do yet makes the most of it she can. Scott shines in her secondary yet important role.







## American Academy of Pediatricians updates head lice guidance

In 2015 the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) updated its guidance on head lice treatment as new products were introduced after the academy's 2010 report. The new report was published in the journal Pediatrics, and it highlights some exciting new developments in the battle against head lice.

"Head lice infestation is associated with limited morbidity but causes a high level of anxiety among parents of schoolthe 2010 clinical report on head lice was published by the American Academy of Pediatrics, newer medications have been approved for the treatment of head lice."

The AAP recognizes that head lice in the United States have developed resistance to the most popular over-thecounter lice products (pediculicides). As a by-product of this resistance, some parents have over-applied the medications, hoping that using more of the products would make them more successful. The AAP warns against this, saying, "the potential for misdiagnosis and the resulting improper use of pediculicides and the emergence of resistance to both available and newer products, many without proof of efficacy or safety, call for increased physician involvement in the diagnosis and treatment."

"The prevalence of resistance has not been systematically studied but seems
