Tuff Sheds replace domes at River Haven

Foundation took a group of people living along in the river bottom in tents and started them on the path to hope and the promise of better things to come: A new beginning at River Haven where they have been living in cleverly-designed Geodesic domes that have surpassed their lifespan of five years by many years.

On June 27, a ribbon cutting was held to celebrate the new small houses made by Tuff Sheds as a replacement for the domes. Tuff Sheds have a 30-year guarantee.

Funded by the community and Turning Point Foundation, River Haven has been helping homeless people turn their lives since 2006. Turning Point's case managers help residents with securing a source of income, job training, medical attention, drug, alcohol and mental health services. In 2017 River Haven served 29 residents, and Turning Point's case manager helped nine people to find permanent housing.

There are no obvious indications that such a community exists right near the entrance to the Ventura Harbor. The City of Ventura owns the over two-acre land while Turning Point Foundation, a non-profit mental health agency, runs the community.



The members of the Committee are restricted to residents and registered voters of the City of Ventura at the time of their appointment and during their term of office. Members may not be an elected official or employee of the City of Ventura, or a dependent of either an elected official or employee.

There are 4 open positions, that will be appointed for terms of 4 years. In order to be considered, citizens must complete an application and have a brief interview with the City Council's Appointments Recommendation Committee. Committee members will be required to file a Statement of Economic Interests (Form 700) disclosing all reportable interests held at the time of appointment and are required to attend ethics training every two years.

- While attending the **Ventura Music Festival** at the Olivas Adobe, featuring the John Jorgenson Quintet, we couldn't figure out why there was a lady on the balcony with what appeared to be a hawk. Turns out it was a hawk. The VMF hired a "falconer" who brought a Harris Hawk to keep the trees free of birds who, in the past, have bombed some attendees at the summer concerts.
- On our pet page is news about the new location for the Canine Adoption and Rescue League (CARL) Thrift Boutique at 2750 E Main St. I feel proud that I was able to provide their architectural drawings and help them through the city permit process. It's a great location, so be sure to support them and the dogs that need adoption.
- Glad to see grading started on the large "triangle lot" development project. Even though it will increase traffic, it is an important part of the Downtown plan with a major public promenade along the bluff to be enjoyed by all.

- The dozens of **Thomas Fire lawsuits** against Southern California Edison proceeded recently when Los Angeles Superior Court Judge Daniel J. Buckley approved some procedural conditions and ordered some evidence be shared in the litigation.

The lawsuits allege negligence by Edison, in maintaining and operating its equipment led to the fires and subsequent Montecito mudslides.

The Ventura County Board of Supervisors voted 3-2 to ban vacation rentals that are not the primary residences of owners in the unincorporated areas of

the Ojai Valley (not city of). The vote affects homes that are rented for less than 30 days (short term).

Ventura has been struggling for some time with what some see as this problem, especially in the small Lanes in the Pierpont area.

- **LeBron James** has signed a contract with the LA Lakers for 4 years for only \$37.5 mill per year. ■ Built by IBM and Nvidia for the US Department of Energy's Oak Ridge National Laboratory, Summit is a 200 petaflop machine. This means it can perform 20 quadrillion calculations per second. As stated by MIT Technology Review, "Everyone on Earth would have to do a calculation every second of every day for 305 days to crunch what the new machine can do in the blink of an eye."

Before you consider buying one: The machine weighs 340 tons. The system is housed in a 9,250 square-foot room at Oak Ridge National Laboratory's facility in Tennessee. To keep this machine cool, 4,000 gallons of water are pumped through the system (it couldn't be in Ventura since we don't have that much water). The 13 megawatts of energy required to power this behemoth could light up over 8,000 US homes.

Summit is now the world's most powerful supercomputer, and it is 60% faster than the previous title holder, China's Sunway TaihuLight. It's the first time since 2013 that a US-built computer has held the title. And if you turn it over, it doesn't say "Made in China".

It appears that the city officials you spoke to did not give you the whole story. While the City has streamlined the plan check and approval process, they have added expensive and time consuming obstacles that are causing unnecessary delays and expenses for the homeowners.

While I don't have all the details, I believe they are requiring soil and seismic reports and there aren't enough professionals available to meet the City's requirements; hence the delays for homeowners who are eager to rebuild their homes.

I urge you to do a little more investigative reporting. And maybe you could do a service to your readers and put a spotlight on unnecessary delays caused by the City. Who knows, maybe you could start a pressure campaign to get the City to drop burdensome and expensive burdens created by bureau-

City of Ventura lifts temporary Leaf Blower Emergency Ordinance

The Ventura City Council terminated the temporary leaf blower emergency ordinance during its regular meeting on July 9, 2018. The repeal is effective immediately and the use of gas, electric, and battery powered leaf blowers in the City of Ventura is allowed.

The temporary leaf blower emergency ordinance was adopted by the Ventura City Council on December 18, 2017, shortly after the start of the Thomas Fire. During

this time, air quality in the City of Ventura deteriorated and became a potential health issue. The use of leaf blowers allows for debris such as fallen ash and soot to be airborne. The City Council declared both a state of local emergency and a local public health emergency due to the Thomas Fire.

City Council Meeting report

The City Council voted on July 9 to approve moving ahead with plans to open a year-round homeless shelter. The council voted 7-0 in favor of moving ahead with city and county officials in drafting terms of the proposal. The shelter will be located at 2323 Knoll Drive, a 4-story property owned by the county. The county would lease the space to the city for a possible \$1.00 per year.

Ventura Count, City of Ventura, and Oxnard released a request for proposal looking for an operator to run shelters in both cities.



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Plans for Ventura call for a 55-bed facility and flexibility to offer more in an emergency. The county has offered \$600,000 toward the property and has agreed to offer more in operating costs. Amounts to be determined later depending on the cost to run it.

Members Christy Weir and Mike Tracy raised the question of the possibility of the county providing a larger share. "The county has a bigger budget and gets state funding for mental health and related services," said Weir.

Tracy added "much of the county's homeless population gets sent to Ventura because the jail, psychiatric facility and county medical center are all located in the city. This is a regional problem. They're not Ventura's homeless, added

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

ThomasFireHelp expands to help survivors of fire

As the reports of the June 6th Holiday Fire surfaced, the ThomasFireHelp. org team was already hard at work to connect those in need to those who had help to give. Within hours of the fire's start, the ThomasFireHelp team had expanded the platform once designed to meet the needs for the Thomas Fire and Montecito Mudslide survivors to now serve the needs of our Goleta neighbors.

Since the Thomas Fire and Montecito Mudslide, ThomasFireHelp has continued to be a key leader in long term recovery efforts in the region. In an effort to expand their capacity to support and advocate for survivors, ThomasFireHelp has enriched their community partnerships and their recovery network now includes faithbased and service organizations. With these vital community collaborations in place, ThomasFireHelp was able to quickly deploy their innovative platform to assist residents affected by the Holiday Fire.

To date, ThomasFireHelp has had over 22,000 page views on Thomas-FireHelp.org and saw posts on the ThomasFireHelp Facebook page reach 11,000 and nearly 13,000 people on critical days after the Thomas Fire and Montecito Slide, respectively. ThomasFireHelp with the use of their online platform, social media outreach and community partnerships works on the grassroots level to match help with need, solving problems on a one-onone scale and picking up those who fell through the cracks.

"ThomasFireHelp was born out of the immediate and desperate needs of people in the Ventura and Santa Barbara communities facing disasters of unprecedented scale and destruction. No one knew where to go or what to do, and everyone wanted to help. That

was our simple beginning we became the 'Craigslist' of recovery, building a web-based platform connecting those in need with those who had resources to give", stated Emily Barany, co-founder of ThomasFireHelp.

The site offers everything from supplies and housing to services and volunteers. Following the closure of the 101 Highway after the Montecito Slide, ThomasFireHelp organized the Montecito Airlift, which deployed 64 volunteer pilots to transport doctors and medical patients, all of whom urgently needed to get across the mud when the 101 was closed for nearly two weeks. 117 passengers were transported as far north as Palo Alto and as far south as San Diego.

"The Thomas Fire and Montecito Mudslide disasters have devastated our community and more than 6 months later, survivors are still trying to find the support they need to get back on their feet" said Peter Zierhut, Vice President of Haas Automation, a local employer with a history of community support. He continued, "For that reason, the Gene Haas Foundation is announcing a challenge grant of \$25,000 to ThomasFireHelp, allowing them to continue their work of connecting those affected by the disasters with the services they need. We're proud to be a part of the good work being done by this hard working organization. As new disasters strike, innovative models like Thomas-FireHelp will be integral to the recovery of the region. ThomasFireHelp is poised to be international leader in recovery assistance and The Gene Haas Foundation is proud to be part of the effort."

The grant ensures that, for every dollar raised from the community, the Gene Haas Foundation will match that amount, up to \$25,000.

Tracy. Many council members said they want Ventura residents to get priority and had some doubts about how much the facility would cost the city. " The city doesn't have millions of dollars to do this." Tracy said.

City and county staff are working to meet an ambitious timeline to open the facility within months. Supervisors expect to see a report on the buildings condition on July 17th.

City Council adopted a resolution re-confirming the continuing existence of a local emergency and a local public health emergency. On December 4, 2017, the city experienced a devastating fire disaster in the city. The city's Emergency

Operations Center was activated at approximately 9:00 pm and a state of local emergency was declared by the City Manager as the Director of Disaster Services at 10.05 pm. On December 11, 2017 the city council adopted Resolution No. 2017-055 which confirmed the existence of a state of local emergency in the city. This action was required by the State Emergency Services Act for the emergency status to continue. It must be re-confirmed at least every thirty days thereafter until terminated.

The council reviewed an Update on Implementation of the Tertiary Treated Flows Consent decree, the Proposed Potable Reuse Project and State Water Interconnection. Kevin Brown, Ventura Water General Manager presented a report on provision of Ventura's water supply. This report covers water supply augmentation and reliability, beneficial reuse of effluent, improvement of water quality and explanation of why use direct potable reuse water supply. Brown said, "In a nutshell this is about diversifying the city's water supply."

Council adopted a resolution authorizing the Ventura Water General Manager, to apply for, receive funds, enter into a cooperative agreement, and administer a grant for up to \$9,868,544 for the 2018 Bureau of Reclamation WaterSMART XVI Water Reclamation and Reuse Projects. Reclamation project covers the reuse of potable water. Also authorizes the Ventura water General Manager, to act on behalf of the city to conduct all negotiations, execute and submit all documents including applications, agreements, amendments, and billing statements that may be necessary to accept these grants and complete the project under the grant.

Alzheimer's disease is an irreversible, progressive brain disorder

Analysis of large data sets from post-mortem brain samples of people with and without Alzheimer's disease has revealed new evidence that viral species, particularly herpesviruses, may have a role in Alzheimer's disease biology. Researchers funded by the National Institute on Aging (NIA), part of the National Institutes of Health, made the discovery by harnessing data from brain banks and cohort studies participating in the Accelerating Medicines Partnership - Alzheimer's Disease (AMP-AD) consortium. Reporting in the June 21 issue of the journal Neuron, the authors emphasize that their findings do not prove that the viruses cause the onset or progression of Alzheimer's. Rather, the findings show viral DNA sequences and activation of biological networks-the interrelated systems of DNA, RNA, proteins and metabolites-may interact with molecular, genetic and clinical aspects of Alzheimer's.

"The hypothesis that viruses play a part in brain disease is not new, but this is the first study to provide strong evidence based on unbiased approaches and large data sets that lends support to this line of inquiry," said NIA Director Richard J. Hodes, M.D.

Alzheimer's disease is an irreversible, progressive brain disorder that slowly destroys memory and thinking skills and, eventually, the ability to carry out simple tasks.

More evidence is accumulating to indicate that this loss of cognitive functioning is a mix of many different disease processes in the brain, rather than just one, such as buildup of amyloid or tau proteins. Identifying links to viruses may help researchers learn more about the complicated biological interactions involved in Alzheimer's, and potentially lead to new treatment strategies.

The research group, which included experts from Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai, New York City, and Arizona State University, Phoenix, originally set out to find whether drugs used to treat other diseases can be repurposed for treating Alzheimer's. They designed their study to map and compare biological networks underlying Alzheimer's disease. What they found is that Alzheimer's biology is likely impacted by a complex constellation of viral and host genetic factors, adding that they identified specific testable pathways and biological networks.

The researchers used multiple layers of genomic and proteomic data from several NIA-supported brain banks and cohort studies. They began their direct investigation of viral sequences using data from the Mount Sinai Brain Bank and were able to verify their initial observations using datasets from the Religious Orders Study, the Memory and Aging Project and

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the Mayo Clinic Brain Bank. They were then able to incorporate additional data from the Emory Alzheimer's Disease Research Center to understand viral impacts on protein abundance. Through the application of sophisticated computational modeling the researchers made several key findings, in all diseases


Human herpesvirus 6A and 7 were more abundant in Alzheimer's disease samples than non-Alzheimer's.

There are multiple points of overlap between virus-host interactions and genes associated with Alzheimer's risk.

Multiple viruses impact the biology of Alzheimer's disease across domains such as DNA, RNA and proteins.

Important roles for microbes and viruses in Alzheimer's disease have been suggested and studied for decades, the authors noted. Since the 1980s, hundreds of reports have associated Alzheimer's with bacteria and viruses. These studies combined suggest a viral contribution but have not explained how the connection works.

While the current findings are more specific, they do not provide evidence to change how risk and susceptibility are assessed, nor the diagnosis and treatment of Alzheimer's, the authors said. Rather, the research gives scientists reason to revisit the old pathogen hypothesis and will be the basis for further work that will test whether herpes virus activity is one of the causes of Alzheimer's.





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

Fall-proofing your home

Six out of every 10 falls happen at home, where we spend much of our time and tend to move around without thinking about our safety. There are many changes you can make to your home that will help you avoid falls and ensure your safety.

Fall hazards in the home, including a scatter rug, dog, and empty slippers.

Pathways

Have handrails on both sides of the the steps.

Remember to use the lights!

Check that all carpets are fixed firmly to

the floor so they won't slip. Put no-slip strips on tile and wooden floors. You can buy these strips at the hardware store. Don't use throw rugs or small area rugs.

In Bathrooms and Powder Rooms

Mount grab bars near toilets and on both the inside and outside of your tub and shower.

Place non-skid mats, strips, or carpet on all surfaces that may get wet. Remember to turn on night lights.

In Your Bedroom

Put night lights and light switches close to your bed.

Keep a flashlight by your bed in case the power is out and you need to get up. Keep your telephone near your bed.

In Other Living Areas

Keep electric cords and telephone wires near walls and away from walking paths. Secure all carpets and large area rugs firmly to the floor.

Arrange your furniture (especially low coffee tables) and other objects so they are not in your way when you walk.

Make sure your sofas and chairs are the right height for you to get in and out of them easily.

Don't walk on newly washed floors—they are slippery.

Keep items you use often within easy

Don't stand on a chair or table to reach something that's too high—use a "reach stick" instead or ask for help. Reach sticks are special grabbing tools that you can buy at many hardware or medical-supply stores. If you use a step stool, make sure it is steady and has a handrail on top. Have someone stand next to you. Don't let your cat or dog trip you. Know where your pet is whenever you're standing or walking.

Keep emergency numbers in large print near each telephone.

Senior Living

If you have fallen, your doctor might suggest that an occupational therapist, physical therapist, or nurse visit your home. These healthcare providers can assess your home's safety and advise you about making changes to prevent falls.

Your Own Medical Alarm

If you're concerned about falling. think about getting an emergency response system. If you fall or need emergency help, you push a button on a special necklace or bracelet to alert 911. There is a fee for this service, and it is not usually covered by insurance.

Healthy habits can lengthen life

Physical activity is one of five healthy lifestyle factors that can lower your risk for several diseases and lengthen your life. Have you heard the advice to exercise, choose a healthy diet, keep a lean weight, never smoke, and limit alcohol?

Researchers wanted to find out whether people who follow this advice live longer than those who don't. So, they compared lifespan and other data from thousands of adults with all five of these healthy habits to those without.

People in the healthy habits group got at least 30 minutes of exercise each day. They ate the recommended amounts of fruits, vegetables, nuts, whole grains, and healthy fats. And they limited salt,

sugary drinks, trans fat, and red and processed meats. They also limited alcohol. Women had no more than one drink each day and men no more than two drinks. They also maintained a normal weight and didn't smoke.

The people in the other group didn't exercise, have a healthy diet, or limit drinking. They smoked and were overweight.

Based on the results, the researchers estimated that a 50-year-old woman who had all five habits would live, on average, to age 93. In contrast, if she didn't have any of these habits, she would live on average to age 79.

For a 50-year-old man, the average lifespan was about 88 years old with healthy behaviors and only 76 years without.

"This study underscores the importance of following healthy lifestyle habits for improving longevity in the U.S. population," says Dr. Frank B. Hu of Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health, senior author of the study.

Old scams don't go away, and one of the scams that has come around again is the secret shopper scam. Most people like shopping, and if someone offers payment for it, many of us will try it. After all, it sounds like fun.

Secret shoppers often are hired by legitimate companies to visit one of their stores and make a purchase. Afterward you make a report on things like cleanliness, pricing, employee attitude and more. In response you might get either a free gift or a cash payment.

When it comes to scams, however, you're given the payment first. You'll be sent a check and will be told to cash it, and then go shopping immediately. You'll likely be told to "test" the service at the Western Union desk, or whatever location will transfer money. You'll be instructed to test the system by sending the money you've just received when you cashed the check. What you won't find out for a long time is that the check you cashed is no good. You used your own money to send a wire transfer, and you'll never get that money back.

Or you might be told to use the cash to buy a handful of gift cards. Again the check will bounce and you'll end up out of pocket for all that money.

Warnings: If you're ever asked to cash a check and send someone else the money, it's a scam. Don't ever pay to sign up as a secret shopper, even to buy a so-called directory. And don't fall for the certification fraud -- you don't need a certificate to do secret shopping.

Dogs & Food Behavior by Victoria Usher

Researchers in Hungary completed a study that have helped them discover that normal and overweight dogs both behave differently when it comes to tasks involving food. The researchers put down two bowls in front of a series of dogs, one bowl contained a good meal and another bowl next to it contained a less attractive meal. The study found that canines of a normal weight continued to obey instructions to check the second bowl for food, but the obese ones refused after a couple of rounds.

"We expected the overweight dogs to do anything to get food, but in this test, we saw the opposite. The overweight dogs took a negative view," test leader Orsolya Torda said. The behavior had possible parallels with overweight people who see food as a reward," said the paper published in the Royal Society Open Science journal. According to the authors of Budapest's ELTE University paper, this study has suggested that dogs could be used as models for future research of the causes and psychological impacts of human obesity.

your dog to roam all over the house, sit on furniture, eat from the table, or engage in any other type of disruptive behavior. Although your dog is your companion, it is a follower in your pack, not a leader. You can reduce this type of behavior by asserting yourself as the pack leader by using calm, assertive energy. Make your dog earn food, water, and affection through exercise and discipline - exercise via two or more daily walks to drain her energy, and discipline through setting those rules, boundaries and limitations.

These types of issues are often exacerbated by a lack of training and discipline for your pet. If this seems to be a big problem, then you may want to consider an obedience class for your dog or speak to your veterinarian for some other solutions.

Dear Paw's Corner: I deliver packages on a long route around town every day. It seems that we've been inundated with warnings over the past few years about the dangers of leaving pets inside the car on a hot day while their owners go shopping or run errands. And yet, almost every day of the summer, I am calling emergency services or asking store

managers to page customers because I see pets panting behind rolled-up car windows.

Please, please remind pet owners to leave their pets at home when they're running errands! -- Concerned Delivery

Dear Driver: I absolutely agree, and I thank you for insisting on this reminder! Even on a day that doesn't seem too hot -- say, 78 degrees -- the interior of a car can heat to well over 110 degrees within five minutes. Now that we're in the hottest part of the year, that interior temperature climbs faster and higher and can reach 120 degrees easily. No pet can withstand such suffocating heat for long.

For short trips to the store or to run errands, leave your pet at home. If they must come with you (such as during long road trips), they should be left with an adult, and the air conditioning needs to be turned on.



One Stop does it all

Ventura County's hidden gem is the One Stop program for homeless people. It is a lifesaver for those most in need ... especially for the newly homeless who are often overwhelmed by the many agencies they must apply to for help.

One Stop, under the leadership of Health Care for the Homeless, provides comprehensive care under one roof – in five different cities each week. Tuesday's Ventura day at the County Public Health HIV Department is a prime example of compassion and efficiency. A dozen service providers gather for three hours to collaborate with each other so as to guide the many people seeking help through the system.

There are no prima donnas there ... just worker bees, collectively figuring out how to best help each person.

Some need photo I.D.s in order to register for services, some need medical care through Medicare or MediCal, others need mental help care. Some have pets and need veterinary care, food or licenses for them, some are disabled,

some are addicted; all need housing. The workers listen to their needs and figure out how to help. They compare notes with the other services to form as thorough a package of care as possible.

This is not your typical homeless agency: people are welcomed as soon as they come through the door. There is hot coffee to greet them, plus a bagged lunch and bottled water. As they form a line to sign in, they are offered candy and chit chat ... this is the best waiting line in town.

People have mail delivered here and so there is a group of people at the mail counter. Friends have a chance to visit in the waiting room or out on the front lawn. Tables with Obamaphones appear so that those who have nothing at least have phones, which are often their lifesavers.

It is a congenial place where very serious business is conducted by representatives from the Health Care for the Homeless Department, Buddy Nation, Independent Living Resource Center, the Health Care Agency, Behavioral Health, Project Understanding, The Salvation Army, Turning Point/River Haven, the Human Services Agency and Whole Person Care. All of this is guided by James Boyd, who knows everyone in the service agencies and everyone on the lines. He keeps things running smoothly and resolves any problems that arise and comes up with answers for complex situations.

When the last person has been helped, the workers exchange ideas and talk among themselves, getting their notes and files ready for the next day of One Stop, which will be in Oxnard.

Clean Eating for sustainable health and community

Consuming an abundance of processed, preserved and refined foods loaded with sugar such as store-bought

cookies, cakes and candy or foods and soft drinks laden with chemicals names that can barely be pronounced may cause momentary bliss. However, indulging in excess over time can ultimately wreak havoc on a person's waistline and mood as well as contribute to serious health consequences. In fact, research shows that regular consumption of these types of foods can lead to elevated blood sugar levels (putting offenders at a higher risk for diabetes) and contribute to a myriad of adverse health effects like an impaired immune system and vulnerability to chronic disease.

Clean Eating = Sustainable Health

"Clean Eating" is a popular term that means consuming "whole" or "real foods" (enjoyed in their natural form as found in nature) that are minimally processed and provide our bodies with the vitamins and nutrients they need.

In beautiful Ventura County, one of the agricultural hubs of the nation, abundant local produce is readily available at local groceries and Certified Farmers Markets.

There are tremendous health benefits to buying and consuming locally produced, in-season fresh fruits and vegetables, as well as sustainable meat and fish, and it's also good for the *Continued on page 22*

Mission San Buenaventura dedicated Michelangelo Pieta Statue

A Vatican licensed copy of Michelangelo's masterpiece Pieta is gifted to Mission San Buenaventura. A dedication and unveiling service was held Sunday, July 8.

Forty-one years ago, May 21, 1972, the Renaissance statue was damaged at St. Peter's Basilica in Rome. The incident, and what subsequently became one of the most delicate and controversial art restorations in history, stunned the world. Forty-six years later Mr. and Mrs. Brad Hanson of Arizona gifted Mission San Buenaventura the financial means to acquire the Vatican licensed exact replica from a mold of Michelangelo's Pieta. Approximately 100 licensed replicas of the Pieta statue are being placed around the world.


Michelangelo was commissioned on August 27, 1498 and carved it out of a single block of Carrera marble he chose himself from a Tuscan quarry. The replica is composed of crushed Carrera marble from the same quarry Michelangelo chose. The crushed marble is mixed with resin and adhesives and then polished to resemble the original work

of art. The Pieta at St. Peter's Basilica is viewed by millions of people a year. Now visitors to the Mission will be able to view an exact replica of the sacred art in what is now the Shrine of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of the Church, formerly the Baptistery.

The folds in the Madonna's veil seem made of muslin rather than marble. When art historian Giorgio Vasari saw the statue in 1550 he wrote in his book about the lives of artists. "It is a miracle that a rock, which before was without form, can take on such perfection that even nature sometimes struggles to create in the flesh".

Mission San Buenaventura was founded in 1782 by St. Junipero Serra and continues to be an active Catholic parish and is open daily to the public for pilgrimage and tour.

General Contractor Fred Kummer, of HBE Corp. in St. Louis, has informed CMH that he will finish the 250-bed project in Ventura and turn it over in August, some 3 years after the promised completion date. After that, training on new state-of-the-art equipment and more approvals could take another four 4 months so the hospital could open at the end of this year, or the beginning of next year.

HBE has built over 1,000 hospitals (as designer-builder) and has been paying a \$10,000 daily delay penalty. Original estimates were \$200 million, but the final cost will be closer to \$280 million.

Housing Authority receiving \$1 Million from Federal Home Loan Bank of San Francisco

The Housing Authority of the City of San Buenaventura (HACSB) has partnered with Montecito Bank & Trust to win over \$1 million in new funds from the Federal Home Loan Bank of San Francisco's (FHLBank San Francisco) Affordable Housing Program (AHP). These funds will support the financing of HACSB's future development sites at Willett Ranch and Rancho Verde in the City of Ventura. Since 1990, FHLBank San Francisco has provided over \$1 Billion in grants to support affordable rental and homeownership opportunities for lower-income households. FHLBank San Francisco announced the awards through its 2018 AHP program on June 26, 2018, funding more than 65.9 Million for seventy projects in seven states, including these two HACSB development projects.

HACSB is proud to continue receiving funds through this program, which prior to this year's award has already infused over \$2.4 million into other HACSB developments. This year's projects represent critical housing developments to support vulnerable Ventura households. Willett Ranch will create 50 new, affordable housing units for low- and very low-income seniors in Westside Ventura. Case management and financial literacy education will be available to residents to help them maintain housing stability. Part of a larger planned residential community, the complex offers three neighborhood parks, pedestrian friendly streets, and architecture styles that incorporate elements that promote social interaction. Willett Ranch received an award of \$750,000 in this year's competition.

Rancho Verde Apartments will create 24 new affordable housing for low- and very low-income farmworkers and their families in East Ventura. A new 4-acre public park will be located across the street and residents will also benefit from onsite amenities such as a community building, garden, courtyard, barbeques, and picnic area. The project is designed to meet LEED for Homes Gold standards, with solar energy production and a greywater system designed to meet 100% of the property's irrigation needs. This project, which is also recipient of USDA Rural Development funds, received an award of \$276,000 from FHLBank San Francisco.

HACSB's Chief Executive Officer Denise Wise said, "This Housing Authority partnership with Montecito Bank & Trust contributes significantly to our efforts to provide affordable housing in an increasing costly Ventura rental market. These AHP funds will assist our community in housing agricultural workers and provide seniors a comfortable, affordable home for years to come."

The HACSB is the largest residential landlord in the City of Ventura, with 376 public housing units, more than 1,500 Section 8 vouchers, and over 450 non-profit affordable rental units. The agency is actively working to increase the supply of affordable housing and to improve the quality of life for hundreds more of the low-income residents throughout the City of Ventura.

Ventura County Regional Energy Alliance launches kWh Countdown Program

The Ventura County Regional Energy Alliance, in partnership with the Community Environmental Council, are launching their newest pilot program, kWh Countdown, funded by the California Energy Commission.

kWh Countdown offers two services for businesses located in the cities of Thousand Oaks, Ventura, and Moorpark:

Free energy benchmarking to all business that enroll

A limited number of comprehensive energy audits to businesses that demonstrate a willingness to invest in energy efficiency projects.

"kWh Countdown is designed to help businesses save money on utility bills and invest in energy efficiency projects with confidence," said Sue Hughes, VCREA's Executive Director. "Business owners often bypass cost-saving energy efficiency projects because of uncertain payback periods or lack of technical expertise. kWh Countdown aims to reduce the uncer-

tainty surrounding energy efficiency projects by clearly explaining the benefits of energy efficiency."

Selected companies will receive free American Society of Heating, Refrigerating and Air-Conditioning Engineers level II energy audits, valued at over \$5,000 each. These energy audits provide businesses with a detailed analysis of potential energy efficiency projects, including payback periods, funding sources, and packages of projects that best align with the individual company's goals and objectives. Due to the cost of providing such a high-level assessment, a limited number of these audits will be conducted. Auditing services will be completed by TRC, Inc. a Southern California-based energy company that was selected through a competitive Request for Proposal process.

Companies that are not selected to receive free high-level energy audits will still receive a benchmarking analysis. Benchmarking uses an online platform called ENERGY STAR Portfolio Manager® to compare a building's energy usage to that of similar buildings. This evaluation provides businesses insight to their energy usage and helps identify opportunities for energy conservation. Additionally, commercial buildings over 50,000 square feet with no residential accounts are mandated to be benchmarked by Assembly Bill 802. kWh Countdown helps buildings owners meet this benchmarking requirement.

(a) Every motor vehicle subject to registration shall at all times be equipped with an adequate muffler in constant operation and properly maintained to prevent any excessive or unusual noise, and no muffler or exhaust system shall be equipped with a cutout, bypass, or similar device.

At the Certified Farmers' Market Midtown at Pacific View Mall (Wednesdays, 9:00 am - 1:00 pm) or Downtown Ventura (8:30 am-Noon at the corner of Santa Clara and Palm Streets), open rain or shine, all farmers and producers must raise, catch, gather, grow or otherwise produce the products they sell. That goes for baked products too.

What's in season for summer?

Here's a partial list from Daylightfoods.com's seasonal guide: Fruit: Summer Squash, Melons, Tomatoes, Stone Fruit (Peaches, Nectarines, Cherries, Apricots, Apriums, Plums, and Pluots), Persimmons, Pears, and Figs. Vegetables: Broccoli Rabe, Cabbage, Kale, Broccoli, Celery, and Chard.

of the partners who have come together to help make this happen. Public, private, corporate and faith-based, all working together. We don't need to feel powerless. We can work together to cause real changes in people's lives."

Councilmember Cheryl Heitmann said of the new sheds "With many of the domes at River Haven failing, the city purchased a Tuff Shed to replace one of the domes and the community has stepped up to replace almost all the rest. One replacement was a cabin constructed by girls attending a summer camp hosted by the National Association of Women in Construction (reported in last Breeze). Many of these girls knew nothing about construction but found out they could develop new skills and construct a 120 square foot tiny home soon to be used by one of the residents at River Haven. One young woman told me she was now considering a career in construction."

"River Haven has proven to be a successful transitional living space for homeless individuals who need a safe place to start a path to more permanent housing. The city is committed to its success and is so appreciative of the partnership with many organizations and individuals in Ventura to help it continue with the new structures; providing its residents with a safer and more durable place to live."

Shots Fired

On June 29, at approximately 9pm, the Ventura Police Command Center received a call of shots fired in the 1000 Block of Kimball Rd. Officers quickly arrived on scene and were able to locate several spent shell casings in the street. A canvas of the area was completed and no victims were located. A witness told officers that a sedan (unknown make or model) was seen in the roadway as the shots were fired and that 3 males were seen running away from the area. The witness was unable to give a description of the 3 males who ran from the scene. It is unknown if the shots came from the vehicle or the 3 unidentified subjects.

Stolen Vehicle Arrest

On July 1 at 8:30am, the Ventura Police Department Command Center received a call of a suspicious vehicle parked to the rear of an apartment complex in the 3400 block of Rexford Street. A witness had observed two subjects inside who appeared to be under the influence.

Officers arrived on scene and located three occupants still inside the vehicle. As officer approached, they observed the suspects preparing to inject themselves with narcotics. Officers announced their presence and ordered the suspects to remain in the vehicle until additional officers arrived to assist in removing them. One of the suspects, 31 year old Camarillo vagrant Dani Cruz refused to comply with the officers commands and attempted to flee from the vehicle. A Ventura Police K9 arrived on scene a short time later and all three suspects were detained without incident. Officers later determined the vehicle had recently been reported stolen.

The driver, 24 year old Ventura vagrant Nicholas Gebber was placed under arrest for being in possession of stolen vehicle, possession of burglary tools and possession of a controlled substance. Cruz was placed under arrest for a parole violation and resisting arrest. The third suspect, 30 year old Ventura vagrant Dorothy Dobbin was arrested for possession of a controlled substance and two outstanding warrants.

Stolen Vehicle and Felony

On July 4, at approximately 3am, officers were at the intersection of Utica Avenue and Telephone Road handling an unrelated call for service when an officer saw a stolen vehicle drive past. The officer followed after the stolen vehicle and initiated an enforcement stop. The driver, 25 year old Ventura resident Martinez, failed to stop and immediately began driving evasively. Officers initiated a vehicle pursuit and Martinez entered a nearby residential housing tract. Martinez drove at high speeds, failed to stop at numerous stop signs, and drove a circuitous route through the neighborhood for over six minutes with officers in pursuit. Martinez eventually yielded in the area of Nevin Avenue and Fairford Street and was taken into custody without

further incident.

Officer involved Traffic Collision

On July 4, at approximately 10:15pm, a Ventura Police Patrol officer was dispatched to a shooting call in the 6000 block of Whippoorwill. The officer responded to the shooting by driving "code 3", lights and siren. As the officer was enroute, a vehicle failed to pull to the right and the officer had to take evasive action to avoid colliding with the vehicle. As a result the patrol vehicle collided with a street signal and Edison light pole. The officer received minor injuries and was taken to a local area hospital to be checked out.

The Ventura Police Department would like to remind drivers that according to California Vehicle Code 21806. Upon the immediate approach of an authorized emergency vehicle sounding a siren and at least one red light that is visible, the surrounding traffic shall do the following: the driver of every other vehicle shall yield the right-of-way and shall immediately drive to the right-hand edge or curb of the highway, clear any intersection, and shall stop and remain stopped until the authorized emergency vehicle has passed.

Bank Robbery



Through further investigation, detectives with the Street Crimes Unit were able to identify 19 year old Ventura resident Alex Reyes as the suspect in the burglary. Detectives later served a search warrant at Reyes' home located in the 10600 block of Veronica Lane in the city of Ventura. Detectives located numerous items in the residence that were stolen in the burglary. On 7/6/18 at approximately 1400 hours, detectives arrested Reyes and booked him at the Ventura County Jail for 459 PC- first degree residential burglary, a felony.



Grant will increase gallery display space

The Scripps Howard Foundation, the philanthropic arm of the media company E.W. Scripps, recently approved a volunteer grant in of \$1,250 for the Buenaventura Art Association, Ventura's 64-year-old nonprofit artists' cooperative. BAA is relocating its downtown gallery to Bell Arts Factory, 432 N. Ventura Ave., and will use the funds toward constructing three moveable walls to increase the display space in its new home.

The grant will cover about a quarter of the cost of the 4-by-8-foot double-sided modules, which will add 192 square

feet of wall space to the gallery.

Retiree Don Scott, a longtime BAA member and former board director, applied for the foundation's help based on his 36-year career at the Ventura County Star and its predecessor, the Ventura Star-Free Press, both of which were Scripps newspapers. He and his wife, Mary Kolada Scott, also a BAA artist and former Scripps newsroom employee, have successfully applied for similar grants over the past several years for BAA projects. #SHFoundation





Joe Cardella was born in 1945 in New Britain, Connecticut. An early stint in the U. S. Navy to Greece and Mykonos made a lasting impression. He eventually made the southern California coast his home to evoke that idyllic sun-lit ocean place of myth, art, and creative energy.

Settling in Ventura in 1988, he helped transform the local art scene into an innovative community, inspired local artists and encouraged others to make art, many for the first time. Works on paper, mail art, conceptual art, Fluxus art, sculpture, assemblage and graphic art were his own media. He helped form the Ventura Artist Union.

He also began publishing the international magazine ART-LIFE in 1981. He solicited artists here and around the world to submit 200 multiples of their single work that he bound in the Original Limited Edition Monthly magazine for 25 years—"A masterpiece in every issue," he boasted.

He died May 15, 2018 of esophageal cancer. His ashes will head back to Greece for dispersal. His legacy of promoting the creative arts here and elsewhere will continue through a trust he leaves behind.







Ant-Man and the Wasp

Ant-Man and the Wasp is a 2018 superhero film based on the Ant-Man and the Wasp. The sequel to 2015's Ant-Man, and the twentieth film in the Marvel Cinematic Universe. Still riding high off the wild ride that Avengers: Infinity War was, I was actually looking forward to watching another Marvel movie, but perhaps going in expecting things like impactful themes, nuanced villains, and meaningful dialogue was unreasonable for an Ant-Man movie. It certainly was a fun watch with plenty of witty jokes and well done action scenes, but it felt like just more of the same Superhero movies we've been going to see for the last decade. Along with some questionable directing and massive overuse of sci fi techno babble, I walked away painfully underwhelmed.

Now that isn't to say Ant-Man and the Wasp was a complete disappointment. The manipulation of size lead to some fun fight scenes and car chases. Paul Rudd continues to be his hilarious self and really has the only redeeming dialogue in this film. There is enough here for me to not completely write this film off. Ant-Man and the Wasp could be especially fun for families with small children, but that's where my praise ends.

There were plenty of strange directing decisions that threw me off, but none more than the director's strange over reliance of Chekhov's gun. Chekhov's gun is a pretty basic storytelling device: essentially you introduce an interesting item, and then the audience gets the payoff of seeing said item move the plot along. Usually used sparingly in a film, apparently Ant-Man and the Wasp find this this technique hilarious, because they do it over and over and over again. So many times our attention is put on a random item, like there is going to be some incredibly clever usage of it, with the resulting payoff being completely vapid.

I wish my complaints ended here, I really do. I should have enjoyed the film more, but so much of the dialogue is just a slog to get through. I just couldn't get myself through all the sci fi mumbo-jumbo speak. Hearing whole conversations consist of random science terms with the word quantum slapped on is just not engaging at all. Usually I expect a film to lay it all out in the beginning and get it out of the way, but instead we have to hear about quantum this and quantum that. The amount I cared by the end was literally at the quantum level itself

Don't get me wrong if you can look past my gripes, you can still

have a good time. Perhaps I went into this with the wrong mindset; maybe I should have just enjoyed it for what it was, a light hearted action romp with some witty jokes, but it really wasn't all that special of one.

Santa Paula Stars Shine in Constellations

It is not often that a completely fresh viewpoint comes to the stage. Santa Paula Theater Center's current offering of Nick Payne's *Constellations* takes its audience into rarely explored territories mixing art and science. The excursion takes the audience on a fascinating ride into mental space to explore what could happen in a parallel universe or universes, where endless strings of slight variation on a singular incident are possible.

Constellations soars through the sky with lightning speed as the two actors, Jessi May Stevenson and Ron Feltner as Marianne and Roland, continually rewrite their relationship from many different angles. The age-old question of how an incident could have concluded with a different outcome is given a great deal of thought. The variations are achieved through the application of the principles of string theory, relativity and quantum mechanics. It sounds heavy, but the situations are so relatable it is easy to see oneself in at least one of them.

It took me a few moments in the beginning to understand why the scenes were being repeated. Once I understood that new characters were emerging with slight tweaks to the scenario, I enjoyed the play with a different level of understanding. It is a deep piece that shimmers on the surface and simmers at the core.

A simple, unadorned setting allows the actors to transform themselves in attitude, demeanor and presence via light pools highlighting the subtlety of how one minor change can alter the outcome of a given situation. I found myself pondering the efficacy of taking the time to "what if" threads to gain some insight as to possible resolutions before proceeding. Could happen.

Directed by the very talented David Ralphe, Stevenson and Feltner appear seamless as they transcend time and space, each becoming a slight variation of themselves on a dime. Both delve deeply into their souls to pull out myriad nuances of emotions. The action is enhanced by the projection of distant stars and nebulas with gentle underlying music.

Presented with no intermission, the audience is given an unbroken glimpse into the ever-changing nature of relationships which is as vast as any universe. On another note: the night I attended was the inaugural evening utilizing SPTC's new air conditioning! With the recent and continuing heatwaves in play and years of using the program as a fan, the AC is a very welcome addition.


