Ventura Rebuilds

Signs of rebuilding are popping up in the neighborhoods impacted by the Thomas Fire. As of September 4th, 32 Thomas Fire building permits have been issued with another wave coming as 131 homes are currently in plan check review awaiting approval.

In addition to the building permits, 311 repair permits have been issued as well as 199 temporary water permits. "We are spending quality time with residents and architects to quickly work through issues and ensure that their homes are approved with no extra time or costs," said Community Development Director Jeffrey Lambert.

Individual meetings are vital to promoting clear communication between the City, the resident and the architect. In fact, the Planning Division has held more than 250 appointments with Thomas Fire rebuild applicants and continues to provide personalized assistance throughout the process.

Given the large-scale devastation created by the Thomas Fire, the City streamlined the rebuilding process by adopting an ordinance intended to facilitate expedited redesign, repair, and replacement of structures within the proposed Thomas Fire Rebuild Overlay Zone that were damaged or demolished by the Thomas Fire.

In February, the Ventura City Council adopted an Emergency Ordinance to expedite the review and first plan check of Thomas Fire building permit applications within fourteen business days (the turn-around time is currently taking ten business days). The City Council also approved more than \$1M in contract services to retain architects, Continued on page xx

How can I prepare for an emergency?

Emergencies can happen anywhere at any time, and the time to be ready is now. This September, in celebration of National Preparedness Month, the Ventura Fire Department is asking you to recommit to being prepared for a crisis.

Planning ahead can help you and your family stay safe during a natural disaster or emergency. You should have an emergency kit ready and stocked with enough water, food, and medication for you, your family, and pets for at least 72 hours. Your kit should also include items such as a first-aid kit, tools and supplies, hand-crank or battery operated radio, sanitation items, clothing, and any other unique needs. It's also a good idea to keep a backpack or plastic tote with basic items at work and in your car in the event that there is a disruption in your ability to commute home.

During a disaster, you may receive critical information from VC Alert, the notification system used to deliver messages to your landline telephone number in the event of an emergency. Ensure that you and your loved ones stay informed and connected by registering to receive alerts on your cell and work phone, email, text, fax or instant messaging. Residents should not rely solely on this system, but should also follow instructions from

public safety officials, and seek information from official sources such as details posted on city, county and government websites.

You and your family also need an emergency communications plan in place so that you know how to contact each other and where you will meet if you are not together when emergency strikes. Our dependency on technology has grown to the point that many of us can't recite our kids' or partners' phone numbers. Take the time to think about which phone numbers you need to know (including an out-of-area contact as local phone lines may be jammed) and carry these contacts in your wallet or backpack. Remember, when cell networks are inundated, it will be easier to communicate by text message rather than a voice call.


Part of being prepared for a disaster also includes safeguarding important financial, legal, and insurance documents. Securing these items now will ensure that you can focus on safety, and not worry about searching for documents at the last minute. Learn your area's evacuation route before an alert is issued and be prepared to leave at a moment's notice.

Chances are that after a large-scale disaster, a bystander or neighbor will be

City of Ventura appoints interim City Manager

The Ventura City Council has selected retired City Manager Don Penman to serve on an interim basis as Ventura's city manager. Penman retired in 2011 from the City of Arcadia after serving for 13 years. Since retirement, Penman served as interim city manager for Azusa, Covina, San Fernando and Temple City.

"I look forward to serving the public in Ventura and working with the City Council and staff in moving the city forward," said Don Penman. Mr. Penman will work in a limited term appointment while the recruitment process for a permanent city manager is completed. City Manager Mark Watkins held the position until December 2017 when he retired, and Assistant City Manager Dan Paranick served as interim city manager until August 24, 2018, when he resigned to accept other employment. An interim city manager is needed to complete objectives established by city council.

Mr. Penman will serve for six months or until the new city manager assumes the position. There are no proposed benefits for Mr. Penman in accordance with CalPERS requirements.



The street at the new triangle project (231 apartments) off of Sanjon, which is being graded now, will be called Vista Del Mar Place. The decision tells local governments that the key to getting homeless people off the streets is to provide housing, both short term and permanent, as well as treatment and services.

This is somewhat pointless because there is little that can be done about it until there is housing available. Our police and council are just working on providing some shelter solutions.

Plans for new veteran's housing in Ventura is proceeding with the City Council voting 6-0 to select a developer for the 122-unit project.

They chose Community of Friends/U.S. Vets Development Team to build the project on 9.6 acres that the city owns next to the existing 60-bed Veterans Homes of California. Combined, the two facilities will provide 182 units of veterans housing, still less than half of what was originally planned for



to a 2014 Government Accountability Report, 40 out of 50 state water managers expect water shortages under average conditions in some portion of their states over the next decade.

"Rainwater harvesting is a simple, low-cost water reuse system that can increase your backyard harvest while reducing storm runoff. It also recharges the aquifers and can lower a homeowner's water bill. Greywater, on the other hand, is water that is gently used from laundry machines to landscape (L2L) or from bathroom sinks, bathtubs, and showers."

"Passive rainwater harvesting in the ground is the easiest method of ensuring extra water in your landscape," continued Maher. "With the installation of a bioswale, a gently sloped contoured drainage course filled with vegetation or compost that will divert, slow, spread, and sink water into the landscape. Installing a bioswale can be done by a homeowner, or it can be crafted and engineered by a landscape professional. "

Installation of bioswales also helps decrease urban runoff, the number one source of ocean pollution, from lawns, gardens, streets, and hardscapes.

"For residents interested in learning more about how to install a bioswale, I recommend visiting ventura.surfrider. org and sign up for some free ocean friendly garden workshops where they'll get some great information as well as hands-on experience."

Other means to capture water on the landscape would be to install a rain barrel or depending upon a homeowner's intended use, a cistern.

"A living roof, where the roof of a home is partially or completely covered with vegetation planted over a waterproof membrane, is a more, but somewhat costly option," said Maher.

"A greywater, laundry to landscape system is also relatively easy to install but still more complicated than installing a bioswale or rain barrel," said Maher. "The only type of a greywater system that can be installed without a permit in Ventura County; however, is the L2L or laundry to landscape."

Installing a greywater system does come with a set of mandatory regulations – no pooling of water, no runoff, no human contact, and no daylight (systems are installed subsurface). Additionally, because of the sodium content in most soaps (and borax), homeowners are required to use only soaps without sodium.

"When installing a greywater system, its best to know the codes," said Maher. "It's important that the greywater doesn't contaminate the groundwater. For example, using soaps with sodium aren't good for the landscape. Plus, nutrient-rich greywater can cause unwanted algae blooms in our watershed. Homeowners should send greywater strait to the soil and into mulch basins. Never store untreated greywater for more

the move-in process. It's anticipated that the new Ocean Tower will open to patients and the public in about four months.

Until then, and during the next four months, CMHS will install the final pieces of technology and equipment, provide safety training and new process/procedure training to all staff, train physicians on the new technology, stock the building with supplies, and install over 500 pieces of original artwork from local and regional artists.

Features of the Ocean Tower include 250 private rooms and expanded space in all critical healthcare areas such as the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit, the Emergency Department (which will offer 37 private rooms compared to 17 curtained bays in the old CMH), and the Intensive Care/Coronary Care Unit.

The surgical capacity increases as the new facility will feature 10 operating suites, as well as five new heart catheterization laboratories. And, for moms, babies and children, an entire floor will be devoted to their well-being.

The new eight-acre CMHS campus also includes a public community park; a Healing Garden for patients and their families; and a Respite Garden for staff and visitors. Other new features include an outside dining terrace and additional parking spaces in a new parking structure for the hospital and the public.

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

Ventura's East End Eateries Part 2: Hill Street Cafe

Serving as a family restaurant since the 1980s, the Hill Street Cafe is located at 1050 South Hill Road.

The ambience is festive; the staff wears Hawaiian print shirts, there is garland strung with lights and foil birds and pineapples hang from the ceiling.

The booths are private with a little lace curtain along the top of the cushy vinyl seats, separating them from the next and there are more tables toward the back. Although there is a large outdoor patio, Hill Street Cafe is not dog friendly. Because of the location, parking is never an issue.

The menu at Hill Street reminds me of a little diner my father used to take me to on the east coast when I was small, sensibly called, "The Little Diner". The meals there had a home cooked quality, but at Hill Street, they've also added some more distinguished selections.

The "Hillstreet Breakfast" menu has the traditional selections such as Bacon and Eggs, Steak and Eggs, Corned Beef Hash and Eggs ... there are twelve of them and each is served with home fries, hash browns or fresh fruit and freshly baked biscuit, muffin or toast. Prices \$7.75 to \$12.95.

The eleven omelets offered include the "Hillstreet Special" with bacon, tomato and cheddar cheese topped with sour cream and guacamole. Omelet's come with the same sides as the traditional breakfasts. Prices \$9.25 to \$10.45

From the griddle come pancakes (buttermilk or blueberry), short stack or full, Country French Toast and

three different Belgian waffle selections. Prices \$6.25 to \$9.25

Two of the more distinguished breakfast selections are Eggs Benedict or Huevos Rancheros for \$10.95.

A full page of sandwiches varies between the classic Rueben to a Fresh Garden Pita stuffed with vegies. There are eighteen sandwiches to choose from and each comes with your choice of Curly Fries, Steak Fries, Fruit, Coleslaw or Potato Salad. All from \$9.75 to \$10.75

The light lunches have a couple of those "not found at your average diner" choices like the BBQ Salmon or Grilled Orange Roughy and as the menu goes on there are the "typically found at the average diner" choices such as chicken fried steak or the always popular grilled liver & onions ... well, you decide.

Salads and burgers galore and a dinner menu that offers Southern Fried Chicken and Old-Fashioned Pot Roast along with many, many others. Dinners come with homestyle soup or salad, baked or mashed potatoes, a variety of breads, rolls or a muffin and vegetable of the day. Dinners range \$12.95 to \$15.95 Service was outstanding, our server's name was "Brigett".



Hill Street Cafe serves beer, wine, champagne and has loads of specials from the weekend brunch with all you can drink mimosas to kids eat free all-day Saturday! Seniors always get 5% off and dinner specials change daily. We were there August 29th, our server, Brigett was outstanding and the special was Turkey and Stuffing. (Thanksgiving in August?).

Craig R. Carey and Bryan Conant, to present community lecture

Craig R. Carey and Bryan Conant, two wanderers of our local hills, valleys and forests are teaming up with the Ventura Land Trust for a fast-paced, informative and often hilarious lecture "Amazing Backcountry Adventures" highlighting their outdoor adventures at 7pm Thursday, Sept. 13 at the Poinsettia Pavilion, 3451 Foothill Rd.

"Amazing Backcountry Adventures" features outdoor author Craig R. Carey and Bryan Conant, cartographer and director of Los Padres Forest Association (LPFA), sharing adventurous tales gathered from more than 60 combined years of hiking in our local backcountry. They have experienced mountain lion encounters "as cool as you please," close encounters with backcountry raptors, being stuck in a tent for 14 hours awaiting better weather, to-die-for sunrises and sunsets, miles of mapping trails with only canines for company and working to create the proposed Condor Trail.

Carey credits his kids for bolstering his passion for the great outdoors because, "they allow me to view the wilderness and its gifts through fresh eyes and remind me to not see it as a project, but rather as a refuge and a place full of wonder." Carey shares that passion by taking youth outdoors, many of whom have never been on a trail. His book, Hiking and Backpacking Santa Barbara and Ventura, has been updated with GPS coordinates designed to help hikers customize their own adventure.

After taking years to create updated maps of the Matilija, Dick Smith and San Rafael wilderness areas, Conant became the executive director of the LPFA, the official non-profit partner of the U.S. Los Padres National Forest whose focus is to educate forest-users and ensure the Los Padres stays open for people to enjoy.

Conant started his "love affair" with our local backcountry after some friends took him to the swimming holes at Red Rock in Santa Barbara County. Realizing existing maps of the local wilderness areas were not good enough; he decided to create his own. "It was the perfect opportunity to blend two of my passions: backpacking and cartography," he said in an interview.

The community lecture, Ventura Land Trust's third installment in their 2018 Environmental Speaker Series, is one of many ways VLT works to educate the public about important environmental topics. A suggested donation of \$10 per person will be collected at the door to go toward fire restoration work at Big Rock Preserve.



Why having a Medicare Advantage Plan may make sense

Health benefits can be confusing to navigate, particularly as you become eligible for additional support services.

While most Americans 65 and older—or those who qualify due to disability—are eligible for Medicare, some may also be eligible for MediCal, California's Medicaid program, based primarily on financial need. Individuals who fit into both categories are known as dual eligible, according to the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS).

How do I know if I'm dual eligible?

While dual eligibility does not apply to every Medicare beneficiary, 10.8 million people nationwide are fully or partially dual eligible. It's important to note that eligibility for Medicare and Medi-Cal are determined separately.

When it comes to Medicare, according to CMS, of the more than 5.6 million Medicare beneficiaries in California, 87 percent are eligible due to age (65 and older), while the remaining 13 percent are eligible due to disability.

When it comes to Medicaid, the income qualifications for Medi-Cal assistance vary, so visit Medicaid.gov or contact your local Medi-Cal office at 1-800-541-5555 to see if you might be eligible.

Why would a Medicare Advantage plan be a good option if I am dual eligible?

If you are dual eligible, signing up for a Medicare Advantage plan can make receiving care more accessible than having traditional Medicare, alone. And, if you are dual eligible, you can sign up for a Medicare Advantage plan once per calendar quarter between January and September, not just during the Annual Enrollment Period (Oct. 15-Dec. 7). Many areas offer Medicare Advantage plans with a \$0 premium.

Here's how having a Medicare Advantage plans over traditional Medicare can help dual eligible individuals make the most of their benefits:

Access to dedicated doctor/ provider network.

Having a Medicare Advantage Plan means the Medicare Advantage plan becomes your primary health plan for receiving care. These plans typically provide you with a network of doctors and health care providers. Doctors and health care providers know that working with Medicare Advantage plans means their patients will have care coordination and other benefits available through the plan.

It's important to note that Medicare and Medi-Cal are two entirely different programs that operate under different guidelines; they were not designed to work together. Because of this, your doctor and health care providers may

need to coordinate payment for services with both your Medicare Advantage plan and Medi-Cal.

The availability of additional benefits.

Medicare Advantage plans often include extra benefits as part of the plan such as dental, vision, and an over-the-counter drug allowance. Many times you will also have access to a fitness benefit that offers free gym membership and access to fitness classes. At the same time, these plans may have simplistic benefit designs that may minimize costs. For example, some Medicare Advantage plans have a \$0 copay for doctor visits and \$0 or low copays for specialist visits.

Care coordination.

A Medicare Advantage plan can offer coordination of your care. This may be especially important if you have one or more chronic conditions, such as diabetes or congestive heart failure. As an example, plans may offer skilled care managers who can help you get the care or services you need at the right time and place. This can include services such as helping you understand and follow your physician's recommended treatment plan, managing transitions between hospital visits and home, connecting you to resources for food, and helping you get access to necessary prescription drugs and medical equipment.

Receiving the care you deserve as a dual eligible individual may be challenging. Signing up for a Medicare Advantage plan is one way to potentially help you get the care coordination and additional benefits you need, all in one plan.



Findings could point to a new possible target for preventing or delaying age-related symptoms.

Could boosting lymphatic function combat age related cognitive decline?

Scientists only recently discovered lymphatic vessels in the brain that remove cellular debris and other waste. Now, new NIA-supported research published in Nature on July 25 suggests these vessels could play a role in age-related cognitive decline and Alzheimer's disease.

Researchers from the University of Virginia, Charlottesville, studied the performance of lymphatic vessels in the brains of mice and the drainage of cerebral spinal fluid (CSF) from blood vessels into the lymph nodes—also known as the brain's waste-removal system.

Using methods that impaired the function of the lymphatic vessels in younger mice resulted in decreased drainage of large molecules from CSF into lymph nodes, reduced flow of CSF in certain areas of the brain involved in

learning and memory, and reduced spatial learning and memory abilities.

Researchers compared the function of lymphatic vessels in younger and older mice. They found that in older mice, lymphatic vessels were narrower, and large molecules did not drain out of the CSF into the lymph nodes as well. Using a method to boost lymphatic function in older mice resulted in improved cognitive function.

Researchers also found that impairing brain lymphatic vessels in mouse models of Alzheimer's disease led to higher levels of amyloid-beta deposits in the tissue covering the brain as the mice aged. Abnormal buildup of the protein amyloid-beta is a factor in Alzheimer's disease. The researchers' findings in the mouse models were mirrored in postmortem analysis on the brains of nine people who had Alzheimer's disease.

According to the researchers, determining whether altering lymphatic vessels in people would have similar benefit to what was seen in the mouse models requires further study, but these initials findings could point to a new possible target for preventing or delaying age-related cognitive decline and Alzheimer's disease.

A 1035 Exchange, know the facts

A common problem faced by insurance and annuity holders relates to a need to upgrade to a better financial option without paying taxes on gains earned on the old policy. There are many legitimate reasons for wanting to upgrade. AAFMAA recommends a 1035 exchange to accomplish this objective. A 1035 exchange has a complicated set of rules established by the tax code that must be followed to qualify this exchange as a nontaxable event. Based on the complexity of the tax code and limitations placed on these exchanges, it is highly recommended that you seek the advice of a tax professional before moving forward to avoid possible tax complications.

Factors to Consider When Exchanging A Life Insurance Product

The main thing you must remember is that no cash can change hands for this exchange to legally qualify as a tax-free 1035 exchange. A life insurance policy can be traded for another life insurance product. The tax code also allows for the exchange of a life insurance product for an annuity. This type of transaction is referred to as a replacement. In all tax-free exchanges, the policyholder must remain the same.

It is prudent to exercise caution before moving forward with a 1035 exchange. Not all exchanges are tax-free. Remember that in the case of life insurance policies, if you surrender your policy early, you may incur surrender charges and taxes. Before any definite decisions are made, you need to research the marketplace to determine whether Continued on page 16





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

A federal grant received by the City of Oxnard and its RSVP program funds the free exercise classes, which follow curriculum developed at the Oregon Research Institute (in Oregon) where studies showed improved strength and balance, increased mobility and reduced incidence of falls among seniors who participated in the classes.

RSVP is a volunteer recruitment and placement program, helping people 55 and older find volunteer positions that match their interests, talent and available time. What to Consider When Upgrading **Your Annuity**

When making a change from an old annuity to a new one in a 1035 exchange, you won't have to pay taxes on your earnings. Immediate Annuities reminds clients that while your taxes can be deferred, it is important to realize that you still may have to pay surrender fees and penalties depending

After the exchange takes place, then you are free to change ownership. To qualify as a 1035 exchange, an old annuity can only be exchanged for a new one. An annuity product can't be exchanged for a life insurance product to comply with the strict requirements.

General 1035 Exchange Guidelines

You can exchange multiple old contracts for a single new contract. The IRS code does not limit the number of old contracts that can be traded for a single new contract. This fact opens the door to many possibilities. As mentioned above, the rule about ownership consistency must be followed naming the same owner on all policies. For accounting and tax purposes the adjusted basis of the new contract will be calculated by totaling the adjusted basis amounts of all contracts exchanged.

Conclusion

There is a practical reason 1035 exchanges are so popular. Deferring taxes as long as possible is always a priority. There is no reason to feel trapped in your current life insurance or annuity contracts by tax ramifications. By using a 1035 exchange, you can take advantage of better alternatives while still deferring taxes.

Pedestrian safety

Thousands of people each year are killed on America's roadways, and many of those deaths could have been prevented. In fact, in 2016, 16 percent (5,987) of all roadway-related deaths were pedestrian fatalities. Tragically, in a crash between a vehicle and a pedestrian, the pedestrian is far more likely to be killed or injured. From 2015 to 2016, there was a startling 9-percent increase in fatalities, which is the highest number of pedestrian deaths per year since 1990.

As a community, there are simple steps everyone can take to reduce the number of these tragedies each year. Keeping our roads safe is a shared responsibility.

With driving comes enormous responsibility. Getting to a doctor's appointment, work, or school won't be important if you strike a pedestrian while driving there. Always look for pedestrians whenever and wherever you are driving. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), in 2016, the majority (74%) of these fatalities occurred when it was dark outside and outside an intersection (72%).

Driving at the posted speed limit, or even slower based on conditions and focusing on the road, instead of an electronic device, also gives the driver more

time to "see, identify, and react" in time to brake for pedestrians. In 2016, 26 percent of pedestrian fatalities occurred between the hours of 6 p.m. and 8:59 p.m., and in many places that means its dark, or getting dark, outside. When a driver "sees" something up ahead, they are able to slow down and "identify" what it is. Because the driver can "see and identify," they are then able to "react" by applying the brakes.

While it is the responsibility of the driver to stay alert and aware of their surroundings, there are also actions the pedestrian can take to stay safe, like being predictable and using crosswalks or intersections if possible and walking on a sidewalk or path when one is available. Pedestrians should also remember to "dress for the occasion." If you are out during the day, wear bright colors, and at night, be sure to wear something with reflective materials especially on parts that move (like your arms, legs and feet) or carry a flashlight. In short, make yourself visible. Just because you can see a motorist does not mean he or she can see you; the driver may be distracted or even have the sun in their eyes. If you cannot make eye contact or do not see the driver slow down for you, just wait until the vehicle passes, even if you have the right of way. If you have multiple lanes to cross, slow and watch for traffic at each lane.

Both drivers and pedestrians should always keep road safety habits in mind, too, like not using electronic devices or drinking or using drugs while driving or walking because they can impair judgment. Everyone who uses our roads has a duty to drive safely, which, in turn,

helps everyone get to their destination unharmed.

To reduce traffic safety risks to pedestrians, safety should always be topof-mind for those traveling on the road and near the road. Let's be safe Ventura!

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

common for dogs. It is an enlargement of the esophagus—the muscular tube leading to the stomach—with decreased or absent motility. Motility the muscular activity that is necessary to move food and liquids through the digestive tract.

"Nanuk needs to be fed in a special chair in the begging position and then he must wait about 30 minutes for gravity to move the food down to his stomach," said Nicky Gore-Jones, Executive Director. "While this is not too difficult to accomplish, it takes some time and patience to feed him twice a day. It is not practical for us because of the commotion in our environment and the number of other animals we have in our care."

Nanuk is working with trainers this week to learn how to sit and be comfortable in his new chair. Other than the special feeding, this young pup can lead a relatively normal life and needs an active lifestyle. He loves to play ball and go for walks or hikes.

Blood given to patients with rare blood types or those who need repeated transfusions for conditions such as sickle cell disease or thalassemia must be matched very closely. Patients are less likely to have complications from blood donated by someone with a similar racial or ethnic background.

Based in Albany, New York, Baby-Friendly USA, Inc is the United States authority for the implementation of the Baby-Friendly Hospital Initiative, a global program sponsored by the World Health Organization and the United Nations Children's Fund.

CMH worked for over two years through various hospital committees to meet all the criteria and create a breast-feeding-friendly environment, said Megan Rodarte, director of Maternal Child Health Services at CMH.

"It's not about forcing all moms to breastfeed. We recognize some can't or there is a medical need for formula. It's about creating an environment and supporting practices that have been shown to increase breastfeeding exclusivity and duration, and to give those moms who choose to breastfeed the best chances of success." Rodarte said.

Rodarte noted that if a new mom chooses to use baby formula, CMH staff

also makes sure the new mom knows how to bottle feed safely.

The international award is based on the "Ten Steps To Successful Breastfeeding," a challenging set of criteria designed to set the standards for the best possible breastfeeding support for mothers and infants in the maternity setting. The Ten Steps are:

Have a written breastfeeding policy that is routinely communicated to all health care staff.

Train all health care staff in the skills necessary to implement this policy. Inform all pregnant women about the benefits and management of breastfeeding.

Help mothers initiate breastfeeding within one hour of birth.

Show mothers how to breastfeed and how to maintain lactation, even if they are separated from their infants. Give infants no food or drink other than breast milk, unless medically indicated.

Practice "rooming in" or allowing mothers and infants to remain together 24 hours a day.

Encourage breastfeeding on demand. Give no pacifiers or artificial nipples to breastfeeding infants.

Foster the establishment of breastfeeding support groups and refer mothers to them on discharge from the hospital or birth center.

Ventura County Watershed Protection District announces community meeting

On Wednesday, Sept. 26, Ventura Public Works Agency's Watershed Protection District will hold a community meeting to share the latest developments and anticipated path for the Ventura River Levee (VR-1) Rehabilitation Project.

The Ventura River Levee (VCWPD VR-1, FEMA ID No. 53) consists of bank protection and other improvements intended to provide flood protection for areas along the river such as residential and recreational properties in low-lying areas behind the levee structure within the floodplain of the Ventura River in the City of San Buenaventura in Ventura County. The VR-1 levee system will ultimately protect 759 homes and structures in Ventura County. The project begins at its downstream end at the Pacific Ocean and extends upstream along the Ventura River to its upstream end downstream of Ca ada de San Joaquin. The overall length of the levee is approximately 2.65 miles, with an embankment height up to 10 feet above natural ground on the landward side

Designed by the U.S Army Corp

of Engineers in 1949, the VR-1 levee system is now owned and maintained by Ventura County Watershed Protection District. As of 2009, it was determined that the VR-1 levee system does not meet FEMA Levee Certification standards, and requires rehabilitation to repair VR-1 levee deficiencies.

VR-1 requires bank protection and other improvements designed to provide flood protection for approximately 2.65 miles along the Ventura River that will ultimately protect 759 homes and structures in Ventura County.

"The VR-1 community meeting serves to educate the general public of the current rehabilitation project, and offers a platform for our community members to ask questions and provide valuable feedback about project's direct impact on Ventura County residents," said Glenn Shephard, Director of Ventura County Watershed Protection District.

borhood meetings upon request. Coffee with a Cop is an additional opportunity for residents to get to know the officers that serve Ventura.

The Coffee with a Cop effort is a national initiative supported by the United States Department of Justice, Office of Community Oriented Policing Services. Similar events are being held across the country as police departments strive to make lasting connections with the communities they serve.

The program aims to advance the practice of community policing through improving relationships between police officers and community members one cup of coffee at a time. Coffee with a Cop provides an opportunity for community members to ask questions and learn more about the department's service. There is no formal agenda, just a casual opportunity to voice concerns and share ideas. This is a no host event.



Police Reports

Police reports are provided to us by the Ventura Police Department and are not the opinions of the Ventura Breeze. All suspects mentioned are assumed to be innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.

Armed Robbery

On August 7, at approximately 4pm, the suspect entered a business in the 11000 block of Citrus Drive and approached the cashier. The suspect, who was armed with a handgun, demanded money and after receiving an undisclosed amount of cash, he fled the business. Responding officers checked the area but were unable to locate the suspect.

On August 30, at 5:30pm, 35 year Santa Paula resident Jonathan Landeros walked into the Ventura Police Department's front lobby and said he believed he was wanted for robbery. Major Crimes Detectives interviewed Landeros and confirmed he was the suspect that robbed the 76 gas station on August 7. Landeros saw a photograph of himself on Ventura Police Department's social media site and decided to turn himself in. On August 30, at 10:45pm, Detectives executed a search warrant at Landeros' residence in the 100 Block of West Main Street in the City of Santa Paula. Landeros was later booked at the Ventura County Jail for Robbery.

Attempt to Disarm an Officer

On August 25, at approximately 10am, the Ventura Police Command Center received a call of a subject refusing to leave CMH hospital. The caller also told dispatchers that the subject was in possession of a knife. As officers arrived at the location, they were told by a victim that the suspect later identified as 31 year old Ventura resident Richard Rivera, threw an unknown object at the victim's car causing minor damage to their vehicle.

Officers began canvassing the area and found Rivera in the 2600 block of E. Thompson. As the officers made contact with Rivera, he became uncooperative and refused to follow their verbal directions. When the officers started to place Rivera in custody, he began to fight with them and at one point attempted to remove an officer's firearm from his holster. After a long struggle, the officers were finally able to get control of Rivera and handcuffed him. Rivera was transported to VCJ where he was booked for, felony attempting to remove a firearm from an officer, felony resisting a peace officer and misdemeanor vandalism.

In 2016 Rivera was arrested for felony possession of controlled substance, and in 2017 he was arrested for misdemeanor

trespassing. Traffic Pursuit with Arrest

On September 5, at approximately 8:30pm, a Ventura Police Patrol Officer attempted to stop a four wheel, off road "quad" for riding on a roadway. The driver did not yield to the officer and fled. After a brief pursuit, the suspect abandoned the "quad" and ran into the neighborhood. Officers and a police k9 searched the area, and after approximately 20 minutes, the suspect was located hiding in a shed in a backyard of a residence on Carr Drive.

The suspect, 26 year old Ventura resident Jose Cardenas who is on active parole for robbery, was arrested and booked into Ventura County Jail on the charges of felony evading, violation of parole and misdemeanor possession of a controlled substance.

Violation of Restraining Order and Obstructing Arrest

On September 6, at approximately 8:30am, the Ventura Police Department was working a high risk incident in the 10100 block of Carlyle St. involving a suicidal subject. The SWAT team had been deployed and members of the Ventura Police Crisis Negotiation team were scene negotiating with the subject.

34 year old Jason Ordoyne, was armed with a hammer and threatened to engage officers when they arrived. Ordoyne was also at the residence in violation of a court order.

Ordoyne had barricaded himself inside and refused to come out of the residence. He was uncooperative with officers, and had made several threats that he was going to arm himself with a knife and come out to force officers to shoot him. Officers with the Ventura Police Crisis Negotiations team continued to negotiate with Ordyne and after approximately 5 hours, he agreed to leave the residence and was taken into custody without incident.

Possession of a Handgun by a Prohibited Person

On September 6, at approximately 4pm, officers conducted a traffic stop in the 2100 block of Harbor Blvd. and spoke with the driver of the vehicle, 39 year old Ventura resident Stephanie Paez. She was found to be on probation for weapons charges, and a search revealed she was in possession of a firearm with an obliterated serial number.

Disenia Paez was booked on the charges of being a prohibited person in possession of a firearm and possession of a firearm with an obliterated serial number.

Program saves \$33 million

The County relies on these people to help streamline the operations and avoid the processes that lack purpose. To date, 4,700 employees have received training in the methods and tools of continuous improvement.

"A program like this can only be created and sustained with unwavering leadership," said Paul Stamper, Deputy Executive Officer and Service Excellence Manager. "The Board of Supervisors, the County Executive Officer the and County leadership team have supported this program and enabled it to thrive."

As more employees receive the training, the savings continue to grow. In the most recent fiscal year, there were 114 Service Excellence improvements with an associated savings of \$3.8 million.

"Over the last decade, significant events such as the Affordable Care Act, safety realignment, foster care reform and, most recently, the Thomas Fire have impacted the County," said Powers. "In every case, the Service Excellence Program gave us the internal capacity to resolve issues and meet customer needs. One example of this is the expedited building permit process for Thomas Fire survivors."

Crazy Rich Asians

Crazy Rich Asians is a 2018 romantic comedy directed by Jon M. Chu. Screenplay by Peter Chiarelli and Adele Lim. Based on Kevin Kwan's 2013 novel of the same name. The film stars Constance Wu, Henry Golding, Gemma Chan, Awkwafina, Nico Santos, Lisa Lu, Ken Jeong, and Michelle Yeoh.

Having discovered her fiancé's family is one of the richest families in Singapore, Rachel Chu has to navigate the intricate power dynamics of the super rich.

I haven't seen a romantic comedy in quite some time, so much so in fact I forgot what makes them enjoyable. Whether it's the beautiful locations, the melodrama, or the inevitable cheesy ending, Crazy Rich Asians hit all these hallmarks. Crazy Rich Asians also has the advantage of being fresh for audiences. An all Asian cast placed in Singapore and revolving around modern Asian culture, 3 distinct things that are not going to be familiar to most western audiences; and that is where so much of this film's strengths come from, it feels genuine. Maybe even more importantly, it's actually funny.

Crazy Rich Asians had an interesting production history that I would directly attribute to this film's success. By securing funding from outside the US, and optioning the original story for \$1, Kevin Kwan retained strong creative control over the adaptation of his book. Kevin's pursuit to bring an all Asian cast to the big screen and create a film culturally significant to Asians is laudable. Even turning down a seven-figure payday from Netflix, Kevin was directly responsible for this films success and cultural impact.

I can't claim to have an understanding of Asian culture, but I can say the portrayal of Asian culture in this film was wildly entertaining. Every bit of this film was turned up to eleven, and the glitz and glamour never stopped being entertaining. The sets were beautiful and really did justice to showing how unique Singapore is. With the titular character being Asian American, there is a lots of drama played off of this fact. At times, romantic comedies can slog around halfway through, but the film stays pretty consistent in quality.

Crazy Rich Asians might be a high point for me in the romantic comedy genre, but some of my usual gripes of the genre are still present. Flashy and wild parties are fun to see, but that makes up a bulk of the films plot. Frequently the film defaults to trying to be all fun and games; I would of liked a bit more fleshed out drama. Maybe asking for more depth from a romcom is the wrong mindset to have, but without a doubt Crazy Rich Asians make a great date night film.

Funny, endearing, and novel, plenty of reasons to make the trip to see this film. Crazy Rich Asians brings fresh ideas and solid execution to the romantic comedy genre. Now if romantic comedy is a steer clear for you, I don't see that changing for this. It hits all the usual beats and is very predictable in that regard. Nonetheless, If you are looking for a fun date night movie, or for a wild destination wedding without the price tag, Crazy Rich Asians is worth the price of admission. Rated PG-13

What a terrific way to end the summer - reliving a memorable time in music history and singing along to the tunes many of us grew up with. The world premiere production of I Dig Rock and Roll Music now playing at the Rubicon Theater fills the arena and the audience with memories and joy. We were reminded that music is a healing art so needed in troubled times. The concert entreated the audience to relax and enjoy "about the happiest sound there is", in the words of Peter, Paul and Mary.

Carrying forward the concept of "Lonesome Traveler", a Rubicon world premiere of a few years ago focusing on acoustic folk music, the current concert showcases songs made popular in the mid 1960's and 1970's when folk became electrified and blended into rock and roll. Ventura Shellfish Enterprise site selection

On September 12, at 7:00PM the Ventura Port District Board of Port Commissioners will convene in Open Session at the Four Point Sheraton Ballroom, 1050 Schooner Drive, for its Regular Meeting.

One of the items on the agenda of special interest to the public is the Ventura Shellfish Enterprise (VSE) Site Selection Process. The Board of Port Commissioners will receive an Informational Report on the proposed site in federal waters approximately 3.53 miles from shore, northwest of the Ventura Harbor in the Santa Barbara Channel.

District staff and Seth J. Theuerkauf, Ph.D. with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) will provide the Board of Port Commissioners with information about two alternatives for site selection in federal waters. This agenda item is on the District's website for your review at www. venturaharbor.com.

The public is invited to receive information on the Ventura Shellfish Enterprise site selection process and provide public comment.

VSE Project Description

Theprojectconsists of twenty 100-acre plots (total of 2,000 acres) located in open federal waters of the Santa Barbara Channel northwest of Ventura Harbor. The closest distance from the growing area to the City of Ventura city limit is 4.5 miles and approximately 4 miles from the Ventura Harbor. The sites will be used for growing the Mediterranean mussel (Mytilus galloprovincialis) via submerged long lines.

VSE Site Selection

The project was initially proposed to be located in waters of the State of California, i.e., within the 3-mile limit. The Ventura Port District, in collaboration with its key participants undertook extensive site selection public outreach that culminated in the decision to instead locate the project in federal waters so as to minimize conflicts with commercial halibut trawlers based in Ventura and Santa Barbara Harbors. NOAA's National Ocean Service staff undertook a second siting study focused on federal waters proximate to Ventura Harbor.

The siting analysis represents an objective, data-driven approach to identify the locations within federal waters with the highest compatibility with the proposed project. The results of this siting analysis identify two alternative sites proximate to Ventura Harbor given equal consideration of existing use
