## High Tide is riding high on three regional wins

After reaching last year's World Finalist spot in 2022, Team 4414 HighTide is headed again to the FIRST Robotics World Championships in Houston. They are riding high on three regional wins at Hueneme Port, Ventura County and AeroSpace Valley. Additionally, they earned awards in Autonomous and Excellence in Engineering.

Team 4414: HighTide is an industry-based robotics team located in Ventura. Student participants range from grades 9 - 12 and attend school at Buena, El Camino, Foothill or Ventura High. Students learn career-oriented skills in engineering, design, mathematics, computer science, and are inspired by industry professional mentors. Michael Sessa of Sessa MFG (where the team trains) said, "Team 4414 HighTide is so dedicated and driven to excellence in everything they do. We are so lucky to have such great students along with amazing mentors."

This year's game Charged Up presented by HAAS Automation sees two alliances competing to process cones and cubes and score onto their grid. The match ends with robots racing to engage on their

## Artisans from around the west will show off their creations at Strawberry Festival

One hundred-fifty artisans from throughout the West will be displaying their goods at the 37th annual California Strawberry Festival, May 20 and 21 at the Ventura County Fairgrounds in Ventura.

The festival, which attracts nearly 50,000 visitors, features more than 50 food and beverage booths, most with a strawberry dish or drink made from fresh strawberries, but it is also known for its eclectic mix of quality artwork, crafts and unique pre-packaged food items.

Many of the artists have been coming to the festival for years. "We haven't had a festival since 2019 because of the pandemic so there is a lot of excitement by the artists to be back," says Dana Hale-Mounier, director of Pacific Fine Arts Festivals and coordinator of the festival's arts and craft booths.

Crafter Ray Wood began Brighten Your Life Creations with his wife Gina about 30 years ago. They started by making and selling pottery but evolved to copper metal art, primarily copper wind sculptures. Their son, Zack, joined them 15 years ago.

"Our pieces have been described as unique, desirable and affordable," says Wood, whose family has been displaying their items at the festival since 2004. "We have customers say that they have never seen anything like what we have. We create four or five different types of designs that move with the wind."

## Local Government News

### Are you a City of Ventura resident interested in making an impact in your community?

The City of Ventura is inviting residents to apply for 20 openings across the City's boards, commissions, and committees. All applications are due by Monday, May 8 at 5 p.m. Per San Buenaventura Ordinance 2019-003, no citizen may serve on more than one committee, commission, or board.

One opening on the Mobile Home Rent Review Board. This is a five-member advisory board that meets quarterly (March, June, September, and December) to receive, investigate, hold hearings on, and act on issues related to mobile home park rent stabilization.

One opening on the Ventura Port District Board. This five-member board meets the first and third Wednesday of each month at 5:30 p.m. to oversee governance of the Ventura Port District according to the provisions of the California Harbors and Navigation Code.

One opening on the Housing Authority Board. This seven-member board of commissioners meets the second Wednesday

of each month at 3 p.m. to review tenant applications and assess both their status and financial standing.

Two openings on the Historic Preservation Committee. This five-member committee meets on the third Thursday of each month at 6 p.m. to make recommendations for designation of historic districts, landmarks, sites, and points of interest significant to the heritage and development of the City Mills Act contracts. The committee also provides recommendations for applications affecting identified or potentially historic resources.

Six openings on the Downtown Parking Advisory Committee. This seven-member advisory committee meets on the third Thursday of the month at 3:00 p.m. to advise on parking management strategies and programs in the Downtown Parking District area. This includes capital budgets, hours of operations, parking pricing policies, valet programs, and employee commuter parking policies.

One opening on the Design Review Committee. This five-member committee meets on the third Wednesday of the month at 6:00 p.m. to review, consider, and provide recommendations for design review applications, assist staff with architectural or landscape design input, and consider new or revised design standards or guidelines.

Three openings on the Arts and Culture Commission. This seven-member commission meets on the second Tuesday of



the month at 5:30 p.m. to advise and make recommendations on matters pertaining to the City's arts, culture, and cultural tourism.

Two openings on the Parks and Recreation Commission. This seven-member commission meets on the second Wednesday of the month at 4:00 p.m. to assist in recommending and promoting public parks and recreation programs, facilities, and events. It also reviews and recommends portions of long-range capital improvement programs pertaining to developing parks and facilities, beaches, golf courses, playing fields, and recreation centers.

Three openings on the Water Commission. This seven-member commission meets on the fourth Tuesday of the month at 5:30 p.m. to review and make advisory recommendations regarding water rates, water resources infrastructure projects in the five-year capital improvement program, water supply options, and other water resource issues.

## As I See It by Sheldon Brown

If you are not familiar with Chat GPT, it is one of a few AI (artificial intelligence) programs that can write articles. They are not written by humans but "robots" - so to speak. I asked it to write 200 words about the Ventura Breeze newspaper.

It wrote 209 words, but close enough. And with a few minor errors. Still amazing, but also scary. Students are using AI to write their reports. For instance, a person can say "write me 500 words about who wrote the constitution, "and the answer displayed in an instant.

AI has passed bar and CPA exams.

This is what Chat GPT wrote:

"The Ventura Breeze newspaper is a weekly (we are bi-weekly) publication that has been serving the Ventura community in California since 2007. It was founded by Sheldon Brown, who remains the publisher and editor-in-chief to this day. The newspaper is free and distributed throughout the city, and its mission is to provide residents with an independent and reliable source of local news and information.



# Annual “Spring Fling” Gift-Away Event

A Beautiful Day Supporting Ventura County Foster/Resource Families, Kinship Families, Adoptive Families, and Bio-families Currently Working in Programs with Kids & Families Together.

On Saturday, April 1st, Kids & Families Together’s Heart 2 Heart Program, hosted their Spring Fling Gift-Away for Ventura County foster/resource, kinship, adopted and birth families who are currently being served in K&FT programs. This annual event has always been a kick-off to Spring, a season of growth and renewal.

Spring Fling 2023 served 125 children with 65 families. This year, we saw the return of the annual “Egg Hunt” for the

first time since the pandemic! Children and families were provided with such items as: gift cards, springtime themed baskets, teen bags, summertime toys, art supplies, clothing, personal care items, along with household, and cleaning supplies.

The event featured music, free face painting, games, and pictures with the Spring Bunny! The weather was perfect for the event, hosted at a park in Oxnard, and with all the recent rain, everything was so green and lush. It was wonderful to see so many smiling faces!

Kids & Families Together (K&FT) was founded in 2000 by David and Faith Friedlander. David and Faith met with Ventura

County Children and Family Services to see how K&FT could fill the gaps and provide services to populations that were overlooked. Faith, a Licensed Marriage and Family Therapist and also an adoptee herself, had a special place in her heart for and expertise on adoptive children and families. Faith began to develop programs to support foster and adoptive parents. Along with that, K&FT became the first organization in the county to provide specialized education and support services to informal kinship caregivers. Informal kinship caregivers are people who are taking care of relative children. These families are considered “informal” because they are not involved with the child welfare system which excludes them from many of the available resources.

Since 2000, K&FT has developed many other programs to meet the needs of all families that are somehow involved with the child welfare system including birth parents who are trying to reunify with their children, foster families, children in foster

care, adoptive families, kinship caregivers, and legal guardians. K&FT provides mental health services that focus on healing children who have experienced trauma and strengthening their attachment with their parent/caregiver.

It takes a loving village to put on events like this! K&FT is grateful to Spring Fling 2023 partners, event sponsors and our amazing volunteers that come from all over Ventura County to support K&FT families.

## Ventura schools: What’s new on the menu?

Ventura students have a lot to look forward to in the coming months and school year.

In a multi-step move towards healthier eating, the food and nutrition services department at Ventura Unified School District (VUSD) has been unveiling a number of fresher choices at most school sites.

“The salad bar is currently in place,” says Kara Muniz, director of food and nutrition services, gesturing towards one which was being prepared with freshly-cut and locally-sourced produce like salad greens, orange slices, cucumber slices, whole strawberries and celery stalks. “We are also slowly moving away from packaged food which were in use during the pandemic.”

VUSD was serving about 6,600 breakfasts and 7,600 lunches to the larger Ventura community, not just students, during the pandemic. The numbers have dwindled since then to just 5,000 for breakfast and 6,500 for lunch.

Post-pandemic, Muniz said her department is always evaluating options. “We look at the data and we always want to do better,” she says. Also in the works is the creation of a student advisory committee to help evaluate food choices, assist in menu planning and just gauge the collective palate of the greater

student body.

Very soon after completing staff training, new commercial-grade tilt skillets will be in use at Foothill Technology High School (FTHS), among a few high school and middle schools.

“We are very excited to use this soon, as this will help to make batch cooking more efficient at an even temperature and also improve safety,” says Lori Walker, FTHS child nutrition manager. “It will also significantly increase the kitchen’s capacity to churn out hot meals from scratch.”

On the day the local press was given a tour of the FTHS cafeteria, steaming bowls of orange chicken and brown rice were on the menu and hurriedly being dished out by the staff as lunch hour was fast approaching.

For easy reference, all recipes are available online for staff to peruse and refer to anytime. “This assures consistency across all school sites,” says Adam Herrera, operations manager.

If for some reason orange chicken and brown rice bowls do not appeal to some students, they can also choose from an array of sandwiches, wraps, protein boxes and the salad bar, of course. Up to eight entrees are available at the high school level and two at the elementary level.

## Earth Day events in and near the City of Ventura

The official theme of this year's Earth Day is "Invest in Our Planet," according to Earthday.org, the largest organizer and coordinator of Earth Day events. In keeping with the theme, many of the organizations staffing booths at this year's events will promote incentives for electric cars, solar panels, water-efficient appliances, and other investments. Local events will also provide education, information, and fun.

Since this year's Earth Day, April 22, is on a Saturday, most local events will be held on the official day of commemoration. However, as usual, events all this month will celebrate Earth Day.

**April 20, at Ojai Farmers' Market, 3 to 7 PM, at 414 E. Ojai Ave, organizers of Earth Day celebrations are encouraging walking, biking, or riding the Ojai City Trolley by giving a \$2 voucher to each person who does not drive to the event.** This "market money" can be used to purchase items from the market's farmers, all of whom do not use pesticide and grow crops within 20 miles of the city. The event at the market will feature live music, dancers, booths with non-profit organization representatives, and handmade goods. An opening ceremony will be led by a Chumash elder, and speakers will explain regenerative farming, oak tree preservation methods, and other subjects. Also, the O-Haiku competition winner will be announced. Haiku poems, due to OHaiku4Peace@gmail.com by April 10, should be about "The Business of Bees" sculpture at the Ojai Valley Business Park in Bryant Circle.

**April 21, at Ventura County Government Center, Noon to 1 PM, the Ventura County General Services Agency Earth Day Tour will meet at the Hall of Administration fountain and visit environmentally important sites on the campus.** This will include tours of water efficient landscaping,

**April 22, In the Ojai Cocoon, 6:30 to 8:30 PM (show starts at 7), 11966 North Ventura Ave, Ojai, an Earth Day concert will feature Sonic Butterfly, the Pixies, and Smitty and Julija.** Sonic Butterfly bills itself as an "instrument of transformation," an acoustic, chromatic long-string harp with strings over 60 feet long, reaching over the audience. The Ojai Pixies are a girls' choir, singing classical, pop, and other tunes. Julija Zonic, a music educator and vocal director, will perform original music. 

## Once a ship of sin was moored off Ventura!

In 1929 the good people of Ventura woke to find a gambling ship moored beyond the three-mile limit off our coast! It was the Johanna Smith, a 257-foot wooden lumber schooner, converted into a floating gambling palace. As it was beyond the legal limit it could legally operate without fear of local or state laws. The craft had restaurants, entertainment and, naturally gambling tables and slot machines. What would be seen as tame today was viewed as the epitome of sin and degradation in 1929. The ship had operated off Long Beach before she pulled up anchor and moved to more profitable waters, as other gambling ships set up shop at her area. It was hoped she could attract new customers

in Ventura County and in that she was correct. Large advertisements appeared in all the local newspapers announcing the arrival of the "amusement steamer" with a grill, cabaret, music and dancing. They even advertised a three-course meal for only a dollar, fifty!

To Visit the ship one had only to take a speed boat called a "water taxi" from the end of the pier out to the moored vessel. The trip was a thrilling ride bouncing over the waves and many said that was the high point of the adventure. It cost only a quarter for the trip. At the ship visitors were greeted by Hawaiian singers and musicians and hula girls in grass skirts. Lots of people came to Ventura to see the ship and leave their

money on the gambling tables and slot machines. People came up from LA, and down from Santa Barbara to enjoy the pleasures of the palace of the seas. But, its popularity proved its undoing. People parked all over, filling the streets, blocking driveways, and becoming a nuisance. Not only that people came home from a night on the steamer, drunk, singing and making noise, waking people up at all hours.. The benefits were outweighed by the headaches caused by the gambling ship. Besides that, the profits all went to the gangsters who operated the craft.

Church leaders warned of sin and corruption brought by the ship. Newspapers editorialized against the evils of the thing, even political people spoke out to force the craft away from Ventura. Soon laws were passed and the water taxis forbidden to operate off our pier. At last the ship moved on, back to Long Beach where she was moored and operated till 1932. But for a few months, Ventura was a bit like Las Vegas. Perhaps, to balance the state budget, the gambling ships should be brought back. A ride on a high-speed water taxi sounds rather fun, and it would be a lot closer than the Chumash Casino.

## Jack Colling's investment in CAREGIVERS is now his legacy

More than 35 years later, Jack Colling's investment in CAREGIVERS: Volunteers Assisting the Elderly is now his legacy. Next year, he will witness volunteer caregiving celebrate 40 years of demonstrated success throughout the nation, knowing that he had a small role in helping launch one of the original pilot programs in his hometown.

Here's one volunteer who started making his imprint on CAREGIVERS from the moment he arrived on the scene. Sister Veronica of the order St. Joseph of Carondelet, who helped to establish the organization, welcomed Jack in the second year of operations when volunteers were serving 105 seniors. Within the year, Jack was leading presentations for the Interfaith Retreat Day, which was fostering participation from congrega-

tions throughout the community. He volunteered with seniors, he picked up manicotti for the volunteer recognition dinner, and eventually he was invited to serve on the board of directors serving alongside Mary Braitman, Harry Walsh and Wayne Dugan and he supported the rummage sale to help raise money for operations.

"I am 30 years old, an owner of a small business. I became a volunteer in the program through my membership with a local church. After experiencing the need in my own family, I chose to work with the elderly. I see this as a very positive means of channeling my energy," Jack wrote in 1987 further describing the transportation, grocery shopping and errands he provided for an 86-year young woman.

In 1991, Norm Weitzel joined the CAREGIVERS' Board, and together Norm and Jack launched the Wearin' o' the Green golf tournament, one of CAREGIVERS' signature fundraising events that has since been adopted by the McGrath Family Clan—cousins Berry, Borchard, Coultas, Doud, Dunbar, Haynes, Laubacher, McCormick and Morris families—who have helped to set new heights surpassing recent years' high gross of well more than \$50,000 last month.

"From a decade of close observation, I can attest that our CAREGIVERS leadership team runs an extremely efficient organization, with a commitment to quality," said Honorary Director Dan McGrath. "Jack Collings has been instrumental in setting that standard."

Jack will be the first person to tell you that he never thought the tournament would be a major force of friends and funds more than 30 years later. "We were so happy to make a profit the first year," Jack said, adding that it was always important to both Norm and him that the tournament be open for golfers of all skill levels to play. Upon Norm's passing, it was Jack's suggestion to name the tournament "The Norm Weitzel Open."

Jack's leadership continues to set the bar higher and higher as he remains an active advisor and Honorary Director—even returning to serve on the Board of Directors once again this last year.

With his wife Wendy, Jack is among the most avid and generous supporters of volunteer caregiving in Ventura County, ensuring the advancement and ability of the organization to reach and serve seniors in every city.

## Event in May focusing on two issues of the CA Master Plan for Aging

"California's over-60 population is projected to diversify and grow faster than any other age group. In Ventura County, older adults now make up over 25% of Ventura County's population and is projected to increase to 30% by 2030. In 2030, there will be 10.8 million older adults in California" (April 4, 2023, Hospital to Home Alliance of Ventura County).

In 2019, Governor Newsom issued an Executive Order (N-14-19) calling for the creation of a Master Plan for Aging, which would become a blueprint for state government, local government, the private sector, and philanthropy to prepare the state for the coming demographic changes. California issued their Master Plan for Aging in January 2021. "There are five goals within the CA Master Plan. Goal 1: 'Housing for All Ages and Stages.' Goal 2: 'Health Reimagined.' Goal 3: 'Inclusion and Equity, Not Isolation.' Goal 4: 'Caregiving that Works.' Goal 5: 'Affordable Aging.'"

The County of Ventura has been working on these goals and the unique needs of older adults and people with disabilities in our county. Multiple entities solicited input from the community for what the challenges of growing older in Ventura County were

and what was needed in our county. In October of 2022, the Board of Supervisors approved a Master Plan for Aging for Ventura County, which can be found on the Ventura County Area Agency on Aging's website at: <http://www.vcaa.org/about-us/planning-strategy/>.

On May 11th 2 of these 5 goals will be discussed: Health Reimagined and Caregiving that Works. The work that is being done, the successes achieved so far, and what is still needed to accomplish these goals will also be discussed.

"Goal 2-Health Reimagined, envisions having access to the care and services needed to live at home in our communities and to optimize the health and quality of life. This will be pursued through: 1) Bridging Health Care with Home; 2) Health Care as We Age; 3) Lifelong Healthy Aging; and, 4) Dementia in Focus.

"Goal 4-Caregiving that Works, imagines one being prepared and supported through the rewards and challenges of caring for aging loved ones. This will occur through two strategies: 1) Family and Friends Caregiving Support; and 2) Virtual Care Expansion" (September, 2021 County of Ventura-Ventura County Master Plan for Aging).

"The question is: 'Are we as a county preparing for the aging population and the increased needs that come with it? And, the answer to that question is, yes, we are preparing. With the Ventura County Master Plan for Aging now in place, the next question for all of us to ask is: What is still needed and how can we help? It takes a village.'" Lynette Harvey, RN, Clinical Services Director, Camarillo Health Care District, and lead member of Hospital to Home Alliance of Ventura County.

During the Thursday, May 11th event, hosted by the Hospital to Home Alliance of Ventura County, expert speakers and panels will focus on issues around 2 goals in the California Master Plan for Aging. Sarah Steenhausen, Deputy Director of Policy, Research and Equity from the California Department of Aging will give the keynote address. This forum is open to local legislators, health care entities, county administrators and staff, community-based organizations, faith-based groups, caregivers of all kinds, and members of the public.

The event is free but tickets are limited. The event is being hosted by the Hospital to Home Alliance with a grant from the SCAN Foundation. It will take place at the Ventura County Office of Education at 5100 Adolfo Rd., Camarillo, on May 11th from 8:00a.m.-12:30pm. ## What is MCI?

Mild cognitive impairment (MCI) is a condition in which people have more memory or thinking problems than other people their age. The symptoms of MCI are not as severe as those of Alzheimer's disease or a related dementia. People with MCI can usually take care of themselves and carry out their normal daily activities.

People with MCI are at a greater risk of developing Alzheimer's disease or a

### Let's Spring into Shape!

The mild days of spring are a great time to get outside and move more – whether it's walking, gardening, or hiking. As you age, you may find yourself becoming more sedentary, which causes you to lose strength and energy. Fight off those sluggish winter doldrums and get moving – you can keep your strength and get stronger no matter what age you are!

#### Focus on Your Core

What does it mean when someone tells you to focus on your core? Your core are the muscles in your midsection or torso surrounding the spine and pelvis. This includes the abdominal muscles at the front but also muscles within the lower back and around your sides. You use your core muscles while performing daily tasks like getting up from a chair, standing, walking, vacuuming and lifting things.

As with other muscles, if you don't use our core muscles enough, they become weak. As the muscles weaken, your movements become less supported, which can put pressure on other parts of your body. Weakness in the core can also be associated with lower back pain, particular among older people.

The good news is you can improve core strength with exercise. And there is no one exercise that is best - choose an approach that works best for you. Start slowly and keep your movements slow

to warm up the muscles and prevent injuries. In my next article I will give you examples of good exercises to do to improve your core strength.

As the weather gets warmer and you increase your physical activity, you need to remember to drink more fluids. Keeping hydrated is so important. Over 70 percent of our body is made up of water. Water helps regulate your body temperature, keep joints lubricated, prevent infections, deliver nutrients to cells and keep organs functioning properly. Being well hydrated will also improve your sleep quality, cognition and mood. Always drink before, during and after you exercise.

Remember if you use it, you will not lose it – so take advantage of the beautiful spring weather and start moving more! Be healthy and happy, and always remember - age is just a number!

### Driving Safety and Alzheimer's Disease

Good drivers are alert, think clearly, and make good decisions. When people with Alzheimer's disease are not able

to do these things, they should stop driving. But some people may not want to stop driving or even think there is a problem.

Older man with Alzheimer's driving a car As the caregiver, you must talk with the person about the need to stop driving. Do this in a caring way. Understand how unhappy the person may be to admit that he or she has reached this new stage.

People with moderate to severe Alzheimer's disease should never get behind the wheel. People with very mild Alzheimer's may be able to drive safely in certain conditions. But as memory and decision-making skills worsen, they need to stop because a driver with dementia may not be able to react quickly when faced with a surprise on the road. Someone could

get hurt or killed. If the person's reaction time or ability to focus slows, you must stop the person from driving.

Signs that the person should stop driving include:

- New dents and scratches on the car

- Taking a long time to do a simple errand and not being able to explain why, which may indicate the person got lost

- Two or more traffic tickets or increased car insurance premiums

- Comments from friends and neighbors about driving

- Speeding or sudden lane changes
- Confusing the brake and gas pedals

- Recommendations from a doctor to modify driving habits

- Other health issues that may affect driving ability, such as changes in vision, hearing, or mobility.

Some people with memory problems decide on their own not to drive, while others may deny they have a problem.

State laws vary regarding when a person with Alzheimer's should stop driving. In some States, doctors are required to report to the State's Department of Motor Vehicles whether a person has been diagnosed with Alzheimer's or dementia. In others, anyone can report a potentially unsafe driver to the State. Check with your State's Department of Motor Vehicles for more information. You may need to notify the person's car insurance company, too.

It is a good idea to have the person's driving skills assessed regularly by a professional. The American Occupational Therapy Association maintains a national database of driving specialists, or you can ask your State's Department of Motor Vehicles or the person's doctor to recommend someone who can test the person's driving skills. Note that there may be fees associated with these types of assessments.

Department of Motor Vehicles staff may ask the person to retake a driving test. There are also a number of tools online that offer caregiver- or self-assessments.

Here are some ways to stop people with Alzheimer's disease from driving:

- Try talking about your concerns with the person.

- Take him or her to get a driving test.

- Ask the person's doctor to tell him or her to stop driving. The doctor can write, "Do not drive" on a prescription pad, and you can show this to the person.

- Hide the car keys, move the car, take out the distributor cap, or disconnect the battery.

- Finding Other Transportation Options

If a person with Alzheimer's can no longer drive, find other ways that the person can travel on his or her own.

related dementia. Estimates vary as to how many people who have MCI will develop dementia. Roughly one to two out of 10 people age 65 or older with MCI are estimated to develop dementia over a one-year period. However, in many cases, the symptoms of MCI stay the same or even improve.

If you have this condition, it's important to see a doctor or specialist regularly to help monitor changes in memory and thinking over time.

Many factors can cause problems with memory and thinking. There is no single cause of MCI, and it's more likely to occur as someone ages. Estimates vary, but roughly 10% to 20% of people over age 65 have MCI, with the risk increasing as someone gets older. Other factors like genetics and certain conditions – including diabetes, depression, and stroke – may affect a person's risk for MCI.

In some cases, memory and thinking problems may be caused by conditions that are treatable. For example, a bad reaction to medication, emotional problems, drinking too much alcohol, blood clots or tumors in the brain, or a head injury can all cause serious memory problems that can be resolved with treatment.

Symptoms associated with MCI lie in the space between what are considered normal age-related changes and dementia. Signs of MCI include losing things often, forgetting to go to important events or appointments, and having more trouble coming up with words than other people of the same age. It's common for family and friends to notice these changes. Movement difficulties and problems with the sense of smell have also been linked to MCI.

If you or a loved one is experiencing symptoms of MCI, discuss these with your doctor. Your doctor can perform medical tests and assessments to help determine whether the source of memory problems is something treatable or may be MCI. He or she may also suggest that you see someone who specializes in the diagnosis of memory disorders, such as a neurologist, psychiatrist, or neuropsychologist.

There is currently no treatment or medication for MCI, but there are things you can do that may help you stay healthy and manage changes in your thinking. Keeping your mind active is one thing that may benefit your brain. The following tips may help you feel better, and could help your memory:  
Follow a daily routine.

People with MCI may worry that their memory problems will progress to Alzheimer's disease or a related dementia. Because MCI may be an early sign of a more serious memory problem, it's important to see your doctor every six to 12 months to track any changes in your memory and thinking skills over time.

If symptoms do progress to dementia, getting a diagnosis early can help you and your family prepare for the future. While there are no medications to stop or reverse Alzheimer's disease or a related dementia, there are medicines that may help slow down certain symptoms, such as memory loss or behavioral problems.

## Museum and interns preserve civil engineering records

The Museum of Ventura County, with funding from the National Historical Publications and Records Commission, has begun to scan and preserve an extensive set of Ventura County engineering records. This month marks the halfway point in making a collection of the county’s longest-serving civil engineering firm available to the public.

In addition to the federal funding, the Museum is utilizing grant funds from TOLD Foundation to offer paid internships, which provide valuable work experience to students who would not otherwise be able to afford unpaid internship work. So far, the funding has supported four interns to help with the archiving project,

including students from California State University, Channel Islands.

“Paying students for their time during internships is a critical step in training the next generation of archivists and librarians and helps to create equitable access to hands on work experience,” says Research Library and Archives Director Deya Terrafranca. “TOLD Foundation’s funding is a game changer for the Museum and for these students. Through our federal, local, and foundation partnerships, we’re making our collections available online and teaching critical skills to students that will give them an edge in the job market once they graduate college.”

One of the most important steps in the process is digitizing the oversized drawings, maps, and plans. With direction from the cataloger, interns learn to handle the items while they are scanned. Interns are then responsible for handling the digital files, uploading them to the Museum’s online database and properly cataloging files to be found efficiently.

“The students are completing the cataloging process from start to finish,” says Cataloger Hannah Rogers. “These kinds of prints were made over decades

and different kinds of drawings were made using different chemical processes. Some of the drawings contain chemicals that can be hazardous to others in the collection and are stored separately. The students are learning to identify the drawings and how to separate and preserve them to protect every item.”

The project will continue through August of this year and the Museum expects to hire at least two additional interns for the summer months. An online exhibit featuring the collection will be

Diabetes education services use a collaborative process through which people who have diabetes or who are at risk for diabetes work with a diabetes educator to receive individualized care. At the Community Memorial Health Centers, primary care providers and endocrinologists diagnose, treat, and oversee the management of diabetes. Certified RN Diabetes Educators who specialize in diabetes care and education work in the Community Memorial Health Centers to provide one-on-one consultations in English or Spanish for patients with diabetes. The education includes the core principles of the Association of Diabetes Care and Education Specialist’s ADCES7 – self-care behaviors including healthy eating, being active, taking medication, healthy coping, monitoring, problem solving, and reducing risks.

American Psychiatric Association chat about pets, mental health

Studies have found that interacting with animals can decrease levels of cortisol, reduce loneliness, and increase feelings of comfort and social support, according to Jen Brandt, PhD, AVMA director of member wellbeing initiatives. Pets can also serve as a bridge for social interactions, help you be more active, and reduce work-related stress.

According to a recent APA poll, nearly 90% of pet owners said their pet positively impacts their mental health. The chat started by addressing the ways pets improve our mental health.

"Pets can be a great source of affection, love, and loyalty," Dr. Brendel said. "The APA was proud to collaborate with the AVMA and spotlight the important positive role pets can on our mental health, and the ways we can strengthen our bonds with our pets."

Cats and dogs thrive with consistency and feel safe when we remain calm," Brandt said.

Companion animals can aid with the treatment of diagnosed mental health issues, and for many people their pet has a large part in helping to manage their health.

Pets provide structure and a sense of purpose, a deep emotional connection that may not feel safe with other humans, reduce feelings of isolation due to stigma, and help distract from symptoms of illness.

■ Don't Give Over-the-Counter Medications to Your Pet

Dr. Lauren Forsythe, a pharmacist at the University of Illinois Veterinary Teaching Hospital in Urbana, shares her expertise about common medications that can be harmful to pets.

Pain Relievers: NSAIDs and Acetaminophen

Nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs) help to reduce pain, fever, and inflammation in humans. Common NSAIDs include aspirin, ibuprofen (e.g., Advil), and naproxen (e.g., Aleve).

"While veterinarians may sometimes recommend human over-the-counter medications for pets, many varieties of human medications are toxic to dogs and cats. Pain medications are among the most toxic," says Dr. Forsythe.

Human pain medications are much more likely to cause toxicity in animals than they are in people, which is why there are veterinary-specific medications that are less toxic.

Acetaminophen (e.g., Tylenol) is not an NSAID. It relieves fever and pain but does not reduce inflammation.

"Acetaminophen should never be given to a cat," says Dr. Forsythe. "Even an infant dose can cause severe adverse effects or potentially lead to death."

Medications for Allergies, Nausea

Antihistamines such as diphenhydramine (Benadryl) are sometimes recommended by veterinarians. But, Dr. Forsythe warns, many commercial medications contain a variety of active ingredients. For example, certain products address several

symptoms that can occur together, such as allergic reactions and nasal congestion or pain.

"Pet owners should consult with their veterinarian before giving any human over-the-counter medication to their pet. The veterinarian will know how to assess the pet's potential underlying health issues, possible interactions with medications the pet already takes, and what the proper dose is for that particular pet," says Dr. Forsythe.

Additionally, pet owners often want to treat their vomiting dog with a commercial medication. The main brands, including Pepto Bismol, contain bismuth subsalicylate, which is similar to aspirin. Products containing bismuth subsalicylate can have adverse effects in dogs and are not recommended.

Topical Antibiotics and Antifungals

Topical antibiotics may provide local benefits and avoid the problems sometimes associated with oral or injectable antibiotics. However, animals are likely to lick and groom themselves, which can turn a topical medication into an oral medication. Ingesting some topical medications could be very dangerous for pets.

In general, any wounds on your pet that might lead to infection should be seen by a veterinarian. A veterinarian will know which medications are safe and will stitch the wound, if necessary.

Similarly, a medical professional should be consulted regarding treatment for a fungal infection. The treatment will depend on the site and severity of the infection. Often, prescription oral antifungals are necessary when topical antifungals aren't appropriate.

Why OTC Medications Aren't for Pets

"Most over-the-counter medications are designed to treat symptoms, not the underlying cause," says Dr. Forsythe. While humans and animals may experience similar symptoms, the underlying causes can be completely different. For that reason, what works for the symptoms in a person may not work in an animal.

There are also important differences between animals and people in how the body absorbs and metabolizes drugs. These differences can affect the efficacy of a medication as well as its toxicity.

Not only should you not give human medications to pets, but it is very important to prevent pets from accidentally ingesting medications.

"Keep all medications, especially flavored ones, out of reach of pets," Dr. Forsythe recommends. "If you have a counter-surfing pet, you may need to keep medications inside a closed cabinet." Even when the bottle is closed, an animal can chew its way in if something smells appealing enough.

Dr. Forsythe advises storing all medications in their original packaging in an upper cabinet located in a cool place without excessive moisture. Make sure your pet is not allowed to lick a topical medication that you have applied to yourself.



## Police Reports

Police reports are provided to us by the Ventura Police Department and are not the opinions of the Ventura Breeze. All suspects mentioned are assumed to be innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.

### Commercial and Vehicle Burglary Arrest

On April 5, at approximately 3:45 pm, the Ventura Police Command Center received a call from a clerk about a subject attempting to sell suspected stolen property at a business. Patrol officers arrived and detained the subject, 38-year-old vagrant Darryl Ellis, and an associate. Street Crimes Unit Detectives also responded to assist. The property Ellis was attempting to sell was determined to have been stolen during a vehicle burglary which occurred the day prior. Detectives also recognized Ellis from a commercial burglary which occurred in March of 2023.

Detectives searched a storage unit Ellis had access to. Detectives located additional stolen property from the vehicle burglary from the day prior as well as clothing believed to be worn during the commercial burglary from March 2023.

Ellis was arrested for Commercial Burglary and Vehicle Burglary and he was booked at the Ventura County Jail.

### Armed Robbery and Assault with a Deadly Weapon

On April 8, at approximately 9:30 pm, the Ventura Police Department Command Center received multiple calls of a subject threatening with a knife in the 1200 block of South Victoria Avenue. A loss prevention agent from Vons called dispatch to report the same subject, 26-year-old vagrant Garrett Powell, had just committed a theft from the store and was following Powell, who was still holding a knife.

Officers located Powell on Victoria Ave., north of Ralston St. and he discarded the knife prior to officers taking him into custody.

The ensuing investigation revealed the loss prevention agent saw Powell conceal a bottle of alcohol inside the store. When the loss prevention agent stopped Powell at the exit and demanded the property back, Powell produced a knife and swung it at the loss prevention agent. The loss prevention agent was not injured in

this incident and continued to follow Powell, giving updates to his location until officers were able to locate and take Powell into custody.

Garrett Powell was booked at the Ventura County Jail for Robbery and Assault with a Deadly Weapon.

### Stabbing Homicide

On April 11, at approximately 7:00 pm, the Ventura Police Command Center received a call of a stabbing that just occurred near the public restrooms at Surfers Point adjacent to the Promenade. Responding officers located one male adult suffering from multiple stab wounds to the upper torso.

The victim, 39-year-old Raymond Morales, was transported to the Ventura County Medical Center where he succumbed to his injuries. The Ventura Police Department Major Crimes Detectives are currently investigating the incident. The ensuing investigation revealed that two suspects approached the victim near a picnic table and were involved in an altercation prior to the stabbing. After the attack the suspects fled on foot to the public parking lot at Surfers Point and left the scene in a vehicle northbound on Figueroa St. This investigation is ongoing and may be gang related.

### Driving Under the Influence Collision with Injuries

On April 14, at 9:53pm, the Ventura Police Department Command Center received a 911 call of a vehicle roll-over at the intersection of Walker St. and Moon Drive. An officer in the area arrived on scene within one minute and found a Subaru Outback on its roof, in the bushes of 5700 Moon Drive.

The occupants of the vehicle were found outside the vehicle with visible injuries. The driver, Loudon Flartey, was tending to his 22 year old female passenger who had sustained injuries during the collision. An officer speaking with Flartey could smell the odor of an alcoholic beverage and began an investigation for driving under the influence (DUI).

At the conclusion of the investigation, Flartey was arrested. An eyewitness to the collision said Flartey's vehicle was driving at a high rate of speed and lost control while trying to make a turn.

The Ventura Police Department Major Crimes Detectives are currently investigating this incident. The ensuing investigation revealed that the suspect and victim knew each other and were at a gathering at a residence on East McFarlane. An argument ensued resulting in the victim being stabbed. This investigation is ongoing and may be gang related. At this time there are no suspects in custody.

**Award winning artist, teacher and mentor, Bert Collins, will be honored at the Ventura County Creative Artist's (VCCA) upcoming show.**

The show will take place on May 6 and 7 from 11 am to 4 pm at her West Hills Gallery located at 1545 Cuyama Road in Ojai. Collins, who will celebrate her 95th birthday in June, continues to paint daily and give classes out of her Ojai home-studio despite challenging physical limitations.

Collins began her long career as an artist painting with oils. Once she and her husband moved to Ojai in the 1980s she transitioned to pastels inspired by the beautiful landscapes of the area. She considers herself a tonalist "with a hard line of realism." Her work is influenced by the past and present, echoing the Romantic humanists of the 19th century. She has influenced hundreds of artists and her work is still widely collected throughout the country.

**Local Oxnard author Leslie Rinchen-Wongmo will visit the Ojai Library at 2pm on Saturday, May 13, 2023, to talk about her new book, Threads of Awakening: An American Woman's Journey into Tibet's Sacred Textile Art.**

What if you set out to travel the world and got sidetracked in a Himalayan art workshop? What if that sidetrack turned out to be your life's path? For over 500 years, Tibetans have been creating sacred images from pieces of silk. Much rarer than paintings and sculptures, these stitched fabric thangkas are among Tibet's finest artworks. In 1992, Leslie Rinchen-Wongmo traveled to the seat of the Tibetan government-in-exile in India to manage an economic development fund, only to wind up sewing pictures of Buddha instead. Through her remarkable journey, she discovered that a path is made by walking it and some of the best paths are made by walking off course. In this talk, Leslie will reveal the unique stitches of an ancient needlework tradition, introduce the Buddhist deities it depicts, and share the extraordinary possibilities they embody.

Trained by two of the finest living Tibetan appliqué artists, Leslie learned to stitch bits of silk into elaborate figurative mosaics that bring the transformative images of Buddhist meditation to life. Her artwork has been exhibited internationally and featured in the documentary *Creating Buddhas: The Making and Meaning of Fabric Thangkas*. After two decades abroad, Leslie returned to southern California where she now lives with three cats and enough fabric to last several lifetimes. ## DATA Middle School will dive into outdoor recreation

680 students from DATA Middle School will dive into outdoor recreation and ocean-related activities after months of environmental education with MERITO Foundation's "From the Avenue to The Channel Islands" Program

Last fall, the MERITO Foundation launched a new program in partnership with De Anza School of Technology & the Arts (DATA) Middle School, Ventura Unified School District, and the City of Ventura, titled "From the Avenue to The Channel Islands" (ATCI). The program gives students from DATA, many of who reside in the community of the Avenue, the opportunity to take part in outdoor recreation and environmental education in their local community and in natural areas.

DATA students in the ATCI program have been learning about environmental, ocean and climate sciences, as well as participating in environmental restoration, exploration and monitoring. In addition, this month all 680 DATA students will partake in an array of exciting outdoor recreation activities, such as kayaking, hiking, surfing, sailing, and camping. DATA science teachers enrolled in the ATCI program were given a variety of educational and recreational opportunities to choose from for their students based on specific grade levels.

The core focus of study for 6th graders in the program is watershed science. Last December, students biked from their school on the Avenue to the Ventura River estuary with our partners at Once Upon a Watershed where they learned the importance of keeping our watershed clean. Students also planted vegetables and native plants in their native habitat garden and harvested lettuce as part of the Garden Club. In May, they will be catching some waves, taking surfing lessons with Surf Class at Surfers Point.

7th grader ATCI participants are immersed in environmental and ocean science topics, such as urban runoff, coastal and island ecology. Students have had field experiences at the Ventura Water Reclamation Facility where they toured operations, performed water quality testing and monitored wetland birds.

The focus of education for 8th-grade students in the ATCI program is on ocean and climate topics such as ocean circulation, sea level rise and plankton ecology. On April 12 and 13, they boarded the *Mystic Whaler*, a 100' Tall Ship replica, where they collected water samples, measure physical parameters, and identify plankton while learning the basics of sailing.

The pinnacle experience for all DATA students in the ATCI program will be 2 night/3 days camping trips to Santa Cruz Island! 220 students in grades 6 and 7 (accompanied by 30 chaperones) will camp, hike, kayak, and snorkel, all while learning more

about the natural history of the Channel Islands National Park and National Marine Sanctuary. Approximately fifty 7th-grade students from DATA Middle School will partake in the first trip scheduled for April 26, 2023. Subsequent trips are scheduled for May 10th, June 5th, and June 7th.

The ATCI program also provides DATA students with leadership opportunities as "Youth Outdoor & Environmental Stewards". Currently, there are eleven youths chosen as stewards, who are providing 50 hours of community service. They support MERITO and partner organizations at outreach events, field experiences, and assist with the DATA Middle School leadership program. As stewards, they also have the opportunity to job shadow professionals at work with our partner organizations, including the Port of Hueneme, Ventura Water, and Buena Ventura State Parks.



## Barbara Brown the artist

Artist Barbara Brown was born in the midwest among the Great Plains states. Her father loved the great outdoors and worked as a Park Ranger in the National Parks, including Yosemite, Mount Rainier, the Grand Tetons and Olympic National Park. Barbara and her family would spend their summers exploring forests, meadows and mountains, where she developed her deep connections to these extraordinary places now reflected in her art.

Barbara is inspired by artists like Moran, Bierstadt, Cole, Church and Innes. She loves painting portraits too and for that, her favorite artist is John Singer Sargent. She finds his brushwork and color relations fascinating.

She started out as a watercolorist, dabbling in acrylics, but her true love is oils. She sees herself as a traditional painter, but also loves experimentation. She will try different techniques, color mixing and brushwork. She might even use a non-traditional tool to create interesting marks.

Spending her time outdoors is Barbara's greatest passion. "My family visits Yosemite every year". Currently she lives near Arroyo Verde

and she walks the park often, where she observes the "weather shifts and colors change". She pays attention to "shadows as they lengthen and deepen and when it rains and surfaces become shiny and reflective." Barbara also finds inspiration at the Ventura Botanical Gardens, where she gives tours as a media guide. She is currently working on a piece that shares the "visuals of the Fybos Garden from South Africa."

### Santa Paula Presents A 50's Fantasy

Retreat to the 1950's when life was measured by the housewife who kept order in check. Haven't we all wanted, at some point, to revert to a time when things seemed so much simpler? On the surface, perhaps they were. But of course, it is all an illusion, as each generation has its own set of restrictions, challenges and inconsistencies to conquer. Today is no different, just with more technology.

Home, I'm Darling, a comedic play by Laura Wade, is playing on the main stage at the Santa Paula Theatre Center. With tongue firmly in cheek, the action introduces us to Judy, strongly embraced by Kimberly Demmary, a woman whose corporate job has been dissolved and who feels that she would prefer to live in a retro world of seemingly better times - the 1950's. Alas, despite her desperate attempt of full immersion, the fantasy cannot be upheld in the face of reality. The complicated job of maintaining a "perfect" home remains undervalued.

Friends and family see Judy's retreat into the 1950's as a temporary coping mechanism. Her husband, Johnny, (James James) plays along for longer than he bargained and finds his patience about to crack. At the same time, he encounters a lack of forward movement in his real estate job when his new boss, Alex (Paula Smiech) chooses another agent for a promotion.

Judy's mother, Sylvia, played with attitude by Poosy Holmes, is a realist, vainly attempting to pull her daughter's fantasy world within logical boundaries, without much success. She points out that the 50's were much more than cleaning and organizing. Prejudice, dis-

crimination and politics were rampant. Judy's fantasy world was only part of the story of the era.

The couple's friends, Fran (Julie Fergus) and Marcus (Derek Petropolis) play along to a point as their own problems come to the surface. Solid performances are delivered by all.

Direction by Sarah Broughton is crisp and lively. The divided set of kitchen and front room of Judy and Johnny's home is well appointed with a 1950's styled kitchen, furniture and ornaments. Costuming lends the right touches of the Donna Reed look, complete with petticoats, pearls and heels to serve tea.

A particularly inventive method of set-changing involves some of the characters appearing with dusters and aprons while be-bopping to 50's music. Everyone appears to be having fun as they tidy up.

There are a lot of thought-provoking questions raised, both in the script and implied, for the audience to consider. The second act explains the action of the first in addition to assisting the couple grapple with compromise. The second act dragged a bit winding up everyone's issues.

Home, I'm Darling gives the audience a fun and fanciful look at some people's inherent desire to slow progress, albeit with their smartphones and laptops handy. Such dichotomy shows the true picture of our hurry-up-and-slow-down world today.

"Yellowjackets" is an original Showtime series about a girls soccer team that survived a plane crash in the wilderness while on their way to the national championship. It takes place on two timelines that alternate during each episode: one in 1996 in the remote wilderness after the plane crash and the other is current day (2021) showing their lives as adults after their final rescue from the woods. The series is filled with eerie dark humor, does a great job of seamlessly moving between timelines and the younger actors are dead ringers for their adult counterparts.

They left off at the end of Season 1 in the present with Natalie (Juliette Lewis) holding a shotgun to her head but kidnapped by people in purple after discovering Travis had committed suicide. Shawna (Melanie Lynskey) killed her lover thinking that he was blackmailing the Yellowjackets and unfortunately found out that it was her husband Jeff (Warren Cole). Taissa (Tawney Cypress) won her election as a New Jersey state senator, while at the same time her partner found a morbid alter she

created under the house. Misty (Christina Ricci) released but poisoned her captor and proved very helpful in helping dispose of Shawna's lover's body.

Meanwhile back in 1996 Jackie (Ella Purnell) fell asleep outside and froze to death when the first winter snow fell on the cabin. Shawna (Sophie Nelisse) struggled with her teen pregnancy and the group knew that Jackie's boyfriend Jeff is the father. Natalie (Sophie Thatcher) and Travis (Kevin Alves) fell in love and shared romantic time away while hunting for food for the group. Javi was still missing since the night that the whole group was accidentally dosed with magic mushrooms Misty (Samantha Hanratty) had stowed away. Lottie (Courtney Eaton) had several experiences in front of the group that proved she had some sort of psychic and mystic abilities. Coach Ben Scott (Steven Krueger) was the only adult survivor, but lost his right leg in the crash. Taissa (Jasmin Savoy Brown) and Van (Liv Hewson) also started a romantic relationship.

In the first three episodes of Season 2, in the present we find out that Lottie (Simone Kessell) had started her own intentional community where she serves as a mystical leader which was the group of people that did grab Natalie and where she stayed since her initial escape. Though some things have been revealed, there are still lots of loose ends and unanswered questions.
