X Games California 2023 lands in Ventura

Visit Ventura has announced that in partnership with the City, Ventura County Coast, and Visit California, X Games is coming back to California. This summer marks three years since X Games fans have been able to watch Skateboard, BMX, and Moto X competitions in a large event format in person together. This summer, fans will be able to watch athletes soar to new heights with the Ventura coastline as the backdrop to the world's most elite action sports event.

Fans will gather at the Ventura County Fairgrounds from July 21 to July 23 to watch more than 150 Skateboard, BMX, and Moto X Athletes compete at featured events including skateboarding park, street, street best trick, vert, and vert best trick; BMX park, park best trick, street, dirt, and dirt best trick; and Motocross quarterpipe high air, best trick, and best whip. The weekend will also feature an interactive festival and live music over the course of three days.

Chief Endaya welcomes newest group of fire academy graduates.

A Day in the Life of a Fire Chief

Some people just seem to know what they want early on in life.


As a second grader, David Endaya knew he wanted to be a firefighter paramedic. His inspiration was a neighbor across the street, a real-life LA city firefighter. "He was my first vision of a firefighter in the flesh and what a firefighter did, aside from being just a really great person," says Endaya. "There were many after him but he was the one that definitely left a mark."

His parents, both immigrants, had instilled in Endaya and his older sister the value of education and hard work, so he attended college at UC Santa Barbara, while also taking paramedic classes at Santa Barbara City College.

He became a paramedic back in 1994, with the City of Ventura, when the city still had ambulances. While most firefighters now get hired straight out of the fire academy, Endaya received some great advice when he was starting out. "I was advised to get my bachelor's first then earn my paramedic license," he says, recalling how stiff the competition was back then when the number of applicants far outnumbered the number of vacancies. "There were people ahead of me who had been testing for about a year or two so I had to learn how to test well and just be persistent and patient."

The best part of the job, as cliche as it sounds, is really the ability to help people on a daily basis. He remembers a horrible accident as a kid, not too far from his childhood home in Arleta, where the firefighters arrived and calmly worked the scene. Young David thought, "What a cool job that is to have the

We received the following email from Ivor Davis. We had the city respond. Being from England we were concerned that he may have been parking on the wrong side of the street going in the wrong direction.

Invasion of the parking meters:

One day, not long ago, I woke, strolled downtown and much to my horror noticed that parts of Main Street have suddenly been infested with those deadly parking meters. Very, very long time Ventura resident. City response:

A recent parking study showed that a paid parking model on the 700 block of Main St, would help manage our parking system. Parking meters or "pay stations" where installed a couple weeks back, along with signs, pavement marking and parking stall

As of this week, the pay stations are fully operational, and visitors may begin to utilize them!

Our Parking Enforcement team will begin enforcing June 1st, only issuing "warnings" until then.

Additionally, we are actively working on a Parking Action Plan, which was recently presented to City Council. The plan includes new parking technologies, additional paid parking areas downtown and other parts of the city, and work towards a new parking structure!

Downtown residents may be eligible to receive a parking permit through the City's Downtown Parking Permit Program. The permit, which is offered in our downtown, medical, and school areas, provides all day parking for residents who live near paid parking areas. By displaying a valid parking permit on your car, you can park all day without the worry of getting a parking ticket or moving your car from space to space on your block near their home.

Related to the recent change in the mentioned area, our Parking and Mobility Program Analyst, Sergio Albarran, shared that a recent parking study showed that a paid parking model on the 700 block of Main St, would help manage our parking system. This topic was



addressed by the Downtown Parking Advisory Committee (DPAC) and with Downtown Ventura Partners before the installation of the meters.

The parking meters or "pay stations" were installed a couple weeks back, along with signs, postcard notices to the 700 block, pavement markings, and parking stall numbers.

City staff was able to add an additional eight parking spaces in the area as well. As of this week, the pay stations are fully operational, and visitors may begin to utilize them.

Additionally, City staff is actively working on a Parking Action Plan, which was recently presented to City Council in three separate workshops culminating in a final presentation on Monday, May 8, 2023.

The Plan seeks to identify parking solutions using new parking technologies, additional paid parking areas Downtown and other parts of the City, and a potential new parking structure to better accommodate parking demand.

Good and odd times for the Fairgrounds. Good news is that the Strawberry Festival and X Games are coming to the Fairgrounds.

When Minneapolis hosted the X Games in 2019, the event generated an estimated \$53 million in economic impact. Being a much smaller city, we probably won't generate near that amount but still a great economic boon for our hotels, restaurants and other businesses (plus TV exposure).

At the press event I asked, "Will there be money spent refurbishing the Fairgrounds." I was told yes there would be. It certainly needs it. The Fairgrounds are like an old run-down car that needs a new engine, upholstery and paint.

The return of the California Strawberry Festival to the Fairgrounds is wonderful. The event hasn't been held (COVID) for several years so glad they decided to do it here.

Now the odd part. Less than a year after she was hired, Stacy Rianda is no longer CEO of the Fairgrounds. The Fairgrounds board of directors announced they had accepted Rianda's retirement. No explanation was given.

She was hired to replace longtime CEO Barbara Quaid who retired. A new CEO will need to be hired, and probably not prior to the X Games.

All questions regarding this matter were referred to the California Department of Food and Agriculture who owns the grounds.

The volunteers who serve on the Ventura County Fairgrounds board of directors hold their seats until they resign, are replaced or die. Directors are not paid.

It has been tough times for the board and Fairgrounds. The COVID-19 pandemic forced the Ventura County Fair to be canceled for two years. The Fair is a major source of income.

The latest controversy involved a \$319 million facelift of the fairgrounds that would include building a 7,500-seat stadium to be used for minor league baseball, conventions and concerts. Directors rejected the proposal.

After eight months of legal wrangling, the Ventura County Christian School and Ventura Unified School District board approved a settlement releasing the school from back rent and future rent in exchange for it leaving the MacMillan Avenue campus at the end of the school year by July 15.



ability to work a scene calmly and know what to do."

It is humbling to realize that someone's best fighting chance at survival in a very dire situation is sometimes just you, according to the 52-year-old Endaya.. "You're almost never off-duty. You could be on vacation with your family or on a flight and you'll still be called to jump in if there's an emergency. It goes with the territory, in or out of uniform," he adds.

While most of us usually have pleasant thoughts and happy associations with holidays, Endaya associates some holidays with emergencies that transpired that day. They got seared in his mind and the memories have stayed with him through the years from his days as a paramedic to becoming fire chief in 2014.

In the past few years, he hasn't gone out on calls as much as he used to, until something large like the

Thomas Fire happened in 2017. "I had to head out and help," he recalls that period. "It was all hands on deck but organized chaos. I'm really proud of how our county and the various agencies responded during that time."

About 70 to 85% of calls are medical emergencies. For example, a car crash is a separate type of call, but it often has a medical component. Another example is a structural fire. It has a medical component as well due to possible smoke inhalation. A majority of the calls are bonafide medical emergencies like trauma, seizures, childbirth and the like.

Also, the Safe Surrender program is still in place in most fire stations around California. Under this program, parents can safely surrender their newborns without any questions asked.

Looking forward, Endaya says a seventh fire station is being considered. The sixth and last one was built

in 1988. Part of a five-year strategic plan is looking for potential locations and designs for number seven. Also looking at increasing gender diversity

within the ranks and hiring more female firefighters. According to Endaya, there is no shortage of female applicants but the job market has become so competitive that prospects find themselves sifting through multiple job offers.

If he weren't fighting fires and attending to emergencies, he thinks he would still be in a job which allows him to make a difference. He says, "I've thought of becoming a helicopter or jet pilot maybe, but I know I just have to be around people and solving problems. I would be happiest doing

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


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"From the Avenue to The Channel Islands" Program

680 students from DATA Middle School will dive into outdoor recreation and ocean-related activities after months of environmental education with MERITO Foundation's "From the Avenue to The Channel Islands" Program.

Last fall, the MERITO Foundation launched a new program in partnership with De Anza School of Technology & the Arts (DATA) Middle School, Ventura Unified School District, and the City of Ventura, titled "From the Avenue to The Channel Islands" (ATCI). The program gives students from DATA, many of who reside in the community of the Avenue, the opportunity to take part in outdoor recreation and environmental education in their local community and natural areas.

DATA students in the ATCI program have been learning about environmental, ocean and climate sciences, as well as participating in environmental restoration, exploration and monitoring. In addition, this month all 680 DATA

students will partake in an array of exciting outdoor recreation activities, such as kayaking, hiking, surfing, sailing, and camping. DATA science teachers enrolled in the ATCI program were given a variety of educational and recreational opportunities to choose from for their students based on specific grade levels.

The core focus of study for 6th graders in the program is watershed science. Last December, students biked from their school on the Avenue to the Ventura River estuary with our partners at Once Upon a Watershed where they learned the importance of keeping our watershed clean. Students also planted vegetables and native plants in their native habitat garden and harvested lettuce as part of the Garden Club. In May, they will be catching some waves, taking surfing lessons with Surf Class at Surfers Point.

7th grader ATCI participants are immersed in environmental and ocean science topics, such as urban runoff, coastal and island ecology. Students have had field experiences at the Ventura Water Reclamation Facility where they toured operations, performed water quality testing and monitored wetland birds.

The focus of education for 8th-grade students in the ATCI program is on ocean and climate topics such as ocean circulation, sea level rise and plankton ecology. On April 12 and 13, they boarded the Mystic Whaler, a 100' Tall Ship replica, where they collected water samples, measured physical parameters, and identified plankton while learning the basics of sailing.

The pinnacle experience for all DATA students in the ATCI program will be 2 night/3 days camping trips to Santa Cruz Island! 220 students in grades 6 and 7 (accompanied by 30 chaperones) will camp, hike, kayak, and snorkel, all while learning more about the natural history of the Channel Islands National Park and National Marine Sanctuary.

The ATCI program also provides DATA students with leadership opportunities as "Youth Outdoor & Environmental Stewards". Currently, there are eleven youths chosen as stewards, who are providing 50 hours of community service. They support MERITO and partner organizations at outreach events, field experiences, and assist with the DATA Middle School leadership program. As stewards, they also have the opportunity to job shadow professionals at work with our partner organizations, including the Port of Hueneme, Ventura Water, and Buenaventura State Parks.

Ventura Land Trust Celebrates its 20th Anniversary

Ventura Land Trust celebrates 20 years of conservation in 2023, starting with a free community birthday party on Friday, May 19th at Topa Topa Brewing Company (4880 Colt Street, Ventura, 93003) from 6-9 pm.

"From the beginning, this has been a community endeavor," says Ventura Land Trust (VLT) Executive Director Melissa Baffa. "We were started 20 years ago by a concerned group of citizens who wanted to protect the hillsides north of the city from development. They wanted the natural beauty of those hills to be preserved for generations to come, and that mission still holds true today."

Founded in 2003 as Ventura Hillsides Conservancy, Ventura Land Trust (VLT) protected its first parcels of land along the Ventura Rive—donated by local families—in 2012. VLT stepped into the spotlight in 2020 with the opening of the 2,123-acre Harmon Canyon Preserve. Open daily for free, Harmon Canyon Preserve has been embraced by the community as a recreation destination and as a place to experience nature's beauty and diversity close to home.

The threatened hillside land that inspired the organization's founding, Mariano Rancho, was purchased by VLT in 2019 and is expected to open to the public as a nature preserve in 2025.

The community spirit and support that has sustained VLT for two decades continues to drive its conservation work. Each year, hundreds of volunteers work

alongside staff on land restoration projects and community outreach, and hundreds of thousands of individuals visit VLT preserves.

"Not all land trusts open their conserved lands to the public," says Baffa. "For VLT, welcoming visitors to these open spaces is an both an invitation to experience how special they are and a call to action. When we connect people to nature, they understand why it's worth protecting."

VLT offers guided hikes and fieldbased educational excursions in English and Spanish. Nature exploration program Ventura Wild fosters a sense of belonging and awareness of the natural world for children as young as two years

"Looking ahead from here, we are digging into the science of nurturing biodiverse habitats that are resilient in the face of climate change. We're building a land trust that reflects the full diversity of our region and welcomes everyone into open spaces," says Baffa.

"Twenty years may seem like a long time, but for nature, it's barely a blink. VLT is really just getting started on the promise we've made to protect these open spaces forever. It's a big promise, but we are sharing this vision and work with so many other people, businesses, and organizations. It makes our community and our planet stronger."

The Importance of Caregivers

"Between 2012 and 2050, our county will experience considerable growth in its older population, projected to be 83.7 million," according to, Martha Shapiro, LCSW, Director of Programs at Senior Concerns in Thousand Oaks. "According to the Ventura County Area Agency on Aging, there are now more people living in Ventura County who are age 60+ than who are under the age of 18.

"Most Americans over the age of 65 live in the community, not in nursing homes or other institutions. Only 4.5 percent (about 1.5 million) of older adults live in nursing homes and 2 percent (1 million) in assisted living facilities. This means that there will continue to be a greater reliance on community-based services, such as those offered by Senior Concerns.

"According to the Alzheimer's Association, between 2020 and 2025 the number of people age 65+ with Alzheimer's disease is estimated to increase 21.7% and most will be care for at home by a family member, who themselves may experience a variety of physical, emotional, financial, and social burdens associated with the caregiving role."

Caregivers in the home may provide hands on assistance with dressing, bathing, feeding and more. Or, they may only provide verbal assistance and guidance while also providing emotional support. Each person's needs are different, and may change over time.

Caregiver burnout can happen for various reasons, according to Shapiro. "Caregivers are often tasked with providing difficult, sometimes medical in nature, physical and emotional help. They may be on guard 24/7, having to be aware of their loved ones' needs. This can take a toll emotionally and physically. If they do not have proper support and breaks, they can feel physical and mental exhaustion."

Providing caregivers, the community's support and caring is essential since caregivers are the backbone of the long-term care system in America. Shapiro said, "I encourage people to reach out to those in caregiving roles and offer concrete help. Rather than asking, 'What can I do to help?' suggest something clear and specific. Considering to offer dropping off a meal once a week, or picking up groceries or prescriptions every Saturday, or sitting with their loved ones for two hours a week so that the caregiver can take a break. Be clear about what you can offer so that it will be easy for the caregiver to accept the help.

"Senior Concerns has a Caregiver Resource Center to support and empower family caregivers," according to Shapiro. "Anyone caring for an aging loved one can schedule a free care consultation to understand the resources available to them, and create a plan of care to help them in their caregiving role. Several caregiver support groups are also offered to facilitate caregivers coming together and supporting each other. Senior Concerns also offers seminars over Zoom that our open to the public that provide education and information on a variety of topics pertinent to older adults and family caregivers.

Elder Abuse: An Underreported Problem

Billions of dollars are stolen from older adults each year, while self-abuse also plagues this age group. Know the signs to help stop elder abuse.

According to a 2021 report by the National Council on Aging, one in 10 Americans aged 60 and older have experienced some form of elder abuse. However, it is estimated that only one in 24 cases is ever reported. Ventura County Adult Protective Services received over 5,200 reports of abuse and neglect in 2022. Financial abuse, as indicated over the past seven years, is consistently one of the most reported types of abuse against elders in our county.

Some of the risk factors include living alone, no regular physician, lack of social support/isolation, lack of resources, family conflict, substance abuse, confusion or cognitive impairment, and refusing help from others.

According to the National Center on Aging, elders throughout the United States lose an estimated \$2.6 billion to \$36 billion annually due to financial abuse and exploitation. These critical funds are needed to pay for basic necessities such as housing, food, and medical care.

Unfortunately, no one is immune to abuse, neglect, and exploitation. It occurs in every demographic, and can happen to anyone – a family member, a neighbor, even you. Yet it rare to discover these crimes, typically because clients are reluctant to disclose the abuse and/or neglect.

Elders neglecting their own needs, which is commonly known as self-neglect, is the second-most consistently reported type of abuse against elders in our county. According to the National Center on Elder Abuse, self-neglect is

Quality Versus Quantity

County of Ventura approves move aligning VCAAA as division of HSA

The County of Ventura Board of Supervisors has voted to approve a change in the Ventura County Area Agency on Aging's administrative reporting structure, which will see the VCAAA become a division of the Ventura County Human Services Agency. The move is intended to better align the county's older adult services.

The VCAAA will retain its current organizational structure, and there will be no change to the existing services provided by the VCAAA, or how clients access these services.

A newly formed Aging and Disability Department will oversee both the AAA functions and programs, and in a phased manner, will assume oversight of four programs currently managed by the HSA: In-Home Support Services (IHSS), IHSS-Public Authority, Adult

Protective Services, and Public Administrator

Victoria Jump, the current director of the VCAAA, will oversee the new Aging and Disability Department and become an HSA Deputy Director.

"For everyone that has relied on us for more than 40 years, the VCAAA will continue to provide the same high level of service to the community that we have come to be known for," Jump said. "That's not going to change. The VCAAA's services will be enhanced as a result of this new structure."

A reason for the reorganization is to reduce the siloed nature of how services to shared populations are delivered. Both existing VCAAA and HSA programs currently serve many of the same clients. Improvements in communication and coordination will reduce duplication of efforts and resources. The move will also create a central point in access for older adults, people with disabilities, and caregivers, and provide more integrated services to these populations.

Additionally, the reorganization will improve the level of administrative support available to the VCAAA, aiming to streamline operations and create better outcomes for clients. Further, it may result in additional leveraging of federal and state funding to support critical programs for older adults, people with disabilities, and caregivers.

The changes will take effect with the new fiscal year beginning on July 1, 2023

Older adults currently comprise 26% of Ventura County's population, and that is estimated to rise to 29% by 2030 and 32% by 2050. In recent years, both a State Master Plan on Aging and a Ventura County Master Plan on Aging have been established with the aim of addressing the complexities faced by an aging population, and the HSA/VCAAA merger will help the County better accomplish the goals laid out in those plans.


OLLI Taste of Summer Registration Opens

a form of self-harm that may co-occur with, provoke, or be triggered by elder mistreatment. It is characterized as the behavior of an older person that threatens their own health or safety, including but not limited to, the refusal or failure to provide themselves with life's necessities.

Self-neglect is an under-reported type of abuse in Ventura County. In 2020, self-neglect was reported 49.2 percent of the time nationally. However, in 2021, only 38 percent of referrals received in Ventura County had self-neglect allegations.

Risk factors for self-neglect include recent widowing or the loss of a loved one, worsening medical problems or a disability, lack of outside contact, isolation from friends and family, lack of a caregiver, and cognitive impairment or dementia. Studies have indicated that the COVID-19 pandemic has exacerbated the incidence of self-neglect in aged populations and increased the need for the use of intervention tools for aging

adults and geriatric patients living alone, many of which may include in-home artificial intelligence systems.

Here are eight things that anyone can do to prevent elder abuse:

Learn the signs of elder abuse, neglect, and self-neglect

Stay physically and mentally active Avoid isolation, keep involved in the community and with family

Stay healthy and seek medical care when

Monitor your financial affairs and watch for unusual banking activity

Be aware of scams – if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is

Use licensed and bonded caregivers who have had background checks

Be careful before adding family or caregivers onto your bank accounts

Dogs and cats can develop a form of senile dementia. In humans, it's easy to notice confusion but in dogs and cats it may be harder to determine. As pets age, they develop both

physical and mental issues. In cats, it's hard to determine, as cats are more likely to be loners and normally sleep a lot.

However, there are signs that may help identify a mental problem.

Signs of confusion such as not using the litter box, excessive roaming, lack of appetite, or not using their favorite napping spot may point to some form of beginning dementia. If a cat is normally friendly and likes to be petted, held, and cuddled then becomes easily irritated and avoids human contact, this could be a sign.

Being stoic creatures, cats don't normally vocalize if there isn't a reason. If a cat begins to be more vocal and shows signs of becoming confused, restless and unsure, it will usually happen at night.

Canine senility commonly occurs among older dogs. 'Dogs are considered to be geriatric when they reach 10 years of age, although smaller breeds may not show signs for another 3-5 years.

Most dogs benefit from a regular schedule and seniors are more relaxed having a routine. However, as his age advances, he may not remember his schedule as well.

Older pets may be more prone to developing bladder infections. There is help for this in the form of prescribed medications. It's important to get regular check-ups for any suspected condition.

Soiling inappropriately should never be punished, as an aging formerly housebroken dog or cat is not being naughty, but may be losing control due to an aging issue. They should never be punished for something they can't help.

Some suspected mental conditions may have a medical basis. If your pet is drinking a lot of water, has a good appetite but is losing weight, it could be

a sign of diabetes. With a loss of bladder control, he will need more potty breaks.

Dogs can also develop lesions in their brains similar to those found in human Alzheimer's patients. The typical age for their formation begins around 7 or older.

Some behavior changes may also be linked to dental issues. Loss of vision and hearing, arthritis, kidney, and heart disease can cause both physical and mental changes.

Diet is very important so that your aging pet receives adequate nutrition and maintains a healthy weight. Pets with medical conditions may need a special diet formula.

So why have cats evolved to have such exceptional night vision?

"Adaptations for vision are the direct result of a species' need to interact with its environment," Plummer said. "Cats are obligate carnivores, meaning they must eat meat in order to stay healthy. They are unable to produce certain required proteins and must ingest them from an external source. Many of their potential prey items are active at night or in dim light."

Despite being more active than the average human during the night, cats are not strictly nocturnal animals. Rather, they are considered "crepuscular," or active during twilight, owing to their fondness for hunting at dusk and dawn.

Assault with a Deadly Weapon

On February 1, at approximately 11:00 pm, the Ventura Police Command Center received a 9-1-1 call reference a fight that had just occurred in a parking lot to an apartment complex. Responding officers arrived within minutes and located the victim who was suffering from severe injuries to his face. The suspect stomped on the victim's face leaving an impression of his shoe. A nearby resident broke up the attack and the suspect fled in a vehicle.

Officers following up on the case located surveillance video from the apartment complex and identified

the suspect as a resident, 25-year-old Ventura resident Coy Duvernay. Officers located the suspect and evidence of the crime in an apartment, and he was arrested. The suspect was booked for Assault with a Deadly Weapon at the Ventura County Jail.

Assault with a Deadly Weapon

On February 14, at approximately 3:00 pm, the Ventura Police Command Center received several 911 calls about a male subject swinging a knife in the Vons shopping center parking lot. Officers responded to the area and detained 38year-old vagrant Ramon Carbajal, identified as the subject with the knife.

During the investigation, it was discovered that Carbajal was in the parking lot, swinging the knife when he approached several juveniles and began slashing at them. He struck one of the juveniles in the back, not injuring her. The youth fled into a local business and asked to call the police.

Carbajal was arrested for Assault with a Deadly Weapon and booked at the Ventura County Jail. A search of the Ventura County Superior Court website shows that since 2019 Carbajal has been convicted of ten misdemeanors and felonies, including Vehicle Theft, Vandalism, Petty Theft, Vehicle Tampering, Brandishing with a Knife, Resisting Arrest, Disturbing the Peace, and Identity Theft.

Students from VUSD will present proposals

For the 8th year in a row, students from Ventura Unified School District will present proposals to reduce their schools' environmental footprint and receive awards.

On Monday, May 22nd, the MERITO Foundation and Ventura Unified School District (VUSD) will host the 8th annual EECCOA Challenge Awards Ceremony. At this event, 7th-12th-grade student finalists

will present their environmental business proposals to either reduce the carbon footprint of their school or advocate for the removal of the relic Matilija Dam from the Ventura River. The primary sponsor of this year's EECCOA Challenge Awards Ceremony is Clean Power Alliance.

For the EECCOA Challenge, students had the option of choosing a project theme from 4 categories: water conservation, energy efficiency, or waste reduction at their school campuses, or outreach about the ecological benefits of dam removal. This multi-disciplinary competition is an opportunity for our youth to combine environmental science with business ideas, and practice environmental entrepreneurship. School administrators also benefit by hearing from students on how to improve their schools' infrastructure and reduce utility costs.

The event will take place at the Poinsettia Pavilion, in Ventura, from 4 -7 pm. The keynote speaker for the event is Anna Cummins, Co-Founder & Executive Director of 5 Gyres, a leading organization in the global movement against plastic pollution, with more than 10 years of expertise in scientific research, engagement, and education. Representatives from the offices of Senator Monique Limón, and Congressman Salud Carbajal will be present to congratulate the students.

There are currently 86 teams competing in the EECCOA Challenge, from students attending Buena High School, Ventura High School, Foothill Technology High School, Anacapa Middle School, Balboa Middle School, or DATA Middle School. After two rounds of judging, the top 16 finalists will present their projects in person before judges at the May 22nd event. After presentations, the MERITO Foundation and VUSD will award cash or in-kind prizes for 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and Honorable Mention in each category. All participating students have been immersed since September 2022

in MERITO Foundation's Ventura Action Network (V-RAN) Program or "From the Avenue to Channel Islands (ATCI) program in partnership with the VUSD.

The V-RAN program provides professional development, field training, and curriculum to science teachers, as well as hands-on field experience for ~700 middle and high school students throughout the Ventura River watershed and coast. Through the ATCI program, 660 students from DATA Middle School enjoy outdoor experiences at the Ventura River, State Beaches, and the Channel Islands. In addition to environmental education, students also participate in biking, hiking, kayaking, camping, snorkeling, sailing, and surfing, and learn leadership skills that they put into practice at outdoor community events.

Sponsors for the V-RAN Program include NOAA B-WET Grant, Ventura Water, and UC Davis Center for Community and Citizen Science. The 'From the Avenue to the Channel Islands' (ATCI) Program of the MERITO Foundation is funded by the Outdoors Equity Grant, created through AB 209 and administered by California State Parks, Office of Grants, and Local Services.

The MERITO Foundation is a 501(c) 3 nonprofit organization based in Ventura, CA, dedicated to protecting the ocean by facilitating environmental education, conservation, and scientific research opportunities for multicultural youth and their communities.

They are Venturan's trying to make it

Thirty-three-years old, Shawn Hittle is a street performer who specializes in fire spinning. Fire performance typically involves moving and throwing objects like batons or rings made with wicks which can sustain a large enough flame to create an artistic effect. He attends a group that meets near the Seabridge Amphitheater in Oxnard for fire spinning tutorials and practice. "There are a lot of different techniques used. Sometimes we juggle fire and there are elements of martial arts we experiment with," says Hittle.

Hittle grew up on a farm in Illinois where he was a member of 4-H and bred Dutch black and white tuxedo rabbits for show. He graduated high school with a 3.3 grade point average and went on to work in construction doing everything from framing to flooring. He took some online computer classes aspiring to work as a software technician.

Hoping for a job with his uncle, Hittle moved to Ventura with his girlfriend in 2018. His uncle had expressed enthusiasm for the burgeoning marijuana

industry and promised Hittle opportunities. Little did heknow, his uncle was living out of his car and the commercial pot growing industry was more difficult than either had anticipated.

After six months, Hittle's girlfriend grew tired of living in a tent and returned home. Since then, Hittle has been couch surfing and relies on his skateboard for transportation. Hittle is one of the city's many homeless.

Hittle says that he gave up looking for employment. Like most homeless, he also has an ID problem. He has a cell phone, but it is not always in working order. "Because I skate everywhere, my phone takes a beating. Half the time, I'm not sure if it is working."

Hittle has been fortunate. He has friends that occasionally volunteer a meal and bed here and there to him. He also receives supplemental food benefits through SNAP.

He has lived in Ventura longer than any previous location since he left home. Because his mother moved a lot, Hittle attended six different high schools in Illinois. He has the occasional call from his sister but is not in touch with any other relatives. Hittle says he would consider free housing but is not keen on oversight. "I stay out of trouble, so someone asking me where I have been or what I have been doing is unnecessary."

He also says that many homeless seem to be a target of police. "When you know you haven't done anything wrong, having the police stop you and ask questions is disturbing." He says that Ventura is pretty low-key compared to some of the places he has lived and is surprised the police even bother.

Safety hasn't been an issue for Hittle-yet-but he does admit that many of the city's homeless have challenges beyond homelessness. "At least 40% of the homeless people here have some type of mental disability," he says." For Hittle, the situation is temporary. He hopes that the future will open some doors-until then fire spinning on the promenade keeps him busy.

A View from House Seats

Ojai Stages Original Work

Ojai writer, director and artist Peter Fox offers up his play "Disappearing Act" now on stage at the Ojai Arts Center Theater.

Fox's work features a young man who ostensibly makes his living as a magician. With this background in mind, the body of the work centers around a man struggling with old familial resentments, a curious and surprisingly naive scholar and an older man who magically appears bringing a few skeletons from his own closet.

Woven into this are some bits of magic as well as references to magic history and personalities in the world of magic, many with which the general public is unlikely to be familiar. Fox's fascination with "inspired magic" is evident. However, from my point of view, it was not fully realized, but did provide a new scenario twist in which to explore disappointment, disillusion and long-buried anger.

The acting by all three is by-andlarge adequately done, particularly Buddy Wilds as Frank. He fairly carried the second act which had more depth. However, the three characters did not seem to have developed chemistry between them.

Max Budroe as Donny, the young man, failed to convince me that his skills were honed enough to make a living as a magician, either in presentation or performance. Budroe seemed unsure and tentative opening night handling the cards and basic tricks. His rather shaggy look never said "professional" to me as a performer. There seemed no difference between the man who lounged on the

couch or the man who was performing "at a gig." He delivered the written material well enough although the actual magic performed seemed quite entry-level. Perhaps his confidence will build as the run goes on.

Emily Vallance gives a strong presence to Molly, a student drafting a thesis on the psychology of magicians. There is a wealth of writing on this subject that seemed given little depth. It was unclear to me what information she was seeking and how it related to the action.

Buddy Wilds' character was crusty and interesting. The dialogue pace picked up considerably after Wilds entered the action.

Some technical aspects seemed to still be in rehearsal phase. Long pauses when lights either did or did not come up in a timely fashion and uncertain sound cues caused pacing to be somewhat choppy. The audience did react favorably throughout, and pacing should smooth out over the run.

Magic Consultant James Lantiegne, owner of The House of Magic in Santa Paula, no doubt lent several props, set decor and instruction but the director and actors must put the polish on, which I found lacking. I was eager for more performance shine to convince me of Donny's acumen as intimated by the script. Sadly, I was disillusioned.

very well-known athletes. Deloris told Sonny she would consider his offer and get back to him, but a short time later he had heard that Adidas matched the offer and included a Mercedes-Benz 380SL so thought that the deal was not going to happen.

Sonny got a call from Deloris who said regardless of what he had heard that Michael was going to sign with Nike but under one additional condition, that along with the \$250,000 he would also receive a percentage of any Nike product sold under his brand. Their chief designer had been working on a line he named "Air", and named Michael's shoe the "Air Jordan". Though the NBA had rigid standards on color, they designed a colorful shoe based on the Chicago Bulls colors and agreed to pay the fine of \$5,000 a game for Jordan to wear the shoes. The Air Jordans were like no other shoe on the market and a record-setting instant hit selling \$162 million in its first year. Currently the Air Jordan brand represents \$4 billion in annual sales for Nike, and Micheal is reported to have made \$400 million a year in passive income as a result of the revenue share with Nike.

"AIR" shares the incredible true story of how Nike and Michael Jordan created a brand with a partnership that completely changed the sports industry, athletic branding and even popular culture. Just after the NBA draft in 1984, Nike only held 17% of the basketball shoe market, far behind the leader which was Converse with 54% followed by Adidas with 29%. Nike's basketball shoes division had to do something big with a comparatively small budget or risk being cut by the board. 
Sonny Vaccaro held the unique position of basketball athletic scout with Nike and was responsible for finding talented athletes that would promote the Nike brand. He worked with Nike Basketball Division Marketing VP Rob Strasser (Jason Bateman) who picked the talent pool for the scouts and was mainly focused on the players from the

recent NBA draft. Michael Jordan was 4th in the draft going to the Chicago Bulls and had been a vocal supporter of Adidas shoes and track suits, which were very popular at the time.

Nike CEO Phil Knight assigned the team an annual budget of \$250,000 for three athletes, which made it difficult for Sonny and the team to get top athletes that were being offered more money by their competition. Sonny requested \$500,000 but Phil said no, so Sonny suggested they use the entire budget to try to sign Michael Jordan. Phil was resistant at first, but then agreed and Sonny set off to meet with his friend George Raveling (Marlon Wayans) who coached Jordan in the Olympics and could offer some support in bringing him to Nike

Sonny told Deloris the contract would be for \$250,000 and that Nike had an advantage in that they could devote much more attention to Micheal than the other brands that carried some
