Local Government News

Approved water and wastewater rates adjustments to begin on July 1, 2023

Starting on July 1, 2023, Ventura Water customers will see water and wastewater rate adjustments reflected on their monthly billing cycles. These forthcoming rate adjustments signify year three of the five-year increases that were approved by the City Council on May 17, 2021.

Rate increases support both daily

operation and maintenance of the City's existing water and wastewater systems, along with approximately 36 planned capital improvement projects, including the long-anticipated State Water Interconnection Project and VenturaWater-Pure Program.

City staff collaborated with the Water Commission and a third-party financial consultant to conduct an exhaustive water and wastewater rate to assess the City's water rate tiers, water shortage rates, wastewater rate structure, and financing alternatives for significant projects.

The study's findings revealed the necessity for an average annual rate increase of seven percent for water service and six percent for wastewater service. These rate adjustments are essential to maintain the ongoing operation and



maintenance of the systems, address infrastructure concerns, ensure a secure water supply, improve water quality, and meet necessary legal and environmental regulations.

Leading up to City Council's decision, Ventura Water conducted over 20 community presentations and hosted several virtual town hall meetings where information about anticipated rate impacts was shared with community members, neighborhood groups, clubs, businesses, and economic development stakeholders.

As I See It by Sheldon Brown



On June 6, I gave an enthralling talk to the Ventura Retired Men's Group at the Poinsettia Pavilion. Luckily no one left – probably because they didn't want to miss lunch.

Because there was so much news to report this issue does not contain the sudoku or crossword.

In this issue there is information regarding events at Portside Ventura Harbor. This is where we live. A wonderful place to live and the tennis court is right next to the building we live in so a 2-minute walk for me to go play.

In 2022, two city staff members formally complained to Human Resources that Councilmember Mike Johnson had acted unprofessionally and in a hostile and bullying manner during city council meetings.

The city attorney retained an independent, third-party law firm to investigate the two complaints. After conducting a thorough investigation (which cost the City approximately \$75,000), the law firm determined that Councilmember Johnson did act unprofessionally toward one of the employees in a hostile and bullying manner.

The Ventura City Council has voted (5-1) to admonish rather than censure Mike Johnson. This is less harsh than previously recommended at a closed door meeting where the council approved a recommendation to censure Johnson and remove him from his committee assignments.

The Strawberry Festival, held at the Fairgrounds, surpassed expectations by drawing an estimated 55,000 visitors to the event. While being successful, it also drew much criticism from locals for what seemed to be the lack of a comprehensive traffic management plan. I'm sure there were lessons learned, which will be enacted next year. Great to keep the Festival in Ventura.

The next large event at the Fairgrounds will be the X Games in July. To avoid some of the traffic issues encountered by the Strawberry Festival, the city will be much more involved in the X Games. Coordination between the City and the Fairgrounds is ongoing, and associated costs are included within not-to-exceed amounts. The total cost will not exceed \$250,000, as presented to City Council in previous budget workshops. This includes all personnel costs for the Ventura Police Department, Ventura City Fire, and other city staff required to support the event.

The California Department of Food and Agriculture, provides oversight for the Fairgrounds that sits on state owned property.

Ventura's clothing company, Patagonia, has been rated the number one most loved company in the United States one more time.

Seven people were shot, two fatally, when gunfire rang out outside a downtown theater in Richmond where a high school graduation ceremony had recently concluded, causing attendees to flee in panic, weep and clutch their children.

A South Carolina gas station owner was charged with murder on Monday after allegedly shooting and killing a 14-year-old boy he falsely believed was shoplifting bottles of water.

The gunman who killed three people and wounded six others while roaming through his northwestern New Mexico neighborhood, was apparently firing at random targets. He was a local 18-year-old high school student.

Michigan Gov. Gretchen Whitmer gave final approval to a red flag law that aims to keep firearms away from those at risk of harming themselves or others as the state grapples with ways to slow gun violence in the wake of its second mass school shooting.

Michigan joined Minnesota to implement a red flag law after Democrats in both states won control of both chambers and the governor's office in November. New Mexico previously was the last state to pass a red flag law in 2020. Something needs to be tried to stop the gun violence in this country. Everyone owning guns is certainly not doing it.

Nevada's Joe Lombardo became one of the first Republican governors to enshrine protections for out-of-state abortion patients and in-state providers, adding the western swing state to the list of those passing new laws to solidify their status as safe havens for abortion patients. A Republican hero.

I find this to be absolutely disgust-

ing. Former president Donald Trump commemorated Memorial Day by comparing his battles against "fascist 'pigs'" and "lunatic thugs" to the more than one million US soldiers that died on the battlefield. Trump took to his Truth Social platform to deliver a maniacal all-caps rant. Families of veterans killed in battle should feel the same way.

I-da-ka (an Indian word meaning "to serve") was formally chartered in 1937 and continued to serve Ventura County until 2008. Local families raised in Ventura remember all the women behind the men who served and all the assistance they augmented to those in need.

It would be an honor for the 100th President, Maya Zumaya to take up this missing history and congratulated those who helped make the Ventura Downtown Lions Club a success from it's inception.

I have inherited all of the historical records of the group and would like to make the records available to complete the rich history of civic service to Ventura.


They ride the 545 miles from SF to LA and fundraise a minimum of \$3,500.

What is in a name? Ventura

The Chamber of Commerce will tell you that the city of San Buenaventura is really the city of good fortune. That is a direct translation of the Spanish word Buenaventura. But in truth, that is not true. The city is named after a man, a very unique man who lived in 13th Century Italy.

His name was Giovanni di Fidanza, born in Bagnaren, Italy in 1221, the son of John Fidanza and Marra Fitel. At the age of four he became sick and lapsed into a coma. His father was a doctor but all he tried to save his son failed, medical knowledge was limited at the time. His mother insisted that the child should be taken to St. Francis who lived not far away. At the time the pious Francis was seen by all as a living saint and it was believed he could cure the boy. They took the infant to the saintly man to restore the child's health.

The saintly Francis told them he couldn't work miracles, and that only God could do such things. The mother begged him to at least give her son a blessing. He took the boy in his arms and pronounced a blessing.

The instant he did, the child woke out of his coma with a cry. The surprised Francis let out the words; "O bona ventura!" (What good fortune). From that day on that became the boy's nickname.

At the age of twenty-two he joined the Franciscan Order where he proved an adept scholar and was sent to Paris to study. There he became good friends with Thomas Aquinas and earned a degree as a Doctor of Divinity and took the position of teacher.

In 1256 he became the head of the Franciscan Order, over time rising to the rank of Cardinal of Albano. His writings were so popular that in 1274 he was commissioned by Pope Gregory X with the task of re-uniting the Greek Orthodox and Roman Catholic churched that had split. In Rome he labored long and hard at his task, working himself to death, but failed in the end. He died on July 14th 1274, he was fifty -three. In his life he penned many papers and books. So many miracles happened at his tomb in the Vatican that he was named a saint. His symbol is the feather, a pen he used to write his many works.

Fr. Serra read his books and was impressed, naming the ninth Mission San Buneaventura in 1782 in his honor. St. Bonaventure is the patron saint of Ventura. A fitting man to represent all that is good in our community.



How to prevent your loved one with dementia from wandering

For over 700,000 people in California living with Alzheimer's disease, wandering is a very common symptom that can be dangerous — even life-threatening – and the stress of this risk weighs heavily on caregivers and family.

It is estimated that 60% of people with dementia will wander and become lost at some point, and many do so repeatedly. If not found within 24 hours, up to half of wandering individuals will suffer serious injury or death.

There are several warning signs that lead to wandering, including forgetting how to get to familiar places or talking about fulfilling former obligations, such as going to work and wanting to 'go home' even when at home.

"Individuals who wander often have a specific intention," said Kathryn Westland, Director of Programs for the Alzheimer's Association California Central Coast Chapter. "They may have a personal need such as going to the bathroom. But if they become disoriented, even in a familiar place, this simple task can become a challenge and may prompt them to leave the house."

While preventative measures cannot guarantee that a person living with dementia won't wander, there are certain tips to help reduce the risk of wandering. Identify the time of day the person is most likely to wander. Plan things to do during this time, including exercise, to help reduce anxiety and restlessness.

Ensure all basic needs are met, including toileting, nutrition and hydration.

Create a daily plan and involve the person in daily activities and chores.

Consider using a GPS device, a tracking app or other technology if the person is still safely driving, or remove access to any car keys if the person is no longer driving.

Avoid busy places like shopping malls and other busy areas, which can be

confusing and cause disorientation.

Assess the person's response to new surroundings and do not leave them, providing reassurance if they feel lost or abandoned.

If a family member does wander and get lost, begin your search immediately. Start by searching the immediate vicinity, including "less-traveled" areas in your home. Outside the home, search the yard and nearby surroundings. Most wanderers are found within a half mile of their homes or starting location.

If, after 15 minutes, the person is not located, call 911 to file a missing person's report. California has implemented a Silver Alert, which is activated when an elderly, developmentally, or cognitively-impaired person has gone missing and is determined to be at-risk.

How Is Alzheimer's diagnosed and treated?

Doctors may ask questions about health, conduct cognitive tests, and carry out standard medical tests to determine whether to diagnose a person with Alzheimer's disease. If a doctor thinks a person may have Alzheimer's, they may refer the person to a specialist, such as a neurologist, for further assessment. Specialists may conduct additional tests, such as brain scans or lab tests of spinal fluid, to help make a diagnosis. These tests measure signs of the disease, such as changes in brain size or levels of certain proteins.

There is currently no cure for Alzheimer's, though there are several medicines approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) that can help manage some symptoms of the disease along with coping strategies to manage behavioral symptoms. In 2021, FDA provided accelerated approval for a new medication, aducanumab, that targets the protein beta-amyloid, which accumulates abnormally in the brains of people with Alzheimer's. The new medication helps to reduce amyloid deposits but has not yet been shown to affect clinical symptoms or outcomes, such as progression of cognitive decline or dementia.

Most medicines work best for people in the early or middle stages of Alzheimer's. Researchers are exploring other drug therapies and nondrug interventions to delay or prevent the disease as well as treat its symptoms.

Alzheimer's disease slowly gets worse over time. People with this disease progress at different rates and in several stages. Symptoms may get worse and then improve, but until an effective treatment for the disease itself is found, the person's ability will continue to decline over the course of the disease.

Early-stage Alzheimer's is when a person begins to experience memory loss and other cognitive difficulties, though

the symptoms appear gradual to the person and their family. Alzheimer's disease is often diagnosed at this stage.

During middle-stage Alzheimer's, damage occurs in areas of the brain that control language, reasoning, sensory processing, and conscious thought. People at this stage may have more confusion and trouble recognizing family and friends.

In late-stage Alzheimer's, a person cannot communicate, is completely dependent on others for care, and may be in bed most or all the time as the body shuts down.

How long a person can live with Alzheimer's disease varies. A person may live as few as three or four years if he or she is older than 80 when diagnosed, to as long as 10 or more years if the person is younger. Older adults with Alzheimer's disease need to know their end-of-life care options and express their wishes to caregivers as early as possible after a diagnosis, before their thinking and speaking abilities fail.

Mild cognitive impairment, or MCI, is a condition in which people have more memory problems than normal for their age but are still able to carry out their normal daily activities. A doctor can do thinking, memory, and language tests to see if a person has MCI. People with MCI are at a greater risk for developing Alzheimer's disease, so it's important to see a doctor or specialist regularly if you have this condition.

If you are concerned about memory problems or other symptoms, call your doctor. If you or someone you know has recently been diagnosed, explore the resources on this website and linked below to find out more about the disease, care, support, and research.

Links found between viruses and neurodegenerative diseases

Neurodegenerative diseases can damage different parts of the nervous system, including the brain. This may lead to problems with thinking, memory, and/or movement. Examples include Alzheimer's disease (AD), multiple sclerosis (MS), and Parkinson's disease (PD). These diseases tend to happen late in life. There are few effective treatments.

Previous findings have suggested that viruses may play a role in certain neurodegenerative diseases. For example, a recent study found a link between Epstein-Barr virus infection and the risk of MS. There are also concerns about cognitive impacts from SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19.

A research team led by Drs. Mike Nalls, Kristin Levine, and Hampton Leonard of NIH's Center for Alzheimer's and Related Dementias examined links between viruses and neurodegenerative diseases more generally. To do so, they analyzed data from the FinnGen project. This is a repository of biomedical data, or biobank, from more than 300,000 people in Finland.

The team searched the biobank for people who had been diagnosed with one of six different conditions: AD, amyotrophic lateral sclerosis, generalized dementia, vascular dementia, PD, and MS. They then

checked how many had been hospitalized for a viral illness before. To confirm their findings, they looked for the same associations in the UK Biobank, which contains data from almost 500,000 people in the United Kingdom. Results appeared in Neuron on Jan. 19, 2023.

The researchers found 45 associations between viruses and neurodegenerative diseases in FinnGen. Of these, 22 also appeared in the UK Biobank. The strongest association was between viral encephalitis — brain inflammation caused by a virus — and AD. A person with viral encephalitis in the FinnGen database was 30 times as likely to be diagnosed with AD as someone without encephalitis. Results were similar in the UK Biobank; people with viral encephalitis were 22 times as likely to develop AD as those without.

The team also found, in FinnGen, the association between Epstein-Barr virus and MS that was described before. The association wasn't seen in the UK Biobank, but this may reflect how the different biobanks use hospital diagnostic codes; Epstein-Barr viruses are common and so often not noted.

Influenza with pneumonia was associated with all the neurodegenerative diseases except MS. The researchers only included cases of influenza severe enough to need hospitalization in the study. Thus, these associations only apply to the most severe cases of influenza.

FinnGen contains data on the same people over time. The team used this to examine how the associations depended on the time since infection. They found that some viral infections were associated with increased risk of neurodegenerative disease as much as 15 years later.

The researchers note that vaccines exist for some of the viruses they identified. These

include influenza, varicella zoster (which causes chickenpox and shingles), and certain pneumonia-causing viruses. Vaccination might thus reduce some of the risk of the conditions they examined.

Ventura's outrigger canoe team hosted the Ventura Challenge

Outrigger canoe boats are various watercraft featuring one or more lateral support floats known as outriggers, which are fastened to one or both sides of the main hull. They can range from small dugout canoes to large plank-built vessels.

An outrigger has a narrow, long and sturdy frame made from buoyant material which is attached to the side of the boat to give it extra stability. They are commonly seen on racing boats and other high-performance vessels,

Ventura's outrigger canoe team, also known as Hokuloa, hosted the Ventura Challenge race on Saturday, May 10th launching out of Harbor Cove Beach. Many of the outrigger canoes and their teams came from as far away as San Diego, Dana Point, Long Beach, Newport Beach, Marina Del Rey, Santa Barbara, Avala Beach and San Luis Obispo County and other cities from Southern California.

Four or five clubs from Arizona and Las Vegas area also participated in the race.



The Secret **Behind Your Pet's Symptoms** by E'Lise Christensen **DVM DACVB** and Amanda Modes DVM, Behavior Resident

Determining the cause of animal behavioral disorders can be a puzzle. Problem behaviors aren't just about emotions, past learning history, genetics, and the outside environment, but also physical health. Of course, some behaviors people dislike are normal for that species. But when behaviors are outside the normal range, veterinary behavior teams jump in. We spend our days unraveling these different components to provide the best medical and mental health support for animals who are suffering.

Animals are stellar at keeping medical problems under wraps. This means a lot of people don't realize, and sometimes don't believe, that their pet's health may be impacting their behavior.

Problems affecting nearly every bodily system can lead to a wide variety of behavior issues for any species. If your cat stops using the litter box, it could have a urinary tract infection, diabetes, or knee pain. A dog that runs away when the leash comes out could be scared, but might also have an infected tooth, neck pain, or a skin rash. We all know nausea can lead to drooling, changes in appetite, and vomiting. But did you know that it can also be the cause of floor licking, tiredness, pacing, yawning, avoidance of food bowls, and even pica (eating non-food items like fabric, rocks, or even glass)? Just like people, animals can be nauseated and not vomit. Pain can be a significant, but often overlooked, component to unwanted behavior. Unless your dog is Dug—"the talking dog" from the movie Up-they may not be showing you how much pain they are experiencing, and they may not even react as we would expect on a veterinarian's physical exam.

If your pet is exhibiting behaviors that are atypical for them, or affecting their quality of life, your first visit should be to your regular veterinarian for a medical evaluation. This includes a complete review of your pet's medical history, a full physical examination when possible (even a hands-off exam can be very informative), and any recommended diagnostic tests. Only once medical causes have been ruled out can we be satisfied that a behavioral condition is solely responsible for the pet's symptoms.

Whether your pet's behavioral changes are due to a physical cause, their feelings/emotions, or both, there are typically many treatment options. These may include behavioral modification (training), avoidance of triggering situations, lifestyle changes, supplements, diet change, and/or medications. Many general-practice veterinarians can help you get this process started. If you find your pet needs additional help, a veterinary behaviorist is your next step. Either way, taking the time to work-up and treat any physical and behavioral conditions will make your life with your pet better.

When cats get together it can be difficult to tell rough and tumble play from a full-blown scrap. Now researchers say they have decoded feline behavior to

help owners spot when the fur might be about to fly.

Dr Noema Gajdoš-Kmecová, first author of the research from the University of Veterinary Medicine and Pharmacy, in Košice, Slovakia a cat owner herself said understanding feline interactions could be difficult.

"Many owners are asking themselves the question, are these cats playing, fighting? Or what's going on actually? We found out that there was actually very little scientific evidence to guide us in answering this question so we decided to go for it and study inter-cat interactions," she said.

Writing in the journal Scientific Reports, Gajdoš-Kmecová, and colleagues, describe how they examined the behavior of 105 pairs of interacting domestic cats recorded on videos collected from YouTube. They also advertised for cat owners.

The researchers randomly selected 30% of the videos and analyzed the cats' actions to produce six behavioral categories, including wrestling, chasing, vocalizations, and motionless postures such as crouching. Each of the cats in the full sample were then assessed for these categories.

When the team looked at the frequency and duration of each of these six behavioral categories for the different cats they found they fell into three clusters.

Experts within the team then reviewed all 105 videos of 210 cats, labelling each interaction as either playful, agonistic, or intermediate.

The team discovered that the three clusters of behavior found in the initial analysis overlapped with the categorization of the interactions made by the experts, suggesting certain patterns or types of feline behavior could indicate whether cats were having a playful interaction or a scrap.

"When cats are young and when they are wrestling and not vocalizing they are most likely playing," the team write. But when there are extended inactive pauses, vocalizations and chasing, the cats may be in the midst of a fight.

Intermediate behavior, the authors write, was associated with prolonged interactivity and included features associated with both playful interactions, such as lying belly up or pouncing, as well as aggressive behaviors, such as arching the back, and retreating.

However, Gajdoš-Kmecová said even wrestling could occur in a positive and a negative context, so it was important to look at the overall pattern of behaviors and whether they were shown by both cats. For example, if claws and yowling were involved, a wrestle was unlikely to be a sign of play; and play was also unlikely if only one cat was attempting to engage in wrestling.

Gajdoš-Kmecová said it was important to be aware that a playful interaction could switch into an intermediate or combative situation. "It's very, very, dynamic," she said. "When cats are getting noisy and are avoiding physical contact by [for example] making an inactive breaks during interactions, the situation might be changing to be agonistic."

Gajdoš-Kmecová added that the study showed feline interactions were not always a binary choice between playing and fighting, but that their behaviors could give helpful clues. "Maybe ask yourself are they playing, fighting, or is it something in between."



Recently the Ventura Botanical Gardens announced the installation of a new specialized viewer for colorblind visitors and also new specialized glasses available to borrow. The installation of a specialized scope viewer allows color-blind visitors to see the true colors of the gardens. The viewer is installed at the Mereweather site in the Chilean Gardens.

Often color-blind garden visitors cannot see the vibrant reds, yellows and oranges in flowering plants that are on display. This newly installed special viewer allows color-blind individuals to see the vibrant colors that non-colorblind individuals see. Color-blind visitors now can borrow a limited number of special glasses at the Merriweather Welcome Center and experience the true colors of the gardens for the first time in their lives

Five color-blind visitors gathered on a Tuesday morning to try out the special glasses that would help them see the rich colors of the garden they have never seen before. They were given the glasses to take home and use for personal use. The visitors for this demonstration were Trent Barnhart, Joshua Goodman, Jeanette Licea, Tom Raetan and Matthew Serrano. The group was aged from 9 to 70 years old, and when they tried out the glasses all were amazed at the newly distinguishable colors of the flowering plants. "The poppies really stand out," said Serrano

Jeanette Licea 9, of Oxnard was amazed trying on the glasses and "I love them," she excitedly gushed out seeing color clearly for the first time. "I like not having to ask my friends what color something is."

Joshua Goodman, 47 of Ventura excitedly walked around the grounds putting the glasses on and off amazed at the difference. He talked about the difficulties of dressing and noted he has always dressed in neutral tones to avoid

color matching mistakes. Goodman added that color coding "is the worst for me," Originally a professional in high tech where everything is color coded, he added "And people really like to color code things'" Currently Goodman is a voice actor, where his color blindness is not an issue.

The glasses were designed and distributed by EnChroma, the company that invented the glasses. The company offers an accessibility program for museums, gardens and similar institutions that provides a matching pair of glasses for each one purchased by the organization. The glasses are able to help most people who are color-blind see a

greater range of color, which gives them the ability to see sharply, with a greater range of color, and the ability to make what was always a dull landscape pop out, according to EnChroma.

Barbara Brown, a spokesperson for the Botanical Gardens said all the participants get to keep the glasses they tried as a thank you for participating in the demonstration.

The gardens have two pairs of glasses available for visitors use and expects to have more shortly. The garden now has the scope previously mentioned about halfway up the trail that is adjusted for color-blindness Brown added.

EPIC Leadership Center, a non-profit organization, is starting its Summer Program in Westview Village, Ventura.



A View from House Seats

Elite Offers Delicious Food for Thought

Theories of connectedness are explored in Elite's current stage offering of "Six Degrees of Separation", a complex play by John Guare. Nominated for both a Pulitzer Prize and a Tony for Best Play, Six Degrees tackles class discrimination, relationships, honesty, desires, self-awareness, facades and much more.

The play is unusual in several ways. The actors frequently address the audience, involving them in the action not just as observers, but ultimately as partners in the deceptions being portrayed.

Skillfully directed by Brian Robert Harris, the tightly choreographed action centers around Ouisa and Flan Kittredge (Aileen-Marie Scott and Bill Walthall), a couple flirting with high society as art dealers while barely maintaining their own tenuous social position. Entertaining a potential investor (John Medeiros), their evening is abruptly disturbed by the appearance of Paul (Remy Muloway), a young man who professes to have been mugged and to know their children from college. A smooth conversationalist, Paul impresses them all with his detailed story of being Sidney Poitier's son which rapidly envelopes the Kittredges, causing them to offer their home as temporary respite.

Paul takes advantage of the situation and is asked to leave. Soon he meets a young couple (Stephanie Blaze Bates and Christopher Robin Rubin) just relocated to New York from Utah and repeats a version of his story to gain entrance to their lives ultimately causing destruction. The Kittredges learn that another couple in their circle has also been led astray by Paul, now recognized as a manipulative con man.

Presented with no intermission, the circles become intense as all the affected people realize how easily their trust was compromised and how connected they became because of this man. Despite Flan's protests, Ouisa is unable to resist attempting to assist Paul, whom she sees as a fellow victim of a tenuous grasp on reality.

The complexity of the play was, at times, a challenge for me to follow. However, I found each character to be so interesting in themselves, how they merged and withdrew to the situation, and the ways in which they were connected that I was nonetheless fully engaged throughout. Several actors, including Amber Shea Hodge and Will Palo take on several personas to fill out the action. All were excellent in their portrayals.

This mind-stretching production deserves full houses. Employing a minimal setting and involving the audience fully allows the actors to tell the story, which reminds us that we are all susceptible to being conned, as we continually con ourselves into certain ways of thinking or perceiving others. This is a deep work presented with a twinkle in the eye and a nod to our need for acceptance and truth, despite our surface misgivings.

The play continues through July 2 with Friday and Saturday performances at 8 p.m. and Sundays at 2 p.m. with one special Thursday evening performance on June 29. www.theelite.org,





