Zarazua succeeds Nancy O'Connor, who retired in September after serving as Parks & Recreation Director since 2016. Zarazua will oversee the department's day-to-day operations while the City conducts recruitment efforts to fill the

"Stacey has a wealth of knowledge and experience within our Parks & Recreation Department. Over the course of her more than 20-year career with Ventura, she has served in many

roles within the department," said City Manager Bill Ayub. "She has a deep understanding of the department's inner workings at every level and can seamlessly provide critical support to various work groups during this time of transition."

Zarazua joined the Parks & Recreation Department in 2001 as a Recreation Coordinator in the Youth Sports section, where she was promoted to an Aquatics Supervisor in 2005. She has held multiple leadership roles within the department, serving in all three department divisions, including recreation, parks, and community partnerships.

Zarazua holds a bachelor's degree in liberal studies and a master's degree in public administration from California State University Northridge.

"I'm thrilled to take on this role and lead our incredible team of staff members, many of whom I've had the privilege of working alongside for years," said Zarazua. "My aim is to ensure that our city staff has the support and resources they require to continue delivering high-quality programming and services to our community. After all, parks make life better."

Annually, the Parks & Recreation Department presents an extensive array of more than 1,000 recreation programs catering to all age groups. It oversees the maintenance of roughly 800 acres of parkland and open space, encompassing three community centers, three historical sites, an aquatic center, a sailing center, two beaches, and two golf courses.

Ventura receives \$32 Million from the State of California for an innovative housing project

In a groundbreaking announcement on Tuesday, October 10, 2023, Governor Gavin Newsom unveiled a historic \$32,076,607 grant for Ventura during the third round of Project Homekey funding. This substantial allocation is earmarked for the Housing Authority of the City of San Buenaventura (HACSB), in partnership with the County of Ventura, to facilitate the transformation of a hotel into a permanent supportive housing facility.

"This is the largest Homekey award in the history of both our City and County and will substantially impact our community," said Ventura Mayor Joe Schroeder. "The City Council is committed to addressing our housing crisis while prioritizing the well-being and future of our residents. This achievement marks a significant stride in our continuous efforts to combat the homelessness crisis that our community faces."

The \$32 million Project Homekey grant is earmarked for acquiring and renovating La Quinta Inn at 5818 Valentine Road in Ventura, strategically situated near public transit, grocery stores, healthcare facilities, and recreational amenities. This funding, granted

The fairgrounds board of directors ted (in a 7-2 vote) to adopt cannabis event guidelines from the California Department of Food & Agriculture (owners of the grounds). They expressed their intent of drafting a policy detailing what could and couldn't take place at gatherings.

The action was designed to allow negotiations to proceed for a wellknown trade show, Hall of Flowers, that has expressed interest in coming to the fairgrounds for an event next year. Staff members said the show could generate more than \$50,000 of revenue and noted other cannabis groups have expressed interest in holding events at the fairgrounds.

If they can have gun shows there, they could certainly have these events. Which is more dangerous?

The Beat Goes On

"The recent noise being caused by conductor casing installation, is essentially pile driving at 3 beats per second. It is admittedly very loud, but it is as the City had expected and the sound wall is mitigating the situation significantly. This step is absolutely necessary for the drilling process and is currently about 1/3 completed. The loud noise should continue intermittently over the next two weeks". Steve Mimiaga, Project Manager for City's Construction Management team

One of the most important pieces of heavy equipment being used on this project are diesel motor driven air compressors to facilitate the conductor casing installation. Compressed air is vital and is being used in the construction of the VenturaWaterPure Outfall Project. "The City has been preparing for the use of this type of equipment for the project for well over a year" said Steve Mimiaga. Two sound studies have been undertaken by the City. And this particular piece of equipment is necessary to get those steel casing pipes diagonally into the ground. The project success is dependent on this process being done correctly.


The next steps of the project, the actual horizontal directional drilling (HDD), should not cause noise anywhere near this level. The HDD process requires multiple diesel motors running simultaneously for each of the three HDD headings: (1) from Marina Park toward the Harbor side, (2) from the Harbor side toward Marina Park, (3) from Marina Park to offshore. Each of the three HDD headings need multiple motors running for the drill rigs, drilling fluid mixing and pumping systems, drilling fluid recovery systems, and motors for heavy

equipment moving heavy components around the site, like the hundreds of steel drill stem segments needed to advance the drill tips. The sound wall is expected to significantly mitigate these noises that will only occur between 7 am and 5 pm Monday through Saturday for the next few months. Again this part of the process is not expected to cause excessive noise impacts to the neighborhood.

During the next two weeks the compressor driven conductor casing noise will be intermittent as the crews need to stop every ten minutes or so to make adjustments and to make sure the pipes are going in the correct position. The noise will be intermittent over 3 to 5 days per heading depending on how well things go.

Steve and his team have been working long hours over the past weeks to prepare for and address community concerns. Noise levels are monitored by decibel meters and recorded on a daily basis throughout the project zone. Vibration sensors are installed throughout the neighborhoods on both sides of the Harbor crossing and recording data 24/7. Steve's team monitor these sensors which will provide text message and email notifications if any alarm set points are exceeded. Steve reported that none of the Marina Park area sensors have alarmed so far in the process.

This project is very complicated with many intricate engineering and construction details to consider for every step. Steve explained that there are many-many critical activities that must be done a certain way and there is little wiggle room for mistakes. Steve notes that the City and the entire construction team are very appreciative of the patience and understanding from the public





Expanding The Game: Pierpont Racquet Club Adds more Pickleball Courts

Pierpont Racquet Club (PRC) is making headlines as it meets the ever-growing demand for pickleball, the fastest-growing sport in the United States. With three new courts, PRC now boasts a total of 8 courts for its members to enjoy, with 5 of them equipped with

lighting for night play. The club offers a diverse court setup, including 5 hard courts and 3 all-weather courts designed for safe play even in wet conditions.

Founded in January 1977 as a private membership club, PRC initially opened its doors for tennis enthusiasts. Later that same year, the Clubhouse was introduced. Today, PRC has expanded its offerings to include 9 tennis courts and 8 pickleball courts, complemented by two swimming pools and comprehensive fitness facilities.

nation can quickly start playing, with experienced players always ready to help newcomers navigate the sport's nuances, including terms like "the kitchen" and scoring. 

World-Renowned Voyaging Canoe Hokulea heads to Southern California

Legendary Hawaiian canoe Hokulea, revered for reviving the lost art of Polynesian voyaging and navigation, is currently docked in the picturesque coastal city of Monterey, California. The traditional double-hulled canoe has been sailing from Southeast Alaska down the Pacific Coast since June, 2023, when the Polynesian Voyaging Society (PVS) launched the Moananuiākea Voyage and began its four-year circumnavigation of the Pacific. Hokulea is set to make several stops in Southern California as part of this historic journey including Ventura, Marina Del Rey, Newport, Dana Point, and San Diego.

The last time Hokulea sailed down the coast of California was 28 years ago in 1995. From October 18-22 it will dock at the Ventura Yacht Club where it can be viewed.

The Moananuiākea Voyage will cover


an estimated 43,000 nautical miles, 36 countries and archipelagoes, nearly 100 indigenous territories and more than 300 ports. Led by the Polynesian Voyaging Society (PVS), the Voyage is a global educational campaign that will amplify the vital importance of oceans and indigenous knowledge through port engagements, education and storytelling. The goal of the voyage is to ignite a movement of 10 million "planetary navigators" by developing young leaders and engaging communities around the world to take part in navigating earth towards a healthy, thriving future.

Ventura Police host "Coffee with a Cop" at Simone's Coffee and Tea

Ventura police held a Coffee with a Cop event on Wednesday October 4, 2023, from 8:00 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. Community members were invited to meet with Ventura Police officers and professional staff to share a coffee and get to know local Ventura officers in a calm social environment. It is common for Ventura residents to perceive officers as unapproachable and detached in high stress situations. Having coffee with a cop strives to break down the barriers between officers and the public. The Coffee with a Cop program affords attendees a relaxed one-on-one interaction with Ventura police chief and the officers who patrol Ventura neighborhoods, businesses, and industrial areas of the city.

"We do this a couple of times a month we pick a different coffee shop in town we try to get to the east end the west end and the middle of the town" Chief Darin Schindler said. The event gave citizens an opportunity to ask questions, discuss concerns or just have a chat with a cop." We have been holding these events for at least five years now and we intend to keep this outreach program indefinitely", added Schindler.

An attendee Kevin Drescher "I knew the officers were going to be here I am actually on the Ventura Community Police Foundation Board, so I knew about it, and I am huge supporter of the police department and I think it is a great way for the community to come out and meet the great staff at the police department."



"In an increasingly complex world, building connections with our community takes an unprecedented importance," said Chief Shindler "Our goal is always to cultivate familiarity among residents and local businesses, increase trust in our officers, and share essential crime prevention and safety information," he added.

Some residents were surprised coming in for their morning coffee and being surrounded by Ventura police officers. Most appreciated the opportunity to speak with officers on so casual a basis.

Almost no police resources were used at this event. Attending police officers were already on duty and encouraged to just drop by and have a cup of coffee before returning to their regular patrols.

Housing Trust Fund Ventura County announces approval of a \$1.5 million acquisition loan

(Housing Trust Fund VC) announces the approval of a \$1,500,000 predevelopment loan to help fund College Community Courts, a People's Self-Help Housing Corporation (PSHHC) affordable housing development in Ventura. With construction set to begin in late 2024, the new multi-family housing community will provide 57 affordable units for farmworkers and their families.

College Community Courts will provide 15 one-bedroom, 27 two-bedroom and 15 three-bedroom units for a total of 57 new, affordable apartment homes, housed within five contemporary two-story buildings that harmonize with the modern aesthetic of the neighborhood. Residents will include our community's essential farmworkers and their families, as well as working class individuals and families earning between 30% and 60% of Ventura County's Area Median Income (AMI). Several resident-serving amenities have been integrated into the property including a large community room, computer lab, children's space, management offices, and outdoor courtyards that feature comfortable seating, children's play structures, and barbeque areas. One distinctive feature of the College Community Courts property is the design of the primary entrances, which lead into these inviting courtyards, outdoor patios, and balconies along the main building fronts. This layout fosters a sense of community and offers ample opportunities for residents to build neighborly relationships.

"57 new units are 57 safe and comfortable homes for individuals and families who won't have to worry about where they will end each day," commented Linda Braunschweiger, CEO of Housing Trust Fund Ventura County, "We are confident that this development from People's Self-Help Housing will bring much-needed stability our hard-working neighbors are searching for."

Through their Supportive Housing Program (SHP), PSHHC has provided direct resident services for two decades. The SHP is a social services program offered to residents completely free, with social service professionals providing coordi-

Housing Trust Fund Ventura County nation of on-site group activities and services to influence positive support for residents. Other assistance for more complex issues that may affect stability and housing for individuals and families are also offered by the SHP.

> In its 2021-2029 Housing Element Update, the City of Ventura quantified its specific housing objectives to be 1,187 newly constructed units for extremely low- and very-low-income households and 865 units for low-income individuals and families. The completion of these 57 permanently affordable rental units for households within the 30-60% of Area Median Income range will directly contribute to addressing this need.

> Housing Trust Fund Ventura County - Launched as a 501c3 nonprofit corporation in 2011, Housing Trust Fund VC is the local trusted leader in helping to increase affordable housing options throughout Ventura County by leveraging public-private partnerships to provide low-cost, flexible loans early in the housing development cycle. As of October 2023, Housing Trust Fund VC has committed to investing \$27.8 million through its Revolving Loan Fund, creating 1,177 affordable apartments and homes for very-low, low- and middle-income employees, transitional age foster youth, veterans, farm workers, and the homeless.





Bringing Memory and Strength to Seniors

When I started to volunteer at the the first thing I noticed was that the home didn't have music. I began organizing a music program there. Research has found that globally aging senior citizens have lost social interaction and mental acuity, especially during the COVID-19 Pandemic. Research has also shown that music is a way that can help cure dementia, depression, and memory. According to Pfizer, today instead of giving patients medication to cure memory loss or depression, many physicians are having people listen to music (Fink, 2023). This made me become more invested in learning more about how social interaction and music can help improve memory and cognitive skills. According to the Arc, "When used appropriately, music can shift mood, manage stress-induced agitation, stimulate positive interactions, facilitate cognitive function and coordinate motor movements" (The Arc, 2019).

With music being a big part of my life, I knew I would apply it towards my Gold Award for Girl Scouts. My Gold Award aims to improve loneliness and mental acuity in senior citizens by bringing music and physical exercises to assisted living homes. I created the curriculum and led the classes. I remember the first time hosting a class, the seniors wouldn't come. The recreation director and I would knock on each door to encourage them to participate and celebrated when four residents joined us in that first class. Today classes have 15-20 senior participants.

When evaluating the survey that I had the seniors complete, nine out of the ten respondents said that they recalled memories while listening to music and felt better after doing physical exercises. I continue to develop this program Lexington Assisted Living senior home, through the Ventura High School Music Department as I have passed it down to two girls who will be taking over the program when I graduate. I know that my program has not only made an impact on the seniors but also on the music department as we all have shared so many memories playing and talking with the seniors. This program has shown how the use of music is a benefit for everyone.

VCAAA's HICAP available to help with Medicare open enrollment

With the Medicare Open Enrollment period about to begin, the Health Insurance Counseling and Advocacy Program (HICAP) - part of the Ventura County Area Agency on Aging, a division of the Human Services Agency - will again be providing countywide resources and help.

Medicare Open Enrollment begins on October 15 and runs through December 7. HICAP provides free, unbiased Medicare counseling to the public.

In October, November, and December, HICAP counselors -- who are registered with the California Department of Aging -- will be all around the county, hosting 37 One-Stops to provide individual counseling sessions, as well as 13 "2024 Medicare Changes" presentations.

Sites for these various events include Ventura (the VCAAA office), Camarillo (Camarillo Health Care District, Pleasant Valley Senior Center), Fillmore (Active Adult Center), Moorpark (Active Adult Center), Ojai (HELP of Ojai), Oxnard (Colonia Senior Center, Palm Vista Senior Center, South Oxnard Senior Center, Wilson Senior Center), Santa Paula (Senior Center), Simi Valley (Senior Center) and Thousand Oaks (CRPD Conejo Creek Community Building, Goebel Adult Community Center).

Heart attacks may be linked to accelerated cognitive decline over time

Individuals who have one or more heart attacks in their lifetime may experience faster long-term cognitive decline, according to an NIA-funded study. Heart attacks were not associated with cognitive decline immediately following the event. The findings, published in JAMA Neurology, suggest that heart attacks are an important risk factor for cognitive decline, even after someone has recovered from the heart attack itself.

Participants who had a heart attack generally did not have any change in cognitive function at the time of the event. However, in the years that followed, they had faster rates of cognitive decline than those who had never had a heart attack.

These results add to a growing amount of evidence pointing toward a link between heart and brain health.

Estimates vary, but experts suggest that more than 6 million Americans, most of them age 65 or older, may have dementia caused by Alzheimer's.

Alzheimer's disease is currently ranked as the seventh leading cause of death in the United States and is the most common cause of dementia among older adults.

Dementia is the loss of cognitive functioning - thinking, remembering, and reasoning – and behavioral abilities to such an extent that it interferes with a person's daily life and activities. Dementia ranges in severity from the mildest stage, when it is just beginning to affect a person's functioning, to the most severe stage, when the person must depend completely on others for help with basic activities of daily living.

The causes of dementia can vary, depending on the types of brain changes that may be taking place. Other dementias include Lewy body dementia, frontotemporal disorders, and vascular dementia. It is common for people to have mixed dementia — a combination of two or more types of dementia. For example, some people have both Alzheimer's disease and vascular dementia.

Alzheimer's disease is named after Dr. Alois Alzheimer. In 1906, Dr. Alzheimer noticed changes in the brain tissue of a woman who had died of an unusual mental illness. Her symptoms included memory loss, language problems, and unpredictable behavior. After she died, he examined her brain and found many abnormal clumps (now called amyloid plaques) and tangled bundles of fibers (now called neurofibrillary, or tau, tangles).

These plaques and tangles in the brain are still considered some of the main features of Alzheimer's disease. Another feature is the loss of connections between neurons in the brain. Neurons transmit messages between different parts of the brain, and from the brain to muscles and organs in the body.

Just down from the old Mission San Buenaventura, at the end of Mission Plaza (formerly Figueroa Street) stands six naked flagpoles, There are three flag poles with the California State Flag, the City Flag and the Stars and Stripes--but no others.

What are the six empty flag poles and why were they put up in the first place? They were set up when the city was all spruced up for the Bi-centennial back in 1976. The six flag poles were to fly the flags that flew over our city over the years. The Spanish flag flown by Juan R. Cabrillo when he sighted the location of the city in 1542, The Spanish Flag flown when Fr. Serra established the mission in 1782 (it was different from the early flag) The flag of the Mexican Republic (slightly different than the one they use today), The flag of John C. Fremont when he captured the city in 1847 the original Bear flag and the 31 star flag when California joined the Union in 1850.

These were flown for many years but wind and sun took their toll on the banners and soon they were worn and needed to be replaced. They proved to be expensive but funds were found to buy a new set. They were flown but suffered in the tragedy of 9-11. Following the fall of the Twin Towers in New York all flags were to be flown at half mast. A city worker didn't know if this rule applied to historic flags and

left them at full staff. The public Flags should not left them at full staff. The public was emotional after what happened in the New York attack and wrote angry letters to the newspapers and city councilmen. The flags were lowered but after that they were not replaced and the poles have been empty since then.

Even with all of them flying, they forgot a historic flag that only flew over Ventura in March of 1838--at the Battle of San Buenaventura, a skirmish fought in a brief civil war when California was part of Mexico. Governor Alvarado toyed with the idea of making California an independent nation, separate from Mexico, then in a confused political state. faction captured Santa Barbara and, in the style of that community, they threw a fiesta inviting the governor to attend. A bit in his cups, he had a simple Mexican flag brought (one without the eagle and serpent) and he took black paint and carefully wrote: "Independencia de California" across the banner--the flag of a free California Nation! He wanted the father at Mission Santa Barbara to bless the flag. When the padre saw this he knew this would mean war with Mexico City and refused. The flag was flown as the forces loyal to Alvarado marched south and took Ventura. Later a sober Alvarado made peace with Mexico City and he vowed to keep the territory of California under the Mexican Tricolor. The flag made in Santa Barbara is lost now but, it represented a historic event that would presage the Bear Flag Revolt of 1846. Maybe that flag should be flown over our community today?

Protect pets from Halloween hazards.

You may love Halloween tricks and treats, but your furry friend most likely needs extra oversight during the celebration.

Dr. Canaan Shores, a veterinarian at the University of Illinois Veterinary Teaching Hospital, sees dogs and cats through the hospital's urgent and convenient care service at its Veterinary Medicine South Clinic, 2100 S. Goodwin, Urbana. He answers questions pet owners may have about how to prevent or respond to close encounters of the scary kind.

What are the most common Halloween hazards you see?

"Ingestion of several types of candy can definitely pose a hazard to pets," says Dr. Shores. "The most common would be exposure to chocolate, which can cause neurologic signs, cardiac signs, or gastrointestinal signs, based on the type of chocolate and amount ingested.

"In general, the darker the chocolate, the more toxic. Cocoa powder and baking chocolate are the most toxic.

"Other candy-related concerns include xylitol, a sweetener found in some 'sugar-free' candy products, and excessive fat intake, especially from eating large amounts of chocolate.

"The final type of toxicity worth mentioning is raisin ingestion, which can cause severe kidney disease."

What is a common Halloween hazard that is not candy?

"A big concern associated with Halloween is behavioral problems with pets," he says. "With strangers—and bizarrely dressed strangers at that!—frequently coming to the door, there is an increased risk of bites and scratches. There is also the risk of pets escaping from a home and running away."

How can owners best protect their animals from these hazards?

"You can minimize pets' exposure to candy by keeping the candies in a sealed container out of reach of the pet. Because of the various toxicity risks, it's best to avoid offering any type of candy to pets. Instead treat your pet to a product made for dogs or cats.

"To prevent some of the behavioral hazards, I advise limiting a pet's exposure to strangers and frequently opened doors," continues Dr. Shores. "Keep your pet in a different part of the house, behind closed doors.

How does the most common hazard wreak havoc on our dogs?

"At high doses, chocolate can cause disease of the nervous system, such as seizures. At lower doses, the cardiovascular system can be affected, leading to a very high heart rate and/or blood pressure," explains Dr. Shores.

National Pet Wellness Month is the perfect time to provide our pets with the attention they require, including scheduling their annual veterinarian visit. Most of us have adopted them as members of our family, and it's only natural we treat them as we would our human relatives.

Just like humans need vaccines,

dental care, bloodwork, and regular checkups with their doctors, our pets need veterinary wellness visits every six months to a year.

Your pet's veterinarian is trained to detect the subtle clues that can indicate a problem or illness, like changes in breathing, heart rate and vision, and even minor swellings. These clues could be signs of something more serious or life-threatening, and it's always better to take a preventative approach with your veterinarian who knows your pet's health history.

The wellness visit is also important to make sure your pet is up to date on their vaccines, especially for rabies protection, and infectious bacterial diseases like leptospirosis and those that cause respiratory infections.

According to the Association for Pet Obesity Prevention, 56% of dogs are considered overweight or obese. With extra weight comes several health problems and concerns that can shorten a dog's life.

The Association states that overweight dogs are more likely to suffer from arthritis, kidney disease, liver disease, diabetes, heart failure, high blood pressure, and cancer.

How can you prevent your dog from gaining weight or being overweight? Surgical Veterinarian and Mobile Veterinary Surgical Services Owner, Jennifer Hoch, said first check on your pet by feeling their ribs.

She said you should feel an hourglass shape and while you don't want the ribs poking out, you should be able to feel the ribs.

If you can't feel the ribs, your dog might be overweight. She said it's best to check with your vet.

Either way, Hoch said there are two things you need to be attentive to, your pets' activity level and food consumption.

"If you have a pet that's getting regular activity, then that's not just going to make their body healthy, but it also stimulates their mind and it will also improve their behavior at home," said Hoch. "They are going to be less destructive and they're going to be engaged in other things, so it makes them a better well-rounded pet at home."

Hoch said she does surgery on pets every day, many of which are ACL repairs, and a majority of the surgeries are from the overuse of muscles or overweight pets.

She said regular, low-impact exercises, like leash walking, swimming, playing fetch, or going to the park will do. The fresh air will do you and your pet some good.

She said active play like throwing a ball, stick, or frisbee for your pet to retrieve is a great way to get them moving.

Hoch said don't wait all week to get them moving and then over-do-it on the weekends with a big hike or long walk.

Adding in walks and playtime during the week will help them be ready for big hikes and long walks on the weekends. She said if they are not used to being active, they can over-exert themselves, which can cause injuries.

If you do take them out for a

bigger exercise event, Hoch said to be sure and keep an eye on them as they are working out. If they want to stop, lay down, or are slowing down or limping, it's time to wrap up the exercise.

"Some people don't have the availability maybe with their schedule, or have physical limitations, to take

their pets out, so there are also other ideas like rehab facilities, underwater treadmills and there are actually people in town that have mobile dog gyms that they can come to you and exercise their pets in air condition for you," she said. "There are lots of different things that should fit anyone's lifestyle."

On October 8, at approximately 4:00 pm, the Ventura Police Command Center received several calls about a pregnant female vagrant waving a knife in the area of California St. and Santa Clara Street. As officers responded, the female fled the area, followed by a park ambassador.

Officers stopped the female a few

blocks away and she was identified as 33-year-old vagrant Rebecca Ross. The investigation revealed Ross picked up a knife from an outside table at a restaurant near Main St. and California Street. Ross began throwing the knife in the air near restaurant patrons. Fearing for their safety, a patron confronted Ross, and Ross brandished the knife at the patron. Ross fled from the area and was detained by officers. No one was injured during this incident.

Ross was taken to the Ventura County Medical Center to be medically cleared before being booked at the Ventura County Jail for Brandishing a Weapon and Criminal Threats.

Commercial Burglary and Vandalism

On October 9, at approximately 4:15 am, the Ventura Police Department Communications Center received a 9-1-1 call from a security guard indicating there was possibly a burglary in progress at a business in the 700 block of East Main Street. Ventura Police Department patrol officers responded to the location and found that an unknown suspect had forced entry into the business by breaking through the front door. Officers checked the business, but the suspect had already fled.

On the same date, at approximately 5:30 am, The Ventura Police Department Communications Center received another call regarding vandalism and a possible burglary in progress at the Sommerset apartments at 540 East Santa Clara Street. The reporting person stated that the suspect broke the glass front door and was trying to open doors inside the apartment building. Patrol officers responded to that location and found the suspect (later identified as 57-yearold vagrant John Ramirez) outside of the apartment complex. Officers found that the suspect was in possession of property taken from the earlier burglary on East Main Street. Officers also determined that Ramirez had broken the front door to the apartment complex and forced entry. It appears he made it into the common area of the complex but did not enter any apartments.

Ramirez was placed under arrest and transported to the Ventura County Jail where he was booked for commercial burglary and felony vandalism.

An internet search revealed that Ramirez was booked for felony vandalism by the Oxnard Police Department on August 21, 2023. He was released on his own recognizance on October 5, 2023.

Felony Evading, Felony Hit & Run, Possession of Narcotics and Paraphernalia Arrest

On Oct. 15, at 2:53 pm, officers pa-

trolling the area of Valentine St. and Portola Rd. attempted to conduct a traffic stop of a motorcycle for a traffic violation. The motorcycle rider who had a rear passenger, failed to yield to the officer's emergency lights and siren and a pursuit was initiated. During the pursuit the motorcyclist, later identified as Brendan Clinch, he drove recklessly while endangering others on the roadway. Clinch eventually entered the SR 101 southbound onramp from Valentine Rd. where he encountered heavy traffic and proceeded to ride at a high rate of speed on the shoulder portion of the freeway. Due to the inherent danger caused by Clinch's behavior, officers cancelled their pursuit.

A short time later, the Ventura Police Communications Center received numerous 911 calls of a multiple vehicle collision involving a motorcycle on the southbound 101 freeway just south of the Victoria Ave. onramp. Officers arrived on scene and discovered Clinch and his passenger fleeing the scene but were apprehended. Both Clinch and his passenger were transported to the Ventura County Medical Center via ambulance for treatment of their injuries. Clinch was arrested for possession of narcotics, possession of narcotic paraphernalia, felony evading, and felony hit and run and later booked at the Ventura County Jail.

Cirith Ungol will be winding down their careers on a high note this next year

Ventura is full of musicians who live and breath music. It's one of the reasons I love this town so much. One of those bands is Cirith Ungol whose history sounds like a rock opera, and if I didn't know Robert Garven (drummer) personally, I would have laid money that their story was pure fiction.

From practicing in a bedroom here in Ventura in the 70s to playing arena festivals in Europe, it truly is an

inspiring story. And though the point of this article isn't to provide their history (I hope a book and/or movie will be in the works), the point is to pay homage to Cirith Ungol who will be winding down their careers on a high note this next year.

In 1992, after releasing four albums, a number of band personnel changes, and frustrations with the industry, the stress took its toll, and the band officially

called it guits. Then in 1998, co-founder, Jerry Fogle died of liver failure. There would be calls for the band to reunite, requests for interviews, and a growing fan base in Europe, but the two remaining core members, Garven and Tim Baker had become "civilians" working their normal jobs and living uncomplicated lives for just about twenty-five years. Then in 2015, Garven, Baker, former guitarists Greg Lindstrom and Jimmy Barraza got together and started to play in a rehearsal space where I'm told, the magic was rediscovered. After bassist Flint declined to rejoin, Jarvis Leatherby of Night Demon (huge fan of the band),

Then 2016 Cirith Ungol headlined the Frost and Fire II festival at the Majestic Ventura Theater. I was there that night and the packed house of metal fans from around the world cheered and welcomed back the band with open arms. In Garven's words, "When the ancient stars aligned, Cirith Ungol crawled out of its ancient slumber, to wreak havoc on an unsuspecting world." Two days later, the City of Ventura declared October 10, 2016 to be Cirith Ungol Day.

Fast forward to today, after playing metal festivals in Europe to packed stadiums and venues, Cirith Ungol has announced they will retire from live performances at the end of 2024.

Cirith Ungol will release their sixth full-length album, Dark Parade this month via Metal Blade Records and will play a special record release show on October 20 at the Roxy in West Hollywood. Not only will this be the bands first Los Angeles live performance in thirty-five years, but it will commem-

orate The Roxy's 50th anniversary with the band playing their new release in its entirety followed by a full set of their classic material.

I can't imagine what a thrill it has been since reuniting and playing to packed crowds, but it couldn't have happened to a better group of guys. Congratulations Cirith Ungol!

I've lived in Ventura County since 1976. Some of my happiest shopping moments have been driving down Main Street, parking in front of a favorite store, and spending money! Buying stuff! Going to the movies! Having a meal! All because I could park and easily

But now you've made that impossible.

I'm a senior now, and mobility is an issue. Safely walking is difficult. And dangerous (because of those stupid brick chevrons in the sidewalk — do you know how easy it is to catch your toe on the raised lip of the cement? I've fallen 3 times! For me, the chevron sidewalks are more falls waiting to happen.

If I want to go to a store or restaurant that is directly on a corner, perhaps I'll be lucky enough to snag one of the few parking spots on the corner. And then I can struggle in. But if there is no parking there, or if the store I want to go to is in the middle of the block, I have to go in back of the stores, into the few parking spots

So what you've done is put all of Main Street out of reach for me. I'm old. I'm disabled. I can't walk like young people. But I have money to spend, I just can't do it on Main Street. The old Ventura I've loved for 50 years is out of reach.

And if all else fails —cancel Main Street Moves. I can't imagine the shopowners on Main Street are making money. There are too many alternative places to shop and people will vote with their feet if they don't like the inconvenience and obstacles Main Street Moves presents.

Tourism to Channel Islands National Park contributes \$31.9 million to local economy

A new National Park Service (NPS) report shows that 323,000 visitors to Channel Islands National Park in 2022 spent \$21.8 million in communities near the park. That spending supported 258 jobs in the local area and had a cumulative benefit to the local economy of \$31.9 million.

The peer-reviewed visitor spending analysis was conducted by economists at the National Park Service. The report shows \$23.9 billion of direct spending by nearly 312 million park visitors in communities within 60 miles of a national park. This spending supported 378,400 jobs nationally; 314,600 of those jobs are found in these gateway communities. The cumulative benefit to the U.S. economy was \$50.3 billion.

As for the economics of visitor spending, the lodging sector had the highest direct effects, with \$9 billion in economic output nationally. The restaurants sector had the second greatest effects, with \$4.6 billion in economic output nationally.





A View from House Seats

The Devil is in the Details

The bombardment of information is a daily and relentless state of being these days. From every direction we are fed tidbits, whole bits and teasers which may or may not be true. Therein lies the crux of the conflict in the Rubicon Theatre Company's current production of The Lifespan of a Fact by Jeremy Kareken, David Murrell and Gordon Farrell based on a true-ish story by John D'Agata and Jim Fingal.

The show opens the Rubicon's Silver Anniversary season with this premiere production mounted by the Fountain Theatre West Coast. Through a collaboration between the two theater companies, Ventura audiences can now enjoy this extraordinary work. All

three of the actors, Ron Bottitta, Jonah Robinson and Inger Tudor, performed in the premiere production in Los Angeles and brought their roles to the Rubicon stage.

Writers can be finicky about the words they place on the page. They may use flexible criteria for their choices, as D'Agata (Bottitta) shares, for the sake of the story, its emotional impact and readability. Fact-checker intern Fingal (Robinson) takes his work seriously and seeks what he feels is the absolute truth in the facts. Editor (Tudor) wants a terrific story to pull her failing publication back into the limelight.

The three of them become engaged

in a verbal battle as they each stand their ground for their viewpoint to be heard. The result is a fascinating in-depth discussion of detail, accuracy and facts versus story, emotion, and readable flow.

Fingal finds many tiny discrepancies in the facts as presented by D'Agata. Some are so small as a differing second of time in two different reports. The question becomes does that small difference bear enough weight to require changing? D'Agata says no, Fingal says yes. Both are right, and both are wrong.

The 90-minute discourse is presented without intermission. I and others in the audience were completely absorbed in the minutia of the discussion which raised so many questions to explore. Keeping in mind that every single person will have a different perspective on a situation depending on myriad factors, is it even possible to have a single accurate

fact? Where does the point of compromise become more important than absolute accuracy? Is such a thing even possible? And to whom does it

All three actors present viable arguments. The performances are exemplary, the writing is tight and introspective. This is a piece that sends the audience on a wild ride of internal "exploration of the creative process, journalistic integrity and the blurry boundaries between fact and fiction."

The Rubicon has chosen an extraordinary work to open their 2023-2024 season. The Lifespan of a Fact will have you laughing, pondering and questioning everything you read, hear or see from this point forward. Of course, that's just my opinion.

Based upon a true story, "The Burial" is a great David and Goliath type story of a small family funeral business that took on foreign corporate greed. In 1995, Jeremiah O'Keefe (Tommy Lee Jones) was 75years-old and the proud patriarch of a family with 13 children and 24 grandchildren in Biloxi, Mississippi. He was a funeral director and owner of a 100-year-old family funeral home business that had grown into eight locations and provided funeral insurance across

Jeremiah had experienced some trouble maintaining the minimum financial requirements to own funeral homes and the state insurance commission temporarily suspended his license. Jeremiah sought the counsel of his personal lawyer and friend for over 30 years eight funeral homes he owned to fix his financial woes. He recommended selling to a company in Canada called the Loewen Group owned by Ray Loewen, who was purchasing independently owned funeral homes all throughout the US and Canada.

They scheduled a meeting with Loewen in Canada, and when Jeremiah met Mike at the airport, Mike learned Jeremiah had invited a young black attorney who was a friend of his son's from college named Hal Dockins (Mamoukou Athie) to join the team and attend the meeting they had scheduled with Loewen. Mike was noticeably uncomfortable due to some very obvious racist views, but Jeremiah just went about heading to Vancouver to meet Loewen on his yacht.

The Loewen Group owned over 1,000 funeral homes, nearly 500 cemeteries, several hundred insurance companies and were gearing up for what they smugly referred to as the "Golden Era of Death", when the Baby Boomer generation would begin to reach their "age of demise". Loewen calculated this shift would result in a minimum increase of 60% in deaths nationwide and wanted to capitalize on this profit potential by buying all the funeral homes he could find.

Jeremiah struck a deal with Loewen to have them purchase three funeral homes and Loewen agreed he would not sell insurance in Mississippi as not to compete with Jeremiah's business.

Four months went by, yet Loewen hadn't closed the deal and it seemed as though Loewen was trying to stall Jeremiah until he ran out of options that would eventually result in him losing his family business, which then Loewen could obtain for practically nothing.

They filed a lawsuit in a neighboring county that was 70% black, which would mean the jury would be composed primary of black citizens. Hal knew that Mike would not do well as lead counsel with a black jury, and suggested they consider another lawyer for the team. Hal had come to know about a charismatic personal injury lawyer named Mike Allred (Alan Ruck) who Willie Gary (Jamie Fox) in the black suggested that he sell three of the community, who had not lost a case in twelve years and suggested they seek his assistance with the case.

Willie originally refused, stating that he was a personal injury lawyer and that this was a contract law case, but was impressed with Jeremiah's background and integrity so agreed to work the case. The team thought they had an advantage now with a black attorney as lead, only to find out that Loewen hired a hot shot female black attorney named Mame Downes (Jurnee Smollett) along with a team of black attorneys to support her.

Though Willie and the team had limited expertise in contract law, they were determined to be triumphant in their quest to expose the Loewen Group for racial injustice and corporate corruption.







through the State's Project Homekey initiative, will transform the 142-room hotel into 134 permanent supportive housing apartments designed to serve households experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness.

"The rise in the number of homeless individuals, particularly those without shelter, underscores the need for further efforts to address and prevent homelessness comprehensively," said Jeff Lambert, Chief Executive Officer of the Housing Authority.

The total project cost, encompassing acquisition and renovation expenses, is estimated at over \$50 million. The Housing Authority of the City of San Buenaventura led the acquisition and rehabilitation of the facility, providing a sponsor loan of \$1 million. The City of Ventura secured over \$1.5 million from a California Department of Housing and Community Development fee on real estate documents to help purchase the hotel. The city also committed nearly \$1.4 million in HOME-American Rescue Plan funding. The County of Ventura also contributed a \$5.5 million grant for the La Quinta Inn project.

Based on the 2023 Point-in-Time Count, the County of Ventura has 2,441 people experiencing homelessness, marking a 9% increase compared to the 2022 Point-in-Time Count. During the same period, the overall number of homeless individuals in Ventura decreased by 10%, from 713 to 644.

It also facilitates the conversion of commercial properties and other existing buildings into permanent or interim housing for those in need.

The development will comprise 134 studio apartments alongside office and community spaces; all centered around a flexible courtyard that serves as a communal gathering place. To ensure the success and well-being of residents, the Valentine Road

housing project will be staffed by four property managers, including two residing on-site, six case managers, and maintenance

The Housing Authority anticipates finalizing the property's acquisition by early 2024, with the first occupants expected to be welcomed by the spring of the same year.

Bill Ayub, City Manager, City of Ventura - "About a year ago, employees from the City, Housing Authority, and County gathered in a small room at City Hall with a shared vision of a project that could significantly improve the lives of those in need of support. Witnessing this vision becoming a reality is exhilarating for all of us and a source of excitement for our entire community."
