

Successful completion of the Montalvo Safe Routes

The City of Ventura is thrilled to announce the successful completion of the Montalvo Safe Routes to School Project. To commemorate this achievement, the City hosted a ribbon-cutting event on Tuesday, November 7, at the corner of Bristol Road and Grand Avenue.

The event featured key stakeholders and dignitaries, including the Ventura Unified School District, Montalvo Community Council, Montalvo Elementary School, City Council, staff, and community members.

The Montalvo Safe Routes to School Project was a collaborative effort representing a substantial investment in our community's infrastructure. It was specifically designed not only to enhance the safety and convenience of travel to and from Montalvo Elementary School for students and their families but also to provide a more accessible neighborhood for the Montalvo community. 

National Register of Historic Places Nomination

The San Buenaventura Conservancy for Preservation will hold a public update meeting about progress on the nomination of the Ventura Unified School District Historic Washington School Buildings to the National Register of Historic Places. The meeting will be on Thursday, November 16th at 6 p.m. at Grace Church Cooper Hall, 65 McMillan Avenue, Ventura. The Conservancy is in support of the preservation and adaptive reuse of the historic Washington School Buildings in midtown Ventura, and is in the process of nominating the school buildings to the National Register of

Closure of five blocks of historic downtown

In May of 2020, city staff, in partnership with the Downtown Ventura Partners, presented a proposal to City Council to allow for a temporary, 30-day closure of five blocks of historic downtown Main Street to vehicular traffic to allow for outdoor dining and shopping in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. The pilot project was a resounding success and provided a financial lifeline to many Ventura businesses.

Through a series of Council actions, Main Street Moves has been extended to July 2024. During this two-year period, various studies will be completed to determine the feasibility of a permanent, 24/7 street closure (Pedestrian Mall). Periodic updates to the community and Council will be forthcoming as studies are completed.

October 16, 2023 - City Council provided staff direction for the next steps with Main Street Moves, including continuing with the full closure while the environmental studies are complete, finalizing the parklet design guidelines, and creating a mechanism to transition the

program liability from the Downtown Ventura Organization (DVO) to the City. Staff Report (PDF)

June 26, 2023 - City Council waives a second reading and adopts the Ordinance of the City Council of the City of San Buenaventura, amending Chapter 16.350 of the Municipal Code to provide regulations prohibiting the use of bicycles, electric bicycles, and other vehicles within Main Street Moves, and adding limitations on the use of any such vehicle on public rights-of-way and within shopping centers. City of Ventura to host Housing Forum

The Housing Services Division of the City of Ventura will be hosting its next housing forum on Wednesday, November 15, from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. at the Juanamaria Elementary School, located at 100 S Crocker Ave.. The forum will cover a wide range



of topics, including landlord and tenant rights, affordable housing development, housing choice vouchers, paths to homeownership, and homelessness. As housing costs continue to rise in the community, it is essential for individuals and families to be aware of the resources available to them.

Presenters at the event will include the Central Coast Alliance United for A Sustainable Economy (CAUSE), Housing Rights Center, Ventura County Community Development Corporation (VCCDC), Housing Authority of the City of Ventura, People's Self-Help Housing and US Vets.

The VCCDC will discuss paths to homeownership and down-payment assistance programs for first-time homebuyers. The City's Housing Services Division will also provide information about the programs and objectives outlined in the City's Housing Element, a plan that was recently certified by the California Department of Housing and Community Development.

"We're thrilled to host our upcoming forum in the East side community, catering to the residential needs of our local residents by offering vital insights into housing resources and affordable programs," expressed Leona Rollins, the Housing Service Manager. "It's crucial that both individuals and families are well-informed about the resources at their disposal and have a clear understanding of their rights as renters and homeowners."

Ventura Land Trust (VLT) honored distinguished donors and volunteers

Ventura Land Trust (VLT) honored distinguished donors and volunteers at its annual Supporter Spotlight event on Friday, November 3rd. Ventura Land Trust supporters joined the VLT Board of Trustees and staff members for happy hour and dinner while celebrating the 2023 VLT accomplishments and community impact.

The Environmental Champion Award was presented to Assemblymember Steve Bennett, representing California's 38th district. Early in his career, Assemblymember Bennett co-authored the Save Open Space and Agricultural Resources (SOAR) initiatives that have made Ventura County a national leader in land-use planning. As a legislator, Bennett focuses on renewable energy, supporting children in the foster care system, and improving access to resources for farmworkers and Ventura's homeless population. He has continually been a champion for environmental causes and shows his commitment by protecting open spaces and his work with VLT. In 2023, he focused on raising environmental awareness by securing funding for trail improvements in California Assembly Bill 411. With Assemblymember Bennett's support, VLT received a grant of \$7.2 million dollars that is being used to prepare Mariano Rancho for opening to the public, as well as other capital needs at Harmon Canyon Preserve.

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Ventura Charter School students return from school-wide campout with a strong sense of community

Ventura Charter School of Arts & Global Education – a tuition-free Ventura County public school – welcomes students' home as they return from a school-wide campout adventure in October. The expedition spanned three days in the local Ventura County wilderness where students, families, and teachers gathered at Steckel Park in Santa Paula to prepare for the school year by building solid connections while creating a strong sense of community to last throughout the school year. This year nearly

400 students and 300 families attended the campout, which is the only such school-wide activity of its kind within Ventura County's public schools.

"The Campout, has allowed our child to slowly come out of his shell and meet new people. With each passing year we have been blessed to watch our child flourish and grow during this event," said Jaret and Jackie Flowers, parents of

Ventura Charter School students for 6 years, "This school is full of loving and caring



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parents, teachers and faculty."

During the trip, students embarked on a sunrise hike, completed a riverboat challenge, formed a drum-circle, participated in lessons on local animals and nature, learned to explore and engage with their surroundings in a scientific way and had time to have fun and build friendships that are sure to continue on campus. All grade levels were invited to participate, with older students in grades 3 and up camping overnight with their families and younger K-2 students enjoying daytime camp activities.

"It's always fun to see the first-time campers getting their hands dirty and embracing the lessons," said Lisa Hildebrand, Executive Director of Ventura Charter School of Arts and Global Education, "For our older students, they look forward to the campout each year. For them, it's about having fun with friends, as they grow their critical thinking skills, build new and deeper connections, and engage with their environment in ways that carry into the classroom."

This is just one of the many unique ways that Ventura Charter School engages students with each other and with the natural world as part of an education that extends beyond the classroom. Taking care of the Earth and understanding the natural world are part of the core principles of Ventura Charter School and are an integral part of its global education.

Toughest Row" is considered to be one of the most difficult races on the water.

The four women will be competing in the race class. Their boat is 28 feet long and weighs 2,000 pounds. The boat is named "Julie" after Gabe and Megan's mother. who was the girl's biggest cheerleader and a huge supporter of equity in sports for women. The boat is a Rannoch R45 Elite ocean rowing boat, powered by solar energy and this will be the boat's second crossing.

Hannah, Gabe, Megan , Kaitlyn and "Julie" will be completely unassisted until the finish line in Hawaii. These four women are also competing in the challenge of beating the worlds' record, by launching on June 12th and expecting to land in Hawaii in mid July, 30 days later.

The current world's record is 34 days for women. The women will face a long journey with challenges of 40-foot waves, extreme temperature, marine life encounter, sea sickness, and weight loss. Collectively, the team will row over 1.5 million strokes.

They will have a weather navigator on land alerting them of storms and weather-related changes.


With a rowing background, Hannah Byrd is looking forward to the "daring odyssey that demands unwavering determination and physical strength".

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\$1 million prize recognizes excellence and equitable outcomes for college students

The Aspen Institute has again named Moorpark, Oxnard, and Ventura colleges among the 150 institutions eligible to compete for the \$1 million Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence, the nation's signature recognition of high achievement and performance among two-year colleges. The institutions selected for this honor stand out among more than 1,000 community colleges nationwide as having high and improving levels of student success as well as equitable outcomes for Black and Hispanic students and those from lower-income backgrounds.

The Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence spotlights exemplary community colleges in order to research highly effective student success strategies shared with the field while also driving attention to colleges achieving post-graduate success for all students. Nationwide, about 15 percent of community colleges have been invited to apply (150 of just under 1,000 public two-year colleges assessed for Prize eligibility), an honor also extended to all three Ventura County community colleges for the 2023-2025 prize.

In the 2021-2023 award cycle,

Oxnard College, Moorpark College, and Ventura College were named among the top 150 colleges eligible for the prize. Moorpark College advanced to the top 10 finalists, ultimately placing fourth in the nation for the 2023 Community College Excellence Prize.

Following the announcement of being named eligible for the prize, the VCCCD board and college presidents expressed their appreciation of the honor:

"The eligibility of all three of our colleges for the Aspen Prize again highlights the consistent quality of our education, the dedication of our faculty, staff, and administrators, and the achievements of our students," said Board Chair Bernardo Perez. "We celebrate this milestone and remain committed to advancing the standards of community college education for the benefit of our community."

"I am profoundly honored that Ventura College has been chosen to submit for the esteemed Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence for the second consecutive year. Our dedicated faculty and professional staff have exhibited an unwavering commitment to improving educational outcomes for our students, as exemplified by their relentless efforts to expand student access and support services including basic needs-food, future housing, mental health services, and more. We are eagerly looking forward to the opportunity to highlight our hard work for the prize's consideration." said Kim Hoffmans, President of Ventura College.

The 150 eligible colleges have been invited to submit student success

data and narratives about strategies to achieve better and more equitable student outcomes as the next step in an intensive review process that culminates in the naming of the Aspen Prize winner in spring 2025.

velopers or speculators that the school buildings should be preserved and reused as a part of any development on the property. Additionally, after designation, the school buildings will be eligible for lucrative state and federal preservation tax credits and listing allows the use of the California Historic Building Code to facilitate rehabilitation.

Washington Elementary School is eligible under Criterion A because of its association with Education in Ventura.

The Washington Elementary School building is also eligible under Criterion C and is a good and rare example of an educational building redesigned in response to earthquake safety concerns in the city of Ventura.

The buildings at Washington School are eligible under Criterion C with a period of significance of 1935 and 1941. The Main Building and Auditorium at Washington Elementary School are examples of the Mediterranean-style as applied to education buildings and streamlined for the needs of earthquake safety and as works of master architect Harold E. Burket.

The nomination process by the Conservancy must be completed by March 1, 2024. Preliminary work done before the involvement of the Conservancy was useful and provided a foundation for future work on the project. The Conservancy expects up to \$7,000 more in expenses to complete the Nomination. The Washington School Nomination Fund has been established by the Conservancy to accept gifts restricted to this project. Over \$3,000 has been donated to the Fund to date. Expenses include the completion of the research and the analysis of the Washington School historic records at the Museum of Ventura County, Ventura Unified School District (VUSD) archives and the State Architect's Office. Additionally, there will be Conservancy expenses to present the Nomination at the State Historic Resources Commission meeting in Sacramento in early 2024.

Harold Escher Burket was a prolific Ventura-based architect who spent over 40 years designing primarily commercial and institutional projects throughout Ventura County, including the Spanish Colonial Revival-style Community Presbyterian Church and the Zig Zag Moderne-style Firestone Tire Store. Burket had a particular interest in school design—specifically the importance of light and air to a healthy learning environment—as evidenced in his many schools in Ventura County.

The Montalvo Safe Routes to School Project included over two miles of continuous sidewalks, one mile of new bike lanes, 12 new curb ramps, reconstruction of 26 existing curb ramps, 27 new pedestrian and bicycle crossings, and the installation of new landmark signage that enhanced the Montalvo neighborhood's identity while improving safety and accessibility for its residents.

A significant portion of the project was funded by a Caltrans grant totaling \$1.38 million, contributing to the broader Safe Routes to School program to improve student safety across the state. The City of Ventura also demonstrated its commitment to the project, contributing an additional \$1 million through Measure O and gas tax funds to ensure its successful completion.

The Montalvo Safe Routes to School Project was another milestone in Ventura's ongoing efforts to enhance pedestrian infrastructure, following similar projects in West Ventura and near Anacapa Middle School on Telegraph Road.

"I would like to share my appreciation with the city of Ventura for securing and dedicating this funding to realize the Montalvo phase of the safe routes to school implementation," expressed Dr. Antonio Castro, Superintendent of the Ventura Unified District. "These improvements have the potential to generate an even more active walking and bicycling community to and from school. Any reduction to the number of vehicles present during school drop-off and pick-up times is welcomed, as is the possibility of helping promote the physical growth and development of our Ventura Unified students."

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

The Forgotten Chapel by Richard Senate

November 15th is the fest day of Saint Gertrude the Great. A German Benedictine Nun who was known for her mystic gifts. She had a large following in Spain for her writings. Her name graces a lost chapel, a branch Mission, five miles north of Ventura, that stood on El Camino Real and the Ventura River.

No one knowns when it was built, they think it was some time in the early years 19th Century. Three times, possibly four, it served as the Mission when Earthquakes damaged the Mission San Buenaventura in 1812 and 1857. Once the padres sought shelter here when the Argentine pirate

Bouchard threatened the missions after attacking Monterey in 1818. The small adobe building with its orchard was a sort of landmark with the many Chumash grass huts that were built near the old chapel. So many huts that the area became known as Casitas (little Houses). The tiles of the roof were removed from the abandoned site and may have been used to roof the Ortega Adobe.

Adobe is a unique building material, if not kept up, it slowly dissolves back into the soil from which it was made--totally biodegradable. That's what happened here to the Chapel of Santa Gertrudis. The old trees survived and letters tell of people riding their houses to Ojai, stopping on their journey to enjoy a Mission Pear, from the old trees. The chapel and its history was forgotten, becoming a footnote in the story of Mission San Buenaventura. That is until the state decide to build a freeway on the site.

It was rediscovered and an archaeological dig under Roberta Greenwood and Robert O. Browne was undertaken in 1964. The foundation stones were uncovered and tile fragments. that indicated there was a three-room building with a court. The largest room was believed to have been used for religious services. You can not visit this site for it is under the freeway heading towards Ojai today. A monument, using some of the foundation stones was put up and is designated Ventura Country Historic landmark number eleven. It can be viewed on North Ventura Avenue. Once trees helped to mark the monument but the Thomas



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Fire destroyed them.

It is sad that the site is gone but with the data collected by the team, a replica of the small adobe branch mission could be built as a museum to tell the story of this site and Chumash Native American contribution to our city. On November fifteen, pause a moment and remember the lost chapel, visit the site and reflect on all the history that passed this way. Perhaps they should re-plant the pear trees here, so that modern travelers could pause and enjoy a pear, as they travel what was once the King's Highway.

There are many reasons why older people may not get enough sleep at night. Feeling sick or being in pain can make it hard to sleep. Some medicines can keep you awake. No matter the reason, if you don't get a good night's sleep, the next day you may:

Be irritable

Have memory problems or be

Feel depressed

Have more falls or accidents

Being older doesn't mean you have to be tired all the time. You can do many things to help you get a good night's sleep. Here are some ideas:

Follow a regular sleep schedule. Go to sleep and get up at the same time each day, even on weekends or when you are traveling.

Avoid napping in the late

afternoon or evening, if you can. Naps may keep you awake at night.

Develop a bedtime routine. Take time to relax before bedtime each night. Some people read a book, listen to soothing music, or soak in a warm bath.

Try not to watch television or use your computer, cell phone, or tablet in the bedroom. The light from these devices may make it difficult for you to fall asleep. And alarming or unsettling shows or movies, like horror movies, may keep you awake.

Keep your bedroom at a comfortable temperature, not too hot or too cold, and as quiet as possible.

Use low lighting in the evenings and as you prepare for bed.

Exercise at regular times each day but not within 3 hours of your bedtime.

Avoid eating large meals close to bedtime—they can keep you awake.

Stay away from caffeine late in the day. Caffeine (found in coffee, tea, soda, and chocolate) can keep you awake.

Remember—alcohol won't help you sleep. Even small amounts make it harder to stay asleep.

Insomnia Is Common in Older Adults is the most common sleep problem in adults age 60 and older. People with this condition have trouble falling asleep and staying asleep. Insomnia can last for days, months, and even years.

Often, being unable to sleep becomes a habit. Some people worry about not sleeping even before they get into bed. This may make it harder to fall asleep and stay asleep.

Some older adults who have trouble sleeping may use over-thecounter sleep aids. Others may use prescription medicines to help them sleep. These medicines may help when used for a short time. But remember, medicines aren't a cure for insomnia.

Restless legs syndrome, periodic limb movement disorder, and rapid eye movement sleep behavior disorder are common in older adults. These movement disorders can rob you of needed sleep.

People with restless legs syndrome, or RLS, feel like there is tingling, crawling, or pins and needles in one or both legs. This feeling is worse at night.


Some people find that relaxing their bodies puts them to sleep. One way to do this is to imagine your toes are completely relaxed, then your feet, and then your ankles are completely relaxed. Work your way up the rest of your body, section by section. You may drift off to sleep before getting to the top of your head.

Use your bedroom only for sleeping. After turning off the light, give yourself about 20 minutes to fall asleep. If you're still awake and not drowsy, get out of bed. When you feel sleepy, go back to bed.

If you feel tired and unable to do your activities for more than 2 or 3 weeks, you may have a sleep problem. Talk with your doctor about changes you can make to get a better night's sleep.

Like many pet owners, psychology professor Brittany Florkiewicz has always considered dogs friendlier and more expressive than cats,

to Scamp but after reviewing 150 hours of videos involving 53 cats, Florkiewicz and co-investigator Lauren Scott documented at least 276 different facial expressions made by cats. Expressions of happiness include moving their ears and whiskers forward and outward and closing their eyes, while unhappy expressions include moving the ears backward and flattening them, licking their lips and constricting their pupils, the researchers reported in Behavioural Processes.

"DCM is a condition that involves gradual thinning of the heart muscle, resulting in enlargement and weakening of the heart," says Dr. Pavlovsky. It is the second most common type of heart disease in dogs. While the condition has a genetic component, especially in breeds such as Doberman pinschers, boxers, and great Danes, it can also develop in any breed.

Dogs with DCM may show no clinical signs or only mild signs initially. However, coughing, exercise intolerance, or the development of an arrhythmia—an abnormal heart rhythm—can be associated with DCM, according to Dr. Pavlovsky.

To help owners navigate the abundance of choices in the dog food aisle, Dr. Pavlovsky advises, "Look for diets that have been tested via feeding trials in accordance with the guidelines developed by the American Association of Feed Control Officials. Choose a diet developed for a specific life stage of your pet, such as puppy or adult."

Dr. Pavlovsky says that diets created by companies that take part in veterinary nutrition-related research and that employ veterinary nutrition experts are likely to be of higher quality. A sampling of brands that fulfill those criteria includes Hill's, Purina, and Royal Canin.

"Stay away from products making grand statements or claims that seem too good to be true," advises Dr. Pavlovsky. "These diets are good for attracting customers but are rarely rooted in solid science."

Additionally, homemade diets and raw meat-based diets may carry significant health risks for pets. Homemade diets are often nutritionally incomplete and can result in long-term nutritional deficiencies or excesses, especially in growing animals. "Science is ever evolving, and what we know and believe now may change," says Dr. Pavlovsky. However, by partnering with your veterinarian to choose the best diet for each individual pet, you can ensure that your pet is eating a diet that is rooted in the most current scientific research and knowledge available.

animals – and is the size of a grain of rice – contains the pet's date of birth, its breeder and contact information, according to the city and the American Veterinary Medical Association.

• Can cats see things that humans can't?

If you could develop any of a cat's sensory abilities, which would you choose? Perhaps hearing, so you can identify each of the many thousands of cockroaches in your building. Maybe proprioception so you, too, can fall from a four-story building and land on your feet. While these two senses offer a big upgrade in perceiving the world, you likely wouldn't take sight. While big cats like cheetahs have impeccable vision for spotting prey far across the savannah, house cats don't actually have great eyes.

So, what does their world look like? What can we see that they can't? In 2013, artist Nickolay Lamm visualized how the world looks through a cat's eyes. Among other key differences, like their expanded periphery and improved night vision, is their color perception. In these images, panoramic views blur and take on a desert-like palette. But where does their color perception start and end? Bruce Kornreich, veterinary cardiologist and director of the Cornell Feline Health Center, tells Inverse what's going on inside those mystifying eyes and how it mediates a cat's universe.

It's not that cats can't see reds and greens at all, Kornreich explains, "but they don't see them with the same richness of hue." This richness of hue is known as saturation. Certain colors in The eye's retinas are full of light-sensing cells called photoreceptors, like rods and cones. Rods help to see at night and help with peripheral vision, while cones enable colors to be seen. Feline cones contain two types of proteins called opsins. Opsins "change their structure when light hits them," Kornreich says. As in, opsins literally change shape in response to visible light. However, each opsin is stimulated by different wavelengths, which determines what color light they perceive. The opsins they possess are especially sensitive to blue and yellow light, which is why they see these colors best. Since cats' cones have two opsins, which makes them what's called dichromatic, meaning they best perceive two light colors. Humans have a third type of opsin, making our eyes trichromatic. But "it's not as if [cats] can only

see two colors," Kornreich says. Colors combine to create various blends that cats perceive at different degrees.

On the flip side, their rods give them solid night vision. They can better discern shapes in the dark, which is likely a predatory advantage for these crepuscular creatures. They evolved to hunt in the dim light of dawn and dusk, so a high contrast vision with low light comes in handy. According to the Merck Veterinary Manual, cats can see six times better than humans in dim lighting.

"They have lots of rods, that's presumably an evolutionary advantage because they often hunt in low light," Kornreich says.

Vehicle Casing, Attempt Vehicle Theft and Assault on Police Officer Arrest

On the above date and time, the Ventura Police Communications Center received a 911 call regarding a subject (later identified as 26-year-old Newbury Park resident Rayvonn Richardson) looking into parked vehicles and checking car door handles in the parking lot of the 99 Store at 1425 S. Victoria Ave. The first officers that arrived on-scene attempted to contact Richardson and he fled on foot. After a brief foot pursuit, the officers detained him. Richardson then violently resisted, broke free from the officers, and punched one of the officers in the face before fleeing again on foot.

Officers chased Richardson through the surrounding area, circling back to where some of the marked police cars were parked. Through a partially open window, Richardson was able to gain access to the driver's side of one of the locked police units. After resisting officers again, he was taken into custody.

Richardson is currently on parole for criminal threats and has numerous arrests, including robbery, criminal threats, possession of a controlled substance, and resisting arrest. Three officers received minor injuries during this incident.

Richardson was not injured. Richardson was booked at Ventura County Jail for three counts of Resisting/Assaulting a Police Officer (Felony), Attempt Vehicle Theft (Felony), Vehicle Tampering (misdemeanor) and Parole Violation (Felony).

Felony Evading & Traffic Collision

On November 6, at approximately 11:15 pm, the Ventura Police Department received a call from the California Highway Patrol (CHP) requesting assistance locating a vehicle that had fled from their officers during a vehicle pursuit. The driver reportedly attempted to strike a CHP officer with the vehicle, committing an assault with a deadly weapon. CHP pursued the vehicle into the City of Ventura but lost sight of the vehicle in the area of Valentine Rd and Victoria Avenue.

Ventura Police officers located the suspect vehicle driving in the area of Channel Drive and Lemon Grove Avenue and initiated an enforcement stop. The suspect fled and drove recklessly through the city and on the 101 Freeway. A supervisor canceled the pursuit when the conditions became too dangerous to continue and officers lost sight of the vehicle. A short time later, the vehicle struck a Gold Coast Ambulance that was driving on Main Street. The ambulance was pushed into a large truck. The ambulance and the suspect vehicle caught fire. The occupants of all three vehicles were injured and transported to local hospitals for treatment. All are in stable condition. The suspect, Ventura resident Ron Balden, was seriously injured but is expected to recover.

The Ventura Police Department is investigating the Felony Evading and suspected Felony Driving Under the Influence. The California Highway Patrol is investigating the Assault with a Deadly Weapon against their officer.

Cleaning up after Veterans Day: This flag is not disposable by David Goldstein

The United States Flag Code is a federal law, but compliance depends on good will. In 1968, the U.S. Supreme Court struck down a criminal statue making it illegal to "mutilate, deface, defile, or burn" an American flag, so now all the provisions of the code are all phrased with words such as "should." A sense of decency is now Old Glory's best protection.

Nevertheless, within our general country's population, inconsistency is common. Many people seem to take great offence when someone refuses to honor the Flag Code's rules for standing in the presence of the flag during the playing of the National Anthem, but fewer may be familiar with the etiquette required for proper retirement of flags no longer fit for service. American flags, even cheap little plastic ones, are not disposable with trash.

Fewer still may be aware of another environmental, economic, and modern way of honoring the flag. By avoiding flimsy plastic flags and reusing a durable flag, people who care about honoring the flag can make it less likely a flag will be improperly disposed. Good flags also impose less burden on private businesses and service organization members who manage the deluge of flags requiring dignified retirement.

Jeanne Clark, General Manager of Ivy Lawn Cemetery in Ventura reports concerns with cheap flags made for limited use. "Wind really beats those up. They don't last," she said. Ivy Lawn Cemetery saves retired flags and provides dignified disposal on a day designated for use of the cemetery's crematoria. No cremations of bodies occur on that day, and extensive pollution control equipment mitigates emissions from the burning of plastic flags.

Flags draping coffins at the funerals of veterans are more easily reused. In cases where families do not want to take home the flag and the veteran is not buried with the flag tri-folded into a plastic case in the casket, staff saves flags for display on an avenue of flags on the streets of the cemetery.

A drop-box for retired flags is available in front of the Ventura County Government Center Hall of Administration, serviced by Veterans of Foreign Wars volunteers. Other service organizations providing flag service include some chapters of the American Legion, Vietnam Veterans of Ventura County, Elks Lodge, and Boy Scouts.

DaVita Health Tour arrives in Ventura providing free health screenings with its mobile testing center

The DaVita Health tour campaign has arrived in Ventura. DaVita Health specializes in Dialysis, a life sustaining- treatment for those living with end stage kidney disease. The specialized bus is designed to offer free health screenings and kidney care education to residents of the cities they visit. The DaVita health screening bus visited Ventura on Tuesday October 24, 2023, setting up shop at the Pacific View mall in Ventura.

The mobile testing center is on a yearly tour offering free screenings and kidney care education in communities across the U.S. The screenings are free and designed to raise awareness of risk factors that could lead to chronic kidney disease. The health screenings will consider obesity, diabetes, high blood pressure, and a family history of kidney failure.

Testing at the mobile center will specifically test certain factors that are indicative of possible kidney disease. The health screening testing will administer: a fingerstick glucose test that will determine diabetes risk, a blood pressure test that will determine hypertension, body measurement testing to determine body mass index, also available is a blood draw to determine a more in-depth measurement of kidney function. A qualified nurse practitioner will review with the participant the details and the results of the screenings.

Bertha Avalos and Vicky Ramos Davita company representatives described the services offered by the company "we deal mostly with patients with kidney failure, and we provide dialysis services for patients," "The tour bus is a oncea-year event" Avalos said. "This is a totally free service and not intended to bring business into our clinics, but it is to serve the community" she added. DaVita maintains many full-service dialysis clinics all over Southern California. "This program is designed to offer kidney awareness to the community", Avalos added. The tour bus is in action from September through November each year. "It's a full nationwide tour, the tour started in Colorado then heads to California and proceeds from Georgia to Michigan and the tour

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




42" diameter pipe was pulled under the Ventura Harbor.

The work appears to be progressing as planned by Patricia Schallert

On November 4th, the 42" diameter 1,450 foot long black pipe that was stretched down Anchors Way was pulled under the Ventura Harbor from Anchors Way to Marina Park. The 42" casing pipe below the Harbor, and the 20" outfall pipe below the ocean, are being constructed by Horizontal Directional drilling (HDD). With the 42" casing pipe now pulled in, the HDD work below the Harbor is completed.

The next step is to insert 4 smaller pipes (called product pipes) inside of the 42" casing pipe. The smaller pipes include the 20" outfall pipe, 2 new 10" sewer force main pipes to replace the

existing aging Pierpont Lift Station, and a new recycled water line to irrigate Marina Park.

The contractor's plan is to assemble these pipes in Marina Park and pull them back to the Anchors Way side of the project. Originally those pipes were going to be stretched along Anchors Way just like the 42" pipe, but the contractor has found a way to perform the work from inside the soundwall at Marina Park to reduce the impact on Anchors Way. This work will be completed in the coming weeks.

The HDD work under the seafloor is still on-going. The initial pilot bore



hole has reached more than 4,000 feet offshore and the tip has "poked" out on the seafloor in about 55 feet deep water. This occurred on Nov 8th. The work appears to be progressing as planned and the next step is to connect the pilot bore head to the barge which can be seen from the shoreline in Ventura. There will be drilling equipment on the barge to assist with the upcoming work to enlarge the bore hole by a reaming process.

The onshore segment of the work is expected to start soon as well. That work will be along Anchors Way to Schooner, then on Schooner Dr., and finally along Harbor Blvd to south of Spinnaker Dr. When all the work is completed the 20" outfall pipe will be connected from the City's Water Reclamation Facility south of the Harbor to the end of the outfall pipe more than a mile offshore.



If you haven't seen the murals at the downtown library, it is worth the visit. The subject matter, created by depression era artist **Gordon K. Grant**, is "Agriculture and Industries of Ventura" - the style of art American Scene or Regionalist painting. Depicted are cattle, horses, fields and laborers of many different types including men milking cows and women packing citrus. They were created to celebrate the virtues of small town or rural life and advance an overt narrative favoring labor and the nationalist, pro-labor politics of the era. The murals, renovated in 1966, date from 1936-37 and were funded by the Federal Arts Project, under the New Deal WPA. They are very reminiscent of the murals of Diego Rivera and were painted around the same time of many of his murals.







Santa Paula Theater Center has pulled out all the stops for their last production of the 2023 season. The 39 Steps, by Patrick Barlow, garnered the Laurence Olivier Award for Best New Comedy in 2007 as well as numerous other awards and nominations. It is a fast-paced delight featuring well over 100 quirky characters, all portrayed by seven highly capable and skilled actors.

Where else could you get vaudeville, a mystery set in bonny Scotland, people becoming props and a hefty dash of Monty Python's Flying Circus, the early years, all packed into one whirling dervish of an evening? Why, Santa Paula

Director Richard Kuhlman has assembled a cast that is a marvel to witness, tightly choreographing the action while also allowing room for (and probably encouraging) improvisation. The staging is a parody adapted from the 1915 novel by John Buchan and the 1935 film by Alfred Hitchcock. But there's no Hitchcockian suspense here. This production will leave you laughing frequently and wondering what they could possibly do next.

John Webber leads the story as Richard Hannay, who becomes entangled in a spy operation with a mysterious woman who is murdered in his flat. Taylor Lee Marr plays an energy on their behalf. Nonetheless, alter-ego version of Richard Hannay, with the two changing places often humor and rolling r's (oh, those to illustrate various points.

The other five actors, Leslie Upson, Sarah Boughton, Martha Benavides, Carlita Mead and Tom Hall, carry the entire rest of the very large cast of characters. NYAD is the incredibly inspiring true story of world-renowned open ocean swimmer Diana Nyad (Annette Bening) and her quest to conquer what was believed to be impossible by swimming unassisted and without pause from Cuba to Key West, Florida. The trip was difficult due to unpredictable weather and strong ocean currents and Diana had first tried at the age of 28, but the weather and oceans currents were very unfavorable and she only completed 76 of the 103 miles, due to 8 foot swell pushing her off course toward Texas.

At the age of 60, Diana decided she wanted to give Cuba another try and began lap swimming in the local public pool after not having done any swimming at all for nearly 30 years. When she was able to swim 8 hours without pause, she reached out to her best friend Bonnie (Jodie Foster) to coach her and join her in her attempt in Cuba. Bonnie initially refused, not having even known that Diana had started training again, but eventually agreed and they went to Mexico for a test run in the open ocean. Diana's goal in Mexico was 8 hours in open water, but in her first attempt she was only able to complete 4.5 hours. This was unacceptable to Diana, who asked Bonnie if they could try again and was able to complete just over 8 hours the next day. She would sing songs to herself to keep pace, but they had to be on a 4x4 beat so that it would keep her timing correct and she built up a library of at least 96 mostly classic hit songs to sing in her head as she swam.

age 60. Diana was given a different medication than the Tylenol requested for shoulder pain and she was allergic to it, had a medical emergency and had to stop at 53 miles left in after 28 hours 42 minutes. 3rd attempt, September 23rd 2011 at age 62. Diana was stung by box jellyfish, which are extremely dangerous and not known to be in the area, and given an EpiPen injection unknowingly making it worse having to stop 59 miles from Florida. 4th attempt, August 18, 2012 at age 61. Diana ended the swim at 12:55 am on August 21, 2012, due to two storms and nine jellyfish stings though she manged to travel the greatest distance than her three previous attempts.

5th attempt, August 31, 2013 at age 64. Diana wore a special box jellyfish suit at night to keep her from getting injured. On the morning of the second day, the electronic system that was designed to repel sharks also went down and a shark headed for her but she was protected by the shark wranglers who were able to get the system back online in time. After swimming almost two full days she started hallucinating which was natural for the depleted nutrients in her body, and though she was exhausted and hallucinating still had about 12 hours to go. Bonnie was able to encourage Diana to continue and she finally walked up on the shore of Key West Florida after 52 hours 54 minutes in the ocean and was greeted by hundreds of fan there to support her mission. Since her epic accomplishment, Diana's talked at many TED talks and done many other notable things including appearing on "Dancing with the Stars" being a the subject of a skit on "Saturday Night Live", and starting a movement to walk across America with her best friend Bonnie Stoll. Annette Benning and Jodie Foster are dead ringers visually for their characters and they portray a very believed bond of best friends.
