There are boats, and then there are the fishing boats in the Ventura Harbor that can't be missed when strolling along the promenade in the Harbor Village. Ventura as a coastal town has a bustling squid industry that has long been a cornerstone of the Ventura economic and cultural community.

With its prime location along the central coast of California, Ventura has become a hub for squid fishing. The harbor continues to be the premier landing port for the California squid

City of Ventura receives \$40,000 donation from Pier Into the Future

The City of Ventura is thrilled to announce a significant milestone in the restoration efforts of the Historic Ventura Pier. Pier Into the Future, a local nonprofit organization committed to the preservation of this coastal landmark, has generously awarded a \$40,000 donation to the city to support some of the much-needed repairs at the City Council Meeting on Monday, December 4.

"Once the longest wooden pier in California, the Historic Ventura Pier is a cherished symbol of our community's rich history. Despite recent challenges, we're committed to ensuring its enjoyment for generations," Mayor Joe Schroeder remarked. "This donation will help address infrastructure needs, enhance safety, and preserve its historical significance."

Since its closure to the public in January 2023 due to safety concerns, ongoing maintenance and emergency repairs have been in progress. These include planned critical corrosion repairs to the steel framing and structure of the pier, with an anticipated reopening in spring 2024.

"This funding will assist in repairing



the damage caused by winter storms to our iconic pier," stated Ronda Holden, President of Pier Into the Future. " Ensuring the pier's ongoing contribution to our community is essential. Our aim is to safeguard this iconic structure and its integral role in shaping Ventura's character."

The event also coincides with the start of the city's foul weather program. The initiative puts the local homeless population in hotel and motel rooms when temperatures drop below 40 degrees or when projected rainfall exceeds a half inch.

Many of the homeless are also mentally ill and have nowhere to stay which is why the following is so important. There is a huge lack of facilities for the mentally ill. Especially for those that are too ill to understand and accept help.

A Ventura County board agreed to continue blocking Vista Del Mar hospital from admitting involuntary patients but is considering the authorization to be reinstated.

Voting unanimously, the Board of Supervisors approved the extension for Vista del Mar Hospital to give county officials time to evaluate whether the Ventura hospital has made sufficient progress in correcting serious deficiencies in patient care.

Vista del Mar remains licensed and can still admit voluntary patients but not those that are involuntary.

The hospital's authorization was suspended two months ago. A 43-bed unit at Ventura County Medical Center is now the only facility where patients can be treated involuntarily in the county.

"With our client's life on the line, the State of Texas is playing despicable political games. This fight is not over," stated the Center for Reproductive Rights, which is representing Cox.



dedicated time to honing her skills, earning her licenses and certifications.





An interesting fact is that there are a total of 64 Squid Seiner Permits issued for all of California. Ventura Harbor Marina can accommodate 54 Squid Seiner Vessels at any given time. ("Seiner fishing is a method of fishing that uses a surrounding net, that hangs vertically in the water with its bottom edge held down with weights and top edge buoyed by floats.") It has also been called "dragnet fishing".

In 2022, the squid catch in Ventura was roughly 36,164,420 pounds or 19582.21 short tons. "680 tons of squid were brought into the Ventura Harbor during the last three weeks." Captain Vic from Pillar Bay stated.

There is no other single marina on the west coast south of Alaska that can accommodate as many seiners fishing boats at one time as Ventura Harbor. It is currently a permanent home to 44 squid seiners with a total of 103 wet slips and 88 dry storage spaces.

Fishermen are attracted to the Ventura coast from as far away as Alaska and Nova Scotia in pursuit of the squid delicacy. These fishermen are equipped with specialized boats and fishing gear as they venture into the water searching for the elusive squid. (Scientific name: cephalopod).

Using powerful lights to attract squid to the surface, the fisherman carefully lower their nets and with precise movements, they haul in their catch, being careful not to damage the delicate squid.

Their expertise in handling these creatures ensures that the squid are brought aboard unharmed and of the highest quality. Once the squid are safely on board, the boats return to the harbor, where the hustle of the squid industry comes to life.

The industry has become a way of life, woven into the fabric of Ventura's identity with residents, restauranteurs, and our many visitors.

In California, the Fish and Game Commission works with the California Department of Fish and Wildlife to actively manage the fishing guidelines and to ensure there is not overfishing or environmental impacts to the ocean.

There are seasonal catch limits, and programs that are designed to evaluate the impact of the fishing on ocean resources. Time and season closure, including weekend closure provides period of uninterrupted spawning, along with limitations on using lights to attract squid around several of the Channel Islands to protect nesting seabirds.

In 2022, commercial landings of market squid totaled 147 million pounds and were valued at \$88 million, according to the NOAA Fisheries.

2022, 36,164,420 lbs. 18,082 tons 28% of CA total catch

CA catch roughly spread across: Northern CA/Monterey, Ventura, Port Hueneme, San Pedro.

Packaging plants located in Oxnard, Port Hueneme and Wilmington, near the Long Beach harbor play a crucial role in the squid industry. These plants ensure that the squid is processed and packaged efficiently for distribution to consumers worldwide. Cleaned squid is sorted based on weight and size before being cooked or frozen, depending on market demands. Quick freezing techniques are used to maintain freshness during transportation.

These packing plants also contribute significantly towards sustainability efforts by minimizing waste through responsible disposal practices.

After being packaged, squid products have various destination depending on the market. One common route are the overseas markets where the packaged squid is exported to different countries around the world. Both Japan and China high demands for California squid, caught along the Ventura coast is significant as they import large quantities of squid due to their domestic consumption needs.

The cost of packaged squid being returned to the United States can vary depending on quality, weight, distance traveled, shipping methods and applicable fees or taxes. Furthermore, there may be import duties or custom fees imposed by the US authorities. River Haven is now gone forever

The City of Ventura and Turning Point Foundation decided to close the River Haven Transitional Housing Program on Oct 1, 2023. Turning Point Foundation managed this transitional housing program for over 17 years.

River Haven allowed clients to stay for 24 months while working on a transition to permanent housing,

River Haven was located on Harbor Blvd. near Spinnaker Dr. A curved dirt road led to the site which made passage very difficult after heavy rains.

The community was funded partly by the city of Ventura and Turning Point Foundation's donors.

The city provided Turning Point with financial support to hire and retain a case manager and operating costs using federal Community Development Block Grant funding and Measure O dollars.

Ventura provided \$25,000-\$30,000 in grants and \$40,000-\$60,000 from Measure O to River Haven.. Measure O, passed by voters in 2016, authorized a half-cent tax sales to help pay for infrastructure repairs and city services.

River Haven residents paid about \$300 a month.

There is, or will be soon , other permanent supportive housing as a former hotel is being converted into housing for the homeless.

River Haven started during the El Nino in 2006. Clients/residents of River Haven received case management services that followed up with service plan goals and their well-being to promote and create action plans for clients that helped them to become more successful and to maintain service connections obtained.

Through support and housing both Turning Point Foundation and River Haven have given people the opportunity and the tools to start truly living happier and healthier lives.

All of River Haven residents were provided with mental health services, physical health services, addiction services, career assistance, income assistance, and medical assistance. Important life skills such as opening bank accounts, learning about budgeting, and learning how to live as part of a community to the River Haven residents.

Turning Point will continue its commitment to providing quality housing,

mental health, and wellness services to this population in the City of Ventura and countywide through their variety of other program.

Celebrating the delisting of two island plant species on the Channel Islands

Partners from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, National Park Service, U.S. Geological Survey, The Nature Conservancy, California, Santa Barbara Botanic Garden, and Naval Base Ventura County came together to celebrate the delisting of two island plant species on the Channel Islands due to committed, collaborative conservation efforts of many.

At a celebration at the Channel Islands National Park visitor center in Ventura, Kaylee Allen, senior advisor for resources with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Pacific Southwest Region said, "Today's celebration is the culmination of decades of work to restore the health of the Channel Islands natural landscape. The delisting of the Santa Cruz Island dudleya and Island bedstraw, two plants known only to exist on Santa Cruz Island and San Miguel Islands, comes as we also celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Endangered Species Act. This landmark legislation has helped prevent the extinction of 99 percent of the species under its protection and has provided the mechanism for agencies, organizations and individuals to forge a path towards recovery of more than 100 species so far. The accomplishment being recognized here today is the culmination of everyone's collective passion, partnership and problem-solving skills, and I am very proud of what has been achieved."

Island bedstraw (Galium buxifolium) is a long-lived woody shrub with small flowers that lives on coastal bluffs, steep rocky slopes, sea-cliffs, and occasionally pine forests, of Santa Cruz and San Miguel Islands. At the time of listing, population estimates were in the hundreds. Helicopter surveys from 2017 estimate more than 15,000 individual plants now occur on the islands. San Miguel Island is owned by the U.S. Navy and managed by the National Park Service.

The Santa Cruz Island Dudleya (Dudleya nesiotica) is a flowering succulent perennial that lives on the marine terraces of Santa Cruz Island. Scientists say after its initial recovery the population has remained relatively stable over the last 25 years, with current estimates around 120,000 individuals.

Santa Cruz Island is collaboratively managed by The Nature Conservancy and Channel Islands National Park as a single biological unit.

Established in 1987, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's Ventura field office works to conserve and protect threatened and endangered fish, wildlife and plants across the southern and central California coast, collaborating with communities and conservation partners to build a future that supports both people and our unique and diverse natural landscapes. 





Fall prevention classes resume in January

Sign-ups are now available for a new series of Fall Prevention classes that will begin in January. These award-winning classes are put on by the Ventura County Elderly Fall Prevention Coalition and the Ventura County Area Agency on Aging, a division of the Human Services Agency.

Four classes, with 12 sessions to choose from, will be offered in five Ventura County cities. The January offerings include:

Bingocize (Fillmore Active Adult Center)

A Matter of Balance (Simi Valley Senior Center, VCAAA office in Ventura)

Tai Chi: Moving for Better Balance (HELP of Ojai, Oxnard Public Library, County of Ventura California Room in Ventura, Community Presbyterian Church in Ventura, Ventura Church of Christ, Buenaventura Mobile Home Estates in Ventura)

Walk With Ease (Fillmore Active Adult Center)

Adults that are 60 or older that are concerned about falls, have recently experienced a fall, or who are just interested in improving balance, flexibility, and strength, are encouraged to participate. Nationally recognized research shows that one in four adults over the age of 65, and half of the population over the age of 75, fall each year. One out of every five falls results in a serious injury, and about three million older people are treated at emergency departments for fall injuries each year.

Bingocize is an evidence-based health education program that incorporates exercise, nutrition, and fall prevention within the popular game of bingo. Participants will have fun and meet new people while learning about techniques to reduce falls and increase cognition. Bingocize — which can be done seated or standing — is a 10-week program that is exercise for your body, mind, and spirit.

A Matter of Balance is designed for people who are inactive with poor balance, who have fallen, and who may have developed a fear of falling. Participants should expect to begin an easy-to-do regimen to improve balance, strength, flexibility and self-confidence. This class is held once a week for eight weeks and includes chair-based exercises.

Tai Chi: Moving for Better Balance is an exercise program developed especially for older adults using modified practices designed to improve and strengthen balance and mobility. Classes are intended for beginners. Canes and walkers are welcome. This class has been proven to reduce falls by 55 percent.

Walk With Ease is an exercise program that can reduce pain and improve overall health. This is a six-week program developed by the Arthritis Foundation that helps participants create a customized walking plan to stay motivated, manage pain, and exercise safely to stay strong, boost energy, and control weight. Participants walk together three times a week, starting slow and building up to walking for a total of 30 minutes.

mentation of a comprehensive coordinated system of care that enables older individuals, children and adults with disabilities, and their caregivers to live in a community-based setting. The VCAAA advocates for the needs of those 60 years and older in the county, providing leadership and promoting citizen involvement in the planning process as well as in the delivery of services.

Daily low-dose aspirin has little impact on stroke risk and spikes risk of brain bleeding from falls

Low-dose daily aspirin does not provide significant protection against stroke resulting from blood clots and may increase risk of bleeding in the brain or skull after head trauma, according to an NIA-funded study. The findings, published in JAMA Network Open, provide new evidence countering past conventional wisdom recommending a daily low-dose or baby aspirin for healthy older adults.

In this study, an international team led by Australian researchers analyzed data from the ASPirin in Reducing Events in the Elderly (ASPREE) trial. ASPREE includes about 19,000 healthy older adult volunteers from Australia and the United States who were randomly assigned to take a daily 100 milligram aspirin or a placebo

pill and were monitored for approximately five years

The research team found no statistically significant difference in stroke incidence between those who took aspirin and those on the placebo. While a relatively small overall number of brain bleeds occurred in participants during the study period - 187 total, with 108 from the aspirin group and 79 from the placebo one - bleeding events were 38% higher among participants who were taking aspirin daily, regardless of their gender, age, or cardiovascular risk. Bleeding into the brain or onto its surface are common and serious results of fall-related head injuries in older adults. In this study, nearly half of these bleeding events were due to trauma.

In a related recent study, the ASPREE team also found that daily aspirin could increase anemia risk in older adults. In 2022, in part due to ASPREE findings, the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force updated its past recommendations to state that healthy adults age 60 or older should not start taking low-dose aspirin as a primary prevention strategy for cardiovascular disease. These recommendations do not apply to individuals taking aspirin for a known cardiovascular condition.

The ASPREE investigators view these recent results as further evidence that healthy older adults with no history of stroke or cardiovascular disease should talk with their doctors about the potential risks and benefits when considering taking aspirin daily. They further note that older adults who have had past strokes or are in higher risk groups for cardiovascular disease may still benefit from aspirin's blood thinning effects, so these individuals should also ask about the benefits of aspirin versus other drugs such as statins.

Alzheimer's Disease

Scientists found both potentially new and previously discovered Alzheimer's disease genetic risk factors by analyzing the genomes of a relatively small group of people who were identified as being of Ashkenazi Jewish ancestry. The results from the NIA-funded study, published in Alzheimer's & Dementia, suggest that genomic studies of Ashkenazi Jewish people and other closely related "genetic founder" groups may help clarify the genetic basis for Alzheimer's.

People of Ashkenazi ancestry descend from a population of Jewish people who founded communities in Central and Eastern Europe during the Middle Ages. For many centuries, Ashkenazi Jewish communities in Europe were culturally isolated from non-Jewish Europeans, and as a result, the population is genetically distinct from non-Jewish Europeans. Due to this reduction in genetic variation, or "founder effect," several hereditary diseases and types of cancer are found predominantly or more frequently in people of Ashkenazi Jewish descent. In this study, the researchers hypothesized that Alzheimer's disease genetic risk factors may appear more frequently – and thus be easier to identify - than in broader, more genomically diverse European populations.

Led by scientists at Boston University, the researchers used genomic information about the Ashkenazi Jewish population to analyze data of three different large genomic and genetic Alzheimer's disease studies involving more than 80,000 participants of European descent. More than 6,500 individuals appeared to be of Ashkenazi Jewish descent. Approximately 2,800 of these people were diagnosed with Alzheimer's and about 3,700 were not.

By comparing those who had Alzheimer's with those who did not, the researchers found previously identified risk factors such as variants of genes called APOE and TREM2. The APOE associations were relatively strong given the small sample size. They also found several potential new risk factors that had borderline levels of association with Alzheimer's. For example, one was found linked to a gene called RAB3B, which is involved in the release of dopamine, an important chemical signal in the brain.

Experiments on autopsied brain tissue provided further support for the idea that the variants identified by this analysis are Alzheimer's disease genetic risk factors. The researchers note that studying a population with very similar genetics enabled them to uncover new genes that would have been hard to identify in a genetically

heterogeneous population.

Further studies are needed to confirm these findings and potentially identify other genetic changes associated with Alzheimer's in people of Ashkenazi Jewish descent or in other historically isolated populations.

Topics range from "How to get up off the floor when you've fallen," to "Nutrition and Parkinson's" to "The benefits of deep brain stimulation and assessing if you're a good candidate for DBS" to the importance of laughter in life and for healing.

Jon Everhart, retired accountant, US Marine and regular group attendee said, "It's nice comparing treatments, symptoms, and the challenges we all face living with Parkinson's." This caring group empowers people like Jon to be more proactive and to participate in deciding the direction of his treatment, complemented by his team of doctors' suggestions.

This unique group gives everyone a great opportunity to learn more about current PD research, to gain more awareness about local help and resources, to share relevant experiences with others — and to have fun along the way.

The Ventura County Parkinson's Support Group was recently resurrected (post-Covid) by Dr. Vanessa White, owner of Ventura County Neurofitness (a local fitness program designed specifically for those with Parkinson's and other neurological degenerative diseases). The impetus for her assuming this responsibility was after her mother-in-law, Toy White, was diagnosed several years ago with PD. This important, special group was born upon her passing.

Meetings are held monthly on the third Tuesday, 10-11am, at Crosspointe Church (5415 Ralston Ave.)

The next meeting will be on Tuesday, December 19th and it will be a holiday social (sponsored by the Parkinson's Foundation) with lots of fun, good food, games ,and fabulous prizes. And, it's all free—please RSVP by Dec. 12th if you plan to attend Vanessa at 805.300.7749.

Tips for coping with sundowning

Late afternoon and early evening can be difficult for some people with Alzheimer's disease. They may experience sundowning—restlessness, agitation, irritability, or confusion that can begin or worsen as daylight begins to fade—often just when tired caregivers need a break. Woman with Alzheimer's experiencing sundowning

Sundowning can continue into the night, making it hard for people with Alzheimer's to fall asleep and stay in bed. As a result, they and their caregivers may have trouble getting enough sleep and functioning well during the day. Possible causes

The causes of sundowning are not well understood. One possibility is that Alzheimer's-related brain changes can affect a person's "biological clock," leading to confused sleep-wake cycles. This may result in agitation and other sundowning behaviors.

Other possible causes of sundowning include:

Being overly tired

Unmet needs such as hunger or thirst

Depression

Pain

Boredom

Coping with sundowning

Look for signs of sundowning in the late afternoon and early evening. These signs may include increased confusion or anxiety and behaviors such as pacing, wandering, or yelling. If you can, try to find the cause of the person's behavior.

If the person with Alzheimer's becomes agitated, listen calmly to his or her concerns and frustrations. Try to reassure the person that everything is OK and distract him or her from stressful or upsetting events.

You can also try these tips:

Reduce noise, clutter, or the number of people in the room.

Try to distract the person with a favorite snack, object, or activity. For example, offer a drink, suggest a simple task like folding towels, or turn on a familiar TV show (but not the news or other shows that might be upsetting).

Make early evening a quiet time of day. You might play soothing music, read, or go for a walk. You could also have a family member or friend call during this time.

Adjust lighting, letting in natural light during the day, if possible, and try softer room lighting in the evening.

Preventing sundowning

Being too tired can increase late-afternoon and early-evening restlessness. Try to avoid this situation by helping the person:

Go outside or at least sit by the window—exposure to bright light can help reset the person's body clock

Get physical activity or exercise each day Get daytime rest if needed, but keep naps short and not too late in the day

Get enough rest at night

Avoid things that seem to make sundowning worse:

Do not serve coffee, cola, or other drinks with caffeine late in the day.

Do not serve alcoholic drinks. They may add to confusion and anxiety.

Do not plan too many activities during the day. A full schedule can be tiring. If problems persist

If sundowning continues to be a problem, seek medical advice. A medical exam may identify the cause of sundowning, such as

pain, a sleep disorder or other illness, or a medication side effect.

If medication is prescribed to help the person relax and sleep better at night, be sure to find out about possible side effects. Some medications can increase the chances of dizziness, falls, and confusion. Doctors recommend using them only for short periods of time.

Adoptable dogs receive Thanksgiving dinner from volunteers


Dedicated to Scamp

Rescue (AFLAR) and Canine Adoption and Rescue League (C.A.R.L.) received homemade Thanksgiving meals, complete with turkey, mashed potatoes, vegetables and canine-appropriate pumpkin pie this Thanksgiving.

"I wanted to give something back to these organizations and the dogs they have rescued and provided care and shelter to. I thought to myself, 'Let's make Thanksgiving dinner for our pups.' Thankfully, several of my fellow volunteers went along with the idea and gathered at my house the evening before Thanksgiving," said AFLAR volunteer, Lupe Flores.

"We are very grateful for these meals that our volunteers cooked and assembled for all the dogs," stated AFLAR Founder and President

Maripat Davis. "Volunteers are the heart of AFLAR, and we are always in need of new volunteers and fosters and donations to help us continue our life-saving work."

Both AFLAR and C.A.R.L. are counting on other community members to support their organizations this holiday giving season.

"As a boarding facility that rescues hundreds of dogs each year, we're always in need of assistance, whether it's through giving monetary donations, fundraising, volunteering or donating food and supplies through Amazon Smile," said Clark.

Shelters nationwide are overcrowded as many Americans cannot afford to own their pets. A recent report highlights that public and private shelters across the nation are expected to reach a three-year high in euthanasia rates in 2023. For example, around 51,000 dogs were euthanized during the first half of the year representing a nearly 40% increase from that same period in 2022.

In addition, pet-friendly affordable housing seems to be one of the most common issues when people surrender their dogs, particularly large dogs, followed by the cost of vet-

erinary care.

"Our organizations relentlessly work to find long-term foster and forever homes for our dogs in addition to providing them with necessary medical care and training," Clark said.

AFLAR boards its rescued dogs at the C.A.R.L. facility in Santa Paula and also has several adoptable dogs in foster homes. Davis says she constantly receives emails and phone calls from pet owners who can no longer care for their dogs but want to rehome them.

"There is a crisis in our nation with regard to shelter overcrowding. We work non-stop to save as many lives as we can," said Davis. "That's why we need ongoing support!"


Residential Burglary, Conspiracy to Commit Residential Burglary and Firearms Possession

What was the Olivas Adobe like long ago?

The main house and small adobe still exists

The main house and small adobe still exists, as does the wall but little more still stands. Letters and news stories give some hints as do census reports of what it was like. It was clearly a complex of structures, as were most ranches and farms of the era. Being prosperous it may well have had the look of a small town or village. Outside of the few references made, we can only speculate on the look of the Olivas Rancho. But as a fun project I set to work attempt to reconstruct what it might have been like in say 1865.

The known sites:

There was a large, impressive barn. This was mentioned in several sources. Some say it rivaled the size of the house. One account said it was part adobe and part wood. (such a barn stands at the Reyes Adobe in Agoura Hills). One "psychic" account said it had a wooden lantern on top where a powerful lantern was placed on foggy nights. Such a folly would have been impressive and might appeal to man wishing to impress visitors—like Don Raymundo Olivas. Such barns are susceptible to termites and it didn't survive.

There was another House. This was mentioned in the US Census report beyond the small adobe and main house but its location was not listed. It must have been close.

There was a small adobe by the Santa Clara River where Candelaria the cook lived. This was in the Bookman letters and Oral Histories. It must not have been far as the Olivas Children would go down and visit her. She made them huge flour tortillas that impressed them. But where was this house located? I believe it was not far from the well, just south of the house.

The Olivas Dance Hall and Saloon. A painting exists of this structure and the painting seems to indicate a bank behind it so it may have been closer to the Santa Clara River. It was perhaps swept away in a storm. Its location is unknown but, to an enterprising man like Don Raymundo such a place might make good business sense. It would be a place to sell his home made "Tinto" wine and apricot Brandy. This seems to indicate a new side to Raymundo. It may have been close to Main Street, then El Camino Real to attract thirsty travelers--and far from the house.

Another speculated site that may or may not have exited:

The Olivas Carriage House. Psychic Archaeology is an inexact and disputed science at best and a pseudo science at worst. But findings from such a team "found" a carriage house foundations in the Memorial Grove, near the road. They said it was a two story adobe and wood structure that held two fancy carriages and place for the driver and his family as well as a fancy team of matched gray horses. The driver was a tall, half Chumash, half Irish man, who stood six feet tall and his wife who came it at five feet. Possible? Yes. They would want a tall impressive coachman to drive them to church on Sunday.





Rubicon Strikes Gold in Silver Year

Twenty -Five years ago the Rubicon theater began as a dream. It has grown, evolved, and become a shining light in the arts community, proving that dreams can come true. In this 2023-2024 season of must-see, "real" theater, the Rubicon continues to be a shining beacon.

Opening night of The World Goes 'Round, a musical revue of the over 40-year collaboration of the highly successful songwriting duo John Kander and Fred Ebb, held a huge surprise.

Former Senator Hannah Beth Jackson, as well as Senator Monique Limon and Assemblyman Steve Bennett were on hand to make a special presentation. Their heartfelt, passionate presentations highlighted many ways the Rubicon has enriched our community over the last 25 years by providing high quality artistic opportunities to the citizens of our beloved community, as well as continuing to thrive and grow during the extraordinary experience of the pandemic.

Karyl Lynn Burns, Rubicon Executive Director, was presented with a \$1.5 Million governmental investment to recognize their importance as a professional regional theater of note (see separate article).

Burns and her husband James O'Neill have been on this journey for the last 25 years, becoming champions of the arts in the Ventura area and cultivating community support.

A recent production of In the Heights was taken to schools throughout the area, introducing over 52,000 students to the magic that involvement in the arts can provide. That's quite an impressive outreach, especially in a time when arts budgets in the schools are cut routinely. The concept of arts as a whole being a necessary component to well-rounded living was soundly applauded.

Following the presentation, the audience was treated to another extraordinary theatrical experience with The World Goes 'Round, featuring songs of Kander and Ebb who penned such familiar classics as the scores to Chicago, Cabaret, Zorba, 70, Girls, 70 and many more.

The Drama Desk Award-winning musical revue exuded high energy, humor and complexity. Many of the songs will be familiar -some less so. Each one is given treatment apart from the usual contextual rendering of its original use. In every case however, the lyrics beautifully illustrate the timeless-

ness and impact of the sentiments..

The Revue has been around since the early 1990's. I vividly recall owning a vinyl copy of the original cast album and playing it often. It was, and continues to be, inspiring. This performance simply stunned me with its depth, triggering so many memories, tears and laughter.

Powerhouse vocals by each cast member shook the rafters. Each shone individually and collectively with some impressive pieces weaving several songs sung simultaneously. Once again, the Rubicon has given our community a priceless gift with extraordinary talent. This is a holiday gift not to be missed.

Performances run through December 23. with multiple opportunities to catch this stirring compilation of well known and not-so-well-known (but equally moving) songs by the duo of John Kander and Fred Ebb.
