Team (CERT) training program.

This free, comprehensive program equips 40 participants with essential skills and knowledge about potential local disasters and how to respond safely, swiftly, and responsibly. Applications are open to Ventura and Santa Paula residents, and will be accepted through Wednesday, January 24, 2024.

"In the aftermath of a major disaster, the demand for professional responders can exceed availability. Our community's ability to respond effectively in times of crisis relies heavily on the preparedness of our residents," said Mack Douglass, Ventura's Emergency Services Manager. "The CERT program provides an opportunity for individuals to not only enhance their emergency preparedness but also become an essential part of the first response efforts."

Participants will complete 24 hours of training covering various aspects of emergency response, including reducing fire hazards, setting up medical treatment areas, assisting responders, conducting light search and rescue operations, and more. Upon completion,

each graduate will receive a certificate of completion and a CERT disaster start-up pack containing a helmet, gloves, vest, and safety goggles.

"This collaboration exemplifies the strength that comes from neighboring communities working together toward a common goal of enhancing public safety and emergency response," said Kate Watkins, Emergency Services Coordinator for the City of Santa Paula. "I am confident that our joint commitment to preparedness will lend itself to a safer and more resilient region for all."

The program is set to begin on January 31, 2024, and will be held on five consecutive Wednesday nights from 6:00 p.m. - 9:00 p.m., with the last class hosted on Tuesday, March 5. The final drill and skills showcase will be hosted on Saturday, March 9, from 10:00 a.m. - 2:00 p.m. Six classes will be hosted at the Ventura Police Department Headquarters, with the final class hosted at the Alessandro Fire Training Facility.

A very busy 2023 for Caps Media

The entire CAPS Media Crew offer our thanks to everyone in Ventura and Ventura County for their tremendous support throughout 2023. All year long CAPS Media crews provided production services for the entire community and created informative, educational, and engaging productions with Ventura City staff and agencies throughout the county.

For the City, CAPS operations manager Donald McConnell and his sidekick Manny Reynoso, recorded and broadcast 48 individual meetings at city hall, totaling more than 170 hours of live programming, all broadcast on CAPS channel 15 and streamed online. The rebroadcasts of the city meetings exceeded 300 hours of information for the community.

CAPS video crews, led by master videographer/editors Gary Roll and Alex Uvari, working in concert with the City Public Information Officers, produced dozens of informative productions for multiple city departments.

At the CAPS Media Center, the talented and dedicated CAPS/KPPQ DJs, directed by radio manager Elizabeth Rodeno, produced more than 150 hours of community talk shows and 300 hours of original music shows, informing and entertaining Venturans and audiences worldwide at 104.1 FM and on myTuner Radio.

Throughout the year, students in the CAPS/ECTV media career program, mentored by Phil Taggart, wrote, produce, directed, hosted, and edited dozens of award-winning programs on wide ranging topics. The ECTV students were also vital crew members in CAPS' recording and live broadcasting of graduation ceremonies for Ventura College and all VUSD high schools and the annual St. Patrick's Day Parade.

CAPS Media presentations for government and nonprofit agencies expanded to include Ventura County Criminal Justice Center, Ventura College Foundation, Ventura Regional Firesafe Council, the Housing Trust Fund of Ventura County and more.

High on the list of very special projects in 2023 were CAPS' collaborations with the outstanding staff at the Museum of Ventura County, creating a variety of media productions for Ventura County's 150th Anniversary Celebration. productions included episodes for "Voices of Ventura County," "Feast or Flop" and "Ventura County: The

Place We Call Home."

In October CAPS held an Open House at the CAPS Media Center inviting the public to meet the CAPS crew, tour the facility, and engage in informative demonstrations on all aspects of media production.

For everyone interested in learning more about CAPS Media and CAPS Radio, separate orientations are held monthly on the 2nd Wednesday of the month beginning on January 10 for CAPS Media and on the 2nd Thursday of the month beginning on January 11 for CAPS Radio KPPQ. The member orientations are held at 6pm at the CAPS Media Center, 65 Day Road. The center is open to the public every week, Tuesday-Thursday noon to 8pm.

Early in 2024 CAPS Members will be able to schedule one-on-one media training with the knowledgeable CAPS staff using an updated CAPS website launching in February.

Thank you all for another wonderful year of serving the Ventura community. Best wishes for a Happy and Healthy 2024.





Ventura Police urge responsible holiday celebrations and safe driving

This holiday season, the Ventura Police Department encourages the public to celebrate responsibly and avoid driving under the influence of alcohol, marijuana, prescription medications, or over-the-counter drugs that can impair the ability to drive safely.

Through New Year's Day, the Ventura Police Department will deploy additional officers on patrol to actively identify and apprehend drivers suspected of being under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs. This heightened enforcement effort aligns with the national campaign, Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over, with the goal of stopping suspected impaired drivers who put everyone on the road at risk.

"Prioritizing traffic safety during the holiday season is a collective responsibility that cannot be overstated," said Sergeant Mark Knackstedt. "It's about safeguarding lives and preventing DUI-related collisions on our roads. We all play a vital role in keeping our roads safe; please take your role seriously."

Some prescription medications or over-the-counter drugs may interfere with driving. Always follow usage instructions

and take note of any warnings related to driving or operating heavy machinery, which includes operating a vehicle. While medicinal and recreational marijuana are legal, driving under the influence of marijuana is not. Marijuana can be impairing, especially when combined with alcohol or other drugs, which can also result in a DUI.

If you see someone driving impaired, always call 9-1-1.

About Libraries and Friends

The Ventura County Library has announced that they have been awarded a Building Forward Library Facilities Improvement Grant in the amount of \$1,5400,001 from the California State Library for the Ray D. Prueter Library in Port Hueneme. These grants are intended to address critical maintenance needs, improve energy efficiency and sustainability, and expand digital and physical access. Thirty-four local libraries across California received funds during this year's round of Building Forward grants earmarked by the governor and the Legislature to improve libraries in the state's highest poverty areas. Ventura County Library Director Nancy Schram said that the state grant funds required a local match of \$770,000. The funding will be provided via a 50/50 split by the Ventura County Library's reserves and the City of Port Hueneme whose City Council voted in May this year to commit \$385,000 to this project. The scope of work for the project will include major system upgrades, energy efficient lighting, new flooring, and enhanced access to the children's program room that is too small to meet current demand.





Historic Ventura Pier receives a \$40,000 donation

Pier Into the Future, a local nonprofit organization committed to the preservation of our historic coastal landmark, has generously awarded a \$40,000 donation to the City to support some of the much-needed repairs during the City Council Meeting on Monday, December

"Once the longest wooden pier in California, the Historic Ventura Pier is a cherished symbol of our community's rich history. Despite recent challengenjoyment for generations," Mayor Joe Schroeder remarked. "This donation will help address infrastructure needs, enhance safety, and preserve its historical significance."

Since its closure to the public in January 2023 due to safety concerns, ongoing maintenance, and emergency repairs have been in progress. These include planned critical corrosion repairs to the steel framing and structure of the pier, with an anticipated reopening in spring 2024.



The site has been a fire department training facility since 1991.

Temporary Fire Station to open in 2024

The City Council (on a 4-3 vote) voted to clear the way for a fire station to go up at 2269 Alessandro Dr. on a 2.9-acre site owned by the city. It will be the Ventura's seventh station.

The station could be used for up to 20 to 30 years (this is temporary)?

The council felt that costs for the temporary station are significantly lower than a permanent station. Perhaps less than \$5 million compared to \$20 million to \$30 million.

Fire Chief David Endaya stated "I don't know that I can come up with a solution that will completely take away the challenges? What I know we've been asking for, and the firefighters group has been asking for, is help."

Councilmembers Duran,

Bill McReynolds and Jeannette Sanchez-Palacios voted against the project. They wanted more information and wished to continue the discussion in six months.


Councilmembers Mike Johnson, Doug Halter, Liz Campos and Mayor Joe Schroeder didn't want to wait so approved the project.

The new station will have a full-time engine company to provide services to Ventura Keys, Pierpoint, Harbor, Marina, and surrounding areas. The fire department's goal is to respond to fires within 5-minutes.

Council members were told that 2 mitigation fee funds of \$5.5 million could cover the costs of the interim station.

Housing Trust Fund Ventura County awarded \$5 million

Housing Trust Fund Ventura County (Housing Trust Fund VC) has been awarded \$5,000,000 from the Southern California Association of Governments' (SCAG) as part of the Regional Early Action Planning (REAP) 2.0 Lasting Affordability program. The funding will support the creation of the Housing Trust Fund Ventura County's Revolving LongTerm Loan Program for Infill Affordable Housing Developments Project. This project will establish a long-term loan program and will increase the lending capacities of Housing Trust Fund VC. In addition, this grant will provide resources to Housing Land Trust Ventura County (Housing Land Trust VC) to create policies and procedures

which will advance Housing Land Trust VC to attract additional capital and land donations. The anticipated outcomes from the new fund include 656 affordable housing units in Ventura County by 2031.

Housing Trust Fund Ventura County's Revolving Long-Term Loan Program for Infill Affordable Housing Developments Project is a new effort by Housing Trust Fund VC to specifically target in fill properties in Ventura County on which affordable housing would be developed. Targeted infill properties will be in urban and transit supportive areas and consist of unused and underutilized land with accessibility to daily services, ideally suited to foster new and growing communities. A portion of the grant will support Housing Land Trust VC in establishing policies and procedures which will create a framework for growth, community outreach, and evaluation of land donation.

"The impact of an award like this is immediate and lasting. We are honored to be considered among programs that will bring affordable living and lasting change to Southern California, including our wonderful Ventura County," said Linda Braunschweiger, CEO of Housing Trust Fund VC and Housing Land Trust VC. "Affordable housing is a community effort and SCAG reminds us just how

important our community truly is."

This award is one of fourteen allocated by SCAG in support of innovative housing finance projects across Southern California. Selected awardees are set to receive a combined \$45 million from the Lasting Affordability program. The Lasting Affordability program is funded by the Programs to Accelerate Transformative Housing (PATH) Program under REAP 2.0 and is meant to accelerate progress toward housing goals and climate commitments by strengthening the partnership between the state, its regions, and local entities with support for program-level investments in housing trust funds and community land trusts.

"We congratulate these 14 awardees for the innovative approaches they're taking in addressing Southern California's housing crisis and look forward to the positive impact they will have on their communities and the region," said SCAG Executive Director Kome Ajise.

Launched as a 501c3 nonprofit corporation in 2011, Housing Trust Fund VC is the local trusted leader in helping to increase affordable housing options throughout Ventura County by leveraging public-private partnerships to provide low-cost, flexible loans early in the housing development cycle. As of December 2023, Housing Trust Fund VC has committed to investing \$27.8 million through its Revolving Loan Fund, creating 1,177 affordable apartments and homes for very-low, low- and middle-income employees, transitional age foster youth, veterans, farm workers, and the homeless.

Eric Nasarenko, Ventura County District Attorney and Santa Barbara District Attorney John Savrnoch, along with Ventura County Sheriff James Fryhoff, Santa Barbara County Sheriff Bill Brown, and Ventura County CEO Dr. Sevet Johnson joined forces to address the epidemic and slow down the flow of fentanyl from Mexico to the U.S. The bill is currently awaiting signature from President Joe Biden and is titled the "Disrupt Fentanyl Trafficking Act" the legislation leverages the tools of the Department of Defense and involves Mexico as an active partner in disrupting drug cartel and trafficking activities.

Top law enforcement officials of Santa Barbara and Ventura counties emphasized the impact that fentanyl has had on the central coast. "This fentanyl scourge that we are facing requires a full court press," said Ventura County Sheriff James Fryhoff. The bipartisan measure, co authored by Congressman Salud Carbajai D-Santa Barbara is part of a \$886 billion defense policy plan that has been approved by the House and Senate and is waiting to

be signed by President Joe Biden. The bill emphasizes the fentanyl crisis as a national security threat and calls on the U.S Department of Defense to produce strategies to target and disrupt trafficking of synthetic opioids. "The details of the plan are not formulated, and there will be limits," Carbajal said. The first draft of the bill concentrated on surveillance and efforts to interrupt the flow of fentanyl from Mexico to the U.S. The bill in its final form calls for more coordination and cooperation between the U.S. military and Mexico in disrupting criminal organizations involved in the illicit import of the opioid into the United States.

"The Central Coast of California has been devastated by the scourge of Fentanyl on our streets, with some areas seeing a 700% spike in overdose deaths in recent years". Said Carbajal. Fentanyl is the leading cause of death for Americans Aged 18-45 and an estimated 196 Americans are dying every day due to the opioid. This new act will strengthen efforts by law enforcement to combat the problem. Specifically, the act will declare fentanyl trafficking a national security threat stemming from cartels and smugglers, directing the pentagon to

develop a fentanyl specific counter-drug strategy, requiring the secretary of defense to increase security cooperation with the Mexican military and address coordination efforts between the military and federal law enforcement agencies.

In a press briefing with Carbajal on Wednesday December 20th law enforcement leaders from Ventura and Santa Barbara counties conveyed hope for the plan to slow down the flow of the drug from China and Mexico into the central

Ventura County District Attorney Erik Nasarenko stated, "More than three individuals die each and every week in Ventura County." He added Fentanyl crime has exploded too with 676 filings by prosecutors this year." He also noted that in 2019 there were eighteen incidents involving fentanyl."

The press briefing also stressed that dosage levels vary dramatically from pill





to pill in the same supply becoming a lethal dose quickly. Other drugs are frequently spiked with fentanyl, and drug users often are unaware that their drug of choice has been spiked with fentanyl and could be lethal.

"The days when people could convince themselves that a recreational drug is safe are long gone," said Fryhoff. Anything can contain fentanyl, he added "One pill can kill."

Older adults' unique nutrition needs

Simple adjustments can go a long way toward building a healthier eating pattern. Follow these tips to get the most out of foods and beverages while meeting your nutrient needs and reducing the risk of disease:

Enjoy a variety of foods from each food group to help reduce the risk of developing diseases such as high blood pressure, diabetes, and heart disease. Choose foods with little to no added sugar, saturated fats, and sodium.

To get enough protein throughout the day and maintain muscle, try adding seafood, dairy, or fortified soy products along with beans, peas, and lentils to your meals. Learn more about protein and other important nutrients.

Add sliced or chopped fruits and pre-cut varieties if slicing and chopping are a challenge for you.

Try foods fortified with vitamin B12, such as some cereals, or talk to your doctor about taking a B12 supplement. Learn more about key vitamins and

Drink plenty of water throughout the day to help stay hydrated and aid in the digestion of food and absorption of nutrients. Avoid sugary drinks.

Eating habits can change as we grow older. The USDA has developed Food Patterns to help people understand

What are board and care homes, etc.?

These small private facilities, also called residential care facilities or group homes, usually have 20 or fewer residents. Rooms may be private or shared. Residents receive personal care and meals, and staff are available around the clock. Nursing and medical care usually are not provided at the home.

costs of living at a board and care home. Medicare does not cover these costs. Medicaid may provide partial coverage, depending on the state and whether the person is eligible. If the older person has long-term care insurance, check their plan to see if it includes coverage for this type of facility.

Nursing homes, also called skilled nursing facilities, provide a wide range of health and personal care services. Their services focus more on medical care than most assisted living facilities or board and care homes. Services offered in a nursing home typically include nursing care, 24-hour supervision, three meals a day, and assistance with everyday activities. Rehabilitation services, such as physical, occupational, and speech therapy, are also available.

In many cases, people must pay for nursing home care themselves. Medicare generally doesn't cover long-term stays in a nursing home, but it may pay for some related costs, such as doctor services and medical supplies. Medicaid may also cover some of the costs of nursing homes for people who are eligible based on income and personal resources. If the older person has long-term care insurance, the policy may include some coverage for nursing home care. Check with the insurance company for details.

Assisted living is for people who need help with daily care, but not as much help as a nursing home provides. Assisted living facilities range in size from as few as 25 residents to 100 or more. Typically, a few levels of care are offered, and residents pay more if they need extra services or special care.

Assisted living residents usually live in their own apartments or rooms and share common areas. They have access to many services, including up to three meals a day; assistance with personal care; help with medications, housekeeping, and laundry; 24-hour supervision, security, and on-site staff; and social and recreational activities. Some assisted living facilities are part of a larger organization that also offers other levels of care. For example, continuing care retirement communities may also offer independent living and skilled nursing care. Exact arrangements vary by facility and by state.

Most people pay the full costs of assisted living themselves. This option tends to be more expensive than living independently but less expensive than a nursing home. Medicare does not pay for assisted living. Medicaid may provide coverage for some aspects of assisted living, depending on the state and whether the person is eligible. This care option is partially covered by some long-term care insurance policies.

Is it flu?

Each year, millions of people suffer from seasonal influenza, which is often called the flu. Flu is a respiratory illness caused by viruses that infect the nose, throat, and sometimes the lungs.

Flu is a mild illness for some people. But for others, including older adults and those with chronic (long-lasting) health conditions, the flu can be very serious and even life-threatening. Getting a flu vaccine every year can help prevent the flu. The vaccine is safe, effective, and available for little to no cost to you.

Most people who get the flu feel better after a few days to two weeks. However, the flu can make you seriously

You can ask a doctor to help you think through health care choices.

Prepare to talk with a health care provider about your advance care plan

You can ask a doctor to help you think through health care choices that may be covered in your living will, like life-sustaining care and other treatment decisions, before you put them in writing. For example, you might ask about the decisions you or your family may face if your high blood pressure leads to a stroke.

You can also ask a doctor about other medical orders you may need in an emergency situation or at the end of life. Common orders include:

Do not resuscitate (DNR) order. A DNR becomes part of your medical chart to tell medical staff that you don't want CPR or other life-support measures to restore your heartbeat and breathing.

Do not intubate (DNI) order. A similar document, a DNI tells medical staff that you don't want to be put on a ventilator.

Out-of-hospital DNR order. An out-of-hospital DNR alerts emergency medical staff to your wishes to restore your heartbeat or breathing if you aren't in a hospital. Physician orders for life-susmedical orders for life-sustaining treatment (MOLST) forms. These forms provide guidance about your medical care that medical staff can act on immediately in an emergency. Typically, you create a POLST or MOLST when you're near the end of life or critically ill and know the specific decisions that might need to be made on your behalf.

Prepare for your appointment by:

Asking your health care proxy to come with you if that makes you more comfortable.

Writing down some of your current health issues and your questions about future health care and end-of-life care.

Completing the Tips for talking with your doctor about advance care plan worksheet.

You may find it difficult to ask your doctor directly about your current prognosis or about end-of-life care. Remember, the goal is simply to start the conversation. You do not have to make specific decisions about your medical care until you feel ready.

Finding someone you trust to make medical decisions on your behalf

You can choose a person to make medical decisions for you if you are unable to communicate them yourself, whether it's due to a serious illness, injury, or other reason. This person is called a health care proxy. Having a health care proxy can help you plan for unexpected situations that may not be covered in your living will.

Some important things to know:

Your proxy can only make decisions if you are too sick to make them yourself. In addition, you can specify how much say your proxy has over your care.

Your proxy will work with your health care team to ensure your care and treatment preferences are followed.

You can change your health care proxy at any time. Simply fill out a new proxy form and let your family and health care team know about the change.

You may name an alternate proxy if your proxy is unavailable.

It's important to find someone who you trust to honor your wishes and who is comfortable speaking up on your behalf with loved ones and health care providers. You may want to talk to more than one person about your wishes before deciding who is the right proxy for you.

Work complexity linked to better cognitive aging

Higher occupational work complexity is associated with better cognition later in life, according to two recent NIA-funded studies published in Alzheimer's & Dementia.

Previous research has indicated that people with complex jobs have better cognitive function as they age and a lower risk of dementia. Both of the two new studies built on these findings by exploring multiple forms of occupational complexity and cognitive outcomes. Occupational complexity with "data, people, and things" was classified using the Dictionary of Occupational Titles, which catalogs the type of work activities involved in different occupations. Examples of jobs with high complexity in each of these areas include a data analyst, a social worker, and a watch repairman, respectively. Education, self-reported as the highest level of education completed, was statistically accounted for as it could indicate prior cognitive abilities before entering the workforce.

In the first study, researchers from Indiana University and collaborating institutions analyzed data from 355 older adults enrolled in the Social Networks in Alzheimer's Disease study. The scientists examined participants' neuropsychological test results, neuroimaging data, employment history, and mild cognitive impairment (MCI) or dementia diagnoses. Most participants, age 70 on average, were retired and no longer working in

their longest-held job. The researchers found complex work with people was associated with better memory, a decreased risk of MCI or dementia, and greater brain reserve — the gap between brain atrophy and poor cognitive function. After accounting for education, complexity with data or things was not associated with any cognitive outcome. These findings suggest that exposure to cognitive enrichment at work, especially via social interaction, may improve cognitive outcomes and increase cognitive resilience to neuropathology. However, a limitation of the study is that the participants were not a diverse sample.

In the other study, researchers from Kaiser Permanente Northern California; University of California, San Francisco; and collaborative institutions also looked at occupational complexity and cognition, specifically in a racially and ethnically diverse sample. Researchers interviewed 1,536 participants, average age of 76 years, in the Kaiser Healthy Aging and Diverse Life Experiences study, which consists of approximately equal numbers of Asian, Black, Latino, and White older adults. Three interview cycles were completed over an average of about two and a half years to measure initial cognition and change over time.

In line with the first study, higher occupational complexity with people was associated with better performance on cognitive measures. However, contrary to that study, higher occupational complexity with data was also found to be associated with better cognitive outcomes and a slower annual rate of cognitive decline. Differences in the methodologies between the two studies may contribute to this inconsistency, but further research is needed. Of note, a greater proportion of Black and Latino participants were categorized in jobs with lowest complexity for

working with data and people.

These two studies add to an increasing body of research demonstrating that intellectually stimulating activities during midlife, such as complex work environments, may be associated with better cognitive outcomes among older adults. It's important to note that the Dictionary of Occupational Titles assigns scores according to job titles and does not capture individual variability within the same title. Further research to better understand the pathways through which different types of occupational complexity affect cognition in later life could help to create work environments that promote cognitive health and health equity.

ill. Some people develop other health issues, called complications, because of the flu. Complications can be mild, such as a sinus or ear infection, or more serious, like pneumonia.

Anyone can get sick from the flu, but some people are more likely to have complications. You are more at risk for flu and its complications if you:

Are age 65 or older Have certain medical conditions such as asthma, diabetes, or chronic kidney disease Have heart disease or have had a stroke Live in a nursing home or other long-term

care facility

Pregnant people and children younger than five years old are also more likely to get very sick from the flu. Flu vaccination is especially important for people in these higher-risk groups. Learn more about people at increased risk for flu and its complications. Why is the flu more dangerous for older

The flu is more dangerous for older adults for a few reasons. One reason is that the immune system — which helps your body fight infections — weakens as you age. For example, because your body is busy fighting off the flu, you might pick up a secondary infection such as pneumonia. A second reason is that older adults are also more likely to have other health conditions, like diabetes, that increase their risk for complications from the flu.

The good news is the flu vaccine reduces your risk of getting the flu and of getting seriously ill if you do get sick with the flu. Flu vaccination is especially helpful for people with chronic health conditions. For example, it has been linked to lower rates of heart problems (cardiac events) among people with heart disease and fewer hospitalizations among people who have chronic lung disease or diabetes. Learn more about the benefits of flu vaccination.

How does the flu spread?

The flu is contagious, which means it spreads from person to person. It mostly spreads through droplets in the air when people with flu cough, sneeze, or talk. It can spread from up to six feet away. Although it isn't as common, the flu can also spread from surfaces — for example, if you touch something the virus is on and then touch your nose, mouth, or eyes.

It's possible to spread the flu before you feel sick and when you have symptoms. Typically, people with the flu can spread it a day before, and up to a week after feeling sick. Young children and people with weakened immune systems may be able to spread the flu for even longer. If you or someone you know is sick with the flu, take steps to help prevent spreading the disease.



On Dec 21, fire units were dispatched to a person yelling for help in the Ventura River Bottom off of Main Street. · Urgent From PETA: Flood Survival Tips for Animals

Since your area is (was) under a flood warning and evacuation orders and warnings are in effect for parts of Ventura

County— will you include in your coverage a reminder that people should never leave dogs tethered or penned outside and always take their animal companions with them if they have to evacuate their homes?

Every time there's a natural disaster, many dogs and other companion animals are left outside to fend for themselves and even left behind when humans evacuate. Dogs kept tethered will swim to exhaustion and drownand there are tethered dogs everywhere. PETA's Animal Rescue Team has witnessed firsthand the trauma that animals endure when left behind to face floodwaters and flying debris. During previous storms, we have found dogs dead. We have also found them up to their necks in water, unable to sit or lie down, and in almost-submerged crates inside houses and seen animals who have been flung around by high winds. Animals are terrified in weather conditions such as these.

Will you please share this lifesaving information with your audience?

Keep all animals indoors with you if you choose not to evacuate. Never leave them tethered, penned, or crated.

If you evacuate, plan your destination in advance and don't leave animals behind or unsupervised in a car.

Be prepared: Use secure carriers, leashes, and harnesses. Bring along water and food bowls, a favorite toy, a blanket, a towel, and enough food for a week. Have your animals microchipped and attach legible ID tags securely to their collars.

Watch for other animals in trouble. If you see any animals in distress but can't help, note their location and call the authorities immediately.

As the days inch further and further into winter and frigid temperatures, Dr. Pavlovsky, director of the University of Illinois Veterinary Medicine South Clinic, has important winter safety tips for those caring for pets.

Cold Winter Temperatures

Just like humans, our pets can develop hypothermia, or a drop in their body temperature, after being outside in cold temperatures for too long. Hypothermia becomes even more likely for dogs that are housed outdoors.

"There is no straightforward answer to how cold is too cold and how long is too long to remain outside, because there are so many variables," Dr. Pavlovsky says. "For most dogs, it is probably safe to be outside for a very short period—just enough time to eliminate—even in extreme cold. However, to be safe, it's probably best to discuss this with your veterinarian, because there may be individual recommendations fitting one pet but not another."

Likewise, how long dogs can be outside in relatively cold temperatures depends on the individual pet. However, Dr. Pavlovsky points out, "It is reasonable to assume that prolonged direct contact with snow and ice is more likely to result in frostbite."

Owners should consider size and length of their pet's fur coat when gauging how long an animal can remain

outside. Shorter fur offers less protection against chilly temperatures, so those pets may benefit from some extra help.

"If your dog tolerates clothing and footwear, it's probably best to put those on," says Dr. Pavlovsky, "especially for short-haired and small breeds. These protections can help minimize heat loss and exposure. For example, good-quality footwear that does not cause discomfort can allow a dog to spend more time outdoors without getting frostbite on the feet."

· It is common for us all to indulge in some high-calorie foods during the holidays, but what about our pets? Can they join the feast? Oklahoma State University assistant professor of behavior science Dr. Leticia Fanucchi advises against it and offered five tips to consider when it comes to food and pets this holiday season:

The No. 1 culprit is my favorite item ...

Chocolate contains methylxanthines like theobromine and caffeine. These two are the reason why we love it so much, as these substances have a stimulant and calming effect all at the same time. However, chocolate is not well metabolized by pets, accumulating in the body and making them sick. Chocolate intoxication can be very serious and cause tremors, vomiting, diarrhea, agitation, increased heart rate and even seizures. Keep those chocolatey treats away from dogs and cats.

2. Grapes mean good luck for the new year in some cultures, but they're bad luck for pets.

Both fresh grapes or raisins, very common items in holiday dishes, can cause kidney disease in pets due to the tartaric acid present in them. The most common signs you will see are vomiting, diarrhea and increased water intake. Acute kidney disease is a serious medical emergency and time is crucial to start treatment with IV fluids if you want to save your pet's life. Keep the grapes in the fridge, and do not leave them spread around coffee tables or food trays. They are sweet and pets are attracted to sweet stuff.

3. Fatty foods

Are you a fan of roast turkey with gravy? So are pets! However, the fat contained in gravy and turkey skin ... not to mention bacon and butter, can cause a condition called pancreatitis. This acute disease can affect other organ systems such as the liver and kidneys, leading to more serious consequences such as blood clotting. Vomiting and diarrhea are the first signs, so do not ignore these signs especially if you know your pet stole that turkey leg or went to town in the gravy boat. Emergency help is paramount as pets can perish quickly from an acute pancreatitis crisis.

4. Who knew garlic and onions could be bad? But wait, bread rolls too?

Yes, garlic, onions and chives are healthy for people, but really bad for pets. Allium species are toxic and can cause hemolytic anemia, which means decreased red blood cells. Signs normally appear after a few days of ingestion and include vomiting, diarrhea, jaundice and lethargy. Yeast-risen foods are delicious, but also bad for pets. The yeast can ferment in the stomach and produce toxic levels of ethanol ... yes, alcohol! Ethanol toxicity leads to metabolic acidosis which makes the blood glucose drop significantly causing seizures, respi-


ratory depression and even cardiac arrest, so keep the bread in the pantry.

5. Last but certainly not least, sugar-free treats.

Pets cannot metabolize xylitol, the artificial sweetener in most sugar free foods, causing low blood sugar, which leads to ataxia (incoordination), seizures and even death from hypoglycemia. No sugar-free treats for pets this season ... or ever.

Several foods we love can be very harmful for our beloved pets, so let's get some special cat and dog treats for them this year and keep human food away from their reach. If you notice vomiting and diarrhea after the holiday, it is a sign your pet may have gotten into something it shouldn't have, so do not think twice, take them to the vet. Time is crucial for preventing long-term damage or death.

Attempt murder and assault with a deadly weapon

On Dec.16, at about 0006 hours, the Ventura Police Department Communications Center received several 911 calls from the area of 1300 Saratoga Ave about an unknown altercation. While speaking with Dispatchers, callers said they heard gunfire. Patrol officers arrived on scene within two minutes of the call. Officers were able to locate the victim and begin life-saving measures. Additional officers found the suspect and took him into custody without further incident. Ventura Police Crime Scene Investigators and Detectives are continuing the investigation. The victim is currently in stable condition. The suspect was identified as Stephen Wilkie 64-yearold Ventura resident and was arrested for Attempt Murder and Assault with a Deadly Weapon.

Deceased female victim

On December 17, the Ventura Police Command Center received a 911 call reference a female subject disturbing in the 200 block of Ute Ln. Upon arrival, patrol officers contacted the suspect Megan Frisbie 38-years-old. Frisbie lived nearby and made statements that led officers to believe a crime occurred inside of her residence. Officers entered Frisbie's residence and discovered a deceased female victim. Frisbie was transported to the police

station for questioning. Police detectives began investigating and later arrested Frisbie for 187 PC – Murder. Frisbie was transported and booked at the Ventura County Jail.

Frisbie has been charged with murder in the death of her mother. She has also been charged with felony elder or dependent adult abuse in connection with the death of Ann Bauman, 74 on Dec.11.. She remains in custody with bail set at \$1 million.

Stabbing arrst

On December 24, at 5am, the Ventura Police Command Center received a call of subjects fighting on California St. just south of Main St. Upon arrival, officers located a male adult who had just been the victim of a stabbing. Ventura Fire and AMR treated the victim's injuries on scene then transported him to a local hospital.

During their investigation officers learned that a group of subjects were involved in a fight, which ended when the suspect stabbed the victim with a knife. The suspect, identified as Jeremy Delgado (37 Years old / Ventura Resident) was still nearby and was arrested without incident.

Major Crime Detectives responded to assist with the investigation. Delgado was later booked at Ventura County Jail for 245(a)(1) PC- Assault with a Deadly Weapon. The victim is expected to recover from his injuries.



Some remarkable people rest at Ventura's Ivy

A visit to the Ivy Lawn Cemetery is a a journey back to the very roots of our history because many unique and special people rest here. As the fall Season is here cemeteries and graveyards are highlighted in advertisings and media at this time of year so a look at who rests at our 1917 era cemetery. The list is long and includes some amazing people. I will start with the most famous of the lot, once the richest man in Ventura County and a true mover and shaker from the world of politics.

US Senator Thomas R. Bard (1841-1915) The senator built Port Hueneme and sponsored a young George Patton for West Point.

Congressman General William Vandever (1811-1845) Union General who served under General Sherman in the Civil War and was part of the capture of Atlanta. Congressman Marion Cannon (1834-1920) Reformer, served in the 53rd Congress as a member of the now defunct Populist Party.

State Assemblyman Charles R. "Chuck" Imbrect, (1949-2000) Two term State Assemblyman and lawyer attended Ventura High School (a classmate of mine). He ran for State Senator but lost. Actress Ethel Clayton (1882-1966) She began her film career in 1909 with the movie Justified. A very beautiful starlet she aged well and made the transition into talkies playing wealthy, snobbish matrons in such films as Alan Ladd's The Blue Dahlia

Actress Bessie Eyton (1890-1965) She became a star on the New York stage before making the transition into silent

Actor John "Johnny" Leal (1905 -1980) A little person, he was blessed by a great singing voice that helped him find jobs on the circus and vaudeville stage.

Voice Actor Knox Manning (1905-1996) Voice Actor for many radio shows such as "Congo Bill", "The Desi Arnez Show," "The Phantom," "Batman" and "The New Adventures of Sherlock Holmes".

Ballplayer Charlie Hall (1887-1943) Born in Ventura he started playing local baseball making it into the big leagues as a pitcher at the age of 21. When he retired from baseball he joined the Ventura Police Department.

Ballplayer Fred Snodgrass (1887-1979) A noted outfielder he played for the New York Giants

Football player Eric Turner (1968-2000) Defensive linebacker he played for the Cleveland Browns and The Oakland Raiders.

Alexander Sarantos Tremolis (1914-1991) Car designer worked for Cord Automotive, Duesenberg, Ford as well as took part in the design of the innovative Tucker Automobile.

The Mass grave of the victims of the Saint Francis dam failure and flood on March 13, 1928. Over 500 people lost their lives that terrible night. Many of the bodies, battered beyond recognition, were recovered at the Santa Clara delta, they were buried at Ivy Lawn. Only a few were identified.



On Dec.22, fire units were dispatched to a traffic collision with extrication on Poli. Firefighters arrived within 5 minutes of dispatch to find a vehicle 100' over the side with 5 patients. Two engines and ladder truck worked together to safely rescue all 5 patients and safely get them back up on to the pavement. The local hospital was immediately notified to ensure we did not overwhelm any trauma centers. All patients were transported rapidly with fire personnel assisting assessment and treatment en route to ER.

Trash, Recyclables and Yard/Organic Waste Pick Up Information for the Christmas & New Year's Holidays

Since both Christmas and New Year's Day fall on Monday this holiday season, there will be a one day delay in the pick up of trash, recyclables and yard/organic waste the weeks of Dec. 25-30 and Jan. 1-6 in Ventura, Ojai and the surrounding areas.

For two weeks after Christmas, from Tuesday, Dec. 26, through Saturday, Jan. 6, residents may put out extra holiday waste curbside on collection day - up to two 50-gallon bags - free of charge. Customers in the unincorporated areas of Ventura County will have extra trash pickup through Saturday, Jan. 13.

Also, remember to recycle your Christmas tree by removing the ornaments, hooks, lights, tinsel, bows, nails and tree stand. Cut the tree into sections no more than 4 feet long and place in your yard/organics waste cart on your scheduled pickup day. Or, place the whole Christmas tree at the curb on collection day. Flocked trees can be recycled too!



Donate blood to help people in need during National Blood Donor Month

Did you know that a single car accident victim can require as many as 100 units of blood? Did you know that just one donation of blood could save 3 lives?

"Blood donations are especially needed in January to help after the drop in the blood supply over the holidays," according to, Natalie Uribe, Hospice Liasson at Assisted Home Health, and Hospice in Ventura. "One donation can help up to 3 patients. 1 in 7 patients entering the hospital will need a blood transfusion.

"Blood donors are urgently needed all month long to ensure blood is available when needed. On average, blood donors give blood less than twice a year. More people are needed to donate regularly up to six times per year for whole blood-to ensure an adequate supply is always available to help patients."

On January 11th Assisted Home Health & Hospice will be holding a community blood drive at Aegis Living from 12:00-4:00pm. Aegis' address is: 4020 Loma Vista Rd. Ventura. Assisted Home Health & Hospice will be partnering with Aegis and Ventura Post Acute (Skilled Nursing and Rehab. Center) and

Vatalant (Blood Donation Center).

Uribe said, "We are pleased to also be involved with Trader Joes, who donates fresh floral bouquets once a month that we bring to the various senior communities in Ventura. We are also looking forward to doing another annual Valentines event with local schools, that we started doing in 2023."

Vitalant (2223 Eastman Ave., Ste. A Ventura), said, "Because of blood donors, life does not stop. Patients are given a second chance thanks in part to blood donors. A 60-year-old man undergoing a triple coronary bypass needed two red cell units, two platelet units, and two plasma units. Acute myeloid Leukemia was the reason a 66-year-old woman needed one lifesaving red cell unit."

"There will be a raffle for prizes for people who donate on January 11th. Those who donate will also be getting a snack and something to drink," according to Uribe. Make a difference to help those in need of blood in the community.

Since I got involved keeping my finger on the pulse of our music community, the most important thing I've learned is that the music scene is a living entity. You have to nurture it. The venues (God love them) need to promote, the artists need to captivate and entertain, and just as importantly, us music loving fans need to support by not only showing up, but show up with our wallets opened. Several venues provide no cover charge, so they especially need your patronage; buy a beverage, order up some food, tell others about the great time you had, and please don't forget about the artists, especially our beloved singer/songwriters; buy their swag, order their music, leave a tip. I've said it before and I'll say it again, it takes three elements to make a music scene, the venues, the artists, and us music fans, together, we make Ventura Rock!

Now on to bringing in the New Year. Most venues will have a special celebration on Sunday, December 31, but not all at midnight. Some pub/ wine houses are celebrating the "UK" New Year at 4 pm, others at 9 pm aligning with the New York dropping of the ball in Time Square, but most will ring in 2024 at midnight our time with entertainment and party favors. My column (as well as VenturaRocks. com) only lists live music, so if you 591 Collection Blvd., Oxnard don't see a venue here (Bombay's, the Six and others), it doesn't mean they'll be closed, they'll most likely rock in the year with a DJ. No matter your preference, I recommend you take a look and see what's available, call the venue to secure reservations and find out if they'll have a cover charge so you'll be prepared. And speaking of being prepared, if you're planning to tie one on, I highly recommend you either have a designated driver, the phone number of a taxi service or have a rideshare app on your phone (Uber, Lyft).





A robust customer support system is used to manage one or many communication channels, including phone, email, and self-service. Utility billing representatives answer questions about billing, changes in water usage, and leaks. They also help customers start

Ventura awarded grant for bicycle and pedestrian safety program

The City of Ventura has secured nearly \$98,000 in grant funding from the California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) to enhance its Bicycle and Pedestrian Safety Program. Funding will support promoting safe practices for pedestrians and bicyclists and educational programs emphasizing the importance of sharing the road.

"We appreciate the ongoing commitment of the Office of Traffic Safety to support bicycle and pedestrian safety in Ventura," shared Public Works Director Phil Nelson. "We look forward to using this grant to strengthen our education initiatives for both our youth groups and community members."

The grant program will run through September 2024 and support a variety of activities focused on bicycle and pedestrian safety:

Bicycle training courses that educate youth on safe riding behaviors.

Helmet fitting inspections and distribution of helmets to those in need.

Community and school education presentations.

Community bike rides that encourage and teach riders safe riding skills. Pop-up events that promote the importance of visibility on roads with safety equipment such as reflective armbands/leg bands and bicycle headlights/taillights.

"Everyone deserves a safe environ-

ment to travel, regardless of how people get to places," OTS Director Barbara Rooney said. "The safety of people walking and biking on our roads is a high priority. Education is pivotal in creating a strong road safety culture that prioritizes traffic safety, especially for our most vulnerable road users."

The City of Ventura remains committed to prioritizing and encouraging healthy modes of transportation, such as biking and walking. The recent approval of the City's Active Transportation Plan by the City Council on Monday, December 4, aligns to provide improved mobility choices for community members. This grant funding serves to support and enhance these efforts.

The City Council recently approved adopting Ventura's new Active Transportation Plan (ATP), a long-term roadmap designed to provide more transportation options to everyone, especially those in underserved communities. It's part of the City's commitment to promote healthy ways of getting around, such as biking and walking. The plan includes important projects that blend with the Safe Routes to School Plan and the Complete Streets Technical Memo.

"By adopting the ATP, we're working towards our goal of creating safe, comfortable, connected, and easy-to-use walking and biking paths. This grant funding will help us put elements of the plan into action, making progress toward a more sustainable and accessible city over the next several years," stated Jeff Hereford, Principal Civil Engineer in Public Works.

Funding for this program was provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Admin-

and end water and wastewater service. As needed, they field calls that can range from a severed fire hydrant to a report of water waste.

The Utility Billing Team also includes three utility service representatives and a utility service lead. With the citywide installation of smart meters, it is no longer necessary to read each meter for each billing cycle, so this group is focused on helping customers with any water related issue. They perform the field work required to maintain meters and troubleshoot the hardware and software to ensure data from the smart meters is successfully transmitted. A utility billing supervisor oversees billing operations including rate changes and audits and coordinates new service. Finally, the Utility Billing Team is led by a utility billing manager, who assures that Ventura Water adheres to all state and federal laws and regulations related to providing water and wastewater service, and guides implementation of programs to help the team increase efficiency and improve customer relations.

Utility Billing Representative, Dillon Galarza joined Ventura Water two years ago, with seven years' previous experience in customer service. What Dillon most appreciates about his job is that everyone on the team truly wants to help the community and that he can rely on any one of them to support their common goal of providing excellent customer service. The most challenging part of his job is the emotional component of utility service billing, for example, having to give delinquent customers the news about late fees or shut offs. Dillon possesses an easy-going attitude which aids his capacity to change a potentially stressful problem into a solution. Fortunately, the

average number of shut offs per week is about 20 and service is typically restored within a day. Dillon mentions that dealing with software issues that come up when utilizing multiple programs can be tricky but invariably this cohesive team works through it.

ing the impact on local companies. It explores difficulties faced and solutions considered from the perspective of business owners. Topics include difficulties faced, solutions considered, and opinions on who should be responsible for addressing homelessness from a business perspective.

"We encourage everyone to participate so that diverse perspectives are included in our efforts to develop an inclusive and impactful Homelessness Plan."

Ventura acknowledges homelessness as a multifaceted issue affecting individuals, families, and the business community. Feedback from the surveys will be instrumental in crafting an effective strategy to address homelessness, aligning with the City Council's 2023-2024 goals of establishing a comprehensive City-wide homelessness plan. Residents and businesses are urged to participate actively, contributing valuable insights to inform policies, programs, and initiatives targeting the underlying causes of homelessness.
