# The demand for professional first responders can exceed availability

After over six weeks of emergency response training, 40 Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) students participated in their final practical exercise, a simulated earth-quake with multiple victims. They practices lifting vehicles, putting out fires, triaging the injured, and managing an incident.

In the aftermath of a major disaster, the demand for professional first responders can exceed availability. We are so grateful these Ventura and Santa Paula residents are more prepared and feel confident taking action.

This program equips residents with essential knowledge about potential local disasters and how to safely, swiftly, and responsibly respond. Participants will learn how to reduce fire hazards, set up medical treatment areas, assist responders, conduct light search and rescue, and more!

Completing the CERT program



requires 24 hours of training and each graduate will receive a certificate of completion, a manual, and a CERT disaster start-up pack containing a helmet, gloves, vest, and safety goggles.

After several months of wild weather and natural disasters, the city of Ventura is re-instituting their program called the Community Emergency Response Team.

It's a free program that trains civilians to respond to emergency situations before, or in place of, first responders, such as assessing the level of trauma, applying tourniquets, CPR, putting out fires and more. It's the first time the C.E.R.T. course has been offered since COVID-19 shut it down.

Ventura Police Department Mac Douglas said they received 93 applications for the course, showing that the community wants this kind of education.

"The fact of the matter is when we have a major incident, our first responders, as good as they are, are going to be overwhelmed," Douglas said. "So, the community needs to take more of a responsibility for their own preparedness and supporting themselves and their neighbors."


# Valdez Alley

# Restoring the Junipero Serra Statue: The Good News

Restoration efforts are underway to preserve the distinguished statue of Junipero Serra, now situated at the Mission Basilica San Buenaventura. The objective is to carefully remove dirt and red paint while safeguarding the original patina, seamlessly restoring the colors to their initial finish. The patina, which results from exposure to the elements, showcases the statue's aging and basic appearance. To prevent the emergence of a green tint often seen on older statues, an oil bronze finish is meticulously applied, ensuring it maintains its intended look since its creation in 1989 for Junipero Serra.

The restoration process encompasses several crucial elements. An evaluation of the statue's condition identifies areas in need of repair. Skilled expert Jerry Cranham employs specialized techniques, using gentle solvents and tools to eliminate dirt, grime, and pollutants, while stabilizing and reconstructing any damaged portions. The addition of a protective coating serves to guarantee the statue's durability. With Jerry's expertise, he places emphasis on historical accuracy and while preserving the statue's original features and historical integrity.

Jerry began the restoration project

the day it arrived at the Mission and careful observation showed red paint splatters on the statue. "Removal of red paint splatters entails the careful usage of an X-acto knife and scrapper to avoid scratching the statue and exposing its cast and metal." A mixture of linseed oil, denatured alcohol, mineral spirits, and Scotts Liquid Gold oil effectively eliminates surface dirt, including aged particles. Scratches are skillfully filled with wax and sealed to "maintain the statue's integrity". Jerry also uses a modified bees wax to restore "color and finish".

The natural patina, developed through atmospheric exposure, is respected, while the absence caused by a previous cleaning process is accounted for.

The statue's significance lies in its representation of the original 1930s installation, completed through the WPA Works Progress Administration (WPA) National project, constructed as part of President Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal initiative. The statue has a rich history in Ventura, having been recast in 1989, commemorating Junipero Serra's role as the city's founder and the namer of both the city and county of San Buenaventura.

Fr. Tom Elewaut, Pastor of the Mission Basilica San Buenaventura describes the final phases of restoration which includes the delivery of the original bronze plaque to the statue's site. A bronze sign will commemorate the original installation at City Hall in 1989, while a second plaque will display the date of installation at the Mission in March

2024. Landscapers will meticulously incorporate vegetation and rocks to accentuate the statue's surroundings. The base will be polished to a dark black, resembling marble. Completion of the final phase is anticipated by April or May.

# Ventura unknown Historic Adobe

Built as early as 1846 the Rodriguez Adobe served as the main house of the Rancho San Miguelito. It could have housed Don Ramon "Nacho" Rodriguez and his family while a larger adobe was built near the mouth of the Ventura River. That adobe sadly fell victim to floods that occasionally plague our county.


It may have been built by Chumash "adobero" ( adobe builder), musician and vaquero Juan de Jesus Tumamait. He is believed to be the last Chumash Elder to live in that structure.

In the 1930's the land was purchased by Shell Oil Company and they restored the old house to be used as an office for the oil fields. They added a tile roof (original may have been reeds or wooden shingles) and installed cement floors.

The Rodriguez Adobe stands today on Shell Road and is being used as rental property. No plaque or monument marks the location of the adobe.

A study of the site seems to confirm its early age—the doors and windows line up with the measurements of a Spanish Vara Stick and not a Yankee yard stick. It is Ventura's forth still-standing adobe. The others are The Mission San Buenaventura Church (1809), The Olivas Adobe (1847) and the Ortega Adobe (1857).

The Rodriguez Adobe isn't open to the public, but perhaps it will be in the future when this unknown landmark will be recognized for its historic value.

# Ivor has lived in Ventura for the past 44 years

On March 23, the Ventura Breeze presented Ivor Davis at Portside Ventura Harbor where he introduced his latest book 60th anniversary Beatles and Me On Tour. Breeze publisher Sheldon was the moderator for the event.

Ivor, who has lived in Ventura for the past 44 years entertained the approximately 50 in attendance sharing his remarkable career and wit. An entertaining Q&A followed his presentation.

Over more than half a century as a writer for the London Daily Express and the Times of London, British born Ivor covered major stories in North America. He penned a weekly entertainment column for the New York Times Syndicate for over 15 years, interviewing some of the biggest names in show business, from Cary Grant to Elizabeth Taylor, Richard Burton to Tom Cruise and Muhammad Ali.

In 1962 he was smuggled onto the campus of the riot-torn University of Mississippi when James Meredith became the first black student ever to be enrolled Three years later Davis was in the front lines as Los Angeles' Watts riots erupted.

In 1964, Davis was the only British daily newspaper correspondent to cover The Beatles' first American tour from start to finish, given unparalleled access to John, Paul, George and Ringo.

Davis covered Robert Kennedy's 1968 presidential bid and was in the kitchen in the Ambassador Hotel the night Senator Kennedy was assassinated. He was one of the Boys on the Bus chronicling the life of actor-turned-politician Ronald Reagan, first in his campaign for governor of California, then for

president. He always seemed to be at the right place at the right time.

He was a co-author of the 1969 political book Divided They Stand, which chronicled the Presidential election; and witnessed some of the biggest trials in American history: and, in 1976, he was in San Francisco to see heiress Patty Hearst convicted of robbery after being kidnapped by the Symbionese Liberation Army.

Over more than half a century as a writer for the London Daily Express and the Times of London, Ivor covered major events in North America. He penned a weekly entertainment column for the New York Times Syndicate for over 15 years.

Ivor's first-hand, insider's memoir, the award winning The Beatles and Me On Tour: 60th Anniversary Edition is a fascinating travel back in time where for the first time he chronicles, frankly and humorously, 34 days with the world's most famous band on the road—at a critical moment in the history of rock and roll. His new book contains photographs from some of the world's pre-eminent Beatle photographers--as well a wealth of fascinating new details about the Fab Four.

His new true crime book, "The Devil in My Friend: The Inside Story of a Malibu Murder." It is an account of the famous Eighties trial of Malibu engineer Frederick George Roehler, who was convicted of the murder of his wife and young stepson after an almost year-long trial in the Santa Barbara Courthouse in May 1982. The killings took place close by—at Santa Cruz Island. The book will be published on May 7th.

Now in her sixth season with the Kansas City Chiefs as the Player Engagement Coordinator, Candice has had the opportunity to celebrate three Super Bowl victories with the team, including kissing the Lombardi Trophy, a moment she cherishes.

After graduating from Ventura High School, Candice pursued higher education, earning her Bachelor of Science degree from California State University, Sacramento and her Master of Arts form the University of Nebraska where she also competed on the Track and Field teams, earning two conference championships in the High Jump. She was a Graduate Assistant in Equipment in Olympic Sport at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln before joining the Chiefs. In her current role, she focuses on player's personal and professional development, financial education, and

continuing education.

#### **Defining Regenerative Agricul**ture in California

The California Department of Food and Agriculture is currently in the process of defining what the term regenerative agriculture means. Rachel Soper, Associate Professor of Sociology at California State University, Channel Islands, will explain all sides of the debate, drawing on public comments given during listening sessions and working group meetings to illustrate the point of view of those who think organic should be the baseline to regenerative, and those who think regenerative should be more inclusive than organic.

Dr. Rachel Soper's publications are on the experiences of indigenous farmers in Ecuador, Black urban gardeners in San Diego, and farmworkers in Oxnard. She examines how each group fits into alternative food movements for food sovereignty and food justice. Dr. Soper is currently writing a book about sustainable, organic, and regenerative farmers in Ventura County. 



# Ventura County Ballet and Museum of Ventura County launch ballet collaboration



# Local Partnering Organizations Launch Free Mobile Vision Clinic

In a groundbreaking initiative aimed at expanding access to vision care for local underserved populations, leading community organizations Rotary International, Lions Clubs International, SEE International, Westminster Free Clinic, and The Salvation Army, announced the launch of a mobile vision clinic.

This innovative service made its debut with a ribbon-cutting ceremony on March 20, 2024, at 11:30 AM, located at 650 S Petit Ave, Ventura, CA, where lunch was served to attendees. The event featured keynote speaker Matt Levere, County Supervisor, as well as personal testimonies from a few

organizational representatives, such as Sandra Adelante, Optician Technician and Sabriana Marrufo, from the Spirit of Santa Paula. Local KVTA radio personality Tom Spence was The Master of Ceremonies.

The need for mobile services became apparent following the organizations' opening of three free vision clinics across the community. After opening the first clinic in Ventura in 2018, services were expanded through two more clinics, one opening in Oxnard in 2021, and another in Thousand Oaks in 2023. Despite these expansions, it was clear that transportation issues and other



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barriers prevented many community members from accessing the much-needed vision care services offered at these clinics. This led to the idea of a mobile clinic, capable of reaching patients directly in their areas.

Thanks to many generous donations and the support of the partnering organizations, a van was purchased and converted to accommodate medical equipment.

Following the ribbon cutting ceremony, the mobile clinic began operations.

The mobile unit will replace the traditional brick-and-mortar setup at the Ventura walk-in and will be

stationed outside the Salvation Army every Tuesday. It will also periodically offer services at the Swap Meet Justice in Oxnard, the Santa Paula Westminster Free Clinic, and many other local events throughout the Central Coast.

Together in partnership, Rotary International, Lions Clubs International, SEE International, Westminster Free Clinic, and The Salvation Army, are committed to providing vision care to underserved communities throughout the Central Coast. This program prepared us to be smart business owners who focus on the growth

and operations of our businesses, giving us valuable educational, administrative and financial tools."

Another graduate, Marisa Aj Tobar, arrived in the United States from Guatemala in 2008 with what she describes as a "suitcase full of dreams and goals". She started out taking the bus to clean houses, worked her way up to supervisory positions on commercial cleaning sites which was what gave her the idea to start her own business. Today Marisa runs her own small business, "Marisa's Housekeeping Services" which has other employees and a waiting list. Marisa said that "coming to WEV was about finding guidance, education, the advice to grow, but above all it was about finding the hope and reaffirmation that I could realize my dreams. WEV is the life jacket I needed to jump into the water. My goal is to grow my business so I can employ mothers who would benefit from a flexible schedule that will allow them to have time with their families."

We established a friendship that has involved regular coffee discussions on topics that often turn into debates. Two things are characteristic of a serious talk with Phil; he is well read and backs up any statement with facts. Secondly, we can discuss controversial topics from two different points of view without getting upset - now that's a rare friend.

Phil and his wife Dea have been in Ventura since 1995. Phil, a physicist, retired from the Department of Energy 13 years ago after a career involving nuclear radiation safety. Dea (USC PhD) retired several years ago from the Ventura County Sheriff's Crime Lab. They have 3 grown children, two boys, a daughter and 5 grandchildren.

Regarding retirement, Phil says he's happy and enjoys the leisure time he has to spend more time with his family and his many hobbies and projects. Currently he's occupied with reading, watching old movies, setting up a ham radio operation after passing the federal exam, writing a play about witches in Ojai, learning German for a trip to Germany and playing poker. His advice

on the latter item is "Don't draw to an inside straight". He remains interested in travel and adventure, be it in Califor-

Looking back at his life, Phil cites the high and low of his years. The high would be enlisting in the Marine Corp and getting married to Dea. On the challenging side has been a diagnosis of Parkinson's Disease. His advice for a good life is "Love your family and keep meeting new friends". As to principles to live by, Phil counts the Code of Chivalry and the Catholic religion. Having been around Phil for many years, I would also add love of country to his strong beliefs.

# Fate had another plan for Patricia Caloia

Patricia Caloia had two choices after graduating from Elsinore High School. Did she want to be a nurse or a teacher? After four years at UCSB, she was qualified to teach secondary English and Math. She received a Singer sewing machine and a Betty Crocker cookbook for graduation. All she needed to set up housekeeping was a husband.

But during the graduation process,

fate had another plan. She was handed her student computer punch cards for the administration office. Fascinated by the idea of holes that could spawn information, she studied them until she deciphered what each said. Inspired by an acquaintance studying computer technology, Caloia snuck into a programming class. The rest, as they say, was history.

"In 1962, computers weren't common. My parents were shocked that I wanted to be a computer programmer," Caloia says. "Programming was a tedious, repetitive task eventually relegated as women's work. But when my folks realized I was making more money than my dad, they came around."

She started at Douglas Aircraft programming business applications and later moved to TRW. "I became head of an all-male group that maintained systems for TRW's business sector." Caloia transferred to the scientific sector supporting Federal Aviation Administration contracts. That led to the FAA's technical center in New Jersey. Still following FAA contracts, she wound up in Camarillo on loan to Unisys. Loving the coast since her UCSB days, she purchased a hillside home in Ventura, but Unisys lost the contract.

Needing income, Pat bought into the candy vending machine business. She traveled around Ventura County stocking machines, collecting coins and baking cookies with broken M&Ms.

Fortunately, a former FAA employee started an air traffic control software consulting company and asked Caloia to help maintain the ATC software at England's CAA-equivalent to the FAA. Excited to live overseas, it was also an awesome opportunity for her young son.

# Free services provided to seniors and to people with disabilities in Ventura County

"Every program we offer at the Ventura County Area Agency on Aging (VCAAA) is free, with no charge," according to Roger Horne, Public Information Officer at the VC Area Agency on Aging. "We have a 'No Wrong Door Policy,' which means if an older adult, a person with disabilities, or a caregiver

call needing help, but is not sure of what services are in the community to help them, we will first try to connect them with our programs if we can. If not, we will try to refer them to other agencies that can assist them.

"The Information & Assistance team at our agency takes the initial phone call from someone who calls asking for assistance. A social worker figures out what that person's needs are to help them out. Our overall goal is to help people to stay in their own home, since people do better by staying in their own homes, while keeping them safe and healthy."

Some of the various types of programs provided by the Ventura County Area Agency on Aging include: 1) Transportation; 2) the Senior Nutrition Program; 3) Digital Services; 4) Health Insurance Counseling; 5) Employment; 6) Housing through HomeShare; 7) Fall Prevention, and 8) LiveWell (annual publication).

Free transportation is provided for those who are 60 years old or older, along with those, of any age, who have an ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) card through a free bus pass. Those who are 65 years old or older can get free Dial-A-Ride tickets to use for transportation. Medi-rides may also be available to individuals who have no other way to get to a medical appointment.

The Senior Nutrition Program funds congregate meals at various senior centers throughout the county. Seniors can get free meals, or give a suggested donation of \$3 for a meal. "There is also a meal delivery program for those who are homebound. Some receive the same meals that the senior centers serve,"

according to Horne. "At the VCAAA, we send out boxes that have a week's or month's amount of food in them."

"Digital resources," according to Horne, "help to deal with the 'Digital Divide,' by offering education. GetSetUp offers classes for older adults in which they can learn about anything that may interest them. Trualta offers free online support and training for caregivers. To sign up for these free services, first go to the VCAAA website at www.vcaaa.org, and click onto 'Digital Resources."

For those who need free help with Medicare, Horne said, "We offer health insurance counseling through our HICAP department by giving one-on-one help, and through giving presentations to various groups. This is unbiased help to support older adults who need it."

Employment help for seniors is also offered. The Senior Community Service Employment Program assists low-income individuals to get back into the workforce. Help on the www.vcaaa. org website is available through a video done by the Workforce Development Committee, which is part of the Advisory Council for the VC Area Agency on Aging: 'Get That Job!' The committee also recently did a job fair in Eastern Ventura County. A job fair in Western Ventura County is in the works.

"Housing can be difficult, especially with the high costs of housing within Ventura County," according to Horne. "HomeShare is a program that matches home seekers with home providers. Some people may have a house that is too big for them. We help them to find compatible people to rent a room, who may be able to help them with various things around their homes."

The Fall Prevention program aims to help people who have fallen, or who are fearful of falling, by offering several evidence-based classes that are aimed at keeping people on their feet.

"LiveWell, which is an annual publication, has various interesting articles that we think older adults, caregivers, and people with disabilities would want to read," according to Horne. "It also has listings of agencies throughout the county that deal with topics like: 1) Health; 2) Legal; 3) Food; 4) Caregiving; 5) Community Resources; and, 6) Transportation."



- People sometimes conclude that cats are unfriendly, unwilling to learn or domineering, but their characteristics have origins in their evolution and continue to be influenced by how humans treat them, say veterinarians. "There are so many misconceptions that cats are spiteful, or cats are being jerks, that they're being aloof or asocial," says cat behaviorist Luke Hollenbeck, "but cats are trying to communicate with us all the time, and people have to be really good at understanding that."

#### Service Dogs Lead to Fewer Seizures in Resistant Epilepsy by Eve Bender

Working with medically trained service dogs is associated with a 31% reduction in seizures compared with usual care in treatment-resistant epilepsy, a new study showed.

Investigators speculate that the dogs may ease participants' stress, leading to a decrease in seizure frequency, although they note this relationship warrants more study.

"Despite the development of numerous antiseizure medications over the past 15 years, up to 30% of people with epilepsy experience persistent seizures," study author Valérie van Hezik-Wester, MSc, of Erasmus University Rotterdam in Rotterdam, the Netherlands, said in a press release.

The unpredictable nature of seizures is one of the most disabling aspects of epilepsy, Hezik-Wester added. Seizure dogs are trained to recognize seizures and respond when they occur.

"The tasks that these dogs perform along with their companionship may reduce seizure-related anxiety, also potentially reducing seizures caused by stress, the most common trigger for seizures," she said.

The study included 25 individuals with medically refractory epilepsy who had an average of two or more seizures per week, with seizure characteristics associated with a high risk for injuries or dysfunction. They also had to be able to care for a service dog.

All were observed under usual care, which included antiseizure medications, neurostimulation devices, and other supportive therapies. Participants could then choose to work with a service dog that had completed socialization and obedience training or be assigned a puppy they would train at home.

The median follow-up was 19 months with usual care and 12 months with the intervention. Participants recorded seizure activity in diaries and completed surveys on seizure severity, quality of life, and well-being every 3 months. Daily seizure counts were converted to obtain cumulative seizure frequencies over 28-day periods.

Of the 25 original participants, six discontinued trial participation before the end of follow-up, four of whom left the study due to difficulty with dog care and training.

Participants receiving usual care reported an average of 115 seizures per 28-day period, while those with trained service dogs recorded 73 seizures in the same period, or a 37% difference between groups.

Researchers found that participants had an average of 31% fewer seizures during the past 3 months when they had seizure dogs, with seven participants achieving a 50%-100% reduction in seizures.

The number of seizure-free days increased from an average of 11 days per 28-day period before receiving a service dog to 15 days after working with a dog.

Scores on the EQ-5D-5L, which measures perceived health problems, decreased on average by 2.5% per consecutive 28-day period with the intervention, reflecting an increase in generic health-related quality of life (0.975; 95% CI, 0.954-0.997).

"These findings show that seizure dogs can help people with epilepsy," said van Hezik-Wester. "However, we also found that this partnership with seizure dogs might not be the right fit for everyone, as some people discontinued their participation in this program. More research is needed to better understand which people can benefit from working with seizure dogs."

In an accompanying editorial, Amir Mbonde, MB, and Amy Crepeau, MD, of Mayo Clinic in Phoenix, Arizona, noted the findings add to a growing body of work on the effectiveness of service dogs in reducing seizure frequency.

"In addition to improved seizure control, the EPISODE study demonstrated the benefit of seizure dogs in enhancing the quality of life for

patients, a crucial component of comprehensive epilepsy care," they wrote.

In prior studies, seizure dogs have identified an odor that a person emits before a seizure in up to 97% of people, they noted, adding that this ability "offers immense clinical benefits to people with epilepsy, enhancing their independence, social engagement,

employment opportunities, self-confidence, and thus quality of life."

The study was funded by the Netherlands Organization for Health Research and Development and Innovatiefonds Zorgverzekeraars. Smith and Jones reported no relevant financial relationships. The authors reported no disclosures.



# Ventura Harbor celebrates \$8.4M in dredging

The Ventura Port District proudly announces the commencement of the annual dredging for Ventura Harbor's entrance channel, an annual program that is critical to the harbor community and made possible through the dedicated efforts of Congressman Salud Carbajal, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, and their contractor, Manson Construction.

This significant undertaking underscores the recognition of Ventura Harbor's importance as California's largest commercial fishing harbor most years. The annual dredging of the federal navigation channel is an essential action that ensures the harbor remains navigable, safe, and prosperous for the industries and boaters that rely on our harbor's working waterfront.

"The annual dredging project not only facilitates safer maritime navigation in the Ventura Harbor but is essential to maintain the economic vitality of commercial fishing, recreational boating, tourism, and all of our waterfront business partners," shares Brian Pendleton, Ventura Port District General Manager.

Congressman Carbajal's efforts on the Fiscal Year 2024 budget have secured \$8,471,000 for the Corps to perform Ventura Harbor's dredging program which will commence in the next few weeks. Further, his advocacy has seen the President's Budget request include \$8,796,000 for Ventura Harbor in Fiscal Year 2025, which puts Ventura in a very strong position for next year's dredging as well.

"The Central Coast's harbors and ports are central to our community's livelihood and lifestyle. Whether it's the family enjoying a Saturday sail or a fisherman collecting their daily catch, having safe and operational channels and waterfronts are crucial to our region," said Rep. Carbajal. "I'm proud to have secured these important funds for the Central Coast in the negotiations over this year's budget agreement, and I will continue to work with our local officials to ensure their needs are met as we face more extreme weather patterns and other abnormal threats to the

Central Coast's harbors and ports."

Michael Blumenberg, Chair of the Ventura Port District's Board of Port Commissioners, said "Congressman Salud Carbajal continues to play a vital role in securing the federal funding necessary for our Harbor dredging project each year. His efforts have been crucial in ensuring federal recognition and support for the harbor's economic and public benefit to the region".

The collaboration, between the Ventura Port District, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, and their contractor, Manson Construction, continues to demonstrate the best in federal and local partnerships. Along with keeping the harbor navigable, the dredge efforts provide high-quality sand used to nourish the public beaches in the Ventura Harbor for beach goers.

"As we recognize the importance of this dredging project, we extend our deepest gratitude to Congressman Salud Carbajal for his unwavering support and dedication. His advocacy continues to contribute to the success and dependability of our working waterfront," Blumenberg said.

The Ventura Port District invites the community to come and see the renourished beaches at the conclusion of the project. In the meantime, the public is asked to be mindful of the construction activities in the water and on the beach and to respect the presence of protected species including the Western Snowy Plover, Least Terns, and California Grunion and their essential habitat, which benefits from the responsibly managed sand placement of this project.

"These improvements underscore our commitment to modernizing services as we strive to enhance customer experience and satisfaction," remarked Mayor Joe Schroeder. "With the updated permit counter at City Hall, we are dedicated to meeting the evolving needs of our community, making the permit process more efficient and user-friendly, and ensuring easier access to City staff for questions and information."

The recent enhancement to permit services introduces online appointment booking for all permitting needs, such as building, electrical, mechanical, and plumbing services. Customers, businesses, and contractors can effort-lessly schedule appointments online to address permit or development inquiries with Permit Services, Building and Safety, Ventura Water, Fire Prevention,

Land Development, and Planning. This streamlined process simplifies departmental reviews and ensures individuals receive real-time updates and seamless communication with city staff.

Since the inception of Ventura OPS three years ago, the City of Ventura has seen a significant increase in permit distribution. The number of permits has risen from 4,821 in 2021 to a projected 6,600+ in 2024, reflecting a growth rate of approximately 36.9%. Additionally, with the creation of Insta Permits, tailored for express and solar projects, the permit process has been streamlined by automating issuance upon submission and payment. # The Shroud Raises Questions at Elite

Some questions are meant to be posed repeatedly throughout time, the answers to which may never come. This is the basis for The Shroud, now playing on the main stage at the Elite Theater in Oxnard.

Written by Michael Kassin and directed by Brian Robert Harris, the play presents a stirring experience as the capable cast wrestles with theories, religion, possible explanations and flat-out mysteries. For more than 700 years, historians and scientists have battled for superiority over the linen cloth espoused to have covered Jesus after his crucifixion. Is it fact or fiction? Or perhaps a little of both? The biggest

question remains unanswered.

In this play, Dr. Laura Gibson (Theresa Secor) is presenting a symposium on the "facts" of the shroud. Attending the presentation are two colleagues from Los Alamos National Laboratory of New Mexico. One of them, Red Broida (Brad Strickland), makes his intense skepticism known, causing quick a ruckus. As a steadfast atheist who had worked on the development of the atomic bomb, Red needs more proof than faith can provide. After some confrontation, he is invited to become part of a scientific team to further investigate the shroud by applying modern testing techniques.

During this team's exploration, Red's mental strength is repeatedly challenged by his memories of personal failure, his colleague, John (Lawrence Gund), a faith healer with demons of her own (Cas Weisberg) and another gentleman from Los Alamos (Ronald Rezac). Erin De Horta appears briefly as Meg, Red's former wife

In a revealing talk-back with the author after the performance I attended, Mr. Kassin related that his goal in writing this piece was to capture the release and growth one might experience of inner transformation. One way was allowing the audience to follow Red in his spiritual journey when he comes to grips with the absolute faith some hold than can be healing even without proof, to his realization that the invention of the atomic bomb may have had a deleterious effect world-wide and that he was a major factor in that outcome. Other characters experience transformations they need to move forward. Each one

carries a revelation.

The play causes one to reflect on many different levels. Even though the shroud itself is a focal point, the play is about much more than that. It is about inner struggles, faith versus fear, and coming to know yourself and what you believe in. It is about dealing with choices made and the resulting consequences.

The cast manages the weighty material well. Cas Weisberg delivers a strong and compelling performance. She brings her own identity as an Indigenous Two-Spirit actor into the already complex character of Laura with a knowing eye. The blend works especially well in the context of this multi-layered piece.

Theresa Secor, a familiar persona in Ventura County theaters also portrays her character with ease and a bit of humor

Ye was given limited tasks but quickly came to the conclusion that what they were working on was not a weapon but a communication device.

Ye learned it was designed to communicate with alien life and devised a plan to magnify the signal using the sun, though one of the guards took credit. Ye waited for the right opportunity to be alone to launch the signal and shockingly got a reply repeatedly saying "Do Not Answer" and that she was lucky a pacifist on the other end received her message from a world that would conquer Earth without hesitation. Ignoring this warning Ye replied "Come. We cannot save ourselves. I will help you conquer this world." forever changing the course of history on Earth.

Around the time of Vera's death, Auggie started seeing a countdown and was given a message to quit work on her nanofiber project. Then a strange woman approached her asking "Has the universe ever winked at you?" telling her to be outside at midnight. Auggie told Saul about the interaction and asked him to be with her at midnight. Sure enough, all the stars in the sky started blinking in what Saul thought seemed to be a code that exactly matched Auggie countdown.
