# Oceana and Blancpain Launch Ocean Expedition to Explore and Document Ocean Biodiversity

Beginning April 29, Oceana - in partnership with prestigious Swiss watchmaker, Blancpain - embarked on a five-day ocean expedition around the Northern Channel Islands off California to explore and document biodiversity that makes ocean waters off the state globally important. The expedition will further Oceana's campaigns to restore ocean abundance and Blancpain's commitment to ocean exploration and conservation.

Southern California boasts undersea geology unlike any other off the U.S. West Coast, marked by a series of faults, banks, and underwater mountains (seamounts). This geology, combined with cold nutrient-rich waters that upwell from the deep make this region a global biological hotspot supporting

# Ventura River Trail Earmarked for \$5 Million of Improvements

Ventura Mayor Joe Schroeder, Councilmembers, key stakeholders, and agency representatives gathered at the Westpark Community Center on Thursday, May 2, to celebrate the groundbreaking of the Ventura River Trail Improvements Project.

The first groundbreaking event in several years, the project is made possible by a \$5 million grant from Caltrans as part of the Clean California program.

"Cal Trans is a proud partner with the City of Ventura by providing nearly \$5 million through the Clean California local grant program in an effort to enhance the community to improve space for walking and recreation," noted Caltrans Senior

# Empowering Ventura County Youth: Workforce Development Board Launches Revitalized Youth Program

Ventura County NextGen, The Workforce Development Board of Ventura County's new youth-focused program, is helping local youth and young adults overcome barriers to employment and embark on successful careers.

The most recently available numbers show that only 88.1% of Ventura County high school seniors graduated in 2022; while this is slightly higher than California's average graduation rate, it still leaves nearly 12% of Ventura County youth exiting school without their high school diploma. Those with lower household incomes have significantly lower graduation rates than those with higher incomes. This demographic already deals with

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the difficulties of entering the workforce at a young age. However, their participation in the workforce is down nearly 3% nationally when comparing February 2024 to February 2020 (Bureau of Labor Statistics).

Recognizing this critical need in Ventura County, the Workforce Development Board of Ventura County (WDBVC) is seeking to pave the way for youth and young adults as they

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

# Know Your Zone: City of Ventura hosts community workshop to educate residents on new Evacuation Plan

With a firm commitment to saving lives, the City of Ventura is spearheading efforts to ensure residents are well-informed about local evacuation procedures. Recognizing the complexity of the various hazards that could prompt evacuations in Ventura, the City has meticulously divided Ventura into 15 evacuation zones, considering factors such as hazard vulnerability areas, population density, and major thoroughfares.

To educate residents on the new evacuation plan, evacuation zones, shelter locations, and transportation

assembly points, community members and business owners are invited to join Emergency Services Manager Mack Douglass for a community workshop on Saturday, May 18, 2024, from 10:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m. at the Ventura Police Department, located at 1425 Dowell Drive in Ventura.

The workshop will cover information about the 15 designated evacuation zones, potential shelter locations and transportation assembly points.

"With Ventura's unique geography, location, and limited ingress and egress



routes, it is crucial for residents to be aware of their designated evacuation zones in case of an emergency," said Police Chief Darin Schindler. "By empowering residents with the knowledge and resources needed to respond effectively, we can streamline evacuation processes and save lives."

The workshop is just one part of the outreach efforts. Additional presentations will be made at neighborhood community councils, ensuring accessibility to all residents. These presentations will cover essential details and provide opportunities for questions and feedback.

Residents are invited to attend the following meetings:

East Ventura Community Council: Thursday, May 16 at 7:00 p.m. on Zoom Downtown Ventura Partners: Thursday, June 27, at 9:00 a.m. at the Crowne Plaza

The Evacuation Plan was developed based on feedback from over 900 residents who completed the Emergency Preparedness Community Survey in 2023. Survey responses provided diverse insights on all-hazards evacuation preparedness, including familiarity with current evacuation routes, emergency shelters, transportation options, preferred communication methods, and overall readiness.

The completed Emergency Evacuation Plan is inclusive of diverse populations, recognizing the needs of individuals with visual or hearing impairments, chronic medical conditions, language barriers, disabilities, access, and functional needs.

Landscape Architect Vathana Chy, adding that "Two of my favorite things to do are biking and hiking, so this is a great place!

"The Ventura River Trail Improvement Project is one of the many Clean California local grant programs and safety-related projects intended to clean up and bring beauty to underserved communities. The goal is to transform our public space into areas that we can be proud of and have a sense of place," noted Chy, who commended the audience for embracing the Clean California spirit and sharing a vision for an improved active transportation network

"We look forward to partnering on projects here in the future," he added.

Improvements to the Ventura River Trail, which travels along state route 33, connecting the westside of Ventura to Ojai and the ocean, include repaving the city's 1.8-mile stretch of the bike trail, adding solar lighting, and installing trash cans, bike maintenance stations, landscaping, art installations, and various trail user amenities.

"We are dedicated to sustainable recreation and fostering connection within our community," said Mayor Schroeder,

expressing appreciation and thanks to all involved with the project.



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# Local Society Hosts "Super Bowl of Gem Shows"

The Ventura Gem & Mineral Society (VGMS) is hosting "Seaside Gems at Ventura," the National Gem, Mineral, Fossil & Jewelry Show May 24-26 at the Ventura County Fairgrounds from 10am–5pm, Friday & Saturday and 10am–4pm, Sunday. The show is open to the public and features family-friendly events and exhibits. Admission is \$8, with children under 13 free with a paid adult. (Note: the Fairgrounds also charges a parking fee.)

VGMS is celebrating its 80th anniversary and was selected from 600 similar nonprofit educational societies to host a truly big national event, namely, the Annual Show & Convention of the American Federation of Mineralogical Societies. They hope to welcome over 3,000 "rockhounds" as they converge on the Ventura County Fairgrounds for what's described as "the Super Bowl of gem shows."

This year's "Super Bowl" organizers invite the general public to enjoy educational displays, dealers and demonstrators, speakers, silent auctions, raffles, and kids activities. For instance, a beautiful gold specimen will be one of the featured displays. Discovered by a young girl in Placer County in 1871, the California Golden Bear nugget is normally housed at the Los Angeles County Museum of Natural History but will be on temporary display at the show alongside samples of our ultra-rare State Gemstone, sapphire-blue benitoite.

Nearly 100 additional educational exhibits are expected of hand-crafted jewelry and carvings, gemstones and crystals, minerals, fossils, and fluorescent rocks that glow in the dark. These exhibits have been assembled from private collections and crafters throughout California and the U.S. and should be exceptional, given that over half will be entered into refereed competition vying for trophies.


Displays will be augmented by dem-

onstrators illustrating how rough stones are crafted into gleaming gems. Watch lapidary artists at work and question them for tips to try yourself. They'll demo lapidary arts like gemstone grinding, carving and polishing; jewelry-making techniques; bead stringing; silver work, and fossil prep.

Kids are sure to enjoy the Kids Booth. A variety of interactive activities are free or priced to match a child's budget. These include a Dino Dig; coloring activities; a spinning wheel where every spin wins a prize; grab bags filled with rocks, minerals, and fossils; "create-your-own-collection" and a sand-sifting activity. A prospecting club - Valley Prospectors of San Bernardino - will show kids and adults alike how to pan for gold just like a Forty-Niner. Teachers will find free teacher resources, including rock samples and packets of educational materials at the show Welcome Booth.

To get a jump on Holiday shopping, 50+ vendors will be selling all manner of rock-related materials: rough agate, jasper, marble, and more to cut, carve, and polish; gemstone rough (amethyst, opal, emerald, sapphire, ruby, tourmaline, jade) to cab or to facet; cut and polished gemstones ready to be mounted into jewelry settings; lapidary and jewelry tools and equipment; minerals and gemstone crystals and meteorites for collectors, whether beginners or advanced; fossils and petrified wood from around the world; gem-, mineral-, and fossil-related publications; beads of all sorts; stone carvings, spheres, and other sculpted works for home decor; and fine custom jewelry ready to wear.

In addition to the professional vendors, hourly silent auctions will be held throughout the show for lapidary rocks and gemstones, minerals, geodes, petrified wood, and fossils. And don't miss the raffle! Those purchasing winning tickets will take home great



prizes that include high quality jewelry; mineral and fossil specimens; and more-including a one hundred dollar bill.

A Speakers Series features nontechnical lectures with talks on topics such as meteorites, amber, an Australian gold mine, the geology of the Channel Islands off-shore from Ventura, and beautifully banded Condor Agates from Patagonia by the man who introduced them into the U.S. market.

VGMS and the American Federation of Mineralogical Societies are dedicated to encouraging interest in geology, mineralogy, paleontology, the lapidary and jewelry arts through education, activities, and exhibitions, such as this nationwide show, which circulates around the US and comes to California only once every seven years. AFMS is composed of local societies and clubs from throughout the US. AFMS and its affiliated societies are 501(c)3 nonprofit, educational organizations. Proceeds from their shows go toward educational endeavors, such as scholarship funds for undergraduate and graduate college students and a free badge program for children. During an Awards Banquet Saturday night, not only will trophies be given for best competitive displays, but also scholarships will be awarded to college students working toward degrees in the earth sciences.

Meyer mentioned how important it has been/continues to be to build relationships first and business second. She said, "When an unlimited number of people in the same profession attend our luncheons, they end up collaborating instead of colliding. It is the theory of, "When 2 or more are gathered."

Besides having the monthly luncheons, the group gathers for evening wine mixers in locally owned women businesses. In March of 2020, the Ladies Luncheon Ventura had their first all-day event: "Radiant You". Meyer said, "We hope to be able to repeat this event soon, since it was very successful with over 100 attendees. Hopefully in May, 2025. Meyer stressed how the group is, "Now about 'Community, Connection and Support.' While we support each other, and refer each other for our businesses, the LOVE that has been created is exponential. And, after 15 years, we have been through many ups and downs with each other, including adversities and successes. The bond continues to be strong, and we are not going anywhere, except growing larger now that, since the pandemic, ladies have more of a desire to be able to connect in person."



# Ombudsman of Ventura County hires new Executive Director

With the percentage of elderly people in Ventura County forecasted to grow to 30% of the population within the next several years, preserving the high quality of advocacy that the Ombudsman of Ventura County has been providing since 1981 is even more critical. "We are very excited to have Keith Gosselin transition intro the position of Executive Director," stated Sylvia Taylor-Stein, current Executive Director, who will transition into a new role and continue to serve the volunteers, long-term care residents, and the community that she loves. She said that, "He has effectively expanded the capabilities of several nonprofit organizations during his professional career.

Gosselin, who has a BA in Management from Loyola Marymount University, in Los Angeles, and an MBA from the College of William & Mary, in Williamsburg, Virginia, has been a tenured Associate Professor at Mount Saint Mary's University, along with having been an adjunct faculty member at Cal State University, Northridge, California Lutheran

University, and University of CA Los Angeles and UCLA.

During his 20+ years of college instruction, he taught mostly marketing classes, such as Principles of Marketing, Advertising Sales Management, Market Research, Social Media Marketing the Nonprofit, and International Marketing. And, with his MBA in Finance, along with a high-tech background, he taught Principles of Finance, along with Management of Information Systems at Mount Saint Mary's University, every year.

Gosselin's most recent position was as the Executive Director for His Hands on Africa, a nonprofit that provides free dental services in Rwanda. He was tasked with increasing U.S. donations to finance expansive efforts, which he did by growing the annual fundraising from \$350,000 to over \$850,000 in just one year. As a result, the number of Rwandans receiving free oral health care will continue to increase significantly over the next decade.

Long Term Care Services of Ventura County, Inc. is a 501c 3 nonprofit that advocates for the higher quality of life and care possible for all our disabled and elderly living in long term care facilities. The Ombudsman staff & volunteers make unannounced and unscheduled visits to long term care facilities to help ensure the quality of care and the quality of life for the elderly and disabled residents. Gosselin said, "I am honored to be a part of a best-inclass organization that represents the needs of two of the often-overlooked populations in our communities: the elderly and the disabled."

In terms of goals, Gosselin said, "My priority at Long Term Care is to retain the incredibly high level of quality of services that the program has provided the community for the last 25+ years (courtesy of Sylvia Taylor-Stein)), through our staff and incredible volunteers. Secondarily, I plan on increasing and diversifying our funding to reduce our reliance on government grants and to expand upon our services into the areas of the community that we would like to

# Free Food Programs for Seniors

Today's soaring food prices are deeply problematic for countless Venturans, but they're particularly stressful for those on a fixed income. For many seniors, regular access to nutritious food can be challenging, but there is help available in the form of local and statewide programs designed to combat food insecurity.

Food Share Ventura County

Since 1978, Food Share has been feeding the hungry in Ventura County. According to Food Share, one in four people in Ventura County lives in a household that experiences food insecurity. Today, staff and volunteers distribute nearly 19 million pounds of food, providing 16 million meals annually to

people in Ventura County through its hunger programs and 190 pantry and program partners. As Ventura County's regional food bank, Food Share provides food for over 250,000 hungry friends and neighbors annually. Food Share is a member of Feeding America, the nation's largest hunger-relief network of food banks, as well as the California Association of Food Banks.

Food Share's Senior Food Box program works to improve the health of low-income seniors by providing monthly, nutritious, shelf-stable food packages to income-eligible seniors aged 60 and over. Currently, Food Share has close to 40 Senior Food Box distribution sites throughout Ventura County that

Ventura County Area Agency on Aging

The Senior Nutrition Program (SNP) from the Ventura County Area Agency on Aging (VCAAA) provides nutritious meals for older adults and people with disabilities within Ventura County, including Congregate and Home-Delivered Meal (HDM) services. These meal programs provide seniors with nutritious meals and contribute to maintaining their health, safety, dignity, and quality of life. Since the COVID-19 crisis began in March 2020, the VCAAA has served more than eight million meals to Ventura County's older adults, people with disabilities, and caregivers.

All SNP meals are approved by a Registered Dietitian to meet U.S. Dietary Guidelines for Americans and are geared toward the Dietary Reference Intake (DRI) and Adequate Intake for vitamins and elements for older, frail adults. These meals provide a minimum of one-third of the DRI and accommodate diabetic and low-sodium diets.

The Senior Nutrition Program is not income-based. There's a suggested donation of \$3 per meal; however, no eligible individual (60 years and over) will be denied participation because of failure or inability to contribute. This valuable service is sustained with the help of contri-

to promote the health, well-being, dignity, and independence of frail, homebound elders through one-on-one relationships with trusted volunteers. CAREGIVERS provides non-medical, in-home support services and transportation with a goal of preventing premature placement into board and care facilities and making it possible for elders to continue to live in the comfort and security of their own homes. Examples of assistance that volunteers may provide include cleaning up around the house, such as washing windows, vacuuming, dusting, mopping, yard maintenance, home organization, and much more.


CAREGIVERS programs are carried out by over 300 giving, caring volunteers who are recruited and trained from our local community. Kayla Meza, a student at California State University, Channel Islands, plans to go into the healthcare field and recently completed a semester with CAREGIVERS as part of her service-learning course. "Throughout the semester, I have had the privilege of assisting three seniors, one of whom I have built a great friendship with. One of my seniors has some health conditions that prevent her from doing everyday tasks such as sweeping, mopping, vacuuming, laundry, and cooking. The little help — an hour per week for each of them — that I provide goes a long way for my seniors, and they are always very appreciative of the time I dedicate to them."

Currently, CAREGIVERS is in great need of additional volunteers. They make every effort to match a carefully screened and trained volunteer to a homebound elder who needs basic assistance and companionship in order to foster a long-term, one-on-one relationship between them. "The organization only asks about 1.5 hours of help per week," explained Meza. "As of today, Ventura County CAR-EGIVERS really needs volunteers in Oxnard, Thousand Oaks, and Camarillo. They also have opportunities to serve as Team Leaders to high school volunteers throughout Ventura County. There are many homebound seniors who need assistance, and unfortunately, the number of volunteers cannot keep up with the number of seniors needing help. If you decide to volunteer for Ventura County CAREGIV-ERS, I promise you will not regret it."





• Volunteers from All For Love Animal Rescue (AFLAR), a local animal rescue organization, spearheaded a project to make 50 brand new, custom-made beds for rescue dogs who are in

boarding, waiting to be adopted. The issue arose when rescue volunteers discovered that the nighttime hutches, essential for the dogs' shelter and protection from wind and rain, were not big enough to accommodate the bigger size dog beds. That left bigger dogs, like AFLAR dog Chevi, without a proper bed inside.

Recognizing the urgency of the situation, AFLAR volunteers embarked on a mission to address this pressing concern. Volunteers Mandy Rodriguez and Kirstin Rizk identified the challenge presented by Chevi's need for a suitable bed. Realizing that the problem extended far beyond Chevi's individual needs, Lupe Flores, an AFLAR volunteer known for her passion and problem-solving prowess, spearheaded efforts to design and construct custom-made beds that would fit the unique dimensions of every single hutch at CARL, a local rescue and boarding facility which houses many rescue dogs.

Through a remarkable display of community support and fundraising efforts, the necessary resources were swiftly secured. Within a day, donations poured in, surpassing expectations and enabling the project to commence without delay. Over the course of three intensive weeks, a dedicated team of 14 volunteers generously contributed their time to bring the vision to life. • Commercially prepared pet food and treats can provide nutritious diets and delicious rewards for pets, but it's important to handle them with health and safety in mind. That's because—just like people food—they sometimes may be contaminated with bacteria like Salmonella or Listeria, which can cause serious illness in both the pets that eat them and the people who handle the food and treats.

Animals that become infected after eating contaminated food also may pose a risk to the people with whom they come in contact. The people most at risk from these infections are the young, elderly, pregnant, and immune-compromised.

Contamination is especially a concern when it comes to raw food products, but can happen with cooked/processed products as well. Fortunately, there are simple precautions pet owners can take to minimize the risk of illness from contaminated pet food and treats in both their pets and themselves.

Purchase only products that are in good condition at the time of sale. Avoid packages that are damaged, such as dented cans or ripped and torn bags.

Wash hands for at least 20 seconds with clean running water and soap after handling pet food and treats. Use hand sanitizer when handwashing isn't an option.

Wash pet food and water bowls, scoops, feeding mats, and other items used in feeding your pet frequently. Use hot, soapy water.

Use a dedicated spoon or scoop to place pet food in the bowl. To avoid contaminating the pet food do NOT use the unwashed bowl as a scoop.

Promptly seal and refrigerate any unused or leftover wet or moist pet food or treats in a refrigerator set at 40°F or below, or discard it.

Use leftover, refrigerated wet/moist food and treats as soon as possible and according to label directions.

Store dry pet food and treats in a cool, dry place at less than 80°F.

If possible, store dry pet food in its original bag inside a clean, dedicated, airtight container. If the original bag is not used, save the part of the bag with the complete product name, date of manufacture, lot number, and expiration date or best-by date. This information is helpful in an investigation where contaminated pet food is suspected. It also can help you avoid feeding out-of-date food.



1991 murder case of Danielle Clause. Using advanced forensic genetic genealogy techniques, law enforcement has identified Larry Devon Welch as the perpetrator, which is a pivotal moment in resolving this long-standing mystery.

"Through extensive collaboration with local and national law enforcement agencies and nonprofits, it's with great pride that I share this success story," said Ventura Police Chief Darin Schindler. "From the initial investigation in 1991 to recent advancements in forensic techniques, I'm honored to highlight the perseverance of detectives as they continued to seek justice for the victim and her family."

On July 16, 1991, the body of 42-year-old Clause was found on the hillside located at the top of Tioga Drive near downtown Ventura. The autopsy showed that she had been sexually assaulted and had died due to multiple blunt-force injuries to her head. Once investigators at the time explored every avenue, the case was suspended and considered cold.

In 2021, Ventura Police detectives and forensic specialists retested crime scene evidence for DNA. Forensic genetic genealogy was pursued, and a family tree was developed. Phenotyping was used to verify distinct characteristics of the suspect, and after collecting family DNA samples, Larry Welch was positively identified.

Welch passed away in 1999. There was no known connection between Welch and Clause at the time of her murder.

"My sister was so much more than a victim of a brutal murder. She was artist, a daughter, a sister, a mother, and a wife. She was a good person with a mighty soul, and she was taken way too young," shared Marcie Forte, Danielle's sister. "I didn't really believe that the police were going to solve this, because there are other crimes being committed all the time. I was proven wrong because the Ventura Police and everyone associated with this cold case did a phenomenal job and I am so grateful. I'm so grateful that I lived to see at least a meter of justice and that they found out who did this."

The Ventura Police Department's unwavering commitment to securing justice for victims and their families endures, regardless of the elapsed time. Presently, VPD has over 25 cold cases, spanning homicides, missing persons, and unidentified deceased individuals.

The Ventura Police Department has released a storytelling video outlining details of this case from the original investigators, current detectives, and family of the victim. 

# As I See It by Sheldon Brown

Councilmember Campos accused a former city executive of bullying her. The City Council voted to accept a city-led investigation that found she wasn't bullied.

Campos accused former acting City Manager Akbar Alikhan of bullying her during a closed-session meeting in May 2023 when he allegedly didn't let her leave the room until she took a certain position on an issue.

The City Council voted on April 9 to accept the results of a city-led investigation into Campos' allegations, which determined she was not harassed or bullied. The probe was headed by a consultant hired by the city and not by the city.

Alikhan, who left Ventura last year and is now the deputy city manager in Thousand Oaks, denies Campos' accusations. "The results of the investigation clearly shows any such allegations were patently false," Alikhan said.

The council voted 5-1 to receive and file the report. Councilmember Mike Johnson voted no because he said he wasn't given the full investigative report and felt the investigation was incomplete and should continue.

 Ventura and Oxnard colleges will each get new presidents in July after Ventura County Community College District trustees unanimously approved contracts for the top roles during a Tuesday night board meeting.

Claudia Lourido-Habib, currently the president of Porterville College will take over as president of the 11,700student Ventura College from the retiring Kimberly Hoffmans on July 8. She'll earn \$288,660 in salary and \$94,610 in benefits annually during a three-year contract.

diverse ocean life and habitats. These ocean waters include migratory routes for large whales - including endangered humpback whales - nurseries for great white shark pups, breeding and foraging habitat for California sea lions and giant seabass, gardens for colorful deep sea corals, and canopies of giant kelp forests to name a

Oceana and Blancpain intend to undertake a variety of research elements that include:

Partnering with a San Diego-based company that uses a Remotely Operated Vehicle (ROV) for military purposes, that for the first time will be used for ocean conservation. We will be using the ROVs side-scan sonar technology to map the seafloor and explore how this technology may be able to help detect the presence of deep-sea corals in addition to seafloor substrate data, and lost fishing gear.

Collecting environmental DNA (eDNA) water samples that will be later analyzed in a lab to detect what ocean animals inhabit and traverse these waters by the DNA "footprint" they leave behind in the water column.

Conducting scuba dive surveys documenting the diversity of ocean fish and their habitats to provide a comprehensive glimpse into the biodiversity at risk.

Identifying individual giant seabass and their aggregation sites - a fish that can weigh more than 500 pounds and once reigned over California's kelp forests until it was overfished in the 1900's. Individual fish are identified by their unique spots - like a fingerprint - and documenting them can provide new insights into their movements and conservation. We are partnering with the scientists at UCSB to advance their "Spotting Giant Seabass" research project.

The groups plan to utilize the imagery and scientific information gathered at sea in support of protecting ocean biodiversity by reducing entanglement of ocean animals - including whales, sea lions, sharks, and other fish - in set gillnet fishing gear. These fishing nets used to catch California halibut and white seabass can be 20 football fields long. Despite action by California voters more than 30 years ago, set gillnets are still allowed in federal waters (3-200 miles from shore) off Southern California's mainland, offshore banks, and in state waters around California's Channel Islands. Oceana is urging the California Fish and Game Commission and the state legislature to reduce bycatch in the set gillnet fishery.

This scientific expedition is the first of three voyages Oceana and Blancpain have planned in partnership to explore ocean biodiversity off California through

# May is National Bike Month

May is National Bike Month, and the Ventura County, the Ventura County Transportation Commission and the Ventura-based non-profit Bike Ventura County offer prizes, maps and training.

Bike to Work Week, May 15-21, and Bike to Work Day, May 17. Adults, over 18 years old, who make the pledge at goventura.org/pledge by May 31 will be entered for a chance to win

one of six \$250 Amazon gift cards.

The Transportation Commission's new guide, "Biking Ventura County: Routes & Tips for Beginners & Families" features shared-use paths and separated bike lanes across Ventura County, and the commission's "Go Ventura Bikeways Map," outlines bicycle routes across Ventura County. Both the guide and the map are available on VCTC's website at goventura.

org/getting-around/bike. Printed copies are available at bike shops across the county or by sending an email to bike@goventura.org.

Bike Ventura County, a non-profit organization based in Ventura, is coordinating several events this month. "Community Wrench" workshops are offered every Tuesday evening in May. "Empowering cyclists with basic maintenance knowledge is key to a thriving cycling community," said Larry Abele, President of the Board of Directors. These and future workshops are sponsored by Kaiser Permanente and the Channel Islands Bike Club, with registration at Bike Ventura County Community Wrench Workshop.

A "Brew Ride" takes place on the second Sunday of each month (May 12th) from 1:00 to 4:30pm, starting at 490 N Ventura Ave. This social ride celebrates Ventura's outstanding, award-winning breweries, but safety is paramount. "There's no excessive drinking and riding," Abele assured. "Riders enjoy tastings and... chat with local brewers." The casual ride starts after lunch, and participants will have just time for one drink at each of two brewery visits. "Remember, on the road, cyclists are vehicles subject to all traffic laws, including those against drunk driving," Abele emphasized.

The next event, a RideReady Adult Class, will be on Saturday, May 25, 8:45am to 1:00pm, at Trek Bicycle Ventura, 4060 E Main St, in

Ventura. Registration is required at the Bike Ventura County website, https://bikeventura.org/rideready/. The class is funded by a grant from the State Office of Traffic Safety to the city and Trek Bikes of Ventura is offering store discounts and donating water bottles to each participant and will award a prize of a free Trek Bicycle to one lucky winner who completes the class. The four-hour session covers bike fit, safety inspection, traffic safety, emergency maneuvers, and responsibilities of the road.

The same grant from the State Office of Traffic Safety to the city of Ventura funds Bike Ventura County's bicycle safety education programs in all four Ventura middle schools and 10 elementary schools this year. So far, over 2,500 students have enjoyed a week-long bike education program, which includes on-bike safety drills and fun "bicycle safety rodeos," for the younger students. The program will cover every Ventura Unified elementary school next year.

One final tip: All Ventura County bus operators are offering free fares to anyone who boards the bus with a bike on Bike to Work Day, Friday, May 17. For more information, see https://www.goventura.org/vctc-transit/free-fare-programs/
